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Wound Fatal To Dr. LeCocq

LYNDEN — Dr. Edward A. LeCocq, 64, Seattle surgeon, was fatally wounded about 3 p.m. Wednesday by a shotgun blast at the home of his nephew, Irwin J. LeCocy at Lynden.

Undersheriff James Tooker said the shotgun apparently was loc'ged in a tree branch and discharged, hitting the surgeon in the right temple.

Dr. LeCocq was a retired navy captain.

A graduate of the University of Oregon Medical School, he was associated in practice with a brother, John, at the Orthopedic and Fracture Rehabilitation Clinic in Seattle.

He was a member of the Seattle Surgical Society, the North Pacific Orthopedic Association, Western Orthopedic Association, the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons and was active in the Children's Orthopedic Hospital and Medical Center.

The survivors include the widow, Jane, two children and four brothers.

Tooker said the coroner, Dr. Robert Rood, has been called in to determine cause of the shot.

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DR. LeCOCQ was born at Harrison, S.D. He came to Lynden in 1915 and moved to Seattle 33 years ago.

Before retiring from practice six years ago, he was associated with his brother, Dr. John F. LeCocy, at the Seattle Orthopedic and Fracture Clinic.
