



Prof Miriam Langer

Chair of the New Mexico Highlands University (NMHU) Department of Media Arts & Technology, and director of the Center for Cultural Technology (CTC). The CTC is a partnership between NMHU and the New Mexico Department of Cultural Affairs, and a pioneer in the emerging field of Cultural Technology at the nexus of computer networks, digital technologies, cultural content and community. Prof Langer is the founder and director of the Cultural Technology Development Lab, an R&D program designing open source hardware solutions for museum clients.

Katherine Hebert

Chief Curator at the American Museum. Her responsibilities include the care and presentation of the collection of American decorative arts within a grade-1 listed building. Simon's current work focuses on visual impairment and visual culture, accessible and inclusive technology, disability arts, and access to cultural heritage.

Brainstorming sessions

1st Brainstorming

The American Museum is facing 3 key challenges related to the use of digital technologies.

Participants will be divided into large groups based on their skills and research field. Each group will brainstorm solutions.

3 artefacts from the American Museum will be provided to stimulate brainstorming.

2nd Brainstorming

Participants will select 1 specific challenge they are interested in.

Based on their choice, participants will be divided into smaller groups.

Each group will devise one or more solutions for a specific challenge.

At the end of the event, groups will present their ideas to the staff of the American Museum.

Artefacts



Bulto entitled 'San Miguel Arcángel', 1840

Carved figure of San Miguel with scales (to weigh the good and the evil in souls) in the left hand (replacement) and the right hand raised to hold sword (missing). Patron saint of soldiers and small children. Feast day May 8th/September 29th



Retablos (panel paintings) entitled 'San Ramon Nónato', 1840/50

The bearded saint stands wearing a red cloak over a bishop's robe. Upraised monstrance in the right hand and shaft in the left. Patron saint of pregnant women. He is prayed to for 9 days before the delivery in New Mexico. Feast day August 31st.



Nuestra Señora del Rosario (Our Lady of the Rosary), 1830/40

This large bulto was probably made for use by the Penitente Brotherhood. The hollow skirt made the figure much lighter, making it easier to carry in the Holy Week processions. She helps families accept the death of a member of the family, and helps prevent danger and accidents. Feast day October 7th
