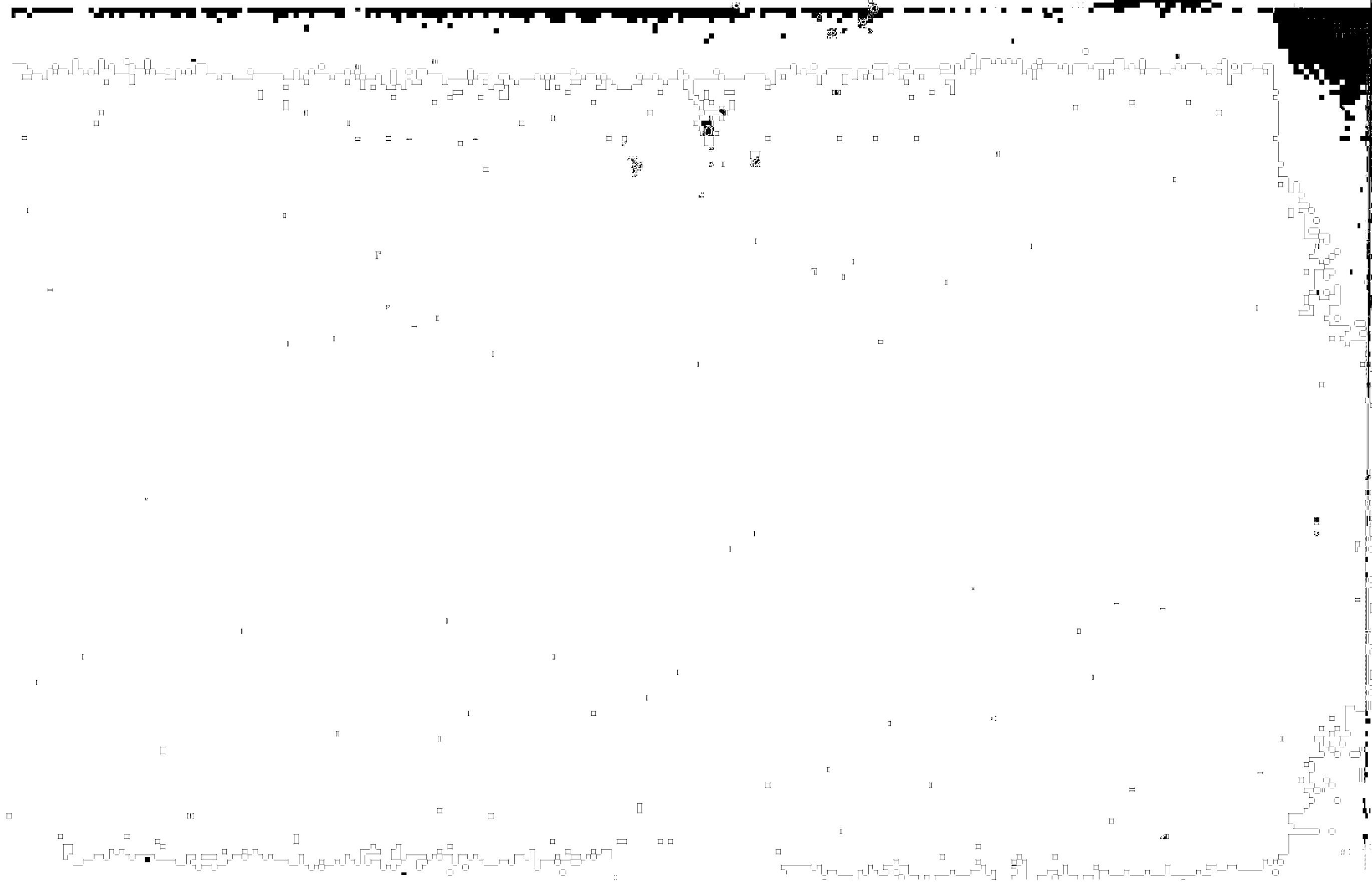

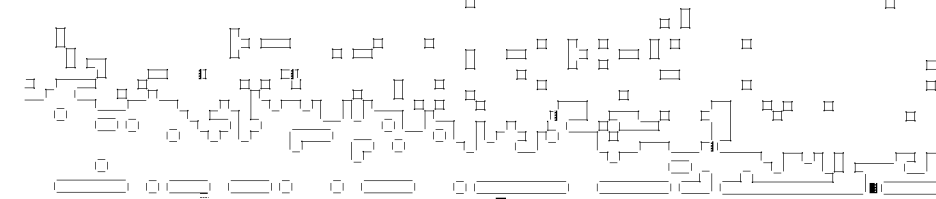

MOTION—James Ashley moved that we send greetings to the Southern Baptist meeting at Denver, Colorado and the Associate Reformed Presbyterians meeting at Bon Clarken at Flat Rock, North Carolina. The motion was seconded. It passed.

THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER—Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr. presided at the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. He was assisted by District Superintendents Martin, James, Holler, Parker, and the Host Pastor, Dr. Bryan Crenshaw. The sermon of the evening was delivered by Dr. James S. Barrett.

SECOND DAY — TUESDAY MORNING

June 2, 1970

THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER was observed in the Mickel Chapel, celebrated by the Reverend Allen E. Long and the Reverend Christopher L. Poole, with the sermon by Dr. H. Lester Kingman.

OPENING—The session was called to order at 9:00 A.M. by Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr. The Conference sang Hymn No. 72, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" after which they were led in prayer by H. Lester Kingman.

AMENDMENT—Harry R. Kent moved the addition of the following sentence to Resolution F: Reports are to be filed between June 1 and June 15. The amendment was seconded. D. E. Canaday requested twenty-four hours for the committee to get the correct wording on the amendment offered by Harry R. Kent. The amendment was adopted with this request granted to the Standing Rules Committee. Report was adopted.

Bishop Hardin then called attention to the fact that Standing Rules 21 (f) and (g) were in conflict with what we had done in adopting the report of the Nominating Committee.

MOTION—Cellis Woodard moved that we suspend Standing Rules F and G to allow the report of the Nominating Committee to stand as adopted. It was seconded and passed.

Harry R. Mays informed the Conference that the Standing Rules Committee had a request to suspend Rule 25 as follows: We respectfully request that the South Carolina Annual Conference (1785), in session June 2-5, 1970, at Wofford College, Spartanburg, South Carolina, suspend Rule 25 of the Standing Rules, insofar as it applies to The Methodist Home, Orangeburg, in the following instances: (a) so that until July 2, 1970, there be twenty-two (22) persons on the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Home, Orangeburg, twelve (12) of whom would be lay and ten (10) clerical; and, (b) so that the restriction "no trustee shall serve more than eight consecutive years" shall be suspended until July 2, 1970, in the one (1) case of Mr. William J. Sigmon. Signed by: James A. Merchant and Harry R. Mays. Standing Rules Committee recommended concurrence. It was adopted.

Harry R. Mays then presented an amendment to Standing Rules to be known as 27 (e): Add a new item: 27(e) as follows: The District Superintendent of the Marion District shall be an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees of the Belin property. Signed by: R. E. Seignious, Secretary Conference Nominating Committee. It was adopted.

Harry R. Mays then presented an additional item concerning the Trustees of Epworth Children's Home as follows: Delete from Section VIII, Paragraph 25, the third sentence and insert a new sentence to read as follows: There shall be 21 persons on the Epworth Children's Home Board, eleven lay and ten clerical, at least three (3) of whom shall be women, effective at the 1971 session of the Annual Conference. Signed by: Claude R. Harper and William C. Reid. It was adopted.

Harry R. Mays then presented an addition to the last sentence of Standing Rule 21(h) as follows: Add to Paragraph 21 (h) the following to be a part of the last sentence: ". . . and shall be by a majority of the ballots cast." It was adopted.

Harry R. Mays then presented an addition to Paragraph 14 (c) as follows: Add to 14(c) the following: Reports shall be printed exactly as submitted by the agencies, boards and committees. Any amendments to reports shall be printed immediately following each report. This rule shall apply only to those resolutions on which the Committee on Resolutions recommends concurrence or resolutions which are adopted by the Conference. It was adopted.

Harry R. Mays next presented an amendment to add to Section D of the Standing Resolutions as follows: ADD TO D. Two Percent of Salaries the following: All amounts paid to or on behalf of the minister to provide funds for payment of all or part of his Social Security obligation shall be reported as salary in Table No. 2 of the statistical report of the Annual Conference. It was adopted.

The report as a whole of the Standing Rules Committee was adopted.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE—Cellis Woodard presented Mrs. Sally Batson, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Home, who spoke relative to the sale of bonds by the Home.

ORDER OF THE DAY—Bishop Hardin informed the Conference that the Order of the Day set for the Board of the Ministry had been withdrawn.

WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE—J. C. Smiley, Chairman, presented James Merchant, Secretary, who presented the report of the World Service and Finance Commission. (See Report)

MOTION—Victor Ross moved that we allow the mileage allowance to remain at 8¢ per mile instead of raising it to 10¢ per mile. It was seconded. The motion passed.

Claude R. Harper raised questions regarding the Board of the Ministry operations funds calling attention to the motion of yesterday to set up a grievance committee which would have to be financed out of the Board of Ministry operating funds. George Duffie, Sr. said the work could not be financed out of the Board of Ministry funds.

Paul McWhirter made the following motion: "I move that the following Boards be reduced by \$100.00 each: Christian Social Concerns, Board of Evangelism, Board of Missions, Methodist Advocate operations, Board of Health and Welfare Ministries and that this money be allocated to the expense of the Grievance Committee."

SUBSTITUTE MOTION—Harvey Floyd moved that this entire matter be referred back to the World Service Commission for further study and recommendation. The substitute motion passed and the matter was referred.

Claude Harper called attention to the Youth Service Fund and asked if this was included in the World Service report. Mr. Merchant, Secretary of the World Service, said that this was received as information by the Commission and was not included in their report.

REFERRAL—W. R. Kinnett presented a resolution on Consultation with the motion that it be referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals. It was referred.

MOTION—Mr. Kinnett then moved that this resolution be an Order of the Day for 9:30 on Thursday and requested permission to distribute copies of the resolution. The Order of the Day and the distribution were approved.

COMMITTEE ON COURTESIES—Bryan Crenshaw presented to the Conference James Mack, Lay Leader of the '66 Conference, and Mr. Hammett Smith, former Lay Leader. Mr. Mack brought greetings to the Conference.

MOTION FOR REFERRAL—Paul McWhirter presented a resolution on meeting place for the Annual Conference with the motion that it be referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals. It was referred. Paul McWhirter presented a resolution having to do with business in the first two days of Annual Conference with motion that it be referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals. It was referred.

Announcements were made by the secretary and the Conference was recessed.

The Bishop reconvened the Conference after recess. Thom Jones led in singing Hymn No. 93, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing." Prayer was offered by Bishop Hardin. Bishop Hardin called on Joe Alley who made an announcement relative to Youth Night which would be held on Wednesday evening of the Conference Session at the Spartanburg Memorial Auditorium.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY—Bishop Hardin recognized Harry Kent who represented the Commission on Minimum Salary and made certain explanations relative to their actions and recommendations. Mr. Kent then called on John W. Robison who made the report. Dr. Robison called attention to the change of the figure \$4,600 to \$5,100 of Paragraph 1 of the report. He also called attention to a change under Section 2 (a) which should read \$5,100 instead of \$5,600 as printed. He also called attention to Paragraph 2 (a) recommending that we add Paragraph 7 (a) which would read "an associate member will be given 30% of the difference between the total received and \$5,100."

The report of the Commission on Minimum Salary was adopted as a whole.

STATE OF THE CHURCH ADDRESS—The State of The Church address was given by Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr.

RESOLUTIONS AND APPEALS—Bryce Herbert, Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals, was recognized.

McWHIRTER RESOLUTION HAVING TO DO WITH THE LIMITATION OF BUSINESS TO TWO DAYS OF ANNUAL CONFERENCE: BE IT RESOLVED, by the 178th Session of the South Carolina Annual Conference (1785) of the United Methodist Church in session at Spartanburg, South Carolina, June 1-5, 1970: 1. That all business of the Conference be scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday of the Conference Session and Thursday, if necessary, beginning in 1971.

The committee recommended consideration by the Conference. McWhirter moved the adoption and spoke to the issue. Discussion followed.

SUBSTITUTE—Francis Cunningham moved that this be referred to the Program Committee to do the best they can in the light of the Conference discussion. The request was made to ascertain the feeling of the laymen present when a show of hands the laymen indicated that they favored the spirit of this resolution. The substitute made by Dr. Cunningham was passed and took the place of the resolution.

RESOLUTION HAVING TO DO WITH ANNUAL CONFERENCE MEETING PERMANENTLY IN COLUMBIA—BE IT RESOLVED, by the 178th Session of the South Carolina Annual Conference (1785) of the United Methodist Church in session at Spartanburg, South Carolina, June 1-5, 1970: 1. That the Annual Conference Session beginning with the 1971 Conference be held in Columbia, South Carolina. 2. That all sessions of the Conference in the future be held in Columbia, South Carolina. 3. That the Conference be held at the Carolina Coliseum and that the Bishop appoint a committee to negotiate a 5-year contract with the Carolina Coliseum on specific dates for the Conference. 4. If the Coliseum is not available for 1971, that the Conference still be held in Columbia and the contract with the Carolina Coliseum negotiate beginning in 1972.

The Committee recommended that the Conference consider this resolution.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE—The business of the Conference was interrupted briefly for a presentation of Wilson Welden, Editor of *The Upper Room* who spoke briefly to the Conference.

Ray Moore moved to adopt the resolution. The motion was seconded. The resolution was defeated.

Bishop Paul Hardin then called for announcements to be made after which he introduced Brother Jordan of the '66 Conference.

The prayer of dismissal was led by the Reverend Tom Brittain.

SECOND DAY — TUESDAY AFTERNOON

June 2, 1970

OPENING—Bishop Hardin called the Conference to order. The Conference sang Hymn No. 14 "Come Let Us Raise", and led in prayer by Ben Hudnall.

RECOGNITION OF MEN RETIRING—C. S. Floyd, of the Conference Relations section of the Board of the Ministry, presented certificates of appreciation to the retiring ministers. They were Clyde W. Allen, John W. Davenport, H. Lester Kingman, and John M. Younginer, Sr. The Bishop spoke words of appreciation. Dr. Younginer and Dr. Kingman responded for the retiring group. The wives were presented to the Conference.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS—W. A. Horne presented Marvin Rogers of Cokesbury who spoke briefly to the Conference and presented a check for \$13,512.55 to the Conference for the use of Retired Ministers. The report of the Committee on Publishing Interests was ordered to record.

RESOLUTION—Ralph E. Farr of Union presented a resolution to the Conference having to do with inviting Aiken Taylor to speak at the Conference of 1971. The resolution was referred to Committee on Resolutions and Appeals.

MOTION REGARDING ORDER OF THE DAY—Claude R. Harper moved that an Order of the Day be set for 2:30 P.M. on Thursday to hear reports on the Methodist Camp and the Campus Ministry. The Order of the Day was ordered.

COMMITTEE ON CHARGE LINES—Bishop Hardin presented John W. Green, Chairman of the Annual Conference Committee on Charge Lines who spoke to the report. (See report) The report was adopted. Attention was called to the recommendation concerning a continuing committee to be called the Committee on Creative Ministry. This item was referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance for funds.

STATEMENT BY THE BISHOP—Bishop Hardin made reference to the Special Program to be held on Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock and said that the purpose of the program was to explain the Consultation on Church Union and that there would be ample time for questions and discussions.

COMMISSION ON INSURANCE—Melvin Derrick, Chairman of the Conference Commission on Insurance presented Ted Morton, Secretary, for the report.

COMMISSION ON INSURANCE—Ted Morton, Secretary, presented an amendment to Report No. 7 of the World Service and Finance Commission having to do with the removal of the insurance item from World Service and Conference Benevolences and apportioning insurance as a separate item:

The Commission on Insurance, South Carolina Conference, The United Methodist Church, recommends that the Budget of the Commission on World Service and Finance proposed for Conference Year 1970-1971, be amended as follows:

Remove from the World Service and Finance Conference Benevolence Budget the item appropriated for the Commission on Insurance; adjust the totals and District apportionments to reflect the deletion of this item; and grant authority to the Commission on World Service and Finance and the Commission on Insurance to work with the Conference Treasurer in devising a plan for distributing this apportionment to the Churches of the South Carolina Conference as an item of Ministerial Support.

This was adopted.

The report of the Commission on Insurance was adopted as a whole.

Don Foster spoke about the insurance program and the importance of prompt payments.

Melvin Derrick presented a summary of Insurance benefits and these were distributed to the Conference. He presented John R. Hannon and Stan Walker, and expressed appreciation for their service to the Insurance Commission.

WORLD SERVICE COMMISSION—James Merchant, Secretary, presented an amendment to Report No. 7. He recommended that the Committee on the Clergy be listed in the amount of \$500.00, this amount to be raised by asking each district to add \$50.00 to its World Service and Conference Benevolences budget. MOTION FOR RECONSIDERATION—A. C. Holler moved for reconsideration of Item 1(c) of Report No. 1 of the Board of Pensions. It was seconded and passed.

MOTION—Richard Murphy moved that we delete Item 1(c) of Report No. 1 of the Board of Pensions. It was seconded.

SUBSTITUTE MOTION—A. C. Holler moved that we substitute for Mr. Murphy's motion the motion that we print in the Journal and Yearbook only the delinquent amounts on the 1% Fund. A count vote was taken and there were 217 votes for the substitute motion and 132 against the substitute. The substitute motion passed. The amendment was then adopted as the main motion. The report on Journal and Yearbook was then approved as a whole.

Announcements were made by the secretary and the session was adjourned. King Scoggins pronounced the benediction.

SECOND DAY — TUESDAY EVENING

June 2, 1970

OPENING—Bishop Paul Hardin called the Conference to order. Thomas Jones led in the singing of Hymn No. 55, "Praise to The Lord." Prayer was led by J. Chad Davis.

COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS—Henry M. Thompson, Chairman, introduced F. Bundy Bynum, Jr. who presented the report. Mr. Bynum called attention to one correction. In paragraph 3 delete "A Youth Mission to Columbia, S. C. will be held during the summer months of 1970 as a project of this year's work. \$1,500.00 has been budgeted for this program. Youth from churches in the Columbia area will

compose the teams. A leadership team of four persons will supervise the work in lower economic areas of the city, assistance at Crafts-Farrow Hospital, Bethlehem Center work, and other areas of ministry."

Mr. Bynum recommended the addition of a fourth paragraph under Recommendations For Next Year's Work to read: "We recommend that two weekend Youth Missions to Columbia, S. C. be held during 1970. One will be held in October and one in February. Youth from churches in South Carolina will comprise the teams. Work in mission will be in low economic areas of the city and in places such as Crafts-Farrow Hospital, Bethlehem Center, and others. It is hoped that these two mission will serve as pilot projects for more extensive youth missions in summer months."

The report of the Commission was adopted with the amendments.

COMMITTEE ON TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION—Grady Newman presented the report.

Report No. 1 — Adopted.

Report No. 2 — "Word and Music" Certificates were presented to producers and managers of the radio stations.

The report was adopted as a whole.

PRIVILEGE—Bishop Hardin presented Bishop Cyrus B. Dawsey to the Conference.

COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT—E. Wannamaker Hardin presented the report and recognized Paul Hardin, III, President of Wofford College who invited the Conference back to Wofford College for the 1972 session. Committee recommended acceptance of this invitation to Wofford in 1972 along with a reaffirming of acceptance to Columbia College in 1971. The report was adopted.

CONFERENCE PROGRAM COUNCIL—J. Carlisle Holler introduced Wallace Fridy, Executive Director, who made the report.

Report No. 1 was received as information.

Report No. 2 — James Nates presented recommendations to the Program Council which are a part of Report No. 2. Item 1 under Report No. 2 was adopted after deletion of Section B. Item 2 under Report No. 2 was adopted. Item 3 under Report No. 2 was adopted.

James Nates moved the adoption of Item 4 of Report No. 2.

Francis Cunningham spoke to the report and outlined an alternate report which had been prepared and presented to the Program Council.

Douglas Bowling moved that the Conference have the opportunity to hear the report made to the Program Council by Mickey Fisher, Dr. Cunningham, and others. There was a second.

Question asked by the Bishop if this could be done. Mickey Fisher said that he felt that the presentation made by Dr. Cunningham considered the essential elements of their report which included a Conference Program Staff of three persons, an executive, a researcher, and an enabler-education specialist.

The Bishop requested that the records show that the report was made without vote on the Bowling motion.

The question was called on Recommendation No. 4. A point of order was called during the taking of the vote.

POINT OF ORDER—Point of order was called by M. D. Moore who said that Mr. Bowling had made a motion giving the Conference an opportunity of deciding between two plans. The Bishop called for a vote of the Conference as to whether they felt that Mr. Bowling made such a motion. The house voted and the house expressed the feeling by hand vote that a choice between the programs had been moved and that such a choice be presented to the Conference.

MOTION FOR ORDER OF THE DAY—M. D. Moore moved that an order of the day be set at the convenience of the Bishop on Thursday or Friday to receive the presentation of the alternate plan as originally given to the Program Council.

Claude R. Harper spoke in opposition to the motion. M. D. Moore spoke favoring his motion.

Paul Hardin, III asked questions for clarification. Francis Cunningham, Carlisle Holler and F. S. James spoke to these questions.

MOTION TO TABLE—R. C. Emory moved that the motion for the Order of the Day be tabled. It was tabled.

Francis Cunningham spoke to the Alternate Plan. The Question was called. Dr. Holler spoke on behalf of the Program Council.

VOTE FOR RECOMMENDATION NO. 4—Paragraph 4 was adopted by the Conference by a vote of 305 to 185. James Nates moved the adoption of Report No. 2 of the Program Council as a whole. It was adopted.

BROCHURE ON WORLD SERVICE AND BUDGETING—T. H. Vickery presented to the Conference a brochure on World Service and Budgeting which had been prepared. These were distributed to the Conference as the Conference adjourned. Mr. Vickery made reference to the use of this pamphlet in the local church, and also called attention to the film strip, "Where in the World Am I?" which has been prepared for use throughout the South Carolina Conference.

Report No. 3 — Order to record.

The report of the Program Council was adopted as a whole.

CLOSING—Following announcements by the secretary, the session was dismissed by prayer by George Duffie, Jr.

THIRD DAY — WEDNESDAY MORNING

June 3, 1970

HOLY COMMUNION AND SERMON—Holy Communion was observed in Mickel Chapel at Wofford College. Celebrants were The Reverend George B. Wilson and the Reverend Henry S. Suggs. The Reverend Harold P. Lewis delivered the sermon.

OPENING—Bishop Hardin called the Conference to order. The Order of Worship for the Consecration of Directors and Ministers of Education and Directors and Ministers of Music was followed.

Claude R. Harper, Chairman of the Conference Board of Education, assisted Bishop Hardin in conducting the service. Those who were consecrated were: Jerry Malcom Hollis, Minister of Music, Charles Burns Nesbitt in absentia, Minister of Christian Education and Sherrill Claire Prevatt, Director of Christian Education.

COMMITTEE ON DAILY JOURNALS—James Adams, Chairman, reported that the Committee on Daily Journals had examined the Journal through Tuesday afternoon and found it to be in order. The report was adopted.

RESOLUTION—Bishop Hardin called on C. LeGrande Moody, Jr., Superintendent of the Greenwood District who presented a resolution relative to the discontinuing of Lydia United Methodist Church in Clinton, S. C.

"WHEREAS the presiding Bishop, a majority of the District Superintendents, and the Greenwood District Board of Church Buildings and Locations have approved the discontinuance of Lydia United Methodist Church in the Greenwood District. . . .

BE IT RESOLVED that the South Carolina Annual Conference in its 1970 session also approve the discontinuance of Lydia Church, and that its property revert to Lydia Mill of Clinton, S. C. for their disposal since the deed has a reversionary clause, and that Lydia's membership be attached to Bailey Memorial Church of Clinton."

The resolution was adopted.

C. L. Moody, Jr. then presented nominations for various positions in the Greenwood District.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE—Carl Harris requested that the Conference have a prayer for Donald Burnett who is ill in the hospital. The prayer was led by Leon Thompson.

BOARD OF MINISTRY—Ralph Cannon re-opened Question 40 under the Report of the Board of Ministry and added to the names of those "voluntary located" Harold Lee Nowell.

CONTINUING EDUCATION COMMITTEE OF BOARD OF MINISTRY—W. C. Stackhouse, Chairman, presented the report. (See report) It was moved to record without reading. Adopted.

COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND OF BOARD OF THE MINISTRY—Thomas N. Brittain presented the report on Ministerial Education Fund. (See report) The report was moved to record without reading.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE—R. Bryce Herbert, Chairman, informed the Conference that the Resolution which had been referred to them yesterday concerning the invitation of Dr. Aiken Taylor to speak to the Conference on COCI had been withdrawn. This was presented as a matter of information.

NOMINATIONS—Bishop Hardin called on George Whitaker, Superintendent of the Charleston District who presented nominations for various offices in the Charleston District.

Those nominated were elected.

BOARD OF EDUCATION—Claude R. Harper, Chairman, presented Mrs. Lela Waldrop who was leaving the Annual Conference Program Council effective this Conference. She spoke to the Conference. R. Wright Spears then reported to the Conference on behalf of Columbia College. Paul Hardin, III reported to the Conference on behalf of Wofford College. Claude R. Harper expressed appreciation to the College presidents, the staff and members of the Conference Program Council who were related to the Board of Education.

Reports 2 and 3 of the Board of Education Report was moved to record. It was adopted.

Claude R. Harper then presented M. Eugene Mullikin who presented a report relative to the Youth Service Fund which was printed under Report No. 1 of the Board of Education. This portion of Report No. 1 relative to the Youth Service Fund was adopted by the Conference with noted changes in the method of distribution of the Fund in order to be in accord with the General Conference directives.

MOTION—Phillip Kearse, Youth Representative to the Annual Conference, moved that council members be seated in the bar of the Conference with the privilege to speak but not vote, the president being the only one able to vote." His motion was adopted.

ORDER OF THE DAY—MERGER STUDY COMMITTEE—Bishop Hardin recognized Rhett Jackson, Co-chairman of the Merger Study Committee, who then called on Hawley Lynn, Chairman of the Task Force on Merger, who presented the history and perspective of the Merger Committee in its procedure. Rhett Jackson called on Tony Anthony, layman of Windsor United Methodist

Church in Columbia who spoke relative to the Merger study. A question and answer period concerning the merger was held.

MOTION—Christopher Poole moved that the Annual Conference send words of sympathy to the family of the Reverend C. Jasper Smith, '66 Conference, who died recently. The motion was adopted.

COMMITTEE ON COURTESIES AND INTRODUCTIONS—Bryan Crenshaw, Chairman, presented to the Conference the Pages who were serving during this session.

Announcements were made.

Conference was recessed.

Bishop Paul Hardin called the session to order after recess.

MOTION—Robert Clyburn moved that the "State of the Church" address given by Bishop Hardin be distributed to local churches in mimeograph form. The motion was seconded and adopted.

Bishop Hardin called on Dr. Michael Watson, physician from Bamberg, South Carolina, who spoke to the Annual Conference on the experiences of those physicians who had been to Anguilla and on the needs of the current mission in Haiti.

MEMORIAL SERVICE—The Memorial Service was conducted with Bishop Paul Hardin presiding. The assistant secretary, Bryan Crenshaw, read the names of ministers, wives of ministers, and widows of ministers who have died during the past year. Wallace Fridy read the Call to Worship after which the Conference sang the Hymn "For All the Saints, Who From Their Labors Rest." Wallace Fridy led in the Responsive Reading, Selection 595, "The Lord is The Keeper." The prayer was led by Risher Brabham. A solo, "Though I Speak With the Tongues" was sung by Thom Jones. The scripture selection, John 1:1-14 was read and the memorial sermon was preached by the Reverend Herbert L. Spell, Minister, Trinity United Methodist Church, York, South Carolina. A closing Hymn No. 283, "Love Divine" was sung by the Conference. Wallace Fridy pronounced the benediction.

After the reading of announcements, the Conference adjourned.

Dr. James S. Jones of the Commission on Religion and Race, dismissed the Conference with the benediction.

THIRD DAY — WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

June 3, 1970

The Conference session was held in the Spartanburg Memorial Auditorium. Bishop Hardin recognized J. Chad Davis for the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs. He presented the report of the Commission and moved it to record without reading. The Conference ordered it to record.

Mr. Davis then called Joel Hand, Jr., who presented The Reverend Dr. William A. Benfield, Jr., Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Charleston, West Virginia. Following the address by Dr. Benfield a period of questions and answers followed.

Dr. Benfield dismissed the session with the benediction.

COMMITTEE ON DAILY JOURNAL—James Adams, Chairman, reported that the Committee on Daily Journals examined the Journal through last evening and found that they were in order. The report was adopted.

NOMINATIONS—Richard Seignious made the report for the committee nominating Delos D. Corderman to replace Joel Cannon on the Board of Pensions. He was elected. Richard Seignious then read the nominations of the Board of Resolutions and Appeals which had not been previously read and elected before the Conference. They were elected.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES—B. B. Barnes, Chairman, made the report.

Report No. 1—Moved to record without reading.

Report No. 2—Cellis Woodard, Superintendent of the Methodist Home in Orangeburg spoke to the report. It was moved to record without reading. Adopted.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE—W. W. McNeill expressed appreciation for the work of the trustees and the administrators of the homes.

Report No. 4—Ordered to record.

Report No. 5—Ordered to record.

Report No. 6—Adopted.

Report No. 7—Ordered to record.

Report No. 8—Nominations for the homes and institutions under the care of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries were made. (See report) Elected.

Report No. 9—Ordered to record.

Report No. 10—These were elected.

Ernest M. Heape then presented a resolution as follows:

RESOLUTION—"Whereas the last will and testament of the late Elizabeth Harmon bequeaths certain property in Greenville, South Carolina, to her

mother, Hattie B. Harmon, and her brother, William Henry Harmon, as long as they remain single or until their death,

and

Whereas this property becomes the property of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church upon the death or marriage of the above mentioned parties, and

Whereas this Conference must, by the direction of the will, build a home for the aged and feeble minded of the white race within a period of two years:

Now therefore:

Be it resolved that this conference authorize the presiding Bishop, Paul Hardin, Jr. and the secretary, Allan R. Broome, to sign a quit claim deed conveying the property to Hattie B. Harmon and William Henry Harmon for the sum of \$2,000.00."

The entire report was then adopted.

ORDER OF THE DAY—Bryce Herbert then presented to the Conference the resolution on Consultation which had been referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals.

A RESOLUTION CONCERNING CONSULTATION

Whereas **The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church** in paragraph 391.1 calls for consultation between the District Superintendent and the ministers serving in his district;

Whereas **The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church** (Paragraph 354.6) calls for consultation between the District Superintendent, the minister, and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee concerning assignments;

Whereas there has been neither a clear statement of policy nor consistent practice regarding consultation procedures in the South Carolina Conference, 1785;

Whereas the practice of consultation in our Conference has varied from district to district and from year to year;

Whereas within districts consultation has varied according to the size and prestige of the church and the standing and salary of the minister;

Whereas there is a great and pressing need for District Superintendents, Pastor-Parish Relations Committees, and ministers to have specific guidelines for consultation;

Therefore, be it resolved that, in the South Carolina United Methodist Conference, 1785, consultation shall include at least the following:

1. Consultation shall be a specific on-going process among the District Superintendent, the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, and the Minister. This process shall include at least the following within the first six months of the Annual Conference year:
 - A. A meeting of the District Superintendent with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee;
 - B. A meeting of the District Superintendent with the minister;
 - C. A Meeting of the District Superintendent with both together, if necessary.

These meetings shall include the following agenda:

- D. A mutual assessment of the strengths and weaknesses of the pastor's ministry in his present appointment;
- E. An examination of the minister's training, experience, interests, abilities, and demonstrated competence that are bearing upon his present appointment;

F. An evaluation of the history, direction, opportunities and unique or pressing needs in the charge;

G. A listing of the social, emotional, and economic factors within the minister's family that might have some bearing upon his appointment.

2. When a change in pastoral appointment seems to be indicated, consultation shall also include the following:

A. By the end of the eighth month of the Conference year, the District Superintendent shall consult with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, in order to (1) delineate the pastoral needs of the charge, (2) describe the personal and pastoral gifts necessary to enable the charge to fulfill its mission, and (3) to define limiting factors such as parsonage size, salary, travel requirements.

B. By the end of the ninth month of the Conference year, the District Superintendent shall name to the minister several possible charges to which the minister might be appointed. The minister shall have an opportunity to respond to each possible appointment as to his strengths for, weaknesses in, and feelings about each situation.

C. By the end of the tenth month of Conference year, the District Superintendent shall have disclosed to each minister and each charge the appointments which the Cabinet is recommending for their consideration. This disclosure shall include a sharing of the Cabinet's perception of (1) the mission of the Kingdom in that charge and of (2) the gifts of the minister as they relate to the mission of that particular charge.

3. The right of both pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee to request a reconsideration of proposed appointments is affirmed, with full acknowledgment and appreciation that final authority and responsibility for appointments rests with the Bishop.

WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE—Mrs. Roy Parker spoke on behalf of the Women's Society of Christian Service. She then moved to record without reading the report. (See report) It was adopted.

RESOLUTION TO DISCONTINUE A CHURCH—Carl Parker, Superintendent of the Marion District, presented a resolution to discontinue Soules Chapel Church in the Marion District.

"WHEREAS, the presiding Bishop and the majority of the District Superintendents, and the Marion District Board of Church Building and Locations have approved the discontinuance of Soules Chapel Church of the Marion District. . . .

BE IT RESOLVED that the South Carolina Annual Conference in its 1970 Session also approve the discontinuance of Soules Chapel Church and also that its property be placed under the supervision of the Centenary

Circuit Charge Conference, and its membership be attached to Central United Methodist Church on the Centenary Circuit."

The resolution was adopted.

MOTION—James Ashley moved that the address of Mrs. Roy Parker be printed in the South Carolina Methodist Advocate. It was adopted.

COMMITTEE ON COURTESIES AND INTRODUCTIONS—F. T. Cunningham presented Mrs. Paul Hardin, Jr. to the Annual Conference. Other introductions were Sam Gadsden, '66 Conference, W. R. Gregg, Chaplain Robert Way, Chaplain George Nichols, Chaplain Kenneth Townsend, Chaplain Charles Johnson, Chaplain William Major, Chaplain Wayne Ballentine, and I. S. Jordan, '66 Conference.

RESOLUTION ON THE CLOSING OF A CHURCH—Thomas Shuler, Superintendent of the Orangeburg District, made the motion that Speedwell Church, Orangeburg District, be closed and the congregation merged into the Swallow Savannah United Methodist Church in Allendale.

"Whereas the presiding Bishop, a majority of the District Superintendents, and the Orangeburg District Board of Church Location and Buildings, have approved the discontinuance of the Speedwell Church and its merger with the Swallow Savannah Church, Allendale, in the Orangeburg District.

BE IT RESOLVED that the South Carolina Annual Conference approve the discontinuance of the Speedwell Church and its merger with the Swallow Savannah Church, Allendale, and that its property be placed under the supervision of the merged church known as the Swallow Savannah United Methodist Church of the Orangeburg District."

This was approved.

RESOLUTION ON THE CLOSING OF A CHURCH—J. H. Martin, District Superintendent of the Anderson District, moved the discontinuance of the Abney Chapel, Anderson District, with the membership to be attached to Belton.

"Whereas the presiding Bishop, a majority of the District Superintendents, and the Anderson District Board of Church Building and Locations have approved the discontinuance of Abney Chapel of the Anderson District. . . .

BE IT RESOLVED that the South Carolina Annual Conference in its 1970 session also approve the discontinuance of Abney Chapel and that its property be liquidated and its membership be attached to Latimer Memorial United Methodist Church in Belton."

This was approved.

NAMING OF THE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON INVESTIGATIONS—The Conference Committee on Investigations was named by Bishop Hardin as follows: B. S. Drennan '68, Chairman, Carl N. Harris '68, W. J. Smoak '64, F. B. Fowler '70, John W. Robison '70; Reserves: C. J. Lupo, Jr. '64, J. Leon Newton '68, Gene F. Couch '70, Daltrum H. Poston '70, H. S. Suggs '64.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS—Rhett Jackson, Chairman, was introduced. He presented George Duffie, Jr., Secretary, for the report.

Report No. 1—The motion was made that the report be moved to record without reading.

MOTION—R. E. Seignious moved that the final sentence of the first paragraph be stricken. These words are as follows: "Here lies a clue to the real reasons we are turning young people off today. This is why they do not come. We lie to them. We say we believe one thing and do quite another."

Mr. Seignious spoke to his motion.

BRABHAM SUBSTITUTE TO THE SEIGNIOUS MOTION—McKay Brabham moved deletion of the sentences as referred to by Mr. Seignious and the inserting of the following as a substitute: "We repent of our failure to understand the contradiction of what we say we believe and what we do; we ask God's help in communicating our concern and love to the youth of our day, and pray that we may be open to the word that comes to us from them."

COPELAND AMENDMENT TO THE SUBSTITUTE—James Copeland spoke to amend the Brabham substitute by eliminating the sentences as referred to in the Seignious Amendment and substituting the following: "This may be one reason why they do not come, perhaps we are not as honest as we should be. Our performance does not always measure up to our performance."

POINT OF ORDER—Francis T. Cunningham raised a Point of Order as to whether the Conference could alter a report which was being received as information only. The Bishop ruled that the Conference could do with this report as it desired.

PREVIOUS QUESTION—The previous question was moved by George Whitaker and ordered by the Conference.

The Copeland Amendment was voted and lost.

The Brabham Substitute was voted and lost.

The Seignious Amendment was voted and lost by standing vote of 241 for and 252 opposed.

Report No. 1 was adopted.

Following announcements by the Secretary, the Conference recessed.

Bishop Hardin called the Conference to order following the recess. After the singing of Hymn No. 138 "Spirit of God, Descend Upon My Heart," prayer was led by Bishop Hardin.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS—G. S. Duffie, Jr., Secretary, presented the remainder of the report.

Report No. 2—Was moved to record with corrections noted. Item 5 was deleted which read as follows:

Pollution of Natural Resources—During the year the Board sent statements to the State Pollution Control Authority urging high standards for both existing industry and new industries coming into the state. Also, the Board sent a communication to an organization of citizens of Beaufort County for pollution control expressing appreciation and support for their effort to prevent pollution of the waters and environment of Port Royal Sound.

