IN MEMORIAM

William Valentine Tarlton was born February 3, 1909, Marsdenville, North Carolina, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Tarlton. Educated in Wingsite High School, Wake Forest University, and Southern Seminary.

He was married first to Letitia Dale Carter. God blessed them with three children: Ruth-Jeanet, Edwin Carroll, and Mary Elizabeth.

After the death of his wife, he later married his deceased brother's wife, Effie Dancy Tarlton.

He served six churches as pastor: Rich Square, Woodland, and Mt. Tabor all of Eastern North Carolina. Also Cliffside Baptist Church of Cliffside, McCall Avenue of Concord and Zion Baptist Church in our association. He was Pastor Emeritus of Zion for ten years.

He was Trustee of Gardner-Webb College, and also served as Trustee of Wingsite College.

On November 20, 1960, he received a message in the night that his daughter, Libby, wife of Missionary George Senter, Missionaries to Liberia, and his beautiful ten year old granddaughter, Rachel, had been brutally murdered by one of the natives. No one who knew him will ever forget how he and his beloved wife, Effie, proved the power of God over suffering and sorrow.

History Of Elizabeth Baptist Church

Elizabeth Baptist began as a dream placed in the heart of Elizabeth Lee Wilson in the late 1800's. According to reliable sources, this saint of God would bring her cow to graze upon the grassy field where the church now stands. As the cow grazed, Elizabeth prayed, often with another early saint of the congregation, Mary Jane Borders Maxey. As the two women sat they saw more than a cow grazing. They saw a church combining the evil influence of a nearby liquor still and providing a place of worship closer than the seven to fifteen miles people were traveling one way over rough roads at that time.

Early in 1883 God sent C.F. Felton to lead the people of this community in a branch arbor revival. During this revival or shortly thereafter, a Sunday School was organized. In September of the same year, the congregation petitioned for membership and was accepted into the Kings Mountain Baptist Association as a new church.

The first building was constructed in 1884. Another building constructed in 1840 with a seating capacity of 500 was struck by fire in December 1954. The only remains was burned and weaned brick. But out of the ashes, a spirit arose which stood against all odds. Elizabeth Baptist Church, using the facilities of nearby Elizabeth School, continued to minister, to sacrifice, and to pray. Eight hundred and two days later on Sunday, February 24, 1957, they entered what the Herald Recorder referred to as "one of the most attractive churches in the state and beyond."

Under the leadership of our Lord, we have continued in the heritage left to us by our spiritual forefathers. Through prayer and sacrificial giving of time, talent, and money, our church is affecting lives from Cleveland County to the ends of the earth.

Rev. Jeff Stenslie serves as pastor, Mr. Mike McCoy as Minister of Music and Mr. Joe Collins as Minister of Education. The current membership is 1,086.



History Of Pleasant Grove Baptist Church

In the summer of 1877 a brush arbor revival was held in the community. From this meeting a very definite need for a church in the community was felt by the laymen and women, who called a presbytery of pastors and leaders from surrounding churches. Fifty-two came from New Berlin Baptist and forty-seven from New Prospect Baptist Church. On October 11, 1878 a church was constituted.

After the church was organized, Allen Hayrick donated four and three-fourths acres of land and other members gave lumber and many hours of labor. The new building was dedicated to the service of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. The church was named Pleasant Grove because of its location in a grove of trees.

The first pastor, Rev. J.P. Steyer was called in 1878. A Sunday school was organized in 1879 and the church was admitted to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association in 1880. Nine men from Pleasant Grove have answered the call to go into full-time ministry. Because of the dedication of it's pastors and laymen of the past, the church has made significant advances and the cause of Christ enhanced greatly.

Rev. Charles J. Tindin, our pastor of four years was appointed on October 9, 1990 as a missionary to Germany. He is to serve as a general evangelist and church planter. His wife, Teresa, will support him through church and home ministries.

Current membership is 377.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a District Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this body shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, this association of churches seeks to further the Kingdom through the following:

- (1) the fostering of fellowship and cooperation among the member churches;
- (2) the ministering of spiritual and physical needs of people;
- (3) the giving and receiving of instruction, assistance and training for member churches;
- (4) the cooperation with North Carolina Baptist State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee. Application should include:

1. Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that seventy-five percent (75%) of those voting express their intent to cooperate.
2. A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
3. A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
4. A willingness to meet with Membership Committee to discuss other items of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist belief and practice and what it means to cooperate with the churches in the Association in a world-wide reunion program. If recommended by this committee and accepted by the Association, a mission or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of one (1) year. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at its annual meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its constitution and by-laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and if requested, the Associational Executive Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like associations.

ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Monday and Tuesday after the fourth Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or Executive Board, provided two (2) weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall give annually, in addition to the pastor, ten (10) messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty (50) members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three (3) nor more than ten (10) messengers. ALONG WITH ALL ASSOCIATIONAL OFFICERS, these shall constitute the voting body of the

Association. The names of the messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

ARTICLE V AUTHORITY

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this Constitution in Article III, Sections 2 and 3.

ARTICLE VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTORS

Section 1: The officers of the association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Ecumenical Director, Women's Missionary Union Director, Director of Media Services, Parliamentarian, and Administrative Coordinator.

Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee. The floor will then be open for additional nominations. This election will occur on the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

Section 3: The newly-elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer shall assume at the close of the annual session all duties incumbent upon them relating to work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on October 1.

Section 4: Any person having served two (2) terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election for two years.

ARTICLE VII TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three (3) Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three (3) years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one (1) new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one (1) year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

ARTICLE VIII THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of all Associational officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Association Director of Missouri, the Church & Community Developmental Director *in-officio* without voting privileges, each acting pastor, two (2) members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairman of all standing committees of the Association. The Associational Executive Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. Associational Executive Board members are the connecting link between the Association and the churches. Executive Board members should represent the churches to the Association. Executive Board members should act as representatives for the Association to the churches. It is the responsibility of the Executive Board members to promote the programs, represent the needs and report to the churches concerning the work and ministry of the Association. Executive Board members should seek acceptable means of representing the Association to their respective fellowships. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its Annual Meeting.

The quarterly meetings will be in January, April and July, on Monday after the third Sunday.

ARTICLE II COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting:

A. To be constituted by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the Annual Meeting:

1. Order of Business and Program Committee (By-Law IV, Section D)
2. Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
3. Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
4. Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
5. Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
6. Nominating Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
7. Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
8. Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
9. Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
10. Institutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
11. Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
12. Seminary Relations Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
13. Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
14. Church & Community Development Committee (By-Law IV, Section 14)
15. The Family Ministry Committee (By-Law IV, Section 15)
16. Missions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16)
17. Recreation and Leisure Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
18. Sunday Morning Committee (By-Law IV, Section 18)
19. Memorials Committee (By-Law IV, Section 19)
20. Youth for Christ (By-Law IV, Section 20)
21. Music Committee (By-Law IV, Section 21)
22. Church Survey and Relations Committee (By-Law IV, Section 22)
23. Any other committee authorized by the association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting: Committee on Committees (By-Law IV, Section 14).

Section 2: The following committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Meeting to serve during the Annual Meeting: Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16).

ARTICLE III AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any Annual Session of the Association, upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association on the first day and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association on the last day. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be referred to the Constitution Committee.

