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

Selectmen's Report

Chairman Chad Hanna, Kristine Poland, Paul Yates

The Town of Bristol remains in strong financial condition, confirmed by our annual audit. We continue to maintain a moderate budget surplus. Collections on property taxes remain excellent, and our thanks go out to our taxpayers for their diligence in paying in a timely way.

Outstanding debt at the end of 2019 was just \$79,846. This is for the 2013 fire truck note which will be paid off in 2023. This year our auditors advised us that the Town should consider borrowing to complete capital projects while rates are low. While we recognize the advantages, the decision has been made to complete current projects without borrowing if possible. As a general policy, our goal is to incur debt only when necessary to keep property tax rates stable.

In 2019 the biggest draw on the Town's highway budget was the replacement of the Upper Round Pond Road bridge over the Pemaquid River, which is shown on the cover of this Annual Town Report. The Maine Department of Transportation, in close coordination with the Town, completed the repaving of Route 130. While this has dramatically improved travel, it has highlighted the need to focus on speeding traffic in our village areas. The Bicycle-Pedestrian Committee, also known as 'Bristol Byways', has taken the lead in identifying safety projects that can benefit everyone who uses our roads.

The number of students enrolled at Bristol Consolidated School continues to grow, a welcome trend after decades of decline. Bristol is an attractive place to raise a family, and the school is a key factor in attracting younger people to the community. We thank the School Board, Principal Ribeiro and the Superintendent's Office for holding the line on cost for the 2020-2021 school year after a 15% increase in 2019-2020 which was driven by increased numbers and increased special education costs. This increase forced us to raise the mill rate for property taxes to 6.75 mills for 2019, and we forecast an increase to 7.25 mills in 2020 to cover the second half of the 2019-2020 school budget.

The Town's valuation determined by the State stands at \$1,056,800,000 for 2020, the highest valuation in Lincoln County. When we receive the County's tax assessment, based on this valuation, we expect Bristol's share of the County's expenses to be close to \$1,500,000, the second largest claim on Town revenue after Education. This primarily funds law enforcement: the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, the District Attorney's office, the courts and Two Bridges Regional Jail.

A special thank you to all of Bristol's personnel, including the staff at the Transfer Facility, who make running a Town like Bristol look easy. Thank you, also, to the board and committee members who volunteer their time to support the business of local government. We value your time and are grateful for the knowledge and commitment you bring to the table.

Finally, an appeal to all residents. The United States Census is held every decade, and its count in 2020 will be important to ensure that Bristol receives any federal or state funding to which we are entitled based on our population. Please assist the Town by completing your census forms fully and accurately.

Town Administrator's Report

Christopher Hall, Town Administrator

2019 has been another busy year for the Town.

The big project completed in 2019 was the new Upper Round Pond Bridge across the Pemaquid River, just next to the Town Hall. The steel and concrete bridge, shown on the cover of this Town Report, is clad in stone thanks to the generosity of a local donor, echoing the original stone arch bridge that was removed in 1984. A stone from that original bridge, dated 1826, was found during the work and has been mounted next to the bridge by the Vestry building (better known as the Quilt Shop).

Two other major projects commenced in 2019. The girls' softball field at the school will be finished in the spring, as will the new Pavilion at Pemaquid Beach Park. The great majority of funding for these projects comes from grants and donations which a small amount of taxpayer funding has leveraged.

The next major project, due to start in the summer of 2020, is the long-awaited repair of the Bristol Mills Dam and renewal of the fish ladder. The permit for inwater work on the fish ladder begins on July 15th, which means that the water level will be reduced and the swimming hole may not be usable for the month of July while coffer dams are installed at the top and bottom of the fish ladder. We regret this inconvenience but hope that swimmers will accept that this work is essential to protect the long-term future of the dam – support for which was overwhelmingly voted by the Town in 2018.

Volunteers have always been a key to keeping Town government efficient, flexible and responsive. I want to recognize the great work done in 2019 by the Bristol Byways Committee to update the Town's Bicycle-Pedestrian Plan. The Committee's low-cost recommendations for road safety measures and active recreation facilities are included in the 2020 budget. A second volunteer effort, the Broadband Committee formed in November, is working with our utility companies to seek grants and other funding to get 100% high-speed internet coverage across Bristol. I also want to thank the Fish Committee for their work to keep the river clear of beaver dams, maintain the existing fish ladder, and assist the project to build the new 'pool-and-weir' fish ladder. 2020 will see another major volunteer effort – celebrating Maine's Bicentennial, including a Bicentennial-themed Olde Bristol Days in August and other events throughout the summer.

We are fortunate to have a dedicated staff working for the Town. I enjoy working with colleagues across all Town departments – the School, Parks and Recreation, Fire & Rescue, Highways, Code Enforcement and the Town Office. It is a pleasure to be able to recommend Jessica Westhaver for promotion to Treasurer, reflecting her good work over the last four years.

Finally I must thank the Selectmen, and all our taxpayers, for the pleasure and privilege of working for our Town.

The Collection of Taxes

Assessments are based on the status of property as of April 1st of the tax year. Valuations can be adjusted at any time during April, or until the taxes have been committed to the Tax Collector. Upon commitment, the valuations become records and may be changed only through the abatement process. Tax bills will be mailed to the owner of record as of April 1st, and if known to the Town a copy will be mailed to any new owner. It is interesting to note that in Maine, there is no legal requirement for the Town to provide a tax bill.

The tax due date and the interest rate for late payment are determined by vote of the townspeople at the Annual Town Meeting held in March of each year. In 2020, the Selectmen will recommend September 15th for the due date and 9% for the interest rate on late payments. 9% is the maximum allowable interest rate in 2020 as set by the State Treasurer. Prepayment of taxes in any amount, but not to exceed the previous years amount, will be accepted at any time.

The Lien Process

Between eight and twelve months after taxes have been committed, the Tax Collector will place a lien on all real estate accounts with an unpaid balance. All lien costs must be paid by the delinquent taxpayer before the lien can be discharged. If the lien remains unpaid for 18 months after having been recorded, the Town becomes the owner of the property. At this point the prior owner may negotiate with the Selectmen to buy back the property, or the Town may sell the property at auction.

Property Tax Relief

Homestead Exemption

You are entitled to a Homestead Exemption if:

- You are a legal resident of Maine as of April 1st, 2020 and have owned a homestead in the State of Maine for at least the past 12 months;
- You declare the homestead in Bristol is your permanent/primary residence;
- Is the only property for which you have claimed a homestead property tax exemption.

Veteran's Exemption

You are entitled to a Veteran's Exemption if you are a veteran, or the widow of one, who served active duty during a federally recognized war period and were discharged or retired under honorable conditions. The Veteran must have reached age 62 or must be receiving a pension or compensation from the United States Government for total disability, either service or non-service connected. A form DD 214 is required to be furnished with application.

Blind Exemption

You are entitled to a Blind Exemption if you have been determined to be blind by a licensed Doctor of Medicine, Doctor of Osteopathy or Doctor of Optometry. Appropriate documentation is required to be furnished to prove eligibility.

If you are already receiving any of these exemptions, there is no need to reapply. Applications are available at the Town Office or on our website at https://www.bristolmaine.org/tax-collection-and-assessing and must be filed on or before April 1st of each year.

Current Land Use Programs

The State of Maine has four "current use" programs that offer the property owner a reduction in assessed value: Farmland, Open Space, Tree Growth, and Working Waterfront. The programs establish valuation of property at its current use, rather than at market value.

All four programs are available to property owners through an application process with the local municipality. Applications must be filed on or before April 1st of the year the reduced valuation is first requested.

Property must meet certain criteria to qualify for each program and any future change in the use of the land will cause disqualification resulting in a penalty.

Farmland

In the Farmland program, the property owner is required to have at least five contiguous acres in their parcel of land. The land must be used for farming, agriculture or horticulture and can include woodland and wasteland. Additionally, the parcel must contribute at least \$2,000 gross income from farming activities each year.

The Department of Agriculture prepares a valuation guideline for municipalities, which results from studies based on suggested values using a correlation from income stream and market data attributable to agricultural enterprise.

If the property no longer qualifies as farmland, then a penalty will be assessed. The penalty is equal to the taxes that would have been paid in the last five years if the property had not been in farmland, less the taxes that were paid, plus any interest on that balance.

See Bulletin 20 (Farmland Tax Law), 36 M.R.S. §§ 1101 - 1121 (Farm and Open Space Tax Law), and 7 M.R.S. chapter 2-B (Registration of Farmland) on the Maine Revenue Website.

Open Space

There is no minimum acreage requirement with this program. However, minimum areas and setbacks must be excluded from classification.

The parcel must be preserved or restricted in use to provide a public benefit. Benefits recognized include public recreation, scenic resources, game management, and wildlife habitat.

The municipal assessor is responsible for determining the value placed on open space land. In the determination of that value, the assessor must consider the sale price that a particular open space parcel would command in the open market if it were to remain in the particular category or categories of open space land for which it qualifies.

If an assessor is unable to determine the value of a parcel of open space land based on the valuation method above, the assessor may use the alternative valuation method. Using this method, the assessor reduces the fair market value of an open space land parcel by the cumulative percentage reduction for which the land is eligible according to certain categories. Those categories are as follows:

Ordinary Open Space - 20% reduction

Permanently Protected - 30% reduction

Forever Wild - 20% reduction

Public Access - 25% reduction

In other words, if the property met all of the above requirements, the owner would see a cumulative reduction of up to 95% on the classified land.

If property no longer qualifies as open space, a penalty will be assessed using the same methodology as is used for removal from the Tree Growth program (see below).

See Bulletin 21 (Open Space Tax Law) and 36 M.R.S. §§ 1101 - 1121 (Farm and Open Space Tax Law) on the Maine Revenue Website.

Tree Growth

This program provides a benefit for owners of at least ten acres of forested land used for commercial harvesting. A forest management and harvest plan must be prepared and a sworn statement to that effect submitted with the application. Applications must include a map of the parcel indicating the forest type breakdown

as well as all other areas to be excluded from the tree growth program.

Each year, the State Tax Assessor determines the valuation per acre for each forest type by county. For a list of current Tree Growth rates, see Rule 202 on the Maine Revenue Website.

Forestry Management Plans must be re-submitted every 10 years in order to remain classified in the Tree Growth program. If forest land no longer meets the criteria of eligibility or the landowner opts to withdraw from the tree growth program, a penalty will be assessed. Depending upon the length of time that the parcel has been enrolled, the penalty is between 20% and 30% of the difference between the 100% Tree Growth value and the fair market value of the land.

See Bulletin 19 (Maine Tree Growth Tax Law) and 36 M.R.S. §§ 571 - 584 (Tree Growth Tax Law) on the Maine Revenue Website.

Working Waterfront

"Working waterfront land" means a parcel or portion of a parcel of land abutting tidal waters or is located in the intertidal zone (located between the high and low water mark) the use of which is more than 50% related to providing access to or in support of the conduct of commercial fishing (including commercial aquaculture) activities.

Working waterfront land used predominantly (more than 90%) as working waterfront is eligible for a 20% reduction from just value. Working waterfront land used primarily (more than 50%) as working waterfront is eligible for a 10% reduction from just value. Working waterfront land that is permanently protected from a change in use through deeded restriction is eligible for an additional 30% reduction.

If property no longer qualifies as working waterfront, a penalty will be assessed using the same methodology as is used for removal from Tree Growth classification.

