Research continues to show that making your work open access in any form increases its impact. In addition, USU Policy, 535 (PDF) "Open Access to Scholarly Articles" ensures that making your work Open Access is your choice, not your publisher's. New tools developed by USU Libraries make notifying your publisher that you intend to make a version of your work open access via the institutional repository easier than ever. Now, a simple web form can be used to notify your publisher of the prior non-exclusive license between you and USU as per Policy 535. In the event that you wish to surrender your copyright to your publisher, you will be granted a waiver of Policy 535 on completion of this web form. Funding Support for OA Publication

- Funded or partially funded 12 articles during our initial pilot phase (October, 2011) and the current fiscal year
- Pilot phase: allocated \$6,300 out of \$30,000 committed (5 articles)
- Current YTD: allocated \$4,700 out of \$12,000 committed (7 articles)
- Considerations:
 - Require matching funds?
 - Hybrids?
 - "Reputable" OA Journals?

USU Policy 535, "Open Access to Scholarly Articles"

- Rights-based OA Policy following the Harvard Model.
- Signed into effect by President Stan Albrecht on May 30h 2012 after a unanimous vote of support by Faculty Senate.
- USU Libraries charged with administering the Policy

"All employees during their employment with the University grant to the University a nonexclusive license to exercise all rights under copyright relating to each of their **scholarly articles**..."



OA as voluntary opt-out

- Faculty may opt out of the policy at their sole discretion
 - Waiver's granted via an automated web form
 - Sometimes necessary for faculty to comply with publication agreements.



Keys to Policy Passage:

- Know your institution
- Should be faculty-led
- Should not appear as a top-down mandate
- Reach out to colleagues!

Policy Implementation: The USU experience

- Know your institution!
- Educate your faculty
- Make it simple
- One Size does not fit all
- Obtain manuscripts quickly!
- Create a culture of OA rather than strictly enforcing the policy

Current State of Commercial Publishing: Unsustainable

- Increase in Journal Prices
 - We anticipate and experience +/-5% annual increases
 - Prices increasing more than average rate of inflation (since 1913, has averaged just less than 3.5% per year according to BLS)
- Flatlining library budgets
 - We manage to maintain most subscriptions by reorganizing our budget, diverting money from lower priority expenditures
 - Staffing levels reduced in recent years

What Are We NOT Saying?

■ We're not 'sticking it to the man' – we recognize that publishers provide a valuable service:

"You hear it said that the public has paid for it, the public should have access to it for free...At that point, I draw back and say, what do you mean by 'it'? You mean something that has got quality in it, that has been selected and copy-edited. Somebody has got to do all that stuff, so the 'it' you want usually has involved somebody acting like a publisher to make it useable and comprehensible."

Not saying current OA models can or should be a wholesale replacement for current publishing model
