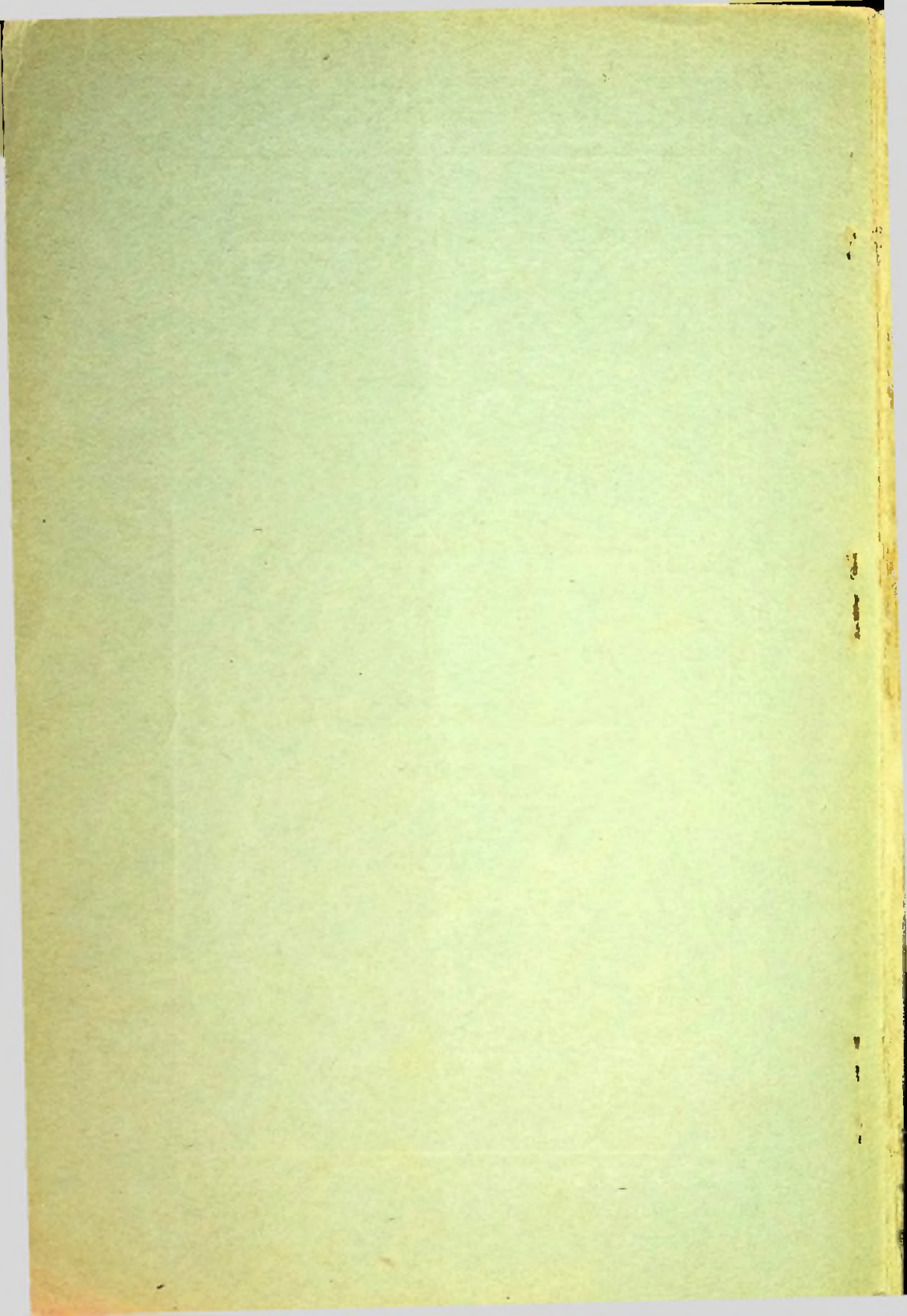

## SCHOOL REPORT.

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### Report of Superintendent of Schools.

*To the Board of Education and the Citizens of Scarborough:*

This has been a most satisfactory year for the schools of Scarborough. As the second, stabilized, year in the new high school program, it has given opportunity for improvements of which full advantage has been taken. In the elementary schools, the achievement along the lines of health and other fundamentals of education has been continued and increased.

But report time is the time in which we find it necessary to take inventory and seek your support for the needs as yet unmet. Thus, in view of that fact that most of our gains have been noted by the interested citizens as they have been made, I desire to make this report a discussion of the abilities and responsibilities of Scarborough in school matters.

### SOUND ECONOMIC SENSE IN EDUCATION.

We believe that the citizens of Scarborough are more interested in children than in dollars. We do not believe that local school finances need any detailed defense. On the other hand, at a time when the tax rate is in the minds of the people, it may be of interest to consider the relation of the schools to the material development of the town.

The public schools were instituted for insurance to society. If the community advantages are to be maintained, youth must be given a reasonable minimum of education. A reasonable minimum of education in the comparatively simple early community life would not be a reasonable mini-

mum of education for the more complex life of to-day. Thus the aims and even the extent of educational offering in the Scarborough of to-day is no greater in proportion to the need than was the offering of yesteryear.