Report No. 2 was ordered to record without reading.

Report No. 3 was ordered to record without reading.

Report No. 4, Section A—An additional paragraph was added to Item 10 (see report).

MOTION—F. T. Cunningham moved that Section A, Item 1 be received as information by the Conference. It was seconded and passed.

Section A—Was adopted.

Section B, Paragraph 1—Approved.

Section B, Paragraph 2—Approved.

Section B, Paragraph 3—**Peace in Southeast Asia**—This paragraph was read by Mr. Duffie and moved its adoption.

NORRIS SUBSTITUTE—Gene Norris moved the following substitute: "I move that this Conference go on record as opposing the Indo-China war as an unjust war from a Christian ethical perspective." Mr. Norris spoke for his substitute at some length and there was debate.

HARDIN SUBSTITUTE—Paul Hardin, III made a substitute for the substitute as follows: "I move you that we amend B-3 by changing the closing period to a comma and adding the following: "and urge the President to continue and complete on schedule the Vietnamization of the war and the withdrawal of all American troops from Southeast Asia." The motion received a second.

MOTION ON TIME—W. C. Reid moved that all speakers for the remainder of the Christian Social Concerns report be limited to three minutes. Passed.

Discussion followed on the Hardin amendment. The Question was called. **HARDIN AMENDMENT PASSED** and became by vote of the Conference the substitute for Paragraph B-3.

MOTION—W. C. Stackhouse moved that the Annual Conference communicate to President Nixon the sentiment and context of this action. Passed.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE—Tom Evatt presented Louis Adams whose only son was killed in Viet Nam. Mr. Adams made a moving statement to the Conference regarding our support for both a quick end to the Viet Nam war and a support of our troops. He was giving a standing ovation by the Conference.

OFFERING—Mr. Nimmons of Jenkins Orphanage was presented to the Conference, and announcement was made that an offering would be received at the doors at adjournment.

Section B, Paragraph 4 — Adopted.

Section B, Paragraph 5 — Adopted.

Section B, Paragraph 6 — Adopted.

Section B, Paragraph 7 — A new item on pollution was presented by Mr. Duffie. "We accept the Biblical concept of man as having been given dominion over nature, therefore we urge that all precautions be taken to insure that pollutants not be deposited in our air, streams, shores, and highways of South Carolina. We commend those industries which have taken initiative to incorporate anti-pollution practices in their operations. We call on the Pollution Control Authority to insure the citizens of South Carolina that existing conditions of pollution will be eliminated. In the future we urge that high standards to protect our natural resources be implemented, and that all new industries be expected to comply."

Paragraph 7, Section B was adopted.

PHILLIP KEARSE MOTION—Phillip Kearsse moved that a new paragraph to be numbered B 8 be added to the report and that this paragraph include the following motion: "I move that we support Planned Parenthood with a limit of two children in each family." The Question was called. The Conference voted to suspend the rules for immediate consideration of this item.

The motion was lost.

Section B of the report was adopted as a whole.

Report No. 4 was adopted as a whole.

Report No. 5 was presented and accepted as information.

Mr. Duffie moved acceptance of the report of the Commission of the Board of Christian Social Concerns as a whole.

MOTION—Austin Wilkes, III, called attention to the Allies in Service section of the report and moved that \$500 be allocated to the Woman's Christian Temperance Union with this money coming from the allocation previously made to Christian Action Council.

Spencer Rice spoke regarding financial history of the Conference with the WCTU. George Duffie spoke to the motion.

The motion was lost.

A. C. Holler requested that the name "Woman's Christian Temperance Union" be added to the listing in Report No. 4, Section B-6. It was added.

Mr. Duffie then again moved adoption of Report No. 5.

It was adopted.

RACE RELATIONS DAY—Spence Rice spoke on behalf of Race Relations Day and our Negro colleges, calling attention to the needs of an offering of \$4,000,000.

Mr. Duffie then moved the adoption of the Report of Christian Social Concerns as a whole. It was adopted.

INTRODUCTIONS—Mr. Fletcher Carter of the General Board of the Laity and Dr. Donald Stanton of the General Board of Education, were presented to the Conference.

CLOSING—The Secretary made the announcements and the Conference was dismissed.

FOURTH DAY — THURSDAY AFTERNOON

June 4, 1970

OPENING—Bishop Paul Hardin called the Conference to order after which the Conference sang Hymn No. 101, "Come Every Soul by Sin Oppressed." The prayer was led by Moody Smith of the Divinity School of Duke University who then spoke briefly to the Conference.

ORDER OF THE DAY—Board of Education—Claude R. Harper, Chairman, presented Wesley Voigt, Superintendent of the Methodist Camp, who presented a number of young people representing a number of various phases of the Youth work at the Methodist Camp.

Spencer Rice spoke to the Conference about the Methodist Camp program. Claude R. Harper then presented James Creel, Chairman of the Sub-committee on Campus Ministry. He presented the report on Campus Ministry found under Report No. 1 of the Board of Education.

M. E. Mullikin presented Report No. 1 and moved it to record.

Report N. 4 — Moved to record without reading.

Report No. 5 — Moved to record without reading.

Report No. 6 — Moved to record without reading.

Report No. 7 — **Nominations for Board of Directors** — Nominations for Board of Directors for Wesley Foundations of University of South Carolina, Clemson University, and Winthrop College were elected.

Nominations were then made for the Board of Trustees for Columbia College and they were elected.

Nominations were then made for the Board of Trustees of Wofford College and they were elected.

M. E. Mullikin then moved the adoption of the entire report of the Board of Education.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE—A. M. Fisher spoke concerning a report he had made to the Campus Ministry Sub-committee on Campus Ministry at Furman University.

The entire report of the Board of Education was adopted as a whole.

INTRODUCTIONS—Bishop Hardin introduced to the Conference Howard G. McLain, Executive Director of the Christian Action Council, Mrs. Ellen Kunes, and Mrs. Dwight Patterson. Mrs. Dwight Patterson spoke to the Conference on the Fund for Reconciliation.

Claude Evans spoke on the motion during the morning session having to do with population growth and assured the maker of the motion that the Conference takes seriously the problem he mentioned.

REPORT OF THE STATISTICIAN—Theus Rogers, Conference Statistician, made the statistical report. This was submitted for information. (See report)

MOTION—Theus Rogers moved that for the purposes of statistics the Conference year be the calendar year.

D. E. Canaday, Chairman of Committee on Standing Rules, was recognized and presented the following amendment to the Standing Rules:

"Add to Section F of the Standing Resolutions: Beginning in the calendar year 1972 and each year thereafter, pastors' reports to the Annual Conference shall cover calendar year (January 1 - December 31) and shall be sent to the Conference Statistician so as to reach that office not later than January 15th of the year following. A seven month reporting period shall be observed from June 1, 1971 - December 31, 1971 with reports due not later than January 15, 1972."

The Committee on Standing Rules recommends concurrence.

Mr. Rogers withdrew his motion in favor of the report of the Committee on Standing Rules. Questions were asked regarding how this would fit into the schedule of the publication of the Journal. Questions were asked regarding how other conferences worked details on this.

Judson Ready, Conference Lay Leader, spoke and said that this matter was a part of the presentation of the Board of the Laity and the Board of Laity would have suggestions to make in its report.

MOTION—It was moved that this matter be delayed and be considered at the time of the Report of the Board of Laity. Passed.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES—L. O. Foxworth, made the report for the Conference Board of Trustees.

MOTION—The following motion was made by the Board: "We recommend to the Annual Conference that a competent legal firm be retained to (1) determine the corporate powers of the Conference referable to the owning and disposition of property; and (2) draft appropriate legal guidelines within which the Commission on Wills and Legacies might operate and communicate in dealing with others concerning its functions."

The motion passed.

MOTION—Mr. Foxworth made the following motion: "The Conference Board of Trustees moved that specific authority be conferred on the Board of Trustees and/or the Board's subcommittees to determine the feasibility of sale of abandoned property(s), and actual sale, if deemed desirable on a case basis. In making this recommendation, the Trustees recognize there is some area of risk (premises liability) with reference to concealed hazards such as old wells on the property(s), and recognizes further that appropriate disposition should be made of abandoned property if there is no foreseeable need for its use by the church."

The motion passed.

NOMINATIONS OF DISTRICT LAY LEADERS—The nominations of District Lay Leaders were made by Allan R. Broome. (See Boards, Commissions, and Committees) Elected.

REPORT OF THE LAKE CITY DISTRICT TRUSTEES—F. S. James moved the report to record without reading. Adopted.

FOURTH DAY — THURSDAY EVENING

June 4, 1970

The Thursday evening session of the South Carolina Conference was held at Central United Methodist Church. The Ordination Sermon was preached by Dr. Boone Moss Bowen, "Anointed to Preach."

ORDINATION OF DEACONS—Dr. George S. Duffie, Sr., Chairman of the Board of the Ministry, and Dr. Allan R. Broome, Conference Secretary, called the names of those elected to Deacon's Orders and presented them to Bishop Hardin for Ordination. They were ordained by Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr. and Bishop Cyrus B. Dawsey, thus answering **Question 32**, "Who have been ordained deacons?" (See list in the Business of the Annual Conference)

ORDINATION OF ELDERS—Dr. George S. Duffie, Sr., Chairman of the Board of the Ministry, and Dr. Allan R. Broome, Conference Secretary, called the names of those elected to Elder's Orders and presented them to Bishop Hardin for Ordination. They were ordained by Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr. and Bishop Cyrus B. Dawsey, thus answering **Question 34**, "Who have been ordained elders?" (See list in the Business of the Annual Conference)

FIFTH DAY — FRIDAY MORNING

June 5, 1970

HOLY COMMUNION AND SERVICE—Holy Communion was administered in Mickel Chapel of Wofford College. Celebrants were The Reverend G. Bryan Carroll and The Reverend Franklin B. Buie. The sermon was delivered by The Reverend James M. Copeland.

OPENING—The Conference opened by the singing of Hymn No. 15, "For All That Dwell Below the Skies." Prayer was led by Bernard Drennan.

DAILY JOURNAL—The Committee reported that the Daily Journal had been examined through last evening session and found to be in order. A motion was made to grant the secretary permission to complete and perfect the Journal Proceedings. This was approved.

BOARD OF THE MINISTRY—Ralph Cannon reported for the Board of the Ministry and moved the re-opening of Question 22. This was granted. The status of B. F. McGuire was changed to Student Lay Pastor. This was approved by the Conference.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM—The report was presented by Wesley Farr.

Report No. 1—Mr. Farr commented on the report. He moved approval of the report down through 1969-1970 report. It was adopted.

He then presented the Section 1970-71 Program Projection. He moved the adoption of this section.

MOTION—H. Theron Few moved that the report be amended by adding to the 1970-71 Program Projections the following on Good News Sunday: "Good News Sunday"—November 15, 1970 shall be designated as Good News Sunday in all United Methodist Churches. The Bishop, the Cabinet, the staff, the laity and the ministers are requested to actively encourage full participation from each local church in providing leadership, financial support and witnesses to

the visitation on November 15. This project be designated as a "Program Projection" in cooperative evangelism for the year 1970-71.

This was approved by the Conference and added to the recommendations.

Report No. 1 was then approved.

Report No. 2—Moved to record.

Report No. 3—Received as information.

Mr. Farr moved adoption of the report of the Committee on Evangelism as a whole. It was adopted.

COURTESIES—The Committee on Courtesies presented to the Conference those who have worked in secretarial capacities: Mrs. Sara Joye, Miss Sylvia Scoggins and Mrs. Caroline Keaton.

CREDIT UNION—A. C. Holler presented a report on the South Carolina Methodist Conference Credit Union for the record. It was received.

Mr. Holler moved that Don Foster be granted the privilege of speaking to the Conference. The Conference granted the privilege and Mr. Foster spoke to the Conference on Ministerial Affairs.

LeGrande Moody moved that the Conference send word of appreciation to those who work in the Office of Ministerial Affairs in Columbia and this was accepted by common consent.

JENKINS OFFERING—Bishop Hardin announced that the offering for Jenkins Orphanage was \$429.26.

BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSIONS—The report was made by Ben Hudnall.

Report No. 1—Sections A, B, C, and D were adopted. The two recommendations were adopted separately.

Section II was moved to record.

Report No. 2—Was presented by Harvey Floyd. He moved the report to record. It was done.

The report was reconsidered by the Conference.

AMENDMENT—Section B-2 was amended by eliminating from the second line the words "but not the packing expense" and inserting the words, "including a maximum of \$50.00 for packing expenses." This was made on motion of John Stapleton and was passed by the Conference.

The report was adopted as amended.

Report No. 3—Report was made by M. L. Meadors who presented Marvin I. Lare, Director of Urban Affairs, of Columbia.

Report No. 3 was approved.

A. C. Holler announced that Spartanburg would become the fourth city with an Inner-City Ministry and that Ken Callham would be appointed to this work. The financing would be by a group of interested laymen.

Report No. 4—Was approved.

Report No. 5—Ordered to record.

Report No. 6—Ordered to record.

Report No. 7—This report was presented by Mr. Hudnall. George Whitaker spoke on the lack of Church Extension money and encouraged local churches to enter in mission in Church Extension.

An amendment was moved to Report No. 7 by Hawley Lynn which became Item 6 of this report: "That the Committee on Urban Work be designated a 'clearing house committee' for churches needing building funds and having difficulty finding them, to transmit these needs to other churches with little or no indebtedness, with the request that these more affluent churches provide 'missional loans' at little or no interest for building purposes." The Board of Missions agreed to include this in the report but requested that it be turned over to the Church Extension Section.

The report was adopted as amended.

RESOLUTION—A resolution was presented by Ed Ellis giving approval to the establishment of the Spartanburg Urban Ministry. Approved.

Report No. 8—Was approved.

Report No. 9—Ben Hudnall presented Lester Kingman, retiring President of Spartanburg Junior College, who spoke to the Conference. Tom Evatt presented a resolution having to do with the work of Dr. Kingman at Spartanburg Junior College and presented Dr. Kingman with a plaque. The resolution is as follows:

WHEREAS, Dr. H. Lester Kingman, for the past seven years has served as President, Spartanburg Junior College, Spartanburg, S. C.

WHEREAS, He has led the college in the erection of five new buildings and the complete renovation of every old building on the Campus. The cost of the new buildings total almost two million dollars.

WHEREAS, Under his tenure as President the student enrollment has increased from four hundred seventy-five (475) to eight hundred and ten (810). The faculty members have increased from nineteen to forty-four, and all have Masters degrees in their chosen fields.

WHEREAS, this period of extraordinary and unselfish service to the College and Methodism has been performed with unswerving fidelity to the eternal verities of Christianity. His unfaltering leadership has been a source of inspiration to faculty, students and the people of South Carolina Methodism.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

FIRST, that we give to Dr. H. Lester Kingman and to his family, our sincere thanks, our best wishes and prayers for his continued happiness and health and success in all his new undertakings, and

SECOND, Our abiding appreciation for his capable administrative leadership and his love for his fellowmen.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be presented to Dr. H. Lester Kingman, published in the South Carolina Advocate and entered in the Minutes of the Board of Missions.

The report was amended by including Item 10 as follows: In accordance with the action of the General Conference, that World-Wide Communion Sunday be a time when we emphasize the meaning and significance of Holy Communion in the life of the church and that each minister use the two Sundays preceding that Sunday to teach his people.

The report was approved as amended.

BOARD OF MISSIONS—Ben Hudnall, Chairman of the Board of Missions, presented a resolution on the Belin property as presented by the Board of Trustees:

Whereas Boards of Trustees of Conference institutions are free to borrow, exchange, sell, convey, develop, manage, and improve property held in trust by such boards, and

Whereas the Belin Board of Trustees is one of such conference institutions,

Now therefore, be it resolved, that the Belin Board of Trustees shall have the same powers and authority as is vested in the other boards of the conference, and that it is authorized to exercise all such powers as are vested in the other conference boards.

Be it further resolved that the Belin Board of Trustees is hereby authorized to take such steps as are necessary to constitute itself as an eleemosynary corporation and is hereby authorized, as such a corporation, to develop, manage, improve, operate, sell, and convey the property held by the board of trustees under the terms of the will of James L. Belin.

S. M. Atkinson moved that the resolution lay on the table. Motion was approved.

Report No. 11 was ordered to record.

MOTION TO LIMIT DEBATE—George Duffie, Sr. moved that all debate during the remaining portion of the Annual Conference be limited to three minutes. It was adopted.

SOUTH CAROLINA METHODIST ADVOCATE—This report was presented by C. J. Lupo and James Barrett.

Report No. 1—Ordered to record.

Report No. 2—Amended by adding "quota is 1/8th membership". It was approved as amended.

Report No. 3—Sections 1 and 6 were ordered to record.

Sections 2 through 5 were moved for adoption.

Walter Gearhart of Columbia spoke of changes he felt were needed in the Advocate. George Fields and others spoke in favor of the Advocate's right of editorial judgment. Following discussion on both sides, the report was approved.

Report No. 4—Approved.

James Barrett then moved adoption of the report of the Board of Trustees of the Advocate as a whole and it was approved.

COMMISSION ON METHODIST INFORMATION AND PUBLIC RELATIONS—Grady Newman moved that the report be ordered to record and this was done.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF THE LAITY—This report was presented by Judson Ready.

Report No. 1—Judson Ready spoke to the report and then it was moved to record. Adopted.

Report No. 2—Recommendations were presented by Mr. Ready. Under "General Recommendations" he called attention to general recommendation No. 1. This has to do with the calendar year as the basis for program and finance. He presented a resolution in connection with this matter. The resolution follows:

Whereas: Several reports presented to this 1970 session of the South Carolina Annual Conference have included recommendations with respect to the timing of reports and the adoption of the calendar year as the basis for Program and Finance, and

Whereas: The 1970 Session of the General Conference has approved a Resolution of the General Program Council that, effective January 1, 1973, the Program year of the United Methodist Church shall correspond with the calendar year and that this action shall be effective for all General, Jurisdictional, and Annual Conference Boards and Agencies and for Local Churches, and

Whereas: Various advantages are represented as accruing from such a procedure,

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Bishop be respectfully requested to appoint a committee and designate its chairman, with representation from the Cabinet, The Commission on World Service and Finance and the Conference Program Council, which, in consultation with the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, the Conference Statistician and the Chairman of the Committee on Standing Rules, shall explore the advantages and disadvantages and investigate the manner and timing of the adoption of such a procedure and to make recommendations with respect thereto to the 1971 session of this Annual Conference. The expenses of the members of such committee to be borne by the agencies which they represent, or as otherwise provided by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance.

This resolution along with the resolutions were adopted.

Report No. 2 was adopted.

Report No. 3 — Received as information.

Report No. 4 — **NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS**—Judson Ready nominated Harry R. Kent as Conference Lay Leader. Mr. Kent was presented to the Conference and spoke appreciatively of the work of Mr. Ready during his ten years of service as Conference Lay Leader after which the Conference stood and gave him an ovation. Other nominations were presented.

Report No. 4 was adopted including the election of Mr. Kent.

The report of the Board of Lay Activities was adopted as a whole.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STANDING RULES—The report on the Committee on Standing Rules and Resolutions was made by D. E. Canaday as follows:

Add to "F" the following: The pastor's report to the Annual Conference shall be sent to the Conference Statistician so as to reach that office not later than fifteen days after the close of the Conference year.

The Committee on Standing Rules recommended concurrence and it was adopted by the Conference.

AMENDMENT TO STANDING RULES—Change Paragraph 17 (c) so that it reads: All monies to be credited to the accounts of local churches for the fiscal year shall be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer not later than five days after the end of the fiscal year.

The Committee on Standing Rules recommended concurrence and it was adopted by the Conference.

AMENDMENT TO THE STANDING RULES AND RESOLUTIONS—Add to Section F: Beginning in the calendar year 1973 and each year thereafter, pastors' reports to the Annual Conference shall cover the calendar year (January 1 - December 31st) and shall be sent to the Conference Statistician so as to reach that office not later than January 15th of the year following. A seven month reporting period shall be observed from June 1, 1972 - December 31, 1972 with reports due not later than January 15, 1973.

The Committee on Standing Rules recommended concurrence and it was adopted by the Conference.

OFFICE OF PASTORAL CARE AND COUNCILING—This report was presented by E. S. Jones. The report was approved.

COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL AFFAIRS—The report of the Committee on Ministerial Affairs was presented and was received as information.

NOMINATION OF EPWORTH TRUSTEE—Ernest Heape stated that the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries had discovered that one of the trustees of Epworth Children's Home was ineligible to continue as he was being appointed as pastor of Epworth Memorial Methodist Church. Tom East was nominated to the Board of Trustees to replace J. Louis Fowke and he was elected.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS—R. E. Selous, Secretary of the Committee on Nominations, made the following nominations

tions to the Board of Christian Social Concerns: Dwight Patterson, Jr. to replace Lewis P. Jones and LeFon LeGette to replace Julian Ward. They were elected.

DISTRICT JOURNALS—The Committee on District Journals have examined the Journals and found them to be in good order. Adopted.

MOTION—Hawley Lynn made the following motion: I move that the Conference Board of Missions read to the South Carolina Annual Conference meeting in 1971 the Will of the late Reverend Mr. Belin in some context of the Board's report. The motion passed.

RESOLUTIONS—The report of the Committee on Resolutions was presented by Robert James. They were approved and the Conference stood in appreciation to those who worked with this Conference.

ATTENDANCE OF LAY DELEGATES—An amended report was given on the attendance of Lay members. In attendance there were 303 Lay members, 119 Reserve Lay members, the Conference Lay Leader, and the Conference United Methodist Youth Fellowship president, giving a total of 424 registered laymen.

Announcements were made by the Secretary.

MOTION FOR ADJOURNMENT—The Conference Secretary, Allan R. Broome, moved that following the answering of Question 54: "Where are the teachers stationed for the ensuing year?" that this, the one hundred and eighty-third session of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church adjourn sine die.

QUESTION 54 "Where are the preachers stationed for the ensuing year?" Bishop Hardin presented the appointments in printed form and as printed were declared by Bishop Hardin to be his official appointments. (See list of appointments.)

ADJOURNMENT—The Conference was adjourned sine die with the benediction.

PREFACE:

WHY A CHARGE-LINES COMMITTEE

When the news was "out" that a Charge-Lines Committee had been authorized by the Annual Conference, it is amazing how many different "expectations" grew up about the committee and what it was "supposed to do." We see no way to fill all of these "expectations" in one report! So...this is a progress report...made in the hope and with the prayer that it will be perfected from year to year.

This report is in three parts:

PART I - FRESH WAYS OF SEEING OURSELVES - is a trial statement of new ways of looking at ourselves and our mission as a conference of Christian laymen and ministers. It is expected that the conference will help the committee clarify this statement until it says what the conference wants it to say.

PART II - RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE CABINET - consists of certain concrete suggestions concerning changes in charge lines which were submitted to the Cabinet four months before the 1970 session of the conference according to the directions of the resolution that created the committee. Since these are recommendations for thought and have not been considered by the respective congregations, they are not listed in this report. A general letter has gone from the committee to all churches asking for their thought and cooperation in working out a way by which they may develop more effective ministries, meanwhile enjoying freedom from dependence on Minimum Salary.

PART III - A LOOK TO THE FUTURE - is for long-range planning.

PART I - FRESH WAYS OF SEEING OURSELVES

We believe that "stationitis" is a curable disease. We think the time has come and gone for the whole conference to help cure it by developing appointments in such a way that each appointment can be seen as an adequate "form of mission" in itself and not a "stepping stone to the real thing."

We believe that each appointment should make adequate demands on the minister's time and ability and in turn should afford him an income that will deserve his respect.

We believe that there are ways to do this:

- Without closing churches in a spirit of retreat - or keeping them open when all wisdom in doing so has disappeared.
- Without massive sums of money for subsidizing unwisely organized "little stations" . . . or charges poorly grouped.

We believe it can be done in such a way that a more effective deploying of manpower and a more creative mission can be achieved.

But this will require a new image which we must all support. . . .

An image of churches willing to combine-to-serve. . . .

An image of ministers willing to share in a new type of parish-type ministry. . . .

An image of laymen who are more concerned with their place "in mission" than in dividing up the clergy so that they may have one "all to themselves."

This new image would reflect the existence of churches, laymen, and ministers whose goal is not to "make stations" but to be effective in mission alone or in combination with other churches.

As guides in the development of this new image, the committee offers the following thoughts gathered from sources that represent long and careful study of this problem of the effective deployment of churches and ministers:

A. "The Church is the body of Christ, and Christ is one; therefore, no local congregation can witness to Christ adequately in separation!"

B. Every trained minister should have a demand on his time and resources sufficient to give him a sense of dignity and a feeling of fulfillment. The committee concurs in the thought that a charge of less than 300 could hardly make such a demand.

C. Every appointment should be of such strength as to:

1. Furnish enough people to make an effective fellowship and carry out a mission....
2. Offer sufficient lay-leadership to carry out its mission.....
3. Have sufficient financial resources to support its ministerial leadership; develop an effective program for all ages in the local church; and share in the total mission of the church....

D. Salaries should increasingly reach such levels of adequacy that we can shade out the rivalries that develop over the "plums" in contrast to the "hard scrabbles."

Conclusion:

We recommend that the conference work toward these goals:

1. Through a wise grouping of churches and the development of a cooperative-parish staff ministry for places where wisdom suggests such a ministry.
2. Through the cooperation of the Cabinet in giving vitality to these insights through the appointments and continuing to see that the effort receives their full and effective support.
3. Through the active support of all ministers in providing adequate leadership to individual congregations.
4. Through the development of a lay-stewardship that is mission-motivated and will support with insight and funds a wide variety of expanding mission concepts.

This committee does not conceive of its assignment as one designed to close churches and beat a retreat; but rather, so to group our Christian strength and ministerial leadership that our full capability can be exerted toward a greater mission in those places where we are the responsible witnesses for Christ.

PART III - A LOOK TO THE FUTURE

We recognize that the job assigned is a continuing one. All churches involved in charge line changes should participate in decisions to create more adequate and effective ministry. Constantly changing circumstances require that our structure be flexible at all times and that we be willing to utilize all fact-finding scientific methods.

We further recommend that the Bishop appoint a continuing Conference Committee to be known as the Committee on Creative Ministries and that each District Superintendent appoint a comparable committee on a district level. Each District Representative to the Conference Committee should be a member of the District Committee. Plans for the continuing Conference Committee should include periodic meetings with the Cabinet.

INTRODUCTION

I would like to say a brief word on two subjects:

1. accommodation
2. merger

I feel very strongly that our church is in its present trouble today because far too many of us were guilty yesterday of accommodating the Gospel to the least Christian view in our pews. Just recently a young lawyer told me that

had been visiting various Columbia churches in order to decide where to place his letter. He told of going to one of our churches on Race-Relation Sunday, and of almost getting sick in the pew as the minister poured forth a paternalistic Southern position that would not square with the stated positions of the United Methodist Church. How easy it is to feel a resentment toward a minister who does this in order to feel popular—to feel accepted. However, I cannot condemn him too severely, because I am not sure when I left his ranks. As a matter of fact, I haven't. When the pressure really gets on, I, too, find myself blating the Gospel in order to please man. We must stop this. Your Board calls on all Methodists to look anew at the call of brotherhood through Christ. To look again at our stated positions of belief. Here lies a clue to the real reason we are turning young people off today. This is why they do not come. We lie to them. We say we believe one thing and do quite another.

And so, just a word about merger. We, by some miracle, still have a chance to witness to the people of South Carolina that we do indeed believe that all baptized Christians are brothers. This conference we will be getting a proposed plan of merger to take back home for a year's study. We will be asked to study this plan in our churches, in our Sunday Schools, in our boards, in our program councils, in our homes—everywhere. Your Board of Christian Social Concerns urges you to make sure that every Methodist is informed. We will come back next conference to vote on accepting this plan. Let us be ready—let us do it. It is the Christ-like thing to do. It might not please all men, but it will surely please God.

REPORT NO. 2

Program Report (Year Ending May 31, 1970)

1. Summer 1969 Migrant Ministry Project

The Board of Christian Social Concerns wishes to thank the Reverend Mr. Charles Dunn who provided the leadership for this ministry to migrant agricultural workers in the Charleston area. The program involved many youths from across the conference, as well as adults, both lay and clergy. The program was conducted in cooperation with other denominations and is becoming a vital ministry in enabling our youth to experience first-hand the agonies of some of the disposed in our state.

2. Summer 1970 Migrant Ministry Project

Throughout the past conference year, the Board has worked to continue the program again this summer. It is felt that in expanding this ministry that the conference should be investigating the needs in the Spartanburg area. This inquiry has been attempted during the past year.

3. Conference Merger Conversations

The Board has attempted to keep abreast of the status of merger considerations being offered by the committees and agencies of the Conference of 1785 and 1866.

4. Use of Church Buildings

During the year the Board, in response to questions by local churches and pastors, published information related to use of church properties for such purposes as private schools.

5. Implied Consent and Abortion Bills

Pursuant to action taken by the 1969 Annual Conference, the Board of Christian Social Concerns communicated to various members of the General Assembly of our state the stance of the conference favoring the passage of these two bills.

6. **Ethics Bill**

The following resolution was adopted at the February 14, 1970 meeting of the Board, and was communicated to members of the General Assembly.

"Believing that office holding is a public responsibility granted by the electorate to its officials, we call upon the House of Representatives and the Senate of South Carolina to maintain its accountability to the public trust, by due consideration and passage of bills of legislation which set forth criteria for such accountability. Specifically we (The Board of Christian Social Concerns of the South Carolina United Methodist Conference, 1785) urge passage of a bill similar to the ethics bill now under consideration in the House of Representatives."

7. **Jail Inspection Bill**

The following resolution was adopted at the February 14, 1970 meeting of the Board and was communicated to members of the General Assembly.

"The Board of Christian Social Concerns of the South Carolina United Methodist Conference (1785) urges passage of the currently pending bill in the state legislature regarding Jail Inspections and Standards, and recommends that appropriate action be taken to safeguard the welfare, safety and health of persons held in local or county jails. We recommend that in the case of local or county jails which cannot meet the standards specified, that persons being held in custody be transferred to such facilities as can meet the standards."

8. **Deleted at Annual Conference.**9. **Primary Prevention Model for Drugs and Alcohol**

The Board has attempted to research the problem of drug abuse during the year. As consequence of this work, a Primary Prevention Model for Drugs and Alcohol has been developed and distributed to local churches.

10. **Constitutional Revision**

The Board has attempted to interpret to the churches the issues and implications involved in the South Carolina State Constitutional Revision now in process.

11. **Participation in Alcohol and Pastoral Care Work**

The Board participated with the South Carolina Commission for Pastoral Care of Alcoholics in its work. Four persons attended the Southeastern School on Alcohol Studies on scholarships provided by the Board.

12. **South Carolina Christian Action Council**

The Board has cooperated with the Christian Action Council in an advisory way, providing leadership in several jointly sponsored activities. In particular we have cooperated in the Workshop on "Issues" and the Seminar on Constitutional Revision.

13. **Prisoner Rehabilitation**

The Board continues to cooperate with and support the work of the Al. Wilkes Society, the prisoner rehabilitation ministry in our state.

14. **United Nations-Washington Seminar**

Seventeen persons attended the UN-Washington Seminar on July 14-19, 1969, and those attending have spoken throughout the conference to churches relating their experience.

15. **Observances**

16. **Public Schools**

The Board adopted the following resolution and communicated copies to the State Superintendent of Education, The County School Board Chairmen, members of the South Carolina General Assembly, and the press.

WHEREAS, the best interest of all the people of South Carolina requires and demands a strong public school system, and

WHEREAS, the Public School System of South Carolina under the instruction of the Courts of the land, have been required to create a unitary system, and

WHEREAS, this transition has created and will create apprehension in black and white students and parents because of the uncertainty, rumors and political opportunists, the Board of Christian Social Concerns, S. C. Conference 1866 (Black) The United Methodist Church, and the Board of Christian Social Concerns, S. C. Conference, (1785) White, the United Methodist Church, meeting together on February 14, 1970, in Columbia, South Carolina, desiring to fulfill our commitment of dedication to God and our belief in a strong Public School System, NOW THEREFORE, We proclaim our support to the State Board of Education and to each County Board of Education, and pledge to endeavor to create a spirit of cooperation among the citizens of South Carolina in accomplishing the reorganization made necessary by the constitutional authority vested in the Courts of our land, and

We further urge industrial, business and political leaders to lend their support to the leaders of the school system so that the citizens of South Carolina will be fully cognizant of the importance of the Public School System and the necessity of a peaceful transition into the Unitary System, and

We urge all the citizens of South Carolina to support the Public School System and to render assistance to the school system in bringing about a peaceful and orderly transition of students and in improving our schools to meet the challenge of quality education in South Carolina.

18. **Joint Meeting with Conference of 1866 Board**

On February 13-14, 1970, the meeting of this Board was jointly held with the 1866 Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns.

19. **Statement of Purpose**

The Board of Christian Social Concerns adopted a Statement of Purpose in 1968. In the light of the restructuring of the Annual Conference related to the Program Council, this statement was revised as regards the relationship of the Board to the Program Council, and in the light of the 1968 Discipline which had been subsequently published, amended to conform with the stipulations contained therein. In summary, the amended document contains the following statements of purpose and function which have been submitted to the Program Council for consideration.

- A. The Board is charged with responsibility for initiating programs for the Conference in the general area of Christian Social Concerns. These programs are submitted to the Program Council for consideration as a part of a unified Conference Program.

- B. The Board is expected to execute all responsibilities in the area of Christian Social Concerns which are assigned by the Program Council for implementation.
- C. Aware of its final amenability to the Annual Conference, the Board shall execute any other programs in the field of its concern which are deemed timely and necessary.

1. Request for Staff Assignment

This recommendation asked the Program Council to assign adequate staff supervision to enable the Board to meet at least the following needs in Christian Social Concerns: (a) Be sensitive to continuing issues and provide models for response (b) Research and investigate emerging new areas in the field (c) Project goals for Board consideration (d) create detailed program proposals (e) Implement adequate programs (f) Provide for evaluation of program completed (g) Administer the Board through budget management, publication of minutes and reports, supervision of communications and correspondence related to Christian Social Concerns and facilitate meetings of the Board.

2. Draft Counselling Seminar at Pastor's School

This recommendation was sent through the Program Council to appropriate conference Committees for consideration.

3. UN-Washington Seminar for June 6-13, 1970

4. Community-Wide Celebrations for United Nations, October 23, 1970.

5. UNICEF observance for October 31, 1970

6. World Order Sunday observance. October 19, 1970

7. Youth Delegates to World Youth Assembly

The recommendation was that one youth from the 1785 Conference and one youth from the 1866 Conference be sent as delegates in July, 1970, to the World Youth Assembly in New York.

8. Charleston Ministry to Migrant Laborers

It was recommended that this program be carried out as it has been anticipated during the current year of planning.

9. Spartanburg Ministry to Migrant Laborers

It was requested that the Program Council deploy staff to make detailed study of the needs for expansion of the ministry to migrants into the Spartanburg area.

10. Summer Missional Youth Program (For 1972)

This comprehensive and detailed recommendation requested that the Conference Program Council consider establishment of a summer program which would involve youth in serious mission work at various places in our state during the summer months of 1972. The youth would be paid a salary of \$500.00 for the summer. The cost of the program was estimated to be \$15,000.00.

a. This recommendation was acted on by the Conference Program Council and amended as follows: The date for the project will be the summer of 1972. The cost will be left open, and is to be determined as the program is developed.

b. Six persons will serve as a committee to develop details of this program. Their recommendations, including a plan for funding, will be submitted to the Program Council by January 1, 1971 and subsequently to the annual conference for 1971 for action. The Boards of Evangelism, Enlistment, Missions and Christian Social Concerns will be requested to appoint one member to this committee from each Board. The Program Council will be requested to make one staff member available. The Executive Committee of the State Youth Council will be asked to serve as full members of this committee. The sum of \$250 will be requested from participating Boards for the expense of this committee.

B. Other Recommendations to the Annual Conference

1. Human Worth and Social Priorities

The Board of Christian Social Concerns calls attention of all United Methodist Christians to the highest priority facing our state and nation, namely, an attitudinal base for conducting life, institutions and the affairs of our society. We affirm that life and our human resources are the most valuable product of the republic. Therefore, we recommend that the Annual Conference affirm the following priorities: (a) Human life and its inherent value and worth. (b) All political, economic, educational and social institutions which work toward the best interest of enhancing and supporting life. (c) An organization and arrangement of a human society which is truly free, fully just and openly available for all equally. In view of these priorities we recommend that seminars, forums and convocations be held wherever possible to accomplish the molding and reshaping of attitudes which foster the best interest of all mankind.

2. Twenty-fifth Anniversary of United Nations

We recommend that every United Methodist Church in South Carolina observe the Twenty-fifth Anniversary of the United Nations during 1970, using the theme, "Peace and Progress," and that the Annual Conference reaffirm its faith in the charter of the United Nations.

3. Peace in Southeast Asia

We support the President of the United States in his quest for a just and honorable peace in Southeast Asia, and urged the President to con-

tinue and complete on schedule the Vietnamization of the war and the withdrawal of all American troops from Southeast Asia.

4. **Constitutional Revision**
We recommend that the Board of Christian Social Concerns on behalf of the Conference continue the efforts begun this year in keeping the churches of South Carolina aware of the implications and issues involved in the Constitutional Revision of the State of South Carolina.
5. **Combat Drug Abuse**
We recommend that the churches of the conference seek to work directly with governmental and law enforcement agencies to combat the growing problem of drug abuse in our state. The Board of Christian Social Concerns will continue to offer leadership in this field.
6. **Support of Allies and Companions in Service**
We recommend that the Annual Conference give its support to the three South Carolina Agencies which provide greatest opportunity for joint service to persons in the state in the area of Christian Social Concerns, namely, The Alston Wilkes Society, The Christian Action Council, the South Carolina Council on Human Relations, and Women's Christian Temperance Union.
7. **Pollution of Natural Resources**
"We accept the biblical concept of man as having been given dominion over nature, therefore we urge that all precautions be taken to insure that pollutants not be deposited in our air, streams, shores, and highways of South Carolina. We commend those industries which have taken initiative to incorporate anti-pollution practices in the operations. We call on the Pollution Control Authority to insure the citizens of South Carolina that existing conditions of pollution will be eliminated. In the future we urge that high standards to protect our natural resources be implemented, and that all new industries be expected to comply."

