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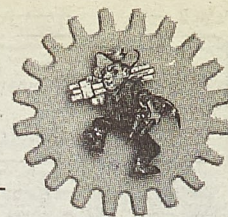

## University Center renovation plans are ready to go

Plans for the University of Missouri Rolla University Center renovations are well underway and will be presented to the Board of Curators at the December meeting.

The plans are to renovate the existing University Center East, adding more space, and then to demolish the University Center West.

"It's going to give us a building more like a student center," said Mr. Joe Ward, student activities director.

The current University Center East will be expanded south onto the visitor parking lot and

east onto the grassy space. The renovations will add a net gain of 17,000 square feet, even after demolishing the present University Center West. Centennial hall will be enlarged to one and one third of its current size. Cafeteria space will be doubled. The bookstore will be moved to the newly renovated University Center.

UCE will be closed for approxi-

mately 18 months during construction, which may begin as soon as June, according to Karl Schmitt, student council president.

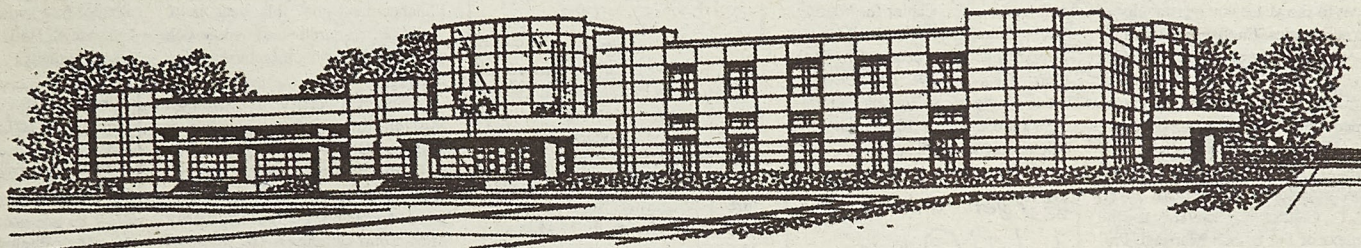
Two groups, the UC Renovations/Expansion Committee and a Student Focus Group, have been working with Dickinson/Hussman Architects on specifics of the project. The chair of the UC

Renovation/Expansion committee is Dr. Wendell Ogrosky, Vice Chancellor for international and Student Affairs,

"At the December Board of Curators meeting the board will be presented with the schematic designs," said Schmitt. At present, there are still minor preparations to be made for the presentation, but, according to Mr. Ward, those will be

taken care of at the November committee meetings.

Last November students approved 12 million dollars for this project. More funds are expected to be raised through donations. "Dr. Ogrosky has pledged that any funds that are raised will be used to reduce those fees [the 12 million dollars]," said Mr. Ward.

An artist's rendering of the new university center. The renovations should begin in June, 1998.

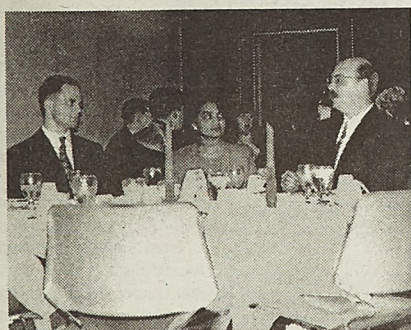

## KMNR plans to celebrate 25th with free concerts

Many thought it would never come, but KMNR is 25 years old. Preparations have been made to commemorate this event with a 25th anniversary celebration. The first installment of the celebration will take place on Friday, October 16th, and Saturday, October 17th, when KMNR will present two free concerts featuring local and not-so-local bands.

Friday evening beginning at 7 p.m. at the Puck (in the event of rain, Miner Rec), the bands Orange Tree, Celery, and Vitamin A will perform. Saturday, at Kappa Sigma Fraternity, KMNR will be throwing a free barbeque at 5 p.m. followed by musical entertainment. Not Waving But Drowning, Fuse 12, and My Scarlet Life are performing Saturday night.

All events are free and open to students (bring student ID's). Any questions about the concerts may be directed to KMNR by calling 341-4272, or by e-mailing kmnr@umr.edu.

Student-run radio started at the Missouri School of Mines in 1964 as KMSM, which broadcast at 88.5 MHz. This was the first FM broadcast station in Rolla. In 1972, the necessary equipment was purchased to begin broadcasting in stereo, making KMSM the first stereo station in Rolla.

While KMSM was busy improving the quality and technology of radio in Rolla, the University of Missouri system was making plans for a network of full power (100 kW) stations at each of the four campuses. KMSM's frequency was determined to be the best for that powerful a station in Rolla. The new station would be built, and would broadcast at 88.5 MHz.

