Scope/Description of course	Students will learn how to pronounce sounds in Spanish and then, they will progress through the first four chapters where they will learn to conjugate verbs in the present tense along with many other grammar points for the purpose of communicating in Spanish. The exercises will increase the students' listening comprehension skills through the use of dialogues and recording exercises. Cultural components are part of <i>iCon brío!</i> , included in the <i>Tu</i> <i>mundo cultural</i> and <i>Tu mundo en vivo</i> sections of each chapter.
Learning outcomes	 At the end of this course, the students will be able to 1. use the Spanish language to introduce themselves and others in social and school situations, talk about their families and friends, refer to daily activities in the present tense and describe everyday objects; 2. have a good foundation for communication in terms of listening comprehension, speaking, writing and reading; 3. respond to questions about Spanish in the United States and the culture of certain Hispanic countries.

Prerequisites	This course is a first semester Spanish; it has no previous Spanish language knowledge.
Requirements	All students will follow the <i>semanario</i> for the class. The <i>semanario</i> can be found in Moodle. It is important that every student work on the material on a daily basis.
