FIRST DAY—FIRST SESSION

Wednesday, December 9th, 1931, 9 A. M.

The Sixty-fourth Session of the South Carolina Annual Conference was called to order by Bishop Frederick T. Keeney, of the Atlanta Area in Trinity Methodist Episcopal church, Camden, S. C., promptly at nine o'clock, Wednesday morning, December 9th.

Following the "call to worship" by Bishop Keeney, the Conference sang with much devotion hymn No. 560 "And Are We Yet Alive." Bishop Keeney fervently prayed the blessings of God and of His Son Jesus Christ upon the Conference. Rev. J. W. Taylor led the singing of "Saviour More Than Life to Me."

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper

"We approached the Sacrament a year ago speaking from the 13th Chapter of St. John. To day we shall study" said the Bishop, "for the introductory of the Lord's Supper the 22nd chapter of St. Luke."

The Bishop stressed the actual Spiritual Presence of Jesus Christ in the elements and directed the conference to that prayerful attitude whereby it could feel the presence in Love, Mercy and Power. He pled for a strong earnest everyday contract with Christ as the only medium for a sin sick world, so full of sorrow and misgivings. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered by Bishop Keeney, the eight District Superintendents and the Pastor of the church.

The Roll Call

D. S. Curry, the secretary of the last Annual Conference, called the Conference Roll, to which 156 members and eight probationists answered the "Call". The secretary of the last annual conference called the names of Wm. R. Eaddy, J. W. White, F. W. Vance, D. M. Minus, D. F. Tillman, A. H. Hayes, Paul Reddish, O. Blassingame, G. W. Cooper, H. L. Davis, J. S. Tyler, T. J. E. Ball, C. L. Lindsey. The entire conference rose in silent respect while Dr. L. M. Dunton

prayed for the families and friends of the pastors that had gone to be "with Him forever more."

Bishop F. T. Keeney introduced Dr. L. M. Dunton who read a beautiful tribute on the life of Mrs. Mary E. Dunton, who died May 26th, 1931.

The Bishop introduced the Rev. B. F. Bradford, District Superintendent of the Sumter District, who gave words of Welcome on behalf of the Sumter District.

Bishop Keeney read a very cordial letter from the Mayor of Camden, S. C., then introduced Mr. I. B. English who spoke words of welcome on behalf of the church. Dr. J. W. Boykin of the Baptist church gave words of Welcome in behalf of the churches of the city.

Dr. Warren G. Ariail of the Methodist Episcopal church

South, brought greetings and words of welcome from the white people of the city of Camden, S. C.

Bishop Keeney pleasantly thanked the speakers for their cordial words of welcome.

The District Superintendents of the Beaufort, Bennettsville, Charleston, Florence, Greenville, Orangeburg, Spartanburg and Sumter districts passed in character and reported nothing against the pastors of their district.

Rev. H. H. Cooper, the secretary of the cabinet read the recommendations from the cabinet. The cabinet recommended the Order of the Day for Thursday, ten o'clock be the election of the Delegates for the General Conference, and that just prior to the election the class for admission would be admitted. On motion of A. R. Howard, the recommendations of the cabinet were adopted.

Introductions

The following brethren were introduced by the Bishop: Drs. Davis, Shaw, Sweeney and Hughes.

Dr. A. G. Townsend was introduced as the Special agent of the Book Concern. He presented checks, from the Book Concern \$417.62 and the chartered fund \$50.00.

Bishop Keeney read a statement from the Board of Pension and Relief. The Conference ordered the statement printed in the Journal.

Unexpended balance 1930-31: Distribution \$447.42; Board's Appropriation regular \$792. Extra \$180.00. Interest on Permanent fund to Dec. 1st, 1931, \$293.18. Interest on balance in Stewards fund to Dec. 1st, 1931, \$77.39. Total Credit \$1,789.99.

Bishop Keeney introduced Dr. W. A. C. Hughes representing the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension who delivered one of the most eloquent addresses heard during the session. His Central thought "A Call to Service" was developed into a spiritual appeal for a higher type of service in this day of new social orders. John the Baptist heard the call and through his preaching transformed Judea. Paul heard it and built a new religious impact that turned the world thinkers to new social ideals of the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man. He closed with the plea for a ministry of personal evangelism.

"What a Friend We Have In Jesus," was sung by the Conference.