The university was not going to stop the organization of KMSM as a student group, but wasn't sure how to handle the new situation. One option that was considered was to provide time slots on the new station to the

KMSM organization. The problem was that KMSM's programming was primarily student-oriented and would not be of interest to the large area covered by the new station. The university was afraid that if it provided a new frequency for KMSM, many would question the necessity of having two radio stations on campus. The executive board of KMSM was determined to keep KMSM independent and on the air and convinced the university to provide the support to allow KMSM to obtain a new frequency, 89.7 MHz.

The Humanities and Social Sciences Lecture Series is sponsored by the UMR College of Arts and Sciences to showcase younger faculty of the economics, English, history, philosophy and liberal arts departments at UMR as well as a few members of humanities and social sciences departments from other universities.

Swenson's presentation will place D.H. Lawrence's final and most notorious 20th century novel, "Lady Chatterley's Lover," in the context of the British Marriage Plot tradition, which emphasizes the triumph of the marriage plot over the seduction plot in British fiction.

*New research center started*

◆ A new research center at the University of Missouri-Rolla promises to undergird research efforts to fix the nation's bridges, roads and other ailing infrastructure.

The UMR Center for Infrastructure Engineering Studies, created through the University of Missouri's Mission Enhancement program, will provide research expertise in the areas of building and civil infrastructure, such as roads and bridges; power infrastructure, such as electric power; and infrastructure management.

The CIES will involve researchers from eight departments in UMR's School of Engineering, School of Mines and Metallurgy, and College of Arts and Sciences.

Nanni envisions future research activities of the CIES to include:

- Developing new design methods for civil structures, such as highways, bridges and buildings.
- Using non-destructive techniques to assess structural damage due to earthquakes, traffic or other stresses

on civil infrastructure.

- Rehabilitating bridges and buildings by applying lightweight fiber-reinforced composite materials. This involves wrapping the strong yet lightweight materials around columns, much like a bandage is wrapped around a sprained ankle.

- Developing intelligent transportation systems and "smart" structures through the use of advanced sensors.

- Studying new flood control, watershed modeling and river engineering methods.

- Developing power system security, operation and reliability systems.

- Developing new composite materials for use in construction and structural engineering.

The center meets one of UMR's two Mission Enhancement goals for the 1998-99 fiscal year - that of improving research and education opportunities in the area of infrastructure. UMR's other Mission Enhancement goal this year is to improve research and education opportunities in manufacturing engineering.

The University of Missouri Mission Enhancement program is designed to meet the future research and education needs of the state by focusing on specific educational programs on each of the four University of Missouri campuses. The Missouri Legislature approved funds for Mission Enhancement projects last legislative session.

First-year funding for the CIES totals \$250,000. The center is expected to attract more than \$1 million in external funding over the next year.

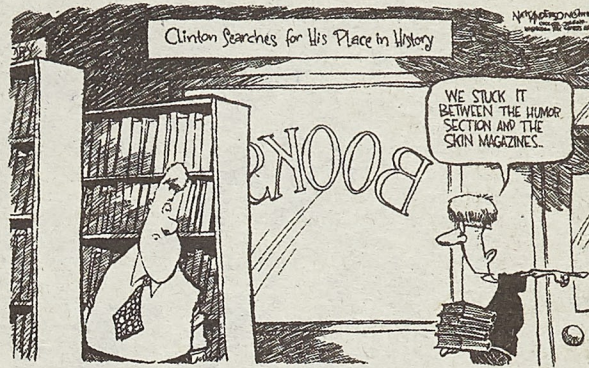

Just as this problem has become apparent, Rolla opened the recycling center to try to reduce the waste we send to landfills. So far, the effort by the citizens of Rolla and the university has been commendable. Unfortunately, as a nation, the effort has been far below par.

The American public is so stuck on convenience and ease that they would simply not want to do the extra work involved in reducing its waste. This simply can't go on. Some things that can be done is separating

garbage and keeping recyclables in a separate container. Most communities near larger cities, such as Chicago, now have curbside service and provide homeowners with bins to place recyclables. These services don't always accept all kinds of recyclable goods, though. The citizens must take it upon themselves to take these recyclables to the nearest recycling center.

Another thing that can be done is buy goods that are made with recycled material. These goods are usually marked with a percentage of post-consumer material that is contained in the good. The most popular good that contains post-consumer material is paper. Look for packaging that contains this recycled paper and buy those products. Paper constitutes 40% of our total waste. The university, the Missouri Miner and many office buildings across the nation have office paper recycling programs to reduce the amount of office paper thrown away to the trash. This not only saves trees, but reduces our waste volume.

Although recycling has just become a concern within the past ten years, much more has to be done to curb our wastefulness. More money must be invested in recycling. More legislation must be instigated to make recycling more mandatory. We can't continue to be known as the country that throws away everything. ## Time to find a new definition of "scandal"?