BY-LAWS

By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

By-Law II ASSOCIATION YEAR

The Association Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committee on Committees and Committee

an Ex-officio. He shall be the Chairman of the Associational Executive Board and be an ex-officio (without voting) privileged member of all other committees. Upon completion of his term of office, the Moderator shall become a member-at-large for the two (2) years of the Mission Committee, Executive Committee and Executive Board.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's Annual Meeting, distribute at the Annual Meeting copies of the Digest of these reports, and make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of Minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the Executive Board. He shall inform all members elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Board, or as designated in the budget; the money to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Board or the Association by annual meeting under an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and financial status at the Annual Meeting and give a report at each quarterly Executive Board meeting and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Associational Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and make a written report to each Annual Meeting of the Association.

Section 6: The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Sunday School Department. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this committee that would promote this work.

The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:

1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
2. Interpret the Sunday School Program.
3. Train Sunday School leaders.
4. Consult with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.

Section 7: The Church Training Department shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Church Training Department. This officer shall attend Executive Committee meetings, maintain the ongoing work of this department at all times, and give an annual report to the Association.

Section 8: The Men's Director shall provide leadership for the Association in session and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall encourage manly growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

Section 9: The Brotherhood Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of men and boys in the churches. The officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.

Section 10: The Women's Missionary Union Director works on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Director of Missions through the W.M.U. Councils along with our associational W.M.U. officers and assists them in their work. He leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of their church W.M.U.s to have fellowship and receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission tasks, leads in interpreting

the WMO program to church leaders, leads to training church WMO workers and members, cooperates with church leaders concerning initiation of WMO work and the improvement of existing work, provides at and plans for associational meeting, leads in associational WMO annual planning, leads in determining mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done, and reports progress of WMO work to the Association and serves as contact between the Association and state WMO.

Section 11: The Director of Media Services shall promote the beginning and maintenance of church Ministries in the churches; provide training opportunities for church Ministers, students and develop the association library; attend Executive Committee meetings; cooperate with the Director of Missions and make an annual report to the Association at its annual session.

Section 12: The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, serve as chairman of Youth for Christ Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Section 13: The Parliamentarian shall, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the sessions. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

Section 14: The Audiovisual Coordinator shall assist all associational leadership in selection, production and use of audiovisual material. Upon request, he shall provide similar assistance to individual church leaders. He shall provide opportunities for training in the production and use of audiovisuals in education, motivation and worship. The Audiovisual Coordinator shall work with the Director in storing, maintaining and promoting the use of audiovisual materials equipment. Maintenance of audiovisual equipment is the responsibility of the Audiovisual Coordinator.

Section 15: Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Executive Board, except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1: THE OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Music Director, and three (3) other members. It shall rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the host church being determined by the group. It shall recommend the procedure and the address for the annual session. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty (30) days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the Annual Meeting through the various news media.

Section 2: THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

1. Shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Music Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMO Director, President of the Pastor's Conference, Audiovisual Coordinator, and representatives of the following committees: Church and Community Development Committee, Nominating Committee, Committee on Churches, Christian Life Committee, Membership Committee, Planning Committee, Evangelism Committee, Strategy Planning Committee, and Baptist Youth for Christ Committee.

2. When without a Director of Missions, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Director of Missions and recommend such person to the Executive Committee, in decision according to By-Law VI.

3. It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or Executive Board and act on routine or emergency matters concerning business management, approval

employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a special meeting (if necessary) to treatment business.

Section 3. THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, shall promote work of evangelists in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelists. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its Executive Board.

Section 4. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, one (1) rotating annually with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

THE FINANCE COMMITTEE may make adjustments during the year in line items or through the assignment of miscellaneous funds in Section VII of the budget providing the adjustments:

1. -- will not increase the total budget.
2. -- will not alter the basic purpose or intent of the budget.
3. -- will have full consent of those affected individuals, department leaders, etc.)
4. -- will not exceed a total of \$5,000 during a fiscal year.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship program offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

A contingency fund is to be established and maintained in the approximate amount of one (1) calendar quarter of the Association's operating budget. This contingency fund is to be deposited in an interest bearing account.

The funds to be disbursed should a shortfall of general funds receipts occur, resulting in a lack of funds for regular operating expense.

Any disbursements of funds from the contingency fund must be upon the recommendation of the Clerk/Treasurer, approved by the chairman of the Finance Committee and the Chairman of the Executive Committee and is limited to budgeted items for operations where current funds for such budgeted items have been depleted.

Section 5. THE CANDIDATE COMMITTEE, composed of five (5) members, with the pastor of the home church (the church of which the candidate is a member, the Director of Missions, and deacons of the home and receiving churches, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and certification of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of the Minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the home church voted to request examination of the candidate.

The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

The chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place, and procedure.

The Committee suggests that the candidate be questioned at least two (2) weeks prior to his ordination.

The committee shall question the candidate about his convictions, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.

The candidate should be free to seek advice from the Committee regarding aspects of the ministry.

In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scriptures, especially I Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9.

The Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The Chairman shall report the Committee's activities to the Executive Board quarterly and provide a written report for the Annual Meeting.

Section 6. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, shall contact and nominate the officers of the Association according to Article VI of the Constitution. This committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WMO and Brotherhood organizations), recommend members for these various departments. The officers and members of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organizing themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). They shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. The committee shall also assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 7. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE, composed of three (3) members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and make recommendations as needed.

Section 8. THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE, composed of five (5) members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws. The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist faith and practice and what it needs to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches and missions under the jurisdiction of the Association and may present them for membership within the Association or that they continue under the subtitle.

Section 9. THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMO Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an associational calendar for the coming year and present same to the ANNUAL MEETING OF MEMBERSHIP.

Section 10. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE composed of three (3) members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation, praise and promote the work of the Committee in an annual planning meeting, and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches where there are events worthy of commendation. DEDICATE THE ANNUAL MINUTES TO A DENIGNING PERSON.

Section 11. THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and six (6) other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Association Meeting.

Section 12. THE SEMINARY EXTENSION COMMITTEE, composed of three (3) members, shall publicize study courses and programs that are available and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension studies as they may be desired.

Section 13. THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, will give continual attention to the moral climate of the community and shall initiate necessary actions to maintain and improve the climate. The committee shall encourage corporations and institutions that uphold Christian values, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness.

Section 14. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, composed of five (5) members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies on all standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the Chairmen of each committee.

Section 15. THE TELEPHONE CONTACT COMMITTEE shall be composed of one (1) person from each group of churches in the Association (6). These committee members shall relay messages to pastors and key leaders during the year. All messages to be sent should be cleared with the Director of Missions.

Section 16. THE ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the missionaries. A total enrollment shall be made for each day.

Section 17. THE CHURCH & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE:

A. Purpose - The purpose of the Church & Community Development Committee shall be to work with the CCM Director to lead the Association to address the priority ministry needs in Cleveland County, and to plan and coordinate programs of ministry to share Christ's love in meeting the spiritual, educational, emotional, and physical needs.

B. Organization - The Church & Community Development Committee shall be composed of the chairpersons of the component sub-committees. Resource personnel will be the WML Director and/or the Mission Action Director of the WML, Brotherhood Director and/or the Baptist Men's Director. The CCM Director will serve as chairman of the committee. Emergency Ministry needs not addressed in the constitution will be met at the discretion of the CCM Director after consultation with the Director of Ministries.

C. SUB-COMMITTEES:

1. PRISON MINISTRIES - The Prison Ministries shall be composed of at least three (3) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries in our local prison camp.

2. JAIL MINISTRIES - The Jail Ministries shall be composed of at least three (3) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries in our local jail.

3. Migrant Ministries - The Migrant Ministries shall be composed of at least three (3) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries among the migrant farm workers.

4. JUVENILE COURT MINISTRIES - The Juvenile Court Ministries shall be composed of at least three (3) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries to the Juvenile Court personnel and clientele.

5. LITERACY MINISTRIES - The Literacy Ministries shall be composed of at least three (3) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the slow readers, non-readers and non-English speaking persons in developing and improving reading skills.

6. EMERGENCY RELIEF MINISTRIES - The Emergency Relief Ministries shall be composed of at least six (6) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the economically disadvantaged persons of Cleveland County.

7. DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITY MINISTRIES - The Developmental Disability Ministries shall be composed of at least three (3) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the Developmental Disabled persons of Cleveland County and to their families.

8. VISUALLY HANDICAPPED MINISTRIES - The Visually Handicapped Ministries shall be composed of at least three (3) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the Visually Handicapped persons of Cleveland County and to their families.

9. CHRISTMAS TREE SERVICE - The Christmas Tree Service Ministry shall be composed of at least six (6) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministry to parents of needy children during the Christmas season.

10. SUBSTANCE ABUSE MINISTRY - The Substance Abuse Ministry shall be composed of at least three (3) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to address the needs of those affected with substance abuse problems and their families.

The personnel of the sub-committees shall provide assistance to churches through their missionary education opportunities in the development of ministries to those included in the job description written above, and to encourage participation by the churches in ministry conducted on the associational level.

11. MEETING - The personnel of the sub-committees will meet as needed to develop the programs of ministry. The Christmas Ministry Development Committee shall meet annually for their planning and training.

Section 18: **THE FAMILY MINISTRY COMMITTEE**, composed of the chairpersons and one (1) person from each group of churches, shall work in creating an awareness of the need for our churches to establish ministries to Families, Young Adults, and Single Adults. It will be their task to identify and prioritize needs, resources, and opportunities for family ministry. It will also be their task to provide family ministry resources and services to churches and provide training for family ministry workers.

Section 19: **THE MINISTRIES COMMITTEE** shall be made up of the following members: Chairman (Vice-Moderator), the Director of Missions, Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Finance Committee Chairman, Chairperson of Church & Community Development Committee, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, W.M. Director, Music Director, President of the Pastors' Conference, and Associational Coordinator.

This Committee is to be available as a sounding board, to support the Director of Missions as a person (as well as an office) in the Association, provide feedback concerning Associational programs and activities, conveying suggestions from the Association and offering support in projecting programs to the Executive Committee and/or Executive Board. The Missions Committee shall work to determine areas of needs within and without the Association and formulate recommendations to the Associational Executive Committee.

The Committee shall enthusiastically explore all mission possibilities throughout the Association, emphasizing the need for new teaching units, preaching points, ministries, and churches, and it shall actively seek out potential sponsoring churches for the beginning of specific mission endeavors. Providing strategic outreach leadership for the Association shall be the Committee's highest priority.

Section 20: **THE RECREATION AND DRAMA COMMITTEE** shall present a program of Christian recreation and drama in the churches. The Committee shall regard recreation and drama as a means, not an end. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall use their programs as a way to teach, a means of witnessing and an avenue of expressing the abundant Christian life. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall be responsible to give assistance to any church that should request help in the area of recreation and drama. The Committee's responsibilities shall include friendships, Service Adults, interns, crafts, drama workshops and other assignments of the Association, if asked. The Chairmen of the Recreation and Drama Committee shall plan with the Director of Missions and give a report of the committee's activities at the Executive Board quarterly meetings.

Section 21: **THE STRATEGY PLANNING COMMITTEE**, composed of the 20 members, shall work to understand the 'Priority Statements' of the Association; provide support and suggestions to the appropriate executives for implementation; and trumpet personally and publicly the committees that address themselves to, and make significant accomplishments in achieving the 'Priority Statements.' At a time it judges appropriate, the Committee will also suggest to the Association the need for further strategy planning.

Section 22: **YOUTH FOR CHRIST COMMITTEE**, composed of a chairperson and six (6) members, shall be responsible for promoting and coordinating the following activities:

1. Youth Council Sessions.
2. Quarterly sessions of Youth for Christ in local churches.
3. A Home Council for Christ every 3 to 5 years.
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS.
5. Serve as a support group to the Associational Pastors/Youth Worker.
6. Any other activity which the Director of Missions and/or Executive Committee deems necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

Section 23: **MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE**, composed of three (3) members will be responsible for:

1. Reassigning dismissed ministers, staff, deacons and members to an appropriate way.
2. Submitting report for inclusion to Associational Minutes.
3. Ministering to the families of associational officers, ministers and staff members when death occurs.

Section 24. DISTRICT MINISTERS COMMITTEE

The District Ministers Committee shall be composed of six (6) ministers and/or staff persons in the Association with two (2) rotating off each year.

It shall be the duty of this committee to work with the Director of Ministries in planning and promoting/renewing educational opportunities for ministers and staff persons in the Association.

Section 25. CHURCH SURVEY AND EXTENSION COMMITTEE

The Church Survey and Extension Committee shall be composed of six (6) ministers and shall encourage the Association to respond to the need for new churches and the development of young congregations. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to keep abreast of the growth and development of the territories within the Association and encourage the appropriate response.

Section 26. Members of all these committees, except the CHURCH & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE and those appointed by the moderators, shall be elected to serve not more than three (3) years on a rotating basis.

By-Law V TRUSTEES

The duty of the Trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its Executive Board.

By-Law VI DIRECTOR OF MINISTRIES

When without a Director of Ministries, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Director of Ministries and recommend such person to the Executive Committee. His selection shall be upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and his vote by the Association at its Annual Meeting, or between members of the Association, by its Executive Board. His term of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a voting and advisory capacity. His duties will be in accordance with the job description of the title of his call.

By-Law VII CHURCH COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR

Section 1. Employment - The Director of CCM shall be jointly employed by the Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Home Mission Board. The employee should be elected to work until the sponsoring groups mutually agree to cease the tenure of service or the employee resigns. The CCM Director shall work under the supervision of the Director of Ministries and in compliance with the Job Description provided by the State and Association.

Section 2. Basic Function - The basic functions are to work with the CCM Committee to organize, supervise and promote a program of activities to meet the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs of the people within the geographical boundaries of the Association.

Section 3. The CCM Director shall be an ex-officio member of the Associational Executive Board, Associational Executive Committee and Ministries Committee without voting privileges.

Section 4. When without a Church & Community Development Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Church & Community Development Director according to By-Law VII, Sections 1 & 2.

By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS

* Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the Annual Meeting by a majority of the members present and voting.

By-Law IX DEBATE PROCEEDURE

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six (6) Association Groups as follows: Polkville, Lattimore, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Green, and Ware.

