New Computer Center in Civil Building To Be Directed by Prof. Ralph E. Lee

he computer center in room Civil Engineering Building on the Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy campus will be open for inspection by the public on Friday, May 6, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., Ralph E. Lee, Professor of Mathematics and Director of the Computer Center, has announced.

The Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy Computer Center was established in March 1960 and was made possible by a \$30,000.00 grant from the National Science Foundation for the purchase of an electronic digital computer system. About \$60,000.00 puter system. About \$60,000.00 worth of electronic digital comwith the \$30,000 grant. This equipment was purchased withthe \$30,000 grant. This equipment was purchased at half price because of the extensive educational program in digital computional program in digital computing at the Missouri School of Mines. The computer center is presently located on the third bresenty located on the third floor of the new Civil Engineering Building in room 312 and will be located there until larger perma-nent quarters are provided.

The computer system consists of a Royal McBee LCP-30 high speed electronic digital computer often referred to as an "electronic brain" by the press, radio and tele-

vision. This computer is capable of over 28,000 mathematical and of over 28,000 mathematical and logical operations per minute and has a memory capacity of 4096 instructions and/or 9 digit numbers. This computer system is the second most widely used scientific high speed digital computer system in the United States. Information is fed into the computer is tion is fed into the computer di-rectly by the tape typewriter or by a high speed photo electric tape reader at the rate of 200 charac-ters per second. Out put is by typewritten copy or punched pa-per tape. Auxiliary equipment con-sists of an offline tape typewriter for preparing paper tape and elec-tric desk calculators that serve as aids in programming. The computer center library contains a large number of computer programs for solving problems in Science and Engineering.

The computer system is presently being operated about fifty hours a week to provide instruction in digital computing and for solving complex research problems in engineering and science. The computer is capable of solving nearly any problem that can be exmanner and may also be used to pressed in a precise mathematical obtain a statistical analysis of

The Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy has an extensive instruction program in digital computing. This semester the Matheputing. This semester the Mathematics Department is offering three courses in the Mathematics of Digital Computing and the Programing, Operation and Design of Computors. The Electrical Engineering Department offers a course in the Electronics of Digital Computers. The techniques of computers taught in these courses are applicable to the largest types of digital computers and therefore provide the students with experience aften desired in with experience aften desired in

The computer center facilities are available free of charge to all Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy faculty and students. The general policy of operation of The general policy of operation of the computer center is determined by the Missouri School of Mines Computer Center Committee appointed by Dean Curtis L. Wilson. It is the responsibility of the Director of the computer center to carry out this policy.

Ralph E. Lee, Professor of Mathematics, is the Director of the Computer Center. His staff consists of a stenographer and 2 part-time graduate assistants.

Richard Terry Wins Freshman Scholarship

Richard Linn Terry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard M. Terry, 29 Church Street, Bonne Terre, Mo., who is presently ranking second in a class of 52 students at the Bonne Terre High School, has been selected to receive the St. Joseph Lead Company Freshman Scholarship at Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy beginning with the academic year 1960-61, according to an announcement by Dean Curtis L. Wilson, head of the school at Rolla.

Richard was selected for the award from among 14 applicants who

were nominated by the school of-ficials of the high schools in St. Francois County and within the towns of Herculaneum, Fredericktown, and Potosi, Missouri.

In commenting upon the selection Dean Wilson said that the selection committee had no easy task in selecting one out of this group of 14 outstanding young men, practically all of whom have been an acceptable candidate.

Richard, in addition to ranking second in his class, made a score that placed him in the 99th percentile among high school students of Missouri on the Ohio Psychological Test and a score that placed him in the 97th percentile on the pational average on the Prethe national average on the Pre-Engineering Ability Test. It was on the basis of these two tests, his rank in class, and the recom-mendations from his high school officials that he was selected for the award, the Dean said.

The committee making the selection consisted of Noel Hubbard,

Assistant Dean and Chairman of the Committee; Professors C. W. Eshbaugh; E. D. Fisher; C. S. Cave; and K. C. Muhlbauer. This committee before making a selection went to Flat River on March 23 and interviewed seven of the 14 applicants who had the highest combined scores on the Pre-Engineering Ability Test and the Ohio Psychological Test.

The St. Joseph Lead Company of which Mr. E. A. Jones of Bonne Terre, Missouri, is division manager, first offered their scholarships at Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy in the fall of 1950. It has been in effect for the past ten years. The award for the freshman year amounts to \$600 and man year amounts to \$600 and, subject to satisfactory progress, the scholarship may be continued for three additional years. There are presently on the campus of Missouri School of Mines four holders of the St. Joseph Lead Company Scholarship. These are Frank Cummings, Jr., freshman scholar; Barry House, sophomore scholar; Donald Burlage, junior scholar; Donald Burlage, junior scholar; and John Davis, senior scholar. Davis is scheduled to graduate on May 29, 1960, with the degree of Bachelor of Science in Chemical Engineering.