The best recent surveys report that 21 percent to 25 percent of married men in the United States have had extramarital affairs. For married women, the figures are 13 percent to 15 percent. Extramarital sexual relations may be deplorable, but they are not rare.

Lying about them is not rare either.

So what is going on in Washington — where the House Judiciary Committee has now voted to launch impeachment proceedings against President Clinton? What is going on in the editorial pages of our country's newspapers, where there are calls for resignation or impeachment at a time when all we know for sure is that Clinton broke his marriage vows and when questioned about it (Should he have been questioned about it?) lied. What does this have to do with the responsibilities of office?

Five years ago, independent counsel Kenneth Starr was appointed to investigate Bill and Hillary Clinton's real estate transactions in Arkansas while Clinton was governor. Starr also looked into the firing of employees in the White House and a variety of other matters. To date, he has not charged illegal or immoral

conduct on the part of the president in any of these areas.

Instead, we have an exclusive focus on sex and its cover-up: The president lied to the public (true); he encouraged others to lie or mislead under oath (maybe, maybe not); and he himself lied under oath (maybe, but maybe he only misled without technically lying). Clinton holds that the purported lying under oath was only evasiveness in responding to Paula Jones' lawyers. As he said, he did not feel obliged to do their work for them. The Paula Jones suit, most observers seem to think, was frivolous on its face and it was, in the end, bounced out of court. That the president should weasel around questions in those circumstances, not only to protect himself and shield his family but to frustrate adversaries hell-bent on savaging him, is somewhere between forgivable and admirable.

So what's going on in Washington?

Any scandal requires three parties: an alleged perpetrator of scandalous acts — acts that violate the moral conscience of the community; a scandalizing agent; and a scandalized audience.

Sen. Joseph McCarthy, R-Wis., was a scandalizer who became the scandal. Not that there were no Communists in the United States govern-

ment; there were. But his pursuit of them was so vengeful and so beyond the bounds of decency and so flagrantly in disregard of civil liberties that it gave a bad odor to congressional investigations for years.

Twenty years after the Senate censured McCarthy, young lawyers recruited to the Senate Watergate committee remembered the lessons of McCarthyism and sought to be especially scrupulous lest they raise the specter of McCarthyite tactics.

The Starr investigation of Clinton, aided and abetted by the Jones lawsuit, aided further by a president too verbally clever for his own good, has turned what still appears to be little more than a man's real, but familiar, moral weakness into a national preoccupation.

The mountain grew from a molehill not only because of a zealous agent of scandal but because of the institutionalization of a scandalizing machinery — today's news media in the post-Chappaquiddick, post-Gary Hart, post-Clarence Thomas-Anita Hill era in which the boundaries between public life and private life have blurred. This frees the media to pursue practically anything in the private lives of public people. Sometimes journalists just say no, as most reporters did when the Henry Hyde adultery story was peddled to them.

But in a competitive media market, it takes only one publication of dubious virtue to spring a story like that one onto the evening news.

The scandalizing agents have been aided also by a related change in political discourse in the past decade — a new emphasis on the importance of character and virtue. This can be traced back to Jimmy Carter's post-Watergate presidential campaign that placed as much emphasis on character as on policy, but it has been greatly expanded in recent years by both "family values" conservative thinkers and "community" and "civil-society" liberal thinkers. Across the political spectrum, there is growing consensus that moral character and "civic virtue" are just as important as policies and institutions.

But has the general concern with character locked in on the right person for the right reasons? This brings us to scandal's third party: a scandalizable audience. There's no scandal if there's no audience for the gossip, rumor and pointed finger. So far, the audience has not materialized.

There could be a turn of events, of course. As late as January, 1974, when Richard Nixon's approval ratings were a miserable 26 percent, only half of Americans wanted him to resign, and fewer than 40 percent favored impeachment proceedings.

This was 18 months after the Watergate burglary; half a year after the Senate Watergate committee's electrifying hearings; several months after the "Saturday Night Massacre" temporarily shut down the special prosecutor's office and led to the resignation of Attorney General Eliot Richardson and his deputy, William French Smith, neither of whom would carry out the president's command to fire special prosecutor Archibald Cox. And still only 7 percent of the people named Watergate as the country's most important problem — 46 percent named the energy crisis. Seven months later, Nixon resigned.

Predicting what will happen is risky, but understanding what a scandal is may help to put this one in perspective. Right now, no one should seek to understand Clinton's plight through the prism of Watergate without giving at least equal weight to the prism of McCarthy.