**CONTINUING EDUCATION COMMITTEE
BOARD OF THE MINISTRY**

The Committee would lift out Par. 355, The Book of Discipline 1968 for consideration:

"The minister shall be encouraged to continue his education throughout his career, including a carefully developed personal program of study augmented

ed periodically by involvement in organized educational activities. In most cases the minister's continuing education program should allow for leaves of absence for study at least one month during one year of each quadrennium. Such leaves should not be considered as part of the minister's vacation and should be planned in consultation with his charge or other agency to which he is appointed as well as his bishop, district superintendent, and Annual Conference continuing education committee."

Your committee has observed a lack of motivation on the part of great numbers of pastors to engage in serious continuing education. This is not peculiar to ministers of the United Methodist Church. Taking a wide spectrum of denominations, the matter of continuing education is a genuine concern of denominational leaders all along the spectrum. There is now a wealth of existing resources in continuing education. Many of these programs are in pastoral counseling with excellent leadership, fine relations with other institutions of the state, and many opportunities provided by the South Carolina Department of Mental Health and its associated agencies.

We urge the ministers of the South Carolina Conference to take advantage of the many opportunities being made available to them. In particular, we make the following recommendations:

- We urge all our charges where possible to include a minimum of \$100 in the local budget to assist the pastor with the expense of continuing education, and to cooperate in providing necessary time away from the charge in order to receive such training.
- We urge Conference support for the newly organized Interdenominational Committee on Continuing Education for Ministry. While this cooperative effort is still in the formative stage, we believe that it will offer great advances in the future for training opportunities.
- We recommend continued support for the program at Interpreters House, Lake Junaluska, and express appreciation to Dr. Carlyle Marney and his Staff for the excellent leadership provided there.
- We urge all ministers to attend Pastor's School to be held in cooperation with the South Carolina Conference '66, September 15-17 at the Ocean Crest Hotel, Myrtle Beach.
- We lift up the annual Duke Seminar as an excellent opportunity for the ministers of our Conference, to be held at College Place Church November 9 and 10, and urge full participation.
- We commend for your consideration the splendid summer pastor's school provided for ministers of all denominations by Furman University. This is without question one of the outstanding offerings in this area.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

to
The South Carolina Annual Conference

June 1 - 5, 1970

Wofford College, Spartanburg, S. C.

This report is presented in compliance with Paragraph 354.10 of "The Discipline of The United Methodist Church."

There is an old Chinese proverb that says: "May you live in interesting times." The truth of this maxim has never been more appropriate than for the day in which we live. We are meeting in one of the most ominous and epochal hours in the life of the world. Stupendous influences and forces are shaking the world to its very foundations. Vast changes are rapidly sweeping the world, as swirling ocean currents sweep the seas.

As Bishop Ralph Ward says, "We pursue our role in a period of anxiety. The problems we and our fellow workers in the United Methodist Church face are multitudinous. The options before us are widely varied. The risks of decision-making are grave." In the face of this, we must not forget that there

is every possibility of being wrong in many things that we project. Things are changing too fast in the world about us.

As we look back upon the history of the Church we must realize that its history is the consequence of the coming of Jesus of Nazareth into the world. It is possible that the one big mistake we are making today is projecting into the future without considering the past. To ignore the past is to repeat the mistakes of the past. If we want to extend a boundary line straight ahead, we go back and take a sight along that line. In projecting the Church into the days ahead, the same procedure needs to be followed. A knowledge of what we have been provides the clues to where we are headed. Opinion and judgment about the Church today must be based upon the knowledge of what has gone before. Otherwise, such opinions and judgments have little claim to authority and respect.

The "happening" that took place in Bethlehem has moved, like the winds of the desert, over peoples inside and outside the Church—over peoples of all races and all climes. However, we must recognize that the powerful religious heritage of Christians seems to be weakening in our day. Fewer people are conscious of the religious roots of their common heritage. Fewer people are bringing into focus the past upon which the future must be built. There is the question as to whether a tree that has lost its roots can long endure.

John Wesley wrote in his Journal on August 6, 1776, "I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist either in Europe or America. But I am afraid that they should exist only as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the power." In other words, when the people called Methodists forget the past and lose the roots of their religious heritage, they become a dead sect without power to influence the world in which they live.

We cannot separate the past, the present and the future. We must accept the continuing presence of the past in the present and in the future. What we are has been transmitted to us through the faith that began with the coming of Jesus Christ.

I am sure that all of us have been feeling that we are taking part in an exodus, that we are moving from one period in the life of the Church to another. Our knowledge of the Old Testament should make us realize that this is not an instant achievement. The exodus recorded in the Old Testament took an entire generation. Whatever the frustrations of the present, let us be aware that we are participants in a moving epoch that will lead us out of the bondage of the old order into the promises and possibilities of the new order. To this end, we must be conscious of the fact that, even though we live in a day of instants, there is no such thing as an instant exodus. Neither peoples, nor society, nor the Church can be changed overnight. Success is achieved only with great toil.

In this transformation of the Church, there are many sincere laymen and preachers who see signs of confusion and contradiction today which seem to them that the Church has lost its way in this exodus. Some feel that the Church is sticking its nose into matters which is none of its business. Others, just as strongly, feel that the Church is sticking its nose into the air, spouting platitudes about love and involvement and reconciliation but never getting its nose dirty. Many talk about this situation in terms of relevance. They say there is something about the Church that does not relate to ordinary people as it should. This is no disturbing accident. It is happening because each of the crises affecting the Church has the same beginning—the search for relevance, for meaning.

In other words, if the Church is to mean anything at all to modern man, it must begin to speak to him in a language that he can understand. This does not mean that the Church must accept the standards of the world—but it does mean exploring with modern man the world in which he lives and its relation to God.

Can it be that out of this search for relevance has come the so-called "generation gap" in the Church—that wide disparity between the ideas and thinking of the younger generation and those of more mature years? There are those who think that this is an unbridgeable gap—a gap in which the younger generation seeks to throw back the veil of hypocrisy and the old tried and true ways of the Church, which they point out as the Church going about its business unfeeling and unthinking. I doubt this conclusion. The crucial gap in our Church is one

that has been there for a long time—a gap between those who care about the Church and those who don't. And every age—from 17 to 97—has its share of those who do care.

We are facing today what is called the Revolt of Youth. We must realize, however, that the Revolt of Youth is not a universal phenomenon among young people. Many millions of our youth continue to go about their business of studying, staking out a life's work for themselves, launching a family and being active in the work and worship of the Church. As one of the young intellectuals of today has put it, "To a large extent, this is a revolt of the best educated, the most articulate, the most self-confident and self-conscious. In short, it is a revolt of the elite among youth. The rebels gained influence far beyond their numbers precisely because 'the Establishment' was more interested in the escapades of elite youth than in the activities of, say, the blue-collar young." Even so, the Church must be responsive to the voice of youth today—not the voice of the revolutionaries but the voice of those young people who quietly but determinedly seek a new pattern of life. However, at the same time, we must not abandon the wisdom of the more mature. I heard a sportscaster over radio one day make this statement—"Every spring a crop of rookies arise that claim they will rewrite the baseball records. A few come forth but it is the experienced, seasoned veteran that is the backbone of the team." In like manner, ever so often a crop of new young preachers arise that claim they are going to rewrite the church and theology—and I was one of that crop in days gone by. A few names remain but it is the experienced, seasoned veteran preacher that is the backbone of the church's ministry.

We are deeply concerned about the polarization among preachers and laymen in our Conference. If not actually polarized, we are plainly divided by antagonisms that cut across theological and generational lines. The task of the Church is hard enough without fragmenting the Conference into warring camps of this group and that group, young and old, conservative and liberal. The tasks are challenging enough and exciting enough to call for the best in each of us, preacher and layman, whatever our age, whatever our race, whatever our talents. One primary question facing our Conference is not how we are going to respond to the demands of the various groups within the Conference, but how the pressure of the Gospel of Jesus Christ makes demands on us as people and preachers called Methodists.

No one of us as an individual or as a member of any group within this Conference dares to think of himself more highly than he ought to think. There is room in this Conference and in this Church for everyone of us and all the ability we have. No one group can say to another: "We don't need you—you have no business here." We are all one. We need each other. One primary task in the year ahead is to develop a program that will reduce polarization and unify our Conference for its Christian mission. In our variety of opinions we are friends and allies. It may be important to do your own thing but it is far more important to do unto others as you would they should do unto you. The main thing is not doing our "own thing" but being obedient to the purpose of God for His Church.

One of South Carolina laymen of another denomination has said, "If we do not have freedom of expression or differences of opinions, the voice of the Church is reduced to the lowest common denominator and ceases to be a cutting sword for righteousness in our society." But, let me add, freedom of expression and differences of opinions in protesting a specific wrong is easier than formulating a thought-out alternate conception of the Church's role in the world.

The merger of the two South Carolina Conferences in the immediate future calls black and white United Methodists to a new way of life based on forgiveness, reconciliation and human sensitivity, rather than conflict over structure and composition of boards, commissions and committees. We look forward to a merger that will be void of racial antagonisms, void of seeking self-advantage or forgetfulness of the general good of the Church. We look forward to a merger based on brotherhood, where success shall be founded on service, and honor given to worth alone.

Beyond the merger of two peoples living side by side and belonging to the same Church, is the projected uniting of peoples with varied traditions. As we study this projected unity, let us be aware that it is not enough to assume that unification will quickly produce the oneness of mutual recognition and acceptance which is necessary in any unification. Various spiritual and institutional dimensions must be encompassed. Members of uniting churches must genuinely desire to be one with all those of other denominations. Until this desire is present there can be no unity.

It is recommended that each individual church in the Conference make a serious study of itself and of the community in which it is located. This study should include its membership; its program of worship, education and outreach; its finances, its leadership and its physical facilities. There can be no substitute for an intelligent seeking out and facing of its own resources, situation and degree of commitment by a local church. The local church must take seriously the needs of the community in which it is located as well as involve itself in the necessary change that must follow if there is to be reconciliation.

It is our opinion that this kind of methodical, objective stock-taking can be of immense psychological, financial and practical value to a congregation as it prepares for both the short and long range mission of serving our Lord. Every church should have a simple, clear statement of purpose that will move it into its mission, a statement that is its own expression of the intention of Christ.

We are already out of the days when we accept without question directives and programs coming down from the top. The day is far spent when General Boards and Agencies and Bishops pass down ready made implementations of plans and programs and expect them to be carried out 1, 2, 3, a. b. c.

I do not mean to depreciate the ecclesiastical structure of the Church. Given the diversity and complexity of our Church and the society in which we live, either chaos or stalemate would occur without ecclesiastical authority. We Methodists are often tempted to equate the mission of the Church with decisions of the General Conference. To this end we have often made decisions that in retrospect did injury to the mission of the Church. In a democratic form of government, the majority rules but it is not automatically right. Mr. Justice Holmes once reminded us, "The greatest good of a minority may be the greatest good of the greatest number in the long run." Therefore, we must not turn a deaf ear to the voice of dissent. To be sure, not every dissenting voice is a prophetic voice. The point is that clues to the mission of the Church are sometimes found in the minority voices.

The answer to the mission of the Church is in "the local church finding itself, discovering its own mission, thereby lighting its own fires, and keeping them burning briskly in the service of the Kingdom of God." The future of the Church depends upon what happens in the local church, the local parish. The parish minister is the man working where the action really is. I challenge anyone to depreciate the role of the parish minister.

The days ahead will be different from the days just past in the greater role of the local church. Here is a new task for the liberal tradition. In the days ahead, a non-violent revolutionary, yet dynamic, approach to the mission of the Church needs to be reconstituted—not in the patterns of the past but in the ways adapted to the problems of the future. Those on the left will not accept this approach and those on the right will resist it. But the Church must accept it in order to begin the job of reconciliation and to move forward once more. Rest assured, brethren, the Christian Revolution will prevail—within the Church if the Church will have it—outside the Church, if the Church rejects it. The Kingdom will come.

I close with these words from an editorial in Fortune magazine: "We are asked to turn to the church for enlightenment, but when we do we find the voice of the church is not inspired. The voice of the church today, we find, is the echo of our own voices. And the result . . . is disillusionment, a profound and absolute disillusionment, arising from the fact that when we consult the church we hear only what we ourselves have said. There is only one way out—the sound of a voice, not our own voice, but a voice coming from something not ourselves, in the existence of which we cannot disbelieve. It is the earthly task of the pastors to hear this voice, to cause us to hear it, and to

us what it says. If they cannot hear it, or if they fail to tell us . . . we are utterly lost. Without it we are no more capable of saving the world than we were of creating it in the first place."

COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

The Commission comes to the close of its second year of existence reaffirming its purpose to aid the local church in discovering and encouraging unity in mission to the needs of the community.

Implementations of Last Year's Recommendations

1. The Commission has continued to train its membership in Ecumenical Affairs and to prepare its members for leadership on the Conference District and local church levels. Three members attended Christian Unity Workshops held in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and Overland Park, Kansas. Four other members attended the National Clergy Conference in Atlanta.

2. Dr. William Benfield spoke at Wofford College in October 1969 and members of the Conference Commission spent several hours with this splendidly informed leader of Consultation on Church Union.

3. Dialogue has continued on the local church level between United Methodist and Roman Catholics.

4. Dr. Robert Huston, executive secretary of the general commission on Ecumenical Affairs of the United Methodist Church led a workshop in Columbia on May 4 for commission members, district program council leaders and district superintendent. The purpose of this workshop was to train district leaders and to discover ways of developing leadership on the local church level.

1970 Annual Conference Program

Dr. William Benfield, Presbyterian minister and leader in COCU was invited and he has accepted the invitation to speak at the 1970 Annual Conference. The time of his address will be Wednesday afternoon, June 3.

Projections

1. The Commission on Ecumenical Affairs will initiate a One Day Consultation involving the representatives from the other denominations participating in the COCU studies.

Time—One Day—10:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M.

Place—to be determined by the Commission

2. District Seminars on Ecumenical Affairs for ministers, local church area chairmen and district program leaders.

Time—These seminars will follow the One Day Conference Consultation

Place—Each District of the Annual Conference

The purpose of these seminars will be to aid the local church area chairmen in finding out where the United Methodist Church is in Ecumenical Affairs; where we are as an Annual Conference and where each local church is as far as understanding and information are concerned. The District Program Council Representative in each district will be asked to chairmen these seminars.

3. Traveling Lay School of Theology.

This Ecumenical experience will be an experimental effort for small towns bringing the advantage of more established lay schools in Columbia and Anderson to smaller communities.

4. Annual Conference Program 1971 to be planned later by Commission.

5. Continued efforts to promote dialogue with other protestants and Roman Catholic groups.

6. To encourage continuation of training on the part of conference leaders in Ecumenical Affairs.

Financial Information

The Commission presented a proposed budget of \$3660 for the Conference year 1969-70. The World Service and Finance Commission approved \$2660. Of this amount \$500 was needed to repay a loan made for the previous year. The loan was needed as there were no funds made available for the first year's operation of this Commission.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

REPORT NO. 1

Our Conference Board of Education endeavors to carry out the purpose of the educational ministry of the Church as stated in the Discipline, believing that "Christian Education is rooted in the gospel."

We try to keep before us as a major objective that all persons be aware of and grow in their understanding of God and of his redeeming love as revealed in Jesus Christ and that this be expressed in mission in every relationship.

The Board's leadership has been applied with awareness that the local church is set free to minister and is called upon to initiate and to be creative. To this end there has been less "handing down" to the local church and more emphasis in training for mission and ministry. This has been especially true of leadership to district staff and in area leadership schools.

This is a difficult concept to put into practice because it requires a whole new approach by the local church and by the district and Conference staff. It is recognized that it will take some time for it to be realized in any great measure. The Conference Staff is increasing efforts to become more effective as "enablers" and will be offering to district councils more opportunities to become competent "enablers" for the local church.

Staff members have devoted much time and effort in promoting understanding of the curriculum resources of the United Methodist Church and of effective methods in its use. This has been a major thrust of the training enterprises held during the year as well as countless conferences with individuals and by correspondence.

Co-operative assistance has been given in connection with planning the School of Christian Mission for 1970. Through co-ordinating the efforts of the W. S. C. S., the W. S. G., the Board of Missions, and the Board of Education, prospects are bright for strengthening this enterprise to the end that districts and local churches may have more and better qualified leaders in this area.

Substantial, though totally inadequate, progress has been made to a major goal set for this year: "To lead every local church into a full and creative experience in the understanding and functioning of the Council on Ministries"

A large majority of Christian Workers' Schools have offered courses designed to meet this goal.

In implementing this goal, assistance was given to the district staff "to the end that they become effective enablers for ministry to the local church."

In February our Board was host to a regional Confirmation Laboratory School. Three members from the South Georgia Conference, five from the North Georgia Conference, three from S. C. '66 Conference, and fourteen from our own Conference attended. Trinity and St. Matthew in Greenville were the host churches and Mrs. Lake Waldrop was the director.

CAMP FACILITIES AND PROGRAM

Due to the large number of requests for the use of the United Methodist Camp during fall, winter and spring months, it is becoming increasingly difficult to meet the demands. In the past year we have served sub-districts, church school classes, District W. S. C. S. groups, District Lay Retreats, Golden Age Groups, Methodist Men's Clubs, Boy Scout Troops, Conference Committees, Conference and District Training Groups.

The Board is on record as approving three badly needed additional facilities; a recreational building, a maintenance building, and a swimming pool. Present plans call for the construction of a recreational building on a cash basis from donations earmarked for that purpose and for adding the other two when satisfactory arrangements for financing can be made with a loan agency.

1967-68 contributions from local churches were \$43,930.16. 1968-69 contributions were \$41,239.99. \$27,130.76 has been contributed from June 1, 1969, to March, 1970.

It is recommended that each church again be requested to contribute \$1 per church school member for the operation and development of the Camp for 1970-71. The last **Conference Journal** lists 132,736 church school members.

During the summer of 1969, 780 children and youth attended programs at the Camp, in the following activities: Elementary Camp (480), Junior High Camp (258), Study Seminar for Midlanders (29), Study Seminar for Seniors (7), and Tenting and Hiking Camp (6).

The ministry of our summer program is made possible by the ministers (38 in 1969) and college students and lay personnel (31). This priceless service is available because each of these persons feels that it is a part of his ministry to work with the children and youth of the South Carolina Conference.

Mr. Wesley Voigt is Camp Superintendent and Director. Mrs. Voigt serves as Dietitian.

By policy of the Board of Education, Midlander and Senior Study Seminars at the Camp were open to youth of the '66 Conference in 1969. No applications were received.

ASSEMBLIES

On behalf of the local church, effective ministries were offered in the summer of 1969: The Senior Adult Assembly at Columbia College, Junior High Week at Spartanburg Junior College, and Youth and Mission Week for Mid Highs and for Senior Highs at Columbia College. The leadership was through the voluntary service of ministers and laymen, serving as deans and counselors. The adult activities were under the general supervision of The Reverend B. B. Brown; the youth program, under Mrs. Lake Waldrop. A total of 176 attended the assemblies for youth. Thirty-five attended the Senior Adult Assembly.

SPECIAL GOALS FOR 1970-71

- I. To put leadership development opportunities in reach of every local church worker:

By working through and in co-operation with District Program Staffs and clusters of churches, promoting leadership development

through seminars, workshops, laboratory classes, leadership schools, etc.

By offering these opportunities in a variety of schedules and settings in order to make them available to those who have not been able or willing to participate in conventional settings which have demanded large blocks of time.

- II. Assist districts in offering training to ministers and others in confirmation for church membership — through seminar workshops and laboratory classes, etc.
- III. To offer the following new opportunities during the summer of 1970:
 1. Instruction, inspiration and fellowship for young musicians and potential musicians of local churches — through a music camp (for grades 7 through 12).
 2. An experience in Christian Nurture and fellowship for families of mentally retarded children — through a weekend camp for families of mentally retarded children.
 3. A change of environment, worship, Christian Nurture, and fellowship for the children from low income families — by encouraging local churches to sponsor a week of camping for deprived children in a regular and normal camp setting.
 4. A new approach is being used in planning the Senior Adult Assembly, making it ecumenical in cooperation with the following denominations: Baptists, Lutheran, Presbyterian, and Episcopal.
 5. A Youth Ministry Weekend — July 31 - Aug. 2 — designed to assist officers in the local church and subdistrict better to prepare themselves as leaders in Youth Ministry.

IV. CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

To help local church Co-ordinators of Children's Ministry to function effectively in Council on Ministries to meet the needs of children.

By assisting district co-ordinators of Children's Ministry to become more effective leaders and enablers to the local church.

By establishing and using new approaches to training Children's Workers.

By using clusters of churches as the base for training.

By District Co-ordinators concentrating on three or four churches to cultivate resource persons. These churches in turn can be called upon by local churches when needs arise — amounts to area resource centers.

V. YOUTH MINISTRY

To assist local church youth and their leaders to become better qualified.

By offering training to district co-ordinators, designed to develop competency as enablers to the local church.

By planning, with district leaders, workshops for clusters of churches.

By having Youth Ministry Weekend to help youth and their leaders to know what youth ministry means and how best to implement it in the local church.

VI. ADULT MINISTRY

Goal: Equip the local church adult co-ordinator for his role in the community and as a member of the Council on Ministries.

Assumptions inherent in the above goal statement:

1. That the role of the adult co-ordinator is to help identify, design, and implement the mission of his local church.
2. That the adult co-ordinator has responsibility for mission and nurture.

3. That the adult co-ordinator uses the resources of the Gospel in helping to design ministries.
4. That the District Program Council has persons skilled in the enabling (equipping) process.

Model of response to above goal:

1. Design a two-day setting for the District Adult Co-ordinators which will give them skills in implementing the goal.
2. Specifically, design a comprehensive plan for achieving the above goal.

HIGHER EDUCATION

The Presidents of Columbia and Wofford will make formal reports to the Board of Education and to the Conference.

The Board of Education requests a continuation of the plan of financial support now in effect for higher education. (See requests to World Service attached hereto).

The Board is concerned about the mounting costs of attending Columbia and Wofford Colleges. Competition with costs to state schools, where it is common for the state to pay more than \$1,000 toward the current cost of each student, makes it urgent that South Carolina Methodists give priority to this cause.

CAMPUS MINISTRY — In this day of crisis on the university campus, our campus ministers have endeavored to remain true to the Church's mission to students: in Evangelism (the personal "word"), in Mission, in Vocation (urging upon students the question, "What are you doing with your life?"), and in the enabling ministries of Education and Worship. To bring the Christian perspective to students as they face personal decisions and campus issues is a major objective.

The Board of Education has entered into a comprehensive evaluation of Campus Ministry and is projecting further study for the coming year. See recommendations below.

The following recommendations are made regarding Campus Ministry for 1970-1971:

1. That we reaffirm the purposes of Campus Ministry as set forth in **The Book of Discipline:**

To lead all members of the college and community to accept the Christian faith in God, according to the Scriptures; to live as true disciples of Jesus Christ; and to become members of Christ's Church.

To deepen, enrich, and mature the Christian faith of college and university men and women through commitment to Jesus Christ and his Church and to assist them in their service and leadership to the world, in and through the Church.

To witness in the campus community to the mission, message, and life of the Church.

(Par. 1040. 2)

2. That we support a full-time ministry at Clemson University, University of South Carolina, and Winthrop. That we support a part-time ministry for the campuses of Furman, College of Charleston, Baptist College, the Citadel, and the S. C. Medical College.
3. That the basis for financial support be 20 per cent of the Higher Education asking. (We are pleased that the Board of Missions is recommending to Annual Conference that the program expenses of the Wesley Foundations be designated as a Conference Mission Special for the coming year.)
4. That during the coming Conference Year we engage in a study of Campus Ministry to determine the following:

- A. Its responsibility in implementing the Church's mission on the campus.
- B. Its relationship to the local church and district.
- C. What basis of support will be adequate for the Church's mission to the campus.
- D. What form (structure) the campus ministry units will take in relation to local churches in order to achieve the function of mission.
- E. What is the priority for Campus Ministry in the total mission of the church.

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**BOARD OF EDUCATION
REQUESTS FOR 1970 - 1971 CONFERENCE YEAR
CHRISTIAN EDUCATION SUNDAY**

We recommend that observance of Christian Education Sunday, (Rally Day) be held on September 27, 1970, and that the offering taken be an amount equal to 2 per cent of the Pastor's and Associate Pastor's total cash salary including travel and expense fund for the current year.

SOUTH CAROLINA METHODIST CAMP

We recommend that an offering be taken for the South Carolina Methodist Camp development and maintenance program on Sunday, October 25, 1970, the goal to be \$1.00 per church school member.

HIGHER EDUCATION

It is requested that the plan of financial support now in effect be continued. The amount requested for 1970-71 is 5.7% of the total net funds raised as reported to World Service and Finance for the Conference Year 1968-1969.

The Board of Education recommends that this fund be divided as follows: 40% to Columbia College, 40% to Wofford College, and 20% to Campus Ministry. The formula now in effect is 40.816% for Columbia College, 40.816% for Wofford College and 18.368% for Campus Ministry.

We recommend that November 1, 1970, be observed as Higher Education Sunday and that each local church plan an observance designed to create an understanding of the total program of Higher Education.

RACE RELATIONS DAY

We recommend that the churches of the Conference observe Race Relations Day the second Sunday in February and take a voluntary offering; and further, that the Conference Treasurer in reporting these funds to the treasurer of the General Board of Education in Nashville, Tennessee, ask that they be directed to Paine College. This observance is to be sponsored jointly by the Conference Boards of Education and Christian Social Concerns.

YOUTH SERVICE FUND

On the recommendation of the Conference Council on Youth Ministry the Board of Education requests that each local church be asked to support the "Youth Service Fund" as a budget item rather than through the voluntary offering which has been customary.

It is suggested that an "asking" equal to 50¢ per member of the youth division be requested of each church.

Note:

The Youth Service Fund, which has ranged from \$8,000 to \$13,000 in this Conference in recent years, is now divided as follows:

45% for Mission projects across the world through the World and National Divisions of the Board of Missions.

25% for Christian Education in Mission fields.

15% is returned to our Conference for Youth Ministry through the Conference Youth Council.

15% Christian Education through the Division of the local church of General Board of Education in Nashville.

It is believed that the proposed plan will provide for our youth an opportunity for more meaningful involvement in the overall program of stewardship in the local church.

REPORT NO. 2

Report of the President of Columbia College

It is my privilege to present to you my nineteenth report as President of Columbia College.

Time and space will allow the recording of only a few facts and projections for the future. Members of the Conference who wish more detailed information on academic, social, religious, and financial matters are reminded that copies of minutes of trustees' meetings are filed in the archives of the Conference in the Wofford library. Full audits are available in the offices of the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Conference Board of Education, and the Secretary of the Conference.

President Pusey of Harvard opens his annual report for 1968-1969 with this statement: "Although the last twelve months brought numerous important constructive achievements, 1968-1969 at Harvard must, it seems to me, be described in a summary view a dismal year." Thankfully, we at Columbia College can say that this past year has been one of our best academically and in most aspects of our college life. But, in all honesty, we must conclude that financially this has been perhaps our most difficult of the last decade!

Academic Programs

Perhaps the most exciting curriculum trend on this campus is the "two-way-street" approach in a number of our courses. Professors and students are relating their research and study to society. Practicums allow groups of students to move to social agencies in our community, and beyond, to make

practical application of their inquiry and findings in library, classroom, and laboratory. In reverse, this plan brings to our campus many groups of persons from the community who are interested in working for a better society. For example, two learning institutes, one on juvenile delinquency prevention and the other on pollution, have involved several hundred people in a most helpful way.

Our Board Committee on Academic Affairs and the Faculty have worked diligently to effect economies in several departments—the sciences, for instance — and we believe they have succeeded without adversely affecting the quality of the academic programs.

We are utilizing the competencies of several of our faculty in "combination roles" in order to operate as efficiently and economically as possible, but we are determined that there is to be no reduction in the quality of teaching.

RAPPORT WITH STUDENTS

We continue our efforts for good rapport between faculty, administration, alumnae, and students. Because of thorough committee work, and the privilege I have each week of informal discussions with students, the college has made real progress in this matter. It is most important that all of us on this campus work diligently for good communications.

College Finances

Church-related institutions of higher education have a bleak future unless state support can be obtained, or large endowments are found, or substantial increases in church support are available soon.

What is the validity for such a statement? In most institutions of our type spiraling costs, together with decreasing percentage support from the church, causes a real dilemma. For instance, ten years ago the Methodist Church was furnishing about 12% of our Columbia College budget. Today we receive about 5%. This is probably typical of Methodist institutions across the nation. Is it not safe to predict that by 1980 the church will be furnishing only 1 or 2 per cent of our budgets?

Student fees have risen sharply, and may sky-rocket again in the next few years. This would relieve the agony caused by growing annual deficits. Many of us oppose this approach, however, simply because these colleges traditionally supported by the church have been available for the middle and lower income segments of society. If we are driven to a more affluent student population, we will be depriving large numbers of students for whom this institution was founded.

Substantial endowment improvement would appear to be one of the best approaches, but our supporters will have to go far and fast in order that this be a safe solution. A decade or two ago, it was said by the best college administrators in our country that at least one million dollars should be available in every college for each block of one hundred students. Very few of our church-related colleges have such endowment. It is probably true that to safely operate for the future, we ought to have more than one million dollars per one hundred students. But what is the actual situation today? In our own institution, with approximately 850 students, we have less than two million dollars.

Columbia College, with approval of the Board of Trustees, has determined to move ahead with an effort to substantially improve our endowment. About ten million dollars must be raised, over the next few years, for our endowment to insure solvency. This effort will be unpublicized, will not be conducted through the churches, and will be aimed at substantial sums from relatively few donors. The main drive is to secure support for senior professorships.

Until a few years ago independent colleges had this field of support virtually to themselves. Public institutions confined their activities to areas of tax support. All of this has been changed. Today most state institutions have their development offices working to secure large support from private sources.

Indeed, there has been a "mass invasion" of the private sector by state-supported institutions.

While we work to improve our endowment holdings, we must continue efforts to secure state funds to assist our students who are penalized financially when they make the choice to attend the private college.

Religious Life

Our Religious Life Committee, composed of students and faculty, has promoted a number of helpful chapel services following the life styles of today's trends in worship. Last year a series of great concerns — Birth, Marriage, and Death — offered our community outstanding speakers and leaders. Currently a similar series is in progress on "Signs of Times," bringing new awareness of new forms in worship — through art, music, drama, and preaching.

Building Program

At long last, our Physical Education Center is under way! We expect this greatly needed facility, a combination gymnasium and auditorium, to be ready for occupancy in the spring of 1971. Our plan is to entertain the Annual Conference on campus in June of 1971. It will be complete with swimming pool, dance studios, classrooms, and faculty offices. The center will cost about \$1,100,000.

Appreciation

Let me express gratitude for the supportive thought of all those who have undergirded our program this year. The Board of Education, the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Board of Laity, Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., and his Cabinet. Alumnae, students, and faculty have been most cooperative. The Board of Trustees has given unselfishly of time and energy in supervision and guidance.

We regret that the rotation plan of our Conference will cause us to lose the invaluable services of three splendid board members: Mrs. H. G. Hendrix, Mrs. LeRoy Epps, and the Reverend Victor R. Hickmen.

REPORT NO. 3

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF WOFFORD COLLEGE

Some weeks ago, in a speech on "The State of the College," I suggested that Wofford's number one goal for the 1970's should be "to create the nation's best interpretation of what it means to be a Christian college." Just a week later we had our annual period of special religious emphasis (an anomaly at a Christian college?), and Dr. Jameson Jones gave a helpful speech in which, among other matters, he invited us to distinguish between being church-related and being Christian. Three days after Dr. Jones' speech, Dean Lesesne, Dean Welch, and I had a panel discussion with Wofford students dealing with the question of how well Wofford is doing in its quest to be a Christian college. It was a spirited session.

The year 1969-70 was a year of excitement and progress at Wofford. There were important physical changes on the campus, dedicated and talented persons were added to our faculty and staff, new academic programs were planned, innovative administrative structures were undertaken, and gift support from the Church and from alumni and other friends reached new heights. Educational costs also continued to soar, and we had to raise fees more than last year. Despite all that, I feel that this report should be used to involve the United Methodists of South Carolina in our quest to be a Christian college, rather than to detail events and attainments of the year. If we are to "create the nation's best interpretation of what it means to be a Christian college," there must be a new intensity of conversation between Wofford and the Church. The primary purpose of this report is to ask for that. We're serious. Let's really talk with each other—and listen!

Let's discuss first the relationship between this Conference and Wofford. It has been a good one. The Conference elects Wofford trustees and has given us good leadership. You have given increasing financial support from the date of our founding to the present. You have sent us your sons and other students to bring life and challenge to the campus. You have performed thousands of individual favors—from speaking in our Chapel to entertaining our glee club. You have given inspiration and moral support in good times and bad.

Wofford has, in turn, educated many of the leading laymen and ministers of the Conference and, indeed, of world Methodism. We have offered and still offer scholarships to your sons and to all students preparing for the Christian ministry. We have maintained the archives and historical records of the Conference, at a cost to the College now approaching \$20,000 per year. We

have joyfully entertained Annual Conference from time to time, including this year, and we are grateful for your presence.

As we talk about the great issues and the deeper meanings of being a Christian college, we covet the maintenance and strengthening of these and other ties. We are proud to be related to the United Methodist Church in South Carolina. We think the denomination to which we are related is a great one and the nation's leader in Christian higher education. We also think the colleges and universities which are related to the United Methodist Church are among the best in the nation and worthy of enthusiastic support.

But is Wofford Christian? If we mean, has Wofford attained Christian perfection, the answer is no. If we refer to a serious quest, the answer is yes. We want your help and advice.

First, we think to be a Christian college means to be the best we can possibly be; i.e., to practice Christian stewardship in the full and prayerful dedication of whatever talents and resources we have to our calling—education. We think there is no higher Christian calling than to prepare young people for useful lives in the real world, and we want to be better at that than anyone else. Wofford is a leader in academic programs. Our January Interim has been a pace-setter. We shall begin in September a new residence hall educational program, a cross-disciplinary study of the cosmic problems of mankind—over and above our present curriculum—and a program which should reassure any students or other persons who doubt that learning is related to life.

We think that a Christian college must seek truth fearlessly in the classroom and in its total intellectual life. While we are free to explore the sacred, it is not our business to censor or screen out the secular. Ideas need to be tested, not suppressed. Thus, we believe that any speaker invited by a Wofford College sponsor is entitled to our platform, provided that he submits to questions from the audience. Of course, we cannot and would not shield from prosecution anyone who violates law when speaking or in other ways enjoying the hospitality of the College.

Second, a Christian college must be a celebrating Christian community, concerned about worship, supportive fellowship, and the proclamation of the Gospel. This does not require the imposition of a profession of faith as a condition of entering Wofford as teacher or student. This does not require daily chapel or sectarian indoctrination in the classroom. It does require us to assume an unblushing institutional stance and let the world know that Wofford is by history and present conviction within the Christian Tradition. We must offer to our students, as a great free elective, the faith and ethic of Christianity. By implication, no student or faculty member who objects to that institutional stance should become a part of the College.

Third, the Christian college, no less than the individual Christian, must seek to live according to the Gospel. If our institutional life is marred by selfishness, insensitivity, trespass on the rights of others, prejudice, carnality, and the like, we must repent, ask forgiveness, and seek to live a new life. We have a long way to go in setting our house in order at Wofford. We are sinners.

Again it should be said that we are trying. The trustees and administration of Wofford determined several years ago that the College would not discriminate on the basis of race, color, or national origin. As I read the records of those deliberations of the early 1960's, this decision was based largely upon the Christian concept of the brotherhood of man. The current administration subscribes to that concept. I want you to know that, and I want your continued support of the non-discriminatory administration of the affairs of the College. I have felt that you do give that support, although a few individual church members have criticized us for recruiting black students and employing as a key administrator a well-qualified Christian Negro educator. Incidentally, there are many more highly qualified Negroes seeking admission than we have scholarship funds to support. This is a nationwide problem, especially in private institutions.

Fourth, we cannot spend all of our energy on ourselves. Wofford is not just on campus. It is in the church, the city, the state, and the world. Our institution must bring prophetic leadership and reconciling ministry to our environment; and the individual citizens of our campus, who are also citizens of the church and society, must be free to express themselves on political and social issues, so long as they do not interfere with the rights of others. No one is more concerned than the president of a college that it should have a good "image" with its various publics. On the other hand, we cannot prefer image building to freedom and justice. When what is right conflicts with local mores, our Christian commitment may mean that we do not "fit in" but rather seek to educate our environment, with affection and tolerance but with complete honesty.

Even though the Christian college may occasionally find itself in friction with society, we have many opportunities to "bridge gaps" in a ministry of reconciliation. For example, Wofford can seek various ways to interpret our student generation to the "folks back home" and to interpret the church to the young people on campus.

Let me say now to the United Methodists of South Carolina that your young people and the others on our campus are first-rate. We haven't given up a single one. This does not mean that we have no problems or that we don't take our problems seriously. We have some grave concerns, and I want to close by sharing one with you.

All of you are hearing and reading that many students from junior high through college age are experimenting with drugs such as marijuana, LSD, amphetamines, and even heroin. I hasten to say that our smaller college campuses in South Carolina have not been as hard hit as schools in urban areas, but we must be deeply concerned. Many of our students who do not themselves use marijuana tell us that today's students do not feel it is wrong to seek pleasure in this way. They argue that no one has really proven that marijuana is harmful, while society has made completely respectable the use of alcohol and tobacco, both of which are known to have dangerous qualities. They also point out that the amphetamines students take to stay awake for exams are the same pills that truck drivers use to stay awake while driving and that many other adults use as "pick-me-ups" during the day.

We reply rather lamely that two wrongs don't make a right, and we urge our students not to risk long range health and happiness for short range pleasure or convenience. But we need help here from churches and homes. Drug use is a problem of the whole society. Smoking seems to be declining in popularity, but most of our students—even the Methodists and Baptists—have decided before going off to college that drinking alcoholic beverages is proper conduct. Society has taught them this and alcohol is still the number one drug problem on every campus. Furthermore, it is a short step to move from the use of alcohol—which is known to have caused untold personal and social misery—to the use of other drugs with less well known dangers.

