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### Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) Light Therapy

Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) is a seasonal form of clinical depression typically seen in the fall and winter. It affects an estimated six percent of the U.S. population and two to three percent of the Canadian population. It is more common in women than men. It is not a selfdiagnosable ailment. SAD can cause problems in functioning both at work and in one's personal life.<sup>1,2</sup> The American Psychiatric Association on maior depressive disorders guidelines recommend the entire range of depressive treatments for SAD, in combination with or as an alternative to light therapy. Light therapy is considered adjunctive to psychopharmacologic therapies for severe forms of SAD.<sup>3</sup>

SAD is thought to be caused by the light-dark cycle or photoperiodic mechanisms that mediate seasonal rhythms. Other theories involve neurotransmitter or neurohormonal systems, including melatonin, serotonin, tryptophan, and dopamine.<sup>4</sup> The antidepressant effects of increased serotonin are well recognized as is the relationship of darkness to increased melatonin production that leads to sleepiness.

Effective light therapy is achieved by exposure to 10,000 lux cool-white light. Distance of exposure from the light to the person is specific for 10,000 lux intensity rating. Lower intensity-rated products are available but require closer distances and extended exposure. Boxes are equipped with either full spectrum or broad spectrum lights. Full spectrum lights include the ultraviolet spectrum and must be used with an ultraviolet filter or diffuser for safety. Broad spectrum lights exclude the ultraviolet spectrum. Optimal exposure is for 30 to 45 minutes early in the morning upon awakening. Eyes must be open not closed for therapy to be effective.<sup>4</sup>

The Circadian Lighting Association is an international trade association of light therapy manufacturers. It sets certain product standards for manufacturer members to assure customers'

confidence. Through independent testing of products checks on ultraviolet light filtration, lux output at designated distances, and other quality tests are required for membership designation.<sup>5</sup>

Insurance coverage for light therapy is difficult and varies with the particular insurer. Since the FDA has not evaluated light therapy, many insurance companies consider it experimental. SAD is recognized as an accepted psychiatric diagnosis and as such the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-IV) of the American Psychiatric Association is used to classify and code it.

The fifth digit represented by "x" in the above table is a modifier for the severity of the disorder.<sup>6</sup>