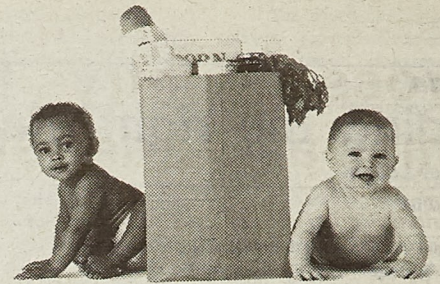

## Cross-Country teams improve times at Border States Invitational

The University of Missouri-Rolla men's and women's cross-country teams competed in the Border States Invitational this past weekend, showing significant improvement in their times and performance.

The event was held on Saturday, October 12th, in St. Louis, Missouri, with Washington University as host.

The Miners ran an 8K and placed 12th out of 22 teams present. Senior Matt Hagen (Rolla, Mo.) came in 8th at the race with a time of 25:22.

There was a large gap before any more Miners were seen crossing the finish line. Senior Josh Sales (Topeka, Ks.) finished 57th in a time of 26:21. A rush of runners completed the course around the same time, and the last four Miners finished just within seconds of one another.

Leading the pack was freshman Josh Anyan (Hazelwood, Mo.), who finished 81st with a time of 26:43. Kevin Johnson (St. Charles, Mo.) finished

92nd with a time of 26:51, followed by John Sanders (Waynesville, Mo.), placing 97th with a time of 26:54. Freshman Kevin McGuire (St. Louis, Mo.) and Senior Dan Saylor tied in the race, rounding out for the Miners with a time of 26:59.

All of the Miners finished well within the top half of the men's race, which consisted of 250 runners. A larger race can be beneficial, as some of the Miners noted. "Having a large group of runners really keeps you focused and in contact with how you're doing," Sales said.

"Some people like the big crowds, but some people like it better to run on their own," Paul Whetstone, a freshman runner for the Miners, noted. "I think it really pumps us when there's a lot of people to cheer us on."

Kim Hoffman of the Lady Miners agreed.

"With a lot of people surrounding you in the race it makes it more competitive; you're always trying to pass the people in front of you. When you're alone, you tend to stay where

you are. Sheri [Lentz] and I took off fast together and tried to pass a lot of runners right at the beginning."

Overall, the team thought they improved from previous meets.

"I thought the team did well," Whetstone said. "We hadn't been up to par in previous races, but I think we're on pace now to be where we need to be for conference in two weeks."

"We really pulled together as a team," Sales said. "We improved our running mentally and stayed together on the course. We still need to move a little faster, but I think we have the potential to beat some of the conference schools we haven't beaten before."

The Lady Miners did not place quite as well among their competitors. The women finished 20th out of 25 teams present at the 5K race. Senior Sheri Lentz (Rolla, Mo.) had a strong finish with a time well under twenty minutes. Lentz finished 40th among the women with a time of 18:56.

## Men's golf team suffers setback at Missouri Southern Tournament

The University of Missouri-Rolla men's golf team suffered severe setbacks at last week's Missouri Southern Tournament. The event was held in Joplin, Missouri on Monday and Tuesday, October 5 and 6. Due to inclement weather, the tournament was canceled on Monday, so the golfers had to shoot 36 holes on Tuesday.

The Miners placed twelfth out of the fifteen teams present. Andy Laegler was the first place finisher for the Miners, shooting a consistent 74 on each round of the course. Laegler tied for 13th place overall with a score of 148. Placing second for the Miner's was Mike Essenpreis, who tied for 45th and 156 strokes. Sophomore Eric Fryatt also finished with 156 strokes. Brad Neuville placed 65th in the tournament with a score of 163, and Kevin Adlard rounded out for the Miners, tying for 71st and 169 strokes.

Rainy weather Monday put a damper on the event. The Miners felt the situation didn't help their concentration any for the tournament, but didn't justify their lower-than-average performance, either. "The course was in pretty bad shape because of the rain, but that was still no excuse for our scores," Adlard said. "Most of the other schools shot what they usually

do. We just blew up."

"It was pretty disappointing overall. Our scores were poor and the course was fairly easy," Laegler said. "Individually, I need to get my short game going. As a team, we need to pull together mentally."

Essenpreis had similar feelings about the Miner's showing. "The tournament was tiring, especially



mentally. It's hard enough to keep your concentration for 18 holes, but it was even worse to do for 36 holes. It's disappointing; we just can't seem to come together and reach our potential as a team. We need to get out there and really work on our execution. As a team, you have to make every shot count. You can't throw shots away because your teammates might not be doing as well as you, even if you're shooting poorly, too."

Though the Miners didn't do as well as they had hoped, they are aware of their talent and plan on continuing to work individually and as a team to improve their standings among their conference schools. Currently the Miners are seventh out of the nine conference teams.

"We're really a heck of a golf team," Laegler said. "Missouri Southern wasn't a conference tournament, but all the conference schools were there, and it was hard to lose to teams we know we can beat."

