

# Giving in a Way That Honors Another

When we reflect on how we came to be where we are in our lives, or in our professions, or even just in our own skin most of us can point to the person or people who helped guide us there. Our mentors and friends...the ones we leaned on and looked to, that now light our way and cheer even our smallest steps.

Honoring the pivotal role such people play in our lives can be difficult. Our desire is to capture our appreciation in a way that is as meaningful and enduring as the imprint they left on us. We want our recognition to illustrate their impact and provide a context of meaning in the larger framework of our history.

Let me give you an example ... after pharmacy alumnus Vincent Cochetti '86, PharmD suddenly passed away in 2013, his parents were searching for a meaningful way to honor his memory and give back to future generations of Pacific pharmacy students. Vince's mother, Ann Morisoli, selected a room in the Edward and Alice Long Memorial Hall, affectionately known as the "Old Pharmacy Building," that was meaningful to Vince and, with a gift to the School, named D121 the "Vincent Cochetti Conference Room."

This room is particularly significant because when Vince was a student in the 80s, he spent many hours in that space when it was two different labs. Memorabilia from Vince's time as a student and life as a community pharmacist is displayed in two shadowboxes framing the doorway of the room. The generosity of Vince's parents was felt across the School, providing important support to the School in a way that memorializes the life of Vince who was passionately committed to caring for patients as a community pharmacist.

Another option is to create an endowed scholarship in the name of another allowing you to both honor that person and support future students. Many of the School's alumni have honored favorite professors by creating endowed scholarships to provide assistance to pharmacy, speech-language pathology and audiology and physical therapy students in perpetuity.









The Emmons E. Roscoe Pharmacy Memorial Scholarship, created in memory of the School's first professor, **Emmons E. Roscoe**, RPh, MS set a precedent for faculty and students to establish a legacy that extends beyond their time at Pacific. Here are just some of the individuals who are remembered as inspirational role models:









Donald Shirachi '60, PhD received a doctorate in pharmacology from Purdue University. From 1971 through 1994 he was one of the central figures in the Department of Physiology and Pharmacology. The honor of the Order of Pacific recognized his exemplary service and contributions to the University. He specializes in the pharmacology of hyperbaric medicine and he has been the Director of Research at the Chico Hyperbaric Center since 1998.

Ravindra Vasavada, PhD came to Pacific in 1973 and became well-known among the faculty for his work in teaching the design, development and evaluation of controlled-release drug delivery systems. Dr. Vasavada has left a lasting legacy through the graduate students he mentored. He received the Order of Pacific in 2000 in acknowledgment of his outstanding contributions.

# A Daring Dream Becomes A Reality By: Anne Marie H. Bergthold

President Robert Burns '31, PhD created an environment of exploration and risk-taking, allowing the School of Pharmacy to be formed despite the reality that, at that time, Pacific was a relatively small, primarily liberal arts college. One of the figures responsible for pioneering the idea of a pharmacy school at Pacific was Emerson Cobb, PhD. When Dr. Cobb came to Pacific in 1948 as Chair of the Chemistry Department, there were only 15 chemistry students. Dr. Cobb believed that since pharmacy students needed a fundamental understanding of chemistry, establishing a pharmacy school would enrich the Chemistry Department. Time would prove Dr. Cobb's theory to be true. With President Burns' blessing Dr. Cobb approached local pharmacists to assess the potential need for a pharmacy school in the Central Valley. The response to Dr. Cobb's inquiry was overwhelming.

Pharmacy owner J. Martin Winton '62, DPA found it incredibly difficult to find pharmacists willing to relocate to Fresno. At that time, there were only two pharmacy schools in California, one at University of California, San Francisco and the other at University of Southern California. Pharmacies located in central California had difficulty persuading graduates to leave the metropolitan areas to come to cities such as Stockton or Bakersfield.

In July 1954, at the Northern California Pharmaceutical Association Convention, Mr. Winton's fervor in expressing the desperate need for a third pharmacy school was so compelling that it brought unanimous approval. He even swayed the opinion of the representative of the two existing schools who, at the outset, were firmly opposed. Mr. Winton pledged the first \$1,000 in a gesture reminiscent of John Hancock boldly signing the Declaration of Independence.

