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Progression! Advances in African-American Archaeology

During the 1999 Society for American Archaeology meetings in Chicago last Spring, I participated in a panel entitled "Communication and Consultation: Working toward an Informed Archaeology." Panel members included a number of archaeologists who work with indigenous people, as well as several who work with African-American and other descendant communities.
