- Challenges to shift from the Open Access to the Open Sciences.

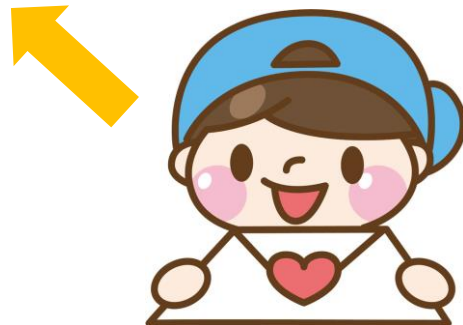
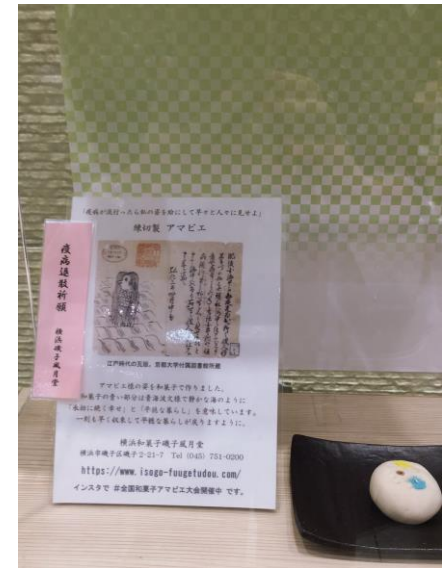

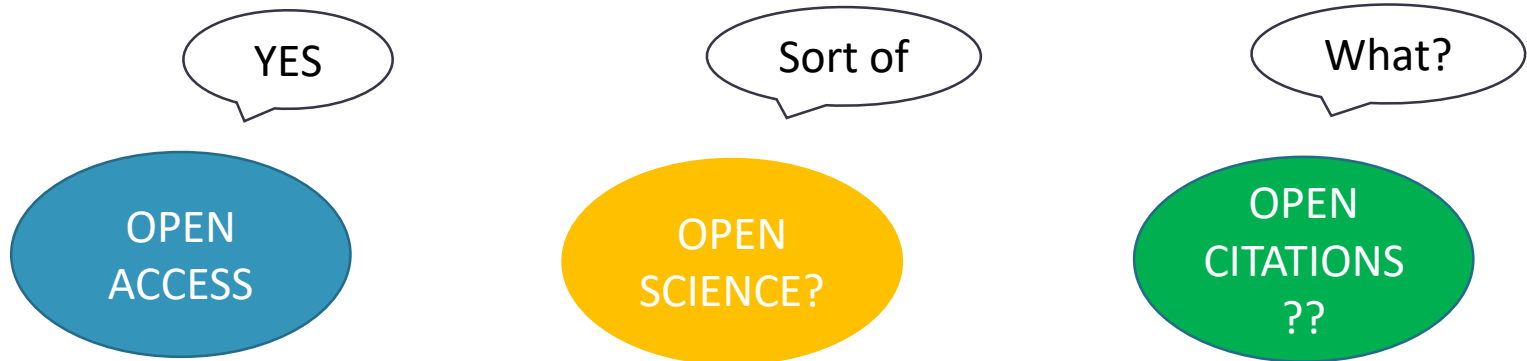
Purpose of This Panel

- Discuss the challenges in promotion of Open Sciences in Asian Studies through the sharing of current practices.

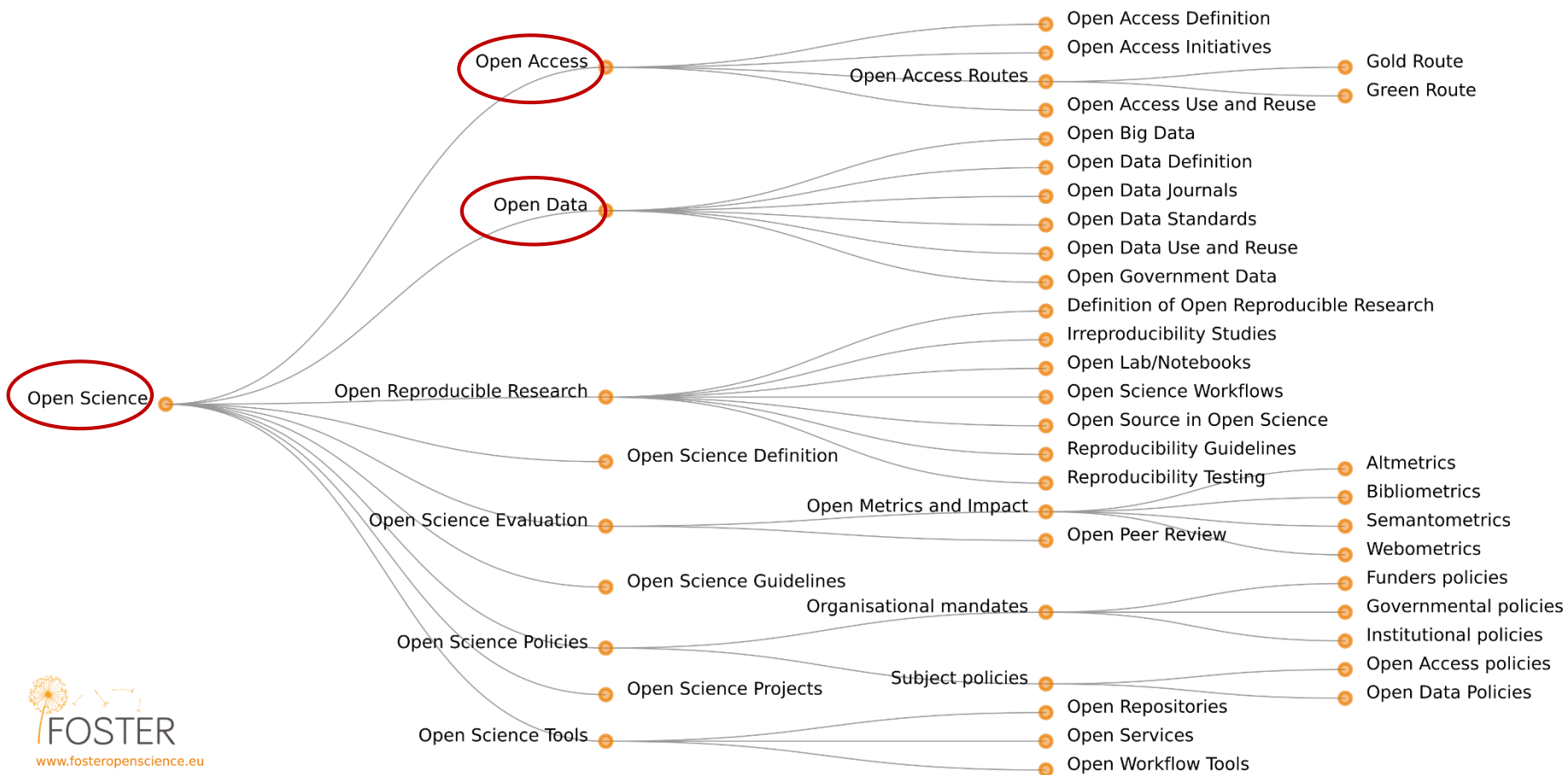