PROCEEDINGS
Monday Evening
October 29, 1960

1. As messengers and visitors gathered at Pleasant Grove Baptist Church, special music was presented by a choir composed of Kings Mountain Baptist Association Ministers of Music under the direction of Mrs. Beth Heffner, Minister of Music, Dover Baptist Church and outgoing Associational Music Director. The group was accompanied by Mrs. Joseph Tillman, Dover Church, on the piano and Rev. Charles Bonard, Minister of Music, Boiling Springs Church, on the organ.
2. Mrs. Beth Heffner introduced Mr. Mark Cabaniss, president of Design Music Group Publishing Company of Nashville, Tennessee. He led the Associational Ministers of Music Choir in presenting the premiere anthem, "Come, Sing A New Song of Love."
3. Mrs. Beth Heffner led the congregation in singing, "Churches in Association," for the opening hymn of praise. The lyrics were written by Ernie Hamrick. Mr. Hamrick grew up in Mt. Zion Baptist Church here in Cleveland County.
4. Moderator Joe Cabaniss expressed appreciation to all the musicians and to Mrs. Beth Heffner and Mr. Mark Cabaniss for the beautiful opening music.
5. Moderator Joe Cabaniss introduced himself and called the 140th annual session to order.
6. Rev. Brian Johnson, pastor of Double Shoals Baptist Church, read scripture from James 1:19-27. Rev. Ray Lamb, pastor of Bethel Baptist Church, led the opening prayer.
7. Moderator Joe Cabaniss recognized host pastor, Rev. Richard Leach, who extended a welcome to the association from Pleasant Grove Church.
8. Rev. Dan Williams, pastor of Calvary Church and chairman of the Order of Business Committee, recognized members of his committee. He moved the printed program for the 140th annual session be accepted as printed. The motion was seconded by Carlos Young and was approved.

10. Rev. Clive Borders extended congratulations to Mrs. Beth Heffner, associational music director, for achieving the Standard of Excellence in the associational music program the second year in a row. A framed certificate was presented to be placed in the associational office.
11. Mr. Cabaniss called for attendance cards to be collected at this time.
12. Mr. Cabaniss introduced Dr. Chris White, president of Gardner-Webb College. He extended greetings from the college stating they are proud to have the largest number of interdenominational students of any Baptist college in North Carolina. He expressed appreciation for prayers, students sent their way, and monetary support. He encouraged the association to let Gardner-Webb and it's students help the churches. President White expressed appreciation to Kings Mountain Baptist Association as being the founder of the college.

13. Mr. Cabaniss introduced Mrs. Charlotte Smith, representative of the Homes for the Aging, Mrs. Smith and her husband, Secretary of Shelby and members of First Baptist Church, Shelby, now reside in one of our four Baptist homes to the state. She thanked our churches for their prayers, gifts and shared information about each home. Robert Stewart, director of Church Programs, Baptist State Convention, was recognized as a visitor.
14. Rev. Alton Martin, pastor of Pulaski Church, and chairman of Evangelism Committee, gave the Evangelism Committee report. He recognized the Here's Hope Steering Committee who served throughout our Here's Hope 1980 Harvest.
15. A warm welcome was extended to our new ministers and staff persons within the association by our Director of Missions, Cleo Borders. Those included: Rev. Brian Johnson, pastor of Double Shoals; Rev. Ray Lantz, pastor of Bethel and wife, Judy; Rev. David Holbeck, pastor of Macomb; Rev. Ervin Price, pastor of Mill's Memorial and wife, Marilee; Rev. Larry Dorris, pastor of Faith and wife, Paulette; Rev. Curtis Styles, pastor of Caesar and wife, Sue; Rev. Jerry Wicks, pastor of Carpenter's Grove; and Rev. Chris McSwain, pastor of Pleasant Hill and wife, Maureen.
16. Rev. Cleo Borders relinquished his regular report here in order to present an introduction to the Strategy Planning Report and how the procedure developed. He introduced Dr. Jim Richardson, pastor of Poplar Springs Church and chairman of the Strategy Planning Committee, to present further information on the report.
17. Dr. Richardson stated this is the third time during the tenure of Cleo Borders that our association has conducted Strategy Long Range Planning. He read the motion approved at the 1979 annual meeting to initiate the Strategy Planning process and gave a step-by-step procedure of what the committee had done since that time. He briefly went over each objective. He encouraged messengers to read the reports prior to the next session tomorrow in order to be able to vote on whether to accept the report. He expressed thanks to those who had a part in the making of this process.
18. Mr. Jimmy Greene, Clerk/Treasurer, gave the attendance report. He reported 269 messengers, 65 non-messengers, and 10 visitors for a total of 344 in attendance.
19. Miss Susan Wilson, Minister of Music at Eastwick, Shelby, led the congregation in singing, "Holy! Holy! Holy!"
20. Moderator Joe Cabaniss recognized Mr. A.S. Davidson, layman from Zoot Church, who gave a special report on the Jail Ministry. He thanked the twenty-eight churches who participated in this ministry during the past year. He encouraged others to become involved in this ministry and thanked Carlos Young and Judy Allen for their contributions to the committee.
21. Moderator Joe Cabaniss introduced the newest member of the Kings Mountain Association's Staff, Rev. Charles Reed, Church and Community Ministries Director. Rev. Reed took a moment to express his joy of being on board here in our association. He encouraged churches to support the upcoming Christmas Toy Store by donating toys and by volunteering to assist in the store.

22. Dr. Donally Corbin, pastor of Boiling Springs, and chairman of the Advisory Commission, presented a report from his commission. He also made a recommendation that the association support the idea of nurturing churches, serving in black communities, to pray for the success of these works, and contribute financial resources toward partial support to the work. Rev. Jeff Braxton moved to adopt the recommendation, seconded by Dr. Jim Strickland and carried.
23. "I Know Where I Have Belonged," our special music for the evening, was presented by Mrs. Beth Hellner.
24. Moderator Joe Cabarrus expressed appreciation for the good music.
25. Due to the interests of the hour, Mr. Cabarrus chose not to present his message. He had planned to speak about the function of the association and the role of a director of missions. He took a few minutes to thank the association for allowing him to serve as moderator. He considers it an honor to be able to serve and stated the association is very important to him. He has served as an officer for twenty-two years along with Directors of Missions Rev. C.O. Greene and Rev. Clay Borders.
26. Rev. Jim Strickland, pastor of Westview, requested that the report of our moderator be put in printed form.
27. Rev. John Bridges, pastor of First Baptist, Grover, pronounced the benediction.

28. Messengers and visitors gathered at 2:45 p.m. at Elizabeth Church for the second session of our annual meeting. Mrs. Beth Hellner welcomed everyone and introduced our new associational Minister of Music, Mr. Charles Board, who is also Minister of Music at Boiling Springs Church. Mr. Board presented a mini-concert on the piano.
29. Mrs. Evelyn Bridges, Minister of Music at Second Church, Kings Mountain, led the congregation in singing "Praise Him Praise Him" accompanied by Charles Board on the piano.
30. Scripture was read from Joshua 1: 8-9 by James Dyer, Minister of Music and Youth at Second Church, Shelby. Mrs. Bridget Allen, Minister of Education for Oak Grove Church, led the opening prayer.
31. David Swann, member of Elizabeth Church and Co-ordinator for our Great partnership project, gave an update on this project. He stated that there are nine Baptist churches in Great and two million people so the need for more churches is evident. This year five people from our association went to Great. Rev. Donack Healy, Rev. Joyce Haller, Dr. Hugh Richardson, Rev. and Mrs. Harold Pitt. During the trip 25 professions of were made. Dates for the 1991 Great Mission trip is April 29 - May 6.
32. The Ordination Committee report was given by Rev. Don Jolly, retired pastor and Chairman of the Ordination Committee. The committee examined and recommended Brian Johnson and Ervin Price this past year.
33. Moderator Joe Cabarrus then ask those who had not already done so to fill out an attendance card and these were collected by the ushers.

