United Press Writer Killed By Mob Violence In India

SINGAPORE (AP)—Gene Symonds, United Press manager for Southeast Asia, died today from a savage beating inflicted by Chinese students who have terrorized Singapore for two days during a Communist-inspired transportation strike. A police constable and a 16-year-old Chinese student also were killed in the riots which began when truckloads of students attacked police who had quelled a strike demonstration with water-hoses. Scores were reported injured. Symonds, 29, of Dayton, Ohio, was injured fatally at the scene where the news was breaking—a roadblock thrown up by the government to halt the spread of Chinese terrorists. The mob dragged him from a taxi and beat him with stones and clubs until he fell unconscious in the street. A British armored regiment and tough Gurkha infantrymen patrolled the city today to prevent further classes but the strike appeared to be spreading and transportation was at a standstill. Violence that flared today was put down though the demonstrators still controlled a nine-mile square section of the city.

Covered Korean War
Symonds, an Army veteran who had risked his life many times to cover the Korean War from the Pusan beachhead almost to the Yalu River, had just returned to Singapore from the Bandung-African-Asian conference when the riots began. He sped to the scene to get first-hand information and ran into the angry mob.

Full Explanation Asked
United Press Vice President Ernest Hobericht in Tokyo instructed the Singapore bureau to ask Singapore authorities for a "full explanation of this unlawful and uncivilized attack on a United Press correspondent."

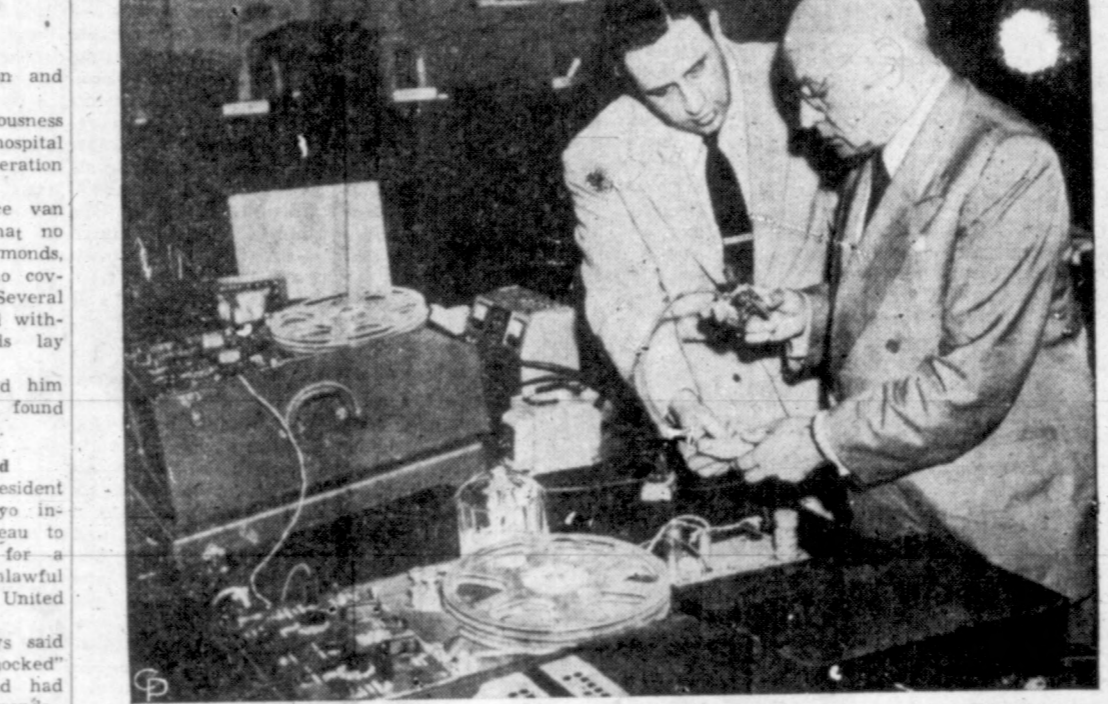
Tickets On Sale For Annual Classic

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government is "likely" to release the first batches of embargoed polio vaccine this afternoon and resume the nation's stalled vaccination program, U.S. Surgeon General Leonard A. Scheele said today.

Breakdown Of Cases
A breakdown showed 29 cases in California, 16 in Idaho, 5 in Texas, 4 each in Louisiana, Pennsylvania, Oregon and Nevada, 2 each in Georgia, Indiana, West Virginia, and Hawaii, and 1 each in Missouri, New York, Colorado, Wyoming, Ohio, Washington, Illinois, Michigan and Connecticut.

NEW YORK UP—The late Wilbur Shaw is sorely missed around the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, and they'll never forget him as long as the spawling old track still stands.

He left his mark in many ways before he was lost in the crash of a private plane last fall, first as a constant competitor and three-time winner between World Wars I and II and then as the dynamic boss of the racing plant in the post-war years.

But just before his death last October, Wilbur completed another task. With an informal autobiography called "Gentlemen, Start Your Engines" the little man who had no nerves probably did more than any other person to humanize those motor maniacs who drive racing cars for a living.

For several years, Shaw issued the warm-up order for the famed 500 at Indianapolis with the command, "Gentlemen, start your engines." Another official will say it is the same for the 33 tense drivers down on the strip. They have lived all year just to hear those words.

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Class A Great Day
To a professional racing driver, May 30 is Christmas, birthday and all the other nice days all rolled into one," wrote Shaw in the book published by Coward-McCann. "If you get into the Indianapolis 500, no matter what the outcome, you feel amply repaid for a year of work."