Personal Property Business Tax Relief

BETE

Certain businesses may qualify for an exemption on personal property tax for equipment first subject to tax on April 1, 2008. This is an annual application.

BETR

Certain Businesses may qualify for reimbursement on personal property tax paid during the previous year. Taxpayers begin the application process by filing the form "801" with our office.

Bristol Fire & Rescue, Paul Leeman Jr. - Fire Chief

Bristol Fire & Rescue responded to 491 calls during 2019. There were 320 medical calls; 41 motor vehicle accidents; 51 fire calls; 24 fire alarms; 4 water rescues; 37 downed trees (29 involving power lines); 15 mutual aid calls; and 33 special duty events. Members spent 823 hours training with a total involvement of 6,078 hours.

On October 21, 2019 we participated in valuable training with the controlled burning of the Pemaquid Beach pavilion. We had 8 mutual aid departments send apparatus and manpower to assist us with this training with a total of 50 fire fighters and EMS members attending. Records were kept with the total amount of water drafted from 2 dry hydrants and the total amount of water flowed. This training will provide information needed for our ISO challenge and the report to them will be submitted in the spring of 2020. It is our goal to finish the ISO challenge this year to reduce the Town's rating.

We have installed an entrance and parking area for the new dry hydrant located at the property of Jeff Templeton. We thank Jeff for offering his land and pond, which will give us a great water source for the southern Round Pond area. The dry hydrant at the Monro Bridge on State Route 32 in Round Pond is still being planned for completion this year. We have obtained all the permits from DEP, enabling us to begin the construction with bids now being sought. This project had been delayed due to some legality issues. This will help with our ISO rating as we will have this water source certified by a geologist. We have already certified 6 other dry hydrants in our town.

The fundraising program "911 reflective sign" continues with the placement of over 1,000 signs throughout the Town of Bristol. We hope residents and businesses continue to recognize these signs as a valuable savings of time since seconds matter when emergency services are needed.

We continue to participate in the annual Easter Egg hunt; the bicycle Safety Rodeo at the Bristol School; the Round Pond Fourth of July parade; Olde Bristol Days; the Alvin Sproul / Samoset road race; the Pemaquid Beach Triathlon; fire education training with the Bristol Consolidated School children; and the Flying Santa by helicopter at the Pemaquid Lighthouse Park. We continue to give each new student at Bristol Consolidated School a new smoke alarm plus hand out batteries for replacement of those already in place at their homes. This is done twice a year as we reset our clocks in the Spring and Fall. Smoke alarms are the most effective method in saving lives in the event of home fires.

It is an honor for all members of Bristol Fire & Rescue to serve the residents of the Town of Bristol. I would like to thank the members for their many hours of dedicated service. Our participation would not be possible without the support of our families who are left at home at the sound of a page for our needed services. A huge "Thank you" needs to be given to the many businesses who allow members to respond to calls during working hours. It is with immense pride that we offer

support and help 24 hours a day / seven days a week throughout the year. A huge help to us would be for all to make sure that there is enough room for our emergency vehicles to travel without encountering trees, limbs, or rocks that will impede our response or damage our apparatus.

As I begin my eleventh year as Fire Chief and my second year in a fulltime capacity, I want to thank all residents for the privilege of serving in this position, and I will continue to do my very best. I want to thank all who continue to support this fine organization through their generous donations. I want everyone to be proud of their Bristol Fire & Rescue.

Bristol Parks & Recreation

2019 was an exciting year for Bristol Parks and Recreation. It began with the award of a \$300,000 Land and Water Conservation Fund grant for the construction of the new Pemaquid Beach pavilion. Two other grants were also awarded toward the construction of the boardwalk: a \$10,000 grant from the Davis Foundation and a \$6,400 grant awarded through the Maine Community Foundation (specifically Raymond McKinley Rideout Jr & Marguerite Waterman Rideout Fund). This funding allowed the Parks Department to move forward with the replacement of the old pavilion. Bristol Fire and Rescue helped save on demolition costs by using the old pavilion as an opportunity for a live training burn. It turned out to be a great way to honor and celebrate the old pavilion as it provided one last important service to our community – a training exercise for our firefighters.



Once the old pavilion was gone, the site was prepared for construction of the new pavilion which was awarded to a local contractor, Ledgewalker Builders, LLC. By the end of 2019 construction of the new pavilion was well underway. It was a great end to a successful year.

Lighthouse Park received some upgrades in 2019 that included a new fire escape and a new garage door. The ticket booth was damaged from a hit and run so the Parks Department used the opportunity to make some needed changes. The door was moved out of the line of traffic and the staff now safely collects admission fees from inside rather than from walking down steps, toward the incoming vehicles. A former Bristol resident, Elizabeth Zwicker, passed away in 2018 and left around \$175,600 to Bristol Parks to be used for Pemaquid Point Lighthouse Park. This generous act allowed Parks to purchase and install the remaining windows that needed replacement in the Keeper's house. The Learning Center in Lighthouse Park had a new door installed. This building was used often for lectures and events by various groups: Friends of Colonial Pemaquid, Old Bristol Historical Society, and Caring for Kids. The Park Manager from Colonial Pemaquid showed two historical movies and plans to continue to use the space in the future.

The Parks Department continued its mission to provide recreation for the residents of Bristol. The youth sports program at Bristol Consolidated School

consisted of a spring program offered after school for multiple grades and multiple sports. A soccer clinic was offered in the fall and the number of participants exceeded expectations. The second annual Pemaquid Beach Triathlon was a success! With over 100 participants and 30 volunteers, the Town came together to witness this exciting event. As in 2018, all proceeds will go toward a future playground at Pemaquid Beach Park.

Seth Fletcher, a Parks staff member, dedicated his time to starting a You Tube channel for Bristol Parks. He created various videos about the area including Beginnings of Pemaquid, Pemaquid Point Lighthouse: Introduction, Samoset, Sagamore of Monhegan, and The Fishermen's Museum. The feedback received from the community and visitors was outstanding.

Finally, the Town of Bristol lost a former Parks Commissioner in 2019, Gordon Benner. Gordon's commitment to Bristol Parks helped grow the Parks to where they are today. His dedication to improving and caring for the Parks deeply benefited the Town and its visitors. His legacy will live on through the Parks and will never be forgotten. Thank you, Gordon, for all that you gave.

Bristol/So.Bristol Transfer Facility David Poland, Manager

For the Bristol/South Bristol transfer facility, 2019 as far as household trash and recycling it was an average year, but bulk waste was extremely busy. The biggest challenge for us in 2019 was help. We had to say goodbye to Raymond Eastman after 35-plus years due to health reasons, and I would like to say on behalf of the two Towns, 'Thank You' for your dedication and commitment to the facility. We also said goodbye to Kurt Geib after 10 plus years. He decided it was time for a change, and I would also like to say on behalf of the Towns, 'Thank You' and Good Luck to both on their new adventures.

The year 2019 seemed like an average year for household trash and recycling, but as far as bulk waste it was the busiest I've seen. Unfortunately our poor backhoe just couldn't keep up as it is old and tired and just plain worn out. The facility cannot function without one, but fortunately because of planning ahead we had enough money in reserve to buy a newer one to do the job.

Looking ahead, what can we expect in 2020? We have always been really low with our fees for bulk waste compared to other facilities. I suspect we have attracted a lot more out of town bulk because of this. It's a hard thing to police but as long as our income covered our expenses it wasn't an issue. A second issue, unfortunately, is that we have new contracts with Waste Management for landfill and with our trucking contractor, and that comes with higher prices. These have forced us to raise our fees, on bulk waste alone, going from .06 to .08 per pound starting February 1st.

My goals in 2020 are to maintain the facility as we do every year but also to put together a 5 year plan to give the transfer station a facelift. I know we are in a good place right now but I feel that in 5 years it will need some attention and possibly before then. With the everyday operations we try to make it as simple as we can and as easy as we can by fine-tuning the operation. We're always looking for new ideas to make things easier and more efficient; we have gathered some ideas that will help achieve that and will be part of the 5 year plan. I would like to say I'm very grateful to our loyal staff: Kurt Geib, Raymond Eastman for a better half of the year and especially Clint Gilbert and Brent Willey who joined us in 2019. I cannot say enough good things about them - they are a great asset to the facility and of course for all that they do to help run and keep it maintained. Thank you.

I'm proud of our towns' growing commitment to recycling. Every little bit helps save tax dollars, and it is important to remember that our tonnage to the landfill is still growing. We must try to both keep our expenses down and keep our recycling rate growing. Please keep up the good work, encourage others and keep that recycling percentage growing.

Code Enforcement Office *Joseph Rose*

Calendar year 2019 has been a busy year for remodeling as well as new home starts. Along with other building projects, the number of building permits increased this year to 87. Plumbing permits followed this trend with an increase of permits issued to 115.

As always, the Code Enforcement office is open to all residents and contractors to discuss projects, and address land use issues to assure that your projects go smoothly.

Please remember that all property owners, occupants, and contractors who are planning to construct, reconstruct, alter, relocate, replace or expand any structure to first consult the Code Enforcement Office to ensure compliance and avoid costly delays. Special attention should be paid to properties in the Shoreland Zone, as delineated by the official Shoreland Zoning map for the Town of Bristol.

All Town ordinances, Shoreland map, and permit applications can be found at the town's website. www.bristolmaine.org or at the town office.

Central Lincoln County Ambulance Service

Nicholas Bryant, Service Chief

Residents of Bristol,

As this is my first full year as Service Chief of Central Lincoln County Ambulance Service (CLCAS), I'd like to take the opportunity to introduce myself. My name is Nicholas Bryant and I have been employed full-time at CLCAS since February of 2010. I have been involved in emergency services since I joined the Bristol Fire Department at 16 years old. I later went on to earn my Associates Degree in Applied Fire Science from Southern Maine Community College, as well as completing my Paramedic Training at Kennebec Valley Community College. I look forward to continuing to serve Bristol and our other communities in the years to come.

In 2019 our service responded to 1,730 emergency calls, an increase of 90 calls from our 1,640 emergency calls from 2018. While we have continued to see an increase in emergency calls, we have continued to see a lower number of BLS transfers which has sharply declined from 941 in 2015, to 81 last year. This has greatly decreased our revenues in the last four years, which has caused the financial contribution from our founding towns to increase. While these financial request increases have been new for our agency, our costs to the taxpayers in each town still remains much lower than most other agencies in the state of Maine.

In summer of 2019 we were awarded a grant from the Burns Family Foundation that allowed us to replace one of our four stretchers, as well as purchase McGrath Mac video laryngoscopes. Video laryngoscopes are tools for intubation of a patient that utilize a camera on the end of a laryngoscope that feeds live video to a small screen on the handle of the laryngoscope. Video laryngoscopes are new to

EMS in Maine, a technology that previously only existed in emergency rooms and operating rooms. This new technology will assist EMS caregivers in providing the best care possible to members of our community.

In an effort to replace aging ambulances, we have undertaken a new capital campaign. Our goal is to raise \$398,000.00 to replace two 2010 chassis ambulances. The new ambulances will be four-wheel drive, and have a more modern layout of the patient care compartment. The new ambulances will be much safer for the EMS caregivers, allowing them to remain seated and secured while having access to most equipment needed for patient care located within reach. The campaign began in November of 2019 and as of January 28, 2020 has raised \$68,961.62.