34. Mr. Charles Young gave a report on our jail ministry and also a report from our Baptist Hospital.
35. Rev. Keith Dixon, pastor of First ISB Church and Chairman of the Committee on Committees, gave his report at this time. He thanked those who had served with him this year: Betty Gamble, Maude Wright, Clifford Hughes and Robert Lamb. He also thanked those who responded to the call to serve on the associational level. He motioned that the report be accepted. It was seconded by Mr. J.Y. Roper and approved.
36. Mrs. Evelyn Bridges led in singing "His Name is Wonderful" and "Alleluia" accompanied by Charlton Henson on the piano.
37. Director of Missions Clinic Brothers recognized a special guest present with us today, Rev. Bob Davis, our former CCM Director. The congregation responded with a round of applause for Rev. Davis.
38. Rev. Cecil Hall, pastor of Norman's Grove Church, gave the Memorial Tribute. We lost 273 laypersons, 13 deacons and 3 pastors, Rev. W.V. Taylor, Rev. Wilson Padgett, and Rev. Ed McGinnis.
39. Mr. Jimmy Greene, Clerk-treasurer, reported attendance of 179 messengers, 42 non-messengers and 3 visitors for a total of 227 for this session. He then gave the Executive Board report and the 1989-90 Treasurers report. He pointed out that the ending balance was almost the same as last year meaning that all income was disbursed as directed during this year. He thanked all our churches for their support in missions. Mr. Greene motioned that we accept these reports. Rev. Roper called for a second and it was approved.
40. Moderator Joe Cabaniss recognized the associational staff. He mentioned that Clinic Brothers has served 17 years as our director of missions, Judy Franks, Financial Secretary for 10 years, Margaret Lipscomb, Office Manager for 10 years, Diane Davis, our new CCM Assistant for four months and Charles Reed, our new CCM Director since October 1.
41. Rev. Roper-Duffee, Pastor of Waco Church and Associational Sunday School Director, gave the Sunday School report. Enrollment and attendance have increased this past year. Mr. W.H. Cross' Lute was recognized for 36 years of perfect attendance in Sunday School.
42. Director of Missions Clinic Brothers presented a plaque to Rev. Roper-Duffee in appreciation for his service as Associational Sunday School Director for thirteen years from 1977-1990. Moderator Joe Cabaniss then recognized Mr. J.Y. Roper, member of Buffalo church, for having attended 48 annual meetings of the association.
43. Mr. T.A. Lieberger, Director of South Mountain Baptist Camp, reminded us that the camp was "born" from our association under the direction of Mr. M.L. Smith who donated the land for the camp 37 years ago. There are now 28 buildings on the property. The camp is used for Deacon Retreats, Marriage Retreats, Youth Retreat and a variety of other Christian activities.
44. Miss Bethel Walker from Spockville, the Church Growth Multiplier appointed by the State Convention for this area, reported that she noticed our church enrollment has not increased. Multi-family housing ministry is one way to reach some people who may be unreach-able.

45. Rev. Bruce Rabon, pastor of Double Springs and Finance Committee Chairman, presented the Finance Committee report. He thanked the members of the committee, Tom Tate, Paul Dwyer, Buddy Corbin, Mary Harris, and Jim Hickey for their work. A declaration of commitment for the April 7-21, 1991 Witness/Life-giving Revivals was presented and signed by Director of Missions Clinic Borders, Moderator Joe Calhoun, Evangelism Chairman Alton Martin and Finance Committee Chairman Bruce Rabon. The 1990-91 budget was then presented. The new budget reflects an increase of 9.05% over last year. Rev. Rabon moved the adoption of the budget. This was seconded by Mr. Carlos Young and approved.
46. Dr. Jim Richardson, pastor of Poplar Springs Church and Chairman of the Strategy Planning Committee, presented the Strategy Planning Report. This is the third report done in the last 15 years. He stated that the Church Development Director will be a permanent position on the associational staff if approved. During the study, the need of such a person surfaced because of 7 direct request and 17 indirect request. He moved that we adopt this report. This was seconded by Rev. Royce Bailey, who also spoke in favor of a Church Development Director. Discussion followed for and against. Rev. John Hedges, pastor of First Baptist, Groves, made a motion to amend the original motion so that the Church Development Director be voted on separately from the other objectives. Rev. David Phibcock, pastor of Macedonia Church, seconded. The amendment to the motion was voted on by a show of hands and was not approved. The question was called for by Rev. Alton Martin, pastor of Poplar Springs Church. Ballots were passed out to all elected messengers by the ushers and taken up to be counted and the report of the vote to be given when this is completed.
47. Rev. Bruce Rabon, Chairman of the CCM Search Committee, introduced Rev. Charles Reed, our new CCM Director and his family to the association. A covenant of ministry together was read by the congregation, Rev. Rabon, and Rev. Reed.
48. The result of the vote on the Strategy Planning report was given by Moderator Joe Calhoun. 144 yes and 37 no. The Strategy Planning Report was adopted.
49. Rev. Sam Snyder, our former interim CCM Director, gave the CCM report. He thanked the association for the opportunity of serving this past year. During the year we ministered to almost 12,000 persons in some way, directly or indirectly. Food, medicine, clothing, fuel, utilities, or Toy Story and many other ways. He also thanked all volunteers who worked in any way and/or donated money or items. He also mentioned us about the Christmas Toy Story and the Duke Match Program, both of which is coming up soon. Rev. Snyder motioned that the report be accepted. Carlos Young seconded and it was accepted.
50. Joe Collins, Minister of Education of Elizabeth Church, gave directions for the evening meal and Rev. David Phibcock, pastor of Macedonia Church, gave thanks.

