### HOSPITAL WARNING

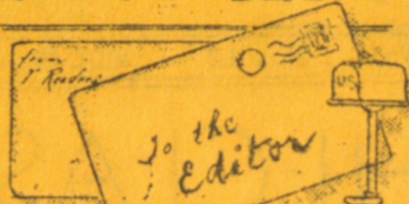

Hero of the day, Isao Tokunaga, batted 4 for 5, including a double to steal the show at bat for the

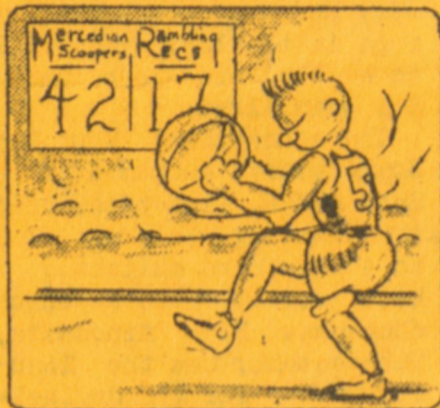