The next step was for President Burns to find a visionary dean who could see beyond the bare lightbulbs of Weber Hall. Burns believed that Ivan W. Rowland, PhD the Dean of the School of Pharmacy at Idaho State University (ISU), had an entrepreneurial spirit that would be vital to the success of Pacific's latest daring venture. In his own words, Dean Rowland notes that "there was no reason for me to leave [...] I was comfortable, had modern facilities, a faculty, lots of students." Not easily deterred, President Burns wrote to Dean Rowland saying: "How will you even know whether you're worth anything or not, if you sit here in the shadows of the two deans who have preceded you?

That history has already been made [...]. If you come to Pacific and establish a School of Pharmacy, you'll know in short order whether you've got what it takes or you're a dismal failure."

With the first classes already scheduled, President Burns took a gamble waiting for Dean Rowland's acceptance. It was a risk that would reap rewards beyond even President Burns' high expectations. That provocative letter sparked action and Dean Rowland decided to accept this once in a lifetime opportunity. Joining Dean Rowland at Pacific was Emmons E. Roscoe, RPh, MS who would be the first pharmacy professor. Dr. Roscoe was both Dean Rowland's former teacher and dean at ISU. He brought wisdom and innovation during the crucial developmental years. Dr. Roscoe's area of expertise was pharmacognosy, the study and use of natural products as medicines.

In addition to Dr. Roscoe, the founding faculty was made up of Carl Riedesel, PhD, Cisco Kihara '61, MS, Ina Pearson and Donald Y. Barker, PhD. Dr. Riedesel served for many years as Assistant Dean alongside Dean Rowland. In addition to his administrative role, Dr. Riedesel was an original faculty member and taught a variety of pharmacy courses. He had a gift for encouraging people to expand their horizons. When students expressed concern about campus issues, Dr. Riedesel challenged them to run for student body president. Not only did one of the pharmacy students run, Wayne Gohl '64, RPh won the election.

Professor Kihara, affectionately known to her students as "Mama K," saw each student as an individual and was concerned with their success. Also originally from ISU, after living for 30 years in Idaho she decided to pull up roots and move to Stockton. In 1961 Professor Kihara became the first master's program graduate of the School when she completed her master's degree in physiology-pharmacology. Her students remember her for her expectation that they come to class dressed professionally. When "High Times," starring Bing Crosby, was being filmed on campus, one of the actors came into her lab dressed in such a way that did not meet her standards. Professor Kihara spoke to the director and, as she explains, "when the actual filming took place the extras all appeared in proper garb and demeanor."

Mrs. Pearson was a librarian who also came from ISU with Rowland. Her significant contribution to the School was the creation of a library from a very meager budget. Mrs. Pearson was known for finding value in materials that others had discarded and many of the documents she preserved were of historical significance. She was, along with Professor Kihara, a member of the Apotherettes, who would later become Pacific's chapter of Lambda Kappa Sigma.

Dr. Barker was warned by friends that going to Pacific would be detrimental to his career. He writes, "I was discouraged to accept this position by friends concerned for my professional welfare. According to them, the School would never see accreditation and would just 'fizzle out.'" What Dr. Barker's friends had not had the opportunity to experience was the zeal of the faculty and students. When Dr. Barker first visited the campus he was impressed.

The dedication of the 1973 yearbook expresses the lasting impact that Dr. Barker had on his students: "In one short year Dr. Barker was to review the basic pharmaceutical math that previous instructors had tried to teach us in addition to teaching quantities of new material relating to product identification and the various dosage formulation process. His hardest and most important task was to ensure that we were psychologically ready to take the State Board examination which we had been preparing for during our college years.

Dr. Barker also prepared us to go out into the profession with the understanding that continual growth in our knowledge is essential for survival as pharmacists."

Those skeptics who had predicted the School's failure were proven wrong when, in June 1959, the School had a graduating class of 16 students, all of whom passed the State Board exam. That same year the program received accreditation. In just a few short years the School made a remarkable achievement of reaching peak enrollment of 250 students.

"The enthusiasm and contagious excitement that prevailed, in addition to the down-to-earth friendliness, convinced me that this is where I belonged."

He believes that the first group of students who gathered in Weber Hall took a leap of faith as there was no visible facility, no dean and no faculty. Looking back over the School's 60 years of history he expresses, "Just look at us now! Look at what grew from the humble start in Weber Hall. As Professor Emmons Roscoe would say, 'Isn't it amazing!"


