Sat. 22 Sept 83 Sandhurst.

Set out from Hotel to find Sic Carus.
The only clue was Mr. Ammons's informer
about Dr. Atkins being a friend - found
a directory with name of Dr H L Atkinson
Trew St & got vague directions from
quadrille civil waiter, T M. & I went
Pottering up Trew St in the dark, peering
at door plates - At last when we thought
we had got far enough enquired at a
shop & found he were directed next door.
Met the doctor on point of going out &
introduced ourselves he directed us to house
& after some consideration remembered name of
person he lodges with Mrs Capper. After
further exploration & inquiries found the
place, & after a struggle with front gate
got in by side entrance. Sic Carus utterly
astonished to see us as if we had dropped from
clouds but greatly pleased to see us -

After talk she looks thin & short winded but
better than I expected. After talk in her
room went back to Hotel - & to bed No 13.

Monday No 12. Busy scene on Mall - Sat night
Sunday 23 Sept. After bkfst went for
a stroll with Mr. iron contains good
buildings, flat, & redeemed from utter
negligence by tree planting. Nearly every
street having a row of trees on each
side - grand - close spaces etc.
Art has done all it could to cure
disadvantages of site - the trees at
buildings in streets make it a

Necular country air, & make one
fancy you are in the Tropics -
Ran up River St - number of banks York
gold office to each - reached Six Carus
lodging at 11 & with her to Roseland
Park prettily laid out reserve, with
lake tennis & bowling courts, in lower
part fern tree bower with hundreds of
thousands of Gippsland ferns -
Swans on the lake & well laid out
flowerbeds - School (State) stands on
rise fronting lower reserve - fine two
story brick bldg on bluestone foundations
very handsome & with fire alarm bell
& balcony - abt 1100 children. Think
there are 2 other schools. High School
quaint one story tiled bldg adjoining
the day room & lovely - After dinner
at Hotel we three took a cab & drove
to Kangaroo Flat with an Irish driver
& a piebald horse. Country not interesting
but as far as Crusoe's Reserve off water
supply - back by a different road
passing number of mines with their
pocket heads & chimneys & heaps of
tailings - grey heaps - The Hustler
& Golden Cull reefs on which the
different claims extend in rows to
number of 10 or dozen or more perhaps
some very fine pocket heads & chimneys
shaft copied from Cleopatra's Needle
with an eye at the top - Had afternoon
tea on returning to hotel - then talk

Sunday, 23 Sept. Again after tea -
I went for a stroll by myself to other
side of town - past Town Hall into
Free Library & Reading Room, & into
Gallery of Theatre where Salvationists
Young was holding a most rowdy sort
of meeting. A vulgar excited man
roaring onstage & responses of hallelujah
etc. Returned to Hotel & took I Carus
home & said farewell to her. Coming
back to hotel two girls - children -
singing "Is the same old religion"
carrikens following singing in mockery
of their shrill young voices some vulgar
parody of which I caught the words
"And barnards will have bouquets -
by & by" - The movement seems to
develope rowdiness in - lovely day -
Monday. 24 Sept. Bright warm sunshine

Up before 6 - Caught train 6:45
Beautiful morning - as we passed
along line saw frequent old digging
yellow gravelly ground, burrowed
all over, little mounds & holes -
Country grew less flat, & more
pretty as we got towards Castlemaine
apparently good pastoral country
Castlemaine rather picturesque
in a little valley or hollow
reminded me a little of Agumbe

At Kepeler had some breakfast
the town rather pretty, all this
part seems agricultural & looks
prosperous & well farmed -
Sir McClarke's place Rupertwood
at Saubury extensive fine house
& grounds not unlike Monatale
in some respects. Arrived at
Spencer St 10:45. Went to Jennings
& Jennings rebound for advice.
Called at Pittons took him to
lunch at Cathedral Tavern, Scotland
St. Then to Jennings office &
to Master in Equity's office rebound.
To Sayce's to tea then walked over to
Mrs Arrowsmith's Albert Park & went
with them to Scots Church to meeting
to consider whether they should secede
from Presb. Ch. of Victoria - 300 or 400
perhaps more present. Very strong
feeling, vehement applause & intercessions
of dissentient speakers - Rob Morrison
showed great pluck & made unable
specter after disruption, but meeting
was evidently swayed by irritated feeling
rather than by argument. At last after
a rather stormy discussion they agreed
to adjourn till to-morrow evening.