We have continued to provide Community Paramedicine visits to members of our community for our sixth straight year. This program provides services to patients in their homes that include at-home blood draws, medical assessments, wound care, medication reconciliation, education and some point-of-care lab tests. The program is run by referral from your primary care physician or a physician you may see in the Miles ER. The program has demonstrated a positive impact on the patient's ability to manage medical conditions at home. If you or someone you know may benefit from these services, please contact your primary care doctor for more information.

I would like to thank Fire Chief Paul Leeman Jr, and all members of the Bristol Fire and Rescue for being an essential partner in our effort to supply the quality Emergency Medical Service to the Town of Bristol. We look forward to working alongside members of the Bristol Fire and Rescue to provide emergency care to the residents of Bristol again in 2020.

Countywide we responded to almost 16,500 calls for service, over 2,000 of these calls were in Bristol alone. Many of the calls in Bristol that required our immediate response involved investigations of motor vehicle crashes, reports of domestic violence, or assisting those who may be in some type of mental health crisis. When possible, Lincoln County Deputies attempt to reduce crime by using discretionary time to perform property checks on commercial or public buildings, as well as private property upon request. This increased visibility has shown to deter crime and improve response times to emergency calls for service. In 2019, Lincoln County Deputies performed over 1,100 of these type of checks in your town.

As a new decade begins, our agency is taking steps to "keep up with the times". We will place in service our first ever hybrid vehicle within the Patrol Division. We have plans to study the impact this vehicle has to both the environment and our budget with plans to purchase more if it is determined this makes sense for the citizens of Lincoln County and our budget. Additionally, we also have plans to collaborate with our County EMA and establish a small unmanned aircraft system (sUAS) program. Most commonly referred to as "drones." This program is expected to be used for many different type of purposes such as search and rescue, crash investigations, and shellfish enforcement. This partnership with our County EMA Office will ensure that an sUAS is always available for whatever need arises countywide.

The Sheriff's Office also has plans to collaborate with the Lincoln County Communications Center on a program called RUOK (Are You Ok). This program will allow seniors and others who may be homebound to be contacted by phone on a regular basis to verify their well-being and give them a sense of security. If you or someone you know is interested in participating in this program, please reach out to any member of the Sheriff's Office or call my administrative office at 882-6576.

United State Senate

U.S. Senator Susan M. Collins

Dear Friends,

As 2019 ends and 2020 begins, I am pleased to report that Congress made progress on a number of issues important to Maine families despite the polarization in our country.

In a major win for surviving military and retiree spouses to whom we are deeply indebted, I was proud to co-lead the repeal of what is often referred to as the "Military Widow's Tax," an unfair offset of survivor benefits that has prevented as many as 67,000 surviving spouses—including more than 260 from Maine—from receiving the full benefits they deserve.

The high cost of health care and prescription drugs continues to be a top issue for families and seniors. To provide continued relief for more lower- and middle-income individuals, I led the charge to extend for another two years the medical expense tax deduction that I included in the 2017 tax law. Without this extension, nearly 20,000 Mainers and millions of Americans with high medical expenses, including many with preexisting conditions, would have faced an increased tax burden. In other good news, the CREATES Act I cosponsored became law. It will prevent pharmaceutical companies from blocking access to a sufficient supply of brand-name drugs needed for the studies that allow less expensive alternatives to enter the marketplace.

Improving people's health and wellbeing remains my priority. On a per capita basis, Maine has the highest incidence of Lyme disease in the country. In August, I held a Senate hearing at the University of Maine's Tick Lab on this growing public health crisis. A comprehensive public health strategy to combat this epidemic is needed, and the new law I authored will do just that.

In addition, I helped champion another \$2.6 billion increase for the National Institutes of Health, our nation's premiere biomedical research institution, including significant boosts for Alzheimer's disease and diabetes research. Last year, NIH funded more than \$111 million for research at 14 Maine institutions.

To help prepare the graduates of Maine Maritime Academy, I secured \$300 million for a new training ship, which will ensure rigorous instruction for MMA students for decades to come.

Significant federal funding was approved for work at Bath Iron Works and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. Funding appropriated by Congress will pay for three new destroyers, make a down payment on an additional ship, and finance infrastructure improvements at PNSY.

As Chairman of the Transportation and Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have led efforts to improve our nation's crumbling infrastructure and ensure that Maine's housing needs are addressed. For Maine's roads, bridges, airports, and seaports, tens of millions in federal funding will help make urgently needed

upgrades and improve safety. Funding will also support housing assistance to low-income families and seniors and aid communities in reducing homelessness among our youth. The Community Development Block Grant program will assist numerous towns and cities in our State.

The Aging Committee I chair has continued its focus on financial security for our seniors. A new law I authored will make it easier for small businesses to offer retirement plans to their employees. Our Aging Committee's Fraud Hotline fielded more than 1,200 calls this year. Congress passed a new law to crack down on robocallers who are often the perpetrators of these scams. And a new law I authored will expand the IRS' Identity Protection PIN program nationwide to prevent identity theft tax refund fraud.

At the end of 2019, I cast my 7,262nd consecutive vote. In the New Year, I will keep working to deliver bipartisan solutions to the challenges facing Maine and the nation. Dear Friends,

The beginning of a new year provides the opportunity to reflect on the progress of the past 12 months. If you've been watching cable TV, you might think that every waking moment of 2019 in Washington has been consumed by divisive, partisan issues – and while there's no shortage of those debates, there have also been opportunities for bipartisan cooperation. You sent me to the Senate to make the most of those opportunities, so as we enter into the New Year, I wanted to take a moment to update you on my efforts to work with members of both parties to make life better for the people of Maine.

One of my most important priorities this past year has been emphasizing preventive healthcare. Maine's distinction as the oldest state in the nation brings us wisdom, of course – but it also creates unique challenges, particularly relating to healthcare. This year has also continued the growth of Maine's forest products industry – a key focus of my work to revitalize Maine's rural economy and communities. We've

seen significant investment in mills across the state, creating good jobs to support rural Maine. I'm also pleased that the investments aren't just in our mills – the industry is thriving because of its commitment to innovation. We're fortunate to have the University of Maine's top-notch researchers exploring cutting-edge ways to use our forest resources, including capitalizing on the rise of 3D printing technology with the world's largest 3D printer. Combining this work with ongoing federal support, our vast forests, and Maine's dedicated workforce, I know that the future of this industry is bright, and I'll continue working to support it on all fronts.

I'm proud of all we've accomplished together this year, but even as I reflect on all that we've achieved, it is challenging to not think of the work left undone. It sometimes can be discouraging to watch these important priorities hang in limbo, but fortunately for me, encouragement is never far. After all, I get to live in Maine – which means I get to count Maine people as my neighbors and friends. I'm always struck by the kindness that our citizens show not only to me, but also to each other. This focus on collaboration and compassion is an inspiration, and it powers my efforts bring a little bit of Maine common sense to Washington. Thank you for all you do to for our state – Mary and I are deeply grateful, and we hope that 2020 will be a good year for you, your family, your community, and the State of Maine.

I hope this letter finds you well. It's a privilege to represent you and your family and I am thankful for the opportunity to update you on my work in Washington and Maine.

In 2019, I was honored to work with my colleagues to pass hundreds of bills that address everything from fighting climate change to raising the minimum wage. And while Congress has become an increasingly partisan place, I was proud to continue my habit of reaching across the aisle, introducing a number of bipartisan bills and cosponsoring even more.

I look forward to continuing this important work in 2020 so Americans are no longer faced with the choice of picking up prescriptions they desperately need or putting food on the table.

I am sure this coming year holds many challenges and opportunities for our country, and I promise that the interests and principals of Mainers will continue to guide my work. 2019 was a year of maintenance. We had a new metal roof installed, an oil furnace, and heating & cooling pumps. The Tabitha and Stephen King Foundation, The H.O. Pete Foundation, and a wonderful anonymous donor made all of these improvements possible. Please stop by and enjoy our comfortable and welcoming building.

We offer free access to computers and wireless technology. We have a free magazine table, a local genealogy room, and access to Ancestry.com library edition. Programs this past year included a "Let's Talk About It" book discussion group, art displays by local artists, knitting for all ages, author and local interest visits, Friday and Saturday story times, and our "A Universe of Stories" summer reading program for children. The library is also a drop-off for the local food pantry and a meeting space for local organizations. Passes to the Farnsworth Museum were donated by The Plein Air Group.

As part of our great collection of 29,632 items we offer music CDs, movies, audio books, and access to 11,328 downloadable books. How often do we hear that libraries aren't just about books anymore? Of course, libraries have never been only about books, but it is critical that libraries continue to be about books and reading. Reading matters for the way our brains develop and reading affects the way we think and feel. This affects how we live our lives, but also for how we make judgements about the world. 9,367 adults and 869 children visited the library in 2019 and signed out 9,469 books.

47 people joined the library this past year, giving us a total of 1,468 adult and children members. This year's Board of Trustees: Carol Jaeger, President; Judith Hope, Vice President; Sue Trouwborst, Recording Secretary; Bonnie Sablinsky, Treasurer; and Anne Merrill, Corresponding Secretary. Many thanks to the town of Bristol for their support of \$14,500 in appropriations which is a very crucial part of our operating budget.

Community Housing Improvement Project, Inc. (CHIP, Inc.) Brittany Gill, CHIP Inc., Coordinator

"Neighbors helping neighbors keep their homes safe, warm, and dry."

CHIP, Inc. was founded by Ruth Ives in 1984 as an ecumenical effort to help homeowners struggling to keep their homes safe, warm and dry.

CHIP, Inc. began in the Town of Bristol and now serves eleven towns in Central and Eastern Lincoln County. During our 2018-2019 fiscal year, CHIP, Inc. worked at eleven different households in Bristol. The various repairs included a handicap accessible shower, three handicap ramps, electrical system repairs, furnace repairs, and a roof replacement, among several smaller projects.

Volunteers, contractors and homeowners all help CHIP, Inc. complete home repairs. This year, volunteers contributed over 500 hours to addressing the safe, warm and dry needs of low-income Bristol residents.

On our annual Community Cares Day in September, over 100 volunteers, including more than a dozen Bristol residents, give their time and skills. A group of retirees volunteer with CHIP, Inc. year round. And a student youth group visits Bristol every summer to volunteer on home repair projects and do other community services, such as visiting nursing homes. At times, homeowners and their families contribute, too. When necessary, CHIP, Inc. hires contractors and collaborates with other organizations to complete repair projects.

From November to March CHIP, Inc. offers a one time, one hundred gallon fuel assistance donation to people struggling to meet their fuel needs. During the 2018-2019 season, CHIP, Inc. donated fuel to 35 Bristol households, including 2 cords of firewood. A team of volunteers splits, stores, and delivers the firewood.

CHIP, Inc. partners with The Carpenter's Boat Shop to maintain The CHIP Shed, a free furniture and appliance exchange. Donations are stored in The Shed, located at The Carpenter's Boat Shop.

CHIP, Inc. relies on the generosity of this community to support these services. Thank you for your contributions.

Coastal Rivers Conservation Trust

In April 2019, Damariscotta River Association and Pemaquid Watershed Association joined together to form Coastal Rivers Conservation Trust. Coastal Rivers is a 501(c)(3) non-profit, membership supported, and nationally accredited land trust and conservation organization dedicated to preserving and promoting the natural, cultural, and historical heritage of the greater Pemaquid peninsula and Damariscotta River region.

Coastal Rivers now holds about 20 Bristol properties in conservation. Most of these are open to the public for low impact recreation and enjoyment of the natural world. These conservation lands also serve to keep wildlife habitat intact and help mitigate the effects of changing climate. The most visited property is the stunning LaVerna Preserve.



- Other beautiful Bristol preserves open to the public free of charge are Bass Rock, Bearce Allen, Cosima's, Crooked Farm, Hatchtown, Little Falls Brook, Moxie Cove, and the Sproul Preserve.
- Looking ahead to 2020, Keyes Woods Preserve will have trails open in the coming year. The Bristol Recreational Trail, owned by the Town of Bristol and managed by Coastal Rivers, was closed during the construction of the school softball field. We are working to have it re-opened early in 2020, with a new trail head and cleared trails. Coastal Rivers is working with the Old Bristol Historical Society on the Pemaquid Mill property.

Coastal Rivers has active programs in the areas of land conservation, stewardship, nature education, water quality monitoring, marine conservation and cultural preservation.


Some program highlights from 2019:

• Coastal Rivers education programs reached hundreds of Bristol residents during the past year. This includes 305 Bristol school contacts during the school

year, primarily through the "Math in the Woods" and Wabanaki Native American programs. Coastal Rivers offers programs that connect people of all ages with nature, from preschool, after-school, and homeschool programs, to school vacation and summer day camps, to workshops and walks and talks.

- Beachcombers' Rest Nature Center (BRNC) at Pemaquid Beach had a successful 16th season in 2019. The goal of BRNC is to create a welcoming experience for visitors from near and far who come to enjoy the beautiful clean beach, salt marsh, and park grounds, and to provide information about the beach environment and how to protect it for future generations. A total of 2,764 people attended programs at BRNC, including the popular Tuesday Touch Tank offered in collaboration with Darling Marine Center.
- Coastal Rivers water stewardship initiatives have two main goals: the protection of water quality and the prevention of the introduction of invasive aquatic plants. Water samples were taken weekly all summer long from 3 swimming sites, including Bristol Mills swimming hole and at Pemaquid Beach, to check for bacterial contamination. In 2019 the weekly water quality numbers were extremely good, with no safety alerts issued. Courtesy Boat Inspectors performed 290 boat inspections at launch sites and 11 plants were brought in for identification. None were invasive aquatic plants. CBI is the first line of protection from invasive aquatic plants for the whole Pemaquid River system and its beautiful ponds.

In 2019, nearly 51,000 people visited Colonial Pemaquid. Visitors explored the main village of the 17th century English settlement of Pemaquid, its partially reconstructed forts, and Museum. Others enjoyed the tasty fare of the Contented Sole Restaurant, boating facilities, and the Site's beautiful maritime setting. We were pleased to send the Town \$1,750.66 as a share of revenue from museum admissions.

We continued our ongoing partnership with the Town hosting Olde Bristol Days, with live music, crafts, food vendors and children's activities, and as always,

provided the best land-based viewing for the 33rd annual Merritt Brackett lobster boat races.

July saw the thirteenth year of the 17th Century Encampment weekend, when more than 200 visitors met an array of 17th century 'characters' who populated fishing and trading plantations like Pemaquid, both English and Wabanaki. In addition to storytelling, reenactors demonstrated blacksmithing and prepared a tasty array of 17th century dishes. Our volunteer reenactors also presented demonstrations of everyday 17th century life each summer weekend at the replica fishermen's cottage.

We were also pleased to offer our second season of free archaeological themed movies at the Pemaquid Point Learning Center, in partnership with Bristol Parks and Recreation. These will continue in summer 2020. Our popular "Kids Dig" program (2) once again offered children the chance to explore firsthand an "archaeological dig."

At Colonial Pemaquid we are proud to preserve one of the most important sites of early English-Native American-French contact and settlement in North America. If you have not visited the Museum and forts recently, come back this summer to see our updated exhibits and a variety of new programs as we celebrate Maine's Bicentennial!

Friends of Colonial Pemaquid Don Loprieno

2019 marked the Friends of Colonial Pemaquid's 26th year as a local, all volunteer, 501(c)(3) organization with a proven record of stewardship and preservation. Since our inception in 1993, we have raised funds to assist with archeological digs, sponsored a diverse calendar of special events and lectures, obtained grants and other funding for on-site projects, including nearly a quarter-million dollars in the late 1990s for the renovation of the Fort House, an 18th century structure, and much more, all at no cost to the taxpayer.

This past summer, in partnership with Bristol Parks and Recreation, we changed the location of our Monday Night Lecture Series from the Contented Sole to the Learning Center at Lighthouse Park. The result was a venue better suited to the programs we offer. Many thanks to Parks and Recreation and especially Lara Sargent for their support and cooperation.

The Friends also re-located its Gift Shop from the back of the Fort House to the front, and re-opened for weekend business on Memorial Day weekend running through Columbus Day weekend. We'll be open again in 2020, continuing throughout the season. Please join us for our special events and programs and be sure to visit the shop!

The Fishermen's Museum John Allan, Treasurer

The Museum opened for our 47th season at the Pemaquid Point Lighthouse Park this past May and recorded attendance at 33,819, an increase of 1,714 visitors over 2018.

The natural beauty of our Lighthouse Park draws local, regional and international travelers to Bristol. Looking over our guest book during October we recorded tourists from every state, including Hawaii and Alaska, along with Italy, United Kingdom, Germany, Singapore, France, Spain, So. Africa, Mexico, Netherlands, Brazil, Iceland, Denmark, Switzerland, Australia, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Israel, Armenia, Ecuador, Finland, and Canada. All these visitors over just 20 days in October!

We hope our website www.thefishermensmuseum.org helped convince some travelers with the photo tours through our galleries and the complete history of the Lighthouse. Many archival documents and photographs are posted including the wreck of the Angel Gabriel, a listing of all of Maine's Lighthouses, How to Catch a Lobster and much more.

Our attractive digital interactive map of the Lighthouses of Maine built by Bristol resident Dave Svens continues to delight and inform. The lighthouse locations are discovered via lights and a touch panel and everyone finds this display surprising and educational. It also illustrates to visitors the intricate blend of bays and islands along our 3,478 miles of coastline (5,000 miles including islands).

The donations the Museum receives support artifact restoration, exhibit maintenance and our small operating budget, with the balance donated to the Town of Bristol. Our 2019 contribution of \$2,743.25 raises the total donated to \$266,975.00 since 1972.

Admission is free and the Museum is open during normal Lighthouse Park hours. Our collection of local fishing heritage includes original tools, traps, nets and artifacts, displays, dioramas, ships logs and first-person accounts of shipwrecks, along with rare and unusual items that present the history of the Bristol community to visitors from home and away.

Our annual scholarship has been awarded since the 1980s and is open to Bristol students pursuing careers in marine related activities such as boat building, fishing, marine ecology and biological studies, engineering, history or other maritime fields. Information about our scholarship and applications can be obtained at the Lincoln Academy guidance office or downloaded from our website.

Once again, the Board of Directors wishes to express their appreciation to the Bristol Park Commission and Park Staff for their support and assistance during 2019.



Healthy Kids Leslie Livingston, M.S., Executive Director

Dear Residents of Bristol:

Thank you so much for your support of Healthy Kids. Healthy Kids is the Child Abuse Prevention Council of Lincoln County. Our mission is to encourage, support and promote the healthy development of our children so that they may grow into healthy, contributing members of our community.

We want you to know that Healthy Kids has provided services to 137 Bristol residents. Those utilizing our services include parents, teachers, students, children, day care providers, physicians, law enforcement, school board members, town council members and general assistance staff, service club members, inmates, and other community representatives including Bristol residents who may work with children elsewhere in the county and still receive professional training.

Those services include:

- Home visiting personalized parenting support
- Supervised Visitation ordered by DHHS and/or the courts
- Educational classes in all four Lincoln County high school health classes teaching students about Shaken Baby Syndrome, the impact of drugs and alcohol on babies and basic infant care
- Parenting groups, workshops and classes
- Alcohol and Kids don't mix programs for parents
- School and Day Care based child abuse prevention programs and monthly parenting tips
- Family Resource Center programs, including playgroups throughout the county, pregnant and parenting teen support, lending library, toy exchange, Christmas toy drive and free informational resources
- Parenting programs at Two Bridges Regional Jail
- Mandated Reporting, Safe Sleep, Period of Purple Crying and Strengthening Families programs for professionals who work with children
- Use of our resource center and education that includes calls and visits to our center, educational information on our website, our TV series online on LCTV 7, our community events such as free dinners, free toys at Christmas through our toy drive etc.

We will continue to provide all of these services to the professionals and families in Bristol and again, thank you for your support!

LifeFlight Foundation

LifeFlight of Maine and the LifeFlight Foundation are both non-profit charitable organizations supporting the emergency care system in Maine. Our fiscal year runs from July 1 to June 30th. Our annual report for FY2018 along with our FY19 audited financial summary and FY20 budget were submitted with our funding request.

Town funding is important to LifeFlight as it helps build the case for major donations from foundations. LifeFlight's aircraft work statewide and every aircraft is used at some point in every community in Maine.

Funds raised from town contributions are strictly segregated and completely allocated to LifeFlight's aircraft replacement fund unless the Town requests the funds support LifeFlight's outreach clinical education program.

- Historically LifeFlight operated two dedicated medical helicopters based in Lewiston and Bangor. N910EM and N910CM were purchased at the end of 2004 and together have now transported more than 15,000 patients and flown more than 17,000 hours and 2 million miles caring for patients in Maine.
- In response to need the LifeFlight Foundation raised funds to add a KingAir B200 turboprop fixed Wing aircraft in 2015 and a third new 'next generation' helicopter in 2017 along with a new base of operations in Sanford. The aircraft acquisition and upgrades were a \$10 million investment with an additional \$2 million of medical equipment.
- In 2018, again in response to need, the LifeFlight Foundation added fast response vehicles to the bases in Sanford and Lewiston to support operations when weather prevents safe flight of operations. With the new aircraft LifeFlight also added 41 new clinical and aviation staff in Sanford and Bangor.

Current Town Funding:

LifeFlight is in the process of replacing the two long term aircraft with fully next gen capable helicopters. While the same model series of light twin engine IFR helicopters, the newest generation A109SP has:

- The new aircraft (the 109SP) has a cabin that is 11 inches longer, 4 inches taller and can carry an additional 400 lbs.
- The Pratt and Whitney engines are higher performing, using the same amount of fuel and cruising at 165 mph instead of 145 mph.
- The new aircraft also features composite materials in its construction, which require less maintenance.
- The avionics of the new aircraft include the advanced autopilot system necessary to make best use of the newest GPS approaches, which are safer and more reliable for patients.
- The new aircraft will also be compatible with the satellite-based radar that the national air traffic control system is required to implement over the next 15 years.

• LifeFlight is initiating a national demonstration project for low level IFR flight with the FAA. The new aircraft are essential to this project.

The current project to replace N910EM and CM is a \$12.6 million project with each aircraft acquisition of \$6.3 million. With the support of towns across Maine, initial deposits and the first completion deposit totaling \$1,578,500 have been made with the first of the replacement helicopter with projected delivery in June of this year. This will allow one of the current helicopters to be allocated to back up and decrease current lease costs for back up aircraft to cover maintenance downtime.

