THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE (1785)
SPECIAL CALLED SESSION

Columbia Township Auditorium

September 23, 1971

Opening—Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr. called the Conference to order, after which he read the call to a special session of the South Carolina Conference 1785.

TO: ALL MINISTERIAL AND LAY DELEGATES OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE '85 OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

This is to notify you that with the approval of the Cabinet, I am calling a special session of the South Carolina Annual Conference (85) of the United Methodist Church to meet in the Township Auditorium, Columbia, South Carolina, at 10:00 A.M., on Thursday, January 27, 1972. This Conference is called for the specific purpose of discussing and voting upon a plan to form one annual conference of the United Methodist Church in South Carolina. The plan has the approval of the Committees of Six of both Annual Conferences.

This formal notice is being delivered to each delegate to the annual conference through the ministers of the churches and charges. The ministers are charged with the responsibility of notifying their delegates.

I pray that God's spirit will lead us in our discussion and action.

Devotion - A devotional period was conducted by Dr. J. Marvin Rast. The Conference sang the hymn "A Charge To Keep I Have" led by Thom Jones. Dr. Rast led the Conference in the Affirmation of Faith and spoke on the topic, "The Apostolic Church."

Organization - Allan R. Broome, Secretary of the Conference, presented the organization plan of the Conference. The roll was received by distributing registration cards. Dr. Broome stated that the tellers for the day would be those who served as tellers at the 1971 session of the Annual Conference. The roll of tellers was read.

Report of the Conference Committee on Standing Rules - DeArmond Canady, Chairman, presented H. R. Mays, for the report. Mr. Mays called attention to Rule 15.D. of the Standing Rules having to do with the limitation of speakers on the floor of the Conference.

Motion - Mr. Mays made the following motion: "I move that for this session of the Annual Conference, all motions shall be written, and a copy be sent to the presiding officers desk prior to or immediately following the making of the motion so as to be at the desk prior to debate on the motion". Adopted by two-thirds vote.

Motion - Mr. Mays made the following motion: "I move that the method of voting on the perfected plan or plans be by ballot". Adopted.

Report of the Committee of Six - Roy Moore, Chairman, was presented

Motion - Roy Moore moved that the Conference grant privilege of the floor to Douglas Broome and Marshall Shearouse, members of the task force on cost, who are not members of the Conference. This motion was adopted and the privilege of the floor granted to these men.

Presentation of Plan A - LeGrande Moody presented Plan A to the Conference and modified the plan by the addition of the first two paragraphs of Plan B. Plan A would thus begin:

Be it resolved that:

- (A) There shall be in South Carolina one annual Conference, to be known as the South Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, to be formed through the union of the two Conferences now existing.
- (B) Union shall be accomplished and the new Conference organized in accordance with the provisions of **The Book of Discipline** of the United Methodist Church, following the steps hereafter provided.

Mr. Moody called attention to the differences between Plan A and the original plan of Merger (revised).

Plan B - Harry Kent presented alternate plan B.

Task Force on Cost - Marshall Shearouse presented the report of the Task Force on cost.

Presentation of the plan and the report of the Committee on Cost was followed by a period of questions and answers on the plan and cost.

Motion - LeGrande Moody moved the adoption of Plan A. This was seconded.

Substitute Motion - Harry Kent moved the substitution of Plan B for Plan A. This was seconded.

Substitute for the Substitute - Roy Moore moved the substitution of the original (as amended) without amendment, as the substitute for the substitute. This was seconded.

The plans as presented were as follows:

ALTERNATIVE A

A. Conference Structure

1. a. Following the creation of the New South Carolina Annual Conference elected members of the conference boards, commissions, and committees, and lay and ministerial delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences, shall be on a ratio of the approximate percentage of members of the former conferences for the first two quadrennia.¹ However, nothing herein shall preclude laymen joining a church of the conference after the creation of the new conference or clerical members joining the conference after the creation of the new conference from becoming members of any board, commission, or committee so long as the ratio of majority and minority groups is maintained. During this period in the election of district lay leaders and two associates for each district (who become members of the conference board of the Laity), at least one of the three shall be elected from each of the former conferences, where feasible.

b. The General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates as elected in 1971 shall be the delegates for the 1972-1976 quadrennium.

2. Until the new annual conference's standing rules are adopted, the Committee on Nominations shall consist of the two Committees on Nominations of the uniting conferences.

3. Being aware of the inherent privilege of each board, commission, and committee to elect its own chairman, but at the same time, in a sincere effort to be faithful to the spirit of determination to bring into being ONE annual conference of United Methodists in South Carolina it is, therefore, the will of the conference that each board, commission, and committee shall elect its chair-

¹ It is acknowledged that in the *Plan of Merger, Revised*, the stipulation for a twelve-year period of certain leadership guarantees for members of the two former conferences is based on that written into the *Plan of Union* between the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church, where the smaller group was given guarantees of leadership assignments for a twelve year period.

