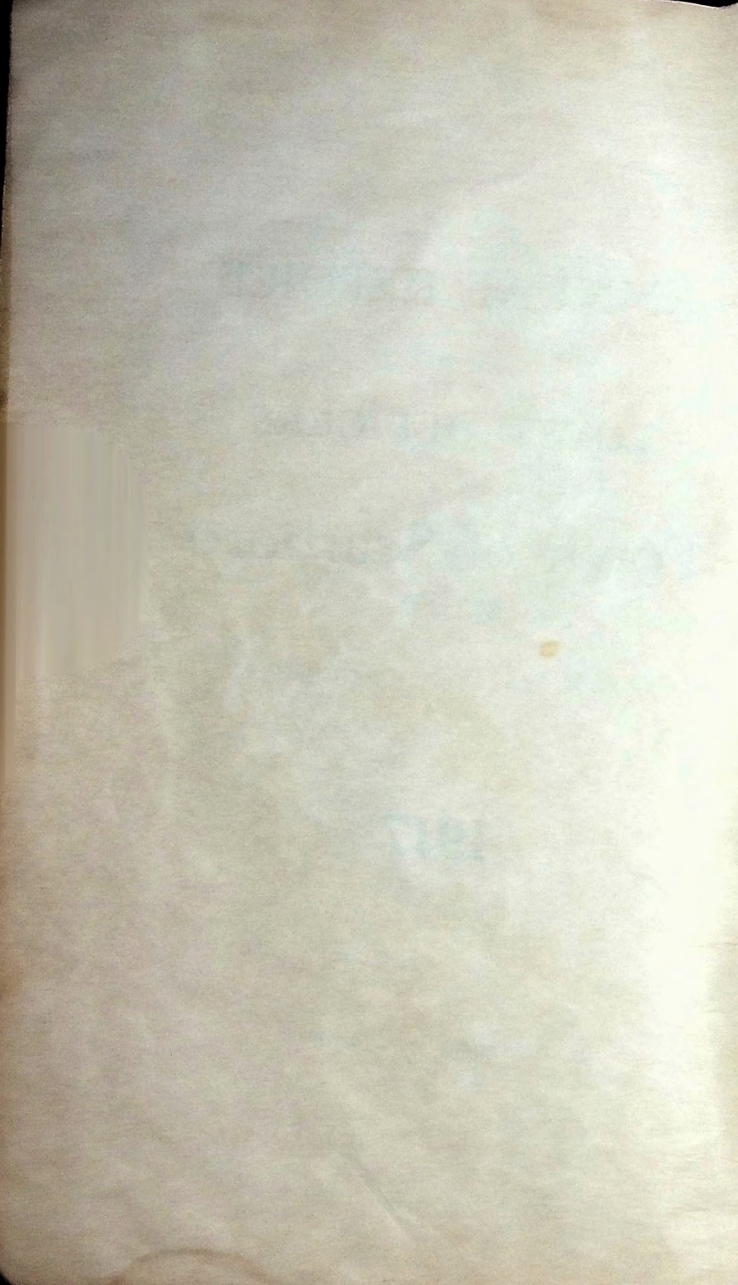

School Report

TO THE CITIZENS OF SCARBORO :

As was stated in our report last year, we believe that the most important period in the education of the child is the early years of the elementary school. During the past year, we have aimed to introduce so far as possible the more natural methods of teaching the little child by obtaining and working from his point of view. With this aim, a new series of text books has been introduced which gives the child greater opportunity for expression of his own ideas while learning how to use his own language correctly. Educational games which make use of that great asset of the child, his enthusiasm, in teaching him important things have also been employed with gratifying success. Handwork, with its accompanying training of his physical and mental powers has also been employed. In a word, we have aimed to use all the previous knowledge of the child, his enthusiasm, and the play instinct, to teach him new things which are necessary to make him an intelligent being. While of course we have not accomplished all that could be hoped for in any one school, yet we feel that distinct gains have been made in all of the schools. It is hoped that we will be able to make even more rapid advancement toward the ideal primary teaching during the year to come.