Saw Harry home to Sayce's in bus then
walked in over Princes B - Strange to look
over bridge see great city trains & vehicles
down as it was solitude up to above

Tuesday 25 Sept. To breakfast to
Layce's & walked across flats to
Steamer Wharf & saw all port & lawn
off by Hinders - Joe & Mrs Clarke,
Miss Solly Jr. Met Leila Fysh then
went to Robertson's & looked over books
sold at great reduction, bought
Gardiner & Leeboken. To Waterhouse-
Chambers & to lunch with him &
Edmondson to Bourke St Coffee Pal
then called on Christie at Pk Asia
Elizabeth St - after having spent an hour
at Divorce Ct Bolam & Bolam
Cor. Stawell St & Highbottom & Barrett
Hobroyd Esq. I Stewart exam'd as
to Confessions of Webb most damaging
Webb - very ugly man, speaks in a
muttering way hardly opening his mouth
Purves - most flippan & offensive mode
of x x x Called at Scotch College
Left PPC card for McMillan & Ll note
Cent - Went out to Albert Park by
train but was driven out -
Met Mrs. A. Macmillan at
Scotch Church where we met many
Meeting very interested - O' Morroch
made strong talk speech agst
disruption in Scotland good &
Dr Robertson on same side - none
of the other speakers seemed to

grasp the subject, except Lorimer, Laube Smith, Agnew, Gule & others, personal & flippancy did not seem to appreciate gravity of step or issues involved - But anger well for movement, its ground being irritation, natural feeling against bigots of press of Melbourne, but no serious or decided principle - Motion for Bill to obtain power to sever passed by 200 or 300 to 12 or 20 - Saw Horrie Sayce & Mary to bus & then to Coffee Pal to bed.

Back to town with C Croby, called on W Blaauw & up to Education Office to see Bastow - To G Robertson's daughter Captain & Hilton - Called at Rev G Goodes 11 Spring St - talk about a service at Hyndland Ch - "tin kirk" - on confines of civilisation but rich country & very comfortable & contented life - & at last we discussed the Slavery question - Dined at Coffee Pal - & then made

on Herbert Chapman
& Sabelberg (re R + Jim Young)
also on Hawthorne. Henry
train to S. Yarra & had tea with
the Bastows - amongst other things
discussed the Sunday Sch Owy &
Pastor Lawrence & Starrett &
on way in called at Sayce's
& walked in with Mr Pege
of National Bank to Coffey &
wrote up journal -

Thursday 27 Sept Fine day. Went
out to Sayce's to breakfast & walked
in with Sayce - Called at Jennings
after packing box of books to go
by S Cross' direct on Monday -
called at Jennings - at Hawthorne's
chambers to say goodbye to Jim &
Young & Edmonson. Left PPC on
Jennings & on D'Bridge at Pub lib.
& looked up works on Canada.
Called at Jolly's & Pittow's but they
had gone to lunch, so hurried
at Gunner's & then called on Jolly
& Pittow & went out to St Kilda to
call on Mrs Ritchie at D' Mason's
Robt St. Found her better but still
looking ill. At Jennings bill found
Dr's Adm' not yet sealed
& went to Bank & arranged as to
transfer of shares etc. Then
met May at Cottes Pt place

met Mary at Coffee Palace
& called at Delinold's for estimate
for S Bank books for Campbell but
they declined except through trade -
Took bus to Mr Higgins Sydney Road
Royal Park they pressed us to stay
to dinner which we did. After
dinner I called on Mr Farland
Ormond College, & had talk with
him abt Scots Church secession
movement. We left Higgins
about 6th past 9 caught bus
& after calling at Coffee Pal
by bus to Sayces. Home to pack
wrote notes at Yorick Club to
Poynter, ~~Wth Higgins~~ & Mr Farland
on beginning to pack was greeted
by female voice from next room
"I wish there was a little less noise
there." - & after a while "Is that
noise to go on all night?" to
which I replied "I hope not." Then
she began trade agst putting her
in a room not fit for decent
people & whereupon I referred
her to the manager to sleep
at 7:30 -

