# Origin of Awarding Degrees

The first academic degree was conferred in approximately 1160 A.D. at the University of Bologna, Italy with the practice spreading quickly to other European universities, most notably the University of Paris, Oxford University, and Cambridge University. The procedure we use for awarding degrees at most American universities is based on a practice developed at the University of Paris in the late 12th or early 13th century. In those days the Bishop of Paris, like every other bishop, was responsible for local educational curriculum and degree setting. His authority, however, soon came to be disputed by the teachers. They asserted that only they could be proper judges of qualifications of their students. The threatened impasse was resolved by a compromise, under which the teachers, or masters, judged the merits of the students and then recommended them to the Bishop for the conferring of their degrees.

# History of Tennessee State University

Tennessee State University is a comprehensive urban coeducational land-grant university founded in 1912 in Nashville, Tenn. The 450-acre main campus, with more than 65 buildings, is located in a residential setting; the Avon Williams Campus is located downtown, near the center of the Nashville business and government district.

Through successive stages, TSU has developed from a normal school for Negroes to its current status as a national university with students from 45 states and more than 50 countries.

By virtue of a 1909 Act of the General Assembly, the Agricultural and Industrial State Normal School was created, along with two other normal schools in the State of Tennessee, and began serving students on June 19, 1912. William Jasper Hale was appointed as head of the school. The original 247 students, along with the faculty and staff, operated as a family. Everyone worked to keep the Institution running in its early years, from clearing rocks to harvesting crops to carrying chairs from class to class. In 1922, the Institution was raised to the status of four-year teachers' college and was empowered to grant the bachelor's degree. The first degrees were granted in June 1924. During the same year, the Institution became known as the

Agricultural and Industrial State Normal College. In 1927, "Normal" was dropped from the name of the College.

As the College grew in scope and stature throughout the 1920s and 1930s, so too did its impressive roster of alumni who embodied the school's charge: "Enter to learn; go forth to serve." In 1943, when William Hale retired after more than 30 years at the school's helm, an alumnus was chosen to succeed him. From 1943 until his retirement in 1968, Walter S. Davis led the Institution through an era of tremendous growth, in areas as multifaceted as academics, facilities, and worldwide recognition. The General Assembly of 1941 authorized the State Board of Education to upgrade substantially the educational program of the College, which included the establishment of graduate studies leading to the master's degree. Graduate curricula were first offered in several branches of teacher education. The first master's degree was awarded by the College in June 1944.

Accreditation of the institution by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools was first obtained in 1946. In August 1951, the Institution was granted university status by approval of the

State Board of Education. The reorganization of the Institution's educational program included the establishment of the Graduate School, the School of Arts & Sciences, the School of Education, and the School of Engineering. Provisions were also made for the later addition of other schools in agriculture, business, and home economics.

On July 1, 1979, the former University of Tennessee at Nashville was merged with TSU as a result of a court order in the 1968 Geier v. Tennessee case.

In 1988, the University received an unprecedented \$112 million from the state general assembly for capital improvements. Under this plan, nearly all buildings on campus have been renovated, and eight new buildings have been constructed, including the Floyd-Payne Campus Center, the Ned McWherter Administration Building, the Wilma Rudolph Residence Center, and the Performing Arts Center. Currently, the downtown campus is undergoing an \$18.5 million renovation project. Through its eight colleges and schools, the TSU of today offers 43 bachelor's degrees and 26 master's degrees and awards doctoral degrees in six areas: biological sciences, computer information systems engineering, psychology, public administration, curriculum and instruction, and administration and supervision.

# Adolpho A. Birch, Jr. Justice, Tennessee Supreme Court



Justice Adolpho Augustus Birch, Jr. (ret.), graduated from Dunbar High School (Washington, D.C.) in 1950 and attended Lincoln University (Pennsylvania) from 1950 to 1952. He graduated from Howard University, where he earned a Bachelor of Arts degree and a Doctor of Jurisprudence and was a member of law review from 1954 to 1956. He graduated from law school in 1956. A Naval Reservist, Justice Birch served on active duty 1956-1958. In 1958, he moved to Nashville, Tennessee, where he taught medical law at Meharry Medical College and law at Fisk University and Tennessee State University, then Tennessee A & 1 University. During this time (1958–1963), he also maintained a private law practice.

In 1963, Justice Birch was appointed to the position of assistant public defender for Davidson County. This was then a part-time position, and he maintained his private law practice. In 1966, he was appointed to the position of assistant district attorney for Davidson County, a full-time position which required him to end his private law practice. He served in this position for three years. Justice Birch became a general sessions court judge in 1969, making him the first black Nashvillian to hold a county-wide, judicial office. In 1978, he was elected criminal court judge for the Twentieth District, Davidson County, Tennessee. He remained a criminal court judge until 1987. In 1981-82 he served as the presiding judge over the trial courts of Davidson County, making him responsible for case assignment and other procedural issues. Again, he was the first black to serve in this capacity.

In 1981, Justice Birch became an instructor at the Nashville School of Law, a position he still maintains.