FIRST DAY—SECOND SESSION

Wednesday, December 9th, 1931, 3:00 P. M.

The afternoon session of the first day of the South Carolina Conference began with the call to order by Bishop Fredrick T. Keeney on the minute of 3 o'clock. The Conference was opened with several Negro Spirituals. Dr. H. L. Davis offered the prayer.

Bishop Keeney directed the Conference to report on Pastor's salary, District Supt. Support, Episcopal Fund, Pension Relief, Convention and Accessions. On motion of W. F. Smith, the Conference adopted this method of reporting.

The Bishop called the Pastors of the Beaufort Bennettsville, Florence and Greenville Districts and they reported the work done on these districts.

Promptly at 4:30 o'clock Bishop Keeney introduced Dr. Davis who took charge of the World Service hour. He invited Drs. Howard Shaw, Butler and Sweeney to the platform. The Conference sang "Stand Up, Stand Up, for Jesus" lead by Dr. Davis.

Dr. Davis thanked the South Carolina Conference for the financial support given the World Service Commission and urged the further support to offset the deficit that the commission is now facing.

Dr. Sweeney the representative of the Board of Pension and Relief was questioned by Dr. Davis regarding the funds coming into the Board from the World Service Commission. Dr. Sweeney stated that of the World Service Dollar given out of the Conference to his Board more than three for one came back. He said that \$950.00 was coming back for Pensions.

Dean Pearson under question said that Claflin College could not run were it not for the World Service Dollar.

Dr. A. R. Howard, secretary of Colored Work of the Board of Prohibition and Public Morals, said in answering the questions of Dr. Davis, that more than 750,000 young Negro students and people of all walks of life had signed the "pledge" not to drink. "The Board", he said "depends largely upon the World Service Commission for it's support."

Bishop Keeney was asked to represent the Board of Foreign Missions. This always seems to be his highest joy. It is reported that he is more completely conversant with conditions in China than any one of the Bishops. He spoke of the urgent need of our Foreign Work, and the Home Land

responsibility to these peoples of the other side. He always thinks and speaks of the devotion and sacrifice of the Chinese people. He said the work there will stop if we, the church, permit the further decrease in giving.

"Savior Thy Dying Love" or "Something for Jesus" was touchingly sung by the entire congregation.

Dr. F. H. Butler representing the Board of Education said that the Cultural Development of 700,000 young people of the church are effected by the gifts coming through from the World Service Commission. "The Board," he said, "spends with great wisdom every dollar coming into its hands."

Dr. Shaw, the editor of the Christian Advocate, South Western Edition said that the religious press was the speaking agency of the World Service commission in presenting its claims intelligently and with cultural emphasis to great masses that follow its standards. The outstanding advocate of human rights, educational, social and religious is the religious press of which the South Western is a happy member.

The Board of Hospital and Homes was represented by Dr. Davis. He said that the five thousand Nurses of the many Methodist hospitals had given service to more than a million people last year, and that such needful work to the suffering would be cut if the church did not rally its forces and come to the aid of the World Service agency. He called upon the district superintendents to rally their forces to the one great task of the church and was assured that to the man the one task of the general church would not suffer. The church he said is lifting the moral and religious standards of the peoples of the earth through its giving to the World Service Commission.

Bishop Keeney stated that the Conference when adjourned would return without Conference Session for the gathering of reports by the District Superintendent at 7:30 p. m. Announcements. Benediction, Dr. Davis.

SECOND DAY—THIRD SESSION

Thursday, December 10th, 1931, 9:00 A. M.

Bishop Fredrick T. Keeney was the presiding officer when the South Carolina Conference was called to order at 9 o'clock, Thursday morning. Devotional services began with the singing of Hymn No. 458 "Jesus I My Cross Have Taken", after which the Rev. A. Mack offered prayer.

Bishop Keeney read six verses of the 15th chapter of St.

Luke. His subject or central theme, The Value of the Lost Member. The chief business of the minister today is to gather the lost, touch the broken hearted, lead the fallen to higher planes of right living. Our task is to bring the member that is out of harmony with God and His church, back to the Fold of the church, said the Bishop with a spiritual emphasis that lifted the Conference a glorious response of Amens. We need men in these trying days who are fired with the desire to have the peopled saved and to bring back the lost ones. The Bishop stated that the Savannah Conference reported 516 conversions, but that lost to the Conference was 1007 and that the Atlanta Conference reported 633 conversions with a loss of 1235 in membership.

