Those familiies will compose the majority of the first segular train movemont which is scheduled to leave for Colorado on Monday, August 31. Daily trainloads are scheduled for transfor during the period of August 31-September 3, by which time it is expected that all residents of Merced Assembly Contor will o romoved to Granada, with the exception f the hospitalized sick and women in an dvancod stage of prognancy. Each load ill consist of about 500 people.

It is anticipated that the trip from Morcod to Grannda will take about 30 hours. No dofinito information has ot been received concorning tho routo f travel, but it is contemplated that t will be by the Santa Fe Railroad hrough Bakersfield, San Bernardino, Bartow, Needlos, Williams, Flagstaff, Al-uquorque, La Junta and Lama.

The responsibility to supervise and assist in the packing and crating of evacuces' property and belongings has been dologated to Mr. Mankins' Works Division. All shipmonts are to be inspected by membors of the Interior Polico.

No government property of any description is to be taken by cvacuees to Granada. This applies to blankets and dining room dishes and utensils, to tools used by the various work details; and to any other property which has been used by evacuoes hore. Similar equipment and supplies will be on hand at Granada for uso thore.

point is about four miles wide. The d istrict is agricultural and already there are about 6000 acres of land under irrigation, with about 2000 acros more which can be placed under irrigation. The main crops are alfalfa, coin, fruits of various kinds, cantaloupes and watermolons, gardon vogetables and sugar boots. Beet sugar factories are located at Holly, cloven miles cast, and at Lamar, 17 milos rost.

The buildings and facilitios nov being constructed at Granada are considorably more substantial than those here. The apartment buildings are line and The floors are brick. The typisided. cal building is 120 foot in length instond of 100 feet as hore, and each building contains six apartments of various sizos.

There are twolve residence apartmont buildings, a recreation hall, a moss hall and kitchon, and laundry and lava-tory facilities in each roctangular block. Four blocks form a square and compose a ward. Wards are separated by wide avonuos w ich serve as recreation areas and firo-broaks. There will also be hospitals, schools, churches, warehouses and industrial buildings.

The principal work projects at Granada will, of course, be agricultural, In addition there will be a normal need for employees to do all sorts of community servece such as we have had at Morcod.

In loaving Morcod, it is the ambition of all citizons to loave their tomporary home in a state of immaculate cleanliness and good order. With this in mind, the Works Division has selected a "cloan-up crow" which will be allocated to the last train load to leave for Gra-nada. This picked crow will have the responsibility to do the clean-up work which ward residents are not able to finish before their departure. However, it is expected that every individual and every family will do everything possible to leave their own quarters and the ad-

Acknowledgments to the departments who have contributed to the building of the Center will also be made at this time.


