Mr. O. L. McPherson Gave Rotary Talk Last Friday

The Institute of International Understanding presented a talk by Mr. Oran L. McPherson last Friday evening at 8:00 in Parker Hall entitled "Maintaining World Trade and a High Standard of Living."

Oran L. McPherson is a Canadian farmer and business man, whose home is in Vulcan, Alberta. He was born in Kingman, Kansas, and attended Shurtleff College in Alton, Illinois, and the University of Illinois. As a young man he went to the Province of Alberta in Canada and developed a large and successful wheat farm.

Mr. McPherson was active in the organization and development of various farmers' associations in Alberta, was one of the organizers of the Wheat Pools of Western Canada, and served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Alberta Wheat Pool and the Canadian Wheat Pool.

He was elected to the Alberta Legislature in 1921, and was later Speaker of the Legislature, serving in that position for five years. He was later Minister of Public Works in the Alberta Cabinet for eight years, and in the early 1930's he supervised unemployment relief for the Province of Alberta. Since retiring from Government service, he has engaged in civilian war activities and in his personal business, which includes the operation of mining properties and farms.

Miners Lose Close Grid Match 20-13 to Springfield Bears

Last Saturday in the second game of the young season, the Miners were defeated by Springfield, 20-13, in a very thrilling game played here.

Statistics show the Miners out-gained Springfield by 30 yards but also shown are penalties totaling 100 yards against M. S. M. These penalties were really the ball game.

Through the first half the game was a scoreless tie and it looked as if it might continue that way. In the third quarter however, Harrison of Springfield threw a touchdown pass to Riley. An attempted run around right end for the extra point was stopped.

After a punt into the Miner end zone brought the ball to the 20-yard marker, little Frank Hequembourg slashed his way through for 62 yards to the Springfield 18. A few plays later, Fullback Don Schultz, who played a whale of a game, registered the first Miner score of the year. Jack Rother place-kicked the point beautifully.

Beginning the fourth period, Riley skirted his left end to score for Springfield. Harrison drop-kicked the extra point. After the kick-off was returned by Carl Dopp to Springfield's 45, Hequembourg led a drive that was eliminated when he reached between two men to grab a long pass from Schultz and galloped across with the tying markers. The attempted conversion was wide.

The game continued in such style until Springfield made a long drive to the Miner seven. A penalty brought the ball to the two yard line with time rapidly running out. After two line plunges, Jolly Dziadyk scored. A pass from Harrison to DeWitt netted the extra point.

It was a tough game to lose but the team was in there fighting and giving everything they had. The linemen played very hard and for this reason were charged with a number of holding penalties.

The game, a part of the Parent's Day Program, was witnessed by a large crowd. Dean Wilson

welcomed the visitors and the R. O. T. C. Unit gave a demonstration between halves. Lineups for the game were:
