Agricultural Communications Program Ranks in the Top 10 Nationwide

The agricultural communication bachelor's degree has been ranked eighth best in the nation based on a study by researchers at the University of Arkansas. The peer-reviewed study examined 40 such programs across the nation. The program prepares students to become professional communicators in agriculture by encouraging them to enroll in diverse courses such as digital communication, graphic design, journalism and technical agriculture. In the fall, a new course focusing on digital video and social media management will be offered to prepare students for emerging careers in online and visual communication strategies. Cal Poly Receives National Award for Efforts to Increase Number of Physics Teachers in U.S. High Schools

Cal Poly is among 11 universities in the nation honored for helping to reduce the critical shortage of physics teachers in U.S. high schools. The Physics Teacher Education Coalition's 5+ Club awards recognized the university and other institutions that had at least five physics teacher graduates in the 2013-14 academic year. The first crop of strawberries planted on university farmland was harvested by the Cal Poly Strawberry Sustainability Research and Education Center on Feb. 18. Although the strawberries are just beginning to ripen, the first harvest produced about 80 pounds, which was sold at the campus

farm stand. Once production ramps up in late March and early April, the Cal Poly-branded fruit will also be sold in local grocery stores such as Vons and at multiple campus locations.

Submission Guidelines Revised for Cal Poly Report

Cal Poly Report (CPR) is Cal Poly's official employee newsletter, designed to communicate information about officially sanctioned university news or events to faculty, staff and administrators. A new policy has been developed to help ensure CPR continues to contain only relevant and approved information. Beginning with the March 11 issue, CPR submissions will be required to come from the employee designated to approve submissions in the respective colleges, units and work areas. A list of approved approvers is available on the Cal Poly Report index website. Entries submitted by those other than the

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designated approver must be accompanied by an approval form signed by the unit's designated person. The approval form is available online in <u>fillable pdf format</u> and a <u>Microsoft Word format</u>. CPR is published weekly during the school year, except during academic breaks, and monthly in the summer. The deadline for each weekly issue is 12:30 p.m. the Thursday prior to publication.

International Travel Update for the Campus Community

Faculty, staff and students traveling on official university business internationally are required to complete International Travel Authorization paperwork and secure international insurance through Cal Poly. All paperwork should be submitted prior to travel with approval received before airfare is purchased. According to the Chancellor's Office Memorandum RM 2014-01, high hazard insurance must be secured 30 days prior to travel, and travel requests need to be submitted and approved prior to the 30-day window. Note that high-hazard travel requests with less than 5 business days notice will not be considered. Travel to war-risk countries must be submitted to the Chancellor's Office for approval and takes additional time to process. Standard individual travel should be submitted to the International Center a minimum of 30 days prior to travel; high-hazard travel should be submitted a minimum of 45 days prior to travel, and travel to war-risk countries should be submitted a minimum of 60 days prior to travel. Ronald Dale Regan, emeritus department head of the Ornamental Horticulture (OH) Department in the College of Agriculture, Food & Environmental Sciences from 1977 to 1991, died Feb. 9. During his tenure, Regan integrated progressive scientific methods into the curriculum, including applications for tissue culture; shared his expertise, nursery management, with generations of students; and developed lasting connections with alumni and industry, including the California Association of Nurserymen. He also worked to develop renewable sources of funding, including the first OH endowment and the first endowed professorship. At

his retirement, the Ron Regan Endowment was established in his honor. A tree, planted in his honor, is located outside the Campus Market, near the Horticulture & Crop Science Department. 'California State of Mind' to be Screened Feb. 25

Cal Poly will host award-winning filmmaker Sascha Rice for a screening of her latest documentary, "California State of Mind," from 4 to 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 25, in the Cal Poly Performing Arts Center Pavilion. A discussion with Rice and Political Science Professor Michael Latner will follow the screening. Outlining the turbulent years of the 1960s, the documentary tracks the climactic story of California Gov. Edmund G. "Pat" Brown's rise up the political ladder. Brown initiated historical legislation that reshaped the state, including The Fair Housing Act, The Fair Employment Act, The Master Plan for Higher Education, Highway Expansion and The California Aqueduct. Rice tells the story through her perspective as filmmaker and Brown's granddaughter, and shows a man's tenacity in overcoming obstacles that led to the making of a new political dynasty after his son, Gov.
