

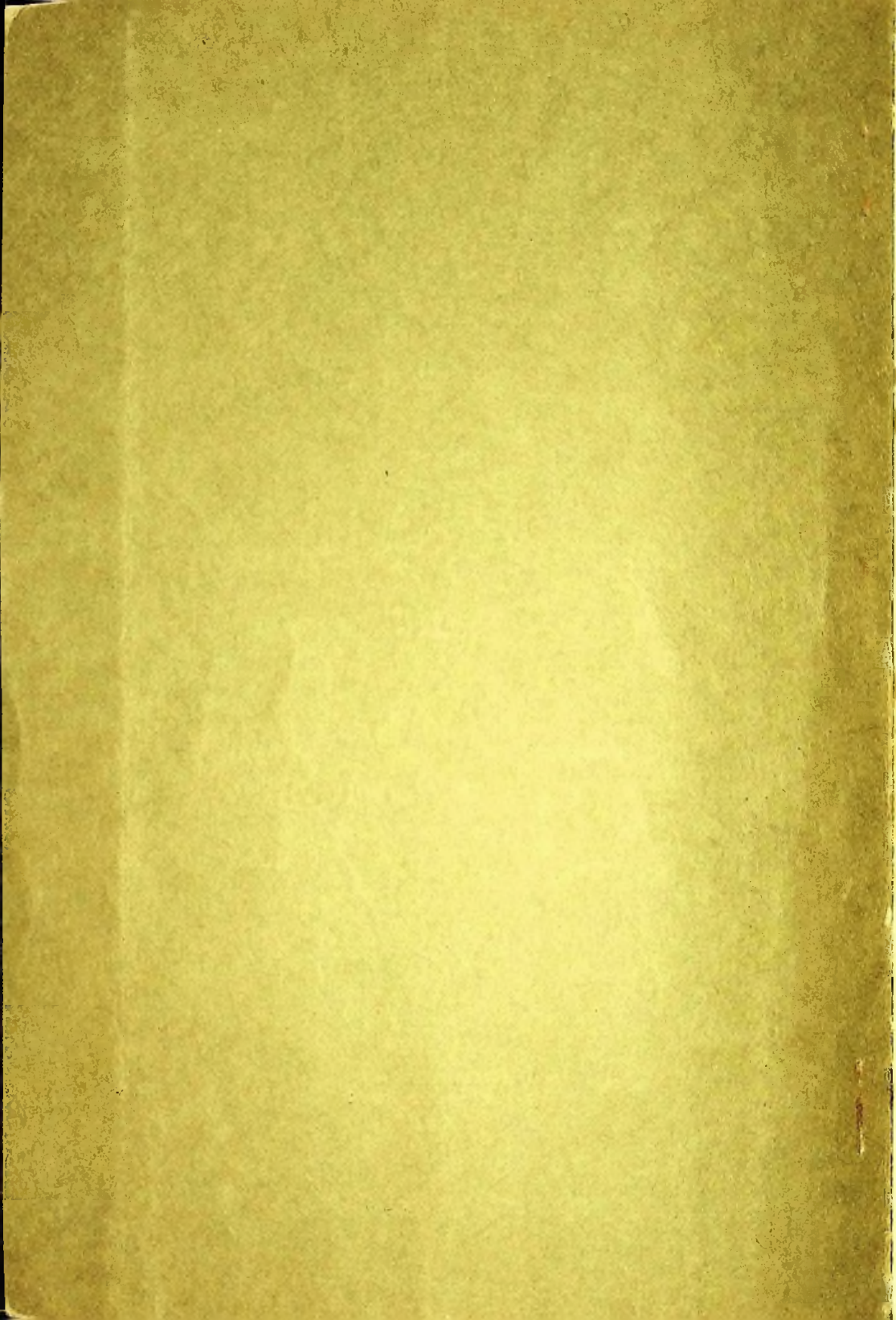

With the consent of your Selectmen, the work was started in the northern end of the town and progressed systematically to the south. The disease was found in the majority of the lots examined, although in some lots much more damage is being done than in others. An example of severe damage is found at Beech Ridge, where 42% of the pines, on an acre containing 366 trees, were found to be diseased and many had already died.

Your co-operation in raising \$250.00 for this work is appreciated and there is every indication that if this amount is available in 1928, the control work, now so well started in Scarborough, can be completed.

SCHOOL REPORT.

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

To the Board of Education and the Citizens of Scarborough:

This has been the most happy and effective year in education in Scarborough for a long time—perhaps in the history of the town.

