Dear Dad

Thanks for your kind letter. I should have written to you before receiving it only there is no change in the monotony of existence in Launceston or in the color of my prospects to record. I have a letter from Joe a fortnight back written in his best style and giving me the impression that he is going along as well as all could wish though he lingers sometimes with a pallid note on his absent friends in Tasmania. I have followed pretty closely the movements of the Association lately and though I will at once admit that

that the campaign has been skilfully
planned and the work energetically
carried out I am not hopeful
that you will get all you want
from Parliament. Still you
may get in effect what you are
aiming at in some modification
of your proposals. Now that it
has been fairly ventilated, so far
as the public is concerned, and
without fearing that most or all may
be interested created to a state in
warmth I think that as Parliament
will shortly assemble you should
endeavour to get a small party
of members to take the matter up
and arrange some proposals
for submission to the Legislature

the paper could, by telegraphing

in Tasmania - something other than
a reprint of the morning papers
in a condensed form

me together with many are the only
pictures in my little cell when
I "Keeps o' nights"

Hope to be down for a day early
in July when I will see the boys
once more.

I have very little to do here and
frequently get miserable through
theor idleness or the wretchedly
unimportant character of the
work I have to turn to. An occasional
run into the surrounding country
districts is the only break in
dull routine.