As you join us in discussing what it means to be a Christian college, please consider how our churches and colleges can help young people mature successfully in a society which builds a way of life around pleasure seeking and then sells the young for joining in. We can and do enact and enforce rules prohibiting the possession and use of alcohol and other drugs on our campus. That may be necessary; it surely isn't sufficient. Here is an opportunity for us to work together and let our youth know that this is our problem as well as theirs.

THE COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

PURPOSE: The purpose of the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations is to confront the people of the church with the sanctity of vocation; to provide means whereby they may see the Church at work in mission to the needs of the world; to disseminate information as to needs within the church for persons in full time occupations; to work through the local church so that the Call of God for service may reach the ears of heeding persons.

THIS YEAR'S ENDEAVORS: During this conference year the Conference Commission has sponsored a team of college age adults with two leaders on a mission to Hawaii. During this mission, six college adults and two leaders served for eight weeks in the Palolo Community Church in Honolulu. Four of the six young adults are headed for full time Church Occupations. Reports of this mission testified to the fruitfulness of the endeavor.

Also, the Commission has this year published a pamphlet listing financial resources available to South Carolina students in colleges and universities. This has been distributed to the local church and made available for wide useage.

The Commission has set up operational structure for Methodist Volunteer Service as part of the Quadrennial Emphasis. A shortage of funds in the Fund of Reconciliation has made impractical wide-spread recruitment of volunteers. We have the needs in South Carolina and projects calling for volunteers, but we lack the financial support to underwrite these projects.

"We recommend that two weekend Youth Missions to Columbia, S. C. be held during 1970. One will be held in October and one in February. Youth from churches in South Carolina will comprise the teams. Work in mission will be in low economic areas of the city and in places such as Crafts-Farrow Hospital, Bethlehem Center, and others. It is hoped that these two missions will serve as pilot projects for more extensive youth missions in summer months."

The Commission has also prepared a display on needs and opportunities for service to be displayed at Annual Conference.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR NEXT YEAR'S WORK:

We recommend a Mission team to Costa Rica (or some other Central or South American country) working with one of the South Carolina missionaries. The team will be composed of college students with adult leaders. They will work in areas of need with an aim of seeing the church at work in mission to other parts of the world.

We recommend that each church examine itself in the light of what is being done in that congregation to give the call of God to full time service in church occupations. The use of CHURCH OCCUPATIONS AND VOLUNTARY SERVICE to give information on needs within the church can be helpful in every church. Public school guidance counselors appreciate receiving this information for their work.

We recommend that District Program Councils consider the work of Enlistment and plan for training local church leaders in roles of enlistment. We will seek to train District Directors of Enlistment in their roles so that they may take the lead in Program Councils.

CONCLUSION: Our Commission is composed of district directors of Enlistment from each district and representatives of every other Board and Agency of the Conference. We seek the support of all agencies in being concerned about Enlistment. We have profited from using the services of the Monthly Mailing from the Program Council. We feel that this coordination is fruitful. We appreciate the work of Mrs. Lake Waldrop, Staff Representative to our Commission. She has proven of great help and assistance. We will hold a planning retreat for training new district directors in May, 1970, so that our work may begin promptly with the new conference year.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM**REPORT NO. 1****Evangelism Defined**

Evangelism is the winning of persons to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. It is an attitude, a spirit, and a living faith that finds expression in a continuous cooperative effort on the part of the Holy Spirit and man to bring the individual into vital relationship with God and his fellowmen through faith in Jesus Christ, God's Son. It results in a definite personal experience of salvation, a growing sensitivity to the social relevance of the gospel, and a progressive building of Christlike character. It seeks to bring man into complete harmony with the will of God, into the fellowship of the Church, and into involvement in the world to be God's servant of reconciliation. It helps him to grow spiritually through the means of grace and to serve God in daily living.

Evangelism is the task of the whole Church. Every minister, department, agency, local church, and member of The United Methodist Church is responsible for its accomplishment.

1969-1970 Report**Seminar on Evangelism:**

The Seminar on Evangelism was held at The Methodist Camp, Cleveland, S. C., on September 29 and 30, 1969. Fifty-eight ministers representing eleven districts of the South Carolina Conference ('85) participated. Dr. Carlyle Marney of the Interpreters' House Lake Junaluska, N. C., served as the featured resource leader for this experience, which was declared by many in attendance to have been the most inspiring ever held in this Conference.

Summer Evangelistic Missions:

Campground Ministry: During the summer months of 1969 five chaplains (Baptist, Episcopal, Lutheran, Methodist and Presbyterian) ministered to some 26,000 summer residents and vacationers in the Grand Strand area of our state making this project the largest of any of its kind in the United States.

Lake Murray Ministry: This project was carried out again in the summer of 1969 under the able leadership of the Reverend John Dickey Evans, a student at the Candler School of Theology of Emory University. The program included activities in the following areas: outreach, worship, recreation, fellowship, and visitation, with attendance at the weekly worship service numbering between 70 and 170. The Lake Murray Ministry is truly ecumenical in outreach with participants from almost every faith.

Training Opportunities:

The District Directors of Evangelism and officers of the Conference Board of Evangelism attended the annual Candler Camp Meeting and the Southeastern Jurisdiction Conference on Evangelism at Lake Junaluska the week of August 17-22, 1969 where they received training in the performance of their offices and inspiration at the feet of some of United Methodism's leaders in the area of evangelism.

Council on Evangelism:

This year's national Council on Evangelism was held in Cincinnati, Ohio January 6-9, 1970. Representing the South Carolina Conference were the

Reverend J. O. Gilliam, Chairman of the Conference Board; Dr. George W. Whitaker, Jr., Cabinet Representative; the Reverend Needham Williamson, Board Member; and the Reverend J. Louis Fowke, Program Council Staff Member.

TV Ministry:

During the 1969-1970 football season the Board of Evangelism sponsored a series of one minute messages on television stations in the following cities: Columbia, Spartanburg, Florence, and Charleston. These spot announcements were programmed during these stations' football coverage and were intended to speak to the male audience. Cooperating in this project was the Conference Television Radio and Film Commission.

Conference Youth Night:

The Board of Evangelism in cooperation with The Shepherds will sponsor a Wednesday evening, June 3, 1970, Youth Night at our Annual Conference session. This program will feature as its main speakers the Reverend Tom Skinner, former Brooklyn gang leader and later a Billy Graham Associate Evangelist; Mr. Clebe McClarey, a handicapped Viet-Nam Purple Heart veteran; and members of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Youth of the Conference are being invited to participate.

1970-1971 Program Projection**Bishop's Convocation on Evangelism:**

Plans are underway for a Bishop's Convocation on Evangelism to be held at the 1970-1971 Annual Conference year. This program is to be held in cooperation with the General Board of Evangelism and the several program boards and agencies of both conferences.

Summer Evangelistic Missions:

The Board of Evangelism will continue its support of the Lake Murray Ministry and the Campground Ministry, underwriting \$500 of the support of the project at Lake Murray and \$900 for the Grand Strand project.

Training Opportunities:

The Board of Evangelism will continue its practice of sending the District Directors of Evangelism to the Candler Camp Meeting and Southeastern Jurisdiction Conference on Evangelism at Lake Junaluska and will at the same time continue subscriptions for these directors and officers of the Board in the mailings subscription service, keeping these key persons informed of the official releases of all new books published by the official publishing arm of the General Board of Evangelism.

Lay Witness Missions:

The Board of Evangelism will continue to encourage local churches to participate in the Lay Witness Movement and will seek to cooperate in every possible way with the persons and churches interested in this evangelistic activity.

Evangelism Pilot Project:

Members of the Board of Evangelism will participate in a pilot evangelistic project during the 1970-1971 Conference year. This initial project will be scheduled for a local church situation with several community United Methodist churches banding together in an evangelistic endeavor which will include training, visitation, preaching, and other efforts. This project will be held in cooperation with the pastors and the district superintendent with the expenses of the participants being borne by the board members themselves.

"Good News Sunday"

November 15, 1970 shall be designated as Good News Sunday in all United Methodist Churches. The Bishop, the Cabinet, the staff, the laity and the ministers are requested to actively encourage full participation from each local

church in providing leadership, financial support and witnesses to do the visitation on November 15. This project be designated as a "Program Projection" in cooperative evangelism for the year 1970-71.

Board of Evangelism and Missions Parsonage

A Parsonage is held in the name of the Board of Missions, South Carolina Conference Southeastern Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church, Incorporated.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

REPORT NO. 1

Epworth Children's Home

Traditionally we have thought of the program of Epworth Children's Home as consisting of a group of children living in the cottages on the Epworth campus located at 2900 Millwood Avenue, Columbia, South Carolina. Indeed, there were one hundred ninety-three (193) children and youth who did live at this address during all or most of last year. Here they received their full care, supervision, training, education and all else that goes with our concern for those who belong to us in this peculiar way. However, to think of this as the program—the total program—of Epworth Children's Home is to underestimate greatly

the service and outreach of this most important agency of The Methodist Church in South Carolina.

In addition to those we are so accustomed to think of as Epworth, let us consider some others who also were a part of the everbroadening Epworth program.

Two hundred eighty-three (283) parents and relatives of those living on campus received continuous assistance through the year in working through problems or strengthening family ties so as to reunite the family.

Two hundred twenty-two (222) children and youth were assisted in the off-campus Family Service Program. Along with these, one hundred fifty parents and relatives (150), seventy social agencies (70), and twenty-two (22) Methodist ministers requested and received assistance in working out plans for meeting various family problems.

Thirty-nine (39) new children were admitted to campus residence during the year and thirty-three (33) were either placed back in a reunited family situation or in other types of living situations more suitable for the needs of the particular person.

During the final weeks of the year, temporary or emergency care was provided to four (4) families consisting of eight (8) children. Since this program is just under way and more adequate provisions are now being made for this type of care, the number served will be in much larger proportions in coming years.

The fact that only fourteen (14) children lived in eight (8) family homes during the latter part of the year does not begin to tell the story here. This is only the beginning of a new program that may have more significant effects in child care than any of us can foresee at the present. This is not the old type of foster home program. This is the employment as staff members of husband and wife teams to care for small numbers of children within their own home. Epworth is one of the pioneers in this.

Nineteen (19) youth were assisted in higher education during the year. This included college, nurses' training, secretarial training, trade school, and similar programs in accord with the individual need of the student.

Thirty-four (34) retarded children were included in the Epworth program last year. Special education is provided on campus for this group. This along with other provisions makes it possible to be of assistance here when three years ago this entire group had to be passed by because of lack of program to meet their needs.

Special services were provided eighteen (18) families in their own homes. Thirty (30) children, twenty-two (22) parents, and fifteen (15) social agencies were also involved in this program. In every case there were children who had lived outside the home, but because of the services provided within the home itself, it was possible to replace the children with their families. At the present time, twelve (12) of these families have been assisted for a full year or longer.

Over five hundred (500) counseling sessions were provided in a newly established family counseling service. At the end of a full year in this area the number of persons assisted will be very extensive.

Two facts should be noted concerning the above statements. First is the expanding nature of the program with so much of it yet in beginning stages. Epworth no longer gears its program to a single area but now more especially seeks to respond in many ways to the varying needs of children and their families.

Second, such a report as this tells of service rendered to dozens—even hundreds—in a single sentence or two. It is left only to the understanding, the knowledge, the imagination of the reader to realize the amount of time and energy expended in helping just one person with one problem. In this our program we are talking about almost twelve hundred (1,200) individuals, many of them provided day-by-day care, and others being assisted in every corner of the entire State of South Carolina. Truly, this is the church in action!

REPORT NO. 2

THE METHODIST HOME, ORANGEBURG, S. C.

I. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

This has been a year of unusual excitement at our Home. The construction of five new buildings is now underway. It all began with the demolition of Asbury Hall in October, 1969. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held on November 9, 1969. Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., Resident Bishop of the Columbia Area, Mr. W. L. Brannon, Acting Superintendent, Wm. J. Sigmon, Chairman of the Board, Henchie McGee, representative of Cleckley-McGee, Contractors, and many others participated in this special service. The occasion marked the culmination of more than two years of planning by the Board of Trustees and McMilliam, Bunes, Townsend & Bowen, Architects-Engineers.

Five buildings are under construction. This includes a Center Campus unit with kitchen and dining rooms, program and activities areas, sales department, beauty parlor and barber shop, lounge areas, post office and office space. There is one Intermediate building with forty-two (42) beds. There are two (2) residence halls with thirty (30) single rooms and private baths. There is a mechanical building which will provide heating and air-conditioning for these buildings and other new ones in the master plan.

The completion of the buildings currently under construction has been timed to coincide with the completion of our Methodist Homes Campaign pledges. It is expected that all pledges will be paid by the end of March, 1970.

The buildings now under construction will cost in excess of two-million dollars. Our Home should collect approximately \$1,800,000 from the Campaign pledges. The Board of Trustees has approved a bond sale as a means of financing the remainder of this project. Therefore, it is essential that we collect all pledges made during this Campaign. Collection on pledges at the middle of March total \$1,125,000.00.

Our new facilities will enable us to provide much better accommodations for our residents and patients. In addition, they will enable us to provide an enlarged and an improved program for our people.

The Home will continue, during construction, to provide care for an average of 200 persons. Many of these need financial assistance and a very large number of our applicants need financial assistance. The Board of Trustees has taken the position that we can provide assistance only in proportion to the amount received on Support Fund. All others must pay the full service fee which is based on the cost of operation. Funds received from memorials and bequests are used for capital improvements.

II. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The following statements are an attempt to answer three questions published in the 1968 Conference Journal, pages 187, 188 & 189:-

1. The Superintendent graduated from the Institute of Gerontology, University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, on December 12, 1969. The staff physician has just completed a refresher course in Gerontology at Medical University of South Carolina, Charleston. We are in contact with Emory, Duke and SMU and plan to have a chaplain with special training in Gerontology for appointment by the Bishop in June of 1971. We are in contact with the Institute of Gerontology, University of Michigan, seeking the services of a Geriatric social worker.

Nurses with special training in Gerontology are just now becoming available. We are offering employment to such nurses as are being recommended to us. Other staff persons continue to pursue short courses, etc. through the State Board of Health and The Orangeburg Technical Education Center to upgrade their proficiency.

2. Salaries of nurses are comparable to, or better than, salaries paid in the local hospital and local nursing homes. Orderlies and other non-professional employees are paid at least .15¢ an hour above the minimum wage

scale. Salaries of long-time employees are above this scale. This applies to both black and white persons. Those responsible for food service, food managers, etc., are paid competitive salaries commensurate with their training and ability. The position of matron or hostess is scheduled to be discontinued when we move into the new facilities.

3. We have a program director. Under her leadership as many of our residents as will cooperate are involved in such cultural opportunities as are available in Orangeburg. On Campus activities, crafts, etc. are available and participation is encouraged.

A part-time Chaplain presently offers several types of ministry to the residents. A full-time, trained Chaplain, will enable this aspect of the Home's life to be expended greatly.

As a Geriatric social worker becomes available for employment, this will enable the Home to offer specialized assistance in the areas related to the elderly person's emotional and socio-economic adjustments.

The recently opened Orangeburg Mental Clinic makes available to the residents of the Home the resources of a psychiatrist and other related psychiatrically trained persons.

REPORT NO. 3

Greenwood Methodist Home

It is with a consciousness of the privilege which is mine, and with a real sense of joy, that I present this second Annual Report as Administrator of Greenwood Methodist Home. Time and space will not permit the recounting of the countless details that have been woven together to form the fabric of this past year, but perhaps you can catch a glimpse of some of the more important events which have taken place, thereby sharing the sense of thrill that has come to those of us who have been closely associated with this project.

Work of The Board of Trustees

There is no better place to begin this report than to highlight the work of our Board of Trustees during the past year. Elected by the Annual Conference last June, on nomination of the Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, this Board met last August to elect its officers and to organize for its work. The Reverend W. Harry Chandler, who has served so effectively as Chairman of the Building Committee, was elected President of the Board. Others elected were: Bruce R. Sigmon, Vice-President; R. B. Perry, Jr., Secretary; and Brooks S. Stuart, Treasurer.

Throughout the year the Board has met regularly and has given itself tirelessly to the task of formulating policy and endeavoring to chart the future course of the Greenwood Methodist Home. This Board is keenly aware of the great responsibility that has been assigned to it by Annual Conference, and members of the Board, individually and collectively, have assumed that responsibility willingly and enthusiastically. The Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, as well as the Conference as a whole, can take real pride in having elected a group of 21 Trustees who are not only able business men, but who are also sensitive to the needs of the aging. We have cause to be optimistic about what the future holds because the Greenwood Home is in good hands with the Trustees you have elected.

Construction Progress

You will recall that the Ground Breaking Ceremonies for the Nursing Center of the Greenwood Home, the first of our buildings, were held in July of 1969. Actual construction was begun in August, and as of the writing of this report (March, 1970), approximately eight (8) months of construction time has passed. The work is moving at a good pace, and it now appears that the Nursing Center will be able to begin service in the fall of 1970.

It had been hoped that the Nursing Center project could move at a faster pace, but the magnitude of the planning required and the scope of the work to be accomplished simply would not permit this. The contract price for the building alone (taking into account certain deductions and additions made in the plans) is \$1,962,827.00. It is estimated that \$200,000 will be needed to outfit the building with necessary furnishings and equipment. One simply does not "hurry up" with a two and one-quarter million dollar project!

The research devoted to this project by the Building Committee has been thorough; the plans have been made in detail that surpasses verbal description; and the construction is being done with skill and pride. South Carolina Methodism will be able to point with pride to the venture it has made in Greenwood on behalf of the aging who require skilled nursing care!

Interpreting the Program

Your Administrator has had the opportunity throughout the year to help interpret to various groups the Conference Program in ministries to the aging. Through preaching engagements in Churches across the Conference speaking engagements before Church and civic groups, and in the setting of agencies that serve the aging, there has been provided many a channel through which to speak to the questions, "What is the Church doing for the aging — and Why?" It may be true that at one time we did nothing more than provide "room and board" for those who could not provide these essentials for themselves. But we have come to recognize, as our Lord insisted we recognize, that "life is more than meat, and the body is more than raiment" (Luke 12: 23). If we fail to recognize this, then we forfeit our mission, which is nothing less than providing "the life abundant" which, in the Name of Christ, ministers to body, mind and spirit!

Supporting Our Homes

To enable your Conference Homes for the Aging to provide the services needed to support life, and the programs that enrich life, it is essential that we do an adequate job of providing financial support. In the last several years, this support has been directed to the Homes through primarily two channels: the Methodist Homes Campaign (for capital improvements) and the Methodist Homes Support Fund (for operational expenses, designated mainly for the care of those who cannot pay the full cost of their care). Within a few years the Methodist Homes Campaign will be concluded; is there not the possibility that once the Campaign is concluded, we might upgrade the level of our giving for operational support?

In the Conference Year ahead, we need to begin moving in the direction of increased support. During 1970-71, the Methodist Homes Support Fund will be divided 25/75, with the larger share going to The Methodist Home, Orangeburg. If the Conference is not to "cut back" on operational support for the Orangeburg program, then the level of giving for the Support Fund needs to approximate \$130,000 a year.

If we are to do a quality work in our ministry to the aging, then funds must be provided to enable the programs and services we desire. It is that simple.

Looking Ahead

Although we look forward to the opening of our Nursing Center at Greenwood this fall, we are conscious that when that service begins, our task is not at an end. Indeed, the members of our Board of Trustees and Building Committee have been at work for some time on various phases of the long-range plans for the Greenwood Home. Certain preliminary plans had to be made necessarily in the course of designing and locating the Nursing Center; we now are facing the responsibility of sketching in the details that will shape the future. When the physical facilities are completed on the 75 acre site that will be the campus of the Greenwood Home—and when the programs and services are operational and giving substance to the guiding principle of "adding years to life and life to years"—then, and only then, will we be able to offer the aging a full range of programs and services designed to meet their particular needs. In the meanwhile much remains to be done.

We have not yet developed a "timetable" on which future development will proceed. This schedule will be developed as the details of a comprehensive program and facility plan are completed.

Budget

As this report is written, cost studies for the operation of our Nursing Center are being completed. We do not have a complete picture at this time, but we do have enough information to know that quality nursing service does not come cheaply. There is a wide price range in South Carolina in nursing home service, and just as widely ranging is the quality of care.

The Trustees of the Greenwood Home are dedicated to the proposition that we want to provide the very best of care for the lowest possible cost. Our position will be strengthened if we can open our Nursing Center debt-free as we anticipate.

Our Budget work will be completed by the time we begin to process patient applications during the mid-summer of this year. This information will be available upon request, simply by writing to the Administrator, Greenwood Methodist Home, Post Office Box 1203, Greenwood, S. C. 29646

To a host of friends throughout South Carolina and beyond, the Greenwood Home is indebted. Those of us working in behalf of the Home are grateful for the support directed through the Methodist Home Campaign, and for countless special gifts directed to our building fund and contributed as Memorials. REPORT NO. 5**Golden Cross**

The work of Golden Cross include five nursing scholarships. The Board feels that this is an excellent way to minister to the health and welfare needs of Methodist in South Carolina. Golden Cross funds are used to help with hospitalization of needy Methodist in our Conference. Golden Cross funds are used for the repair and upkeep of our ten homes for retired ministers. Each Church is asked to place Golden Cross in their budget or to receive an offering during Golden Cross Week, the first week in December.

REPORT NO. 6**Recommendations**

SECTION 1. Epworth Children's Home has continued its excellent ministry to the needs of children under its care. We commend the quality of care given its children and join with the Trustees of Epworth in respectfully requesting the Bishop and his Cabinet to re-appoint Dr. Allan R. Broome as superintendent.

SECTION 2. We recommend that the third Sunday in September (September 20, 1970) be set aside as Annual Work Day and that a special freewill offering be received in all churches of the South Carolina Conference on that day for Epworth Children's Home; and also that a special freewill offering shall be received on Mother's Day (May 9, 1971) in all churches in South Carolina for Epworth Children's Home; and that the Church Schools of the South Carolina Conference shall be requested to give the offering received on the first Sunday of each month to the support of Epworth Children's Home.

SECTION 3. We further recommend that each District of the South Carolina Annual Conference accept a quota of not less than the following

We further recommend that a goal be sent to the various churches of the District by the District Superintendent in consultation with the local church. It is recommended that this quota be apportioned on the basis of ability and willingness of the local churches to make the reaching of this quota possible. It is understood that the offerings received on Mother's Day, Annual Work Day, and the first Sunday of each month in the Church Schools may be used to assist them in reaching their requested quota.

SECTION 4. We recognize the ministry rendered to the elderly through the Methodist Home at Orangeburg. We commend the Reverend C. Woodard and his staff for their care of the elderly and join the Trustees of the Methodist Home in respectfully requesting the re-appointment of Mr. Woodard as Superintendent.

SECTION 5. We recommend that each church in our conference set a minimum goal of \$1.50 per member either in freewill offerings or through the budget. It is also recommended that the Thanksgiving week be set aside

in each church for a special offering for the Methodist Homes. We further recommend the support fund for the Orangeburg and Greenwood Homes be divided on a 75% and 25% basis respectively.

SECTION 6. The Board wishes to commend The Reverend T. R. Morton for his efforts in preparing to serve as Administrator of the Greenwood Home, and the leadership he has given in the building program now nearing completion. We request his appointment as Director.

REPORT NO. 7**Nursing Scholarships Program**

The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries will award five scholarships for \$250.00 each to nursing students in South Carolina. REPORT NO. 11

Methodist homes Campaign Continuing Committee

Throughout the past Conference Year, your Methodist Homes Campaign Continuing Committee has sought to fulfill its mission of "keeping alive" the concern for the aging of our Conference, as this was expressed more than two years ago in the Methodist Homes Campaign. In fulfilling this mission our Campaign Office has been maintained at The Methodist Home, Orangeburg, with Mrs. Nancy T. Faulling serving as Director on a part-time basis. Periodic contacts have been made with local Churches for the purpose of keeping them informed of our progress toward realizing the Campaign's \$2,000,000-plus goal.

The effort was made in December to contact by mail every local Church that had not at that time begun to pay its Methodist Homes pledge. Some 77 local Churches, with pledges totaling more than \$85,000 were contacted.

A significant number of these Churches have now undertaken to meet their pledges, and, hopefully, all will undertake to make some contribution before the Campaign payment period is concluded. In January a specially designed promotional poster was mailed to every Church or Charge, along with a report on the Campaign's financial progress. A month-long "follow-up emphasis" was conducted in March. In the concluding months of the Conference Year, visits were made to District Pastors Meetings in every District of the Conference for the purpose of seeking the re-newed support of pastors on behalf of the Campaign.

Total Contributions

As of February 28, 1970 (when this report was prepared), total contributions to the Methodist Homes Campaign stood at \$1,084,848.40. With contributions averaging approximately \$40,000 per month, we can project total giving by the close of the Conference Year (May 31) at \$1,200,000. In gauging "where we stand," it should be remembered that the original Campaign goal was set at \$2,000,000, and that actual gifts and pledges totaled \$2,576,431.78.

Payment Period Timetable

According to the "timetable" under which the Methodist Homes Campaign has been operating, the third year of a three-year payment period began on April 1, 1970, and the Campaign is scheduled to conclude officially on March 31, 1971. It is apparent, however, that when the two-thirds point was reached in the Payment Period (March 31, 1970), the Campaign was not two-thirds "paid out;" and if we continue to pay our pledges at the present monthly average of approximately \$40,000 per month, we will not have reached our \$2,000,000 goal by March 31, 1971.

In evaluating our progress to date, your Committee has taken into account the fact that many local churches took the option of placing the Methodist Homes Campaign Fair Share Goal assigned to them in the Budget, rather than seek pledges from individual Church members. As a result, most of these Churches did not begin to pay their pledges until some six months (or a year) later than the beginning of the Payment Period (April 1, 1968). These Churches will, of course, need additional time in which to meet their goals in full. Your Committee encourages every Church of the Conference to commit itself to the task of meeting its local Church Fair Share Goal in full, regardless of whether it requires one additional year, or two years, or longer!

Construction Progress at The Homes

Continued good progress is reported in the construction programs at both our Conference Homes for the Aging. At both Orangeburg and Greenwood, construction has reached a point where monthly payments now exceed \$20,000 per month at each Home. Construction budgets were planned at the onset in keeping with anticipated income from the Methodist Homes Campaign. When contributions fail to keep pace, the only option open to our Homes is that of borrowing funds to meet construction costs. To date this has not been necessary, although it is anticipated that the Orangeburg Home will have borrowed some funds to complete the expansion of facilities now under construction. Faithful discharge of our obligations to the Methodist Homes Campaign will enable the Orangeburg Home to forestall using borrowed funds until the last possible moment.

COMMISSION ON INSURANCE
 REPORT NO. 1

The Conference Insurance Program

The Insurance Program of the South Carolina Conference has been designed to provide the ministerial members of the Conference and their dependents a comprehensive plan for major medical and life insurance. The program is administered through a group plan, underwritten by The Prudential Insurance Company of America, under the supervision of the Conference Commission on Insurance. Eligible for coverage under the program are all ministerial members of the Conference, whether active, retired, or seminarians, and qualified dependents of these Conference members. Eligibility requirements are given in detail in a guidebook, **Your Group Insurance Plan**, published by the Commission. This guidebook is available free of charge from the Office of Ministerial Affairs, Post Office Box 11284, Columbia, South Carolina 29211.

Since the purpose of the Insurance Program is to provide comprehensive coverage, the requirement is made that all participants in the Program enroll for both life insurance and major medical hospital insurance.

This Insurance Program is continuously reviewed and analyzed by the Commission on Insurance and the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs, as well as The Prudential Insurance Company. Coverage is up-graded periodically in order to keep the Program strong and in order to provide coverage that is adequate to meet the demands of an ever-changing economy.

REPORT NO. 2

Life Insurance Benefits

The Conference Insurance Program provides the following coverage under its Group Life Insurance Policy:

However, in no event will an employee's total amount of insurance be less than his accumulated paid-up insurance.

Dependents of retired employees are not eligible for life insurance coverage.

REPORT NO. 3

Major Medical Hospital Insurance Benefits

The Major Medical Expense Plan of the Insurance Program provides benefits for reasonable charges incurred by the insured or a covered dependent while receiving hospital services, treatments and supplies ordered by a physician. The plan provides for payment of the first \$1,000 of eligible expenses, and 80% of all other eligible expenses over \$1,000, up to a lifetime maximum of \$30,000 for each employee and each insured dependent covered under the plan. Provision is also made for coverage for certain services rendered outside of the hospital, accidental injury and maternity benefits.

The coverage for retired ministers is reduced to a lifetime maximum of \$15,000 for the insured and each eligible dependent, or to the remaining unused portion of the \$30,000 benefit limit provided before retirement, whichever is the lesser amount.

Other details of the Major Medical Expense Plan are contained in the guidebook, **Your Group Insurance Plan**.

REPORT NO. 4**Medicare Benefits**

Medicare is the health insurance plan, administered under the Social Security Act, for the benefit of retired persons. The Medicare program consists of two parts: (A) hospital insurance, designed to pay for hospital and related health services; and (B) medical insurance, designed to pay for physicians' services and related medical services. Under terms of the Medicare plan, hospital insurance (Part A) is provided for all persons insured under the plan; the medical insurance (Part B) is an optional feature, for which the insured pays a stated monthly premium.

The Conference Insurance Program is designed to provide certain benefits at the point where Medicare coverage terminates and some benefits which are not covered by Medicare at all. Therefore, it is expected that all ministers 65 and over, or whose wives are 65 and over, will enroll in the Health Insurance Plan provided by Medicare. Obviously, in order to derive the maximum benefit, the insured should be covered by both the general and optional provisions of Medicare (Parts A and B). An adjustment in premium charges for the Conference Insurance Program is made in order to allow for payment of the Part B Medicare coverage. (If a recommendation contained in the concluding section of the Commission's Report is approved by the Annual Conference, and funded by the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Part B Medicare premium will be paid for each retired minister by the Annual Conference.)

A handbook explaining the provisions of Medicare is available from any District Office of the Social Security Administration.

REPORT NO. 5**Administrative Procedures**

Billing: The Administrator of Ministerial Affairs sends a quarterly statement to everyone enrolled in the Conference Insurance Program. Statements are mailed in February, May, August and November. Although statements are mailed quarterly, payments for premiums may be made on a monthly basis. Bank drafts and post-dated checks may be used in making premium payments, if desired.

Cancellation of Coverage: It is imperative that each participant in the Conference Insurance Program keep his premium payments current. The Commission On Insurance has instructed the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs to cancel the insurance coverage of any participant who does not pay his premium by the end of the Quarter for which he has been billed.

Ministers Serving Special Appointments: For purpose of proper cost analysis, it is required that all Conference Boards and Agencies, served by ministers and others eligible for insurance, pay for the "institutional share" of the insured's premium (the "institutional share" for ministers served by Churches is paid through the World Service and Finance appropriation directed to the Conference Insurance Program). This provision shall apply to the District Superintendents, those serving Methodist colleges and other institutions and agencies operating under Boards of Trustees, and those serving institutions and agencies outside the Annual Conference should they elect coverage under the Conference Insurance Program. In every case the full cost of coverage must be paid by the insured, his employer, or through combined payments of the insured and his employer.

Premium Payments: Premium payments shall be made in accordance with the instructions printed on the Quarterly "Statement of Account."

Application for Insurance Coverage: Applications for enrollment in the Conference Insurance Program are available from the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs. No medical examination will be required for new members of the Conference, provided they make application for coverage within 30 days after they become eligible for participation in the Conference Insurance Program. Individuals making less than \$5,000 per annum will be covered by \$2,000 Life Insurance but will not be eligible for Term and Paid-Up coverage.

Coverage under the Major Medical Hospital Insurance shall be the same as for all other persons covered, and all provisions governing eligibility for the Conference Insurance Program shall apply.

REPORT NO. 6**Coverage for Lay Employees**

The Commission on Insurance receives, from time to time, requests from Conference boards and agencies for insurance coverage for lay employees. Accordingly, the Commission has adopted the following policy in this connection:

Conference Insurance coverage is available to all employees of the United Methodist Church directly related to the South Carolina Annual Conference, who are not under the direction of a Board of Trustees, provided the employee (the insured) and the agency concerned bear their full share of the cost of the insurance.

Individuals making less than \$5,000 per annum will be covered by \$2,000 Life Insurance but will not be eligible for Term and Paid-Up coverage.

Coverage under the Major Medical Hospital Insurance shall be the same as for all other persons covered, and all provisions governing eligibility for the Conference Insurance Program shall apply.

REPORT NO. 7**Coordination of Benefits**

The purpose of health care insurance is to help meet actual expenses. In line with that purpose, the Conference Insurance Program contains a non-profit provision which coordinates our plan with other plans under which an individual is covered so that the total benefits available will not exceed 100% of the allowable expenses. Under this plan if a dependent, employed wife is covered by another group plan, application for insurance benefits should first be made under the employee's own policy; then application may be made to the Conference Insurance Program for any additional benefits that might be available.

Strict adherence to this policy is essential if we are to maintain good benefits under our Program, at a reasonable cost. A detailed explanation of the "Coordination" provision is contained in "Your Group Insurance Plan."

REPORT NO. 8**Election of Administrator**

In accordance with the Conference Standing Rules, Section XII, Paragraph 50, Donald A. Foster has been elected Administrator of Ministerial Affairs with responsibility for administering the Conference Insurance Program and the Conference Pension Program.

REPORT NO. 9**Recommendations**

The Commission on Insurance makes the following recommendations for Conference Year 1970-71:

(1) The Commission on World Service and Finance appropriate the sum of \$160,000 for the Conference Insurance Program to be used as follows:

- (a) \$13,420 for Administration of the Program;
- (b) \$30,000 to provide insurance benefits for retired ministers;
- (c) \$116,580 to pay the Conference's share of the cost of the Insurance Program for the active members of the Conference for the 1970-71 year.
- (d) Recommended ministerial payments for 1970-71 Conference Year as follows:

(2) Participants in the Conference Insurance Program shall pay their premiums monthly in advance. All coverage shall be subject to cancellation if payments are not made prior to the end of the Quarter for which the insured is billed.

(3) Every participant in the Conference Insurance Program become familiar with the provisions of the Program as outlined in the guidebook, "Your Group Insurance Plan;" and, further that each participant maintain a file and become familiar with the additional instructions relating to the Program which may be issued from time to time by the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs; to the end that claims procedures be expedited, required administrative procedures followed, and the present high level of benefits be maintained at a reasonable cost to the Conference and the Insurance Program participants.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF THE LAITY REPORT NO. 1

Introduction

This report to the 1970 Session of the South Carolina Annual Conference follows a different format in the presentation of program recommendations but has the same broad purpose as that of recent years; namely, to alert the clerical and lay members of the Conference, and through them the members of their local churches, concerning the program resources and services offered by their representatives on District and Conference Boards of the Laity.

Relationships

The chart submitted with this report (Exhibit A) shows the organic and program links between the local churches and the District and Conference Boards of the Laity. For instance, when the local church elects its church lay leader, it is thereby electing its representative on the District Board of the Laity. He is the conduit for expressing the viewpoint of that church in the deliberations of that board or on its committee on which he may be asked to serve. If he fails to attend its meetings, the link is broken and he, his church and the district's services to all the churches will suffer.

Likewise, when the District Board nominates its district lay leader and elects its associate lay leaders, it is choosing its district representation on the Conference Board. If it chooses well, i. e., persons who are able, willing and available to serve, the Conference Board and its committees to which they are assigned will be strengthened and that district's viewpoint will be heard.

The chart shows the six cross-sectional committees of the Conference Board, which are concerned with the value, feasibility and acceptability of the processes related to the six program categories, from the viewpoint of the churches of the South Carolina Conference and in the context of the concerns entrusted by The Discipline to the Board of the Laity. These Conference Board committees are chaired by the six Conference Directors of special emphases elected by the Board.

The District Boards have six similar committees, to which the corresponding Conference Board committees relate. After considering the program recommended by the Conference committees, they have the responsibility for offering these at suitable occasions to representatives of the local churches.

Thus, the cycle is complete and the manpower represented by the local church lay leaders has started a chain reaction which ultimately comes back to the local churches in the offer of training opportunities for the local church leadership in a program within the broad scope of the responsibilities assigned by the Methodist Church to the Board of the Laity, but adapted to the needs and interests of the churches of this Conference.

Program

Report No. 2 consists of "Program Recommendations" substantially as submitted by the Board to the Conference Program Council on March 14, 1970. It is hoped that its statement of "Content and Values" will be the object of frequent reference by the lay and clerical members of this Conference and their churches and that all will support the district and Conference lay leadership in regard to the other sections.