The poor need sympathy and guidance from the pastor and officials at all times. The converted life will render such to them. The membership should be taught to give something in money and service. He closed his address with a fervent prayer in behalf of the lost membership of the church.

Norwood, Vivian V. Richardson and Boyd C. M. Wilson were advanced to the studies of the Third Year.

Rev. H. H. Cooper, secretary of the Cabinet read the cabinet's recommendation as to Special Committees and Tellers for the election of General Conference delegates. On motion of T. J. E. Curry the recommendations were adopted.

The Tellers were as follows: 1st Set: D. E. Thomas, H. B. Jones, T. J. E. Curry, F. H. Grant. 2nd set: N. T. Bowen, C. R. Brown, Jr., J. W. Buddin, G. C. Brown.

The Order of the Day was called exactly at ten o'clock, and the First Set of Tellers took the first ballot. The result of the 1st Ballot was the election of A. R. Howard, he having received 89 votes out of 153 was declared elected.

The second set of Tellers took the second ballot, resulting in no election. The third ballot was taken and on vote of the Conference was sealed to be read at the 2:30 p. m. session of the Conference.

The closing prayer was offered by Bishop Keeney. He pronounced the benediction.

SECOND DAY—FOURTH SESSION

2:30 P. M.

Promptly at two-thirty o'clock Thursday afternoon Bishop Keeney presiding, the South Carolina Conference came to order. "Sweet Hour of Prayer" was sung. Bishop Keeney prayed that God would direct the election and guide the conference aright.

H. H. Cooper, secretary of the Cabinet read the list of the Standing Committee as recommended by the Cabinet, See Committee.

The third ballot was opened, counted and read. It resulted in the election of N. W. Greene and C. C. Clark. N. W. Green 85 votes, C. C. Clark 75 votes out of 142 cast.

The fourth ballot resulted in no election, and the fifth ballot resulted in none.

The sixth ballot was taken, the Rev. H. H. Cooper, receiving 87 votes was declared elected the fourth delegate.

D. S. Curry: "Bishop, I move that the South Carolina Conference now proceed to elect three Reserve delegates to General Conference meeting in Atlantic, New Jersey, May 1st, 1932."

F. H. Grant: "I second the motion." The motion was put and then voted to elect three Reserve Delegates to the General Conference.

The first ballot was taken for the Reserve Delegates, resulting in the election of J. W. Taylor, 1st Reserve and James F. Page, 2nd Reserve Delegate. A second ballot for the third Reserve Delegate was taken and sealed to be opened at the 7 p. m. session.

Benediction, Bishop Keeney.

SECOND DAY—FIFTH SESSION—7:00 P. M.

The Conference came to order at 7:00 P. M. with Bishop

Keeney of the Atlanta Area presiding. "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart" was sung and the Bishop offered prayer.

The second ballot for the third Reserve Delegate was opened; the Rev. S. A. Funches having received the majority was declared elected the third Reserve Delegate to the 1932 General Conference.

Constitutional Amendment

The Constitutional Amendment as handed down by the Pennsylvania Conference, as to changing the words of the Constitution or amending paragraph 38, section 2, by inserting between "Conference" and "four" 89 for nothing against.

Amend Par. 39, Sec. 2 substituting for the sentence Annual Conference may elect Reserve Delegates not exceeding three, etc., to read Annual Conference may elect as many Reserve Delegates as it may determine, not exceeding the number of its delegates. The vote stood 89 for nothing against.

Amend. Par. 39, section 4 by substituting for the sentence A lay electoral conference may elect Reserve Delegates not exceeding three in number and not exceeding its number of Delegates; the following A lay electoral Conference may elect as many Reserve Delegates as it may determine, not exceeding the number of its delegates, was carried 76 for and nothing against.

The pastors of the Orangeburg, Spartanburg and Sumter Districts reported as directed by the Conference.

Announcements were made.

The pronouncement of the Benediction was given by Bishop Kenney.

THIRD DAY — SIXTH SESSION

Tuesday, December 11th, 1931—9 A. M.

The Sixth Session of the South Carolina Conference was assembled through the call of Bishop Keeney at 8 o'clock. Tuesday morning, December 11th, 1931. "Come ye that love the Lord" was heartily sung. Bishop Keeney offered the prayer.