Lincoln County Television

As Lincoln County Community Television (LCTV) begins its 31st year as the local community television station, THANK YOU to the residents of the Lincoln County communities who have financially supported our station throughout these years.

Originally the station was managed and funded by the municipalities of Damariscotta, Newcastle, Nobleboro, Waldoboro, and Wiscasset. In addition, community media service is provided to Alna, Bristol, Dresden, Edgecomb and Westport Island. In recent years we have received funding from Bristol, Edgecomb, and Alna and many local businesses.

Beginning as a totally volunteer organization, there is a need to keep up with changing technology. In 2004, the first part-time manager was hired. Increasing services to our Towns requires additional advanced equipment and paid personnel. Our talented volunteers and a small number of paid part-time staff are committed to quality programming.

We fulfilled one or our long-time goals in 2019 with an emergency back-up generator which will protect our equipment and ensure that we will be providing 24-hour broadcasting. We have done limited upgrades to equipment but we look to improve even more in 2020.

We look toward 2020 as a banner year for Lincoln County Television (LCTV)! We see a bright future. A change in leadership, an engaged Board of Directors, and some exciting new programming show great promise; these will add to our existing community bulletin board, local government meetings, high school basketball games, and the yearly coverage of the Pumpkinfest Parade and Regatta. Some locally produced shows are: WuzzUp, Spotlight on Seniors, Community Conversations, Gruesome Glenn's Friday Fright Night and in 2020--historical programming highlighting the State of Maine's bicentennial. Also planned is a wide range of community-interest programming that include nonprofit interviews and discussions with a variety of Town officials. General topics of interest will be discussed such as paramedicine, mental health issues, and the opioid problem to name a few.

LCTV is committed to forging new, stronger relationships with the Towns who support us. We have opened the lines of communication with Town leaders and welcome input and suggestions. In addition to the ongoing support of the Towns, there are plans for some fundraising events including an exciting concert series at

the Lincoln Theater during the winter months.

Our primary goal for 2020 is to identify how we can better serve you. We are committed to showcasing our vibrant communities and our amazing history.

Currently, Town Government and other locally produced programs are also available streaming, as video on demand at www.lctv.org; and, of course, 24-hour programming on Channel 1301 for Spectrum customers and Channel 7 for Tidewater customers. New Hope for Women

New Hope for Women provides services in Sagadahoc, Lincoln, Knox and Waldo counties to individuals, their families, and their friends who are affected by domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. In 2019, we provided over 4,400 hours of service to over 1,300 individuals in Mid-Coast Maine. We need your help to continue our work. Unfortunately, the need for services in our community is growing. In order to keep up with this need, we request \$1,045, the same amount as last year.

Services New Hope for Women provides for Bristol community members include:

- Crisis intervention services including a 24-hour hotline which operates 365 days yearly. Members of our staff or trained volunteers answer this crisis line. We also have emergency safe homes throughout the Mid-Coast.
- Legal services provided by our staff attorney and court advocates.
- Support and education groups in all four counties that provide individuals with the opportunity to work toward ending violence in their lives.
- Six units of transitional family housing for up to two years including personalized support and assistance with long-term goal planning.
- Community education programs to businesses and agencies that allow communities to offer a consistent and helpful response to the needs of individuals living with violence.
- Prevention/education programs in area schools that equip young people with information they need to make healthy choices in relationships.
- A batterer intervention program certified by the Maine Department of Corrections for women who use violence.

In 2019, New Hope for Women provided the following services to Bristol, Maine: 11+ hours of direct service to 9 clients and 15+ hours of community and youth education.

Domestic violence knows no boundaries. There is no typical abuser or abused. That is why the contributions made by the communities in Sagadahoc, Lincoln, Knox and Waldo counties are so important. Thank you for supporting our programs. We hope that you will continue to join with us. Together, we can transform our cultures and provide safety for those who need it.

Mission Statement

New Hope for Women offers support to people in Sagadahoc, Lincoln, Knox and Waldo counties affected by domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. It provides educational resources to assist our communities in creating a safer and healthier future.

Old Bristol Historical Society

The Old Bristol Historical Society was established in 2003. It is a charitable and educational nonprofit corporation with the purpose to collect, preserve, and share for the benefit of the public the artifacts and oral, documentary, personal and physical histories of Bristol. By involving local people and institutions it aims to foster a sense of community and pride in our collective past and future.

2019 has been a remarkable year for OBHS. In the forefront of our many activities has been the acquisition of the Hammond Lumber property in partnership with the Coastal Rivers Conservation Trust (CRCT). This acquisition was to enable CRCT to preserve the land, and OBHS to own the historic Pemaquid Mill and Retail Building. Recently, CRCT decided to transfer ownership of all the property and buildings to OBHS, with CRCT holding a conservation easement on the land. The deed transfer will take place in early 2020. We are grateful to CRCT, and thrilled with this opportunity for OBHS as we rebuild the historic Pemaquid Mill and refurbish the retail building as our new Bristol History Center.

Although this acquisition has been prominent in our activities, we have enthusiastically continued the regular life and work of OBHS by offering the following throughout the year:

- 1. Seven Summer Lectures of local Bristol history
- 2. Made these presentations available to view on our local television station LCTV.
- 3. Maintained our Digital Image Archive of photographs, letters, and rare documents, and making our Digital Image Archive available online.
- 4. Began our Oral History Project interviewing our older residents to preserve first hand accounts of Bristol history from those who have lived it.
 - 5. Began photographing the historical barns and fish houses of Bristol.
- 6. Provided educational talks on the history of Bristol for our local school children
 - 7. Published bi-annual newsletters.
- 8. Developed a strategic plan for the rebuilding of the Pemaquid Mill including a vision statement and an outline of what we will do to the Mill, how and when we will do it, to what period we will restore it, how we will use it within our community,



how we can fund it, and other recommendations concerning our historic mill.

9. Acquired the original Poole Brothers portable saw mill from the early 1900s.

The Pemaquid Group of Artists

The Pemaquid Group of Artists celebrated 91 years of continuous exhibition during the 2019 season — the last 59 years on the grounds of the beautifully maintained Lighthouse Park. One of the oldest artist organizations in Maine, PGA currently juries new members from artists residing in area towns within Lincoln County. Gallery admission is free for park visitors.

We exhibit a diverse collection of artworks – including oil, pastel, watercolor, and acrylic paintings, as well as mixed media, sculpture, ceramics, woodturning and marquetry. Exhibiting Artists continually update their work as pieces sell. This year we featured the art of 31 permanent members and two seasonal guest artists. We began our season by opening on weekends starting on Memorial Day weekend. The Gallery was opened seven days a week between June 7th and October 14th with an Opening Reception on June 9th. We hosted a reception for Patrons Appreciation and the public in August and presented plein air demonstrations for park visitors throughout the season. Member artists participated in the Artists at the Point plein air event in July and during Open Lighthouse Day in September.

We continued our support of local arts education through financial donations to three area elementary schools, the preschool programs Healthy Kids and Coastal Kids, and Lincoln Academy. We also funded a pass to the Portland Museum of Art, available free to Bristol and other Maine residents by reservation through Skidompha Library in Damariscotta.

We are grateful to our Patron members, whose loyal enthusiasm mirrors that of our artist members, Board of Directors, gallery manager, and knowledgeable gallery attendants. Our upgraded facility and the lovely landscaping done in the park as a whole continues to provide a welcoming environment for our visitors.

Our very active Board is comprised of myself, Bob Vaughan, President; Anne Jackson, Vice President; Judy Nixon, Treasurer; Kathleen Horst, Secretary; Dianne Dolan, Sarah Fisher, Cindy Spencer and Will Kefauver, Past President. We hope

you will have the opportunity to visit us at the gallery in May of 2020 when we open our doors to begin our 92nd year with an all-new exhibit of the creative work of our new and existing members.

spectrum Spectrum Generations

Spectrum Generations' history spans nearly five decades of helping older and disabled adults age in place, by providing the highest quality of life possible through at-home and community-based services. Spectrum Generations' mission is to promote the life-long learning, health, wellness, nutrition, community engagement, and the social well-being of all older and disabled adults. Spectrum Generations offers programs and services catering to the individual needs of older and disabled adults throughout six counties (Lincoln, Kennebec, Knox, Sagadahoc, Somerset, Waldo), and the towns of Brunswick and Harpswell.

We provide services to older and disabled individuals, often those who are homebound and may not have any additional support. Our counselors are available to meet with people in the community, in our centers, or in their very own home; we find this accessibility to care services greatly increases the individual's ability to remain aging in place. Most of our services are also offered for free; there are very few self-pay services.

In the past year, Spectrum Generations has helped the Town of Bristol in the following ways:

- Through our Meals on Wheels program, we have served 955 meals to 4 homebound older adults
- We provided services to 108 unduplicated Bristol residents
- Aging and Disability Resource Specialists provided 127 hours of outreach counseling on topics including elder abuse, prescription drug coverage, and long-term care
- Additionally, 15 caregivers were able to receive respite services, aiding in the balancing act of working and taking care of an older or disabled love one

Spectrum Generations continues to pursue long-range objectives including enhancing collaborations with other healthcare providers, such as hospitals and health systems, to address social determinants of health. Our efforts focus on improving our consumers' health, expanding outreach efforts for people living in rural/isolated areas, and bolstering collaborative efforts that support older individuals living in their own homes (we will use new technologies, social networking, life management skills, and expansive volunteering to accomplish these plans).

We thank our valued staff, dedicated volunteers, and community partners for our many successes! We could not do all that we do without their support.

BRISTOL EDUCATION REPORT PRE-K - 12

Looking back at 2019, I am reminded that our schools must always be looking forward as we prepare our students to be "21st century learners" with the promise of making them "future ready" lifelong learners. We know that critical thinking, cooperation, communication, and creativity are essential for our students to succeed. To ensure our instructional practice includes these foundational skills, teachers at all levels and throughout all of our schools continually review and revise their curriculum and teaching practices. Professional development and growth is central to developing strong teaching skills. To that end, Central Lincoln County School System has formed a professional development committee for teachers and another for support staff. These committees work complementarily to plan and present meaningful, current, targeted learning opportunities for all staff. In October, all AOS 93 staff attended the annual conference of the Association of Computer Technology Educators of Maine in Augusta. In November, a professional development day with sixteen different sessions focused on school safety with all staff gathering at GSB. All staff have also individually completed trainings on mandated topics including reporting abuse and neglect, student confidentiality, suicide prevention, civil rights, bullying prevention and harassment.

The vibrancy of our local communities and their support for our CLCSS schools is essential for the attainment of student aspirations and success. Maine law recognizes the critical role schools have in the lives of our children: "Compulsory education is essential to the preservation of the rights and liberties of the people and the continued prosperity of our society and our nation. Maintaining regular student attendance is necessary to achieve the goal of an educated citizenry." It takes the commitment of many people to create and maintain a strong and effective school. Bristol Consolidated School has many parents and community members supporting its mission and place in the town. Two recognized groups who provide core support are the Bristol School Board and the PTO. The School Committee's primary responsibilities are for budget, policy development, and oversight. The PTO works to provide support for many school and community enrichment activities with its organizing and fundraising. Additionally, Principal Ribeiro works diligently fulfilling her leadership role to ensure the school is wellstaffed and focused on meeting the needs of all students with the most qualified professional staff available. Principal Ribeiro also ensures that JVS buildings and grounds are well maintained and cared for. Principal Ribeiro and I are very proud of the work our teachers, support staff, and administrators have done to enhance learning opportunities and achievement outcomes for all students.