In connection with this aim, we urge the co-operation of parents along two important lines. First, we respectfully suggest that children should not be sent to school at too early an age, especially in a one-teacher school. Secondly, since changes which we propose are sure to make some difference in the selecting of pupils of different classes, we urge that instead of judging the work by the mere grade or rank to which

the pupil has attained, parents look rather to that all important thing, *how far the pupil has advanced physically and mentally as a result of his school work*

Of course the aim of our school system is to give every boy and girl in our town, equal and adequate facilities for an education. Owing to the extent of our territory and the necessity of maintaining a number of schools seemingly out of proportion to the number of pupils educated, the accomplishment of this purpose sometimes makes necessary, changes in the number and location of our school buildings. Two such changes have been made during the past year. Owing to the decrease of the average attendance in the Broad Turn school to less than eight pupils, this school was closed and the pupils are now transported to Dunstan. By employing the Broad Turn teacher in the Dunstan school, it was possible to institute a grammar department in that school. This is the greatest change during the year and the success of the new plan is most gratifying.

In the northwestern corner of the town up to this year we have maintained the Babb school in co-operation with Buxton and Gorham. Owing to the distance of this school building from the greater number of the Scarboro pupils, this plan was thought to inflict an unnecessary hardship on them. Accordingly, the committee voted to unite with the town of Buxton in opening the old Union school which is nearer to our pupils. Each town shares the expenses equally.

NOTE—In addition to the required courses each student must select two from the elective list. Courses marked with numerals are offered alternately with the course of their respective number. In each of the above courses the student recites five times a week. The entire school was given a music lesson once a week during the Spring term.

Our aim in the High school during the past year, has been toward intensive work along the lines which have been laid down rather than changes in the curriculum or methods of administration. Our school has maintained the same course of study which it has had for the past four years and the work done under it has shown the gratifying improvement which follows steady advancement along well selected lines. The work of our graduates in various lines has shown

most gratifying evidence of the good training received in the school in the past few years. The greatest need of the school at the present time is room. Our facilities for science, and other studies so necessary for the high school pupil who is not going to college are becoming cramped owing to the increase in the enrollment of the school. Room for the extension of our library is very much needed. It is earnestly desired, whenever proper arrangements can be made, to institute more work along manual training and other practical lines. The school has formed an orchestra during the past year, and in all of the other outside activities which are so important to the life of any high school, the achievements have been most pleasing.

CO-OPERATION

One of the best features of the work this year has been the practical co-operation of pupils, teachers, and individual citizens in increasing the efficiency of the schools. Through the efforts of the pupils and teachers in several of the schools, the buildings and grounds have been kept in better condition and even some permanent improvements have been made. Perhaps the greatest of many efforts was that of the Oak Hill boys who built a sidewalk in front of the school building.

Mr. Royal E. Hudson and Mr. Samuel Milliken have furnished athletic fields for the use of our boys. The Misses Libby have provided a fifty dollar scholarship to assist a graduate of our high school in attending Gorham Normal. Mr. Onville Ward has also given great assistance, not only this year but for several years past in connection with the athletic games and other activities of the schools. It is hoped that every citizen of the town will at least acquaint himself with the work which is being accomplished and co-operate with the school authorities in any way which may be possible.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Efficiency in our schools comes in the last analysis to efficiency in our teaching force. It is only through the unusual efficiency, faithfulness and co-operation of our teachers that we have been able to maintain the present standard in our educational work. For this reason, my chief recommendation this year is in connection with the teachers.

If we are to keep our present efficient corps of teachers and to fill the natural vacancies with teachers of equal efficiency, we must make some slight increase in the salaries which we pay. During the past year, the movement for the increase in the salaries of teachers has been country wide, influenced largely by the increase in the cost of living. In the recommended appropriation for this year, provision has been made for the increase of salaries. Part of this increase has been offset by the decrease in the proposed appropriation in our department. For instance, it was felt that a decrease could be made in the amount for repairs through the co-operation of teachers and pupils in keeping the school buildings in good condition and even making some of the smaller repairs. Incidentally, in this way the pupils will not only be saving expense but also be learning how to preserve and repair property. Whenever my time will permit, I shall gladly contribute my services to this end. It is thought by your committee that some savings may be made by purchasing during the summer months, coal and wood in large quantities.