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT.

If the increase of facilities made possible by the occupation of the new high school building had not come when it did, we wonder what we would have done with our pupils. This is the first fall in years in which the school authorities have not had to worry as to where the pupils would be placed. The high school during the fall term had an enrollment of 83, the largest in the history of the school, and 15 higher than for the fall term the preceding year. In the Oak Hill elementary school, the enrollment was 101, as compared with 91 the year before. An extra teacher was placed in that school, the seventh and eighth grades were moved upstairs, and all, for the first time in years, had adequate space to do their best work. Incidentally, a few pupils in the higher elementary grades went to the Oak Hill school from Dunstan, Black Point and Beach Ridge schools, giving them the benefit of a better educational grouping, and relieving somewhat the educational and housing burden of those schools. The total enrollment for the fall term in 1927 was 456, as compared with 434 in 1926.

STAFF.

We now have three new teachers in the high school. One represents expansion of the staff and curriculum; the other two are the result of departures—one of them a leave of absence for one year. Such wholesale change might have been a decided handicap on entering a new plant. The teachers

who have been replaced were most efficient. Fortunately the three newcomers, all college graduates, are proving also to be the type we are glad to welcome to our schools.

On the staff of thirteen in the elementary schools we have four new teachers, and the high caliber of our entire elementary school staff is being maintained.

THE NEW HIGH SCHOOL.

We purposely left off "building" in this heading. Not only the building and much of the teaching staff, but parts of the curriculum and the whole achievement of the high school is new. Even Principal Bessey, whose conscientious and co-operative efforts have meant so much in the development of secondary education in Scarborough, works with a new encouragement.

We moved into the new building on Tuesday, March 1, 1927. What a splendid plant it is was seen by many of you at the time of the dedication on February 25, 1927. We hope that all of you will visit the school often enough to appreciate it with us, and we assure you that you will always be very welcome.

With the opening of the fall term we were able to start home economics for the girls—the one subject from which every girl, from a semi-vocational point of view, can profit. We have started this with two classes. This curriculum will be developed to four years along lines approved by the State Board of Education. In carrying on this work, the town receives financial aid from the State.

Biology, a course full of possibilities for the teaching of more intelligent living, and physical training and health education for the girls have also been begun.

These are the high spots of our new high school. How the change has improved the established program, and additional features, will be treated in the report of Principal Bessey.

In this connection we are happy to express our thanks to various friends. Lockers for the physical training department were contributed by the Portland Y. M. C. A. For the library fund, a gift of \$100 was received from Mrs. Gilman

Boynton and Edward Gilman, in memory of their father, Lewis Gilman. The library needs of a growing high school have been previously mentioned by the principal, and assistance along this line will be most gratefully received. The musical work of the school was greatly benefited by the gift of a piano from the Hurlburt family, in memory of William Hurlburt. Some of the equipment for the economics room, which made it possible to start this work earlier than had been hoped for, was provided by the Civic League, which has been a helpful and generous friend of the schools. Lewis A. Peterson, class of 1895, furnished the clock for the assembly room. The Ladies' Aid of the Black Point Church contributed \$25 towards our equipment fund. Other organizations and citizens have contributed money and valuable time.

The educational needs of the public schools are generously met by the citizens through public taxation. However, we most sincerely welcome these—and will welcome other—gifts, not only as a means of making the education of our children more complete and our school centers more beautiful, but also as lasting expressions of the interest of individuals and organizations in the town's educational efforts.

HEALTH.

As so often stated before in these reports, it is no mere accident that health was placed first in the seven educational objectives listed by an outstanding research commission a few years ago. Our health inspection of pupils has been carried on again this year with their customary efficiency by Dr. Wentworth and Miss Price, the county health nurse. With the interest and co-operation of the teachers, steady improvement in pupils' condition is being noted.

A new valuable addition to the health work during the past year has been the mobile dental clinic at the Broad Turn and Beech Ridge schools. This clinic is sent out by the Cumberland County Public Health Association. The expenses were met through the co-operation of the Scarborough Branch of the Red Cross, the Broad Turn Parent-Teacher Association, and the parents of the Beech Ridge school.

With the aid of the Home Economics Department, a noon

lunch has been provided at the high school. At other schools noon lunches have been made more suitable.

COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES.

Believing that civic service should be a part of the education of every pupil, we are happy that all schools are in the Junior Red Cross. Our elementary school children sold over \$100 worth of Christmas seals and our high school pupils assisted in the annual adult Red Cross enrollment.