**Tuesday Evening
October 30, 1960**

51. At 7:00 p.m. as messengers and visitors gathered at Elizabeth Baptist Church for our evening session, the Kings Mountain Baptist Association Wied Ensemble presented special music under the direction of Rev. Lenton Neely, Minister of Music and Youth of Bethel Baptist Church. The Wied Ensemble consisted of Ministers of Music within our association of churches.
52. Moderator Joe Calhoun welcomed the group to the evening session and asked for messenger cards to be distributed to those who have not previously registered for the day.
53. Mr. Charlie Calhoun, Music Director of New Hope Baptist Church, led our opening hymn, "O Worship the King." We were accompanied by the Wied Ensemble: Mrs. Jean Massey, organist; and Mrs. Sue Hamrick, pianist.
54. Rev. Ervin Frye, pastor of Mills Memorial and a student of the Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary Extension class held at the Baptist Center, thanked the association for their part in providing a place for classes for seminary students. He shared scriptures from I Corinthians 1:1. Rev. Michael Johnson, Minister of Education, First Baptist, Shelby, gave the opening prayer for the evening session.
55. Rev. Marion Adams, retired minister and chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented his report. The report included the dedication of the associational minutes to the memory of Rev. Wilson Padgett, former pastor of Eastside, Shelby and to the memory of Rev. W. V. Tarlow, former pastor of Zion Church. Rev. Adams moved the report be accepted, seconded by Rev. Russell Pitts and carried.
56. Dr. Wynn Washburn, Associational Historian, gave the Historical Report. This report included how the best church got it's name. He then called all in the association to come forward who had been a part of the Poland or Brazil mission trips this year. He introduced Clara Hamrick and Nancy Hladok who shared stories from their trip to Poland.
57. Dr. Jim Richardson, pastor of Poplar Springs Church and chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the following report for 1960-61:

- Rev. Marion Adams moved that these be elected to serve. The motion was seconded by Rev. John Bridges and the motion carried.
58. Mr. Jimmy Greene gave the attendance report. He reported an additional 45 messengers, 23 non-messengers, and one visitor for a total of 290 for the day.

59. In the absence of Rev. C.G. Greene, chairman of the Membership Committee, Rev. Roland Leath presented the Membership Committee Report. He made a motion to accept Christopher Road Baptist Church into full membership of our association. The motion was seconded by Charlie Cabaniss and carried. Rev. Leath recommended that New Jerusalem Baptist Church be brought under watchcare of our association. Rev. Larry Davis moved the recommendation be approved, seconded by Dr. Ann Richardson. The motion carried.
60. Mr. Mike McGee, Minister of Music of Elizabeth Church, led the congregation in singing, "All Hail The Power."
61. Moderator Joe Cabaniss appointed the 1990-91 Committee on Committees. Those who will serve are: Rev. David Gordon, New Hope Church, Chairman; Rev. Larry Morris, Putnam Church; Mr. J.B. Williams, Lantana Church; Mr. Hershel Cook, Zion Church; and Mr. Ralph Murch, Northside Church.
62. Rev. Dan Wallace, pastor of Calvary Church and associational Discipleship Training Director, introduced Mrs. Wendy Minton Edwards from the North Carolina Baptist State Convention office. Mrs. Edwards gave some very enthusiastic words for Discipleship Training. She stressed the importance of making the effort to participate in Discipleship Training.
63. Moderator Cabaniss presented our speaker for the evening, Rev. Roland Leath. Rev. Leath is a retired Minister of Music who served First Baptist Church, Shelby, and also served as interim pastor in various churches here in our association as well as interim pastor in Korea.
64. Mr. Mike McGee, Minister of Music at Elizabeth Church, thanked the musicians and choir for their participation in the service. He led the special music for the evening, "Crown Him With Many Crowns," performed by the Elizabeth Sanctuary Choir accompanied by the Ministers of Music Wind Ensemble; Mrs. Joan Mastrey, organist; and Mrs. Sue Hamrick, pianist.
65. Rev. Roland Leath presented the evening message. He shared scripture from 1 John 3:1-3. His subject was "The Family of Christ." In this passage we can see the family name, family life, and family hope. We are sons of God and are called to live lives of purity and holiness. Our hope is that one day we will be like Him - not by our merit; by His grace. The only way the brotherhood of man can be accomplished is through the Fatherhood of God.
66. Rev. Curtis Styles, pastor of Calmar Church, was asked to give the benediction declaring the close of the 140th annual session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

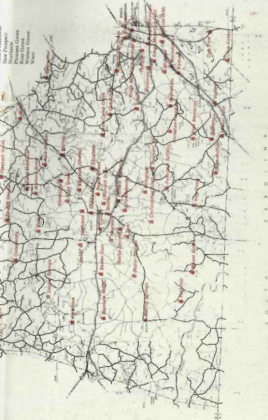

4. PRISON MINISTRY:

- A. **YOKELLOW MINISTRY** - Meetings are held every other Tuesday with three volunteers assisting. This is a time for worship and fellowship.
- B. **BIBLE STUDY** - Harold Ingle, Chaplain of the liberty prison unit, has led a group in bible study on Thursday afternoons. The average attendance has been nine (9).
- C. **CHURCH** - inmates have organized a church at the prison. It has approximately fourteen (14) members.

5. MINISTRY TO THE VISUALLY HANDICAPPED:

Events held by this ministry during the past year included a graduation party for visually handicapped students at Gardner-Webb College in May, day camps held for children in June and July at Union Baptist Church and Patterson Grove Baptist Church, a watermelon social for adults held at Western Baptist and two fundraisers held at Eastside Baptist, Shelby.

6. MINISTRY TO DEVELOPMENTALLY DISABLED:

Two churches hosted VBS for developmentally disabled youth this summer. Oak Grove held VBS for these young people June 11-15 with an average of thirteen (13) special youth and five (5) volunteers. Eastside, Shelby hosted July 16-20 with an average attendance of fourteen (14) youth and sixteen (16) volunteers.

Day camps were held by New Bethel, Shelby Second, Hoover Dam/Polkville, Mt. Sinai, Eastside Shelby, and Christopher Road. The average attendance was ten (10) with seventeen (17) volunteers.

7. MIGRANT MINISTRY:

The migrant ministry continued this year at Debedood with the Methodist churches in the Upper Cleveland County area alternating with Waco Baptist, Caesar Baptist, First Baptist Shelby, Union Baptist and Moore View Baptist. Christopher Road Baptist began a migrant ministry for the southern end of the county.

8. FRIDAY LUNCH PROGRAM:

Two hundred thirty (230) volunteers participated in the Friday Lunch Program this year. Total meals served: 1,750.

9. JAIL MINISTRY:

Carlo Young and Judy Allen have done a tremendous job in coordinating the Jail Ministry. Approximately twenty-six (26) churches participated by conducting services at the jail.

10. LITERACY MINISTRY:

The Literacy Ministry has twenty-five (25) volunteers. These tutors are very dedicated in helping others learn to read. This ministry is coordinated by Sara Williams and Ann Worden.

11. CHILDREN'S BIBLE DRILL MINISTRY:

This ministry provides children's Bible books to young children on their birthdays to children of persons who apply for assistance at the associational office. John Cabrera is very dedicated in carrying out this ministry.

12. VOLUNTEER RECEPTIONIST AND CLOTHING ROOM WORKERS:

We have fifteen (15) active volunteers serving as receptionists for our CCM office. We also have five (5) volunteers who assist us with our clothing room. These individuals are invaluable to our ministry. We certainly do appreciate them.

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT - 1990

Three regular meetings of the Executive Board were held on Monday evening during the months of January, April, and July 1990. Church hosts for the meetings were: January - Bruce Darr; April - Delaney; and July - DuBak.

New pastors and new Board members were recognized and welcomed at each meeting. Reports of our Director of Missions, Director of Church and Community Ministries, the various associational committees, and the Clerk Treasurer were presented at each meeting.

At the January meeting, a report was given that the Strategy Planning Committee had begun the work assigned them at the 1989 Annual Meeting to take an intensive look at "why" and "how" we do missions in Cleveland County. The plans will set the direction of the association for the next three to five years. The goal was to have a completed report by September 1990.