#### The Edward and Alice Long Memorial Hall

John Hambright '71, PharmD was one of the students who witnessed the transition from Weber Hall to North Campus when the Edward and Alice Long Memorial Hall was completed in 1969. He recalls, "Many students were engaged to move furniture and equipment. The leader of the band, Dean Rowland orchestrated the move to one of the finest facilities in the country."


Joan Nielsen Abbott '74, PharmD remembers her most memorable day in lab with Cisco Kihara '61, MS, "We were making throat lozenges. [...] I decided to not put it into another container, but instead heated it on the asbestos pad on the Bunsen burner directly in the Pyrex mortar. 'Lo and behold' the mortar cracked and

the candy preparation began oozing out the crack, downwards onto the counter."

Leah M. Robitaille '06, PT, DPT also had a memorable experience in lab. She shares, "I will never forget our first day in gross anatomy lab with Dr. Jim Mansoor. As we were preparing to see our cadavers for the first time my heart was racing and I was not sure I would be able to get through the lab. After we got started we were all just focused on identifying the anatomical sites in the hip as we had been assigned. From that day forward, it was just another part of our learning experience, along with the strong smell of formaldehyde!"

The School's state-of-the-art pharmaceutical care lab is named in honor of **Donald Y. Barker**, PhD who served as a faculty member from 1957 to 1989. When the lab was refurbished **Jerome "Jerry" Greene** '88, RPh named a lab bench in recognition of the role that both his parents and alma mater have played in his career. Greene credits his parents with instilling in him the attitude that anything was possible. Owner of an independent pharmacy, he believes that, "If not for my parents guidance [...] I wouldn't have attended graduate school, nor would I have the tools to be able to proudly say that because of my upbringing, and the education I've received at Pacific, I have owned my own compounding pharmacy for the past 11 years."

After Vincent Cochetti '86, PharmD passed away suddenly in 2013 his mother, Ann Morisoli, selected a room to be named the Vincent Cochetti Conference Room in his honor. Adam M. Kaye '95, PharmD who was Cochetti's friend and colleague, explains, "Vince was a wonderful preceptor for dozens of experiential students for over 20 years." Dr. Kaye believes this is "a fitting memorial for this incredibly smart, caring and thoughtful pharmacist who left the profession he loved much too soon."

#### Rite Aid Information Commons

Funding from the Rite Aid Corporation enabled the School's existing library to be completely refurbished and renovated. Christopher K. Berg '11, '14, DPT reminisces, "I would often use the Rite Aid Information Commons for lunchtime studying and my favorite spot was the last cubicle on either side. That spot would block out everyone and give me the peace and quiet I needed to study."

#### The Rotunda

One of the memories that Gina Moore '83, MBA, PharmD has from the Rotunda is "our class sitting in the balcony of the Rotunda for Dr. Chaubal's class. There wasn't a single student in the main level. Dr. Chaubal then laid down on the stage to give his lecture." Rebecca "Becky" Harper '03, PharmD vividly recalls "being scared Dr. Abood would choose my name out of the hat to answer a question." Both Harper and Paula Cannistraci '05, PharmD fondly remember Timothy J. Smith, RPh, PhD playing his guitar. At first Cannistraci sat in the balcony, but she soon found that it was too easy to fall asleep. She moved to the lower section where "fear of professors kept me awake." For Steve Leuck '87, PharmD one of his best memories from the Rotunda was when he received the 1986 California Society of Health-System Pharmacists Student of the Year Award.

#### Chan Family Health Sciences Learning Center and Clinics

Since 2003 the Chan Family Health Sciences Learning Center and Clinics has provided much needed classroom and clinical space for each of the School's programs.

Simalee Smith-Stubblefield '83, MA, CCC-SLP shares a memory from a few years ago: "The Pacific basketball team was playing in the NCAA tourney and many of us met in Room 115 and watched it on the big screens, ate popcorn, chips and salsa and had a great time rooting on the Tigers for two rounds. It was fun and built camaraderie."

Benjamin Reece '01, '08, MS has worked with clients at Pacific both as a student and a faculty member. He recalls, "I had a really interesting gentleman as my first adult client when I was a student. He had just received a cochlear implant and was coming to the clinic for aural rehabilitation." As Professor Reece was new to aural rehabilitation, he worked one-on-one with Dr. Hanyak to prepare for the first few sessions. Professor Reece adds, "While it was somewhat scary, it was an excellent opportunity to work closely with a member of the faculty and I loved it! In addition, the gentleman was one of the most interesting guys I have ever worked with. [...] I will never forget him or working with Dr. Hanyak to serve him."

