### All Escape Plane Crash

PRESTON, Conn. (AP) - A four-motor Air France Constellation, en route from Paris to New York, crashed and burst into flames in an attempt to make an emergency landing in a potato field today.

State police said at least four persons were injured but another 29 to 35 escaped before fire enveloped the plane.

Officials at New York International Airport said that the plane was on a last leg hop from Gander, Nfld., to New York and had been told to turn back to Boston airport because of poor flying conditions in the New York area.

An Air France spokesman in New York said the plane was flight 975 from Paris, originally scheduled to reach New York at 8:15 a.m. EDT.

It was reported 28 adults, a baby and a crew of eight were aboard the craft.

State police at Groton said that there were no fatalities.

The injured were taken to William W. Backus Hospital at Norwich. They were removed from the plane by firemen.

The plane came down on the farm of David Stefenson an Air Force veteran.

The Constellation was circling in the rain.

"I never saw a plane so low," Stefenson said.

"The pilot was trying to make a good landing," he said. "He would have made it except that a tree and a barn were in front of the plane and that caused the crash."

"The fire didn't break out until the passengers and crew got out."

Stefenson sheltered about a half dozen of the passengers, including the baby.

One of the passengers, Aaron Rosenstein, a Brooklyn, N. Y., clothier returning from a fashion show in Paris, said there was no panic aboard the plane.

"Everyone was calm," he said. "Very calm. They didn't know what was going on until the pilot told them they were returning to Boston."

He said that after the crash everyone escaped, "so far as I knew."

The Constellation's destination was Idlewild Airport in New York. After it left Gander, Nfld., bad weather developed and the control tower at Idlewild instructed the pilot to return to Legan Airport, Boston.

There was a heavy rainfall and poor visibility when the crash occurred.

### Accident Victims Are Better

The accident victims over the past weekend are reported to be mending as well as could be expected. Mr. Ernest Bailey is also reported to be doing well, although he is not out of danger yet. Mr. Bailey is expected to be removed to his home on Wednesday.

Dr. Lowry reported that Mr. Bailey is resting well and can sit almost normally again. Some additional work will have to be done at a later time, however, which is not of too serious a nature, he said.

Clarence Compton is reported in fairly good condition after the wreck Saturday which took the life of his wife. The small boy, Terry, is still reported critical, but in much better condition. A daughter Carolyn was treated at the hospital and released.

Gene, Mr. Compton's fifteen-year-old boy was taken to the Vanderbilt Hospital immediately after the wreck, with a fractured hip and broken leg. He is also reported mending well.

The three children of Charles Ryan were injured yesterday in an accident on the East highway. Rita, his six-year-old daughter received a broken leg. Mike, age two, received a cut on the head requiring three stitches.

Pamela, age 8, received a punctured back and a severe blow on the head.

MAYFIELD (AP) - Former Vice President Alben W. Barkley and Sen. John Sherman Cooper, two leading candidates in the state's 1954 senatorial election, are scheduled to speak at the annual community picnic at nearby Fancy Farm tomorrow.