Since the tournament wasn't an MIAA sanctioned event, the men's golf team technically wasn't hurt in their standings with the other schools. Central Missouri State University has the top position in the conference at the present time with 18 points. Truman State has consistently come out in the top three schools at each of the tournaments, and is in second place for the conference with 15 points. Points are awarded at each MIAA sponsored event, with nine points awarded to the top finishing school, and one point going to the school that finishes last. UMR has a total of 6.5 points, still ahead of Pittsburg State and Southern Baptist, each with four points and two points, respectively. Points will be doubled when the teams play in the MIAA tournament.

## Men's soccer team claims MIAA championship

The University of Missouri-Rolla men's soccer team had two big wins last week, one of which making them the MIAA champs this year.

On Wednesday, October 7, the Miners battled Southern Illinois University in Edwardsville, Illinois. SIU's Matt Little started the scoring with a unassisted goal at 12:55. UMR would not come back and score until 61:29 with a goal by Joe Young with the assist by Matt Long.

UMR freshman Hass Jassim said, "The first twenty minutes or so were kind of tough. We just weren't there at first, but as the half went on, we hot into our rhythm and we began to play our game."

"We started off a little slow, and let them have a goal in the first half, but we really picked it up in the second half," said UMR's Aaron Ogorzalek.

UMR scored again in the second half to bring the score to the final 2-1. The final goal was scored at 79:18 by Brian Koscielski.

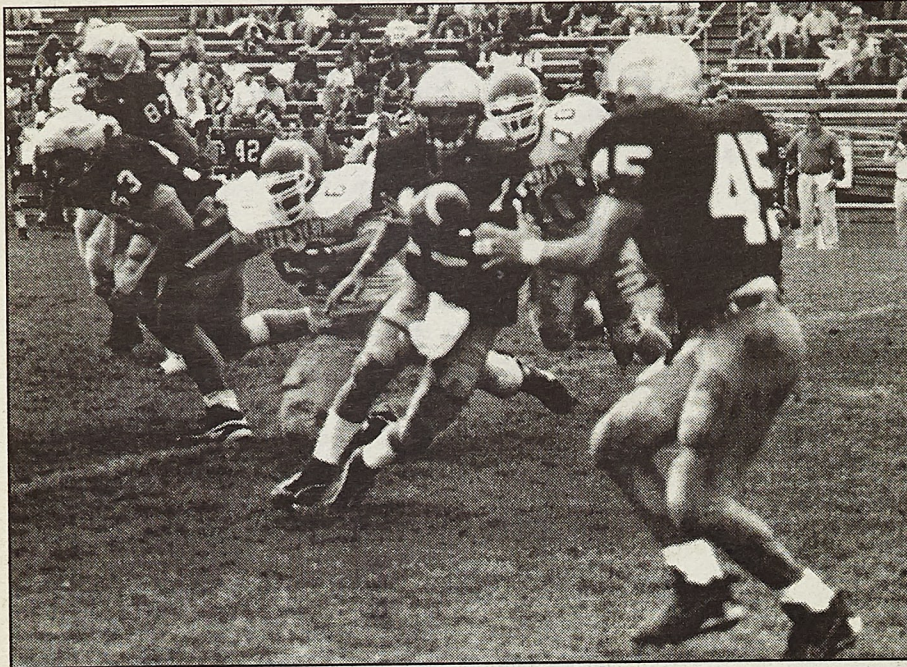
UMR's Scott Vogelsang said, "This is probably one of the best games that we have played. We played strong the whole game and never let down. We played soccer the

way that it was meant to be played, we played with a lot of heart."

After winning the SIU game the Miners had another tough battle ahead of them. This time they played Truman State University, a team which is ranked fifth in NCAA Division II, and first in the Central region. The Miners stepped up to the challenge and beat Truman in a 2-1 overtime victory. This gave the Miners the 1998 Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association championship, which is the last championship ever. The MIAA is suspending conference championships for men's soccer after this season. This win makes it the second consecutive year that the Miners have held this title. Last year, the Miners shared it with Truman State and Missouri Southern. This is the first year that the Miners have won the championship outright. After already beating Missouri Southern earlier in the season, the Miners were ready for revenge when playing Truman on Sunday.

"We owed Truman big time from last year," said Vogelsang. "They beat us in overtime last year after we had controlled the whole game."

# Miners trounced in 49-6 debacle

The University of Missouri-Rolla's football team lost to Northwest Missouri State University last Saturday. This latest defeat brings them to a record of 0-6 and maintains their ranking of last place in the MIAA.

Northwest lead by seven after eighteen plays in the first quarter. Northwest went on to score seven more points in the first quarter, fourteen in the second, and twenty-one in the third to come to their final score of 49. UMR scored once in the fourth quarter but failed to get the extra point, thus coming to their final score of 6.