BCS enrollment in October 2019 was 197 students in grades Pre-K - 8. There were 91 Bristol students attending secondary programs including Lincoln Academy and Medomak Valley High School, as well as several students participating in home school programs.

School budgets provide the backdrop for telling the story of every school. How a school appropriates and uses its available funding translates to and defines what is important to the administration, teachers, support staff and the community because it represents what these groups want and need to provide for their students. Budget preparation is a complicated process. From one budget year to another, school administrators work with local officials and community members to ensure that each school budget is adequate, equitable, and predictable and that it is developed with input from all stakeholders in a clear and transparent process.

Our work together in the schools and communities is complex, sometimes challenging, and yet unquestionably essential and rewarding. Together we make a positive difference in the lives of our students, their families, and the communities in which we live and work. We are increasingly coming together as a learning community to engage in expanding our shared commitment for improving the education we provide to our children. I encourage you to visit the AOS 93 and Bristol Consolidated School websites (www.aos93.org) for current news and information about our students and school activities, as well as school policies, School Committee meeting agendas and minutes. Bristol School Department *Jennifer Ribeiro*, *Principal*, *Bristol Consolidated School*

Bristol Consolidated School is a vibrant learning community that continues to adapt to the changing needs of our students and community. We have been growing over the past few years and have a PreK group of 28 students this year. This is our largest group since the 8th grade class of 2009.

We were able to accommodate this growth by adding one new position. Although we only added one new full-time teacher, we had many staffing changes to adapt to for the 2019-2020 school year. A number of teachers moved into new positions and we have new staff leading the front office and the custodial crew.

Our academic program for grades PreK through 8 continues to strengthen as we collaborate with each other to meet student needs. Support is provided for students who need more targeted instruction, as well as those who are ready for additional challenges. Students can participate in choral groups, band ensembles, art buddies, yearbook club, a civil rights team, a book club and an after-school learning lab to name a few! In addition to the co-curricular choices we offer at least seven athletic teams for students to participate in. Our students benefit from

many community partnerships that enhance the offerings at school.

Our educational focus over the past few years has been on supporting student growth and developing students with grit and perseverance. We provide instruction that encourages students to make growth on academic standards and track their progress over time. Focusing on progress with standards ensures that all students are challenged appropriately throughout their school experience. Our curriculum and instructional materials are evaluated to ensure they are relevant. The middle school math teachers across the AOS are evaluating math curricular materials this year. Collaborations with Lincoln Academy are important when discussing our programs to ensure the middle school transition to high school is as successful as possible.

In meeting the needs of all students, we have many special programs available to our students. BCS hosts the Compass Program which is a positive behavioral support program for special education students from Bristol, Nobleboro, Jefferson and South Bristol. This is a regional program that is financially supported by the sending schools. We also support the Pathways Education Center at Jefferson Village School. That program is funded similarly to Compass and supports special education students who have a need for Life Skills programming.

The Bristol School building is an important resource to the community. The physical plant continues to be monitored to ensure timely upgrades and maintenance. We are embarking on a new strategic plan that will specifically address the needs of the building and grounds with a focus on safety, compliance and sustainability. The school community has benefited from the recent upgrades to the parking lot and heating controls. Our most exciting project is the construction of a new softball field on school grounds. This project began late last spring and will be completed once the fundraising goals are met. We have many generous supporters in this community that have brought the dream of a softball field within reach. The Bristol School Boosters have a softball committee that continues to organize fundraising efforts and the town has supported this project through grant writing and working with donors. We look forward to our first home game!

Our school continues to be a welcoming place for parents, students as well as community members. School events are sponsored to increase school spirit and community involvement including Bristol YMCA night, Devil Pride Week, Diversity Week and the annual Thanksgiving meal served by our kitchen staff to students and parents. This year we were invited to participate in the Winter Kids Winter Games for the month of January. This event brought parents, friends and local resources to the school for outdoor physical activity and learning. The Bristol Masonic Lodge has sponsored their fifth Bikes for Books program this year which provides new bikes and helmets to 2 students at each grade level as a result of their reading efforts! We hope you enjoy one of the many upcoming events that are organized to support all of these programs for BCS students.

These are the many examples of the wonderful things that go on at Bristol

School. Not only are the students learning to be well rounded, responsible school community members, they are performing at high levels on state assessments. Last year Bristol Consolidated School students continued to score above the state average in English Language Arts, Mathematics and Science. We have a lot to celebrate!

Lincoln Academy *Jeffrey S. Burroughs, Head of School*

To the Residents of Local Sending Towns:

Greetings from Lincoln Academy! My name is Jeff Burroughs, and I began my tenure as Lincoln Academy's 44th Head of School in July of 2019. I am honored to write to you, the residents of our sending towns, to update you on current happenings at Lincoln Academy.

In September we welcomed 500 local students from 23 towns and 35 residential students from 14 countries around the world. This represents a drop in our residential program numbers, which was not entirely unexpected after we graduated 31 boarding students in the class of 2019. Meanwhile, local numbers are on the rise: for the second year in a row the ninth grade class has 150 incoming students, exceeding previous projections about declining local enrollment.

At the halfway point in our school year, the LA community is focusing on school climate and norms. We are actively engaging staff, students, and parents in discussing ways we can continue to support students in a safe and positive learning environment. Meanwhile classes, sports, and extracurricular activities remain in full swing.

In academics, more than 130 students take at least one Advanced Placement (AP) course each year. Many take multiple courses and sit for multiple exams. This year, 35 students are enrolled in vocational programs at the Bath Regional Career and Technical Center (BRCTC). Our teachers mentor students in independent studies in a wide variety of subjects from multivariable calculus to jazz piano, photography, and physics. About one third of the student body participates in music classes, and this year over 50 LA musicians qualified for District III, All State, and All State Jazz honors festivals. In visual arts, students have over a dozen courses to choose from in drawing, painting, ceramics, printmaking, and more.

About half of LA students participate in at least one sport and many are two and three-sport athletes. Last spring the girls tennis team won their second consecutive State Championship, and this fall the boys cross country team won the Kennebec Valley Athletic Conference Championship for the fourth year in a row. Several teams were also recognized for good sportsmanship awards. This year we are pleased to add a Unified Basketball team to our winter sports offerings.

Popular extracurricular activities include our State Champion Debate and Math Teams, Model United Nations, Outing Club, Special Olympics, and a wide variety of service and student-interest clubs. This year's musical theater production, Guys and Dolls, will hit the stage in March, and we are delighted that more than 50 students have been cast in the show, the biggest cast in over a decade. Our ATEC building is now open and staffed until 4 pm every weekday, and many students and community members are taking advantage of this state-of-the-art facility to make projects using our 3D printers, laser cutter, CNC machine, and other equipment.

In November we participated in a high school fair for middle school students who have a choice of high schools. We value the principles of school choice, and hope that the majority of AOS students as well as other students around the region will continue to choose LA. Without the continued support of our sending towns, Lincoln could not continue to serve generations of families in the midcoast region. Thank you for that support.

Central Lincoln County (AOS 93) Adult & Community Education Annual Report 2019

CLC Adult & Community Education provided services to nearly nine hundred people in 2019. We offered the HiSET (formerly GED) high school equivalency diploma program, basic literacy and math instruction, college preparation classes in mathematics and English language arts, college placement testing, college and career advising, medical certificate programs and a wide variety of community enrichment classes for all ages. Except for our community enrichment classes and some of our medical certificate courses, all of our programs and services are offered at no cost to our learners.

During the 2018 - 2019 school year, we had twenty-two learners enrolled in our high school equivalency program. Before the year was out, twelve of them completed the program and earned a diploma! A graduation ceremony was held on May 30th that celebrated the effort and dedication of these remarkable honorees.

For the first time, we offered summer education hours for students to continue working on their high school equivalency programs without the usual summer break. Four students took advantage of this option and I anticipate their program completion within the coming year. Anyone who is seventeen or older and out of high school but without a diploma should contact us to explore options and develop a plan. Our dedicated staff is ready and eager to provide instructional support and ongoing encouragement in order to help each learner reach his/her goals.

During the 2018 -2019 school year, twenty-seven people accessed our college transition courses and services. Many of those are now enrolled in college or in a workforce training program of some kind. Anyone seeking support in navigating the college transition process, in meeting the academic placement requirements for college acceptance, determining college and career goals, or in understanding and completing college related paperwork/forms should contact us. Our college transition coordinator and instructional staff are ready to help with all of the above.

Approximately six hundred community members accessed one or more of our low cost, high impact community enrichment offerings in 2018 - 2019. Our partnership with the RSU 40 Adult & Community Education program enables us to provide a single point of access for information about classes throughout the Lincoln County area. Our partnership with LincolnHealth allows us to offer several medical certificate courses including Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) at no cost and with an apprenticeship option as well, Certified Residential Medication Aide (CRMA), Heartsaver Adult/Child/Infant CPR/AED, and a Babysitters' Training Course. We are also partnering with The Academy of Medical Professions to offer a range of other health certificate programs via both online portals and face-to-face at locations in Topsham and Camden. These partnerships provide residents

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, and each major fund of the Town of Bristol, as of and for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, and each major fund of the Town of Bristol as of December 31, 2019 and 2018, and the respective changes in financial position, and where applicable, cash flows thereof for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Bristol's basic financial statements. The introductory section and the combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements.

The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

The introductory and statistical sections have not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on them.

Management's Discussion and Analysis

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 2019

The Municipal Officers of the Town of Bristol, Maine offer the readers of Bristol's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of its financial activities for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2019. We encourage readers to consider the information presented in conjunction with additional information furnished in the basic financial statements and the accompanying notes to those financial statements.

The Financial Statements

The financial statements presented herein include all activities of the Town of Bristol, Maine using the integrated approach as prescribed by GASB (Governmental Accounting Standards Board) Statement No. 34. The government-wide financial statements present the financial picture of the Town using the accrual basis of accounting. They present governmental activities (functions that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues) and business-type activities (functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and charges) separately. These statements include all assets of the Town as well as all liabilities, including long-term debt.

The fund financial statements include statements for each of the three categories of activity: governmental, business-type and fiduciary. Notes to the financial statements provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

Statement of Net Position and Statement of Activities

The statement of net position and statement of activities report information about the Town and its activities as a whole. Excluding infrastructure, these statements include all assets and liabilities of the Town using the accrual basis of accounting, which is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the Town's net position and changes to it. Net position is the difference between assets and liabilities, which is one way to measure the Town's financial health or financial position. Over time, increases and decreases in net position is one indicator of whether the Town's financial health is improving or deteriorating. Other factors to consider are changes in the Town's property tax base and the condition of its infrastructure. In the statement of net position and statement of activities, the Town's activities are separated as follows:

Governmental activities: Most of the Town's basic services are reported in this category, including public safety, public works, and general administrative services. Property taxes, excise taxes, user fees, interest income, cable television franchise fees and State and Federal grants finance these activities.