SOME INDIVIDUAL ACHIEVEMENTS.

While we probably do not know, nor would we have space for mentioning, all the outstanding achievements of our pupils and graduates, we are happy to note two or three outstanding cases. Mary Pedersen, valedictorian of the last graduating class of the high school, attained a scholarship average of 96.6, the highest in the history of the school—an achievement the more notable because she was at the same time most helpful in extra-curricular activities. She entered Gorham Normal School, where in December, 1927, out of a class of 250, she was one of eight highest students and had a scholarship standing of six A's. Another graduate, Elizabeth Knight, is also on that honor list. We regret that Eleanor Lary, another graduate, who achieved high rank last year at Gorham Normal School, has been forced by illness to leave school.

Gertrude P. Soule won the Lydia Spear prize in public speaking, for which representatives of thirty-one Maine secondary schools competed. Henrietta F. Meserve won second prize in an essay contest conducted by the University of Maine on "What Science Has Done for the Modern Home."

That we are taking seriously our obligation and attaining some success in interesting our boys and girls in the best things in rural life is shown by the fact that of the eleven county representatives of 4H Club Work, chosen on merit to go to the Eastern States Exposition at Springfield, Mass., five were Scarborough boys and girls. Perhaps, incidentally, this might be considered a valuable supplement to the town's co-operation in Advertising the Advantages of Maine." Our

young people also won two county championships in the 4H Club Work during the past year.

A rather unique distinction came to our athletics when Dagna Olesen scored 286 points in nine basketball games.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT.

During the year the Blue Point schoolhouse has been painted and the sanitary conditions at Broad Turn were standardized. Our account for this work received a bad setback, and some additional improvements were deferred because of the emergency necessity of providing a new boiler for the Dunstan School, at a cost of \$455. The town also contributed \$100 toward the improvement of the Union School at Buxton.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT.

We hope that sufficient funds will be provided during the coming year for the following improvements to our schools:

1. Liberal appropriations for the general upkeep and improvement of all school plants.

2. Standardization of the sanitary arrangements at the Beech Hill School. When this is completed, every Scarborough School now in use will be provided with standard sanitary arrangements as outlined by the State Board of Education.

3. Extensive repairs and some further standardization of plant at Beech Ridge. This building is in very poor condition and extensive repairs are absolutely necessary.

4. Grading of the high school grounds. The extent and potential beauty and usefulness of our high school grounds are such as few towns enjoy. Further details of this proposal will be prepared for action at the town meeting.

OUR EDUCATIONAL AIM.

Sometimes it is worth while to review our educational aims. Education does not stand still; it is dynamic. The aims remain much the same, but their attainment calls for different materials and methods as the social and economic situa-

tion into which we send our young people becomes increasingly complex.

This demands that the educational administration must study its educational plan scientifically as to how it is meeting the needs of the child. An ideal plan will train the child in thought as well as memory; will give him an ideal of social service and fitting into the community; will not neglect giving him a correct attitude toward work; will preserve and strengthen in each child the individual aptitudes with which he has been endowed by heredity.

On the other hand, the schools are supported by public taxation. A successful school administration must necessarily, in the interests of true economy, make the best possible use of all its facilities and of the particular abilities of the individual members of its staff.

EDUCATIONAL RECOMMENDATIONS.

With this aim in mind, we outline for your consideration two developments in the Scarborough school plan:

1. Ever better co-ordination between the highest grades of the elementary schools and the high school. This is largely an educational problem for the administration. It implies better grouping of pupils when they reach the seventh and eighth grades. A pupil in the higher grades in a small school, where he may be the only pupil in his grade, lacks the encouraging, competitive setting which will bring out his best work. Of course you will realize that this rearrangement made universal leads to the junior high school plan of organization, frequently previously mentioned in these reports and accepted as the best organization in all parts of the country. However, owing to the wide extent of our town and the resultingly large financial obstacles, this is not presented as a proposal for universal rearrangement. It is presented rather in the hope that the individual family, realizing the advantages, may find some way for its son or daughter to gain that advantage. As indicated at the beginning of this report, in a few cases parents have found it possible to send their children to Oak Hill from outlying schools, and those pupils are reaping the advantages of that planning and endeavor.

2. The development of manual training for boys at the high school. By this we do not mean an intensive "trade" course in mechanics. It should rather be sufficiently varied to give a boy the knowledge of mechanics which will be valuable at home as well as in industry; an opportunity for the boy by actual trial to determine whether he is fitted for mechanical pursuits; a course which provides for and gives motive to many parts of his academic studies; and, most important, a course which will develop neatness, accuracy, self-reliance, and an appreciation of the value of order and concentration.