The Journal of the preceding sessions of the South Carolina Conference were read and in the usual way adopted.

The Conference recognized with great appreciation the telegram from Dr. Allen MacRoshie bringing greetings to Bishop Keeney and the Conference and calling attention to the Pamphlets, Lewis "Preaching and Theology" and Eiseles "The Preacher of to-day."

The Secretary read a resolution touching the service interest and devotion of Bishop Keeney to the task and duties of the Atlanta Area. The resolution was put to the Conference by the Secretary and unanimously adopted by the Conference. The resolution directs the delegation to request the return of Bishop Keeney to the Atlanta Area and that the boundaries of the Area remain as now is.

Dr. A. R. Howard read, motioned and the Conference voted a splendid set of resolutions touching the sainted lives of Mrs. Bishop F. T. Keeney and Mrs. Dr. L. M. Duntun and ministers wives. This resolution directs that two memorial windows be placed in the new Trinity M. E. church at Orangeburg, not costing more than one hundred dollars each with such wording as stated in the resolution.

The morning's address by the Bishop was taken from the sixth Chapter of the Acts of the Apostles and the third and fifth verses. Was delivered to a joint meeting of the South Carolina Conference and the Lay Electoral Conference. It was the most direct appeal to the Conference and a group of laymen for a life of righteousness that has been the pleasure of the group to hear. Some of the high points of the address. St. Stephen though a layman was so consecrated to the will and task of Christ and the New Church that his face shone like that of an angel. Philip, a layman devoted mass evangelism. These men and many more like them turn the world up side down, because they were devoted to the ideals of Jesus Christ.

He directed his appeal in such earnest and sympathetic language that Ministers and laymen alike, felt the "call" to that higher life and larger service.

The district Superintendent of the Beaufort District S. A. Funches, having previously passed in character rendered the report of the Beaufort District.

The District Superintendent of the Bennettsville District having also passed in Character, reported the work of the District.

Dr. S. H. Sweeney, the representative of the Board of Pension - Relief was introduced and with positive frankness stressed the matter of the Claimants Pension to the Conference. At the conclusion of this splendid appeal, a collection of \$40.50 was taken for the Cause of Pension-Relief.

Rev. B. F. Bradford rendered a progressive report for the Sumter District. He having previously passed in character.

Bishop Keeney introduced Rev. S. M. McCollum of the

Spartanburg District who read a fine report of the work done on the Spartanburg District.

Rev. D. H. Stanton, D. D., the representative of the American Bible Society and Rev. D. D. Martin, D. D., of Gamon Theological Seminary were invited to a seat on the platform and introduced to the Conference.

Dr. Martin in dignified language laid the interest of Gamon on the hearts of the ministers. He asked the Conference for two scholarships of fifty dollars each for two worthy young men. He got them. The Conference raised one hundred dollars for Gamon Theological Seminary.

Dr. D. H. Stanton delivered an eloquent and instructive address in behalf of the American Bible Society and the Summer School for under-graduates of the Conference.

The Conference voted to call the afternoon session at 3:30 p. m.

The several heads of Committees the Bishop and the pastor of the church made announcement.

THIRD DAY—SEVENTH SESSION Friday, December 11th, 1931—3:30 P. M.

The pleasing handshaking and cordial felicitations stopped at the call of Bishop Frederick T. Kenney on the dot 3:30 p. m. "Jesus Lover of My Soul" was sung after which Bishop Kenney led the Conference in prayer.

The Journal of the Sixth Session of the Conference was read and in the usual manner adopted.

Dr. A. R. Howard. I move that the three District Superintendents living in Orangeburg, with three members being appointed by the Cabinet be empowered to carry out the terms of the resolution regarding the memorial windows to the memory of Mrs. Keeney, Mrs. Dunton and the ministers wives. It was carried.

The Committee Consisting of Drs. J. F. Page and H. H. Cooper with Dr. S. H. Sweeney to visit the Lay Conference in behalf of Pension and Relief reported \$27.60 donated by the Lay Conference.

The Florence District was called and the Rev. H. H. Cooper, having previously passed in character reported the work of the District. This District made the best average report, said the District Superintendent.

The Rev. J. E. C. Jenkins, making his last report for the Greenville District, having spent six years there, reported

the district doing splendid work. At the conclusion of the report, the Rev. E. C. Wright of Easley presented Dr. Jenkins with a purse of money in token of his kindness and service to the men of the District. Dr. Jenkins in choice words thanked the district for the gift.