Business-type activities: Parks and Recreation is considered a "business-type"

activity. A fee is charged to visitors to cover costs associated with admission to and use of Bristol's parks. Parks and Recreation is completely self-supporting through admissions, rental income and other user fees and donations.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide detailed information about the most significant funds, not the Town as a whole. A fund is a grouping of related accounts used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. Some funds are required to be established by State law or by grantor. In the Town of Bristol, these include worthy poor funds, cemetery funds and a small fund set aside for maintenance of the Rock Schoolhouse. During 2018, the town opened two new dedicated accounts: a Restricted Funds account to hold proceeds of a major grant for replacement of the fish ladder; and a Veterans' Memorial account for donations for the proposed memorial. Management also establishes other funds to help it control and manage money for particular purposes, using funds set aside by vote of the Town or by the Parks and Recreation Commissioners. In fiscal year 2019 Bristol had eleven such "capital reserve" accounts: the Bridge Fund, the Building Fund, the Computer Fund, the Bristol Dam Fish Ladder Fund, the Highway Equipment Fund, the Landings and Harbors Fund, the Revaluation Fund, the Parks Fund, the Learning Center Fund, the Fire Truck Fund and the Facility Maintenance Fund which offsets capital expenditures for Bristol's three fire stations.

Governmental Funds

Most of the Town's basic services are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the remaining balances at year end that are available for spending. These funds are reported using an accounting method called "modified accrual", which measures cash and all other financial assets that can be readily converted to cash. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed, shorter-term view of the Town's general government operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information helps determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the Town's programs. The Town's governmental funds consist of the following:

General Fund: The general operating fund of the Town used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Proprietary Funds: When the Town charges customers for services it provides (business-type activities), these services are generally reported in proprietary funds. Proprietary funds are reported in the same way that all activities are reported in the Statement of Net Assets and Statement of Activities.

Fiduciary Funds: The Town's fiduciary funds are held in trust for the benefit of others. These funds are not included in the government-wide financial statements and cannot be used to support general government activities and operations.

Governmental Activities

The cost of all governmental activities in 2019 was 7,945,278.23, an increase of 710,756.73 in comparison to 2018. Some of the costs were paid by those who directly benefited from the programs, or by other governments and organizations that subsidized certain programs with operating grants and contributions. The Town paid for the "public benefit" portion of governmental activities with property taxes and through additional sources such as excise tax, interest revenue, State revenue sharing, cable television franchise fees and other miscellaneous revenues.

Town programs include education, general government, health and welfare, highways and bridges, protection, special assessments (County tax), and unclassified. Each program's net cost (total cost less revenues generated by activities) is presented below. The net costs show the financial burden placed on the Town's taxpayers by each of the functions:

On December 31, 2019, Bristol's net position for governmental activities totaled 9,596,446.96. The net position as of December 31, 2018 was 9,604,690.46 thus an increase in net position of 8,243.50 during fiscal year 2019.

Business-Type Activities

The cost of the Town's only proprietary fund, Bristol Parks and Recreation, was 352,448.06. The amount paid by users of the system and raised through grants and donations was 658,570.45, resulting in a net gain of 306,122.39. Much of this gain is set aside for use in renewal of the pavilion at the Pemaquid Beach Park.

Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

The breakdown of actual expenditures for the year may be found in the Selectmen's Financial Report which is part of the 2019 Annual Report of the Town of Bristol. This could be compared with the proposed budget for 2020 to ascertain potential increases or decreases in individual budgetary items.

Administrative Notes

Bristol had just one outstanding loan at the end of fiscal year 2019: a fire truck loan which matures in 2023. The following is a comparison of total long-term debt as of December 31st of each fiscal year:

The mil rate was 6.75 per 1,000.00 of valuation in fiscal year 2019, an increase from fiscal year 2018. In 2018, the mil rate was adjusted to reflect the revaluation of property throughout the Town. Based on the old valuations, the mil rate in fiscal year 2018 was 6.25 per 1,000.00 of valuation in 2018.

Education accounted for approximately 64% of the tax commitment followed by the County tax assessment at 20% and the Municipal budget at 16%.

Bristol's financial position continues to be exemplary. The Municipal Officers continue to pursue ways to contain the cost of providing essential services to Bristol's taxpayers. Bristol taxpayers should, however, be prepared to face growing needs for funds as enrollment in the Bristol School rises (following four decades of slow decline), as we face increased demands for infrastructure, and as the rising costs of law enforcement (through the County tax), health care (including ambulance services) and education surpass the overall inflation rate.

Notes to Financial Statements

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The accounting policies of the Town of Bristol conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governmental units.

1. Financial Reporting Entity

The Town of Bristol was incorporated in 1765. The Town operates under a town meeting form of government.

In evaluating the Town of Bristol as a reporting entity, management has addressed all potential component units. The primary criteria for including a component reporting entity are the exercise of financial accountability by the Town of Bristol's municipal officials.

The Town's financial statements are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is responsible for establishing Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) for state and local governments through its pronouncements (Statements and Interpretations). Governments are also required to follow the pronouncements of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued through November 30, 1989 (when applicable) that do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements.

2. Basic Financial Statements - Government-Wide Statements

The Town's basic financial statements include both government-wide (reporting the Town as a whole) and fund financial statements (reporting the Town's major funds). Both the government-wide and fund financial statements categorize primary activities as governmental. The Town's fire protection, recreation, public works, and general administrative services are classified as governmental activities.

In the government-wide Statements of Net Position, the governmental column is presented on a consolidated basis by column, and is reported on a full accrual, economic resource basis, which recognizes all long-term assets and receivables as well as long-term debt and obligations. The Town's net position is reported in three parts - net invested in capital assets; restricted; and unrestricted. The Town first utilizes restricted resources to finance qualifying activities.

The government-wide Statements of Activities reports both the gross and net cost of each of the Town's functions and business-type activities (fire, public works, administrative, etc.). The functions are also supported by general government revenues (property, certain intergovernmental revenues, fines, permits, and charges, etc.). The Statements of Activities reduces gross expenses (including depreciation) by related program revenues and operating and capital grants. Program revenues

must be directly associated with the function (fire, public works, etc.). Operating grants include operating-specific and discretionary (either operating or capital) grants while the capital grants column reflects capital-specific grants.

The net costs (by function or business-type activity) are normally covered by general revenue (property, intergovernmental revenues, interest income, etc.).

This government-wide focus is more on the sustainability of the Town as an entity and the change in the Town's net position resulting from the current year's activities.

3. Basic Financial Statements - Fund Financial Statements

The financial transactions of the Town are reported in individual funds in the fund financial statements. Each fund is accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures/expenses. The various funds are reported by generic classification within the financial statements.

The following fund types are used by the Town:

a. Governmental Funds:

The focus of the governmental funds' measurement (in the fund statements) is upon determination of financial position and changes in financial position (sources, uses, and balances of financial resources) rather than upon net income. The following is a description of the governmental funds of the Town:

1. General Fund:

General Fund is the general operating fund of the town. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

2. Capital Projects:

Capital Projects funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities and equipment.

3. Fiduciary Funds:

Fiduciary Funds are used to report assets held in a trustee or agency capacity for others and therefore are not available to support town programs. The reporting focus is on net assets and changes in net assets and is reported using accounting principles similar to proprietary funds.

The emphasis in fund financial statements is on the major funds in either the governmental or business-type activities categories. Nonmajor funds by category are

summarized into a single column. GASB No. 34 sets forth minimum criteria (percentage of the assets, liabilities, revenues, or expenditures/expenses of either fund category) for the determination of major funds.

The Town's fiduciary funds are presented in the fiduciary fund financial statements. Since by definition these assets are being held for the benefit of a third party and cannot be used to address activities or obligations of the government, these funds are not incorporated into the government-wide statements.

4. Proprietary Fund:

The Proprietary Fund is the fund used to account for all financial resources relating to the Parks and Recreation Department. The generally accepted accounting principles applicable are those similar to business in the private sector.

4. Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues or expenditures/expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. It relates to the timing of the measurements made regardless of the measurement focus applied:

a. Accrual:

Governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements and fiduciary fund financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

b. Modified Accrual:

The governmental funds financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual; i.e. both measurable and available. "Available" means collectible

within the current period or within 60 days after year end. Expenditures are generally

recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is

incurred. The exception to this general rule is that principal and interest on general

obligation long-term debt, if any, is recognized when due.

5. Financial Statement Amounts

a. Cash and Cash Equivalents:

The Town has defined cash and cash equivalents to include cash on hand, demand deposits, and cash with fiscal agents. Statutes authorize the Treasurer of the Town, as directed by the municipal officers, to invest all municipal funds, including reserve and trust funds, to the extent that the terms of the instrument, order, or article creating the fund do not prohibit the investment in financial institutions as described in Section 5706 MRSA and securities as described in Sections 5711 through 5717 MRSA.

b. Capital Assets:

Capital assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of 2,000.00 or more are reported at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are reported at fair market value as of the date received. Additions, improvements, and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives:

Buildings 20-50 Years
Machinery and Equipment 5-10 Years
Improvements 10-20 Years
Other Infrastructure 10-50 Years

c. Revenues:

Substantially, all governmental fund revenues are accrued. Property taxes are billed and collected within the same period in which the taxes are levied. In applying GASB No. 33 to grant revenues, the provider recognizes liabilities and expenses and the recipient recognizes receivables and revenue when the applicable eligibility requirements, including time requirements, are met. Resources transmitted before the eligibility requirements are met are reported as advances by the provider and deferred revenue by the recipient.

d. Expenditures:

Expenditures are recognized when the related fund liability is incurred.

e. Deferred Inflows and Outflows of Resources:

In addition to assets, the Statement of Net Position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense) until that time. The deferred outflows relate to the net pension liability, which include the Town's contributions subsequent to the measurement date, which is recognized as a reduction of the net pension liability in the subsequent year. They also include changes in assumptions, differences between expected and actual experience, and changes in proportion and differences between Town contributions and proportionate share of contributions, which are deferred and amortized over the average expected remaining service lives of active and inactive members in the plan.

In addition to liabilities, the Statement of Net Position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The deferred inflows relate to the net pension liability, which include the differences between expected and actual experience and changes in proportion and differences between Town contributions and proportionate share of contributions, which is deferred and amortized over the average expected remaining service lives of active and inactive members in the plan. They also include the net difference between projected and actual earnings on pension plan investments, which is deferred and amortized over a five-year period.

f. Use of Estimates:

The presentation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions

that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

g. Fund Balance:

In accordance with GASB Statement No. 54, the Town employs terminology and classifications for fund balance items as follows:

Nonspendable fund balances includes amounts that cannot be spent because they are not in spendable form or legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

Restricted fund balances represent those portions of fund equity that have externally

enforceable legal restrictions.

Committed fund balances are amounts that can be used only for specific purposes because of a formal action taken by town government. The fund balances in the Capital Projects Fund are in this category.

Assigned fund balances are amounts that the Town intends to use for specific purposes. The Board of Selectmen approved carryovers are included in assigned fund balances.

Unassigned fund balances are all amounts in the General Fund that are not assigned to another category. Only the General Fund can have an unassigned fund balance.