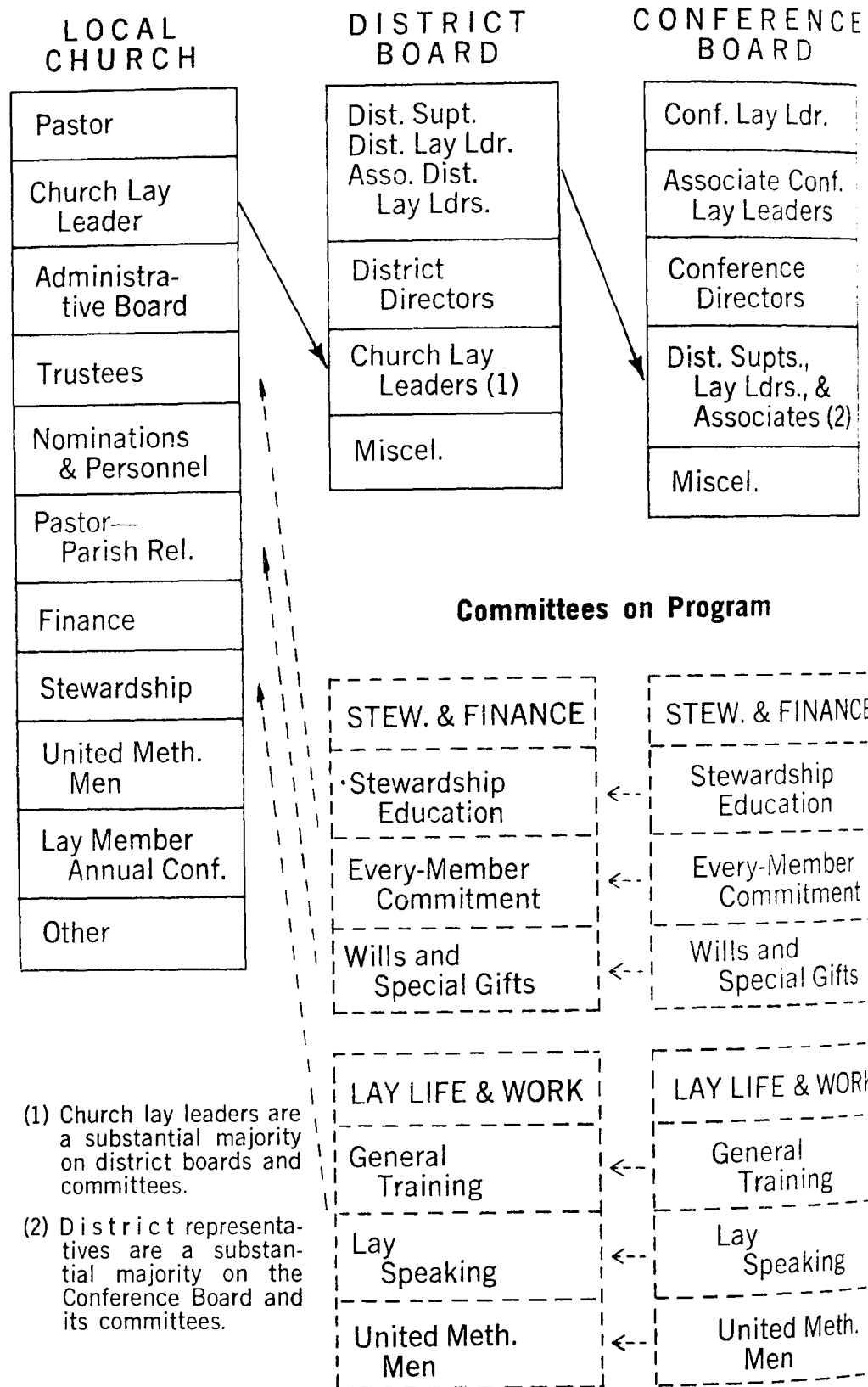
Acknowledgements

Goals

The goals listed below are expressed in terms of the basic and ultimate objectives of the planning and training "Process", upon the faithful and effective performance of which realization of the goals depends. Equally valid, but intermediate, goals relating to the successful implementation of each step in the "Process" (Set forth in a subsequent section) should be inferred, as they are omitted here so as to avoid repetition.

Stewardship Education

1. The reawakening of a sense of pride and satisfaction in the performance by the United Methodist Church in its mission beyond the local church which is supported by Word Service and Conference Benevolences in fields of Missions, Evangelism, Education, Social Concerns and Health and Welfare ministries, as well as in the supportive role of General and Conference Agencies on behalf of the local church.

2. The discovery by Christian families of significant priorities in the making and spending of money in the best interest of parents and children in a materialistic world.
3. The enrichment of Christian lives by an increased response to the opportunities for church-related careers and voluntary service in ordained and other ministries.
4. The growth of adults and children in the awareness of the breadth and depth of Christian Stewardship, in the experience of its inner satisfactions, and in the practice of its principles in the decisions of daily life.

Every-Member Commitment

1. The capture by local church members of the spiritual refreshment, fellowship and enthusiasm which are the predictable fruits of planning, working and praying together, catching a fresh vision of the mission of their church and going out to invite others to share in sacrifice for a noble cause.
2. A 10% increase in the per capita giving by the membership of the Methodist Churches as a step toward the adequate funding of the programs proposed by local church Councils on Ministries to implement their mission and support the mission of the connectional church.

Wills and Special Gifts

1. The making and maintaining of a valid Will by every Methodist of legal age, on the advice of an attorney, as a mature expression of concern for the avoidance of hardships which might otherwise be suffered by his or her survivors.
2. The awareness by local church members of the adverse effects of the abrupt termination of their normal stewardship expressions of support for the church and its institutions; the discovery that such stewardship expressions can be continued, perhaps to an extent greater than was ever possible during their lifetime, by means of special gifts or bequests; and their response to this challenge by making provisions appropriate to their circumstances.

General Training

1. Informed, and therefore interested and effective officials in positions of administrative responsibility in local churches.
2. A Methodist laity which is not afraid or embarrassed to be identified as "The people of God", steadfast in the faith, happy in the brotherhood, evangelistic in outlook, compassionate in spirit and stalwart in the service of the Lord of the church.

Lay Speaking

1. An increasing response, especially by the young men of Methodism, to the challenge to serve in the Certified Lay Speaking program and to be diligent in developing a diversified range of church related topics.
2. The effectiveness of the witness of the spoken word, as exemplified in the Lay Speaking program, in the propagation of the Gospel and in the spiritual enrichment of believers.

United Methodist Men

1. Provision of a unique fraternal organization for the men of Methodist churches, in which they can identify in a compatible environment which eases the transition from a secular to a sacred commitment and challenges the discovery of practical avenues for service in the church and the world.

2. As a step toward renewal, the adoption by local clubs of a set of goals based on standards of excellence to be found in the "Blue Ribbon Club" program.
3. As a matter of self interest, the examination by each club of the features of the "Blue Ribbon Club" project and a careful consideration of its possible impact upon the vitality and usefulness of the club to its membership and to the local church of which it is a part.

Process

The following summary of the "Process" is based upon the results of program planning meetings by the six committees of the Conference Board of the Laity, chaired by the conference directors of the six program categories and representing cross-sections of the Board, in which district superintendents, district lay leaders and associate district lay leaders predominate. The district directors of the six emphases were invited to attend as resource persons. In the normal course of events, orientation sessions are held by the conference directors of the six emphases to share with the district directors and their related district committees.

1. Utilize special workshops, Lay Retreats programs, and Area Training School courses to the extent feasible, to provide training in Stewardship Education, EMC, Wills and General Training topics and for UMM officers. Also, use District Conference agendas to solicit invitations to present the Wills program to sub-district and local church groups.
2. Endeavor to arrange for at least one district to undertake and "EMC weekend" research experiment in which a few couples representative of churches having had varied results would review in depth and evaluate the provisions of the EMC manual making a tape recording for subsequent study and analysis.
3. Encourage attendance by lay delegates at pre-Conference orientation meetings and subsequent sessions of the Annual Conference.
4. Provide district gatherings, such as (1) Lay Retreats, (2) Lay Rallies, (3) Lay Speaker Appreciation banquets and (4) UMM banquets and attendance at the Junaluska Laymen's Conference, for fellowship, inspirational and educational purposes; also encourage experimentation with local church retreats.
5. Provide for lay-clergy dialogue at District Lay Retreats in suitable settings.
6. Collaborate with the Board of Evangelism in exploring approaches to the undergirding and conservation of the values of the Lay Witness Missions.
7. Encourage churches to make liberal use of printed resources and to provide reference libraries for leadership use; also to expand the use of audio-visuals.
8. Promote enlistment, training and effective use of Certified Lay Speakers in local church and community assignments, and provide occasion to express appreciation for their services.
9. Encourage pastors to observe Laymen's Day by utilizing Certified Lay Speakers and other laymen in the worship services that day.
10. Redouble efforts to provide practical assistance to United Methodist Men fellowships, by increasing communications from the Conference UMM Director, by visits to all clubs by District UMM Directors and their Committees, by encouraging clubs to adopt as goals the standards of excellence suggested in the "Blue Ribbon Club" program and urging pastors and church lay leaders to provide active support.
11. Vigorously promote the realization by local clubs of the benefits of the "Blue Ribbon Club" program, by improving the administration of the reporting process and encouraging district, as well as conference, recognition for superior performance.

2. Maintain in the Columbia office, sample manuals, booklets, leaflets and other printed resources, catalogues and order blanks useful in presenting the program topics; acquire, to the extent feasible, and deposit in the Methodist Audio-Visual Library in Columbia, films, filmstrips, records, tapes, etc., for use by districts and local churches; and prepare such supplementary digests, outlines and lists as appear to be feasible and needed for sharing with district and local church leadership.
3. Welcome any opportunities to present the lay program to audiences of pastors, and encourage their interest and cooperation in promoting and evaluating results.
4. Continue on the alert for situations and circumstances in which joint efforts with other boards and agencies may be mutually advantageous, and cooperate and coordinate with Program Councils at Conference and district levels.

General Recommendations

1. That the Annual Conference give consideration to the adoption of the calendar year as the basis for program and finance.
2. That the Conference Program Council give consideration to the designation of a specific year as a "Year of Stewardship Emphasis".
3. That all districts acquire, or be supplied with, compatible tape recording and play-back equipment, preferably utilizing standard cassettes.
4. That the Methodist Camp be equipped with an adequate range of modern audio-visual equipment.
5. That the presidents of United Methodist Men be designated to serve as members of local church Councils on Ministries (1968 Discipline Par. 154).
6. That all United Methodist Men clubs elect officers to serve on a calendar year basis.
7. That District Program Councils allot two adequate periods in one or more of their meetings occurring early in each Conference year, for presentations by the associate district lay leaders on Stewardship and Finance and on Lay Life and Work, respectively, (and their district directors) of their plans for the six emphasis in the coordinated Conference program for which they are responsible.

PROPOSED PLAN OF MERGER OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE (1785) SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE (1866) OF THE SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTION OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

For Study During 1970-71 — Not To Be Voted On Until The 1971 Annual Conference Sessions

Preamble

As we prepare for the merger of the two South Carolina Conferences of the United Methodist Church, the question of "Why" is more important than "How." For if we see clearly why it should be done, men of good will and Christians of honest intent will work diligently and faithfully in achieving merger.

Our history we cannot escape and our differences as a people we cannot ignore, but of greater significance is our bond in Christ. Out of a past of separateness, the South Carolina Conferences of The United Methodist Church seek to serve the demands of the present age. As people of God, we respond in faith to His Word and His will as we seek our way in a new Church.

Our emerging understanding of the commission of our Lord and His prayer: "That they may all be one; as Thou, Father, art in me, and I in Thee, that they may also be one in us: THAT THE WORLD MAY BELIEVE THAT THOU HAST SENT ME." (John 17:21) daily confronts us with perennially searching questions about our separateness:

1. Will not wholeness more effectively witness as "the body of Christ" and win men to Him as Lord and Savior in a secularistic world? (Romans 12)

2. Would not open doors to brotherhood be more conducive to the full presence of the Holy Spirit and the enrichment of the spiritual lives of our brethren of both races? (Ephesians 4:1-7)
3. Will not a united Church work more effectively in developing a climate of support which will make universal equality and justice a reality? (Galatians 5:13-26)
4. Are there not qualities of mind and heart within each race which are needed by the other for growth toward spiritual maturity and mutual trust and respect? (Philippians 2:1-11)

As Biblical foundations for our movement toward an inclusive Church we cite the following passages from The Word of God:

"Our Father" from the Lord's Prayer. (Matthew 6:9)

The High Priestly Prayer in John 17 "... that they may be one."

"(God) ... hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth" in which we find our common origin (Acts 17:26)

And "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" in which Jesus establishes the one proper relationship between His followers. (John 13:35)

We concur in the statement of purpose of the Board of Education and the objectives of the Board of the Laity as expressed in **The Book of Discipline**, both of which state: "... that all persons be aware of and grow in their understanding of God, especially of His redeeming love as revealed in Jesus Christ, and that they respond in faith and love, to the end that they may know who they are and what their human situation means, increasingly identify themselves as sons of God in every relationship, fulfill their common discipleship in the world, and abide in the Christian hope."

We reaffirm the spirit and intent expressed in Article IV of the Constitution that "The United Methodist Church is a part of the Church Universal which is one Body in Christ. Therefore all persons, without regard to race, color, national origin, or economic condition, shall be eligible to attend its worship services, to participate in its programs, and, when they take the appropriate vows, to be admitted into its membership in any local church in the connection. In The United Methodist Church no conference or other organizational unit of the Church shall be structured so as to exclude any member or any constituent body of the Church because of race, color, national origin, or economic condition." (**The Book of Discipline**, The Constitution, Part I, Division 1, Article IV.)

With the foregoing as a basis for our concern, we proceed with faith in the task before us "to move men to live in awareness of the presence and life-giving power of God's Holy Spirit, in acknowledgement of His rule over earthly history and in confident expectation of the ultimate consummation of His purpose." (**The Book of Discipline**, Par. 1277.5)

Therefore, we, the people of The United Methodist Church residing in the Columbia Episcopal Area, serving one Lord whose Gospel declares that in Christ there is neither Greek nor barbarian, bond nor free, male nor female, but that all of us are without distinction the children of God whose love is all-inclusive, do now declare our earnest hope that The United Methodist Church in our Area shall truly become an inclusive Church, and that together, under the Holy Spirit, the participating Conferences may find God's will for a better way of service.

II. PURPOSE AND USE OF THIS DOCUMENT

- A. The Plan of Merger is to provide a basis for responsible study and discussion by members of the annual conferences and by all members of The United Methodist Church in South Carolina at district, sub-district, and local church levels, beginning at the 1970 session of the conferences. At the 1971 sessions, this plan will be presented for consideration and action by the annual conferences. Merger, if voted affirmatively by both of the conferences, would then be celebrated and organization of the new annual conference completed at a special session called by the presiding bishop.
- B. Each pastor and lay member is urged to report to the local church on the plan of merger as soon as possible after the close of the 1970 annual conference sessions.
- C. Within two or three months, but not later than November of 1970, all district superintendents are urged to activate sub-district task groups and local church task groups who would continue study and discussion of the proposals for merger throughout the year, including discussion groups across conference lines.
- D. We suggest that each sub-district task group be composed of persons from both conferences where possible.

III. SCOPE OF MERGER

- A. By adopting this plan of merger, the two conferences of the Columbia Episcopal Area, under the authority of action by the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, create one new conference, to be named the South Carolina Annual Conference.
- B. Merger of local churches and charges is a matter for action on the part of the congregations involved and for consideration under appropriate provisions of the **Book of Discipline**: Par. 1547, 1548.
- C. The question of the inclusiveness of the local church is covered under already existing provisions of the **Book of Discipline**: Par. 107.

IV. PROPOSED RESOLUTION OF MERGER

Whereas, The United Methodist Church has declared its intention to eliminate all forms of racial structure from its organizations and to work toward a truly inclusive fellowship; and further, the annual conferences of the Columbia Episcopal Area have resolved to work toward merger; and whereas merger of these Conferences should preserve the historical and religious integrity and heritage of the peoples making up these conferences; therefore be it resolved that:

- A. The South Carolina Conference of 1785 and the South Carolina Conference of 1866 shall be merged into one annual conference to be known as the South Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.
- B. This merger shall be accomplished in accordance with the provisions of the Plan of Merger which accompanies this resolution.
- C. Merger shall be celebrated and become effective at a uniting conference called by the presiding Bishop. The new Annual Conference shall be organized in accordance with **The Book of Discipline** of The United Methodist Church and the Plan of Merger herewith submitted.

V. PLAN OF MERGER**A. Conference Structure**

1. Elective members of the conference boards, commissions and committees in the new conference shall be on a seventy-five—twenty-five percent ration of the members of the former 1785 and 1866 conferences for a period of twelve years following merger. During this period, in the election of district lay leaders and two associates for each district (who become members of the Conference Board of the Laity), at least one of the three shall be elected from each of the former conferences, where feasible.
2. Until the new annual conference's standing rules are adopted, the Committee on Nominations shall consist of the two Committees on Nominations of the merging conferences.
3. For a period of twelve years following merger, the chairmanships of conference boards, commissions and committees shall be divided as follows:

4. The South Carolina Women's Society of Christian Service, being a part of the connectional system of the Columbia Area of The United Methodist Church, shall be guided by the plans for merger established by the annual conference, the districts and the local churches. (**The Book of Discipline**, Pars. 1311-1314)
5. The Executive Committees of the Women's Societies of Christian Service of the two former conferences shall set up:
 - a. A Committee on Nominations to prepare a slate of officers for the composition of the new society, with proportionate representation.
 - b. A Committee on By-Laws and Standing Rules to draw up by-laws and standing rules for the new society.
 - c. A Committee on Finance to establish procedures for combining conference and district treasuries, clearing financial practices and policies of the two former societies and to provide a clear interpretation of the directives regarding the financial policies as they are received from the Women's Division of The United Methodist Church.
6. In the selection of new trustees for the boards, agencies and institutions of the conference, the principle of inclusiveness shall be observed.
7. In the merged Annual Conference, the Program Council and other boards and agencies of the conference having employed staff shall employ staff members and clerical personnel on an inclusive basis, with a 75%-25% ratio being observed as a guideline in future employment where such qualified personnel are available.
8. The number of districts for the new conference initially shall be fifteen, with eleven superintendents from the former 1785 Conference and four from the former 1866 Conference, with this proportion (75%-25%) being maintained for at least twelve years following merger.
9. District boundaries shall be determined according to Par. 390.3 of **The Book of Discipline**.
10. The Program Council shall consist of the presiding Bishop, the District Superintendents, two representatives of conference agencies determined by the annual conference, one of whom shall be a member of the former '66 Conference and the other a member of the former '85 Conference, the conference secretary, two representatives of the conference youth organization, one of whom shall be a member of the former '85 Conference and the other a member of the former '66 Conference; two representatives of the W.S.C.S., one of whom shall be the president and the other a member of the other former conference; the conference lay leader, one layman from each district, chairmen of age-level and family departments, and such additional members as to make the membership of the Council to be on a 75-25 percent ratio between the former '85 and '66 Conferences.

B. Standing Rules

1. In the organization of the new conference a Committee on Standing Rules shall present rules of procedure for adoption by the conference.
2. Until new standing rules are adopted, the new conference will be guided by **The Book of Discipline** and **Robert's Rules of Order**.
3. For a period of twelve years following merger, the standing rules and resolutions of the new conference shall not include any rule or resolution that contravenes the provisions of the Plan of Merger.

C. Financial Adjustments

1. **Apportionments:** Apportionments shall be made by the conference Commission on World Service and Finance directly to the churches (or charges) after consultation with the district superintendents. These apportionments shall be based on a tri-part formula considering church membership, pre-

vious world service giving and non-capital expenditures by the church or charge.

2. **Minimum Salary:** The minimum salary schedule in the new conference shall be uniform for all members, and the General Conference of The United Methodist Church shall be asked to provide from the Temporary General Aid Fund sufficient monies to make up for the differential between the minimum salary rates of the former '85 Conference and the former '66 Conference.
3. **Pensions:** The annuity rate shall be the same for members of both former conferences. The General Conference of The United Methodist Church shall be asked to provide from the Temporary General Aid Fund sufficient monies to make up for the differential between the annuity rate of the former 1785 Conference and the former 1866 Conference.
4. **Conference Homes:** The services at all conference homes for children, the aged and conference claimants shall be available to all persons on an equal basis. Opportunities for employment in homes having employed personnel shall be on an inclusive basis.
5. **Institutional Support:** The institutions supported by the two former conferences shall be undergirded by support by the new conference bases determined by the new annual conference.
6. **Insurance:** The program of life insurance and health insurance for the new conference shall be based upon the insurance plan now in effect in the Conference of 1785.

D. Continuing Committee

The presiding Bishop is requested to appoint a follow-up Committee on Merger, with representation from the two former conferences, to consider emerging concerns and developments relating to merger of the two conferences which have not been anticipated or provided for in the Plan of Merger.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY 1970 - 1971

Whereas, the **DISCIPLINE** of 1968, paragraph 920, provides for fixing a minimum salary by the Annual Conference, therefore be it resolved: That the South Carolina Annual Conference fix its minimum salary according to the following scale to become effective on the adjournment of this conference session and continue until changed by the Annual Conference.

1. Minimum Salary of Conference Members on trial who are not seminary graduates shall be \$5,100. The Minimum Salary of Conference members on trial who are seminary graduates shall be \$6,400. The Minimum Salary for traveling elders full connection shall be \$6,700.
2. The Minimum Salary of a Retired Supply Pastor serving full time shall not exceed \$2,200, the exact amount to be determined by the request of the District Superintendent with the approval of the Commission on Minimum Salary. Amounts for those not living on the charge and not serving full time shall not exceed \$1,200, the exact amount to be determined by the request of the District Superintendent with the approval of the Commission on Minimum Salary.
 - (a) The Minimum Salary of associate members shall be \$5,100.
 - (b) The Minimum Salary of full time lay pastors shall be \$4,900.
3. The Minimum Salary of Student Pastors shall not exceed the following amounts, whether they be supplies, lay pastors, probationary members or elders in full connection:
 - (a) Seminary students \$4,000.
 - (b) Junior and Senior academic undergraduates living on the charge \$2,200; living off the charge, \$2,000.
4. The District Superintendent shall recommend the adjusted amounts which must be approved by the Commission on Minimum Salary before payment can be made. Any person shall be considered a student pastor if he is enrolled in an accredited college or seminary for a degree.

5. Supplements for years of service for ministers who are under 40 years of age or who have had less than 40 years of service shall be as follows: Traveling Elders with ten years' service, \$200, and for each additional five years, \$150 up to 25 years' service. Full time Lay pastors (except retirees) with ten years' service, \$100, and each additional five years, \$100 up to twenty-five years' service.

6. Any minister shall be entitled to \$200 additional, if married; \$200 additional for each dependent unmarried child under twenty years of age; or if said child is in college \$600 for this child while in college, as undergraduate, also \$100 for each church beyond two on the charge.

7. (a) Conference members in full connection and probationary members whose total income from church sources is \$7,700 or less: the travel supplement will be 30% of the difference between a man's total salary and \$7,700. An associate member will be given 30% of the difference between the total received and \$7,700.

(b) Lay Pastors whose total income from church sources is \$5,900 or less: the travel supplement will be 30% of the difference between the man's total salary and \$5,900.

8. It is recommended that if a charge is to receive minimum salary help, it should have a minimum of 150 members for a student pastor or 200 members for full time pastor, except in the case of a church extension situation approved by the Board of Missions and Church Extension as such or an urban work situation approved by the Urban Work Committee of the Board of Missions. Also, neither side of a split charge should be on minimum salary unless one side is clearly designated church extension situation, approved by the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

A. It is the policy of Minimum Salary to support a church for three years. **Exceptional cases for an extended period will be considered upon recommendation of the District Superintendent to the Commission on Minimum Salary.** (This will not apply to church extension situations.)

9. Be it resolved that the Annual Conference through its Minimum Salary funds shall not pay in excess of 35% of the above amounts. The local church shall be encouraged to pay the other 65%, but this resolution will not hinder the Board of Missions and Church Extension or other agencies of the church from making appropriations from its discretionary funds. Exception to this resolution will be allowed under the following conditions:

- The church must meet all the requirements of Minimum Salary Commission.
- The official board of the said church must declare in writing to the District Superintendent that the above requirement having been met, it cannot pay the 65%.
- The District Superintendent and the Cabinet must recommend this exception unanimously.

10. Be it further resolved that \$2,000 be set aside as a discretionary fund to be administered by the Commission on Minimum Salary on application to the District Superintendent.

11. Minimum Salary funds shall be dispersed at the end of each month and shall be given only to the minister involved.

MINIMUM SALARY NEWLY SET-UP WORK OR URBAN WORK 1970-71

Schedule A

- Notes: 1. Schedule A applies to ministers serving first pastorates.
- These schedules apply to ministers serving on trial or in full connection only. In case of the appointment of an approved supply the salary will be the responsibility of the Minimum Salary Commission.
 - First full year of the church's organization.

1st Year: The salary shall be the top amount allowed under existing Minimum Salary Commission regulations applied to one in this category. The local church from its funds may increase this amount by not more than \$300 without reducing the minimum salary appropriation.

2nd Year: The salary of the second year will depend upon that paid the first year and may be increased by not more than \$300, but the local church must assume one-fourth of the total salary paid.

3rd Year: The salary of the third year will depend upon that paid the second year and may be increased by not more than \$300, but the local church must assume one-half of the total salary paid.

4th Year: The salary of the fourth year will depend upon that paid the third year and may be increased by not more than \$300, but the local church must assume three-fourths of the total salary paid.

Schedule B

Notes: Schedule B applies to ministers who are on trial or in full connection and who have had a minimum of four full years of service prior to this appointment. Time served in this present appointment under Schedule A does not count as a part of the four years' experience required under Schedule B.

1st Year: Note: First full year of church's organization.

The Minimum Salary shall be \$6,700.

Special Note: The District Superintendent may apply to the Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions for a salary that is more in keeping with the amount received by this minister in his previous appointment.

2nd Year: The salary depends on amount received first year. At the beginning of the second year, the newly established church must assume one-fourth of the minister's salary.

3rd Year: The salary for the third year depends on amount received second year. At the beginning of the third year, the newly established church must assume one-half of the minister's salary.

4th Year: The salary for the fourth year depends upon the amount received the third year. At the beginning of the fourth year, the newly established church must assume three-fourths of the minister's salary.

Notes: 1. Except where the administrators of this salary schedule feel an extreme case of hardship exists, no salary funds will be granted to a church after the fourth full year.

2. A "new church" may be interpreted to mean an "engulfed" situation or a relocation project, if it is determined to be a church extension responsibility by the Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions.

3. The local church share of this salary schedule is interpreted to mean salary plus any travel and utility allowances.

4. These figures are maximums, and any amount of funds from any source in any guise added to these figures will be subtracted from the conference support given.

5. In all cases where a newly set-up work is attached to an existing charge, these become charge figures.

ALTERNATE PROPOSAL (PLAN C)

The Minimum Salary Commission recommends a \$500 increase across the board for ministerial support which is an 8% increase. We further recommend that a minister if married be entitled to \$500, an increase from \$200; for each dependent unmarried child he is entitled to \$300, an increase from \$200; and for each child in college he is entitled to \$1,000, an increase from \$600.

Supplements for years of service for ministers who are under 65 years of age or who have had less than 40 years of service shall be as follows: Traveling Elders with ten years' service, \$200; each additional five years of service, \$150 up to twenty-five years' service. Full time Lay pastors (except retired supplies) with ten years' service, \$100; and each additional five years, \$100 up to twenty-five years' service.

After looking at this plan in January 1970 and at the economy of South Carolina Methodism, at the present time we feel we should hold to the regular minimum salary increase of \$500 per year as we have been doing for the past four years. Therefore, we hope that as a commission that charges will voluntarily go into Plan C, and perhaps this can be done before the Bishop's Study Commission on Charge Lines' report has been completed.

My thanks to two members of our committee that assisted with most of the work, Rev. Ted Walter, Sec. and Rev. Ben Cunningham, Treasurer.

It shall also represent the interests of the United Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief and shall promote its projects within the conference. It shall cooperate with the Joint Commission on Education and Cultivation within the conference . . ."

The two scheduled meetings of the Board were held on October 14 at Claflin College and on March 10 at Columbia College.

I. COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND CULTIVATION REPORT

The Bishop's Convocation on Christian Mission was held at the Wade Hampton Hotel, Columbia, on January 16, 17, and 18 with 350 persons, members of both conferences of the Columbia Area participating. Principal speakers included Bishop Roy C. Nichols, Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., Dr. Van Bogard, and Miss Miriam Brattain. The Convocation was a joint project of the Conference of '85 and the Conference of '66.

II. SHORT TERM VOLUNTARY SERVICE

Participation in Mission Anguilla ended on a healthy note during the conference year with the coming of a full time physician to establish a practice

on the island. The physicians from South Carolina who volunteered their services and financed their own ministry to this people are to be highly commended.

With the conclusion of Mission Anguilla the committee set about to locate another area of service and under the guidance of UMCOR a survey committee composed of the Dr. Michael Watson, and Mr. Joe Watson went to Haiti and returned with the dedication to challenge the people of South Carolina United Methodism to answer the crying need for medical, agricultural, dental, economic and other services.

The first project to be undertaken will be a tetanus immunization drive with the first physician going to Haiti in June to remain for two weeks and to be followed by other physicians at an interval of six weeks. The projection is that in the period of one year from 25 to 50 per cent of the Jeremie Project Area will be immunized against this deadly disease.

An agricultural project of training in modern scientific methods of farming, storage, and marketing is being projected as an absolute necessity.

The initial consensus is that there are unlimited opportunities for the laymen of South Carolina United Methodism to become meaningfully involved in Mission in Haiti.

Mr. Bill Richardson, layman of Seneca, has recently participated in an emergency construction team on the island of Roatan. He joined laymen of the North Carolina and Virginia Conferences in an effort to lead in reconstruction of buildings destroyed by a hurricane.

This committee recommends with all available enthusiasm that every member of the United Methodist Church in South Carolina volunteer for a short term project using his talents and means in fulfillment of the divine commission.

REPORT NO. 2**The Town and Country Committee**

The mission of the Town and Country Committee, of the Board of Missions, is to work for the most effective ministry to God's people in non-metropolitan areas. Although our state is following the national trend of urbanization most of our churches are still in areas under 10,000 population. These churches are of special concern.

To fulfill this mission the Town and Country Committee has set the following goals:

A. SPECIAL GOALS FOR THIS YEAR

1. The planning and preparing of a Resource Booklet for use in the local churches and encourage the use of the same.
2. The development of creative ministries where needed.

B. Our Continuing goals are:**1. RURAL LIFE SUNDAY**

We request all churches to observe Rural Life Sunday, the fifth Sunday after Easter each year. All of us are dependent on rural areas for food and other necessities of Life. Materials are made available to each church.

2. MOVING EXPENSE

We recommend that the Church or Charge pay the moving expenses of its incoming preacher, including a maximum of \$50.00 for packing expense, and that the I. C. C. rates be the basis upon which the minister's moving expenses be paid and that the maximum of 7,500 pounds be the weight limit. We recommend that a bonded mover be employed to move the minister's possessions which, while they may not be many, are some-

- times costly. We recommend that the incoming minister be informed whether the moving expenses are to be paid and arrangements made with him. The lay delegate to Annual Conference should have this information for the new minister.
3. **PARSONAGE STANDARDS**
We recommend that our Churches be guided by the latest revised edition of PARSONAGES STANDARDS in building, furnishing, landscaping, maintaining and remodeling of parsonages; and that both churches and parsonage families give careful consideration the "Standards" in all matter pertaining to the minister's home. Furthermore, we recommend that any future proposals concerning parsonage standards be referred to the Parsonage Standards Committee for study and recommendation.
 4. **DISTRICT ADVISORY COMMITTEE**
A district advisory committee, with the district director of Town and Country as chairman and other persons as determined by the District Superintendent, is to be organized to assist in the district work of the Town and Country.
 5. **CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS**
We recommend that Town and Country Committee of the Conference in each district co-operate with all boards and agencies in an effort toward recruitment of full time leaders in the church with special emphasis placed on Deaconess and other rural workers.
 6. **CONTINUING MINISTERIAL EDUCATION**
The Committee helped to foster this committee and will continue to be interested in this program.
 7. **SCHOLARSHIPS**
We recommend that the Town and Country Committee give yearly four \$100.00 scholarships to Town and Country Workshops which will be beneficial to Town and Country Work.
 8. **MINISTER'S SALARY**
We support the principle of an adequate minimum salary for all ministers.
 9. **CONFERENCE SURVEY**
We continue to support the work of the Conference Survey in the Charleston District.
 10. **CHARGE LINES**
We support the work done by the current Charge Line Committees of our Annual Conference.
 11. **HINTON RURAL LIFE CENTER**
We encourage the continued support of the Hinton Rural Life Center at Hayesville, N. C. as a Mission Special.

REPORT NO. 3

Committee on Urban Ministries

The mission of the Committee on Urban Ministries of the Board of Missions is to develop, implement, and support plans, programs, and funding for existing and new urban ministries.

The Committee has set the following goals for the 1970-71 conference year:

- A. Educational
 1. To create grassroots awareness of urban mission needs and programs at the Conference.

- B. Organizational
 1. To continue seeking the creation of District Committees on Urban Ministries in Districts containing cities of 40,000 population. (Such committees already exist in Charleston, Columbia, and Greenville).
- C. Financial
 1. To seek financial support by every local church through District and Annual Conference Mission Specials.
- D. Programs
 1. To insure that urban ministries emphasize salvation through Christ as well as meeting physical and social needs.
 2. To support existing urban ministries in Charleston (North Charleston Inner-City Ministry) and Columbia (Columbia Urban Service Center) with \$5,000 each as requested in the conference Board of Missions budget.
 3. To encourage the development of the proposed West Greenville Industrial Parish (a structure for creating community ministries among congregations along the Textile Belt in Greenville) by allocating \$200 to this project from Conference Committee on Urban Ministries travel and expense funds for 1970-71.
 4. To identify new areas and needs for additional urban ministries through continuing study, (especially the research project by the National Division of Missions on the Charleston area and the study by the Rev. Ted McEachern on the entire state).

REPORT NO. 4

Wesley Foundation

One of the most visible mission fields is the university campus today. The youth exodus from the church begins during the high school years and intensifies on campus. While we in the church have been trying to picture campus ministry as "an extension of the M.Y.F." the situation has dramatically shifted. Realizing the urgency of the need, the Board of Missions wishes to declare the MISSION NEEDS of the Wesley Foundations at the University of South Carolina, Clemson University and Winthrop College as a CONFERENCE MISSION SPECIAL for this year.

At the University of South Carolina this year, the Conference is asked to undertake a bold new experiment in mission to the campus. Approximately one-half of the funds received for this Mission Special will go into this venture. The approach is that of a "Council on Ministries." The council will be composed of a basic staff of six graduate level students who display a strong Christian commitment. They will come from six sectors of the campus. They will work ten hours per week and be paid on a rate competitive with the university work-study program. They will function (1) assembled as a council and (2) dispersed to their respective sectors of the campus. They will explore the campus for needs, develop cooperative ministries through the council, implement missional ventures into the campus, and evaluate.

On campus it is always "the day before tomorrow" and local churches will be having to face issues tomorrow which today are evident on the campus! We feel the churches will respond to this opportunity to share in the agonies and joys of this venture next year.

Board of Evangelism and Missions Parsonage

A Parsonage is held in the name of The Board of Missions, South Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Incorporated.

REPORT NO. 7

Church Extension Section

1. State of Church Extension Donation Policy.

The Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions carries on activities with the understanding that it has responsibilities mainly in situations that fall within the following categories: (1) New church buildings for newly organized congregations, (2) Parsonages for these new congregations, (3) Relocated congregations where it is felt a church must move its base of operations if it is to render its most effective service to the community, (4) Churches that are being engulfed with expanding population making it impossible on their own to care for the influx of new people. (5) Parsonages

for divided charge situations. (6) The section feels that on rare occasions there may exist an emergency in a local church for which it should assume some responsibility.

2. New Church Pastor's Salaries.

The Church Extension Section has the responsibility for working with the Minimum Salary Commission in establishing and administering a salary scale for pastors in new churches. This scale is printed in conjunction with Minimum Salary Commission report.

National Division Salary Support.

In most cases the National Division shares in the support of the pastor of a new church in the amount of \$1,000 for the first year and \$500 for the second year. This does not raise the level of salaries which are set by Church Extension and the Minimum Salary Commission but has the effect of saving the Conference this amount each year.

4. National Division Donations for Buildings.

If the National Division accepts plans for a new church building for a new congregation they will make a donation for \$1,000 for the building fund.

5. National Division Loan Funds.

Every Methodist Church has a wider community and world responsibility which it shares with the district and annual conferences by accepting a part of the financial obligation called World Service and Conference Benevolences. Thus The Board of Missions of the Methodist Church has set up under its National Division a Methodist Investment Fund. The main purpose of this fund is to make available loan funds for local churches with special emphasis on new congregation building funds. Application blanks should be secured from the conference office.

That the Committee on Urban Work be designated a "clearing house committee" for churches needing building funds and having difficulty finding them, to transmit these needs to other churches with little or no indebtedness, with the request that these more affluent churches provide "missional loans" at little or no interest for building purposes.

REPORT NO. 9
SPARTANBURG JUNIOR COLLEGE

Spartanburg Junior College continues to be a unique missionary educational institution, as attested by these facts:

-Fifty-two percent of our students work part-time, either on campus or in Spartanburg. We secure a job for EVERY student who needs it.

-\$90,000 last year given worthy students in financial aids, scholarships or loans.

-Ninety-four high risk students academically given special help in an eight-weeks Summer Prep Program last year, without which they would have difficulty passing Freshman courses.

-Through study skills and individual testing and guidance by faculty members, many students are helped to find themselves and develop both intellectually and morally.

-810 students admitted in August, 1969 (the largest enrollment in our history of 59 years) are receiving accredited educational opportunities in a Christian atmosphere.

-92% of our graduates transfer to the Junior class of senior colleges to complete their educational career (65 young men at Wofford this past year).

-Total costs at Spartanburg Junior College this year were \$284 LESS than the average cost at six Methodist junior colleges of this area, and between \$900 and \$1,000 less than neighboring senior colleges and universities.

As an aid for all students, especially the average and below average student, we now have the Study Skills clinic which offers individualized assistance in their academic studies, giving particular emphasis to the teaching of basic skills, e.g. study techniques, reading improvement, vocabulary development, and listening ability. The clinic has 34 listening-study stations with the latest electronic equipment available for the student's use. Two full-time professional instructors are on duty to counsel and guide the students. They are assisted by six part-time student helpers. The average weekly student visitation to the clinic is 475.

These seven years as president of this great Junior College have been filled with pleasant and exciting experiences. My successor, Dr. James Barrett, with the wholehearted support of ministers and laymen of the Conference, will lead Spartanburg Junior College to newer and higher levels of Christian service.

- X. Assisted Trenholm Road United Methodist Church, Columbia, in establishing a Pastoral Counseling Service. This is a cooperative venture between Trenholm Road Methodist Church and the Columbia District. The Reverend Paul Carlson is Minister of Counseling.

Recommendations for Next Year:

- (1) The Conference Committee on Pastoral Care and Counseling recommends that the program continue with counseling services being provided in the Columbia and Florence offices. Because of financial necessity it has been necessary to close the office at 1427 Pickens Street, but conversations are now being held with a local church in Columbia so that it may be possible to continue to meet with clergy and their families in the Capital City.
- (2) That a series of clinical training sessions for clergy be held in several areas of the state.
- (3) That retreats for clergy and their wives be continued.

BOARD OF PENSIONS
REPORT NO. 1

I. (A) The Board of Pensions requests that the South Carolina Annual Conference fix \$83.00 per service year as the rate for annuity payments to retired ministers which shall include approved supply time prior to admission into full connection. In the case of special Conference Claimants, the rate shall be 100% of the rate for Conference Members. The Board requests that the annuity rate for widows be 75% of the husbands rate: (1) based on ten years if her approved years are fewer; (2) for her approved years of service if less than 15 but more than 10; (3) for her husband's total years of service if her service years are more than 15. The Board requests that the annuity rate of dependent children of deceased ministers be 25% of the father's annuity rate, with payments based on his years of approved service, with a minimum of 10 years credit.