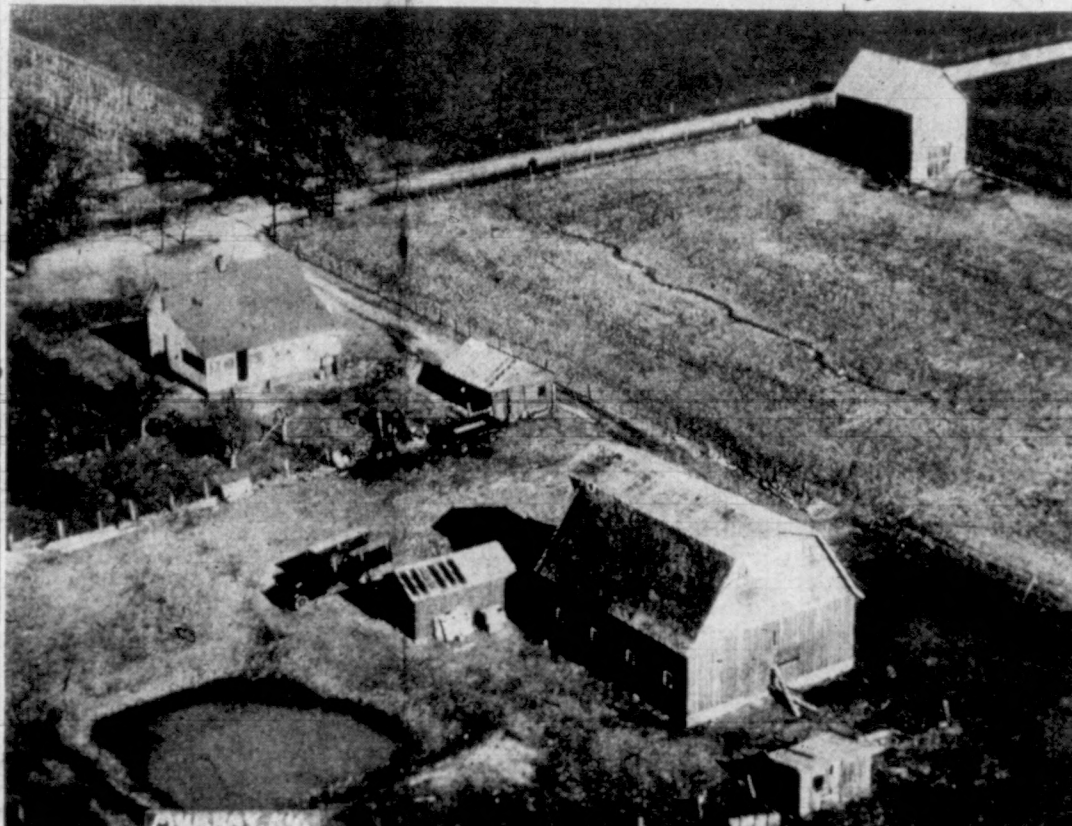

### Fire Routs 500 From Large Hotel

NEW YORK (AP) - One man was snatched from a flaming death and 16 others were overcome by smoke early today as fire routed some 500 night-clad guests from the Park Sheraton, one of the city's largest hotels.

An off-duty elevator operator was credited with saving the life of hotel guest Gary Cook, 13, of Taft, Calif., and passing the alarm which narrowly averted panic in the 33-story hotel where some 1,500 persons were asleep.

Stanley Giletta, 40, the elevator operator, was returning to the hotel to retrieve a forgotten billfold when Cook shouted for help from his ninth floor window. The fire apparently had been started in his bed by a cigaret, hotel officials said.

Giletta ran to the hotel switchboard and gave the alarm. With bell captain Dan Mulligan and elevator operator John Patrone he then raced to the ninth floor. As Mulligan and Patrone awakened other guests on the smoke filled floor, Giletta opened Cook's door with a passkey.

"I heard a man calling for help, but I couldn't tell where he was," Giletta said. "I told him to drop to the floor and start crawling to ward the door. I got no answer. His yelling stopped."

Giletta said he was forced to leave the smoked and flame-filled room.

"In a few seconds, when I could breathe again, I started back into the room. The smoke started rising and soon I could see part of the floor. I saw a nude man lying there. Flames were getting close to him. I rushed in and grabbed him and pulled him out."

Flames filled the room a few moments later. Cook was taken to Roosevelt Hospital for treatment for smoke poisoning. Nine other guests and seven firemen also were overcome by smoke and fumes which mushroomed through all but the top floors of the huge hotel, the city's third largest.

### Polio Total Only 23 Under 1952

LOUISVILLE Aug. 3, (AP) - Kentucky's 1954 polio case total was only 23 cases under the 1952 figure today. The state Department of Health reported 155 cases this year, including four deaths.

There were 178 cases and 18 deaths at this time in Kentucky in 1952, which was the worst polio year in recent years in the state. There were 143 cases and 11 deaths reported in the state at this time last year.

Today's official state total include 70 cases in Jefferson County although that county's officials had records of 78 cases today.

### Cool Air Touches Off Violent Storm

By UNITED PRESS A rush of cool air touched off a violent storm in the Chicago area and temperatures dropped in two other sections of the nation.