UMR was, however, greatly overmatched in this game. Northwest is tied with Central Missouri State at 4-0 for the top slot of the MIAA and is currently ranked fourth in Division II of the NCAA. Steve Hodson, senior running back for UMR commented on the mismatch:

"We were overmatched physically in the game against Northwest," Hodson said. "We are going to put this game behind us and concentrate on Truman State."

After this game, the Miners are taking time to analyze their mistakes before moving on. Matt Hinson, junior defensive back for UMR, saw the mistakes occurring at the beginning of the game:

"We got down at the beginning of the game," Hinson said. "We need to make some progress and keep driving the whole game."

UMR was forced to punt on their fifth play with possession, but received possession once more in the first quarter. Two rush attempts totalled up no gain and a complete pass by Matt Brueckner to Dustin Penn totalled only eight yards on the third down, thus forcing UMR to punt again, this time from their 24 yard line.

Andy Singleton, junior running back for UMR, further analyzed their performance at the beginning of the game:

"There was really one major setback," Singleton said. "We had trouble moving the ball early on. We put the defense on the field too much."

UMR's defense took the field 13 times during the game, compared

to Northwest's 12. However, Northwest's defense only gave up 221 total yards, compared to UMR's 526 yard forfeit.

UMR continued to have trouble maintaining possession of the football throughout the game. On their third possession in the first quarter, the Miners received 15 yards on a personal foul penalty against Northwest. The Miners took advantage of the opportunity, Matt Brueckner completing a pass to Ken Ennis for 12 yards and the first down. Unfortunately, the wind changed once again as Brad Clarke rushed for a one yard loss followed by a fumble by Steve Hodson returning possession to Northwest.

In the third quarter, UMR's Drew Bullocks fumbled a kickoff return, recovering it on his own 19 yard line. Soon after, Matt Brueckner fumbled the ball on a rush attempt, giving possession once again to Northwest.

UMR fumbled the ball three times during the game, losing possession two of the three times to Northwest and was forced to punt nine times throughout the game.

Coach Jim Anderson is working extremely hard to keep his team up and running. The players have noticed his efforts.

"He tries to evaluate things on a week-to-week basis and accentuate the positive," Hodson said. "He doesn't get down on the players."

"He's trying to have us keep a positive attitude," Singleton said. "It is the same outlook he is trying to [keep for himself] as well."

Despite their current record, the Miners are determined to hold their heads up high and concentrate on the games ahead.

"It's tough losing as many games as we have," Singleton said. "We are going to try to be as upbeat as possible."

"We are trying to regroup and work hard," Hodson said. "We will work out our mistakes and prepare for the next game."

"We just got to get our focus back on and concentrate on the next game," Hinson said. "There are a lot more games we can still win. We just need to move on and get ready for the next one."

The Miners play their next game at home against Truman State at 1 p.m. on Saturday, October 17.

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# Rams defeat Jets Sunday

ST. LOUIS — The New York Jets arrived at the banks of the rain-swollen Mississippi River on Saturday at full steam after consecutive victories. They chugged away Sunday with momentum left shipwrecked in the dirty brown muck.

Right beside quarterback Glenn Foley's starting job.

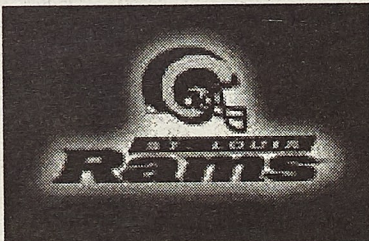
In what the club hoped would be a springboard game heading into next Monday's pivotal clash with the Patriots, the Jets ran aground under the weight of five turnovers — three by Foley. The St. Louis Rams converted those turnovers into 27 points en route to a 30-10 victory at the Trans World Dome.

It was the most lopsided defeat in Coach Bill Parcells' 21 games with the Jets, and sparked painful recollections of the days before he took over.

"This is as bad as we've played in a very, very long time, and we had no chance to beat anybody today," Parcells said. We had 45 players dressed for this game and we had 12 guys coaching.

Everybody stunk, OK? Everybody." Enter Foley, back under center after missing two games with a rib injury despite back-to-back victories

produced by Vinny Testaverde. Given the chance to start against one of the league's most pliable defenses, the rusty redhead completed only 5 of 15 passes for 76 yards with two interceptions. St. Louis turned those Foley pickoffs and a lost fumble into 13



points before Parcells had seen enough, yanking the quarterback in the third quarter.

For Foley, who has six interceptions in three games, the move may well mean a lengthy return to the bullpen — and he knows it, even though Parcells would not commit to either quarterback for next week. Foley is 1-7 as a starter, 0-3 this season.

"If you're not playing well, you're not going to play," he said. "I didn't play well ... This is as helpless as I've felt. Everything we tried seemed to run into a wall."