Provisions of paragraphs 3451, 3452, and 3471 of the Pension Manual are to be followed in making these payments.

(B) The Board requests that an appropriation be made that will give The Board of Pensions (Conference Claimants) \$682,158.35 for the pensions program of the Conference for the fiscal year ending May 31, 1971, and that this sum be apportioned to the charges of the Conference on the basis established in continuing resolutions. This amount includes the new entrant program which prepays pensions for ministers serving in our Conference for the first time and entitled to pension credit.

(C) The Board requests the Annual Conference to order the pensions report to be printed in two columns in the 1970-71 Journal and Yearbook; Column 1 to be the amount assessed the ministers; column 2 to be the amount paid.

(D) It is recommended that ministers be permitted to instruct their local church treasurer to withhold and remit their pensions payment to the Conference Treasurer on the 2% Fund and to the General Board of Pensions on the Reserve Pension Program.

II. (A) The Board recommends that the minimum amount payable to retired ministers, including retired Lay pastors, be based on 10 years of service; and that the minimum amount payable to widows, including widows of Lay pastors, be based on 10 years of service.

(B) The Board further recommends that the minimum amount payable to dependent children be based on 10 years of service, as provided in paragraph 3471 of the Pension Manual with educational benefits as herein described.

III. (A) The Board has approved, and recommends for Conference approval the following institutions and organizations for annuity credits: Wofford College, Columbia College, Spartanburg Junior College, The South Carolina Methodist Advocate, Epworth Children's Home, The Methodist Homes, Columbia Urban Service Center, the Star Gospel Mission, Urban Crossroads Center (National Board of Missions) and Associated Christian Training and Service (Memphis).

(B) We hereby approve any recognized institution of our church to which a member of the South Carolina Conference may be given an Episcopal appointment, outside of the state, as an institution to which ministers so appointed may receive pension credit, PROVIDED the minister pays his institutional assessments, if the institution fails to make such payments.

(C) Each institution or organization to which a minister is appointed with annuity responsibility shall pay to the Conference Board of Pensions \$70.00 per month for each minister under the current income distribution program of the conference, and if the minister appointed is under the MRP program, the contribution shall be the amount the Conference has to pay the General Board of Pensions for this coverage for each year thus appointed.

(D) With reference to annuity credit for service to approved institutions indicated in above sections, The Board of Pensions recommends that no pension credit be given if these institutions fail to pay the assessments required, unless the minister serving these institutions himself pays the assessments in addition to his two percent obligations. The minister should apply to the Board of Pensions for proper clearance as early as possible to avoid mounting interest charged as a penalty on arrears.

IV. The Board of Pensions is the Committee on Proportionate Payment as set forth in the Discipline, Par. 1350.6, and shall compare the records of amounts paid on support of pastor and Conference Claimants and keep a permanent record of defaults for the purpose of making deductions from annuity in such cases as have not been rectified.

V. The fiscal year of the Board of Pensions shall be the same as that of the Annual Conference.

VI. (A) We recommend that the Conference approve the distribution which the Board of Pensions has made to claimants during the year as set forth in detail by our report no. 4.

(B) We request approval and the privilege of ordering to record without reading the detailed distribution to claimants.

CONFERENCE PROGRAM COUNCIL

REPORT NO. 1

As we approach this 1970 session of the South Carolina Annual Conference, we do so with greater confidence in and appreciation for the place and significance of the Program Council concept as envisioned in **The Book of Discipline**.

The mission of the church is one mission with various facets or segments, and the council is the instrument to coordinate these parts so that the church through the local church may move in mission in the world. The council is a council of boards and leaders rather than another agency, and is related to boards and agencies through their representatives. Cooperative planning is central in the function of the Program Council.

The purpose of the Conference Program Councils shall be (a) to receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district agencies, the Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Program Councils; (b) to develop these recommendations into a coordinated program to be recommended to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment, and adoption as the Annual Conference program; and (c) to provide implementation and the administration of the coordinated program as adopted by the conference.

The functions assigned to the council are:

1. To study the mission of the Annual Conference and the local churches of the conference and to determine program emphases which will assist the conference and the local churches to perform their mission.
2. To describe, coordinate, and organize opportunities to serve within the mission.
3. To receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district and annual conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and

- General Program Councils; to evaluate these recommendations; and to formulate a coordinated conference program to be presented to the Annual Conference for consideration.
4. To provide for implementation and administration of the program adopted by the conference.
 5. To provide program resources and assistance in program planning and implementation for local churches.
 6. To provide personnel for implementing and administering the conference program.
 7. To provide channels of communication between annual conference agencies and local churches.
 8. To give leadership in research and planning for the conference and cooperate with other research and planning agencies.
 9. To cooperate in ecumenical projects and events which have been approved by the conference.
 10. To study and coordinate the budget askings of the conference agencies as they relate to the conference program and to make recommendations regarding the same to the Commission on World Service and Finance, understanding that an Annual Conference may direct that the accounting service for the conference treasurer shall be provided by a centralized office under the direction of a business manager.
 11. To interpret the conference program to the local churches with a view to gaining the financial support needed in order to implement that program.

COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

In June of 1968 the Program Council of the South Carolina Conference was organized and began its operation. A Program Director was appointed and was directed to serve under the following directive:

- "That under the guidance and direction of the Bishop and the Cabinet and/or the Annual Conference Council, the Program Director be instructed during the 1968-1969 Conference year to make a study of:
- A. General Conference Legislation as it applies to our Annual Conference Program.
 - B. The Annual Conference Council as planned or already organized in other Annual Conferences.
 - C. The Program needs in the South Carolina Annual Conference relative to the mission of the church.
 - D. Recommend administrative approach to meet these needs.
 - E. Staff required to meet these needs.
 - F. Cost of suggested staff and program implementation.
 - G. Long-range anticipated needs."

In the implementation of this program provision for the work of the Board of Evangelism and the Board of Missions was made in the appointment of a staff person for one year to assist the Program Director in this endeavor.

Without any definite guidelines to follow or any job analysis to give direction, this year was spent serving under the directive of the Annual Conference to study the needs of the conference in terms of progress, the legislation of the church and the policies and programs of other Annual Conferences.

In developing a program, care was taken to be sure that values of the past would not be lost as we embraced new forms, new structures and new ministries. Deliberately an effort was made to start with current programs and to begin new ventures where we were.

Following a year of study recommendations were made to the 1969 session of the Annual Conference that we begin the second year with the same number of staff personnel (seven), including the staff member assigned to Missions and Evangelism. Actually the Program Council would now begin to function fully as a council with the Board of the Laity incorporated within its operations.

At the 1969 Annual Conference a substitute motion was adopted that called for continued study and further exploration of structure and administrative approach to our needs and mission here in this state. The directives of this substitute motion were carried out, and two rounds of meetings were held within the districts of the conference, designed (1) to give assistance to district program councils in their task of training the local council on ministries and (2) to listen to the concerns and needs of the churches of the conference, to gain insight and suggestions for recommendations to be made concerning structure and administration.

In May of 1969 the Program Director and Associate Director held interviews in each of the eleven districts with the District Superintendent. The purpose of these interviews was to discuss with the District Superintendent the concerns and needs of his district, and to determine how the Conference Staff might be of assistance.

We found the superintendents viewing their tasks as trainers and directors of program, as well as administrators of the affairs of the district. From these conferences we concluded that the first priority was to offer some assistance to local churches as they moved into the new structure of the church. We agreed with the superintendents that we should start with the District Program Councils and subsequently scheduled eleven District Seminars with members of the District Program Councils, to be held in September and October.

We felt strongly that we should design these seminars focused toward the local church Council on Ministries. Our aim was not to hand down a packaged program, but rather to discover a process whereby each local church could discover its own mission and ministry and to provide some tools whereby this might be done. It was our intent to help equip the members of the District Program Councils so that they in turn could be enablers to the local churches within the districts.

In these eleven sessions we held up the purpose of the Council on Ministries, which as we see it is to put the local church in comprehensive ministry. It is to hear the word of God and respond to it. It is our feeling that the new structure is so designed as to open doors to the Holy Spirit. The Council on Ministries offers the means of responding to the Word of God and the needs of persons.

Paragraph 113 of the Discipline was examined carefully so as to give a clearer understanding of the meaning of membership. All that is done in the local church should be measured in the light of the nature and meaning of the church and the demands of the gospel.

Certain tools and conceptual models were offered the members of the district staffs as aids in developing skills in dealing with the new structure—that is the Council on Ministries. We considered the role and concept of Coordinators and Work Area Chairmen. The whole seminar was designed to offer some skills and understanding on how to put the local church in comprehensive ministry. Instruments of evaluation were provided.

Following these meetings with the District Program Councils we continued to carry out the directives of the Annual Conference in the substitute motion "having district or regional meetings for the purpose of discussion and determination of what type of program supervision the local churches of the Conference want and need."

In setting up the nine district or regional meetings it was suggested to the District Superintendents that "the District Program Council be the representative group for discussion, with the understanding that the meeting would be open to anyone desiring to attend. The size and composition of the group of course is left to the judgement of each District Superintendent."

In response to research and study, the consultations, the expressed needs of the conference, the projected programs and goals as set forth by our boards and agencies, and in response to proposals made in a special session of the Program Council, we have gained insight into our needs and some directions as to administrative approach.

DISTRICT PROGRAM COUNCILS

1. We are convinced of the need of a District Program Council, which is closer to the local church than a Conference Council, and all of our districts have organized such a District Council. However, we discovered many areas which call for the help of a Conference Council Staff.

2. In continuing our study, each district superintendents was asked to estimate his budget needs for the operation of his District Council. These estimates vary, but financial undergirding is needed at the district level and must come either from district sources or from the annual conference.

3. Our two visitations confirmed the need for a representative from the Conference Staff to serve as an ex-officio member of the district staff. This person would serve as a liaison representative from the Conference Staff.

BOARD AND AGENCY SERVICES

It seemed advisable for us to determine as far as possible how much direct services boards and agencies of the council expect from the Conference Staff. Consequently, inquiry was made to boards which have had service in the past and those which had not. It was felt that there is real need for staff assistance in carrying out details relative to program implementation.

We are convinced that the boards and agencies of the annual conference have a more vital and significant role in the mission of the church in our time. More responsibility is placed upon them to be creative and working units. Programs should be initiated by Boards and Agencies of the conference in answer to the needs of local churches and in response to the needs of our time in terms of the demands of the gospel. These programs should be submitted to the Program Council for review and evaluation. The Program Council then formulates a coordinated conference program to be presented to the Annual Conference for consideration. After the Annual Conference has approved or amended the program, the council seeks to implement the plan.

The Conference Staff serves as resource persons, as enablers. This new emphasis is on training the local church and district leaders to equip them to initiate and operate their own programs, adapting standard plans or originating their own program ideas. "The council staff shall be responsible, in cooperation with the district superintendents, for the implementation of the conference program": (Discipline, Paragraph 841, 9, b; and (in Paragraph 841, 10) "The functions of the Annual Conference Program Council are: d) to provide for implementation and administration of the program adopted by the conference. e) to provide staff personnel for implementing and administering the conference program."

This has been a busy year for the Conference Staff as we have tried to carry on the regular work of the council, in addition to the work of study and consultations. In addition to administrative services rendered the conference boards, agencies, commissions and committees, the staff has worked with district program councils, with local churches, in planning training events, with the Fund for Reconciliation, in the Bishop's Convocation on Mission, and in numbers of other ways too numerous to detail. Most Sundays staff members have been in local churches, preaching, teaching, counseling.

Reflected in the conference reports of the boards and agencies will be found staff engagement and service. Projected in these reports will be program goals and recommendation for the new year. These have been reviewed by the Program Council and are now offered to this Annual Conference for consideration.

Gratitude is felt, and appreciation is here expressed for the support and encouragement given in this period of transition as we have labored to move with responsibility and imagination into the structure of a new church. Let us move with reaffirmation for the mission before us that together we may do

the work fully and joyfully and gratefully in the name of Him who has called us and who sends us out in a ministry of reconciliation.

REPORT NO. 2

Following the 1969 session of the South Carolina Conference, your Program Council proceeded to implement the adopted program for the conference. Plans were formulated at the June 27 meeting of the Council to carry out the directions of the substitute motion as approved by the Annual Conference. Fall district meetings were set up in cooperation with the district superintendents to consider the function and work of the Council on Ministries in the local church, and of how the District Program Council can serve as a resource of training for the Council on Ministries. (See Staff Report)

The Program Council authorized steps to be taken to incorporate the council.

A committee was set up to consider counseling services now offered in the conference and of how these can best be coordinated. Representatives from Health and Welfare and Pastoral Care and Family Life were to be asked to help in this procedure of coordination.

At the Executive Committee meeting on August 25 a committee was appointed, as directed by the Annual Conference, to study the needs of the Board of the Laity, in terms of staff services required, and to report by January 1, 1970 its findings.

The Executive Committee set up an Advisory Committee of three persons to counsel with the Executive Committee as to conference structure and staff needs. The members of this committee were Dr. Francis T. Cunningham, Reverend H. Levy Rogers and Mr. Furman McEachern.

The Executive Committee meeting November 4, in keeping with the Annual Conference's directive, authorized another round of district or regional meetings, to present at least two alternate plans of staff structure with comparative costs for discussion and consultations. These meetings were held in nine locations across the conference. (See Staff Report)

At the Executive Committee meeting January 14 a report of the Study Committee on the staff needs of the Board of the Laity was made and the Executive Committee recommended that a staff person be employed to serve under the direction of the Conference Program Council in its coordinated program. (See Report Exhibit E) The Executive Committee also recommended that the conference staff be six persons, including the staff person recommended by the Laity Study Committee.

The Program Council meeting January approved the recommendations of the Executive Committee concerning staff needs for the conference year of 1970-71. It also set up a meeting of the council for March 11, 1970, to receive and consider other proposals as to conference structure and staff needs. These presentations were received—one from Dr. F. T. Cunningham, Reverend David Clyburn and Reverend A. M. Fisher; another from Reverend Harry T. Wags, and a third, a study paper or survey on Public Income and Church Finance by Reverend Ted McEachern. The Council is grateful to these for their ideas and suggestions which provide helpful resources for the Program Council. Certain of the recommendations in the Program Council report reflect or embody some of the definite concerns expressed in their presentations to the Council.

The final meeting of the Program Council was held March 13-14, to hear reports from the various boards and agencies of the conference, and to make recommendations concerning them to Annual Conference. It also heard

reports from the various committees of the council and prepared certain recommendations to the Annual Conference. A budget was adopted and a possible deployment of staff was considered. (See exhibits in report 3)

A Committee on Interpretation, a mandatory committee, made its report. The function of this committee is as follows: "It shall, in cooperation with the Council, promote the program of World Service and other general benevolence causes in the pastoral charges of the conference in cooperation with the Division of Interpretation of the General Program Council.

This committee is preparing a brochure to be made available to members of Administrative Boards of local churches describing the benevolent causes and concerns of this conference. This committee is one of the channels of communication between the Annual Conference agencies and local churches. The chairman of this committee is Reverend Thurman H. Vickery.

A Research Committee on Data Processing and Systems Analysis reported that after months of study it recommends that a comprehensive type of data processing be employed in the South Carolina Conference. Therefore, the committee recommends that "the Program Council request an allocation of \$10,000 from the Conference and an authorization to hire a systems consultant, either firm or individual, which would study the conference data problems and would recommend a method by which the conference can be more efficient. The chairman of this committee is Reverend George D. Fields, Jr. Subsequent to the report of the committee it was discovered that the South Carolina Conference may be able to obtain from the General Council on World Service a study of our Conference Data problems without the cost originally estimated. Our cause has been ably presented to the Council on World Service by Chairman, Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We reaffirm our conviction of the place and significance of the District Program Councils and pledge our continued effort to strengthen and undergird these councils by:
 - a. Assigning a staff member to serve as an ex-officio member of each District Program Council;
 - b. Deleted.
 - c. Planning a two-day conference for members of the 11 District Program Councils to consider the work, mission and development of a viable District Program Council; and
 - d. Recommending that in cooperation with the District Program Councils sub-district workshops be held for local church Councils on Ministries.
2. We recommend that the Program Council set up a Committee on Program Coordination Research and Planning to study the Mission of the Annual Conference, to recommend to the Program Council the objectives and priorities, to evaluate submitted programs, and to consider proposals concerning structure and administration and to make recommendations concerning these to the Program Council and subsequently to the Annual Conference.
3. The Program Council reviewed the goals and program proposals of the Boards and Agencies of the Council (as found in the various reports) and commend them to the Annual Conference and recommend their adoption.
4. To carry out the mission and ministry, as recommended by the Boards and agencies to this Annual Conference, the Program Council recommends that the Conference Staff for 1970-71 be six persons.

Your Program Council made up of a representative group (see Exhibit 1) has tried to be faithful to the tasks assigned to it in formulating a workable and effective instrument to assist the church to be in mission and ministry in our state and conference. It has tried to be open and listen to the concerns and needs of our people, and has honestly sought to present to this conference

its findings and best judgment for our time. We are convinced of the significant place and role such a council can play in the life of our church, and we look to the future with hope and trust, to the end that together, under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, we may truly be the Church, the People of God.

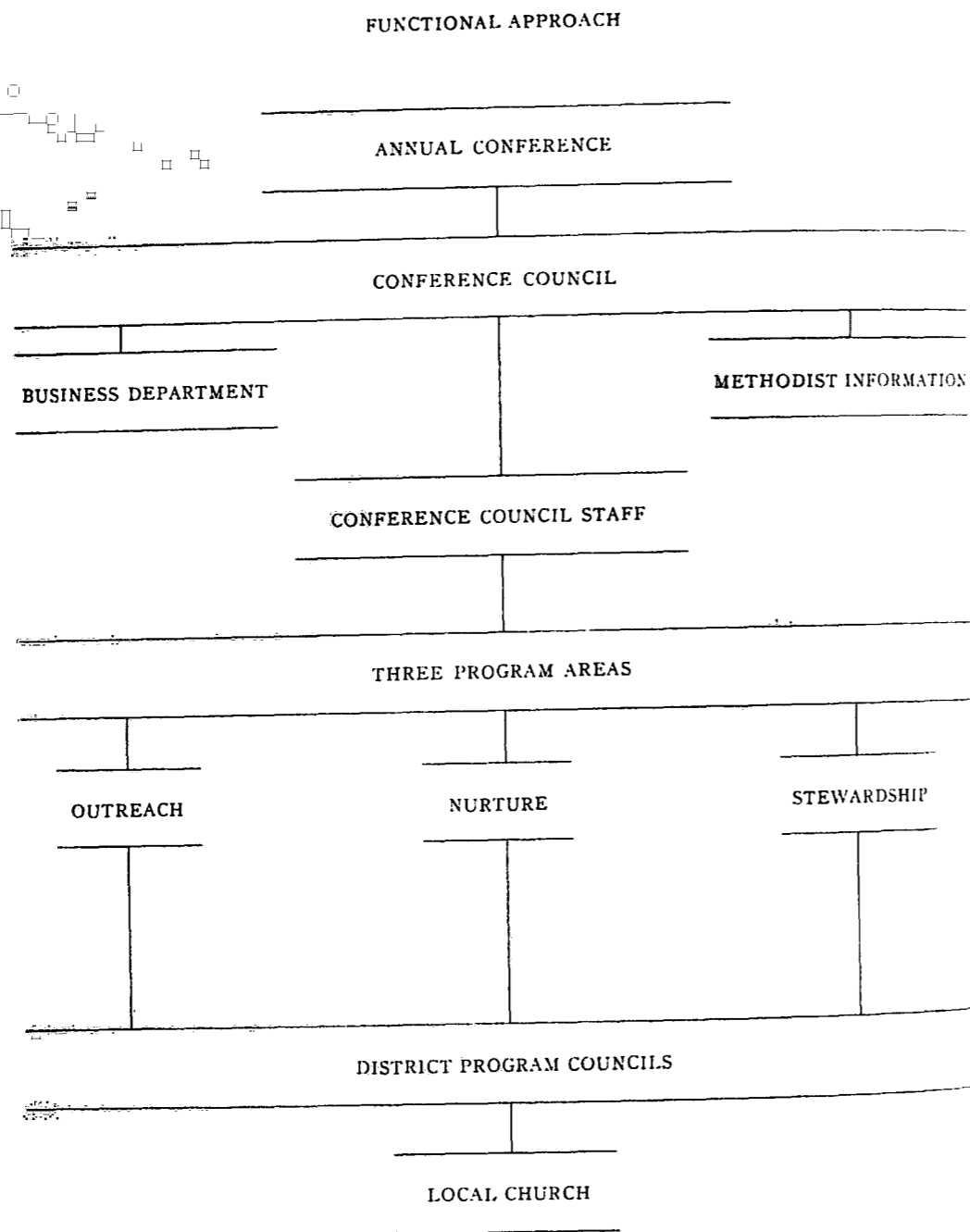

REPORT NO. 3

SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON TELEVISION, RADIO, AND FILM COMMUNICATION

REPORT NO. 1

TRAFCO has previously accepted the working theory that there is AN INCREASING OPPORTUNITY TO COMMUNICATE THE GOSPEL of Christ by use of Modern Mass Media: Television, Radio, Films, Filmstrips, Tapes and Cassettes.

With the valuable assistance of District Superintendents, District Directors of TRAFCO, the Program Council Director and Staff, Conference Boards and Agencies, your Conference TRAFCO has performed the following useful services in the South Carolina Conference ('85) The United Methodist Church in the Conference Year 1969-1970.

1. Production of s/c filmstrip "WHERE IN THE WORLD AM I?" and conference-wide distribution of this filmstrip. The production depicts World Service projects in many parts of the world, and showing features of the 16 agencies supported by World Service. Also the filmstrip was interspersed with major Conference institutions, and projects supported by approved methods. The 26 sets of the filmstrip have been in continuous circulation through District Superintendents, and TRAFCO District Directors. Administrative Boards, Councils on Ministries, UMYF, WSCS and U Men's Clubs, and Church School classes have requested the filmstrip. The Committee on Interpretation has produced a Brochure detailing World Service agencies, and how

funds are allocated. This brochure may be used in conjunction with the filmstrip, "WHERE IN THE WORLD AM I?", if desired. The cost of the filmstrip was underwritten by the Conference Institutions (Colleges, Homes, and Major Boards). Thanks are given each of these. The General Division on Interpretation gave direction in the production, while the Reverends Harlan Wilson, and James Hall provided photographs and script assistance.

2. Workshops on important radio productions included one on "WORD AND MUSIC". Present producers attended, and invited prospective producers also enrolled. Twenty-three were present. As a result, six additional radio programs have been aired, giving a total of 14 now on the air in South Carolina. "THE PLACE" workshop was also conducted in December, 1969. Eighteen men attended. From this workshop TRAFCO has Seven radio broadcasts being heard in South Carolina. The emphasis of "THE PLACE" is on ministry to unchurched teens through TOP 40 MUSIC with a religious, moral, and/or Christian implications.
3. TRAFCO has assumed operation of the Conference Audiovisual Library. The AV Library has been efficiently operated through the generous services of Dr. A. McKay Brabham, Jr. and the ADVOCATE. Mrs. Thompson has served as traffic operator in scheduling and servicing AV materials. To these persons TRAFCO extends grateful thanks. The AV Library will remain in the Methodist Center, but will be in a different location, effective as of this conference. The fee will be \$2.00 per use for any item to all users, plus a rental fee of \$5.00 for use of 16mm films for all NON-CLUB MEMBERS. \$10.00 a Year Film Club Members pay NO rental fee for 16mm films.
4. TRAFCO has acquired essential equipment including an Overhead Projector, and a 16mm sound film projector for previewing films. Additional equipment will be added, hopefully. TRAFCO supports the recommendation of the Board of the Laity to purchase—sufficient Amplification and Public Address Equipment, and Tape Recording facilities, to be used for all major Conference events of Laymen, WSCS sessions, and those of Boards and Agencies, and special related events. This is presently being done by TRAFCO chairman.
5. Taping of Conference and related events in 1969-1970 included the Pastors' School; Annual Conference sessions; Convocation on Worship; Duke University Theological Seminar; and Workshop on "Drugs Uses and Abuses". All taping was done at the request of the agency involved. Tapes of Annual Conference were produced for the Annual Conference Secretary for a complete reproduction of procedures. 96 sets of tapes were requested by Conference Laymen and ministers for use in local church situations. Specific items most requested included: Minimum Salary discussions; World Service report and discussion; and Program Council controversy; and sermons of Bishop Copeland, and Bishop Hardin. The Bishop's Convocation on Mission was also taped, at request of the Program Council. Sets of Tapes requested, and provided on cost basis totaled 305. Each set consisted of three or more reels.
6. Training of leadership in local churches in the use of Audiovisual equipment and materials was given concentrated attention. Many workshops were conducted by District Directors, and qualified laymen who are members of TRAFCO. More than 90 local church leaders attended more than 11 individual training events.
7. TRAFCO placed Television spots on Seven TV stations in South Carolina at half-time breaks, during and after professional football games in 1969, and in post season games. These pointed to Christian ideals in attractive ways and in conformity to proven TV procedures. These were placed by Reverend Jim Hall, TRAFCO's TV Public

Relations director. A more ambitious record of placements is to be advanced in 1970-1971. Major activities of TRAFCO in 1970-1971 will be reflected in the Budget accompanying this report.

- TRAFCO repeats the working Theory "There IS AN INCREASING OPPORTUNITY TO COMMUNICATE THE GOSPEL OF Christ by use of Modern Mass Media".

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

REPORT NO. 1

Institutions

- CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION:** We approve the Christian Higher Education Fund. We recommend that this be distributed among the churches at the rate of 5.7% of the net total funds raised for the 1968-69 Conference year, with the same formula for division among Columbia College, Wofford College, and Campus Ministry being used as was the case for the past conference year, the ratio of distribution being 40%-40%-20% for Columbia College, Wofford College and Campus Ministry respectively.
- EPWORTH CHILDREN'S HOME:** We recommend that the third Sunday in September (September 20, 1970) be set aside as Annual Work Day and that a special freewill offering be received in all churches of the South Carolina Conference on this day for Epworth Children's Home; and also that a special freewill offering shall be received on Mother's Day (May 9, 1971) in all churches in South Carolina for Epworth Children's Home; and that the Church Schools of the South Carolina Conference shall be requested to give the offering received on the first Sunday of each month to the support of Epworth Children's Home.

We further recommend that each District of the South Carolina Annual Conference accept a quota not less than the following:

We further recommend that a goal be sent to the various churches of the district by the District Superintendent in consultation with the local church. It is recommended that this quota be apportioned on the basis of ability and willingness of the local churches to make the reaching of this quota possible. It is understood that the offerings received on Mother's Day, Annual Work Day and the first Sunday of each month in the Church Schools may be used to assist in reaching their requested quota.

THE METHODIST HOME: We recommend that Thanksgiving Week (November 22-28) be designated for a special freewill offering for the Methodist Homes, and that each local church set a goal of \$1.50 per member either through this special offering or through the budget. We further recommend that this support fund be divided on the basis of 75% for the Orangeburg Home and 25% for the Greenwood Home respectively.

SOUTH CAROLINA CAMP FUND: We recommend that an offering be taken on October 25, 1970 for the Conference Camp Development and Maintenance Program. Each church is requested a goal of \$1.00 per church school member.

REPORT NO. 2

Special Day Offerings

- RACE RELATIONS DAY:** We recommend that the churches of the Conference observe Race Relations Day the 2nd Sunday in February and take a voluntary offering and further that the Conference Treasurer in reporting these funds to the treasurer of the General Board of Education in Nashville, Tennessee, ask that they be directed to Paine College.
- CHRISTIAN EDUCATION SUNDAY:** We recommend the observance of Christian Education Sunday, September 27, 1970, and that the offering

taken be an amount equal to 2% of the pastor's and the associate pastor's total cash salary including travel and expense fund and Social Security payments in order to conform to Standing Rules addition for the current year.

3. **GOLDEN CROSS:** In accord with a request of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, we recommend that each church receive a special freewill offering for Golden Cross on the 1st or 2nd Sunday in December.
4. We approve the request of the Television, Radio, and Film Commission that each church be authorized to take an offering or place an amount in the budget for the "Methodist TV-Radio Ministry".
5. **COKEBURY INSTITUTE:** We approve the request of the Cokesbury Conference Institute Committee that a Sunday in 1970-1971 be designated as Cokesbury Institute Sunday, and that a freewill offering be received in the churches for Cokesbury Institute. We request the Annual Conference Council to designate the Sunday.

REPORT NO. 3

Special Recommendations

1. We recommend that the District Superintendents and the District Stewards be allowed to make adjustments in salary items (District Superintendents, Conference Claimants, and Minimum Salary) where there is evidence of inequity in these items. However, no changes affecting district totals may be made.
2. We recommend that every active minister who is a member of the Annual Conference, and not on MRPF, pay 2% of his total cash salary, including travel and expense fund and Social Security to the Conference Claimants Fund. This applies to Lay pastors.
3. The fiscal year for which all recommendations are to be operative shall be June 1, 1970 through May 31, 1971.
4. During the first six months of the Conference year, we recommend that the Conference Treasurer be authorized to advance from available funds amounts not to exceed \$5,000.00 or 50% of the annual appropriation, whichever is lower, to the several commissions and committees of the Conference for the purpose of meeting current expenses where the appropriation has not been received from current collections. However, the Committee on Conference Journal and Yearbook shall be allowed to withdraw its full amount at any time during the year when the bill comes due, since all of its funds are needed for the printing of the Annual Conference Journal and Yearbook in the early part of the year.
5. We urge each pastor to check with his treasurer (or treasurers) before sending his report to the statistician to see that all amounts reported paid have been remitted.
6. We recommend that at the close of the fiscal year of the South Carolina Annual Conference the Statistical Secretary bring his records into conformity with the records of the Treasurer of the South Carolina Annual Conference. (The minister should be notified immediately where adjustments have to be made in the records of a local church.)
7. The Commission on World Service and Finance recommends a bond of \$250,000.00 for the Conference Treasurer, Mr. S. D. Clarkson. He will serve as Treasurer for all Boards, Commissions and Agencies as outlined in Paragraph No. 914 of the 1968 **DISCIPLINE** and shall submit to each board or agency, monthly, a statement showing the amount of the disbursement.
8. We approve the recommendation of the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension that all local churches be urged and encouraged to include in their Advance Special giving a share for Conference and District Church Extension needs.

1. All Boards, Committees or Commissions receiving funds from the Conference Treasurer shall with each voucher submit adequate supporting data.
2. Boards, Agencies, and Conference Institutions which are allowed to withdraw lump sums from the Conference Treasurer shall submit an audit by a Certified Public Accountant to the World Service Commission.
3. It is the recommendation of the World Service and Finance Commission that all Boards, Commissions, and Agencies of the church pay a standard rate of 8¢ per mile when a representative travels on church business and that other actual expenses be paid.
4. We recommend that all District Superintendents, Pastors, and Laymen take advantage of every appropriate opportunity to encourage will and request support of our churches, church colleges, Epworth Children's Home, The Methodist Home, World Service causes, Missions and any other church related agency or cause the donor may desire to support, and that information concerning such bequests be published in the South Carolina Methodist Advocate as information and inspiration to others.
5. We recommend to the Annual Conference that \$2.00 per resident family be placed in the local budget to provide subscriptions to the **ADVOCATE** for families of that church, and that this money be paid directly to the **ADVOCATE** on at least a quarterly basis.

REPORT NO. 4

Ministerial Items

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS:

- a) We recommend \$12,600.00 salary for each District Superintendent for the Conference year 1970-1971.
- b) That for the Conference year 1970-1971 the apportionment for the District Superintendent's Fund be distributed to the several Districts and Charges on the basis of 1.41% of net total funds raised for the Conference year 1968-1969.
- c) We recommend that each District Board of Stewards, or in the absence of such a board the District Board of The Laity, make adequate provisions in the funds for District Work for the necessary expenses of operating the work of the District including upkeep of the District Parsonage, actual travel expense at the Conference rate of 8¢ per mile, secretarial and office expenses, and other necessary expenses incurred by the District Superintendent in the performance of his work.
- d) The Commission on World Service and Finance of the South Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, the United Methodist Church, hereby designates up to 15% of the District Superintendent's salary for the calendar 1970-1971 as allocated for parsonage utilities and maintenance, not including maid service and such expenses paid by the district.

CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS: We recommend an assessment of \$2,150.00 to be distributed to the Conference Claimants during the Conference year; that is, 6.93% of the net total funds raised for the 1968-1969 Conference year.

MINIMUM SALARY: We approve the sum \$165,000.00 for the Minimum Salary Fund during the 1970-1971 Conference year. This is 1.68% of the net total funds raised during the 1968-1969 Conference year.

EPISCOPAL FUND: The Episcopal Fund apportionment is 2% of "the total cash salaries paid to the pastors and associate pastors serving charges under Episcopal appointment or as Supply pastors as reported to the current session of the Annual Conference".

REPORT NO. 5

The Commission has received the auditor's reports; Derrick, Stubbs, and Stith Certified Public Accountants, Columbia, South Carolina, and is open at all times for inspection. There is also a copy on file with the Conference Secretary as required by the Standing rules.

REPORT NO. 6

Annual Conference Entertainment

We recommend that:

- (a) Each local church or charge assume responsibility for the entertainment expenses of its clerical and lay delegates to the Annual Conference.
- (b) The District Fund be responsible for the entertainment expenses of the District Superintendent to the Annual Conference.
- (c) A per diem of \$10.00 per day be paid from the Conference Entertainment Fund to all retired members in attendance at the Annual Conference.
- (d) A per diem of \$8.00 be paid from the Conference Entertainment Fund to each full-time ministerial student at Emory and Duke Universities, and others who may be required to appear before the Conference Commission on Ministerial Training and Qualifications and who are not serving a pastoral charge. The Conference Commission on Ministerial Training and Qualifications will be requested to furnish the Conference Treasurer with a list of all such persons at least two weeks before the meeting of Annual Conference in order that he may have funds due these individuals available to them at the time they arrive for Conference.
- (e) Conference Boards, Commissions, and other Institutions, as appropriate, should provide for the expenses of their representatives to Annual Conference.

(c) We recommend that our World Service & Conference Benevolences, \$756,500.00, and our Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, \$12,144.00, and our Temporary General Aid Fund, \$6,786.00, be distributed to the several districts separately as follows:

One-third on the basis of previous giving, one-third on the basis of total net funds as reported to the World Service & Finance Commission for the 1968-1969 Conference Year, and one-third on the basis of total membership as reported to the 1968-1969 Annual Conference. THE COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

THE PURPOSE of the Commission on Worship is to enable ministers and laymen to worship God in a meaningful way. The Commission realizes that true worship can create and cement a true community of believers through a common experience and thereby give a common ground to stand upon in times of trouble and disagreement as well as to seek to fulfill the mission of the church. It was to this end that the Commission held a Convocation on Contemporary Worship during this past conference year. It was useful for those attending and the leadership was excellent. The Commission also encouraged its district directors to actively participate in the district staff to offer real guidance and local leadership in the area of worship.

We are aware that we are living in a fast changing time and in many instances the ways we worship need to be changed to relate to the variety of persons involved. The organization of our church is also undergoing change. Realizing all these things we make the following proposals for the coming year:

1. To implement all actions of the Annual Conference that relate to the Commission on Worship.
2. To provide training for our district directors at Lake Junaluska to the end that they might be a valid resource on the district program staff.
3. To encourage local churches to become aware of the variety of worship resources and to experiment in this area.
4. To encourage services of worship that are ecumenical in nature.
5. To encourage private and family worship.
6. To assist the local church in any way possible toward more meaningful worship experiences.
7. To assist other Boards and Agencies of the church whenever called upon to do so.
8. To encourage the use of meaningful music in our churches and to support the South Carolina Chapter of the Fellowship of United Methodist Musicians.
9. To aid ministers and laymen to become aware of some of the things that are happening over the world in the area of worship that they might discover something that would be useful in their own situation.
10. In accordance with the action of the General Conference, that World-Wide Communion Sunday be a time when we emphasize the meaning and significance of Holy Communion in the life of the church and that each minister use the two Sundays preceding that Sunday to teach his people.

ALFRED BROWN FERGUSON, JR.

The Rev. Alfred Brown Ferguson, Jr., who was called to his Heavenly reward at Columbia, S. C., on July 2, 1969, gave thirty-five years of devoted service to God as a Methodist minister. He was also an exemplary minister of the church for ten years in the retired relationship.

Son of Alfred Brown and Margaret Jane (Robertson) Ferguson, he was born on February 27, 1894, at Catawba, S. C. He was educated in the Rock Hill graded school, the Lancaster high school, Wofford Fitting School, Wofford College, and Emory University.

Mr. Ferguson felt the call to preach early in life. He was licensed to preach at Rock Hill, S. C., in 1924, and that year was admitted on trial into the Upper S. C.—now S. C. Conference. He was received into full connection and ordained deacon in 1926, and was ordained elder in 1928.

The charges he served were: Graniteville, 1925-28; Duncan Circuit, 1929-30; Whaley Street, Columbia, 1931-36; Pelzer, 1937-38; Judson, Greenville, 1939-41; Main Street, Columbia, 1945-57; Barnwell, 1958-59. He retired in 1959 and made his home in Columbia. At the time of his death he was a member of Washington Street Church Charge Conference, Columbia, where he frequently taught church school classes, assisted with the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, and rendered other valued services. Mr. Ferguson was successful in building and improvement programs in all the charges he served. Outstanding was the enlargement and building program at Main Street Church, Columbia, where he was pastor for thirteen years. He was a good minister of the Gospel of Christ. From the beginning of his ministry to its close his brethren esteemed him for his brotherly spirit and for his exceptional evangelistic gifts. He was a leader of men to whom people responded readily, sacrificially. He was a pastor much beloved, a husband and father of exemplary devotion, and a respected and honored citizen.

For a number of years he was a valued member of the Columbia Lions Club. He served as Chaplain of the State House of Representatives, 1930-36 and as a Mason and Shriner he served a year as Chaplain of Hejaz Shrine Temple. For five years he was associate Richland County Chaplain, spending much time ministering to prisoners and to the indigent. For several years in his retirement he supplied preaching and pastoral services for the Presbyterian churches of Maysville and Bishopville. The beautiful Ferguson Chapel of Main Street Church, Columbia, and the Ferguson Church School Class there honor his memory.