During the past few years the Scarborough local government, the state government, public utilities, and individual property owners have invested millions in roads, transportation and communication facilities, water supply, sanitation and improvement of private properties in our town. These improvements have made Scarborough a more comfortable and happier place in which to live.

Incidentally, too, much of our increased tax rate has been due to these same improvements.

But physical improvements alone cannot make a prosperous, efficient and happy people. A road is of value only for the transportation of something. If the resident along that road has not the ability to produce economically, market intelligently, finance efficiently, and enjoy his rewards in a wholesome manner, of what use is the road? If these material investments are to be of the value intended, the town must assume the education which completes the story.

But to Scarborough, in comparison with Maine communities of similar size, this education has not been expensive. In February of this year, the State Department of Education issued a bulletin on school costs for the school year ending June 30, 1928. Scarborough was in a list of thirty-eight towns having a similar number of children of school age. In ability to pay for education, measured in the amount of taxable property per child to be educated, Scarborough was fifth highest. In the amount spent per child in average attendance in elementary schools (\$46.07) Scarborough was twenty-third from the top in this list of thirty-eight towns and \$2.02 below the average for these towns. Scarborough spent \$106.82 per child in average attendance in high school

and was sixth highest in the list. The significance of this difference in relative position in the elementary school field and in the high school field will be seen later.

Spending for the schools as a whole, Scarborough spent \$12.00 per capita of population as per census of 1920, and was eighteenth in the list of thirty-eight towns.

Thus fifth in ability to pay for proper educational facilities, Scarborough has not at any point been called upon to pay up to ability, and the amount spent on its elementary schools is below the average spent in communities of its size throughout the State.

Or approach it in terms of tax rate. For the same year (1927-1928) in the State as a whole the average school rate was  $12\frac{1}{4}$  mills; Scarborough's was  $7\frac{9}{10}$  mills. The average rate for all purposes was  $46\frac{1}{4}$  mills; Scarborough's was 46 mills. The average city or town was spending something over 26% of its taxes for schools; Scarborough was spending only about 17%.

We are happy that the school costs have been kept so low. We are gratified that even with such comparatively low costs the town has been able to maintain good elementary schools and to make distinct advances in the high school field. We feel that the town money has been economically spent and that these figures show definitely that any increase in the general tax rate is not due to unreasonable demands for the schools.

#### OUR GREATEST NEED.

But on the basis of the same figures, we feel that it is now time to point out a serious handicap in our school system.

Our school buildings have been put into reasonably satisfactory condition. We are proud of our high school, and our elementary schools are being standardized at a speed consistent with reasonable expenditure per year. During the past year the installation of new toilets at the Beech

Hill school completes the standardization of all our school as to sanitation. Extensive repairs were made at the Beech Ridge School and it was brought to standard as to lightings. At Black Point a standard heating and ventilation plant was installed. New modern movable desks were installed at the Broad Turn School, and considerable miscellaneous improvement was made at other centers.

Our schedule for salaries of high school teachers is adequate to attract and retain excellent ability. That is the chief reason why our expenditures are nearer, although still under, our ability to pay in the comparative study quoted above. That is also the chief reason why our high school graduates are achieving success in the higher institutions and in the business world.

But, let's get back to our need. We are not so happy in our schedule of salaries for elementary school teachers. Our present schedule is: First year, \$792.00; second and third years, \$825.00; fourth year, \$845.00; fifth year and after, \$900.00.

We desire for such teachers two years of normal school training or its equivalent. We desire to retain a teacher over a period of years, as her local experience makes her more valuable to us. When we have to fill vacancies, we desire to have the pick of the best in personality and efficiency. Most of our elementary school teachers are in one-room schools by themselves, obliged to have the tact, sympathy and ability to meet the needs and problems of that little community with a minimum of detailed assistance from the central organization. We even expect a teacher occasionally to spend time and money in professional training—summer courses—while employed.

But our salary schedule does not assure these advantages. We are indeed fortunate in our elementary school staff to-day. We are blessed with teachers of personality and

ability. Without their earnest, conscientious, loyal endeavor, in many cases far beyond the compensation they receive, we would long since have faced problems, and paid plenty, either in financial reward or decreased benefit to our children. Probably the saving grace of the situation has been the interest and spirit of sympathy and support of the various communities which have inspired the teacher. May that sympathy and support continue, for without it, even if the salary was high, the life of the teacher would be dreary and her work drudgery.

But it is time that Scarborough financially regarded the efforts of the able and conscientious, and attracted and retained only such. Last fall we lost four out of our thirteen elementary school teachers, a turnover of approximately 30%. In every case the teacher went for better financial return to a town probably no better able to pay than Scarborough. The fact that we were able to obtain good teachers in their places does not compensate for the loss of the advantages which those leaving teachers would have had from longer local tenure. During the past few years, as other towns have raised their rewards, this has been too frequently the case. If Scarborough is going to insure its continued progress in the elementary field, it must no longer depend on chance conscientiousness and be satisfied with short tenure.

