- Included in larger scholarly collections
- Open Access

Open Access Journals


- Freely accessible scholarly content
- Hosted on the internet, but not necessarily hosted by internet discipline professionals

Problem

This stuff gets expensive

Develop a Wordpress plugin any institution could implement with minimal skill and IT support.

What This Plugin Does

- 1. Define a submission with extra fields
- 2. Create metadata for harvesting
- 3. Allow creation of journals
- 4. Supply WordPress shortcodes for controlling submissions and display

What It Can't Do

- 1. SEO (Semper Plugins' All In One SEO)
- 2. Self-submission (CAPTCHA plugin)
- 3. Participation in Digital Commons network (Never promoted)
- 4. Granular Usage Reports (Still available on request)
- 5. Collaborative Editing Tools (Never used)

What It Does Better

- 1. Cross-post items
- 2. Instant creation of series
- 3. Complete control over customization
- 4. And of course...

Much cheaper

- Digital Commons nearly \$20,000 per year
 \$3000 for a cosmetic redesign
- WordPress Plugins + hosting = \$600/ 3 years
 - Redesign at will
 - Hosting covers other subdomains, including library main site

Any Institution could host their journal or IR with the OSP Plugin

\$19,800

Approximate annual savings to migrate to our solution.
