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

the current Middle East crisis. They also expressed that the United States should not have brought the American military into the conflict. By President Bush taking this action, it has caused more friction between Kuwait and Iraq said the panelists.

The first panelist, Waleed Al Khalifa, an A&T student from Kuwait stated that their country has been taken away from them. He also added that people are being killed and there are no medical supplies. "The movement is very inhuman and nobody is supporting it inside or outside Kuwait," said Waleed Al Khalifa. He brought about the concern of media because they are giving the American people the impression that Kuwait is against the United States when in fact Kuwait is on its side.

Another topic of discussion was, "America's Role in the Middle East" which was lead out by Dr. Fasihuddin Ahmed, associate professor of sociology and social work at A&T. He believed this to be the largest movement into Kuwait in the history of American troops. Fawzia Saleh, a student at A&T said, "I don't see any chance of peace ... there will be a war." Dr. Fasihuddin said, United States interest is of crude oil." He felt the Americans role was not in the Middle East.

Kavita Gulraj, a graduate student of A&T, felt the program made students aware of what was really going on because the media isn't doing that good of a job."

Dana Tillman, a junior said, "I thought that the meeting was very informative. We heard view points from people who were from the Middle East ranging from background information, Kuwait, Middle East to personal opinions about the United States' role in the Middle East."





Our People, Our Pride

African American Heritage, Poetry and Community News

The historical period of slavery in America produced many Africans who dedicated their lives to the struggle for liberation and independence. Because of the many injustices inflicted upon enslaved Africans by racist oppressors, the desire to resist was forceful and understandable. A long line of African revolutionaries and abolitionists evolved from this time in history.

One African born with a strong desire to resist was Sojourner Truth. Truth, originally named Isabella, was born a slave in Ulster County, New York. As a slave, Isabella received an education in the tyranny of racism. She grew up to learn how it felt to be denied freedom. She understood the pain of a mother seeing her son being sold and kidnapped to another state. She witnessed first hand the brutality of slave masters and overseers.

Through receiving this type of education in oppression, Isabella created within herself a strong desire to be free. She also realized that slavery must be destroyed completely. A deeply religious woman, Isabella dedicated her life to the struggle against slavery.

Having gained her freedom at around the age of 40, Isabella decided to leave her old name behind with her memories of slavery. In SOJOUNER TRUTH: NARRA-TIVE and BOOK of LIFE, Isabella explains how she found her new name through a religious experience. "My name was Isabella; but when I left the house of bondage, I left everything behind And the Lord gave me Sojourner because I was to travel up and down the land showing people their sins and being a sign unto them. Afterward I told the Lord I wanted another name.because everybody else had two names; and the Lord gave me Truth, because I was to declare the truth to the people."

As a fee woman, Sojourner Truth began a campaign of liberation lectures on the east coast. Because of her powerful style, Truth became known as one of the best abolition orators, male of female. Because she could not read or write, her ability to stir up a crowd was all the more amazing. Truth spoke straight from the heart and was recognized as a sassy and witty commentator on the conditions of America at that time. Truth would preach about the many sins of slavery. Because of her fiery delivery and intelligence, combined with her awkward physical appearance, Truth was often mistaken for a man. At one point during an emotional antislavery rally, Truth proved her womanhood once and for all by ripping off her blouse to satisfy an annoying heckler in the audience. The type of courage displayed by Sojourner Truth was not unusual for this period of time. It is crucial for Africans in America today to understand the great significance of freedom fighters like SojournerTruth. Although lacking a formal education, Truth was thoroughly educated in life. She took this education and created for herself a purpose, a reason to live. With this purpose Truth spoke out in an unforgivable tone against the calamity of slavery. Careful study of Sojourner Truth and other freedom fighters may help future generations create their own foundation of courage as the struggle for mental, political and economic liberation continues. Black History's featured presentation will be James Weldon Johnson's "Gods' Trombones."



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
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












Barbara Weathers

Greensboro's own to perform at City Stage

The name may be

new, but to anyone in touch with the cutting edge of contemporary music the voice, the energy and the distinctive musical dynamics of Barbara Weathers are already familiar.

For four magical years, the multi-talented Ms. Weathers was the primary vocal presence for one of today's most innovative and successful groups -- Atlantic Starr. Now she's stepped out on her own with a dazzling debut album for Reprise Records, making a major musical move with a stunning collection of songs delivered with all the passion, persuasion and consummate artistry that have always distinguished this extraordinary young performer from the rest. Giving top-notch performances on such Atlantic Starr albums As The Band Turns and All In The Name Of Love, Barbara toured extensively with the group, and by time she decided to pursue a solo career, had a solid professional foundation, and a large and loyal following, to build Shortly after her amicable split with the group, Barbara signed an exclusive recording contract with Reprise Records. She began sifting through the sheaves of songs submitted by some of the scene's hottest writers and began assembling a team of producers and players that constituted an A-list of in-demand talent. Along with

- who was behind the boards for such standout Barbara Barbara tapped the expertise of Earth, Wind & Fire's Maurice White on "My Only Love," "Anywhere" and a funky, updated rendition of the Supremes standard "Where Did Our Love Go." Also on hand were Vanessa Williams and Janet Jackson stalwart Rex Salas for the cut "Barbi Doll" (co-written by Barbara) and Surface's "Pic" Conley for the album's debut single and video "The Master Key." Among the many musicians who sparked the sessions were sax man Gerald Albright, backing vocalist Carla Benson, the above mentioned Wayne Lewis and Maurice White.

The result is Barbara Weathers, the most impressive debut album of the musical season. In short, this fresh young artist is about to put a name to the voice already at home on the top of the charts.

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
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