The Committee of Six feels it is reasonable to expect that two quadrennia will actually more than serve the same intended purpose for our two former conferences. Time and geographical factors are different. On the General Church level, General Conference meets once usually, every four years, while we, of course, are discussing a new annual conference, which also will not be as broad and far-flung as the whole United States but nearer to the neighborhood of our one state.

man for the first quadrennium of the new conference from one of the former conferences involved, and that in the second quadrennium the chairman shall be elected from the other conference involved, so that following the first eight years of the new conference, and forever thereafter, chairmen of boards, commissions, and committees may be elected strictly on the basis of qualifications without regard to former conference relationships.

4. a. The South Carolina Women's Society of Christian Service, being a part of the connectional system of the Columbia Area of The United Methodist Church, shall be guided by the plans for the creation of the new conference established by the annual conference, the districts, and the local churches. (**The Book of Discipline**, parts. 1341-1344)

b. The Executive Committees of the Women's Societies of Christian Service of the two former conferences shall set up:

(a) A Committee on Nominations to prepare a slate of officers for the composition of the new society, with proportionate representation.

(b) A Committee on By-Laws and Standing Rules to draw up by-laws and standing rules for the new society; and

(c) A Committee on Finance to establish procedures for combining conference and district treasuries, clearing financial practices and policies of the two former societies and to provide a clear interpretation of the directives regarding the financial policies as they are received from the Women's Division of the United Methodist Church.

5. In the selection of new trustees for the boards, agencies and institutions of the new conference, the principle of inclusiveness shall be observed.

6. In the new annual conference, the Program Council and other boards, and agencies of the conference having employed staff shall employ staff members and clerical personnel on an inclusive basis, with the proportions pertaining at the time of the formation of the new conference being observed as a guideline in future employment.

7. The number of districts for the new conference initially shall be twelve.

8. District boundaries shall be determined according to Par. 390.3 of **The Book of Discipline**. The appointment of District Superintendents is the responsibility of the presiding Bishop.

9. The Program Council shall consist of the presiding Bishop, the district superintendents, two representatives of conference agencies determined by the annual conference, one of whom shall be a member of each of the former conferences, the conference secretary, two representatives of the conference youth organization, one of whom shall be a member of each of the former conferences, two representatives of the Women's Society of Christian Service, one of whom shall be a member of each of the former conferences, two representatives of the Board of the Laity, one the Conference Lay Leader and the other a member of the other former conference, one layman from each district, chairmen of age-level and family departments, and such additional members as to make the membership of the Council to be in accordance with the proportions pertaining at the time of the creation of the conference.

Standing Rules

1. In the organization of the new conference a Committee on Standing Rules shall present rules of procedure for adoption by the new conference.

2. Until new standing rules are adopted, the new conference shall be guided by **The Book of Discipline** and **Roberts Rules of Order**.

3. For two quadrennia following the creation of the new annual conference the standing rules and resolutions of the new conference shall not include any rule or resolution that violates the provisions of this Plan of Implementation.

Financial Adjustments

1. **Apportionments.** Apportionments shall be made by the conference Commission on World Service and Finance directly to the churches (or Charges) after consultation with the district superintendents. These apportionments shall be based on a tri-part formula considering church membership, previous world service giving, and non-capital expenditures by the church or charge.

2. **Minimum Salary.** The Minimum Salary schedule in the new conference shall be uniform for all members and shall be equal to that previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.

3. **Pensions.** The annuity rate shall be the same for the members of both former conferences and shall be equal to that previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.

4. **Funding.** The 1970 General Conference reordered its priorities and instructed every board and agency of the church to trim budgets and programs until two million dollars from present giving could be made available to fund special programs for minorities.

With this precedent to guide us, and recognizing that additional costs will be involved, it is recommended that the World Service and Finance Commission of the newly created conference immediately reorder financial priorities and request all boards, commissions, and committees of the conference to trim budgets so that the financial needs of the new conference can be more nearly met as it comes into being.

It is further recommended that the World Service and Finance Commission of the two conferences involved, prior to the creation of the new conference, remind the 1972 General Conference of the amount of financial support provided by the 1968 General Conference in such situations (that is, 100% for the first quadrennium, 80% for the second quadrennium, and so forth).

If the General Conference of 1972 is unable to provide the funds authorized by the 1968 General Conference for this purpose from present or anticipated revenues, that the General Conference of 1972 then be petitioned to make some special provision for the funding of those additional costs to the new conference which are beyond the present financial capacity of the conference itself.

We pledge our every effort to be financially responsible as we seek to increase giving in the new conference. However, without additional funds being made available from some source—our own resources and those of the General Church—it will not be possible to bring into being a "united" Conference in the United Methodist Church in South Carolina that is faithful and just to everyone who will be involved in the life and work of the new South Carolina Conference.²

5. **Conference Homes.** The services of all conference homes for children, the aged, and conference claimants shall be available to all persons on an equal basis. Opportunities for employment in homes having employed personnel shall be on an inclusive basis.