The wind storm, which lashed northern Illinois as far south as Springfield, reached velocities of 50 miles per hour in Chicago and 64 miles per hour at Joliet.

The storm was partially blamed for an auto-train collision near Crete, Ill., in which two men were killed. Trees toppled on two autos in Chicago and lightning struck at least two buildings.

Chicago's temperatures dropped 12 degrees in half an hour as the winds whipped the metropolis.

Storms also struck in the northern Midwest and a farmhand near Pewaukee, Wis., Arnold Clark, 37 was killed by lightning.

Two other cool waves swept in on the Pacific Northwest and the Middle Atlantic States. Rain was reported from the Great Lakes region over the Mississippi and Ohio valleys to Tennessee.

However, a marathon heat wave held its grip on parts of the Southwest. Temperatures climbed to 107 at Las Vegas, Nev., and to 105 at Presidio, Tex.

### Some Areas Severely Damaged; Tobacco In Good Condition

The federal crop reporting service at Louisville reported today that rains in Kentucky beginning last Saturday and continuing through this morning were very beneficial to pastures and crops, but warned that the driest parts of the state need still more rain-fall to get any lasting benefit.

The Department of Agriculture statisticians pointed out that crops, especially corn and pastures, were severely damaged in some places by high temperatures through July as well as lack of moisture.

The crop damage was spotty, but generally was most severe west of a line from Cadiz to Princeton, and in the area along the Ohio River between Louisville and Covington.

Even in those areas there were spots where crops were in relatively good shape, but other spots where corn and pastures were near failure.

Rains Help Last weekend's rains will help late corn, and they revived pastures to some extent. The current rain should help the pastures even more.

Soybean prospects are still good, the service said, with a good soybean hay crop practically assured.

Early tobacco conditions are very spotty with considerable damage in parts of western and northern Kentucky. The drip ticks and one sucker and Green River tobaccos, are in better shape than burley. The rain of the past few days will give length to the leaves very important to dark fired tobacco.

Lespedeza, the major late hay crop, is still a question mark in most areas. The prospects are good in Hopkinsville, Madisonville and Russellville areas, where some already has been cut.

Best Since April The recent rain was the largest weekly total for Kentucky since the period ending last April 20. Average rainfall for the state during the week ending this morning was 1.24 inches.

An announcement from Washington and the official forecast for the next five days brought cheer to Kentucky farmers.

The official forecast for Wednesday through Sunday, Wednesday and Thursday, cooler Friday and Saturday.

Temperatures will average near or a little below the seasonal normal which is 77 degrees in Kentucky Wednesday through Sunday. Warmer Wednesday and Thursday, cooler Friday and Saturday.

Prof. Ardito Desio, leader of the expedition, said the group fought to the summit of the 28,250-foot mountain Saturday after months of battling up the jagged slopes which claimed the life of one party member.

The expedition said it had hoisted Italian and Pakistan flags on the virgin peak of the mountain, sometimes known as "K-2."

Arthur K. Gilkey, 26-year-old Ames, Iowa geologist died on the icy slopes in August, 1953, in his vain effort to scale it.

May Have Help Soon The Washington announcement stated federal authorities hope to have a drought relief subsidy program in operation in six states by this weekend. The report said there is a chance sections of six other states-including Kentucky-will be declared eligible for help under the program by this weekend.

Rain fell across the state yesterday, ranging from 4 inches at Paducah to 1.77 inches at Louisville. High temperatures in the state yesterday ranged from 78 at Louisville to the high 80s.

Other rainfall totals for the 24-hour period ending this morning included Shelbyville 1.62; Covington 1.46; Williamson 1.40; Bowling Green 2; Pikeville 5.6; Corbin 2.8 and Richmond 2.5 inches.

### New Military Command Is Established

WASHINGTON (AP) - Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson announced today that a new military command comprising all the services-and to be run by the Air Force-will be set up for continental defense.

Wilson said that the new command-which in effect establishes an "American Theater"-will be operational by about Sept. 1. Gen. Benjamin W. Childlaw, presently commander of the Air Force air defense command, will be head of the new "continental air defense command."

Wilson told a news conference that centralized direction of the nation's continental defense system has been made necessary by "the advent of new weapons and increased forces available for continental air defense."