From 1983 to 1986, Justice Birch served on the Court of the Judiciary, a specialized court that investigates allegations of judicial malfeasance and determines sanctions when allegations are found to be valid. On March 2, 1987, Justice Birch was appointed to the Tennessee Court of Criminal Appeals by Governor Ned Ray McWherter. In August 1988, he was confirmed in a state-wide retention vote under the provisions of the Tennessee Plan. In 1993, Justice Birch was appointed to the Tennessee Supreme Court by Governor Ray Blanton, becoming only the second black ever to serve on that body to that time. He also became the first Supreme Court judge in Tennessee history to have served at every judicial level. In October 1994, Justice Birch was selected Chief Justice by his fellow Supreme Court Justices. He served in that capacity until May 1996. In August 1998, he was confirmed for a second, eight-year Supreme Court term, serving additional terms as Chief Justice from July 1997 to August 1998 and from September 1999 to August 2001.

Justice Birch announced his retirement in 2006 following a 50-year career, 37 years of which were served as a member of Tennessee's judiciary. The A. A. Birch building in downtown Nashville, the home of Davidson County's Criminal Courts, was dedicated in his honor in June 2006.

Justice Birch is active in numerous civic and professional organizations. His many awards include the 2001 Thurgood Marshall Award from the Judicial Council of the National Bar Association; the 2002 Barbara Jordan Award, which is the highest honor conferred by the Phi Alpha Delta International Law Fraternity; and the 2005 William H. Hastie Award, which is the highest award of the National Bar Association's Judicial Council. Other awards and honors he has received include the Judicial Achievement Award of the National United Law Enforcement Officers Association; Certificates of Appreciation from the State of Tennessee and the Metropolitan Government of Nashville-Davidson County; a Distinguished Service Award from the Napier-Looby Bar Association; the Civil Rights Award from the Rainbow Coalition; the NAACP 1994 Image Award; a Distinguished Alumnus Award from the Howard University School of Law; Honorary membership in Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity; the inaugural Richard Allen Award for Public Service from the African Methodist Episcopal Church; the C.B. Robinson Award from the Tennessee Caucus of Black Legislators; and the Alumni Achievement Award in Law and Public Service from Howard University.

He received an honorary Doctor of Civil Law degree from the University of the South in 1998 and has also served as a Distinguished Jurist in Residence at the University of Memphis's Cecil C. Humphreys School of Law.

Justice Birch is proud of his three children and four grandchildren.



# The Symbols of Office

#### The University Seal

In 1922, President William Jasper Hale, first president of Tennessee A. and I. Normal School, asked Frances Thompson, Professor and Department Head of Art, to design the University Seal. Enclosed in a circle, the seal is divided into three parts: Agriculture upper left, Industry upper right, Education lower center. Education is further emphasized by a hand holding a light with rays extending above the seal. The motto, "Think, Work, Serve," is placed beneath the seal for support.



#### Presidential Medallion and Chain of Office



The Presidential Medallion and Chain of Office serve as a symbol of authority as head of the University. It originated in medieval times and is worn by the President of the University on ceremonial occasions such as commencement, convocations, or other formal occasions.

The Medallion and Chain of Office, the first in the history of the University, was commissioned in 2005 by Dr. Melvin N. Johnson, the seventh president of the University. The front of the medallion bears the official University Seal.

The back side of the Medallion was conceptualized by Dr. Johnson and artistically designed by Professor Carlyle Johnson, Department Head of Art. The seal is circular with a blue border bearing the President's

motto in Latin: NIL SINE MAGNO LABORE – "Nothing without Great Effort." Encircling the inside base of the seal on a background of silver is President Johnson's trademark, which is a suspended bridge supported by three massive pillars with extended pinnacles symbolizing the institution's Past, Present, and Future. At the top center is the year that the Institution was founded and at the bottom is the year that the Medallion and Chain of Office was conceived.

Each link of the chain holding the medallion is inscribed with the name of a past president of the Institution and his term in office. Holding together these links and supporting the medallion is a bronze leaf cluster.

#### University Mace and Baton

In 2005, the mace and baton was conceptualized by Dr. Melvin N. Johnson and artistically designed by Professor Carlyle Johnson, Department Head of Art, with layout and logistical formatting provided by Dr. John Cade, Dean of Admissions and Records.

The Lapis stone characterizes the TSU Blue and is used to stimulate inner vision and give enhanced wisdom, insight, and good judgment. The pearl stone represents the TSU White and symbolizes the wealth, purity, and power of knowledge. The head and flanges of the mace are modeled after the Floyd-Payne Campus Center Tower located on the University's main campus. The reflective quality of the polished silver signifies the vision of the University.



The baton of the mace is made of wood which is a forest symbol or the symbol of a provider. It represents

# The History of Academic Regalia

The history of academic dress began with the medieval European universities of the 14<sup>th</sup> century. In a time when all students were clerics, the gown and its attached hood served the dual function of keeping the student warm in unheated buildings and identifying the particular order to which he belonged.