Friday 28th Sept Up at 6:30
had bath & finished my
packing. Went to Sayces to

breakfast back said good bye to
Mary Horrie & Mennie Little
Hillie, then walked in with Sayer
Called at Collins St Baptist Chapel
to look at reversible seats for
Sunday School - Then Cab to
Jennings & Jennings left cheque
for balance & signed acceptance of shares
as advisor. Arranged as to couples
Posted PPC's Sci & Clarke, Irving,
Topp, Kruse, Rev C. Strong,

Called to say good bye to Robertson
& reached him at 5 min to 10.
Mother & Charlie Crook Jr. down to
say good bye - Left Warr a few
min after 10. nuisance of parcels
Crook sent about half a dozen
including samples of sugar.

Reached Williamstown at 11.
lovely day & calm as still found
young down the bay. Passes
Kayan & family - Ed Wilson.

F. Birchall. Ernest Nicholson
his brother - Both 89 with Carl
traveller named James Wilson.
Reached Queenscliff - 10.15.

In the Rep. 1.30 slipped on ice
Wet about tenage pass' abo
10 min. going thru - fresh break
key fine lay on deck reading

but had to return about 5.30 PM
when I retired to bed & after one
catastrophe went to sleep - had
some tea at tea time - & then slept
till 1.30 when sea quite smooth.
Reached Low Heads 5.45 - lovely
trips up Tamar - Reached Wang
shortly after Q - A.M. met Hannah
Giblin with Mrs Stewart -
called on Mrs Still who told me of
Cousin Dorothy's illness - (another
stroke of paralysis) on Brown (See)
CK Ellis - Ferguson -
Went to dinner to H Ritchie's
he drove me to train - Mary Solby
a passenger. Mr Rolphagen
got in at Etondale where
Bessie Gatenby was - Mr & Mrs

Dec. 17. Took 2 drams to Edmundson's
pharm of the virtues of Bromide of Sodium
as an absolute cure of sea sickness, I
determined to try it. Bought bottle at Pham
the taken in 1f. dra. doses (1tablespoonful)
Took one dose before tea & 1 before bed time

Dec 18. Took 2 hds. doses Bromide
in evening a 1 drachm dose. Had Jack
Smith up to tea, but went to Mr. Perkins
to learn myself whence there P. disc'd.
the N Coast road from Christchurch
advised me to take it - Connie
& Hamelby, Mrs. & Lily Barclay came
in - I called at the Campbells today
and they had supper.

Dec 19. Took 1 dr. dose of Bromide
after bkfst. Found it announced
to start at 12 instead of 4 - had
an awful scramble at office &
Took Jack with him into

Up to lunch - found all Clarkes
there - Steamer to start at 2 -
Left home at 2'5 calling at Bank
for draft treached Manarapa '5
min before she started. Lot of people
down say good bye Mary & Ida.

Our party consists of Lotta Macdonald
Poppy Clarke, Sarah ^{Lester Walker} & myself
Sarah's berth No^o 21. Nine 42 - Lester 40
Got off from wharf everyone alight.

Took another draught nose of Brimide
Dull day but calm - Sarah disappeared
soon after passing Betsy, Id. -

Poppy & Lotta M. before dinner -
Fortunately I thank to Brimide I was
quite well - Leslie & I with young
Watson of Livercappell went
down to dinner - Very good. Soup -
fresh Brumpler - Roast - Potol
Custard pudding, strawberries
rounding up with glass of sherry.
The Saloon very spacious X

Rows of tables very nicely fitted.
Cabins very nice. 3 in rows.
Leslie not so a. myself in lower berth
Man named Boyd in upper

Life belts under each pillow.

Nice wash hand basin.

Rack by bunk & Sluys for urinoid.
Two bath rooms next door.

Packed deck in evg went to bed
just before 11 as electric light
turned out. Soon went to sleep.