He said forces of the Army and Navy as well as the Air Force will be under Childlaw's command. The new continental setup is like that used in such overseas theaters as the Far East and Pacific, where units of all services are under a single overall command.

Wilson said that the test to this continent is "principally" from enemy bombers but the new command-also will "naturally be organized to identify any 'submarines or surface ships as well."

He said that "some additional money" will be spent on continental defense in the fiscal year starting next July 1 but figures are not yet available.

### Babe Ruth League Back On Regular Schedule Now

The Babe Ruth League will resume their regular play Wednesday after the interruption of the two day All Star tournament. Murray won over Upper Cloverport at Harlan 14 to 9, then dropped the Saturday morning game to Harlan 6-5.

The schedule Wednesday will see the Pirates meet the Tigers and the Braves vs the Giants. These two games were originally scheduled for Monday night.

Fans are urged to attend the Babe Ruth and Little League games. A large sum of money has been spent to make the parks equal to any in this area, and a number of people have given of their time and money all summer to provide this worthy recreation for youngsters from nine to sixteen.

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## Mystery Farm Number Twenty Nine



Mystery Farm Number Twenty Nine was that of Mr. Layne Shanklin, of Murray Route 4.

Calling to identify the farm was Mrs. Lowell Key.

The farm is located 3 miles southeast of Lynn Grove near Sinking Springs Church and was formerly owned by Arthur Miller and Truman Young. Mr. Shanklin has owned the farm for about 3 years.

Since purchasing the farm, Mr. Shanklin has fenced the farm, and

shedded some of the outbuildings for livestock purposes. The house on the farm was built about 1893.

Mr. Shanklin uses general farming practices on his 70 acre farm with 42 acres being allotted to dark fired tobacco, 15 acres of field corn and the rest is in pasture for his sheep and beef cattle.

Mr. Shanklin claims sheep and tobacco as his favorites. He says that the two go together better than any other two projects on

the farm because the labor with the sheep comes at lambing time, which is late in the winter and early spring, while labor in the tobacco comes in late summer and fall.

Mr. Shanklin asserts that his four years of Veterans Schooling has helped him very much, and he tries to follow the practices learned there.

The farm supplies good pasture and water supply for livestock in summer, and Mr. Shanklin adds commercial supplements to his feed in winter. He uses the necessary mechanical equipment for a farm that size.

Mr. Shanklin is married to the former Miss Mary Sacrakis, of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. They have one daughter, Georgia Jane Shanklin, who is one year old.

Mr. and Mrs. Shanklin are members of the Methodist Church of Lynn Grove.

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## Mystery Farm Number Twenty Nine



Mystery Farm Number Twenty Nine was that of Mr. Layne Shanklin, of Murray Route 4.

Calling to identify the farm was Mrs. Lowell Key.

The farm is located 3 miles southeast of Lynn Grove near Sinking Springs Church and was formerly owned by Arthur Miller and Truman Young. Mr. Shanklin has owned the farm for about 3 years.

Since purchasing the farm, Mr. Shanklin has fenced the farm, and

shedded some of the outbuildings for livestock purposes. The house on the farm was built about 1893.

Mr. Shanklin uses general farming practices on his 70 acre farm with 4.2 acres being allotted to dark fired tobacco, 15 acres of field corn and the rest is in pasture for his sheep and beef cattle.

Mr. Shanklin claims sheep and tobacco as his favorites. He says that the two go together better than any other two projects on

the farm because the labor with the sheep comes at lambing time, which is late in the winter and early spring, while labor in the tobacco comes in late summer and fall.

Mr. Shanklin asserts that his four years of Veterans Schooling has helped him very much, and he tries to follow the practices learned there.

The farm supplies good pasture and water supply for livestock in summer, and Mr. Shanklin adds commercial supplements to his feed in winter. He uses the necessary mechanical equipment for a farm that size.

Mr. Shanklin is married to the former Miss Mary Sacarakis, of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. They have one daughter, Georgia Jane Shanklin, who is one year old. Mr. and Mrs. Shanklin are members of the Methodist Church of Lynn Grove.