#### Pacific Hearing and Balance Center in San Francisco

Veronica Koo '18 explains the vital role that the Pacific Hearing and Balance Center at the San Francisco campus plays in the doctor of audiology program: "Access to an on-site audiology clinic is invaluable to the students, as it provides immediate application of classroom concepts into practice. Not only does this solidify audiological concepts, but also humanizes them by allowing students to interact with real patients who have real concerns."



Looking back at the history of the School there are a number of women who stand out as trailblazers in disciplines where before them there had been few female role models. They have also played key roles in the School's milestones, from Katherine Lum Owyoung '59, RPh who was the only woman in the School's inaugural graduating class, to Alina Chen '95, '00, PharmD, PhD who in 2000 became the first student to complete the doctor of pharmacy-doctor of philosophy dual-degree program.

# Remembering the Ladies

Edna Gleason was one of the local pharmacists consulted in the initial discussions that led to the formation of the pharmacy school at Pacific. Her husband was a practicing pharmacist and she his apprentice. In 1922 she passed the State Board examination. Sadly, just two months later her husband died of pneumonia. She refused to sell or hire someone to take over the store's management. Nicknamed "Dynamite," she was very active in professional organizations and politics. In 1933 she became the first woman President of the California Pharmacists Association and a year later the first ever woman on the California State Board of Pharmacy.

Helen Rowland '31, was a member of the University's Development Staff before she met Ivan W. Rowland, PhD who was to become her husband and the School's founding dean. One-half of "Team Rowland," her vital role in fundraising in the early years is undeniable. She served as a gracious host and personally wrote thank you notes to all donors, regardless of the amount of the gift. She is warmly remembered by alumni who knew her for taking a personal interest in their families and careers.

Katherine Lum Owyoung, '59, RPh was the only woman in the class of 1959. Owyoung served as the first President of the Central Valley Chapter of the California Society of Health-System Pharmacists. Known to many as a mentor, she was a charter member of Pacific's chapter of Lambda Kappa Sigma. During her 40 years of dedicated service at St. Joseph's Medical Center in Stockton, her roles spanned from Staff Pharmacist to the Director of Pharmacy.

Cisco Kihara '61, MS attended pharmacy school at what is now Idaho State University (ISU) where she was one of only three women in her class. In the early 1930s Professor Kihara was asked to join the faculty at her alma mater. When Dean Rowland left ISU to come to Pacific, she boldly made the move to leave the life she had established in Idaho to become one of the School's founding faculty. At Pacific she was the first to receive a master's degree from the fledgling program. She was actively involved in a wide variety of organizations, including serving as the International Vice President and the U.S. President of the Pan Pacific Southeast Asia Women's Organization.

Alice Jean Matuszak, PhD left her fingerprints on the School in many notable ways. Soon after she started at Pacific, Dean Rowland instructed her to found a chapter of the Rho Chi Honor Society. The application process was incredibly labor intensive, but resulted in a charter on their first attempt. In 1964 Dean Rowland strongly encouraged Dr. Matuszak to take the State Board exam. Preparing for the exam entailed Dr. Matuszak learning approximately 500 new drugs that had come on the market since her graduation. While she never had the opportunity to use her board certification as a practicing pharmacist, it paved the way for her to be appointed to several prestigious positions. Dr. Matuszak served a 10-year term as the representative for the American Pharmacists Association on the United States Adopted Names Council, which is

tasked with creating unique nonproprietary names for new drugs before they are released on the market. This uniquely equipped Dr. Matuszak to teach her pharmacy students about the new drugs.

Jean I. Baldwin, PhD was the founder of Pacific's physical therapy program. In addition to working as a physical therapist, Dr. Baldwin served in the U.S. Navy and taught at Marquette University. Dr. Baldwin set the tone for a program where the work was rigorous but also enjoyable. The atmosphere that she helped create attracted students from all around the world. In 1977 she oversaw the first graduating class of 16 students and was instrumental in the program receiving accreditation from the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA). Dr. Baldwin again witnessed an inaugural graduating class when, in 1988, Pacific had 30 students graduate with a master of science in physical therapy.

Carolyn Hultgren, MPH, PT was at Pacific during a time when the doctor of physical therapy degree was just a dream. Her leadership helped poise the department for what would be a necessary change. Professor Hultgren has been a member of APTA since 1957, serving on the Board of Directors and a 6-year term as Speaker of the House of Delegates. Always an advocate for involvement with professional organizations, she explains that as a member "you have the best opportunity to influence the direction of your profession." She represented Pacific at numerous conferences, including the World Confederation for Physical Therapy Congress in Yokohama, Japan.