At the April meeting, the association approved the following: 1) Adopted a revised job description for a new Church and Community Ministries Director. 2) Established 'Bob Davis Endowment Medical Fund' in honor of our former Church and Community Ministries Director. Minutes for the fund were dictated by Mr. & Mrs. Neal Talley. Interest from the funds to be used for medical needs through the CCM Department of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. 3) Gave permission to the Executive Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association to administer funds to Billy Robinson from the Billy Robinson Educational Fund. 4) Offered guidance and support to Vision Baptist Cathedral by forming an Advisory Council composed of interested persons in the association of churches.

At the July meeting, Dr. Haskely Corbin, chairman of the Advisory Council formed to give support and guidance to Vision Baptist Cathedral, shared information concerning problems that had occurred with the new church. A lease agreement was made, meetings held, and discussions began to build. A resolution was drawn up between the association and the new church but was never finalized. The relationship deteriorated and the Advisory Council chose to terminate the relationship. The Executive Board voted to pay funds due Hoyle Memorial Methodist Church for the lease agreement which was made during the time we were trying to finalize a joint resolution with Vision Baptist Cathedral.

Dr. Corbin stated the desire of the Advisory Council to continue the idea of generating a Southern Baptist Church in a predominantly black community and to seek a pastor to enter such an agreement. The Board took action to set aside \$3,000 from the general fund for the Advisory Council to use to explore their idea. The motion was amended to pay the \$1,400 due Hoyle Memorial Methodist Church from the \$3,000 and the balance of \$1,600 be used at the discretion of the Advisory Council to begin a new work.

The Executive Board took action on the following on September 18, 1990 in a called meeting held at Bethel Church.

1) The Board unanimously approved the CCM Search Committee's recommendation to call Rev. Charles Reed as Director of Church and Community Ministries of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. 2) The Board approved that the CCM Search Committee be permitted to remain together as a group to serve as a support group for Rev. Reed and a liaison committee between him and the association for a period of at least one year.

Following each regular meeting these churches provided refreshments to the Board members during a fellowship time.

Thank you for your continued support to the association.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

I am delighted to report to you that Sunday School enrollment and average attendance increased this past year. We still lack data from three churches, but the numbers received from the other churches show increases for Sunday School this past year. The importance of the Sunday School in Southern Baptist life cannot be over stressed. The Holy Spirit's work through the Sunday School has been the fountain for soul winning, growth, attendance, and income for our churches.

An article in "Christianity Today" recently said that one of the problems Sunday School is having today is that we are in an age that detests commitment. I want to recognize someone who can be a role model for commitment. Mr. W.H. "Cox" Lane has completed thirty-nine years of perfect Sunday School attendance; that's commitment. He has also completed fifty years as a Sunday School teacher; that's service.

The first major activity of the Sunday School Council or ASSNTeam this year was Men's Hope Sunday School Committee training on February 11 at Patterson Springs Church. Because the ASSNTeam thought that the energies of our association should be directed towards the "Men's Hope" revival, the spring teacher training workshop was cancelled.

A Vacation Bible School Pre-planning Conference was led by Denise Smith on Monday, February 12 at the Baptist Center with approximately 20 in attendance. VBS materials for 1990 were previewed and suggestions were shared regarding recruiting workers and organizing for a successful Vacation Bible School.

On Saturday, April 12, the Vacation Bible School Training Clinic was conducted at Elizabeth Baptist Church under the leadership of Denise Smith. The De lauze, one day format was offered in response to evaluation cards turned in at previous years clinic. There were 56 in attendance.

Capping off the decade-long 10-90 Sunday School emphasis was the "Final Four Rally" May 8th at Bowling Springs Baptist Church. The 10-90 campaign was an effort to achieve a goal of having 10 million enrolled in Southern Baptist Sunday Schools at the end of the 1990 church year. The "final four" months of the campaign followed the rally in May. Dr. Ken Hemphill, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Norfolk, Virginia was the keynote speaker. Because Norfolk First Baptist has one of the fastest growing Sunday Schools in the SBC, there was a seminar time with Dr. Hemphill in the afternoon on how his church does Sunday School.

The final associational Sunday School event of the 1990 organizational year was the Associational Training School September 10-11 at Elizabeth Church. Joe Collins directed this school. There were 48 who attended the outreach emphasis studying the book, Evangelism Through the Sunday School. The Bible Teaching series for preschoolers, children, youth and adults had 61 in attendance with a total attendance of 107 representing 29 churches.

The ASSNTeam was saddened when the Lord called our Homeboard Director, Rev. W.V. Taylor, home to heaven. Brother Taylor had been Homeboard Director for eight years.

Tuesday, May 8th was the First Four Rally at Hoising Springs Church with twelve of music directors helping with the singing. Tuesday, August 28 another luncheon was held with our Music Directors. Eight attended and helped make plans for our Annual Associational Meeting in October.

During the year I have attended most of the Missions, Executive Committee and Executive Board meetings, led hymns at special associational meetings and services, attended Key Leadership at Hedgesport, helped place music directors in various churches in our association; provided music information to both pastors and music directors whenever possible; and have been a friend to those who were experiencing frustrations in their ministry.

Three associational music newsletters were mailed to all music directors in our association. Special thanks to our Zone Directors, who helped spread news and obtain information. They were: Hal Massey, Evelyn Bridges, Dorcas Payne Wascow, Laddie Shields, Chariton Bousard, Marie Healey, Mike McGee, and Beth Heffner.

This coming year Chariton Bousard, Minister of Music at Hoising Springs Church, will serve as your new Associational Music Director. Chariton is an extremely talented musician and will be an asset to our association. Please fill him up in your prayers.

HISTORIANS REPORT

My report on is divided into three parts. I had previously planned to report how the 74 churches of our association got their names, but now some other happenings seem to be more timely. Today, I will tell you how this best church, Elizabeth, got its name and tell of the others at a later date.

James Low, who 150 years ago gave most of the land now occupied by the city of Shelby, had a beautiful daughter. In the course of time she fell in love with and married a handsome man from this community named Thomas Wilson. He was a hard working, enterprising young Scotsman and eventually owned about 2400 acres of land, including this church property and the famous mineral springs down the road, first known as Wilson's Springs and later Cleveland Springs.

This young lady was so nice, such a good neighbor, devoted wife, mother, and Christian citizen, that in 1882 a newly constructed church at this place chose her name for its own. Her name was ELIZABETH which means "promise of God." Elizabeth Low Wilson.

Part two is about celebration of anniversaries. Pollock had one for its 100th birthday. I was involved since I was the only surviving member of the presbytery which constituted and organized this growing and very progressive church in the summer of 1840, before World War I. However, many of the charter members still survive and were present for impressive services. If Pollock's gracious pastor, Rev. Alton Martin, is still around in the year 2040 A.D. and I am still around, I hope he will invite me to their centennial.

Part three of this report is about missions, home and foreign. A number of notable events occurred. One group from Zion went to Honduras in Central America to construct and repair mission property. Another went to Brazil for evangelistic efforts. Ten workers from our association have just returned from Poland and a 10,000 mile mission project near Warsaw. They included: from Double Springs, Jennings and Mary Brooks, Gators and Lela Belle Washburn, from Rolling Springs, Jimmy and Nancy Blalock, Dorothy Edwards, Hayward and Margaret White, and Cleo Herrick. Mrs. Blalock and Mr. Herrick will give a short summary of their Poland trip.