Dr. A. R. Howard with representatives from each of the eight districts, came before the Conference and presented Bishop Keeney with a beautiful genuine leather dressing case.

This took Bishop Keeney at surprise, for it was just Thursday when Dr. J. B. Randolph, President of Claflin in very gracious words for service rendered the college by the Bishop had presented him a genuine leather brief case. The Bishop: "Brethren I am deeply touched with such kindness as the gift suggests. I thought Dr. Randolph's gift was for all of you. I graciously thank you."

The Bishop based his morning's message from the 2nd chapter of Timothy through the 15th verse. His subject, "Perfect Love." Jesus wants to have a love like His. The Methodist preachers ought and must have love enough to go into all parts of the world with the gospel of Jesus. The preacher that remains from his charge until Sunday is doing only fifty per cent. of his duty to the people and the church.

The one thing that has made us great is that we have laid stress upon the doctrine of love.

His part of the address dealing with "Call to Preach"

and the qualification and work of the ministry was very instructive and helpful to the Conference. "Go" said the Bishop love and be disciples to all men. Build up the Kingdom and bring in the lost ones. That the mission of the true preacher of God.

The closing prayer by the Bishop was a fervent petition to the Christ that the Conference might see and go forth to the task of building anew the kingdom.

A. R. Howard: I move that the expense of the secretary-Treasurer of the Pension-Relief Dept. be cut to \$15.00 per annum. It was carried.

The resolution calling for two new memorial windows in Trinity Church, Orangeburg in memory of Mrs. Dunton, Mrs. Georgia Keeney and Ministers Wives also called for a committee to see that it be carried out. Committee is as follows: Jas. F. Page, S. M. McCollum, S. A. Funches, District Superintendents, Robt. F. Freeman, the pastor of the church and Dr. J. B. Randolph, President of Claflin College. Provision was made that for additional members to be added

at the discretion of the committee.

The cabinet recommended that for the publication of the Annual Conference minutes, that each charge be assessed 1-2 of one per cent of the Pastor's cash salary from year to year at Conference.

ANNIVERSARIES AND PUBLIC SERVICES

TUESDAY EVENING, DECEMBER 8th 1931.

Camden, S. C.

It is refreshing to turn to the philosophy and method of Dr. L. M. Dunton, who is concerned with an enriched life flooded with God-consciousness and who presided at the Clafin Roll Call Tuesday evening, December 8th, 1931. He lined O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing, which was sung with delight by the vast audience after which the venerable Doctor offered prayer. The happy strain of "Come Thou Almighty King" came from the audience to the spiritual enjoyment of all that joined the singing.

There is another law of human life which admonishes the complete correlation of all education enterprises. It is the law of social solidarity. This seemed to have been the theme of Prof. MacCullum of the Department of Religious Education of Clafin College. Races, nationalities, classes are all inter-dependent upon the former statement, said the Professor.

It matters not, said Dean Pearson with what educational agency one may be identified, the home, the church or the College, he must endeavor to see the task in terms of a unified world and work un-remittingly for a synthesis of all the factors involved in putting Christian truth into life. This is what the teaching force of Clafin College is doing and deserves the support of the Conference.

It was here that the Browning Home girls rendered sev-

eral splendid selections for the entertainment of the meeting.

Dr. L. M. Dunton, introduced Dr. F. H. Butler, the representative of the Board of Education who said the Christian College cannot long endure without the sacrificial dollar. And without the Christian College the hope of civilization is lost.

Dr. Dunton in a fine flow of words introduced Dr. J. B. Randolph, president of Claflin College. He said that agencies of different type and kind were asking why not "merge." It should be understood the real basis for such an educational merger is not an administrative concern, but the inexorable laws of human life Christian Education must take account of the unfolding process of life. It cannot go faster than childhood unfolds to maturity. Claflin College is needed more today as a guide through this complex educational dilemma than ever before. He reported that the Conference had paid in to Claflin \$5614.17 and urged that every appointment stand by the College financially with their influence.