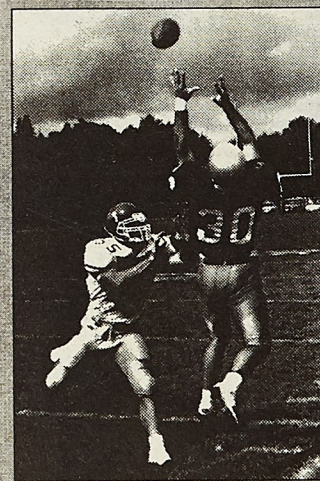
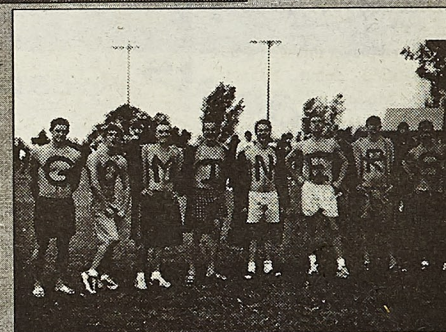
With the victory, St. Louis (2-3) snapped the NFL's longest home losing streak at eight. The Jets, also 2-3, managed 177 yards in the game, including only 54 on the ground with feature back Curtis Martin at home nursing a bruised right thigh. His replacement, Leon Johnson, managed 56 yards on 13 carries — only six yards after halftime — and was sacked on a pass attempt in the first quarter.

The Jets, who have dropped six of nine games going back to last season, have lost four straight on the road and five of their last six. Four of their next six games will be on the road.

The Rams, whose three losses are by a combined 18 points, had two weeks to prepare for the Jets, and it showed. Quarterback Tony Banks, playing despite a slightly separated right throwing shoulder, finished 18 of 24 for 171 yards and a touchdown, completing 15 straight throws in one stretch. The Rams, despite having starting tailback Robert Holcombe shaken up at one point, got 141 yards on the ground from five rushers, with veteran Amp Lee producing 53 yards and two touchdowns on only nine carries.

"It wasn't beautiful," St. Louis coach Dick Vermeil said, "but it was pretty well-executed."

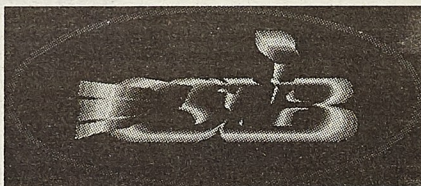

## Soaring high in the sky

"Oh, I have slipped the surly bonds of earth and danced the sky on laughter silvered wings." This is how John Gillispie Magee Jr. described flying. Just as Magee enjoyed learning how to fly so did Cadet David Bieger a UMR student in Air Force ROTC.

During a week stay at the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs Colorado, Cadet Bieger learned how to fly a plane that had no engine. Yes, that's right, no engine. So how did the plane ever get into the air to begin with, you might ask? How do you learn how to fly such a plane?

These planes without engines are called sailplanes. Basically, a motor-glider tows the sailplane up to about 9500 feet and then the rope between the two planes would be disconnected.

The motorglider 'motors' away and the sailplane would 'sail' away. There is a lot more to it than that, though. While 'in tow' the pilots must ensure that the rope stays taut. If the rope would slack, then the risk of it breaking when it became taut again was a danger. If it broke at the wrong time the sailplane might not have enough altitude to land safely.

Once in the air, the sailplane can do more than you think: nose high dives, spirals and much more. But the challenge is that after all this you have to maintain control of the plane without a motor to help you.

As Cadet Bieger explained, it was a chance of a lifetime. Since the sailplanes have no engine, they are obviously a lot quieter than regular planes, so it is much more peaceful and seems like you are just a birdie in the sky! It is neat to be able to look down on the earth while sailing in the sky.

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# Army ROTC cadets meet challenge

After completing five weeks of demanding and leadership-intensive training at Fort Lewis, Washington, six cadets from UMR Army ROTC, Stonehenge battalion have returned to campus to report nothing less than full mission accomplishment. As a result of their efforts, Stonehenge battalion can again claim the distinction of a 100% success rate at the Army's annual training camp.

Each summer, Army ROTC sends its third-year cadets to Fort Lewis, Washington for the purpose of attending Advanced Camp. The goal is to evaluate each cadet's potential for a career as an officer in the U.S. Army. Although the cadets engage in numerous training activities, the chief focus is leadership. Cadets are required to serve in several leadership roles throughout the five weeks, across a wide range of situations. During one phase, a cadet may be charged with overseeing his unit's training in a regular garrison environment. In the next, he may have to provide bold and decisive leadership in a field exercise, as his unit engages enemy forces during a mission. All this time, the cadet is evaluated by regular Army officers and non-com-

missioned officers, who look for the qualities that are critical to the success of our Armed Forces.