Sept. 20. 1900. Woke by steward
Coming with coffee feeling quite well
Up shortly after 8 - fine bath.
Had breakfast - 32 passengers out of 85
Sarah very unwell.

Poppy squamiculi Lotta in beentick.
Had long talk with Mr. Meredith Bill
especially re Smith v Smith Case.

Took off dredge & dredge of Pronade
about 12 - had gained 20 min.

1 P.M. Dredging since leaving 7260m. in 22 hrs.
32 p. played cards & read stories with
~~not~~ Chenevieux & Lawcruises very fine

2000 horse power burn 30 tons

Newcastle Coal p. do. He says
best ped. coal best steam & the
best mouth best gas coal.

Arrangements for passage very good. Cabin
passenger amidships & forward. Then saloon
for lounge room. Steerage & crew
right aft.

Course S by S. Weather overcast
with mod breeze from E & heavy
sea swell. About $\frac{1}{2}$ past 3 got
Poppy on deck for a walk towards
berm rug. Dinner at 6 abt
Same log. Stewardess came to me &
told me Sarah very ill & I could have
champagne wh I got. Had a cigar
& part of glass of sherry then had a
sudden exposure to cold & I suspended
my dinner. Came back to my cabin
my clothes didn't awake till after
light turned out about 11:20 cold &
shivering - undressed flurried air &
fell asleep.

Sund 21 Dec Woke after 6 with coffee
Morning overcast wind freshened &
increased. Stayed in bed to breakfast
also Boyd making top berth. Got
up berth 10th & 11. Took Poppy upon deck
283 miles run at noon
Cold unpleasant day - sea rather long
Sarah definitely ill - doctor who also
could not be prevailed to come on
deck - Usual routine until
dinner, they feed you well on these days
the aconite or poison all that we
evidently - lay it off hand &

after dinner I had some work
Sarah was still ill, very anxious about her
the stewardesses (our course) awfully good.
Monday 22 Dec - woke early - bally
breakfast soon after 10 sighted land
at Pussegger lighthouse

island ahead - run 302

Wind since yesterday - Pleasant
day much warmer & a little sun.
Wind fair & sea pretty smooth - hope
to get in to night before dark, as they
say they can't get into Port Harbour
in the dark, entrance too dangerous.

Soldader I on Starboard beam large
conical rock running along S. Coast
of NZ on port beam - fine views of snow
covered ranges bold & rugged - West Coast
ranges. The cone appears a great tangle
of mountain - further on the Takatimus

Passed Centre Island Lighthouse

Took Miss Ross on deck & had quite
a fit up with the old boat

This Mary Roberts
passed Heads at dinner - So wharf abt
7 in a pouring shower. Mr Macdonald
came on board - went up in special train
to Invercargill. Left traps at Albion
& drove out to the Macdonalds
about a mile to half out. Invercargill
rapidly improving town very flat
wooded to the ground buildings

at Whit Street Bee Street - New road.

Upper Street Lee Street - Mrs Mac.

Lotta - May. Tom + a younger one.

They were very anxious for me to stop a day but Leslie Walker insisted on our not losing a day - McDonald is very kind & good like very much. Said goodbye to poor Sam who looked like a ghost + to Abby + the rest. Tom McDonald came with us to Albion Hotel - he took a stroll in the town + turned in about 72 - Room 32.

Tuesday - 23 Dec. Albion 57.

Up 5:45

had breakfast + then took train 6:45 - train - lovely morning warm sunshine wide plains - granite now capped peaks + ranges to N orthward + the two snow to W. The N. lower range we saw yesterday - the plain rocky brown grass, with belts dark looking timber not unlike gum - but white + black pine + cedar - patches of cultivation + pretty little wooden homesteads - the distant hills beautiful soft shades of dark blue - the distant peaks + ranges quite alpine in appear. Some beautiful farms, + the grass magnificently green - Cropt only florishes high - sheep ^{n^o} flat carpet the - the rock.

vege. here & there bluish rocks showing up
everywhere. The other side steep rocky
going sheer down with bright green bushes
in clumps & patches between crags of
dark grey weather beaten limestone.