6. Implementation of New Accounting Standards

During the year ended December 31, 2019, the following statements of financial accounting standards issued by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board became effective:

- a. Statement No. 83, "Certain Asset Retirement Obligations". The objective of the Statement is to address accounting and financial reporting for certain asset retirement obligations (AROs). An ARO is a legally enforceable liability associated with the retirement of a tangible capital asset. A government that has legal obligations to perform future asset retirement activities related to its tangible capital assets should recognize a liability based on the guidance in this Statement. Management has determined that this statement is not applicable.
- b. Statement No. 84, "Fiduciary Activities". The objective of this Statement is to improve guidance regarding the identification of fiduciary activities for accounting and financial reporting purposes and how those activities should be reported. This Statement establishes criteria for identifying fiduciary activities of all state and local governments. The town is currently evaluating whether the government is controlling the assets of the fiduciary activity and the beneficiaries with whom a fiduciary relationship exists to determine if the fiduciary fund should be included in the basic financial statements of future years.

c. Statement No. 88, "Certain Disclosures Related to Debt, including Direct Borrowings and Direct Placements". The primary objective of this Statement is to improve the information that is disclosed in notes to government financial statements related to debt, including direct borrowings and direct placements. It also clarifies which liabilities governments should include when disclosing information related to debt. This Statement defines debt for purposes of disclosure in notes to financial statements as a liability that arises from a contractual obligation to pay cash (or other assets that may be used in lieu of cash) in one or more payments to settle an amount that is fixed at the date the contractual obligation is established. This Statement requires that additional essential information related to debt be disclosed in notes to financial statements, including unused lines of credit; assets pledged as collateral for the debt; and terms specified in debt agreements related to significant events of default with finance-related consequences, significant termination events with finance-related consequences, and significant subjective acceleration clauses. Management has determined that the impact of this Statement is not material to the financial statements.

7. Future Accounting Pronouncements

- a. Statement No. 87, "Leases", effective for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021. The objective of this Statement is to better meet the information needs of financial statement users by improving accounting and financial reporting for leases by governments. This Statement increases the usefulness of governments' financial statements by requiring recognition of certain lease assets and liabilities for leases that previously were classified as operating leases and recognized as inflows of resources or outflows of resources based on the payment provisions of the contract. It establishes a single model for lease accounting based on the foundational principle that leases are financings of the right to use an underlying asset. Under this Statement, a lessee is required to recognize a lease liability and an intangible right-to-use lease asset, and a lessor is required to recognize a lease receivable and a deferred inflow of resources, thereby enhancing the relevance and consistency of information about governments' leasing activities. Management has determined that the impact of this Statement is not material to the financial statements.
- b. Statement No. 89, "Accounting for Interest Cost Incurred before the End of a Construction Period", effective the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021. The objectives of this Statement are (1) to enhance the relevance and comparability of information about capital assets and the cost of borrowing for a reporting period and (2) to simplify accounting for interest cost incurred before the end of a construction period. This Statement establishes accounting requirements for interest cost incurred before the end of a construction period. Management has determined that the impact of this Statement is not material to the financial statements.
- c. Statement No. 90, "Majority Equity Interests an amendment of GASB Statements No. 14 and No. 61", effective for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020. The primary objectives of this Statement are to improve the consistency and

comparability of reporting a government's majority equity interest in a legally separate organization and to improve the relevance of financial statement information for certain component units. It defines a majority equity interest and specifies that a majority equity interest in a legally separate organization should be reported as an investment if a government's holding of the equity interest meets the definition of an investment. A majority equity interest that meets the definition of an investment should be measured using the equity method, unless it is held by a special-purpose government engaged only in fiduciary activities, a fiduciary fund, or an endowment (including permanent and term endowments) or permanent fund. Those governments and funds should measure the majority equity interest at fair value. Management has determined that the impact of this statement is not material to the financial statements.

8. Subsequent Events

The Town of Bristol has evaluated the subsequent events through January 22, 2020, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. No subsequent events were identified which required accrual or disclosure.

NOTE B - CASH:

The Town's cash is categorized to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by the Town at year end. These categories are defined as follows:

Category #1 - Insured or collateralized with securities held by the Town or by its agent in the Town's name.

Category #2 - Collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent in the Town's name.

Category #3 - Uncollateralized (This includes any bank balance that is collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution, or by its trust department or agent but not in the Town's name.)

NOTE E - GENERAL FUND BUDGET:

The Town operates on a net budget as compared with a gross budget. All revenues are not estimated, but are credited to the particular operating account. Certain revenues are dedicated for particular purposes by vote of the townspeople at the annual town meeting or at special town meetings.

At the annual town meeting, held in March of each year, the townspeople vote on various articles on which amounts for appropriations have been recommended by the Board of Selectmen and/or the budget committee.

NOTE F - ASSIGNED FOR OTHER PURPOSES:

Historically, the townspeople vote to carry certain departmental unexpended balances forward to the following year for expenditure. This is usually in lieu of additional appropriations in any particular account.

NOTE G - REVENUE RECOGNITION - PROPERTY TAXES:

The Town's property tax for the current year was levied May 23, 2019 on the assessed value listed as of April 1, 2019 for all taxable real and personal property located in the Town. Taxes were due September 15, 2019 with interest at 8% per annum or part thereof commencing September 16, 2019.

Tax liens are filed against delinquent real estate taxpayers after eight months but within one year of the original tax commitment. If the tax, interest, and costs have not been paid eighteen months after the filing of a lien certificate then the lien is automatically foreclosed.

The National Council on Governmental Accounting (N.C.G.A.) Interpretation No. 3 requires that property tax revenue be recognized only to the extent it will be collected within sixty days following the year end. The deferred tax revenue shown on the balance sheet represents property taxes not expected to be collected within sixty days after the year end.

Property taxes are recognized when they become available. Available includes those taxes expected to be collected within sixty days after year end as stated above.

NOTE H - MAINE PUBLIC EMPLOYEES RETIREMENT SYSTEM:

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Pensions - For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows for resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the Maine Public Employees Retirement System State Employee and Teacher Plan (SET Plan) and additions to/deductions from the Plan's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the Plans. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Maine Public Employees Retirement System

General Information about the Pension Plan

Plan Description - Teaching-certified employees of the Town of Bristol are provided with pensions through the Maine Public Employees Retirement System State Employee and Teacher Plan (SET Plan), cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plans, administered by the Maine Public Employees Retirement System (MPERS). Benefit terms are established in Maine statute. MPERS issues a publicly available financial report that can be obtained at www. mainepers.org.

Benefits Provided - The SET Plan provides defined retirement benefits based on members' average final compensation and service credit earned as of retirement. Vesting (i.e. eligibility for benefits upon reaching qualification) occurs upon the earning of five years of service credit. In some cases, vesting occurs on the earning of one year of service credit immediately preceding retirement at or after normal retirement age. For SET members, normal retirement age is 60, 62, or 65. The normal retirement age is determined by whether a member had met certain

creditable service requirements on specific dates, as established by statute. The monthly benefit of members who retire before normal retirement age by virtue of having at least 25 years of service credit is reduced by a statutorily prescribed factor for each year of age that a member is below her/his normal retirement age at retirement. MPERS also provides disability and death benefits, which are established by statute.

Contributions - Employee contribution rates are defined by law or Board rule and depend on the terms of the plan under which an employee is covered. Employer contributions are determined by actuarial valuations. The contractually required contribution rates are actuarially determined as an amount that, when combined with employee contributions, is expected to finance the costs of benefits earned by employees during the year, with an additional amount to finance any unfunded accrued liability.

SET Plan - Maine statute requires the State to contribute a portion of the Town's contractually required contributions. Employees are required to contribute 7.65% of their annual pay. The Town of Bristol's contractually required contribution rate for the year ended December 31, 2019 was 14.33% of annual payroll of which 4.16% of payroll was required from the Town and 215,643.76 was required from the State. Contributions to pension plan from the Town was 72,986.70 for the year ended December 31, 2019.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

The net pension liabilities were measured as of June 30, 2018 and the total pension liabilities used to calculate the net pension liabilities were determined by actuarial valuations as of that date. The Town's proportion of the net pension liabilities were based on projections of the Town's long-term share of contributions to the pension plans relative to the projected contributions of all participating School Administrative Units and the State (SET Plan), actuarially determined.

SET Plan - At June 30, 2019, the Town reported a liability for its proportionate share of the net pension liability that reflected a reduction for State pension support provided to the Town. The amount recognized by the Town as its proportionate share of the net pension liability, the related State support, and the total portion of the net pension liability that was associated with the Town were as follows:

Mortality rates were based on the RP2014 Total Dataset Healthy Annuitant Mortality Table for Males and Females.

The actuarial assumptions used in the June 30, 2018 valuation were based on the results of an actuarial experience study for the period July 1, 2005 to June 30, 2010.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighing the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. Best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class included in the pension plan's target asset allocation as of June 30, 2018 are summarized in the following table:

Discount Rate - The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 6.75% for the SET Plan. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rates assumed that employee contributions will be made at the current contribution rate and that contributions from participating local districts will be made at contractually required rates, actuarially determined. Based on these assumptions, the pension plans' fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current active and inactive employees. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liabilities.

General Information about the Pension Plan

Plan Description - Employees of the Town are provided with post employment benefits through the Maine Public Employees Retirement System Consolidated Plan, administered by the Maine Public Employers Retirement System (MPERS). Benefit terms are established in Maine statute. MPERS issues a publicly available financial report that can be obtained at www.mainepers.org.

Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB)

The Group Life Insurance Plans (the Plans) provide basic group life insurance benefits during retirement, to retirees who participated in the Plans prior to retirement for a minimum of 10 years (the 10-year participation requirement does not apply to recipients of disability retirement benefits).

The level of coverage in retirement is initially set to an amount equal to the retiree's average final compensation. The initial amount of basic life is then subsequently reduced at the rate of 15% per year to the greater of 40% of the initial amount or 2,500.00.

Funding Policy

Premium rates are those determined by the System's Board of Trustees to be actuarially sufficient to pay anticipated claims. Premiums for basic life insurance coverage for retired teachers are paid by the State as the total dollar amount of each year's annual required contribution.

On-Behalf Payments

As mentioned above, contributions are made by the System for participating retired teachers. The summary below provides the School Department's allocation of these contributions as well as the proportionate share of the net OPEB liability. The net OPEB liability is not recorded on the Town's financial statements since it is a liability of the State of Maine and not a liability of the Town.

NOTE K - RISK MANAGEMENT:

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. All significant losses are covered by commercial insurance. There has been no significant reduction in insurance coverage. Settlement amounts have not exceeded insurance coverage for the current year or the three prior years.

NOTE L - INTEREST COST INCURRED:

During the current year the Town incurred interest costs totaling 2,551.38 which was charged as an expense to protection.

NOTE M - OVERLAPPING DEBT:

The Town of Bristol is situated in Lincoln County and is therefore subject to annual assessment of its proportional share of county expenses. Long-term debt outstanding in Lincoln County for which the Town of Bristol would be proportionally responsible in the event the County defaulted, is approximately 4,297,400.00 at December 31, 2019. The Town of Bristol's share would be 13.6% of the debt, or approximately 587,025.00.

NOTE N - EXPENDITURES IN EXCESS OF APPROPRIATIONS:

During the year there were overdrafts in Homestead and Marsh Island Tax. Historically, Marsh Island Tax has been funded from unappropriated surplus, and the Homestead Appropriation was 3,473.35 higher than actual revenue.

NOTE 0 - JOINT VENTURE:

The Towns of Bristol and South Bristol have entered into an interlocal agreement to provide for solid waste disposal facilities for the two communities. The joint venture is administered by a joint board composed of the Board of Selectmen from each town. All costs and revenues are shared in the ratio of 60% - Bristol and 40% - South Bristol.