He was married to Miss Ethel LaRue Grice of Edwardsville, Alabama, October 10, 1922. Surviving are his widow of Columbia; four daughters, Mrs. W. C. (Sarah) Sloan of Atlanta, Ga., Mrs. Bohdan (Martha) Yacyshyn of Marlboro, Mass., Mrs. W. L. (Edith) Robertson and Mrs. James G. (Ethel) Thornton of Columbia; a sister, Miss Margaret Ferguson, and a brother, Hazel Ferguson, both of Lancaster.

The funeral was conducted in Washington Street United Methodist Church, Columbia, on July 4, 1969, with the Rev. E. Wannamaker Hardin pastor, and the Rev. Peden Gene Curry, pastor of Main Street United Methodist Church, Columbia, officiating. Burial was in Elmwood Cemetery, Columbia.

A. B. Ferguson's Christian ministry will bear fruit throughout eternity. His faith is beautifully expressed by Whittier:

"I know not where His islands lift
Their fronded palms in air;

I only know I cannot drift
Beyond His love and care."

J. EMERSON FORD

Dr. J. Emerson Ford was born on January 29, 1893, in Horry County, South Carolina, the son of George Marshall and Mary Leah (Meares) Ford. He died in Nashville, Tennessee, on December 10, 1969.

He attended county schools in his native state, the Wofford Fitting School, Wofford College (B.A., 1914), and Yale University Divinity School (B.D., 1927). Wofford College conferred the Doctor of Divinity degree on him in 1937.

Licensed to preach in 1914, he was admitted on trial in the South Carolina Conference that year. He was ordained deacon and admitted to full connection in 1916, and ordained elder in 1918. His appointments were Aynor, 1914-15; Marlboro Circuit, 1915-18; Andrews, 1918-19; conference superintendent of Sunday school work, 1919-24; student at Yale, 1924-28; Cheraw, 1928-30; executive secretary, conference board of education, 1930-35; superintendent, Marion District, 1935-41; St. Paul Church, Orangeburg, 1941-44; editor of youth publications, General Board of Education, Nashville, Tennessee, 1945-58. He retired in August, 1958, and continued to live in Nashville.

In 1938 he was elected for the first time as a delegate to the General Conference and at that time was elected to head the delegation. At the conference he was named to the Commission on Interdenominational Relations and Church Union, and was elected secretary of the Southern Church's delegation. This made him a member and an officer on the Joint Commission on Union between the Methodist Episcopal Church, three Methodist Protestant Churches, and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. This commission had the task of shaping a prospectus for the Discipline of The Methodist Church, then coming into being. Dr. Ford served on the Committee on Education of the Joint Commission, thus having a hand in the structuring of the General Board of Education.

When the Uniting Conference of 1939 met in Kansas City, Dr. Ford, as secretary of the Southern Church's delegation on the Joint Commission on Union, was one of the three secretaries who officially presented to the conference the adopted Plan of Union and the prospectus for the Discipline of the new church.

He first became a member of the Board of Christian Education of the Southern Church in January, 1932, and in 1939 he continued on the new Board of Education in The Methodist Church, also serving on its executive committee. He was elected to membership on the General Board's Curriculum Committee in 1940, and was named chairman of the Committee on Curriculum for 1941-42.

In November, 1944, he became editor of youth publications in the Editorial Division of the General Board of Education in Nashville. During the seven years of his tenure, several significant developments occurred, but space is inadequate to list them.

He was married on December 28, 1916, to Irene Anderson Prince, who lives him. She had been a high-school teacher at Clinton, and as a pastor's wife she proved a real helpmate. She served a term as vice-president of the conference women's society, was district worker with teachers of children, and very active in stimulating missionary interest among youth of the University, Durham, North Carolina.

A long-time friend and colleague, Dr. J. Marvin Rast of this conference, described Dr. Ford's ministry and life in these terms:

"Few persons in South Carolina Methodism have served the interests of the kingdom of God as broadly and as effectively as J. Emerson Ford. His was a keen intellect, a winsome personality. He was a wise counselor, a good minister of Jesus Christ whose ministry of preaching, teaching and writing reached afar.

Participating fully in life to the end, Mr. Phillips passed from this life to the Life Eternal on August 11, 1969.

"Well done, thou good and faithful servant. Thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things. Enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

GEORGE HOLLAND VARN

It is strange how many facts one can know about another and still not know the person!

Biographical data sounds as monotonous as a computer as the familiar questions are answered. First, the birth questions: Where? When? and By Whom? Then a bit later the same round with respect to schooling: where, when, and by whom. Still later, concerning the marriage: where, when, and by whom . . . with children added to change the pace. And, finally, the life work that was done: where, when, and by whom!

But see how lacking these facts are in the power to reflect the person. Run them through with George Holland Varn. He was born at Weimers Cross Road, Colleton County, South Carolina, on March 3, 1898 as a son to David Miley and Jennie Lou (Bird) Varn. He was educated in his early years at Weimer grammar and high school. This early education was advanced with an A. B. degree from the University of South Carolina in 1920 and a B. D. degree from Emory University in 1924.

On June 27, 1935, he married Nell Gertrude Wilson. There were three sons born to this family: George Holland, Jr., David Wilson, and William Baker.

He served his church through appointments at: Jordan, North Charleston Union (Kingsree District); Pinopolis; Ellore-Jerusalem; College Place; Columbia; Mullins; Conway; Marion District; Kingstree; Abbeville; and Manning. He retired in 1966 to his beautiful rural home near Hemingway. During this ministry with the church, he had also served with ability on important boards of the Conference - such as the Board of Education, the Board of Trustees, as trustee of Epworth Children's Home and as Chairman of the Committee on Conference Relations.

He died on November 20th, 1969.

These are the facts . . . but having read all of this how could one know the true person who carried the name of George Holland Varn and who experienced these facts? It is from those who knew him as a person that his true biography must come.

For these it is an inspiration to remember Holland Varn--

Because, at a time when the word of many might be doubted, his word was better than his bond. To think of him is to think of integrity, genuineness, dependability and such fine words of our language. There are not many among us who reflect in their lives the unquestioned integrity of this friend.

And because of his rough-grained common sense that seemed never to grow thin and slick with use. He was not given to much speaking in conference groups, - but it was a serious mistake not to get his point when he did speak. To heed him was often to save oneself from foolishness.

And because of his genial kindness! He was able to say the "straightest things" with the kindest tongue!...which put many a man in his debt.

And because of his life-long loyalty to his church - when he liked what he was asked to do...and when he didn't.

And because of his sly humor. It would be easy to think that such a person as we have described must certainly have been a hard one with whom to live...but how wrong this would be! A large part of the inspiration of remembering Holland is the memory of his chuckle. This chuckle meant that he had suddenly seen a person, or a situation, or a remark in such a light as to reflect the humanness of us all.

So he lived and believed and loved - fulfilling the trusts imposed in him and enjoying the gifts of love returned to him by family and friends. In the fine tradition of his New Testament spiritual ancestors, he reveled in the low country out-of-doors and caught its fish with skill.

How genuine he was and how it enriches the memory to think of him.

DENNY JENRETTE GLEATON

It is true that Denny Jenrette Gleaton came late to the vineyard of service, but it is equally true that when he came, his hands were willing and his heart was determined to do his "Master's" bidding. From the very beginning, in his quiet and humble way, he sought only to "walk worthy of the vocation wherewith he was called."

He was born at St. Matthews, South Carolina on April 19, 1914, and was the last of the Reverend William C. and Agnes Dawsey Gleaton's nine children.

He seemed destined to preach the "Goods News" from the beginning. As a young man, no one could gainsay the fact that he had all the gifts. Namely, the sensitivity of the artist, the orator's ability of expression, the curiosity of the scholar, as well as, the natural affinity for the things of the spirit, without which the minister of God is at a distinct disadvantage. It was almost taken for granted, as such things are, that he would follow in the footsteps of his distinguished father, his "Uncle Cy", whom he loved deeply, and his two older brothers, Wallace and Cuyler. However, due to a conspiracy of circumstances, including the distraction of World War II, in which he served with more than honorable distinction in the United States Army Air Force, his ministry was first delayed and then, for all practical purposes, almost entirely abandoned. Finally, more than a decade after the war the tide of affairs began to turn. He reached a point in his life, as I have often heard him say, when he, - "would fain have filled his belly with the husks that the seine did eat; and no man gave unto him." At which time, by the Grace of God, Denny Gleaton, as a man of forty-five years and literally, as we know now, in the ninth hour of his life's day, "arose and came to his father".

He was licensed to preach on March 13, 1959, and in June of 1960 was appointed to the Lebanon Charge of the South Carolina Conference. It was an abiding sense of satisfaction to Denny that his father, many years before, had served in the same vicinity. Often in our walks and talks together, in those early days of his ministry, he would refer to his father, who died while he was quite young, with a sense of pride. He was very proud of his family: his brother, his sisters, his aunts and uncles, yes, and even some of his distant relatives. It ought to be said, that one of the tenderest joys of his life was the privilege of having his mother with him during a part of her last years.

For nine years Denny Gleaton gave himself tirelessly to the task of feeding the "Good Shepherd's" sheep. His sermons, filled with gentle persuasion and delivered almost always, without reference to manuscript or notes of any kind, were without exception, well organized and to the point. There was a spontaneity about his delivery which captivated the ears and hearts of his hearers. He quoted the "Word" with an almost casual precision, indicating to all who listened, that somewhere along the way, "this Word" had become a part of his very being. The "truth" of God's testimony concerning Himself became the validating reason for Denny Gleaton's life and work as a Methodist minister.

But preaching, as much as he thrilled to its challenge, was not his primary means of communicating the "Gospel". Instead his unique gift was, by the measure of our Lord's grace, a patient and sensitive pastoral ability which functioned most effectively in a one and one, dialogue situation. Denny could speak, but, better yet, he could listen — and he did so to the Glory of God.

In the nine years that he served in the ministry of our United Methodist Church, he was a fervent preacher, a capable administrator, a devoted pastor and an able student of the Methodist Church; its history and policy. His appointments were Lebanon, St. Andrews, and Lodge.

He departed this world for the "gain" of the other on November 4, 1969. Surviving are two sisters, Mrs. S. H. Sheider and Mrs. W. C. Grooms of Hanahan, three brothers, Munsey S. Gleaton of Wrightsville, Pa.; the Rev. Bascom C. Gleaton of St. Paul Charge, Yorges Island; and Halsey W. Gleaton of Wilmington, Calif.

The funeral services were held November 6 at St. Paul United Methodist Church, Yorges Island, S. C., conducted by Rev. Donald A. Foster, Administrator of Ministerial Affairs for the South Carolina Conference; Dr. Adlai C. Holler, Dist. Supt. of the Spartanburg District; and Bishop Cyrus B. Dawsey, and uncle. Interment was in Riverside Memorial Park on the banks of the Ashley River in Charleston, S. C.

HISTORICAL ADDRESS
FRANCIS ASBURY

AMERICAN METHODISM'S TIRELESS ITINERANT

In attempting to do justice to the life and ministry of such a magnanimous spirit as Francis Asbury, being limited both by ability and by time, I feel somewhat like the youthful seminary student who, upon trying to preach one of Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick's sermons, was told by his professor of preaching, "Son, you can't fire a forty-five calibre bullet in a twenty-two calibre pistol!" But try I shall.

It has been said, and I submit, rightly so, that, "American Methodists have neither used nor honored the memory of Asbury as they should." His place in and his impact upon our history has not been given proper emphasis, either in our church or national life. Especially does our own South Carolina owe this great and good man a lasting debt of gratitude and honor long overdue, for so much of his time and ministry was invested here in our own state.

My personal interest in the man was first stimulated when, as a small boy, I heard my parents speak of "Uncle Francis," a great uncle on my mother's side of the family who was named after the pioneer bishop. He is Dr. Francis Asbury Buddin, now retired from the Methodist itineracy after a long and fruitful ministry, first, in this our own Conference, and later in Texas and Arkansas. More recently, while serving the historic Belin Memorial Church at Murrells Inlet, I learned that the Reverend James L. Belin for whom that church is named and who labored long and hard among both the black and white people of that coastal region of our state during the early 1800's, was ordained by Bishop Asbury. Moreover, in reading Asbury's Journal I was reminded that the Bishop on numerous occasions traveled along Ashley River Road when it runs in front of the parsonage in which we now live near Charleston. So this assignment in the year of our Tricentennial celebration, came as a pleasant one although an awesome and flattering task nonetheless.

As most of you are aware, the facts relative to Asbury's birth and early life are fairly well documented, although even the Bishop himself seemed uncertain as to the exact date of his arrival. According to him it was either the 20th or 21st of August, 1745 in the parish of Handsworth near Birmingham, England. This was of course during the heat of the Evangelical Revival, and in a country which is said to have had the "idle discontented look of the morning after some mad holiday," a land in which many were saying the day of preaching was done. Asbury quite obviously proved this to be one of the great fallacies of all time! Into such a world as this, then, Francis Asbury was born, the only child of his parents with the exception of a sister, Sarah, who died at an early age.

Asbury's father, Joseph, was a gardener for two of the wealthiest families of the parish. His mother, Elizabeth, much like the mother of the Wesleys, of whom Mrs. Harmon spoke so effectively last year, was a deeply devoted woman, a zealous Christian as well as a person of exceptional intelligence. It is recorded that, even before her son's birth, she felt God had a special purpose for his life. There is a story that, before he was born, Asbury's mother had a dream in which God spoke to her, informing her that her child would be a boy and a great religious leader, who would preach to the heathen. Some have found it interesting that the Almighty failed to specify the Americans!

The devotion of Asbury for his parents is a well-documented historical fact. Of his meager salary as a Methodist bishop, only some sixty dollars a year (which was the same salary received by all the Methodist itinerants) he regularly sent a portion of it to his parents for their partial support. At one time when their needs were especially great, he wrote to England telling them that he had sold his watch and his library in order to be of help to them and that he felt was far too small a thing . . . he wished he could do more.

After thirty-one years of separation from his family, while presiding over the Baltimore Conference in 1802, Asbury learned of his beloved mother's death. This news came as the deepest sorrow of his life, for his devotion to her in death was as loyal as when he, as a boy, had sat at her knee. Elizabeth Asbury's influence upon her son's life, most scholars would agree, was immeasurable. And of course there were other profound influences upon his religious life also.

As a boy of six or seven, Francis began reading the Bible. He was also privileged to hear some of the great preachers of the day, no doubt as a result of his mother's insistence as well as in an effort to satisfy his own childish curiosity. The young Francis was seemingly a sensitive and sober child; indeed, some historians suggest too much so for his own good. It appears that his excessive sensitivity was one reason he left school so early, about the age of eleven or twelve. He either could not or would not stand up to the brutality of his schoolmasters, and thus he left his studies and began working as an apprentice to a blacksmith. This good man, a Mr. Foxall, having been associated with the Methodist movement, influenced the impressionable young Asbury profoundly. His interest having been aroused, Francis inquired of his mother concerning the "Methodists," and receiving a favorable report, he began attending some of their meetings. This apprenticeship under the Methodist blacksmith-saddler was later to prove more valuable in training Asbury for ministry on the rough and rugged American frontier than would have been a university education which, of course, he lacked.

When he was sixteen, Francis was privileged to hear Alexander Mather preach and he was greatly moved by the message. Later that same evening he went to his father's old barn with a friend, probably William Emery, and there he had an experience not unlike that of Wesley's at Aldersgate. Afterwards that ancient barn became for Asbury a sanctuary which he frequently visited. In fact, many of the neighbors claimed that it was kept standing only by the boy's prayers!

It is also significant that, with his spiritual awakening, Asbury underwent a process of intellectual conversion as well. He began studying in earnest. As has been said of him, "self-help became divine-help." It was not uncommon, even during these earlier years, for Asbury to study as much as ten hours a day. Accordingly, he was to be a serious student the rest of his life.

By the age of seventeen Asbury was preaching in public meetings, and when about twenty-one, he filled in for one of Mr. Wesley's traveling preachers. By 1789 he had been appointed the regular assistant at Northamptonshire.

It was five years later at the age of twenty-six that Asbury heard and heeded the call of Mr. Wesley for additional preachers for the American Continent. Asbury and four others offered their services, with Richard Wright and himself finally being appointed.

From the very beginning the commanding Mr. Asbury made a most favorable impression on the American people. Frederick Maser, in describing him, says:

"He was a man about whom other men circle as the planets revolve about the sun. He was five feet, nine inches tall and weighed 151 pounds. His posture was erect, giving the impression of greater height. He had a prominent nose, a large mouth, which one contemporary said was made on purpose for talking, and keen blue eyes that seemed to penetrate through any person at whom he was looking. He dressed neatly in a gray suit with leggings, and he usually wore a low-crowned broad-brimmed hat."¹

It is noteworthy, moreover, that Asbury was always a "man's man." In fact, there was later to be certain opposition to the presence of Dr. Thomas Coke in this country, partly because he seemed somewhat effeminate in comparison to the imposing Mr. Asbury. Yet, Asbury like our Lord, was a man at home with all classes of people, one who could in fact "walk with kings and not lose the common touch." He dined with governors and presidents as

well as with the peasant poor, feeling equally at home in the company of either. He was in fact a man of rare humility. And while tender-hearted toward others, he was intensely severe toward himself. He was forever fighting the temptation of thinking more highly of himself than he thought he had right. Never did he feel completely adequate for the task at hand, and once he wrote to his mother of himself, "There never was a man of smaller abilities raised so high." As you will recall, Asbury would not even accept ordination until his fellow preachers voted on the issue, although Mr. Wesley had given his blessing upon it and made provisions, through Dr. Coke, for the ceremony. After the vote, which was unanimously in his favor, Asbury was then elevated to three offices in as many days. During the historic Christmas Conference of 1784 he was ordained Deacon by Dr. Coke, now Bishop Coke, or more factually, General Superintendent, assisted by Whatcoat and Vasey. Coke had earlier been consecrated by Wesley with orders to come to America to consecrate Asbury. The next day Asbury was ordained Elder, and on the third day of the conference, he was consecrated General Superintendent. It was not until after the conference of 1787, however, that the title was officially changed from Superintendent to Bishop, as rendered in the English scriptures.

Few students of Asbury's life could agree with his overly-modest self-esteem, however. For while a small man physically, by any yardstick Asbury was a spiritual and ecclesiastical giant. Some have gone so far as to equate his life with that of Thomas à Kempis and even Augustine.

It seems the consensus of most church historians that Asbury in his generation did more for Christianity on this continent than any other man. It has been said, I think justifiably so, that, "With Wesley, Whitefield, and Coke, Asbury ranks as one of the four greatest representatives of the Methodist Movement, and in American Methodism, his influence upon this great church is unsurpassed."² "More than any other," wrote Ezra Tipple, "he embodied the genius and spirit of early Methodism."³

Not only was Asbury a man of authentic humility, he was, as has already been indicated, a man equally known for his generosity. A man once asked him for fifty dollars, which would have amounted to about five-sixths of his total annual income. Asbury gave the man five dollars of all the money he had, which at that time was only about twelve dollars. At the session of the Western Conference in 1806, upon finding certain of his preachers in need, almost without clothing, the Bishop immediately parted with his watch, his shirt, and his coat. Said the Bishop on another occasion, "I'd rather have grace than gold."

When he finally made out a will in 1813, the man who had come to this country with but one suit and a blanket, estimated his entire estate to be valued at only \$2,000, most of which had come from his friends in Maryland, and all of which he had bequeathed to the Methodist Book Concern.

Asbury As Preacher - Evangelist

In an evaluation of the person of Asbury, it behooves us to consider the man against the background of his ministry, particularly his role as preacher. Indeed, at forty years of age, after twenty years in the ministry, this was his only title, that of "preacher," for he had yet to be ordained. From first to last preaching WAS his life, and that preaching was forever Christ-centered. "Salvation," both personal and world-wide in its application is the one word that best describes his homiletics. Asbury was a serious preacher, although he would indulge himself in severe satire from time-to-time. But he was notably a serious man, who never descended to anything beneath the dignity of a gentleman and a Christian. He was an awesome man who always preached for an immediate decision, knowing that he may well never pass that way again. To be sure, what every preacher attempted to do in each sermon in those frontier days was answer the ultimate question, "What must I do to be saved?" So the message of Asbury and his itinerants was a message of life and liberty to perishing men.

From both a homiletical and historical standpoint, we would have to agree with Frederick Maser in affirming that, "Methodism's message, not its ritual and liturgy is the spark used by the Holy Spirit to illumine men's hearts with the truth about God."⁴

It is told that the wife of an English soldier-surgeon was converted by an itinerant Methodist preacher, one of Asbury's band, whereupon the surgeon-husband quickly applied a mustard plaster on the back of her head to draw the Methodism out of her! An infectious Godly disease it was!

As a preacher, Francis Asbury was also noted as a long-winded speaker. He seldom preached less than an hour and frequently went on for two. At least once he sermonized for four hours, after spending two hours in prayer. The Bishop always preached TO the heart of his text, never FROM it. A biblical preacher through-and-through, Asbury was never known as a topical preacher. As one might suspect, he was not a popular preacher, or for that matter a great preacher by today's standards. In fact, it was often said that he prayed better than he preached. "He prayed the most and best of any man I knew" said Freeborn Garrettson. But the proof of authentic preaching then, as now, lies with the results, and Asbury got results. For by 1807, after some thirty-five years of preaching the gospel, nearly one-half the American people were under the religious influence of Asbury and his itinerants. The secret of such pulpit success seems to have been attributed primarily to the man himself and his approach in presenting the gospel to ordinary men. Asbury incarnated the Word! One could not, it seems, in hearing him, separate the message from the man. And of course his messages were always simple, direct, and thoroughly evangelical. Indeed, for Asbury, Methodism WAS evangelism! From its inception Methodism was, in the words of Ezra Tipple, "a revival church in its spirit, a missionary church in its organization."⁵ All of Methodism's preachers were missionaries, thoroughly committed to and energetically about the business of church extension. Always, Asbury and his itinerants went TO the people, a lesson in effective evangelism some of us have been long in learning.

This evangelical fervor for Asbury, as with Wesley, was rooted firmly in what might well be described as "authentic Christian piety." Always there was the dual emphasis of personal holiness linked arm-in-arm with social and moral reform. While the social gospel, as such, did not exist for Asbury, his preaching bore fruit in terms of social betterment nonetheless.

Asbury believed, as did many in his day, and hopefully some in our own, that God could do more with a man's sins than simply forgive them. He believed and practiced spiritual holiness and sought it passionately for all men. Yet the Bishop was never dogmatically fanatical! His religion was reasonable, persistent, and thoroughly scriptural. His enduring concern was that the religion of men be more than empty ceremonialism and mere verbal profession. The Christian faith for Francis Asbury was a living, breathing, vital and viable experience, a way of living and doing, resulting in fervent, but intelligent, apostolic zeal. He was one of those rare individuals who possessed that unusual combination of total commitment wedded with the gift of shrewd common sense.

It is also noteworthy that, Asbury's lack of formal education, which would have been the downfall for most men, made of him a self-educated student of the highest order. And when one becomes aware of the scarcity of both material and opportunity for personal study, Asbury's solid biblical scholarship seems all the more incredible, for he used the Bible with effectiveness seldom equaled by preachers of the American church, reading both biblical Hebrew and Greek. One would have to agree with Arthur Bruce Moss who has said of Asbury,

"The ability to use the original language with fair facility is proof of a determination of will that turned the multiplied thousands of miles on horseback into a university library, and the unlighted nights of a half-century into a graduate seminar."⁶

Accordingly, the Bishop's horseback study seems to have been that of improving his Hebrew. (If it were not for the Christian cross on its cover, the book being read by the man on horseback, seen on the front of the little black book so familiar to every Methodist minister, might have been a Hebrew testament! When our son was a little fellow learning to talk, he heard me speak of John Wesley's horseback ministry, and when he would take the daily suggester out of my shirt pocket, seeing that picture, he would say, "That's John Horseley!")

Well the man on the horse, so far as I can tell, represents not Wesley, but Asbury, who said incidentally, that he couldn't read as much on horseback as Mr. Wesley, "But," he added parenthetically, "the English roads were much better!"

Asbury As Administrator And Journalist

As chief pastor to the American Methodists, Asbury the preacher-evangelist, must also be remembered as the effective administrator and journalist which of course he was.

It appears that Asbury, though a strict disciplinarian, was firm but notably fair as an ecclesiastical leader. Unlike some, namely Thomas Rankin, one of Wesley's assistants who seldom put matters to a vote, Asbury, on the other hand, was clearly democratic in his approach to church proceedings. He permitted open debate in his conferences and then put matters squarely to a vote, expecting all those involved to abide firmly by the decision.

In March of 1789, while in our city of Charleston, Asbury received a scorching letter from Mr. Wesley, accusing him of assuming more ecclesiastical authority than he had right. Most historians seem to agree, however, that this was an unfair as well as an unfounded criticism. The Bishop did administer the affairs of the church with an iron hand and an indomitable will, but he could hardly be called a politically ambitious person. The fruits of his ministry bear ample testimony to his statement of intent in saying, "My only aim is to profit for the flock of Christ."

In the business of pastoral appointments, Asbury was always against the soft places, the easy life of leisure for any and all of his preachers. He fought openly against the tendency of his men who wanted to settle in the cities rather than itinerate. Said the good Bishop, "My brethren seem not to know the way to the country . . . I think I shall show them." And show them he did! Not only did he send them to the country, he went with them, never permitting himself the luxury of a permanent episcopal office in the city.

For this reason and others, Asbury never married. Some say it was because of a life-long love affair with his childhood sweetheart, Nancy Brooks, a relationship apparently terminated by Asbury's mother. At any rate he felt it unfair to bind any woman to a man who was gone fifty-one weeks out of the year. "Such," he said, "would neither be just nor generous." In fact, it appears that celibacy for all the clergy was Asbury's ideal. At the Virginia Conference of 1809, of the sixty itinerant preachers present, all but three were single, because, as one historian put it, ". . . the high taste of the Southerners would not permit their daughters to wed with men so poor in worldly goods," to which Asbury is reported to have said, "Then all the better!"

As a journalist, while not as scholarly as Mr. Wesley, Asbury was prolific in his efforts nonetheless. His *Journal* is, as you know, a classic in the picture it provides of American life in the Eighteenth and early Nineteenth Centuries. This ministerial diary was begun early in his ministry, for on July 24, 1774, he wrote of his conversion, his work in England, and of his journey to America, alluding to the fact that he had begun to keep an "imperfect Journal". The *Journal* was continued daily, except in periods of severe illness, for some 40 years, providing invaluable insight into the man, his mind, and his ministry.

Again, like his father in the ministry, Mr. Wesley, Francis Asbury was never an idle man. A typical day, which for him usually began at four in the morning, he described as follows: "My present mode of conduct is . . . to read one hundred pages a day, usually to pray in public five times a day, to preach

in the open air every other day, to lecture in prayer meeting every evening," and, he adds, "if it were in my power, I would do a thousand times as much for a gracious and blessed Master."

While in Charleston on one occasion, he calculated that he had preached 18 sermons, met 15 classes in the city, written more than 80 letters, read about 100 pages, visited 30 families again and again (Obviously he was not easily discouraged in pastoral visitations!) and found time to write 300 pages on subjects of interest to the society and connection. The Bishop claims to have written about 1,000 letters a year. He also tried his hand at writing a little poetry, but he destroyed it, readily recognizing the poverty of his efforts.

To the incalculable loss of the church of posterity, however, all of Asbury's collected papers, original books of Journal sermons, outlines, biblical notes, and other valuable correspondence was lost in the Methodist Publishing House fire in 1836.

Asbury As Educator And Pastor

American Methodism's pioneer Bishop, widely recognized as a noted preacher-evangelist and an administrator-journalist, is perhaps less known for his ability as an educator. While not formally trained himself, yet was Asbury fervent in his concern for education in this country, to the extent of requiring all of his preachers to preach on education at least once a year. A considerable portion of his time was given towards the establishment of schools and colleges, although he did not particularly enjoy raising money, even for a college! (One wonders what kind of college president he would make today!)

While Asbury's primary concern in terms of education, seems to have been that of establishing secondary schools and Sunday schools, some students of his life contend that, if Asbury had one worldly ambition, it was that of being the founder of a good college for his people, and possibly his failure to do this was the one great disappointment of his life. Horace M. DuBose reminds us, however, that one of the colleges that Asbury projected for South Carolina finally became a reality in the form of this our own Wofford College.⁷ Thus his efforts were not all in vain.

There was also the establishment of Cokesbury College in Maryland, the first Methodist College in this country, named for the two pioneer bishops. The raising of funds for this institution was to be one of the first official tasks of Dr. Coke and Asbury, upon Cokes's arrival in America. This proved to be something of a disastrous project, however, for money then, as now, was a scarce commodity.

As for Sunday schools, which were formally recognized by conference action in 1790, Asbury gave his full support. There are some who have credited Asbury with having begun the first such schools in this country. During the 1790 Conference, which met in Charleston, it was resolved to establish Sunday schools for poor children, both black and white. Interestingly enough, these sessions were to be conducted from six in the morning until ten and from two o'clock in the afternoon until six!

Through the Sunday school movement and through his pastoral concern, Asbury revealed his abiding love for the Black people of his day. After his first visit to Charleston in March of 1785, he said, "Now we know that God has brought us here, and have a hope that there will be a glorious work among the people . . . at least among the Africans."

There is one report of Asbury's having preached to a dozen Blacks, all illiterate, who listened eagerly as the Bishop read to them from the Bible by the light of a candle in a slave's shack.

According to A. M. Shipp in his history of South Carolina Methodism, the first slaves to be brought to the Carolinas were brought by William Sayle about 1715. But, as you know, little more than a century later Asbury was openly and aggressively opposing the slave trade and, indeed, helped have a law passed which required all the preachers who had them, to free their slaves where law

would permit. The church was of course divided over the issue, but Asbury and Coke pressed their point. In fact they even visited General Washington at Mount Vernon in May of 1785 to solicit his signature to a petition from the Virginia Conference, urging Virginia State Assembly to seek either the immediate or gradual emancipation of the slaves. The future President, although sympathetic to their cause, refused to sign the document, however.

Authentic evangelism for Asbury was thus decidedly social in its application as well as individual and personal. And, as one might suspect, the Bishop was hardly any more welcome in some sections of the country then than he would be today. Yet did he manage to accentuate both the prophetic and pastoral functions of his ministry with equal effectiveness. As chief pastor of the American Methodists, he loved his people with enduring devotion, and throughout the Revolution, his heart was squarely with the colonists. In fact, at the end of the war, of the eight English preachers officially sent to America by Wesley, Asbury alone remained. It is significant that, at the time, there were actually two revolutions underway, the American and the Methodist, both moving forward side-by-side, and both ultimately breaking with the Mother Country.

So Asbury, who had come to love this land as much as that of his birth, remained here never to return to his homeland. It was thus said of him, that even as Wesley saved England, so Asbury saved America.

As he loved his people and this their land, all the more he loved his preachers! For years he prayed daily for each one, calling them all by name. He also initiated a "mite subscription" to aid the retired preachers and their widows. This he collected regularly while making his rounds. Likewise, he had a great love and an abiding concern for the "German Methodists," so called. He held in high esteem Mr. Otterbein and Martin Boehm, Mr. Otterbein having assisted Dr. Coke in Asbury's consecration to the episcopacy. These men and their followers, the forerunners of the former Evangelical United Brethren Church, were dear to the heart of the Bishop, and were a constant source of inspiration and encouragement to him. "I love these people," wrote Asbury, "they are kind in their way."

The Scope Of Asbury's Travels

As the title of this presentation suggests, Francis Asbury has perhaps been best known for his ceaseless travels. He has deservedly earned such titles as the "Moses of American Methodism," "The Prophet of the Long Road," "The Tireless Itinerant," and others, all accentuating the phenomenal mobility of his entire ministry. In the light of modern-day highways and modes of transportation, his travels seem all the more amazing. It has been said of him that, "He printed the map of his ministry with his horse's hoofs." He crossed and re-crossed the Allegheny Mountains more than sixty times. According to Charles Selecman, he covered during his ministry here some 275,000 miles and traveled into virtually every state in the Union again and again.⁹ He rode the same horse an average of 5,000 miles a year for five years! (Twenty-five thousand miles for a man on one horse must be some kind of a record?) Truly, Asbury was, like his Lord, a man without a real home. Wherever he hitched his horse and laid his head, there was his home, on the "long road," and it was still there 45 years later when death finally overtook him. This noble man who "rambled throughout the United States," as some said of him, and who gave as his mailing address, "America," traveled so much and so frequently, he claimed it seemed like confinement to rest even one day. His travel was not simply for the love of travel, as you know, but rather for the sake of the man by the side of the road . . . that was the motivation behind his mobile ministry.

A typical year's journey went something as follows. Usually, in early September, he would leave New York, heading for Philadelphia, Wilmington (Delaware), Baltimore, Alexandria, Petersburg, and Norfolk. From there he would come on to Raleigh and then to Charleston, ending his southward tour in Washington, Georgia. He would then return through the western part of our state, heading for the mountains of North Carolina and Tennessee. From there he would travel into the wilderness of Kentucky to Lexington and on up the

west side of the Alleghenies across the entire breadth of Virginia to Uniontown, Pa. Crossing the Alleghenies to Baltimore, he would then press on to New York and then into Connecticut and Massachusetts, finally heading back to Albany and through the Hudson valley again to New York, arriving there usually the latter part of August.

From his *Journal* we learn that he went into New York State more than 60 times; New Jersey, more than 60 times; Pennsylvania 78 times; Maryland, 63; North Carolina, 63; South Carolina, 46 times; Virginia, 84; and Georgia, 20 times each, and into Massachusetts, 24 times.

As one might suspect, such riding took its toll in terms of the Bishop's health. He complained early of his hip bothering him, which is easily understandable, especially in view of the fact that, after such arduous riding, he frequently had to sleep all night on the ground!

This phenomenal man was constantly in danger it seems. He was followed by wolves; he was fallen upon time and again by his own horse; he was more than once lost in the dismal swamps of our own South Carolina. While riding in the dark, he was bruised by trees. Once he was almost burned to death due to another person's carelessness. He endured all kinds of weather; rain, hail, wet, snow and ice. Once he was hit by a bullet that grazed his head as he was riding through the forest, and on another occasion, the buggy in which he was riding was shot through by a stray bullet.

The Bishop forded streams and rivers and once crossed the Potomac in a very open boat. I recall hearing a story some years ago which may or may not be true . . . I've searched his *Journal* and have not been able to substantiate it, but as the story goes, Asbury was traveling through the Pee Dee section of our state on his way to the conference session in Charleston. It seems that Asbury arrived at the Great Pee Dee River either in late January or early February. There being no other way at the time to cross the icy and treacherous river, Asbury is said to have disrobed, tying his clothes in a bundle to his saddle, and then, holding to his horse's tail, he and his faithful steed swam to the other side. As the story goes, by the time he reached Charleston Asbury was almost dead with pneumonia!

In later life, as his health steadily declined, the Bishop resorted to using a buggy or small carriage; but most of his miles were covered on horseback in which saddlebags he and his preachers carried the fundamentals of civilization—a Bible, a hymnbook, religious literature, and bringing with them news of the outside world.

From time-to-time, especially during his later years, Asbury enjoyed the traveling companionship of a number of men, such as Edward Bailey, Hope Hall (one of the founding trustees of the University of Georgia), and his "silver trumpet," Nicholas Snethen, who was later elected Chaplain to the United States Congress. And of course there were others such as Whatcoat, Jesse Lee, and Henry Willis. These men were invaluable to Asbury, especially during his frequent headaches, fevers, chills, colds, and his unrelenting battle with rheumatism. During one period of some four months, he was continuously ill; yet he covered during that time at least 3,000 miles. At times he was so ill death undoubtedly would have been a welcome friend. But he pressed on saying, "I will ride or die." As late as 1802, looking back over his life and his earlier *Journal* entries, Asbury was modest enough to suggest, "It was little I could do many years ago; I do less now." Most of us today may well stand rebuked for our incompetence in comparison to such a ministry and to such a man.

Asbury In South Carolina

Neither time, talent, nor space will permit here a just treatment of Asbury's life in our own state. This you can read for yourself in his *Journal* and in many reputable competent histories of South Carolina Methodism. But there are several observations that we might share to our mutual advantage.

It seems that the best religious influence in South Carolina before 1766 was that of the Calvinists of France. The Presbyterians were numerous, especially in the middle colonies, although in the South the Church of England was of course the chief ecclesiastical institution. In 1766, as Dr. Lewis P. Jones reminds us in a splendid article in the July, 1969 issue of *Sandlapper Magazine*, an air of

religious indifference pervaded the South. In spite of the earlier ecclesiastical efforts of the Wesleys, Whitfield, and Benjamin Ingham, all "Oxford Methodists," and the work of the Calvinists and Anglicans, the Southland to which Francis Asbury was later introduced could hardly be called eager for evangelization! Even though Methodism had officially come to South Carolina in 1772 with the work of the Reverend Robert Williams, it had not been very influential, it appears. On one of his early visits to Charleston, Asbury observed that the only people there with much religion were the Calvinists. And in 1794, upon leaving the Port City, he wrote, "I now leave Charleston, the seat of Satan, dissipation, and folly." As late as 1812 he wrote of our "Holy City," "Religion is not very fashionable in Charleston." His work and that of his itinerants was obviously cut out for them!

Asbury's first, and in many respects, one of his most productive visits to South Carolina was in 1785. A Society was organized in Charleston which was to become one of the vital strongholds of Methodism. On several occasions Asbury remained in Charleston during the winter months, staying with friends. Indeed, in spite of opposition and difficulty, the Bishop grew to love the peninsula city with an affection second only to that which he held for Baltimore.

On the return trip of 1785, a station was organized in Georgetown under a Mr. Hickson, a man of much enthusiasm and rare genius, and with the able assistance of Mr. William Wayne, reportedly the first Methodist convert there. This station was the forerunner of Duncan Memorial Church.

The terrain from Charleston to Georgetown, you will be interested to know, Asbury described as "barren country in all respects." Years later after traveling through our lowcountry the Bishop wrote, "I have been out for six weeks, and ridden near five hundred miles among strangers to me, to God, and to the power of religion." In January of 1811, upon reaching Georgetown, Asbury said, "I am always in letters in this place, and were they to offer me twenty such towns as a bribe, I would not visit it again."

Once, while in Orangeburg County, the Bishop scheduled an evening service. Only two men showed up—both drunk! Of the liquor problem in the upper part of our state, Asbury wrote in 1796 that there was a shortage of corn, to which he said, "... no wonder, when we consider the number of stills in the country, the people here drink their bread as well as eat it!"