New Record Is Set By Bank
Kentucky farmers helped the Federal Land Bank of Louisville set a new 20-year record in loans during April when its long-term mortgage loans made to farmers in Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana and Tennessee amounted to \$4,160,000, reports M. S. Kennedy, president of the bank.
April was the second consecutive month in which the bank has loaned \$4 million or more. The loans at this rate were in October, 1934, when the Federal Land Bank System helped turn the tide from depression to recovery by refinancing foreclosure-threatened farm loans by thousands.
In the first four months of 1955 the Louisville bank made 1,584 loans for \$12,653,100 in its four-state district. In this four-month period 254 Kentucky farmers received loans amounting to \$2,057,900.
The Federal Land Bank is cooperatively owned by borrowing farmers through their local national farm loan associations. The local advertising program of the associations and the bank, coupled with a four percent annual interest rate and appraisal values that more realistically gear amount of loan to the repayment capacity of the farm, are largely responsible for the bank's increase in business, Mr. Kennedy explains.

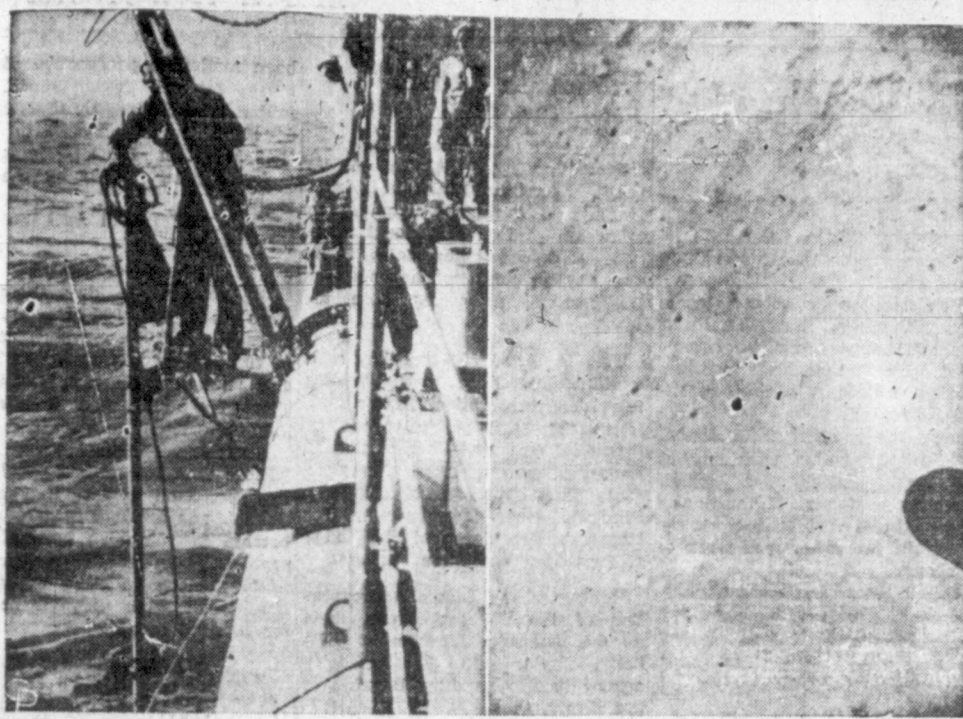

Microfilm Okay For Bank Records

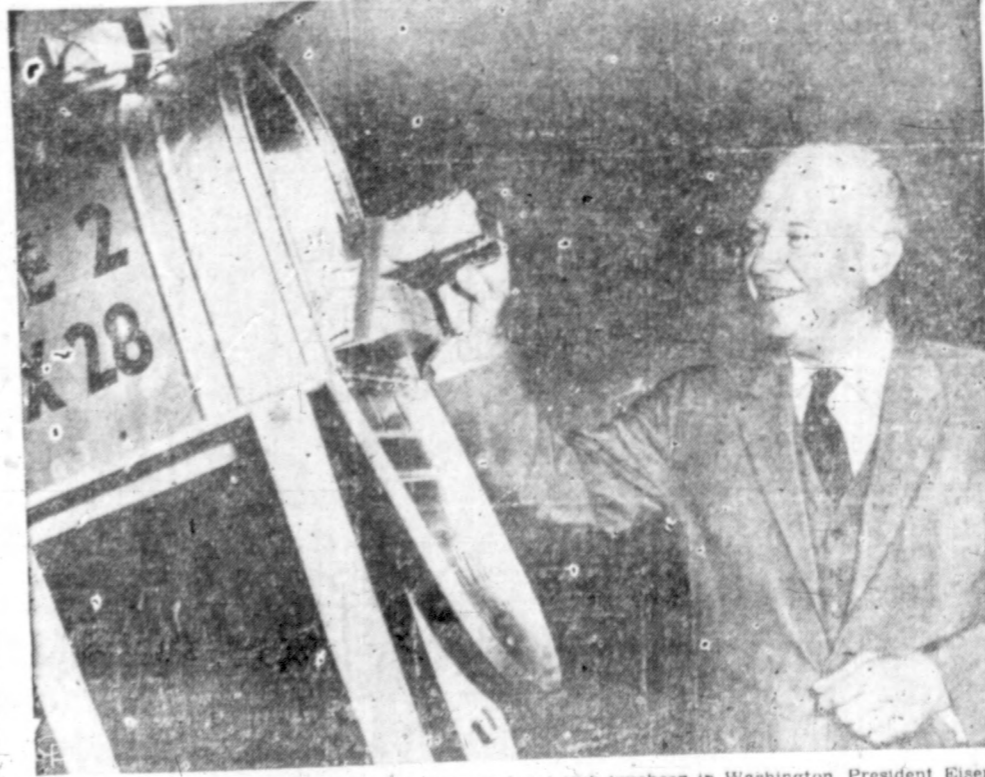