Darcy Umphred, PT, PhD has the experience to write the book on physical therapy, and she has, authoring several highly acclaimed texts. She is the author of "Neurological Rehabilitation and Neurorehabilitation for the Physical Therapist Assistant." Dr. Umphred also explored the realms of neuroscience and spirituality in a series entitled "Traveling Plains of Consciousness." Her area of expertise is the rehabilitation of patients with neurological disease. In 2003, Dr. Umphred was named a Fellow of the APTA. Dr. Umphred has a life-threatening genetic disorder, but rather than live under a cloud of fear she has a tenacity for life, which was evident to all of the students she encountered at Pacific from 1986 until her retirement in 2004.











Virginia Puich, MS was well respected by her colleagues during her 28 years at Pacific and was awarded the Order of Pacific, the University's highest award. Her teaching style was approachable and left a lasting impression on her students. Along with Kenneth Perrin '77, PharmD, PhD and Roy Timmons, PhD she was instrumental in forming the foundation of both the undergraduate and graduate programs that exist today, including the accreditation of the master's degree program in 1973. During her tenure she was considered the heart and soul of the department. Simalee Smith-Stubblefield '83, MA, CCC-SLP in speaking of her mentor, expressed, "She taught me to have high expectations yet be thoughtful and kind."

Janet Nimtz '85, '86, MA, CCC-SLP joined Pacific in 1988 and over time her responsibilities expanded, including acting as Clinical Director of the Scottish Rite Childhood Language Disorders Center. In this position she oversaw numerous students while they gained valuable clinical experience. Former students view her as a mentor and credit her with helping define who they are as clinicians. Always one to offer encouragement and words of wisdom, she urges her fellow speech-language pathology professionals to "Challenge yourself to take your practice to the next level and connect with fellow alumni and others in the profession. [...] This will help you to keep your practice fresh, inspired and energized so you can remember all the wonderful reasons you chose SLP as a career."

#### ALICE JEAN MATUSZAK, PHD

Alice Jean Matuszak, PhD pursued chemistry and pharmacy at a time when it was rare for women to be seen in those professions. Raised on a dairy farm in Ohio, she came in contact with a variety of chemicals, which sparked her interest in chemistry. While in high school she met Betty Gunnerson, a local pharmacist, who got Dr. Matuszak a job working at the pharmacy where she was employed. The atmosphere at

that pharmacy was one that fostered learning; if the pharmacists were working on something interesting they would call Dr. Matuszak to the back to observe.

This formative experience led her to study pharmacy at Ohio State University (OSU), where she met her husband, Charles Matuszak, PhD, who was working on his PhD in chemistry. After earning a master's degree at OSU she pursued a doctorate at the University

of Wisconsin-Madison, making her the first woman to be accepted into that program. She later learned that if she hadn't been married, she probably wouldn't have been accepted. Not long after she started at Wisconsin, the head of the program, Edward Smissman, PhD, accepted a position at the University of Kansas, taking his research and grants with him. Dr. Matuszak, along with more than a dozen graduate students, made the move to Kansas.

Interested in entering academia, the couple sought out a university that would have an opening for faculty in both chemistry and pharmacy. When she interviewed with Dean Ivan W. Rowland, PhD he hired her on the spot. In 1963 she began teaching Pharmacy Orientation and Chemical Toxicology, taking over the courses from Dean Rowland, which allowed him to concentrate on fundraising for the construction of new facilities that were desperately needed.

When she started she had one room that served as her classroom, lab and office. The facilities fell dramatically short of what she was accustomed to, but because she immediately liked the students she didn't have second thoughts. Her focus

was constantly on the success of her students. She says, "I always thought that we shouldn't just write on the blackboard."

She also has many fond memories of her colleagues at Pacific. In particular she recounts her friendship with Donald Y. Barker, PhD who took her under his wing. On one occasion he came into her office and asked if she knew how to use a complicated new machine that predated the photocopier. She remembers Dr. Barker saying, "I bet you don't know how to use that. You're going to have to learn how to use that so come with me."