End of lake narrow more like river
water clear & bright - like @ Derwent at Hob.
St. Moritz never flies Kingston to Queenstown
had lunch on board great crush. Fairly
young Irish trailer - gave us little but
good nature. Croft salt meadowed all
the time. Highly chaffy grey limestone with
vein of quartz. sandy beach of coarse sand
of small white stones round margin of

After dinner for Kawarau Falls

In many parts of the lake terraces -
the flats I should have judged 2000 ft -
but the Capt said those we were
deposit was 6000 above the lake
with snow patches. & beyond Double
Cone 7688 over sea level - highest
point of Remarkables - the lake Capt.
is 4 miles wide but measuring about
2 miles, water dark blue, blackish
much deeper than Benwell like width
of lake takes off height of hill & the height
of mountain takes off width of lake -
Scenery so fair scale one can't appreciate
it fully. Occasional suggestion from
little cottages on bank, like small doll houses
At half way Bay a fine terrace & beautiful
little homestead with fine poplars & gums
just past this bay immense solid
pyramid of Bayonet peak - brownish
yellow on E side the hills grass
Covered & sloping on N side more greenish.

Devil's Staircase - bathwater

but many remarkable scenes
changes of these hills out of
site - most extraordinary bare
& rugged jagged rocks of most
wonderful shapes - Double cone &
the Mt. S. p. corner where Queenston
is a magnificent mass of rock
Queenston prettily set in a corner
of Bay just under Beaumont and
(two peaks) wooden houses - squeezed
in bet' n Mt. in Lake -
got to sharf at 3:15.

after dinner at Eichhardt's Hotel
went a walk to falls of Kawarau
outlet of lake falls into Molymore
or Clutha - beautiful walk along
the swollen lake bet' narrow
fine view of great mountains looking
back with sunset behind
falls the dark outline agst sky
the falls round head of lake a fine
rush of water. Magnificent clear
& glorious sparkling pools of foaming
crystal water - Croft L Walker
Mc Stewart & Maule $\frac{1}{4}$ mile north of Ireland
main & another group of lake about 5
miles - the remarkable grand in
the rugged splendour towering above
us - Good fun walking back
Grecian stories - 1.2.3 good night.
Black Rd. Nicaceous Schist

Wednesday, 24 Dec.

Halk up Queenstown Gorge in
pouring rain - fine effects on hills
olive & sea green went to back of
Beulomond - magnificent piles
of mtn & strata like stack of brick,
brown over - overshotover Bridge
Went along bed of shotover - digging
then along road to abt mile
past turn off to Skidders (new rd)
Magnificent views over Martin's
flats - terraces apparently
old river bed & beautiful
green fields with trees on
either side of wide valley -
back through gorge to Wakatipu
Lake with Mt Cecil in
background - had drink ale
at pub - young Irish girl -
heavy showers & home abt 3
hours gone over 7 miles there & have
return - Had lunch -
Then round reserve & cemetery
off by St. at half past 5 for head
of lake. Quite fine & beautiful
air - old Israel & the Crayshaws
The Titus getting finer & taller
we turned corner the sun peaks
with eight or nine but really

Humboldt range - nearly pure
white - afterwards when we're up
near River where no layed down
we saw the splendid Earuslaw
himself above perpetual snow.
& as we went up its beauty grew
on us. Before it all former
ights paled - 9,000 ft dwarfing
all others. Majestic snow peak
+ glacier - now snowed over.
the last peak sharp cut pyramid
lofty group as we passed Island
but terribly darkly with bush in tufts
Earuslaw to right dominating the
head of lake - on each side white
cones but Cosmos & Aspens! (or
Tiydale perhaps) flanked
on left with snowy peaks
of Humboldts & nearer on ea
side other peaks on ea side lake
high with snow patches &
lofty calm blue lake in front
& grand group in fine setting.
Reached Kukloch about 8³⁰

Set off - Stayed at house

Mr. & Mrs. Young Dunedin fellow & newly
married couple from Dunedin -

2 or 3 houses comfortable enough.
In sophisticated people. Wande