Bishop Keeney, who came before the meeting through the introduction of Dr. Dunton spoke of the origin of Colleges, stating that Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Dartmouth and many others were chartered for the purpose of teaching men the way of life through the gospel of Jesus. He also said that the Christian College was the balance wheel of the human families of the world. In them the child is taught the way of Life and the law of Service. At the conclusion of his address, he called the Roll of the Conference and \$1747.45 was reported. For full account see list of charges as reported during the year.

WEDNESDAY EVENING **Rev. C. R. Brown, Sr., Presiding**

The Anniversaries of the Board of Education and Pension and Relief was held in the splendid adapted Trinity M. E. church, December 9th, 1931 at 7:30 p. m., the Rev. C. R. Brown, Sr., presiding. The Trinity choir excelled itself in singing "The World for Christ." Dr. A. P. Shaw, the editor the South Western offered prayer.

The Franklin quartet rendered two very beautiful selections to the delight of the audience and the choir charmingly sang "I was Glad When They Said Unto Me."

The speaker representing the Board of Education, Dr. F. A. Butler was introduced by the master of ceremonies and

with much eloquence, presented the work of the Board to the People, from the subject "Christian Education, as interpreted by the Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal church.

The anthem "Use Me" was in harmony with the message delivered.

Further intertainment by the Franklin quartet singing "Dip your fingers in the Water" and "All Over this World" was given long applause from the audience

Rev. C. R. Brown, master of ceremonies presented Dr. S. H. Sweeney, who spoke from the theme "The Preacher". The theme was developed into one of the most earnest appeals on behalf of the "Preacher", especially the retired preacher, that has been the pleasure of the Conference to hear.

A BRIEF RECORD OF THE LIFE AND ACTIVITIES OF MARY PHELPS DUNTON

Mary Phelps-Dunton, the only wife of Dr. Lewis M. Dunton, was born in Martinsburg, New York, May the nineteenth, eighteen hundred and forty nine; and passed to her heavenly reward in Orangeburg, South Carolina, May the twenty-fifth, nineteen thirty-one, aged eighty-two years and six days. Her parents belonged to strict puritan stock, both being active members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Mrs. Dunton's father's big over-shot water wheel ground the community's wheat, corn, oats, rye and barley, through many long and eventful years. His old red mill had the distinction of being one of the main stations, and a safe rendezvous, of all passengers on the famous underground rail road. Mrs. Dunton when a mere child, assisted her mother in preparing bountiful meals for run-away slaves, enroute for freedom in Canada.

There were four children, all of whom were raised under painstaking home regulations; none roamed about at night, but rather—spent their evenings at home with their books, papers, and music. Mrs. Dunton had one sister, and two brothers—both of whom became ministers in the Methodist Episcopal church. All of the children became public school teachers; and one brother, a graduate of Syracuse University, became the Principal of two leading Methodist Seminaries in New York State.

Mrs. Dunton was educated in private schools, and became a teacher in Bostwick Academy and at Falley Seminary. She also took a course of study at Chautauqua, New York; and later completed her work in the Modern Languages in Paris, France—where she received a “Certificate of Capacity.” Upon the recommendation of Dr. R. S. Rust, Bishop H. W. Warren, and others, she received the honorary degree of Master of Arts from a Western College.

In January eighteen seventy-three, under the order of a physician, Lewis M. Dunton came to South Carolina in the interest of his health; and, at the suggestion of President Alonzo Webster, taught two classes in Claflin University until the following June. Finding that the change of climate was proving beneficial to his lung trouble, and having become intensely interested in what seemed to be a field of great usefulness, he returned to New York, and on October the fifteenth married the lady to whom he had been engaged to for several years. They left immediately for Beaufort, South Carolina after the emancipation, until the

regular meeting of the S. C. Annual Conference in Columbia, 1874. At this time Dr. Dunton joined the Conference and was sent by Bishop Haven to John Wesley Church in Greenville. After serving three years—both as pastor of the church and principal of the Allen Graded School; and after three years at Centenary Church in Charleston; then one year more at Greenville, he was appointed Presiding Elder of the Greenville District, which then included thirteen counties.

In 1883, upon the recommendations of Bishop H. W. Warren and others, Dr. Dunton was elected Vice-President of Claflin University, and the following year President of Claflin University, and the State Agricultural & Mechanical College serving both institutions until the separation in 1896, from which time he continued as President of Claflin until his resignation in 1922.