We have not been unmindful of this situation. We have deferred asking the town to face it for two reasons. First, due to the heavy demands on the town for public improvements, we have felt constrained to keep the school demands modest. This is shown in the proportion of the taxes spent on elementary schools as compared with other towns. Secondly, most of the additional money we have felt justified in requesting has had to be put into building expansion and improvement in order to provide reasonably healthful quarters in which our children might be educated. But we now

believe we would be guilty if we allowed this teacher handicap to continue.

Accordingly, we recommend that over a period of three years, salaries for elementary school teachers be adjusted to reach this schedule:

First year,	\$ 800 00
Second year,	850 00
Third year,	900 00
Fourth year,	950 00
Fifth year,	1,000 00
Sixth year,	1,050 00
Seventh year,	1,100 00

In making new appointments a candidate will be given credit for experience elsewhere in proportion to her success and the nature of her experience.

During the transition years, no teacher now in service will receive more than \$72.00 increase per year in bringing her up to schedule.

This is the first and by far most important of our recommendations for the coming year.

#### OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS.

Other recommendations, either so minor or so well-known as to need little explanation, are as follows:

The development of manual training for boys at the high school. This has been frequently recommended in these reports and its need increases as each year passes. It is a matter of justice to the boys, since the girls are already given opportunity along similar lines. We have the space, and the cost of equipment and instruction need not be excessive, and would be partly offset by state financial aid.

Adjustment regarding disputed land adjacent to the Libby School and the purchase of a triangular piece of land adjacent to the Oak Hill School. Both of these are minor

adjustments necessary to prevent the schools from being deprived of suitable playgrounds and to avoid interfering structures. I am pleased to state that the Board of Selectmen has already started necessary proceedings to acquire undisputed title to land adjacent to Libby School. During the past year, a similar necessary adjustment as to land adjacent to the Beech Hill School has been made.

Grading of the high school grounds. This is a much needed improvement, not only for the impression which this prominently located school may make on the visitor, but also for more complete and efficient use of the entire plant along modern lines.

As the teacher appreciates the interest and sympathy of the little community she serves, so is the Superintendent inspired by the co-operation, be it commendation or constructive criticism, of those for whom and with whom he works. Such co-operation and conscientious attention to school problems from the Board of Education, town officials, Civic League and other organizations, and faithful friendly assistance from principal, teachers and janitors, has made the year a pleasant one.

### Report of High School.

*To Superintendent F. H. B. Heald:*

I herewith submit my eight annual report as Principal of Scarborough High School.

This year's high school enrollment totals eighty-four pupils, the largest in the history of the school. The enrollment is distributed as follows: Seniors, eleven; Juniors, eleven; Sophomores, thirty; Freshmen, twenty-six; special students, six. The fact that our graduating class this year is small, and that the enrollment in the eighth grade is over forty, leads me to predict that approximately one hundred pupils will be enrolled in high school in the coming year.

The following students were placed on our honor roll for proficiency in their studies during the last semester: Students attaining an A average—Marguerite Clark, Frances Lothrop, Urbain Archambault and Almeda Moulton; students attaining a B average—Lillian McCullough, Norman Morse, Marion Douglass, Delia Smith, Nathalie Lothrop, Ruthanna Knight, Stanley Pederson, Warren Libby, Eleanor Davis, Dagma Nielsen, George Douglass, Barbara Harmon, Hope Fergatto, Evelyn Chandler, Ruth Pillsbury, Howard Lyons, Dorothy Clark and Rachel Shaw.

Students in the senior class who have attained honors for excellency in scholastic work during their four years' course are as follows: Urbain Archambault with a 93% average, and Stanley Pederson and Norman Morse with averages of 92.3% and 91.5% respectively. We notice the somewhat unusual fact that all three of these honor students are boys.

In November a school savings bank was instituted in conjunction with the Maine Savings Bank of Portland. Its purpose is to encourage thrift by means of small deposits

each week, amounts as small as five cents being accepted. The incidental clerical work is carried on by four members of the student body. During the past three months, thirty-one per cent. of our pupils have deposited one hundred and twenty dollars.

We are now offering two complete units in home economics, a course instituted a year ago. Hot lunches are being served each day of the week from the month of November to May, under the supervision of the home economics teacher. Between forty and fifty pupils avail themselves of this privilege daily.

Although public speaking is not a subject offered in our regular course of study, Scarborough High has made an enviable record in the annual contests which she has engaged in during the past ten years. In this period of time, she has been judged victor in four triangular contests, has numbered two first and four second place winners in seven years of county competition, and has been represented in the finals of the last three state contests, winning one state championship and one second place. These records, which I believe are unparalleled in any other high school in Maine, lead me to think that we might do even better if a one-hour course in public speaking, elective to interested students, could be added to our course of study in the coming year.

I am particularly pleased with the splendid condition in which our new building is kept. Many visitors have commented on this during the present school year. Although our exterior surroundings leave much to be desired, I feel that within our building the results of careful and painstaking janitor service is constantly in evidence and that it certainly reacts favorably on the quality of school work which our students do.

In conclusion, I wish to heartily thank the Superintendent

ent and the Board of Education for their co-operation and support in the administration of my duties.