Historical Blue 1954sons go today to New Richard Pyley in his 28th year as Pastor of Zion and to Dr. Gene Watterston in his 22nd year as pastor of Shelby First Baptist Church. Dr. Watterston also brings honor to the association as president of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. Only two other men from this association have ever held this prestigious office; Dr. Zeno Wall four times in the 1920's and Rev. John W. Suttle in 1948. Dr. Columbus Durham was general secretary of the convention for several years around the turn of the century.

1960 BRAZILIAN PARTNERSHIP REPORT

Volunteer missionaries this year were Rev. Broadus Housherry, Rev. Royce Daffin, Dr. Hugh Richardson, Dr. and Mrs. Harold Fite. The group departed August 30 and returned September 13. There were twenty-five professions of faith from the work of this trip and 2,000 Bibles were given to Brazilians who did not have a Bible.

O.D. Martin, State Partnership Coordinator, has asked each association to contribute \$750.00 towards training and equipment. This money will be used to strengthen the evangelism project in each Brazilian association.

A total of \$2,377.00 has been contributed to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association for the purchase of land within the Sul de Capital Association. A church will be built on this land once it is purchased. Funds will be sent to the Foreign Mission Board for disbursement to the Sul de Capital Association in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

The next evangelism mission trip will take place April 15-May 6, 1961. Many volunteers are needed. Training will begin in January 1961.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE REPORT

In July 1969, the Executive Board of the KMBA met and voted to "offer guidance and support to the development of a Southern Baptist church in a predominantly black community." Since that time an Advisory Committee was formed. This committee was to be composed of churches and leaders who are supportive of the idea. Since that time, the Advisory Committee has met regularly to discuss the possibilities. Over fifteen churches in our association have gathered to hear needs and to forge plans to develop the work, when presented.

In April 1969, the Vision Baptist Cathedral presented itself to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association Advisory Committee and dialogue continued until the church and the association decided not to go ahead with plans. In June 1969 the Advisory Committee met and agreed to work with New Jerusalem Baptist Church. The church and her pastor, Rev. Xavier Terrill, signed a joint resolution agreeing to develop a mission church and to enter into a cooperative relationship.

Since that time, another work has surfaced in the Kings Mountain area. Rev. John House expressed interest in being a part of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. On September 11, the pastor of the Northwoods mission joined Rev. Clay Danders, Dr. John Sloan, and Dr. Buddy Corbin for a tour of the Northwoods section of Kings Mountain. On October 7, Rev. House led the first service of the mission church in Northwoods. Seventeen people were present for Sunday School and thirty came for worship.

On October 20 the Advisory Committee met to discuss the future plans of both New Jerusalem Baptist Church and the Northwoods project. It was recommended by those churches present (10) that the association support these two works with financial and prayer support. The recommendation was moved, seconded and unanimously supported. The Advisory Committee also voted that the "officers", Buddy Corbin, Delbert Lee and Bob Lamb, will meet monthly beginning November 15 and the larger committee will meet quarterly to develop further plans.

AND WHEREAS TWO CONGREGATIONS HAVE EXPRESSED GENUINE INTEREST IN BECOMING SOUTHERN BAPTIST CHURCHES AND MEMBERS OF THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION;

BE IT RECOMMENDED THAT THE MEMORANDUM METING IN THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, OCTOBER 29-30, 1960, VOTED TO SUPPORT THE IDEA OF NURTURING CHURCHES, SERVING IN BLACK COMMUNITIES;

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The work of the Finance Committee this year has been marked with a sense of optimism and a spirit of celebration as we have rejoiced in that which you as an association have done. You have been faithful stewards of your resources and you have contributed well to the tasks and ministries we continue to share together. In response to the budget needs presented last year during the annual meeting, you forwarded \$181,262.68 from your churches to the work of the Kings Mountain Association. You are to be commended for such a notable record of achievement.

The work of the Finance Committee is multi-faceted. One of the tasks with which we as a committee are charged is that of the promotion of healthy stewardship among our churches. One of the major efforts at stewardship development focused on the idea that the Christian life involves both witnessing and giving. Indeed, we are who we are because our Lord gave Himself for us and, in the Providence of God, someone gave a witness to his love in our lives. Because Christians are folk who must be faithful both in witnessing and in giving, and because these dynamics are inseparable, we joyously share with you an exciting development among Southern Baptists.

Continuing off the tremendous success of the "Him's Hope: Jesus Cares for You" campaign of last year, the Southern Baptist Convention's Stewardship Commission joins with the Department of Evangelism of the Home Mission Board in presenting a series of revivals in 1991 to be followed in the succeeding years with other opportunities emphasizing these themes. In June 1990 a "Witnessing-Giving Life Festival" was sponsored by the Baptist State Convention and made available through the Associational Finance Committee. The dinner meeting at Ross Grove Church was well attended, and the "Witnessing-Giving Life Revivals" of 1991 were prepared. These revivals will be similar in preparation to the Him's Hope revivals of 1990. The format will also be very similar, but there will be additional services for the development of good stewardship among believers. The recommended dates for the "Witnessing-Giving Life Revivals" in our area are April 7-21, 1991.

As a part of the commitment to this revised concept, I will ask the Moderator, Director of Missions, and the Director of Evangelism to join me in signing a declaration of Commitment to the "Witnessing-Giving Life Festivals."

The second major responsibility of our Finance Committee is that of preparation of a proposed budget for the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. It is my joy to present this budget to you at this time. The proposed budget represents an increase of \$18,554.26 over last year's budget, an increase of 9.03%. As was noted last year, the proposed budget is a compilation of the requests from both associational staff, committee chairpersons, and heads of organizations. Recommendations for staff salaries and housing allowances increases are at the 5% level. Other changes have been explained in the notes that are affixed to the budget you have received.

We feel this to be a healthy budget. We feel that it is challenging enough to motivate us to do our best, yet not so overwhelming as to be oppressive. On behalf of the Finance Committee I move the adoption and the support of the Proposed Budget, 1990-91.

NOTES REGARDING CHANGES IN BUDGET:

1. Salaries and housing/ utilities allowances have been increased by 5%. The salary for the C.C.M. Director does not reflect this change, since he was called and employed at a stated salary package.

2. Mr. Sanders has been covered by a long-term-disability policy with the HCC Annuity Fund, at a cost to CHSA of \$70.50 per month. The HCC's policy states that there is a 60 month waiting period before one is eligible for disability payments, and no coverage will be extended beyond age 65. Since Mr. Sanders turns 65 in April, he has satisfied the requirements for payments to the disability insurance. Consequently, the fringe benefits allowed for disability have been directed to his retirement package.

3. The Hayside State Commission no longer pays retirement for C.C.M. Directors, as it did during the years when Mr. Don Davis was employed by the Association. This item must now be covered by the C.C.M. Director's expense.

4. Mr. Charles Ford will have his health insurance coverage provided for him by the New Mission Board upon his appointment by the Board. This figure represents the cost of his health insurance during the approximately three-month period in which he awaits appointment by the Board.

5. Allowances shown in the budget reflect the specific expenses of staff, committee chairpersons, and/or heads of organizations.