A statement of the foregoing details has seemed necessary in order to link Mrs. Dunton more closely with the varied activities of her long and useful life on the Greenville District, and as one of the original organizers of the Womans Home Missionary Society, and as a maid of all work and teacher of modern languages in Claflin University.

In those early days there were no railroads through the Greenville District and travel was limited to horse and carriage, and often over almost impassable roads. Mrs. Dunton usually accompanied her husband on his trips; and while he attended to his disciplinary duties, she organized Sunday Schools, addressed temperance gatherings, and talked to the women on various health, social, and domestic affairs. She pledged over eight thousand to total abstinence from intoxicating drinks, and many scores from the use of tobacco. She used to tell the people that if the Lord had intended that they should smoke He would have built a little chimney in the top of their heads.

Bishop H. W. Warren, whose headquarters were at Atlanta, learning of the interest Mrs. Dunton was awakening on the District, made a special journey to Greenville to obtain her consent to go to Cincinnati and assist certain ladies who were planning an organization for the betterment of the freed women of the South.

Mrs. J. C. Hartzell, afterwards Mrs. Bishop Hartzell, had started a similar movement in New Orleans, which was followed closely by Mrs. Dunton on the Greenville District; a little later a similar work was started in Atlanta. With these three beginnings, the Womans Home Missionary Society was organized in the early eighties, with Lucy Webb

Hayes, the leading lady of the land, as President; and Mrs. Dr. R. S. Rust as Secretary.

Mrs. Dunton was called to Cincinnati, and in company with Mrs. Rust, visited 28 annual conferences in about as many States; presenting the cause, organizing Societies in many Methodist Episcopal churches, with Mrs. Rust handling the business and Mrs. Dunton making the inspirational addresses. This was the initial movement which resulted in the establishment of one of the largest and most efficient organizations of the Methodist Episcopal Church: The Woman's Home Missionary Society.

Bishop Charles H. Fowler, who had repeatedly heard Mrs. Dunton speak, handed her the following commendation: "I have long known Mrs. Dunton, the wife of President Dunton of Claflin University, South Carolina. She is a modest, successful, worker for the cause which has absorbed her energies for many years. I know you will be pleased with her when you hear her for His cause. Always sincerely, C. H. Fowler, Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Buffalo, New York."

I was profoundly moved by the remarkable address made by Mrs. Dunton before the Conference. I am sure it sent us all forth with a new consecration to service in which we shall find the joy of sacrifice.

In 1903 Mrs. T. L. Tompkinson edited a book entitled: "Twenty Years' History of the Woman's Home Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church" and published by the Woman's Home Missionary Society. I quote a few select passages from that book, a copy of which I have in my library.

"Mrs. Dunton's experience on the Greenville District eminently fitted her to stand by the side of Mrs. Rust in many Northern Conferences and other assemblies—where they co-jointly presented the work and enlisted hosts of sympathizers. In more than one of the strong Conference organizations of the North and East the women remember with gratitude the days when those able addresses inspired

them to say: 'We will gladly help in such good work as this.' "

"Soon after Dr. Dunton became President of Claflin University, a movement was inaugurated to establish a Home for Girls at Orangeburg. Mrs. Dunton, who had given a large part of her time to the Greenville District, and later to a canvass of the Conferences in the North—in which she solicited aid for the Woman's Home Missionary Society, was so impressed with the suggestion of a Model Home, that a building was set apart on the Campus, and Mrs. Dunton gave of her own household furnishings to hasten the opening, which occurred on November 12, 1883."

"The venture succeeded so well that a plea was sent to the annual meetings of the Society in 1884, asking for a new building and better accommodations. In response, the ladies of the Philadelphia Conference pledged one thousand dollars for a new building, to be named: "Simpson Home". The following year Mrs. Dunton visited Philadelphia and spoke in many of the churches in that Conference; soliciting contributions, and securing pledges. The Home was built by the School of Carpentry; Dr. Dunton himself supervising; thus saving some hundreds of dollars to the Society. Dr. Dunton's cooperation has been invaluable in advancing the interests of the Society."