Modern academic costume in the United States is based upon an intercollegiate code established in 1895. These early agreements have been revised periodically to cover standardization of the cap (two basic styles), the gown (three basic styles), and the hood (subject to greater variation than either the cap or the gown). The cap, originally round in shape, is usually the more familiar mortarboard square with tassel or black Oxford style.

The gown, commonly black, differs in sleeves and trimming according to the level of degree. The bachelor's gown is relatively simple in design. It is full-cut, falling in a straight line from an elaborate yoke, with long pointed sleeves as its distinguishing mark. The master's gown is similar to the bachelor's except for its peculiar arrangement of the oblong sleeves which terminate in square ends at the wearer's knees; the wearer's arms emerge through slits in the sleeves made at the elbows. Short-sleeved master's gowns are also worn. The doctoral gown is an elaborate, full-cut, flowing costume distinguished by velvet panels down the front and round the neck and by three bars of velvet on the voluminous bell-shaped sleeves. The velvet is usually black, but it may be a color designating the field of study (for example, dark blue for philosophy).

The hood, traditionally bearing the heaviest symbolic burden, is the most important feature of the academic costume. The length of the hood and the width of its velvet trimming designate the level of the degree. The hood's lining identifies the institution that granted the degree, and the color of the velvet heralds the major field of learning.


#### **Program Notes**

- Photographs: Guests are requested to refrain from taking photographs during the exercises.
- The audience is requested to remain seated during the Academic Procession and Recession.
- Main Floor Access: Please be reminded that no access to the main floor will be permitted during the commencement ceremonies.
- The assembly is requested to stand for the Alma Mater.
- An interpreter is provided by the University for hearing-impaired members of the audience. These guests should be seated near the front of the stage on the second level of the gym.
- This program is not an official graduation list. It lists students who were eligible to participate in the graduation ceremonies pending the outcome of final examinations and final grades. Therefore, it should not be used to determine a student's academic or degree status.
- Candidates: Any display of disruptive behaviors--stomping, dancing, etc.--on stage will not be tolerated. No talking on cell phones. All phones must be turned off! Once lined up, candidates must not leave the processional for any reason. Failure to comply with these University rules will necessitate the removal of the graduate from the ceremony, withholding of the diploma, and other possible consequences.
- Audience: Please turn off cell phones, keep the noise level to a minimum, and do not display behaviors that disrupt the ceremony (bull horns, signs, whistles are prohibited).

## Fast Facts about Tennessee State University

- TSU now has nearly 9,000 students, from almost every state and more than 50 countries.
- TSU engineers have developed new robots that are being used to sweep for mines and save soldiers' lives in the battlefield. Another application is detecting life during earthquakes, floods, and other civil disasters.
- This spring, TSU launched a new Pilot Center of Academic Excellence for Intelligence Studies, one of only four in the nation, which will prepare students to work in such agencies as the CIA, FBI, Homeland Security, and all branches of the military. This program also will allow students to study abroad; recent studies have been in China, South Africa, Australia, and Central and Eastern Europe.
- TSU astronomer Greg Henry, the first to discover a planet outside our solar system, was part of a team last year that discovered the first planet outside our solar system with a solid core, which may help explain how Earth developed.
- In recent years, TSU has built eight new facilities and renovated every existing structure on campus. Our newest buildings are a \$9 million performing arts center, a \$1.5 million fitness center, and a \$1 million technology center for agricultural research. And, after an \$18.5 million renovation, our downtown Nashville campus will have a mock stock trading room and other innovative features that will enable students to gain first-hand Wall Street experience.
- TSU is the only HBCU in the nation to offer studies in supply chain management at both the graduate and undergraduate levels. Supply chain management is the fine art of bringing together parts from all over the world for precise timing of production and delivery. U.S. News & World Report describes it as one of the 20 hottest job tracks for this century.
- Tennessee State University has experienced an explosion in sponsored research in recent years, more than \$30 million annually, making the university a leading institution in the state of Tennessee for research funding. The university has established a Center for Neural Engineering, a Center for Automated Space Science, and a myriad of other programs through sponsored research funding.
- Tennessee State University is an economic powerhouse. According to TSU's Office of Business and Economic Research, the university had an economic impact on the greater Nashville area of nearly \$500 million in 2001-2002. TSU created more than 9,000 jobs and attracted visitors who spent \$42.4 million.
- Tennessee State University's Business Incubation Center has launched numerous small businesses in Tennessee, including Christie Cookies, which now has national sales through its web-site and an eight-person sales force.
- The university offers a full range of bachelor's and master's degrees and awards doctoral degrees in six areas: biological sciences, computer information systems engineering, psychology, public administration, curriculum and instruction, and administration and supervision.
- Tennessee State University is home to two centers of excellence: the Center of Excellence for Research and Policy on Basic Skills and the Center of Excellence for Information Systems Engineering and Management. TSU is also home to the Samuel P. Massie Chair of Environmental Engineering, funded by the U.S. Department of Energy.
