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
## The Wicked Issue: Sustainable Illiteracy

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
Of food is lost in the food production cycle

♦ Students will be encouraged to spread their sustainable knowledge to their community




Figure 1: Do you feel that local, healthy food is available to you at an affordable cost? Yes: 26, No: 20, Neutral: 4