"In 1885 the fourth annual meeting of the Society was held in Arch Street M. E. church, Philadelphia; and was presided over by "The First Lady of the Land", Lucy Webb Hayes. The session was remarkable for the many distinguished speakers of both sexes. (Follows a long list including: Mrs. Clinton B. Fisk, Mrs. E. L. Rust, Mrs. R. W. P. Goff, Mrs. James Mather, Frances E. Willard, Bishops Vincent, and Walden, Dr. J. M. Buckley, Bishop Atticus G. Haygood of Georgia, and Mrs. Dunton) 'who from twelve years of labor among freed women came to tell of their needs and the success and practicability of the Model Home.' "

"In 1895, every available space in the Simpson Home being taken, it was decided to erect an Industrial Hall; the ladies of Binghamton (upon the appeal of Mrs. Dunton) contributing three hundred dollars. About this time the ladies determined upon an advance movement. Claflin U. has more than one thousand students, numerous dormitories and buildings, and the most extensive Manual Training department of any of the Freedmen's Aid Schools. The general scope of the school, and the special work for boys has at-

tained such proportions that the Model Home, as a provision for the industrial training for girls, was no longer considered adequate. It was decided to abandon the Home boarding department; remove certain partitions; finish the Hall and enlarge the equipment. This having been accomplished—three hundred girls of the University classes will receive instruction in scientific cooking, dress-making and draughting, minninery, and maual training."

As an item of historical interest to both Claflin University, and Browing Home and Mather Academy, we quote further from the same source.

"Browning Home and Mather Academy."

"Beautifully located in Camden, S. C., is the Browning Industrial Home and the Mather Academy. Here Mrs. Sarah A. Mather purchased property and opened a school for colored children; with herself teaching and carrying all of the expense. Through her influence the New England Southern Conference undertook in 1884, the erection of an Industrial Home. In 1887, October 10, the Home was opened in a rented house, with an enrollment of 26."

"A bequest from a departed worker, Mrs. F. O. Browning, was a welcome help to the ladies who had 'searched Jerusalem with lighted candles' in a heroic endeavor to complete the building. In deference to Mrs. Mather's wish, the home was named: 'The Browning Home.' "

"In 1890, the Society purchased, for \$1700, the property of Mrs. Mather in Camden, a lot of twenty-seven acre, with a commodious house; Mrs. Mather donating three hundred dollars of this amount."

"In 1899, another gift came from Mrs. Mather, twelve hundred dollars, for the erection of another building; this was followed a little later by another gift of two thousand dollars. In the year 1900, by request of Mrs. Mather, it became Mather Academy, as a memorial to her deceased husband."

An occasional review of the past, particularly as it relates to individuals and Institutions that have been helpful to us, should be considered not simply as items of historical interest, but also as tributes to the memory of those who gave their time, talent and very life to the cause of Christian education.

May God help us to emulate their virtues and leave behind us a record posterity shall delight to revere.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE STANDARD LEADERSHIP TRAINING SCHOOL

Honorable Bishop, Officers, Members and Friends of the S. C. Conference:

We the Board of Managers of the Standard Leadership Training School of the S. C. Conference, very cheerfully make the following report:

This year, two schools of Standard Leadership Training were staged: One in Greenville and one in Darlington. The dates of these schools were, August 24-29 and Sept. 1-6.

The following instructors were present and in a very able and efficient manner presented their subjects. Dean, A. R. Howard. Rev. N. W. Greene taught "The Teaching Work of the Church." Mrs. P. M. Gibbes, taught "Early Adolescence." Prof. A. McAllums, taught "Message of the Church." Rev. E. M. Hurley, taught "Later Childhood."

These teachers taught in both schools. Though this year no appropriation was made by the Board of Education for this school on account of lack of funds, still these teachers did their work well without remuneration, not even being paid fully their expense of travel.

The total enrollment of both schools was about 75. This is our third year of accredited work, and certificates were issued to those completing satisfactorily their courses of study.

The devotional messages delivered by Dr. Graves of the M. E. Church South, Drs. W. S. Thompson, Curry and Summers, were inspirational and our hearts burned within us as they spoke to us beside the way.

The dulciter music rendered by the various, vested choirs was greatly enjoyed by all.

In view of the great success at this our third session of the S. L. T. S. we your Board of Managers, do submit the following items for your indorsement:

1. That next year we operate two schools, one in the upper and one in the lower part of the state, in order that both parts of the state may be reached and cultivated at less expense.

2. That each D. S., a pastor and a layman from each charge constitute a Promoting Committee to help further this imperative educational and religious program.

3. That each pastor pledge himself to raise at least \$1.00 for the support of said school and turn over same to their respective district superintendent before July first and that he also see that his charge is well represented at the school.