In the new building we have the space. The equipment need not be extensive at the start, and some of it can be made by the pupils as a part of their instruction. The teacher, if employed on a full-time basis, may give part of his time to academic work, or, perhaps, as was the case when we offered similar opportunity to the girls this year, make possible the physical training and health education for the boys. It might even be possible if necessary to obtain a teacher on a part-time basis for this course.

With the introduction of this course we will equalize the opportunities offered to boys and girls and give our school a complete, well-organized curriculum.

For all work in manual arts we would receive financial aid from the state.

IN CONCLUSION.

I desire, once more, to express my sincere appreciation of the conscientious and co-operative manner in which the Board of Education, members of the staff, town officials and the townspeople have assisted during this happy, but difficult, transition into what we hope will be a new era of education in Scarborough.

Report of High School.

To Superintendent F. H. B. Heald:

I herewith submit my seventh annual report as principal of Scarborough High School.

The enrollment for the last semester was the largest in the history of the school and was distributed as follows: Seniors, thirteen; Juniors, fourteen; Sophomores, thirteen; Freshmen, forty-two; Post-graduates, one; a total of eighty-three pupils.

The following students were placed on the honor roll for proficiency in their scholastic work during the semester: students receiving an A average—Urbain Archambault, Stanley Pederson, Willie Faulkner, George Douglas, Lillian McCullough and Marguerite Clark; students receiving a B average—Norman Morse, Delia Smith, Evelyn Chandler, Ralph Lorfano, Delila Woodward, Frances Lothrop, Gertrude DeCoste, Rachel Shaw, Olive Fielding, Frances Bowley, Hope Fergato, Irving Peterson, Dorothy Clark, Ruthanna Knight, Reta Milliken, Constance Higgins, Gerald Pillsbury, Hazel MacMillan and Almeda Moulton.

In the Senior class, Willie Faulkner has attained highest honors, with an average of 92.8% for the four years' course, and Gerald Pillsbury ranks second, with an average of 88.4%.

Each subject is taken five periods per week. Sixteen points are required for graduation, a point representing work pursued five periods a week or a year.

Special credits are awarded for the successful completion of work in club work, public speaking and physical education.

The curriculum provides satisfactorily for the college preparatory student, but the General Course is lacking in that it does not provide for any work in the manual arts for the boys. I hope that a course in manual training may be introduced in the near future, as I feel that this line of study would prove invaluable in a rural high school of our type.

The most marked development in the building up of our curriculum during the past year has been the addition of a course in home economics and one in biology. The fact that thirty girls, or seventy-five percent of the total enrollment of girls, are members of the cooking and sewing classes attests to the popularity of these classes. Here are being taught the practical duties and practices of the home, and we cordially invite the citizens to inspect this new department of our school work.

The cooking class has charge of a hot noon lunch on four days of the week. A group of four girls are responsible for the preparation and the serving of the lunch each week. Another group of volunteer workers, consisting either of four

boys or four girls, have charge of the washing of the dishes and cleaning up of the kitchen, and are given free lunch tickets for their work. The lunch is self-supporting, and the bookkeeping of its accounts is carried on by the Sophomore bookkeeping class.

Through the gift of one hundred dollars from Mrs. Elva Boynton and Mr. Edward Gilman, and through the individual efforts of many of our pupils about one hundred and twenty-five books will be added to our school library during the year.

In order that the stage in our assembly room may be used for theatricals and dramatics, the high school is planning to present several entertainments in the near future to raise money for equipping it with scenery. I understand that the Women's Civic League of Scarborough is already arranging for the purchase of a new curtain, which they will present to the school.

I believe that the efficiency of our school has greatly increased during the past year and I am confident that it will continue to do so.

The pupils from the Broad Turn School were brought to the clinic. The clinic was held for two days.

Number of pupils treated in both schools, 27; number of cleanings, 27; number of silver fillings, 58; number of cement fillings, 1; number of extractions under gas, 36; number of extractions with novacaine, 10. The Cumberland County Public Health Association furnished all material used and the services of their nurse to assist the dentist, Dr. D. M. Milne.

The "outfit" was set up in the back room of the Beech Ridge School. Mrs. G. A. Sherwood entertained the dentist and nurse for dinners. The dentist's fee was financed by the Broad Turn Parent-Teachers' Association and the parents of the Beech Ridge School. The Scarborough Branch of the Red Cross assisted by paying half the bill for each school.