While providing leadership and learning how to command, the cadets of Advanced Camp train in the fundamentals of infantry tactics. During the land navigation phase, cadets must locate specific points while moving through a thickly wooded training



area. This five-day exercise includes a day phase and a night phase. In both phases, the cadet must rely upon his skill to utilize a compass and a pace count to complete the course in a limited time.

Weapons training is also a key component of Advanced Camp. Cadets must qualify as a marksman or

better with the M16A2 rifle on a live-fire range with pop-up targets. In addition, there are ranges for the M60 machine gun and a grenade training course. Cadets also train on how to call for fire support, during which live-fire from Paladin self-propelled artillery gives the cadets an appreciation for the destructive force of the modern weapon systems they may some day command.

Perhaps the most exciting phase of Advanced Camp focuses on small-unit infantry tactics, as the cadets head into the woods for almost two weeks of near-constant mission-oriented evaluation. Each cadet must receive and plan missions, react to enemy contact and demonstrate an ability to deal with a variety of problems that can arise during real-life scenarios. The campaign reaches its climax with an intense air assault offensive against enemy forces.

Only after completing these and other rigorous training events may a cadet march across the graduation field, to be recognized with his unit as a graduate of Advanced Camp. Stonehenge battalion is proud to announce that Louis Bartels, Eddie Brown, Rickey Christopher, David DeVillez, John Mikrut and Steven Paige have successfully met the challenge!

The songs on this album include the very popular "Iris" from the "City of Angels" soundtrack, along with many new melodies. The popular new single, "Slide," is the second track on the album and has a good, driving guitar sound. I like the Goos combination of pretty melodies and complex acoustic guitar rhythms. This is prevalent on track number eight, "All Eyes on Me" and "Iris". Unfortunately, I found that many of the songs sounded very similar and tended to blend together. 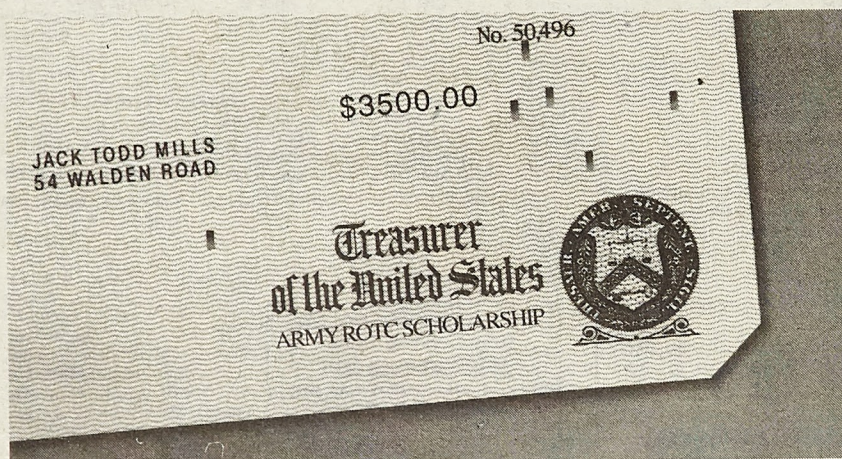

The call letters KMSM were outdated, as the school was now known as the University of Missouri-Rolla (and the Montana School of Mines had already taken KMSM). KUMR would seem obvious, but it was to be used for the new station at 88.5 MHz. Since the university mascot was Joe Miner, it was decided to try KMNR. It turned out that these call letters were already assigned to a decommissioned Coast Guard boat, so a letter had to be obtained from the Coast

Guard stating that they relinquished their claim to the call sign KMNR.

KMNR went on the air in the fall of 1973 using a new Gates transmitter and the antenna on the side of Harris Hall. This combination served the station until 1991, when a new QEI transmitter, Broadcast Electronics exciter, and existing Optimod processor were installed in the United Telephone/Sprint building. A new antenna was also mounted atop an existing tower there. The whole setup was controlled from the station with a digital remote control, and audio was sent on phone lines.

KMNR moved into its present location in March 1995.

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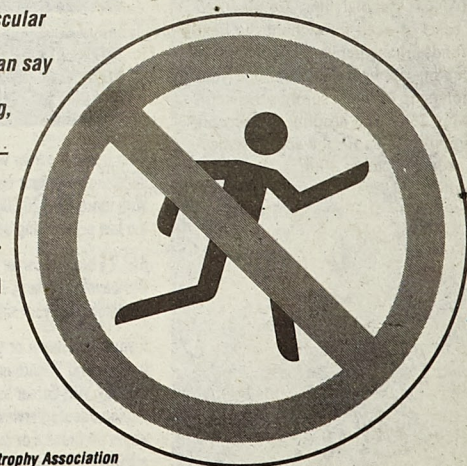