When talking with Dr. Matuszak it quickly becomes apparent that she has a limitless curiosity and love of history. One subject in particular that has piqued her interest is Lewis and Clark. She explains, "When doing research at the University of Virginia [I found] a list of drugs that Lewis had ordered at Philadelphia. I looked at these lists and thought, 'Oh my goodness, we studied all of these drugs when I was in school!" She adds, "After we retired we drove across the country and traced almost the whole path they took." While they have made Stockton their home, when watching college football they will always be loyal fans of the Ohio State Buckeyes. One might be surprised to learn that she is also a fervent NASCAR fan and has closely followed the career of Jeff Gordon. 🐇

#### KATRIN MATTERN-BAXTER PT. DPT. PCS

Every time Katrin Mattern-Baxter, PT, DPT, PCS sees the color orange she is reminded of her time at Pacific. She accepted a position at Califormia State University, Sacramento to be closer to her home in Davis and to help the department transition their physical therapy program from a master to a doctorate. This transition marks one of the most dramatic changes that she has seen in the field of physical therapy. As a result of the American Physical Therapy Association's (APTA) requirement of a doctorate level degree, patients now have direct access to physical therapists. In addition, "Physical therapists [now] have autonomous practice."

Emphasizing the importance of academic discipline in the highlycompetitive field of physical therapy (PT), Dr. Mattern-Baxter's advice is to "work hard in your science classes." To thrive in this profession it is also vital to "really enjoy working with people all day long." She adds that students need to have a "combination of a big heart and a big brain." The desire to work with people and an interest in the movement systems is what originally

drew Dr. Mattern-Baxter to study physical therapy. Currently her research includes working with children under the age of five who have developmental disabilities. Starting from when the children are perambulatory, twice a week the children walk intensely on "pint sized" treadmills to increase their mobility.

Coming from a background as a clinician, she is grateful to Pacific for jump-starting her academic career. When looking back at her time at Pacific, what stands out to her was "the amount of support I received." In particular, "funding sources for new faculty and mentoring for new faculty." An individual whose support she is especially thankful for is her faculty mentor, Jim Mansoor, PhD. She misses both her students and colleagues. One fond memory of Pacific is the song that the second-year PT students sing to the first-year students before their first big anatomy exam.

As a professor she approaches interactions with her students from the mindset that she will be working alongside them in a few years; she emphasizes, "I always treated them as my future colleagues." She enjoys staying up-to-date with the life events of her former students through Facebook. Every year at the APTA Combined Sections Meeting she also looks forward to seeing familiar faces at the alumni reception.

An added benefit of working at CSU Sacramento is that her schedule is aligned with that of her husband, Jim Baxter, who is a biology professor at the university. Students may remember her sharing about how her husband is an avid documentarian. He recently was an Executive Producer for the award winning PBS documentary "Becoming California." They are adjusting to life as empty-nesters and enjoy traveling through Europe. Originally from a small town near Stuttgart, Germany, she tries to get back every year to visit family.

# MA, CCC-SLP

SIMALEE SMITH-STUBBLEFIELD '83

In talking with Simalee Smith-Stubblefield '83, MA, CCC-SLP one is struck by her joy, love for people and humility. In 2015 she was awarded the Order of the Pacific, the highest award that the University bestows. She places the growth of the speech-language pathology (SLP) profession, and the School's commitment to be on the cutting edge of such advances, above any personal accomplishments. Over her career she has seen the field of SLP evolve. Especially notable is how the scope of practice has expanded. For example she has witnessed a greater emphasis on phonology, "how you form your sounds," an area that was only touched on when she was a student. She also notes a greater emphasis on written language.

She believes that to thrive in the SLP profession "you have to be very flexible, when you look at cases you look at them like little puzzles. It is not one size fits all." She explains that often when people are considering pursuing SLP they say, "I just want to work in a hospital, I just want to work with kids," her response to that mindset is, "I say don't limit yourself."

When she looks back at all of the people she has crossed paths with at Pacific she insists that there are "so many people who are so important to me, I would hate not to name them all." Two of the names that came to mind were Roy Timmons, PhD and Virginia Puich, MS. Dr. Timmons was the chair of the department when she was a student. The

class schedule for SLP did not align with the academic calendar of the rest of the University. Dr. Timmons, wanting to celebrate the accomplishments of the seniors, would host a graduation ceremony at his home complete with replica diplomas. She calls Professor Puich her mentor and the heart of the department.

