My Dear M. Muri I got back to Philadelphia the other day & coins on here with my wife today to go on board the Oceanie tomorrow - The weather was somewhat broken after leaving Sun Fran Ciseo but Ihad not unch to complain of on that ecore. After joining the C.P. R. however my comfort as a Kulway traveller in this great centurant was gone - the Corriages were filthy and crowded so much so that I was glad Det a seat in a sunking room of a second class Carriage one day from 2 a.m. till 5 p. m. I survived it all however of any here une tho worse - The seenery about 5 lucies and Bauff was really very fine but I am with you in thruking that the mountains & rocks of the Posemite cannot be beaten by anything I have since seen. The train going sast was about 8 hours late when I joined it at Bungt day at the same place - It began to sure at dush

I continued, surving heavily when sentened the train at 2 a.m. By daylight I daresay there were 6 or 8 in ches of sum in the prairie but during the forenom it eased off I we seen left the surv behind as - By the time that Verden was reached I carried till how much the train was late, but so much that I was only able to spend one day with my Edunburgh priend there in. stead of two. Then a day was lost at wenning but being sunday I went to S'andrews Church then I heard the author of the "man from Glengary" of the thy Pelot preach - Sometime after leaving Wurnipeg another delay of ghours took place in a riarrow deep cutting wing tou full of rock which looked at me time very bad - we got this however & I am hopeful now of a good passage across the pond. my wife + I came on here today + Flost no trino of calling on der Johnson of the Century from whom I had a very cordial reception and from whom shave received the Century magazines for June 1895 (the discovery of Glacier Bay) + the alash a trip) aug 1894 (advantions with a Doct a Glacier) and Sept 1894 ( John Munichy Kay Stammert Baker ) - Then I went to the Outlook" Office Afortimately got the number for 6 June 1903 with Ray Steinard Bakers Shetelo gyon - after procuring a seemed Copy of the last for my wife's Philadelphia griend I asked how many numbers they still had of it, + lons told 3 - Mis? nientin byon as you thought it was all sold out - Now I shall write no more tell after I have seen elle & Maggie Runaun when I will write you muir- your daughter-t yourself in which my write Cordially joins me Believe me yoursely success? turnsellundoch
