






All things considered, do you think that you are (or will be) better or worse off Percent Responding "Better Off" or "Much Better Off"




Reported Level of Satisfaction with Social Services in Community: 1996 - 2019


Percent Indicating "Satisfied" or "Very Satisfied"






How Internet Service Limits Ability to Stream Online Video Content by Community Size, 2018

In order to get ahead in life these days, it's necessary for a person to get a college education


Getting a college education today is more important than it was 10 yrs ago

Increasing the number of people who get college degrees is necessary to build a strong economy


I am confident that having a bachelor's degree can lead to a good job