One thing many alumni remember her for is teaching them visual phonetics. Former students tell her, "I use my visual phonics all the time!" Pacific has seeped into many aspects of her life. She expressed, "I've made so many connections with people here, former students, colleagues, faculty at other universities, that it is just hard not to think of Pacific in my life." She adds, "I want to thank all the faculty, all the former and current students; without them I wouldn't have stayed (for 33 plus years). The people that we get to work with make everything easier, better, more fun, enlightening."

Anyone who knows Professor Smith-Stubblefield knows that she is a diehard Giants baseball fan and during the season she goes to guite a few games. She also loves card making and gardening, or as she says in her characteristic upbeat style, "I love to get out and play in the dirt!" Actively involved in the Pacific community, she still calls Stockton home and is currently teaching one course.





The School's founding Dean and his wife, Helen Rowland '31, who were affectionately known as Team Rowland, devoted their lives to developing the School. A larger-than-life personality, his faculty remember him for both challenging them to develop professionally and for being supportive of new ideas.

Ivan W. Rowland, PhD Dean of the School of Pharmacy from 1955 to 1980 Dr. King joined the Pacific faculty in 1962 and is responsible for establishing the Clinical Clerkship program for PharmD candidates. This resulted in a new competency-based curriculum including didactic and experiential components, a first in the School's history. An innovative and entrepreneurial educator, he created the School's first decentralized clerkship program, placing pharmacy students in practice sites throughout California and Hawaii.

Dr. Barker came to Pacific in 1957 from the University of Manitoba to be one of the founding faculty. Possessing a brilliant mind and a remarkable memory, Dr. Barker would remember if individual students were absent in his classes. Underneath a reserved public persona was a warm and generous personality. Outside of the classroom he was known for his culinary skills, especially his marinated steaks. At the time of his retirement he had taught and mentored more than 3,800 students, many of whom credit him as being instrumental in preparing them for a career in pharmacy.



The time that Dr. Floriddia has spent as a part of the Pacific community can be counted in the decades. In any conversation about Pacific's chapter of Kappa Psi, Dr. Floriddia's name is sure to be mentioned. With a specialization in nuclear pharmacy, his many achievements include co-founding Pharm-Atomic, Inc., the first centralized nuclear pharmacy in California. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame for both the San Joaquin Pharmacists Association and the California Pharmacists Association. Widely sought after for his expertise, in 2001 he was invited to be part of the review team for the pharmacy program of the Ajman University of Sciences and Technology in the United Arab Emirates.

# **Faculty Spotlights**

#### CARL L. FAIRBURN III '10, PT, DPT

#### ASSISTANT PROFESSOR, DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICAL THERAPY

Graduating with a doctor of physical therapy (DPT) from Pacific, Carl L. Fairburn III '10, PT, DPT returned to the School by way of Duke University, where he completed a residency in cardiovascular and pulmonary physical therapy. His residency was from July 2013 until he joined the Pacific faculty in August 2014. He dove right in to enriching the DPT program with his unique areas of expertise. Fairburn explains, "My professional goals [...] are to integrate the use of High-Fidelity Simulation into the curriculum and to promote interdisciplinary collaboration within the School as it relates to the delivery of patient care and student learning. I also hope to increase the students' confidence and competence within the critical care environment through the utilization of our High-Fidelity Simulation lab."

His research interests include early mobilization within the ICU, cardiovascular and pulmonary rehabilitation. He is also interested in researching methods to improve student performance and knowledge within the acute/critical care setting to improve student outcomes during their clinical internships. "Through my experience as a DPT student at Pacific and as a practicing clinician within the acute/critical care environment, I have gravitated in the direction of cardiovascular and pulmonary physical therapy. This is largely due to the excellent instruction that I had as a DPT student within the Pacific program." In particular he is grateful for the support of Christine R. Wilson, PhD, PT who has since

retired, who he says "inspired my direction of practice. She also provided me with excellent mentorship after graduating from the program."

If the hallmark of a small town is one stoplight, the town of Lakeview, Ore., is a step further with none. Lakeview, where Dr. Fairburn was born and raised, is near the intersection of Oregon, California and Nevada. Dr. Fairburn is thankful for the continual support of his "wonderful, hardworking" parents, Holly and Tucker, who he says "have been incredibly influential and supportive of my aspirations." He also enjoys his role as uncle to his niece and nephew. His life outside the world of academia is spent playing guitar, riding his 1998 Springer Softail Harley-Davidson or hitting the slopes.