Lest you think me unfair to the people of these good communities, I must confess that he found things in my hometown of Kingstree hardly any better, even though it had been settled in 1732 by good Scot-Irish Presbyterians! While there on one occasion he met and visited with a Mr. Durant, a Methodist, but who, in Asbury's words, "was not in the enjoyment of religion." Some scholars suggest that this was Kingston, our present town of Conway, and not Kingstree; at any rate our forebears were not all given to Southern hospitality it seems.

The Bishop was subjected to scandalous attacks, both verbally and physically, while in our state. Once the church in which he was preaching in a night service in Charleston was stoned, and in 1789, according to A. M. Shipp,¹⁰ the Charleston newspapers began leveling their attacks against The Methodist Church in general and the Methodist bishops in particular!

After the first episcopal tour of 1785, the year of the founding of our conference, the appointments of Camden, Georgetown, Charleston, and Georgia appeared in the conference minutes for the first time. The Georgia work was obviously quite limited. The first step toward establishing a permanent type of annual conference in South Carolina did not come until about 1793, however. At that time all of South Carolina, Georgia, and a portion of North Carolina was included as part and parcel of the South Carolina Conference, though at that time there were neither conference names nor boundaries as such.

In spite of religious indifference, overwhelming opposition, and his wailing health, Asbury's ecclesiastical efforts in our state ultimately achieved astonishing results. From a total Methodist membership in 1787 of 2,075 Whites and 141 Blacks, the church grew until in 1814 there were 23,240 Whites and 14,527 Blacks in the churches of our South Carolina Methodist Conference. This was the last year Asbury's name appeared as a presiding officer of this Conference,

ference, the position then being shared with Bishop William McKendree, the first American-born Methodist bishop.

Asbury's Final Days

The Tennessee Conference of 1815 was the last over which Francis Asbury presided. It was also the last conference he attended. Having no home to call his own, he kept moving, weakening increasingly. "I die daily" he wrote of those final days.

His last sermon was delivered in Richmond, Va., on March 24, 1816, where he preached sitting on a table, as he could no longer walk or stand. His death came quietly, four months after the last entry in his *Journal* which was written at Granby, S. C. (near Columbia), on Dec. 7, 1815. Asbury's long-time friend and companion, John Wesley Bond, sent out a message to the preachers and churches, saying, "Our dear father has left us, and has gone to the church triumphant. He died, as he lived—full of confidence, full of love—at four o'clock this afternoon, Sunday, March 31, 1816."

The Bishop's body was then buried in the family plot of his dear friend, George Arnold, in whose home he died, some twenty miles from Fredericksburg, Va. The remains were later moved, as a result of General Conference action, to Baltimore and interred beneath the pulpit of the old Eutaw Church. In 1854 the body was again moved and deposited finally in the Mount Olivet Cemetery in that same city.

Thus, American Methodism's "Prophet of the Long Road" had traveled more than a quarter of a million miles during his episcopate, having preached some 16,000 sermons, having ordained more than 4,000 preachers, and having sat as presiding officer of 224 annual conferences.

The fundamental secret of his life and ministry, we would have to agree, is to be found in that passage from St. Matthew's Gospel which says, "He that findeth his life shall lose it: and he that loseth his life for my sake shall find it." (Mt. 10:39)

Robert Frost has given us some memorable lines that seem a fitting epitaph for this great pilgrim of faith. Said he:

"The woods are lovely dark and deep
But I have promises to keep
And miles to go before I sleep
And miles to go before I sleep."

To this Christ and to these promises Francis Asbury remained ever faithful. Truly, he did find his life in losing it . . . in giving it away. He was indeed, "American Methodism's Tireless Itinerant."

STANDING RULES AND RESOLUTIONS
STANDING RULES

South Carolina Annual Conference

I. Rules of Order

1. The Parliamentary rules of the preceding General Conference shall govern the procedure of the Conference where applicable. (See Rule 15).

II. Organization

2. The official roll call shall be the roll call cards signed by the clerical and lay members present. The record of attendance shall be made therefrom.

3. The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected on nomination arising from the floor, and the Conference Statistician on nomination from the cabinet. They shall serve for the quadrennium.

4. The Secretary shall nominate his assistants annually for election by the Conference.

5. The Secretary shall employ the Conference stenographer.

6. The Conference shall elect annually an Associate Statistician, and an assistant statisticians as needed, on nomination of the Statistician.

7. The Auditor shall be elected annually by the Conference on nomination of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

8. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation for the above officers and also the amount for meeting the expenses of said officers. The Conference Treasurer shall pay them amounts from the Conference expense fund.

9. Program Committee.

(a) The Bishop, the Host District Superintendent, the Host Pastor, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Lay Leader, and the Chairman of the Conference Entertainment Committee shall be the program committee for the Conference. They shall arrange the Annual Conference program, giving due regard to special orders as required by the Discipline, or as ordered by the Annual Conference. This committee shall determine the compensation and expenses for speakers invited by this committee and the Treasurer shall pay such out of the Conference entertainment or expense fund.

(b) The Program Committee shall meet at least five months before the time of the meeting of the Annual Conference to coordinate the activities of the Program Committee and the Local Entertainment Committee.

(c) The Commission on World Service and Finance shall be placed in the Conference Program at a time not later than the morning of the second full day of the Conference.

10. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of four ministers and three laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference after the General Conference. It shall be the duty of this committee to advise with the local entertainment committee; and as the Conference shall direct, to determine the place and method of entertaining the Annual Conference sessions at least two years in advance, the Conference Secretary shall be an ex-officio member of this committee.

11. (a) Committee on Memoirs: The Cabinet shall be responsible for the selection of persons to write the memoirs of preachers, wives and widows of preachers, who died during the year. The Conference Secretary shall see that pertinent biographical data are included in each memoir.

(b) The Memorial Service: There shall be a Memorial Service held annually at a time the Program Committee shall determine.

(c) There shall be a printed Memorial Service Program, including the memoirs and the names of those who have died during the year. Memoirs shall be printed in the Conference Journal, not to exceed 600 words for preachers and 250 words for wives or widows.

(d) The Program Committee shall select a speaker for the Memorial Address.

12. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three shall be elected annually to cooperate with the Secretary and examine the daily minutes and report to the Conference.

13. Resolutions and Appeals: The Conference shall elect annually a five-member Committee on Resolutions and Appeals to serve from the closing of the Annual Conference throughout the year and until the close of the following Annual Conference Session. Any Resolution not from a constituted Board, Commission or Committee of the Conference shall be referred to this Committee for proper reference or report. (See Rule 17a). Any resolution not referred to a Board or Committee shall be reported back to the Conference, and may carry a recommendation of concurrence or non concurrence.

14. Conference Journal:

(a) There shall be a quadrennial Committee on Publication of the Conference Journal, composed of five ministers and four laymen. The Secretary of the Conference, who shall be the Editor of the Conference Journal, and the Statistician, shall be ex-officio members without vote.

(b) The Committee shall consult with the Editor, let the contract for printing the Journal, contract for printing shall be made at least a year in advance, and make recommendations to the Conference regarding the publication of the Journal.

(c) The Journal shall be the official record of the Annual Conference. Reports shall be printed exactly as submitted by the agencies, boards and committees. Any amendments to reports shall be printed immediately following each report. This rule shall apply only to those resolutions on which the Committee on Resolutions recommends concurrence or resolutions which are adopted by the Conference.

(d) It shall be printed according to the recommendations in the Discipline and contain the Standing Rules and the Statistics.

(e) The Statistics shall be edited by the Statistician.

15. Rules:

(a) At the first session of the Conference, following the General Conference, there shall be elected a Quadrennial Committee on Rules, composed of three ministers and two laymen. The report of this committee shall be made immediately after the organization of the Conference annually, and as often during the session as necessary.

(b) Amendments to Rules: Proposed amendments may be submitted in writing by any member of the Conference. They shall be referred to the Rules Committee for consideration and report.

(c) The Conference by a majority vote can amend or alter the Standing Rules with or without the concurrence of the Committee on Standing Rules, provided, that any change or alteration not originating in the Committee on Standing Rules may be voted on only after the lapse of one day from the time of its submission to the Conference.

16. (a) Members of Quadrennial Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees shall not serve more than eight consecutive years on the same Conference Board, Commission or Committee. This rule applies only to those persons nominated and elected by the Conference.

(b) Any member of a Quadrennial Board, Commission, or Committee who is absent from two consecutive meetings of the same without rendering an acceptable excuse to the Chairman in writing shall forfeit membership on such Board, Commission, or Committee. The Chairman will notify the Committee on Nominations when such forfeiture

has occurred. The Committee on Nominations shall fill the vacancy subject to approval by the next session of the Annual Conference.

- (c) No trustee, or member of the faculty or staff of any institution, or manager of any interest shall at the same time be a member of the parent or supervising board or commission, unless otherwise required by the Discipline.
- (d) No one shall serve on more than one of the following disciplinary, administrative boards of the Annual Conference at the same time: Columbia College; Wofford College; Spartanburg Junior College; Epworth Children's Home; The Methodist Home, Orangeburg; South Carolina Methodist Advocate; Annual Conference Board of Trustees; and Greenwood Methodist Home.
- (e) No one shall be elected to serve on more than one of the following boards of the Annual Conference at the same time: Christian Social Concerns; Education; Evangelism; Missions and Church Extension; Pensions; Board of Health and Welfare Ministries; Board of the Ministry.
- (f) All laymen employed by the agencies of the Conference shall conform to the compulsory retirement age set for the ministers of the church. Such retired laymen may be employed on a part-time basis without executive or administrative responsibility.

III. Reports

- 17. (a) Reports from Boards, Commissions and Committees, shall be presented in triplicate, filed with the Conference Secretary and placed on the Conference calendar before it is presented to the Conference for consideration. (See Rule 13).
- (b) The trustees of the Conference institutions (Columbia, Wofford College and Spartanburg Junior College, The Epworth Children's Home, The Methodist Home, Orangeburg, and Greenwood Methodist Home) shall furnish to their parent boards complete audits made by certified public accountants approved by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. All other boards and agencies receiving sums of money from the Conference shall furnish to the Conference and the Commission on World Service and Finance a complete audit made by certified public accountants approved by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

A summary of the Annual Budget of each institution of this conference (Columbia College, Wofford College, Spartanburg Junior College, Epworth Children's Home, The Methodist Home, Orangeburg, and The Greenwood Methodist Home) shall be published annually in The South Carolina Methodist Advocate and The South Carolina Conference Journal.

The salary and expense account of the head of each of the institutions named above shall be published as a separate item along with the annual Budget summary.

- (c) All Boards, Commissions, and Committees, except the Board of the Ministry shall submit their reports to the conference secretary or someone designated by him) so that they may be printed and ready for distribution at least two weeks prior to Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary shall advise the boards and agencies in advance the dates reports are due to maintain this schedule. If the Commission on World Service and Finance should be unable to complete its report in time for this printing, it shall have its report printed or mimeographed separately for distribution on the first day of Conference.
- (d) The Program Director shall have a digest made of any items adopted by the Conference (not in the printed reports) which call for activities by Districts or charges, these to be distributed to the District Superintendents and pastors following the adjournment of Conference

- (e) All monies to be credited to the accounts of local churches for the fiscal year shall be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer not later than five days after the end of the fiscal year.
- (f) The library of Wofford College shall be designated as the depository for all Annual Conference minutes and records. Permanently bound copies of the minutes of the proceedings of each Annual Conference shall be placed in the depository. Each Board, Institution, Corporation, and Agency of the South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church shall place in the Depository a bound copy of the minutes of the Board or Agency, or a summary thereof, and its annual audit. These bound reports shall be furnished at no expense to the Wofford library within 90 days after the close of the Annual Conference. Exceptions may be made of any unfinished or pending matters which appear in the minutes of any institution, Board, or any agency which in their judgment would hinder their work if it were included. When such matter is closed, it shall be included in the next annual report filed. The Annual Conference Commission on Archives and History shall inspect annually the documents presented, and request of any group or agency failing to file its record or any part of them that they comply. A written report shall be made to the following Annual Conference covering this item.
- (g) Any salary paid as a supplement to any ministerial member of the Conference by any Board, Commission, Committee or from any Church Fund shall be included as a separate item of that Board, Commission or Committee's annual report. This information shall be furnished annually to the Conference Secretary by the Conference Program Director and shall be published in the Journal of the Annual Conference listing the minister's name and the amount of the supplement and shall immediately follow the listing of the salaries of ministers serving special appointments.

IV. Annual Conference Commission On Archives and History

- 18. (a) The Annual Conference Commission on Archives and History shall consist of the Conference Secretary, the President, and the Secretary of the Historical Society, the Archivist of Wofford College, and two laymen at large to be nominated by the nominating committee.
- (b) The Historical Society shall be an organization within the South Carolina Annual Conference in accord with Paragraph 1411.2, 1968 Discipline. The membership of the Conference shall constitute the membership of the Historical Society, and the officers shall be elected by the Society.
- (c) An address on some subject of historical interest to Methodism shall be delivered each year, the speaker and subject to be chosen as the officers may direct. The address shall be published in the Journal and Yearbook of the Conference and paid for by the Historical Society.
- (d) The Conference Program Committee shall provide for a time of meeting during the Conference session, and the Minutes of the meeting shall be a part of the official Conference record.

V. Conference Committees and Commissions

- 19. (a) There shall be elected annually committees on:
 1. District Conference Journals
 2. Courtesies and Introductions
 3. Investigations
- (b) There shall be elected quadrennially a Commission on Group, Life and Hospital Insurance, composed of nine members.

VI. Ministerial Character and Records

- 20. (a) The Board of the Ministry shall prepare each year jointly for the Conference Secretary, a statement concerning the age, domestic status, education, and ministerial experience of each preacher admitted on

probation or as an associate minister this statement to be included in the Conference minutes.

- (b) The Conference Secretary shall prepare a biographical sketch of each preacher received into full connection with the Conference, including each preacher received from other denominations or by transfer. The sketch to be printed in the Journal and Yearbook, along with an individual picture which shall be furnished by each minister received.

VII. Nominations and Board Organization

21. (a) The Annual Conference Committee on Nominations shall be composed of the Presiding Bishop as Chairman or one appointed by the Bishop to preside over the sessions, the Secretary of the Cabinet and the eleven ministers and eleven laymen (one each from each district). The layman shall be elected by the lay members to Annual Conference within the District and the minister elected by the ministers of the district with the District Superintendent presiding. The election shall be by secret ballot after nominations are made from the floor. The results of the election shall be reported to the Secretary of the Conference and the Secretary of the Cabinet no later than one month prior to the convening of the Annual Conference.
- (b) This shall be a quadrennial Board. Any minister or layman moving out of the district shall be replaced the year of his or her move.
- (c) Election to the Committee on Nominations shall be in keeping with conference policy on tenure. No member of the Committee shall serve for more than eight consecutive years. When a minister or layman is elected to membership on the Conference Standing Committee on Nominations, he may not, during his period of service on this committee, be nominated by that committee for membership on any Board, Commission, or Committee under the jurisdiction of the Standing Committee on Nominations.
- (d) The Committee on Nominations shall nominate persons for membership on Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees, and Trustees of the South Carolina Methodist Advocate and The Methodist Center. In the making of nominations the persons nominated shall be consulted by the Committee on Nominations and consent to serve before the nomination is made. This consultation shall include notification of the time of the organizational meeting of the Board or Committee. (See par. 23(h).)
- (e) The Committee on Nominations shall publish and distribute its report to all clerical and lay members of the Annual Conference no later than registration time of Annual Conference.
- (f) It shall be an Order of the Day at the morning session of the first full day of Annual Conference that the floor shall be opened for additional nominations to Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees and Trustees of the South Carolina Methodist Advocate and The Methodist Center. (See Par. 21 (d) for consultation and consent. The maker of a nomination from the floor shall certify that he has consulted with his nominee who agrees to serve if elected.
- (g) It shall be an Order of the Day at the morning session of the second full day of Annual Conference to have the election of members of Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees, and Trustees of the South Carolina Methodist Advocate and The Methodist Center. If additional nominations have been made as per par. 21(f) ballots shall be prepared by the Nominating Committee for use in the election.
- (h) Each Quadrennial Board, Commission, Standing Committee, and Trustees of the South Carolina Methodist Advocate and The Methodist Center shall be convened for organization (at which a majority of members must be present) as an Order of the Day for the third day of the Annual Conference by a District Superintendent or another elder appointed by the Bishop. If possible, these organizations

meetings shall be held one hour prior to the usual adjournment time of the afternoon session. The election of officers shall be by ballot without oral nominations and shall be by a majority of ballots cast.

- (i) When a minister is appointed as District Superintendent, his membership on any Disciplinary or Conference Board, Commission, or Committee nominated by the Standing Committee on Nominations automatically ceases provided that this shall not apply to ex-officio membership on Disciplinary Board, nor to membership on Boards of Trustees, Boards of Managers, or service on Commissions and Committees when nominations are made by groups other than the Conference Committee on Nominations.
- (j) Laymen and ministers shall retire from (and not be eligible for further membership) on Conference Boards, Commissions, at the Annual Conference following their 72nd birthday. This rule shall not apply to the Conference Board of Laity until the Conference year beginning in 1970.
- (k) Parent Boards may not nominate their own members to any Board of Management or Trust until said member has been off the Parent Board for at least one year.
- (l) Quadrennial Boards, Commissions and Committees shall receive reports and recommendations from the outgoing boards and immediately upon organization shall assume their functions, except as otherwise required by the Discipline or by Conference action.
- (m) The Board of Trustees of the South Carolina Methodist Advocate and the Methodist Center shall be composed of nine members, provided that no trustee shall serve more than eight consecutive years. After such period of service, a trustee shall be ineligible for re-election until the lapse of two years. Nominations of these trustees shall be made every two years (even numbered years) and for two year terms.

VIII. Boards, Commissions and Committees

22. The Conference Board of Pensions:
- (a) It shall be composed of nine laymen and nine ministers, subject to the provisions of Paragraph 1380.2.
23. Board of Education:
- (a) The Board of Education shall be composed of one layman from each District, an equal number of ministers, such additional members as provided for in the Discipline, and any member of the General Board of Education living within the bounds of the Conference.
- (b) Every two years (even numbered years) the board shall nominate suitable persons to be elected by the Conference as trustees of Wofford College and Columbia College for two-year terms. The tenure of the trustees shall be limited to 12 (twelve) consecutive years. After such a period of service a trustee shall be ineligible for re-election until the lapse of two years. Vacancies may be filled in any year, but one-year terms shall not be permissible in even numbered year elections. These institutions shall make their report through this board.
- (c) The Board of Education and the Board of the Ministry shall cooperate in nominating the board of Managers for the Pastors' School.
- (d) There shall be a Committee on Christian Higher Education within the Board of Education consisting of eight (8) of its members selected by the Board in consultation with the bishop and his cabinet. (Par. 1114, 1968 Discipline).
24. Board of Evangelism: There shall be a Board of Evangelism as required in Paragraphs 1146-1155 of the Discipline.
25. The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries (Paragraph 1173) shall receive the annual reports from the Epworth Children's Home, The Methodist Home, Orangeburg, and The Greenwood Methodist Home, and transmit them to the Annual Conference. Every two years (even-

- numbered) it shall nominate to the Annual Conference suitable persons to be trustees of these institutions. There shall be 21 persons on the Epworth Children's Home Board, eleven lay and ten clerical, at least three (3) of whom shall be women, effective at the 1971 session of the Annual Conference. There shall be twenty-one persons on the Methodist Home, Orangeburg Board, eleven lay and ten clerical. There shall be twenty-one persons on the Greenwood Methodist Home Board, eleven lay and ten clerical. No trustee shall serve more than eight consecutive years. After such a period of service a trustee shall be ineligible for re-election until the lapse of two years.
26. Board of the Ministry: This Board shall be composed of twenty-two ministers (Paragraph 665.4(a).)
27. Board of Missions: The Board of Missions shall be composed of one layman from each district, an equal number of ministers, and such additional members as are required by the Discipline (Paragraph 135, 1968 Discipline), but may not include optional memberships indicated in said paragraph.
- (a) Spartanburg Junior College Board of Trustees: The Board of Trustees of Spartanburg Junior College shall consist of twenty-one (21) elected members, two (2) ex-officio members who shall be The Associate General Secretary and the Treasurer of National Missions of the Board of Missions of The Methodist Church, and two (2) Student Advisory Trustees.
- (b) The elected trustees shall be divided into three classes of seven (7) each. One class shall be elected each year to serve for three years.
- (c) Four (4) trustees of each class and two Student Advisory Trustees shall be elected by the South Carolina Annual Conference upon nomination of its Board of Missions, and three (3) trustees shall be elected by the National Division of the Board of Missions of The Methodist Church on nomination by the South Carolina Annual Conference upon recommendation of its Board of Missions.
- (d) The tenure of the trustees shall be limited to 12 consecutive years. The tenure of Student Advisory Trustee shall be one year.
- (e) The District Superintendent of the Marion District shall be an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees of the Belin property.
28. Board of Christian Social Concerns.
- (a) The Board shall be composed of fifteen (15) ministers and fifteen (15) laymen (including at least one layman from each District and conforming to Paragraph 1004, 1968 Discipline) and the District Directors.
29. Commissions on Minimum Salary: This Commission shall be composed of five ministers and six laymen whose duty shall be to administer the plan of minimum support as adopted by the Conference (Paragraph 924.1). The Board of Missions and the Board of Lay Activities shall each designate one of its members to work with this Commission.
30. Commission on World Service and Finance: There shall be five ministers and six lay members of this Commission (Paragraph 898, 1968 Discipline) (See Rule 40)
31. The Program Council:
- (a) Members of the Program Council shall be the Presiding Bishop, the District Superintendents, the Conference Secretary, two representatives of Conference Youth, one layman from each district, and Chairman of Age Departments. Also two representatives from each of the following Boards: Education, Evangelism, Missions, Laity (one of whom shall be the Conference Lay Leader), Worship, Ecumenical Affairs, Christian Social Concerns, Women's Society of Christian Service (one to be the Conference President), Health and Welfare Ministries, and Board of the Ministry (one to be the chairman). Also one representative of Pastoral Care and Family Life, and one representative from Committee on Enlistment for Church occupations.

- (b) The following shall be members without vote: The Conference Staff (both Salaried and Volunteer), the Conference Treasurer, one representative from World Service, the Editor of the South Carolina Methodist Advocate, and the Executive for Ministerial Affairs.
- (c) There shall be an Executive Committee composed of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Presiding Bishop, two District Superintendents, Conference Program Director, and additional members necessary to achieve a balance of ministers and laity.
32. There shall be a Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations (Paragraph 666).
33. There shall be a Commission on Worship as provided in The Discipline (Paragraph 1387). The Commission shall be composed of one ministerial and one lay member elected from each district at the beginning of each quadrennium on nomination of the committee on nominations of the conference. District Directors of Worship appointed in the several districts of the conference shall be ex-officio members of the commission.

IX. Laymen and Lay Members of Conference

34. Lay members of Boards and Committees and Boards of Trust (who are not members of the Conference) shall have the privilege of the floor without vote.
35. Each district superintendent shall transmit the completed list of the lay delegates from his district in triplicate to the Secretary of the Annual Conference at least five months before the opening date of the Annual Conference.
36. Where a District Conference is held each pastoral charge in the District shall be entitled to one lay delegate elected annually by the Charge Conference in addition to the membership of the District Conference provided for in the Discipline.

X. Districts

37. There shall be eleven Districts in the South Carolina Annual Conference.
38. A District Conference may be held in each District annually at the discretion of the District Superintendent.

XI. Support of the Ministry

39. The apportionment for district superintendents' fund, minimum salary fund, and conference claimants fund shall be distributed to the several districts on the basis of annual fixed percentage of the total funds raised in the several charges during the preceding year, exclusive of funds raised for new buildings and grounds (church and parsonages), for re-modeling churches and parsonages, for payment of debts (principal and interest) on church and parsonage building and grounds, special funds (including building and endowment, not support funds) for our Conference agencies and institutions, and money raised for special missions over and above any apportionment for benevolences.
40. The salaries and other allowances of the several District Superintendents shall be uniform. After consulting with the Bishop and his Cabinet the Commission on World Service and Finance shall estimate the total amount necessary to furnish a sufficient and equitable support for the District Superintendents as provided in Paragraph 908. The Conference Treasurer shall, as far as practicable, remit monthly to the several District Superintendents the amounts due them.

XII. World Services and Other Funds

41. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds collected from the general sources and on the budget or Annual Conference benevolences, administration, conference claimants and other funds in accord with Paragraph 914 after Discipline. He shall be also the custodian of the fund: (1) of the Annual Conference, Trustees, the Trustees shall administer the funds; (2) of the Group Life Insurance, and the Major Medical Hospital Insurance, the Commission on Insurance shall administer the funds; and (3) of the Board

of Pensions which shall administer these funds. These funds as allocated to the various boards, commissions, and committees by the Commission on World Service and Finance shall be credited by the Conference Treasurer in separate accounts to the boards, commissions, and committees. Disbursement of these funds shall be made by the Conference Treasurer upon order by voucher drawn by the secretary of the board, commission, or committee and countersigned by the chairman or president of the board, commission, or committee. All boards, commissions or committees drawing money in block amounts for use by said board, commission, or committee for promotional work or other use shall make itemized statements of these expenditures to the Conference Treasurer as supporting evidence for his records. (Rule 18).

42. There shall be an Administrator of Ministerial Affairs for the Conference who shall work under the supervision of the participating Boards and Agencies through a Special Executive Committee composed of the Chairman and one other representative of each participating Board or Agency.

43. Boards, Commissions and Committees of the Conference receiving appropriations shall make an annual report to the Conference, giving an itemized statement of all credits, disbursements, and funds credited still on hand.

44. Detailed instructions concerning finances shall be carried as a Standing Resolution prepared by the Committee on Standing Rules.

XIII. Elections

45. At any session of the Annual Conference where there are to be elections of Officers or Delegates by ballot, there shall be elected a Board of Managers composed of one minister and one layman from each District, which shall conduct elections as the Annual Conference shall direct.

Section XIV. South Carolina Conference Credit Union

46. The Conference Secretary is requested to list in the Conference Journal the names of the officers of the South Carolina Conference Credit Union, and to publish in the Journal a brief resume of its report.

Section XV. Moving Day for Ministers

47. Moving day for ministers shall be the second Wednesday following the close of Annual Conference.

Section XVI. Lay Pastors

48. The same health qualifications shall be required of all who desire to become or continue to be listed as Lay Pastors as is required of those seeking to be admitted as associate or probationary members into the South Carolina Annual Conference (Paragraph 323.6, 1968 Discipline).

STANDING RESOLUTIONS OF THE S. C. CONFERENCE

A. Contingent Fund

A Contingent Fund of \$500.00 shall be maintained out of the funds collected for the secretarial and Journal expense; in order to finance (1) commissions (2) judicial proceedings, and (3) other proper needs unprovided for. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of this fund and shall make disbursements on order of the Conference or of the cabinet in the interim.

B. Board of Health and Welfare Ministries

The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries shall have authority to use Golden Cross or other available funds for:

(a) The hospital aid of retired ministers, their wives, widows, and dependent children; widows and dependent children of ministers who have died in service up to \$300.00 within an Annual Conference year, or more in extreme cases upon recommendation of the District Superintendent and the pastor.

(b) And also assist in the medical aid of the deserving poor, aged and children.

(c) Such expenditures upon homes as may be necessary for the comfort of the retired ministers, widows and their dependents.

(d) The providing of nursing scholarships for worthy students.

(e) The Board of Health and Welfare Ministers shall report all expenditures under these provisions to the Annual Conference.

(f) All funds for the Methodist Home, Orangeburg, shall be sent direct to the Treasurer of the Methodist Home, Box 15, Orangeburg, S. C.

(g) All funds for the Epworth Children's Home shall be sent to the Superintendent, 2900 Millwood Avenue, Columbia.

(h) The Greenwood Methodist Home.

C. Conference Insurance

1. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall include in the askings for conference work a sufficient sum annually to be applied on the Conference Group Life Insurance premiums to cover the total premiums for the group life insurance of all retired members of the Conference.

2. The Commission on World Services and Finance shall include in the askings also annually a sum sufficient to pay approximately one-half of the premiums for the Conference Major Medical Hospital Insurance and for its administration. These funds shall be administered by the Commission on Insurance. The Commission shall furnish an annual report to the Conference on all disbursements of these funds.

D. Two Percent of Salaries

(a) Every active member of the Conference including those on trial and approved supplies, except those covered by the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund Plan and those who are on special appointments without Annuity Credit from the South Carolina Conference shall pay to the Conference Claimants Fund two percent (2%) of his total current annual support received from all sources, which includes the amounts reported to the Conference as salary, travel, and expense fund and parsonage utilities, regardless of the sources from which these funds come. All amounts paid to or on behalf of the minister's parsonage utilities shall be reported as parsonage utilities in Table No. 2 of the statistical report of the Annual Conference. All amounts paid to or on behalf of the minister to provide funds for payment of all or part of his Social Security obligation shall be reported as salary in Table No. 2 of the statistical report of the Annual Conference.

(b) Beginning with the close of the 1966-67 fiscal year all past due amounts will bear 6% interest, chargeable on the first day of the new Conference year See Discipline, 1968, Par. 1381.c). However, interest on arrears will be waived at the end of any year in which the minister pays his current two percent and a minimum of 10% of his arrears as of May 31, 1968 or who pays his current two percent and a minimum of 10% of his present total arrears, whichever is the larger.

(c) The ministers shall be required to remit at least quarterly to the Conference Treasurer. If a minister on trial is discontinued, any amount paid by him on the two percent fund may be refunded to him at his request.

(d) The Board of Pensions shall render statements at least annually to all ministers.

E. Conference Funds

(a) Offering for Church School Rally Day, Methodist Student Day, Race Relations Day, Golden Cross; Fellowship of Suffering and Service, Overseas Relief, Methodist Youth Fund, Fourth Sunday World Service Offering, Veteran's Day, Town and Country Work, District Superintendent's Salary, the two percent of the pastors' salaries, Temperance, and other funds not specifically directed shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

(b) The Commission on World Service and Finance shall include in the askings for conference work an amount sufficient to cover the travel and other expenses of those persons elected from the Conference to serve on the General

Board and the General Assembly of the National Council of Churches, of Christ in the United States of America, if funds are not otherwise provided.

F. Local Church Financial Reporting

(a) The pastor's report to Annual Conference shall include all expenditures of a local church for the period June 1 through May 31, regardless of the local Church's own fiscal year. All conference appointments and askings are to cover the same period, June 1 through May 31.

(b) The pastor's report to the Annual Conference shall be sent to the Conference Statistician so as to reach that office not later than fifteen days after the close of the Conference year.

(c) Beginning in the calendar year 1973 and each year thereafter, pastors' reports to the Annual Conference shall cover the calendar year (January 1-December 31st) and shall be sent to the Conference Statistician so as to reach that office not later than January 15th of the year following. A seven month reporting period shall be observed from June 1, 1972-December 31, 1972 with reports due not later than January 15, 1973.

G. Commission on Minimum Salary 1970-1971

Whereas, the DISCIPLINE of 1968, paragraph 920, provides for fixing a minimum salary by the Annual Conference, therefore be it resolved: That the South Carolina Annual Conference fix its minimum salary according to the following scale to become effective on the adjournment of this conference session and continue until changed by the Annual Conference.

1. Minimum Salary of Conference members on trial who are not seminary graduates shall be \$4,600. The Minimum Salary of Conference members on trial who are seminary graduates shall be \$6,400. The Minimum Salary for traveling elders in full connection shall be \$6,700.

2. The Minimum Salary of a Retired Supply Pastor serving full time shall not exceed \$2,200, the exact amount to be determined by the request of the District Superintendent with the approval of the Commission on Minimum Salary. Amounts for those not living on the charge and not serving full time shall not exceed \$1,200, the exact amount to be determined by the request of the District Superintendent with the approval of the Commission on Minimum Salary.

(a) The Minimum Salary of associate members shall be \$5,600.00.

(b) The Minimum Salary of full time lay pastors shall be \$4,900.

3. The Minimum Salary of Student Pastors shall not exceed the following amounts, whether they be supplies, lay pastors, probationary members or elders in full connection:

(a) Seminary students \$4,000.

(b) Junior and Senior academic undergraduates living on the charge \$2,200; living off the charge, \$2,000.

4. The District Superintendent shall recommend the adjusted amounts which must be approved by the Commission on Minimum Salary before payment can be made. Any person shall be considered a student pastor if he is enrolled in an accredited college or seminary for a degree.

5. Supplements for years of service for ministers who are under 65 years of age or who have had less than 40 years of service shall be as follows: Traveling Elders with ten years' service, \$200, and for each additional five years, \$150 up to 25 years' service. Full time approved supplies (except retired supplies) with ten years' service, \$100, and each additional five years, \$100 up to twenty-five years' service.

6. Any minister shall be entitled to \$200 additional, if married; \$200 additional for each dependent unmarried child under twenty years of age; or if said child is in college \$600 for this child while in college, as undergraduate; and \$100 for each church beyond two on the charge.

7. (a) Conference members in full connection and probationary members whose total income from church sources is \$7,700 or less; the travel

supplement will be 30% of the difference between a man's total salary and \$7,700.

(b) Lay Pastors whose total income from church sources is \$5,900 or less; the travel supplement will be 30% of the difference between the man's total salary and \$5,900.

8. It is recommended that if a charge is to receive minimum salary help, it should have a minimum of 150 members for a student pastor or 300 members for full time pastor, except in the case of a church extension situation approved by the Board of Missions and Church Extension as such or an urban work situation approved by the Urban Work Committee of the Board of Missions. Also, neither side of a split charge should be on minimum salary unless one side is clearly designated church extension situation, approved by the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

A. It is the policy of Minimum Salary to support a church for three years. Exceptional cases for an extended period will be considered upon recommendation of the District Superintendent to the Commission on Minimum Salary. (This will not apply to church extension situations.)

9. Be it resolved that the Annual Conference through its Minimum Salary funds shall not pay in excess of 35% of the above amounts. The local churches shall be encouraged to pay the other 65%, but this resolution will not hinder the Board of Missions and Church Extension or other agencies of the church from making appropriations from its discretionary funds. Exception to this resolution will be allowed under the following conditions:

A. The church must meet all the requirements of Minimum Salary Commission.

B. The official board of the said church must declare in writing to the District Superintendent that the above requirement having been met, it cannot pay the 65%.

C. The District Superintendent and the Cabinet must recommend this exception unanimously.

10. Be it further resolved that \$2,000 be set aside as a discretionary fund to be administered by the Commission on Minimum Salary on application of the District Superintendent.

11. Minimum Salary funds shall be dispersed at the end of each month, and shall be given only to the minister involved.

MINIMUM SALARY NEWLY SET-UP WORK OR URBAN WORK 1970-71

Schedule A

- Notes: 1. Schedule A applies to ministers serving first pastorates.
2. These schedules apply to ministers serving on trial or in full connection only. In case of the appointment of an approved supply, the salary will be the responsibility of the Minimum Salary Commission.
3. First full year of the church's organization.
- 1st Year: The salary shall be the top amount allowed under existing Minimum Salary Commission regulations applied to one in this category. The local church from its funds may increase this amount by not more than \$300 without reducing the minimum salary appropriation.
- 2nd Year: The salary of the second year will depend upon that paid the first year and may be increased by not more than \$300, but the local church must assume one-fourth of the total salary paid.
- 3rd Year: The salary of the third year will depend upon that paid the second year and may be increased by not more than \$300, but the local church must assume one-half of the total salary paid.

4th Year: The salary of the fourth year will depend upon that paid the third year and may be increased by not more than \$300, but the local church must assume three-fourths of the total salary paid.

Schedule B

Notes: Schedule B applies to ministers who are on trial or in full connection and who have had a minimum of four full years of service prior this appointment. Time served in this present appointment under Schedule A does not count as a part of the four years' experience required under Schedule B.

1st Year: Note: First full year of church's organization. The Minimum Salary shall be \$6,700.
Special Note: The District Superintendent may apply to the Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions for a salary that is more in keeping with the amount received by this minister in his previous appointment.

2nd Year: The salary depends on amount received first year. At the beginning of the second year, the newly established church must assume one-fourth of the minister's salary.

3rd Year: The salary for the third year depends on amount received second year. At the beginning of the third year, the newly established church must assume one-half of the minister's salary.

4th Year: The salary for the fourth year depends upon the amount received the third year. At the beginning of the fourth year, the newly established church must assume three-fourths of the minister's salary.

NOTES:

1. Except where the administrators of this salary schedule feel an extreme case of hardship exists, no salary funds will be granted to a church after the fourth full year.
2. A "new church" may be interpreted to mean an "engulfed" situation or a relocation project, if it is determined to be a church extension responsibility by the Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions.
3. The local church share of this salary schedule is interpreted to mean salary plus any travel and utility allowances.
4. These figures are maximums, and any amount of funds from any source in any guise added to these figures will be subtracted from the conference support given.
5. In all cases where a newly set-up work is attached to an existing charge, these become charge figures.

ALTERNATE PROPOSAL (PLAN C)

The Minimum Salary Commission recommends a \$500 increase across the board for ministerial support which is an 8% increase. We further recommend that a minister if married be entitled to \$500, an increase from \$200; for each dependent unmarried child he is entitled to \$300, an increase from \$200; and for each child in college he is entitled to \$1,000, an increase from \$600.

Supplements for years of service for ministers who are under 65 years of age or who have had less than 40 years of service shall be as follows: Traveling Elders with ten years' service, \$200; each additional five years of service, \$100 up to twenty-five years' service. Full time approved supplies (except retirement supplies) with ten years' service, \$100; and each additional five years, \$100 up to twenty-five years' service.

After looking at this plan in January 1970 and at the economy of South Carolina Methodism, at the present time we feel we should hold to the regular minimum salary increase of \$500 per year as we have been doing for the past four years. Therefore, we hope that as a commission that charges will voluntarily go into **Plan C**, and perhaps this can be done before the Bishop's Staff Commission on Charge Lines' report has been completed.

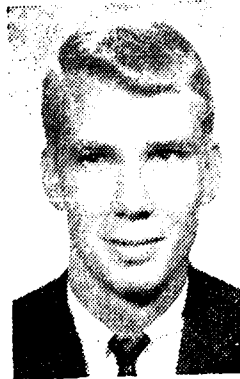