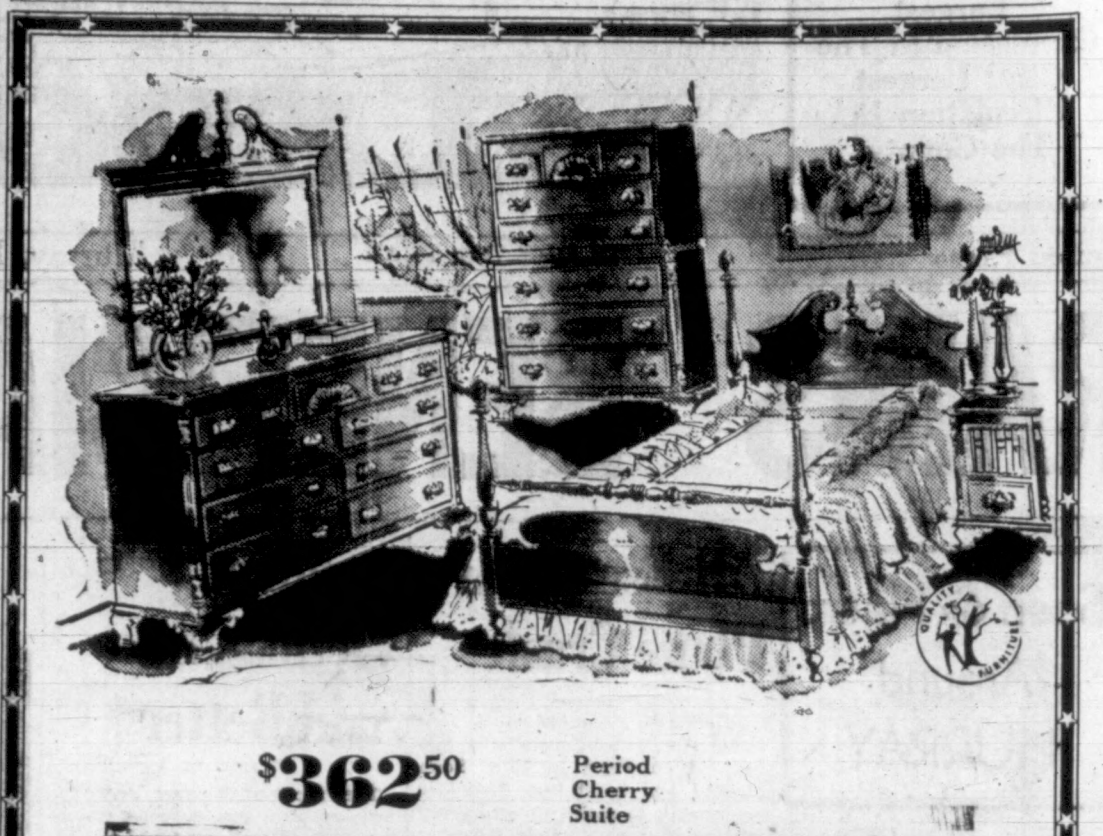

## Household Hints

**By United Press**  
To protect the fuzzy surface of brushed-knit sleepwear during laundering, turn each garment inside out before it goes into the soapuds.

Soil is a garment's worst enemy. All knits, but especially woollens, should be washed before they get heavily soiled. When dirt, and perspiration become embedded in the yarn, they are difficult to remove. Left in, they are destructive.

Egg stains usually can be removed by scraping off the excess, soaking the soiled part in cold water, then washing in warm soapuds.

Let a cake cool before it's cut. Cooling helps to "set" the cake. For proper cooling, air should circulate all around the pan. This prevents steaming the delicate crust.

If you want to anchor a screw, dip the threads into thinned shellac just before it is inserted into the wood. The treatment prevents rust.

For a menu surprise, beat an egg and season into two cups of hot mashed potatoes. Shape into four balls and press the center to make cups. Put pieces of cheese into the cups, brush with melted fat, sprinkle with crumbs, and bake in a moderate oven 30 minutes.

Embroidery hoops are convenient for holding material in place when removing stains.

Sprinkle a tablespoon of baking soda into the suds when washing painted woodwork.

Store lemons in a tightly sealed glass jar in the refrigerator to keep them from drying.