#### MELANIE A. FELMLEE, PHD

#### ASSISTANT PROFESSOR, DEPARTMENT OF PHARMACEUTICS AND MEDICINAL CHEMISTRY

Melanie A. Felmlee, PhD joined Pacific in March of 2015 as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Pharmaceutics and Medicinal Chemistry. Originally from Canada, Dr. Felmlee received her bachelor of science in biomedical toxicology from University of Guelph. She received her masters in pharmacy from University of Saskatchewan. Dr. Felmlee then went to State University of New York, University at Buffalo, for a doctor of philosophy in pharmaceutical sciences. While in Buffalo she also completed a postdoctoral fellowship. A prolific writer, she is the author of more than 30 peer-reviewed publications and abstracts.

She has long term goals for her roles as teacher and researcher: "In terms of teaching, my goal is to help the students gain an

understanding of pharmacokinetics and pharmacogenomics and their clinical application. Pharmacokinetics, specifically, is not a favorite subject [of students], and my goal is that students will gain an appreciation of this field. My research goals are to generate good quality research in my area of study, and obtain extramural funding."

Her current research focuses on a topic that is a sobering cultural issue. Dr. Felmlee is examining the role of age and gender in the regulation of monocarboxylate transporters and the impact of these changes on drug pharmacokinetics and toxicity. "I began to focus on this area during my doctoral studies where my training was centered on pharmacokinetics and drug transport, specifically for the drug of abuse, GHB. GHB is commonly used in drug facilitated sexual assault, and abused by juveniles and adults. Despite the use of GHB in women and juveniles there is minimal information on GHB pharmacokinetics and toxicity in these populations. Monocarboxylate transporters are crucial in determining GHB pharmacokinetics, as well as a number of other pharmaceutical agents."

She has been married to her husband, Brian, for over 10 years. They are kept busy by their three children, Nate (9), Logan (4) and Ella (2). Her friends compare her to Dr. Temperance Brennan on Bones. She suggests it is because, "I am very analytical and logical in how I think through problems." Her hobbies span the spectrum, from spending time outdoors working in her vegetable garden to being indoors doing needlepoint and playing video games.

#### JACQUE GEORGESON, AUD

#### DIRECTOR OF CLINICAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING, DEPARTMENT OF SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY AND AUDIOLOGY

Jacque Georgeson, AuD, came to Pacific in July of 2015. Originally from the part of the country known for its harsh winters, her parents, two younger brothers and 97-year-old grandmother still live in South Dakota and Minnesota. Her academic career has taken her to much warmer climates: humid Memphis, Tenn., where she did her graduate work, then on to balmy Gainesville, Fla., where she received her doctorate, followed by sunny Sydney, Australia, where she worked for the Australian Hearing Services.

Her youngest brother, Jerome, is responsible for putting her on the path to audiology. Dr. Georgeson elaborates "Jerome was born with a congenital hearing loss, which he had surgically 'fixed' when I was deciding whether to major in speech-language pathology or audiology. I was fascinated with the procedure and the outcome." As the Department of Audiology's Director of Clinical Education and Training her goal is to recruit diverse, engaging and dynamic clinical rotations for the audiology students. She also strives to provide beneficial training for clinical preceptors to enhance the teaching experience of the preceptor, as well as the learning experience of the student. In addition, Dr. Georgeson has challenged herself to develop an exceptional three-year clinical training model for audiology. In her research she focuses on implementing evidence-based clinical precepting models from health care to further the development of clinical teaching.

Outside of the classroom she enjoys being in the great outdoors either sailing or hiking. She has taken to heart the quote by St. Augustine, "The world is a book, and those who do not travel read only a page." Her group of close friends could be compared to the camaraderie of the characters of Sex in the City. She explains, "I have a very close-knit girl group of strong, independent, professional women. When I lived in San Diego, we did virtually everything together." In addition to exploring the globe, she is an avid knitter.

#### MARCUS C. RAVNAN '94, PHARMD

#### PROFESSOR, DEPARTMENT OF PHARMACY PRACTICE ASSISTANT DEAN FOR THE PRE-PHARMACY AND PRE-HEALTH PROGRAMS

For Marcus C. Ravnan '94, PharmD Pacific holds a place of significance both personal and professional. 1994 was a momentous year for Dr. Ravnan; in September he and his wife, Susan Ravnan '94, PharmD were married at Pacific's historic Morris Chapel. That same year they both graduated from the School with doctor of pharmacy degrees. 


