Abstract


The [formylpeptide receptors](#) (nomenclature agreed by the [NC-IUPHAR Subcommittee on the formylpeptide receptor family \[185\]](#)) respond to exogenous ligands such as the bacterial product [fMet-Leu-Phe](#) (fMLP) and endogenous ligands such as [annexin I](#), [cathepsin G](#), amyloid β 42, serum amyloid A and [spinorphin](#), derived from [\$\beta\$ -haemoglobin](#).

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