My second recommendation is that the town purchase a diagonal lot joining the Oak Hill school lot on the rear. This lot which has been said to contain approximately 7,000 square feet is now available to the town for \$100.00. We feel that this would be a far-sighted investment for the town.

In the not far distant future, additional school facilities will be needed at Oak Hill. In 1905, eleven years ago, the enrollment in the Oak Hill building was 102; last fall it was

141. This is a gain of more than 38 per cent. If this same increase continues for eleven years to come (and there is reason to believe that it will increase rather than decrease) there would be 194 pupils in that building. As already stated, the schools are even now somewhat cramped for room, and it is plain to see that not far hence something must be done.

In agreement with your School Committee, I submit the following schedule:

Warrant for Town Meeting, 1917

TO WILLIAM G. SHERMAN, A CONSTABLE IN THE TOWN OF
SCARBORO, IN THE COUNTY OF CUMBERLAND :

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Scarboro, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town, on the fifth (5th) day of March, A. D. 1917, at ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit :

1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
2. To choose a Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Collector, Treasurer, one member of the School Board, and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
3. To see if the town will accept and adopt the reports of the several town officers.
4. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools ; schoolhouse repairs and supplies ; text books ; school appliances ; the poor ; repair of roads and bridges ; for spraying trees ; rental of hydrants at Pine Point ; rental of hydrants with Portland Water District ; electric lights ; and to defray all other town charges.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Free High School for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising the money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

7. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$864.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

8. To see whether the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State and State Aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Sections 9 and 18, Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the repair of Black Point Road.

10. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint one or three Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.

11. To see if the town will vote authority to the Selectmen to purchase land for highway materials, if in their judgment it is for the interest of the town; provided the funds for such purchases shall be taken from money voted and raised for highway purposes. By request.

12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to renew the lease of hall in upper part of the Town House to Owascoag Tribe. I. O. R. M., for a term of fifteen years. On petition.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 to be expended on the town way known as King Street at Pine Point. On petition.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to widen and gravel the road from A. B. Deering's toward the Buxton line. By request.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, to be expended on the town road leading from Higgins Beach road to Cape Elizabeth town line. On petition.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$700.00 to be expended in completing the work of filling and widening the Marsh road at Pine Point. On petition.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00, to be laid out on the road commencing at the Four Corners at North Scarboro going toward Beech Ridge.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on the Wescott Hill road, so called.

19. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to contract with the Portland Water District to extend its main from Dunstan to the tracks of the Western Division of the Boston & Maine R. R. at Pine Point, and raise money for same. On petition of Henry F. Snow and others.

20. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Mary W. Means, the interest on said sum to be used for care of Ethan Wiggin's lot in Black Point Cemetery.

21. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$300.00 from the estate of the late Mary F. Libby, the interest on said sum to provide for the perpetual care of burial lot in which Capt. Silas J. Libby is buried; the old family

lot of Mary F. Libby family ; also the new lot where Mary F. Libby is interred. All three lots are in Black Point Cemetery.

22. To see what compensation the town will vote to men and teams for labor on the highways. On petition.

23. Tho see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to grade and gravel Granite Street, Pine Point, as accepted by the town 18 years ago. On petition.

30. To see if the town will vote to abate the Samuel Karstensen tax for the year 1917, on account of the loss of his bridge. On request.

31. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Municipal Officers to hire money, if the same becomes necessary.

32. To see if the town will vote that all contracts, or purchases of supplies, made by the Selectmen for the fiscal year of 1917, involving the expenditure of \$500.00 or more, shall be let out to the lowest responsible bidder. On petition.

33. To see if the town will vote to install three electric lights on the Ross Road, so called, at Blue Point, and raise money for same.

34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to discontinue certain lights on the Black Point road. On request.

thoroughfare, connecting the cities of South Portland and Saco, by the name of King street. By request Scarboro Board of Trade.

42. To see what action the town will take as regards raising a sum of money for the employment of the Scarboro Band several times during the summer months at our different community centers, for the purpose of encouraging an organization formed for the purpose of developing musical talent and appreciation among our people. By request.

43. To see what compensation the town will vote its Collector for his services for the ensuing year.

44. To see what compensation the town will vote its Clerk for the ensuing year.