6. **Institution Support.** The institutions supported by the two former conferences shall be undergirded by support by the new conference on a basis determined by the new annual conference.

7. **Insurance.** The program of life insurance and health insurance for the new conference shall be based upon the insurance plan previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.

I. Continuing Committee

1. A follow-up Committee on Implementation shall be elected quadrennially for two quadrennia, with representation from the two former annual conferences to consider concerns and developments relating to the creation of the new conference which have not been anticipated or provided for in the Plan of Implementation. The Committee on Standing Rules shall determine the number to be elected and the extent of ex-officio representation.

² Realizing the practical importance of costs in the creation of a new conference, the Committee of Six has asked a special Taskforce, composed of two Methodist businessmen and one pastor, to bring to the special session of the Conference, 1785, in September, as clear and concise a statement as can be provided at this time concerning this matter.

ALTERNATIVE B

Be it resolved that:

(A.) There shall be in South Carolina one annual conference, to be known as the South Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, to be formed through the union of the two conferences now existing.

(B.) Union shall be accomplished and the new conference organized in accordance with the provisions of **The Book of Discipline** of the United Methodist Church, following the steps hereafter provided.

I. The uniting conference shall be called by the presiding Bishop during the next month of June after union is approved by the two participating conferences.

II. During the period between agreement and the uniting conference, the Standing Rules Committees of the two former conferences shall merge, organize into one committee, and draft rules for the new conference.

III. For one year following the uniting conference, all boards and agencies will be composed of all the members of these same boards and agencies from the two former conferences. The boards shall be, as recorded in the current **Minutes**, convened at the uniting conference and organized for the one year period following.

IV. A nominating committee shall be elected and organized immediately after the uniting conference, in accordance with the standing rules adopted at the uniting conference, to bring in nominations to the first regular session of the new conference, for the balance of the quadrennium.

V. The General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates elected in 1971 shall be the delegates for the 1972-1976 quadrennium.

VI. For the first year of operation, all employed staff members of the two former conferences shall be retained. A committee on personnel shall be elected at the uniting conference to report to the first regular session on the staff needs of the new conference.

VII. The present districts shall be retained intact for the first year of operation. A committee on district needs shall be elected to make a report to the first regular session.

VIII. Finances

(A.) Apportionments shall be made by the conference Commission on World Service and Finance on an equal basis for all churches or charges in the new conference.

(B.) Minimum Salary schedule, pensions annuity rate, and insurance programs shall be equal to those previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.

(C.) The General Conference of 1972 will be petitioned to make some special provision for the funding of added costs.

(D.) We pledge our every effort to be financially responsible as we seek to increase giving in the new conference. However, without additional funds being made available from some source—our own resources and those of the General Church—it will not be possible to bring into being a "united" Conference in the United Methodist Church in South Carolina that is faithful and just to everyone who will be involved in the life and work of the new South Carolina Conference.

(The original plan as moved by Roy C. Moore is printed in the 1971 **Journal and Yearbook**.)

Bishop Hardin clarified the parliamentary procedure stating that the plans would be perfected beginning with the first. Questions followed.

Plan A - Plan A was declared before the house for perfection.

Motion - W. R. Kinnett moved adoption of procedure as outlined by the Bishop. Adopted.

Motion - Bill Kinnett moved consideration of Plan A, section by section. Adopted.

Motion Amending - I.A. Douglas Bowling moved the substitution of Section 1A by deleting the present section and substituting the following: "Following the creation of the new South Carolina Annual Conference, elected members of the Conference boards, commissions, and committees shall be on a ratio of the approximate percentage of members of the former Conferences for the first two quadrennia. Realizing that lay and ministerial delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences are elected by secret ballot, we call upon the delegates, in their election as a matter of conscience, to follow a ratio of the approximate percentage of members of the former Conferences. However, nothing herein shall preclude laymen joining a church of the Conference after the creation of the new Conference or clerical members joining the Conference after the creation of the new Conference from becoming members of any board, commission, or committee so long as the ratio or majority and minority groups is maintained. During this period, in the election of district lay leaders and two associates for each district (who become members of the Conference Board of the Laity), at least one of the three shall be elected from each of the former Conferences, where feasible."

The Bowling Substitute for I.A. was adopted.

Substitute for Paragraph 3 - James Hood presented a substitute for paragraph 3 as follows: "Being aware of the inherent privilege of each board, commission, and committee to elect its own chairman, but at the same time, in a sincere effort to be faithful to the spirit of determination to bring into being one annual Conference of United Methodists in South Carolina; it is, therefore, the will of the Conference that the Conference Nominating Committee shall nominate for each board, commission and committee a chairman and that these nominations, for the next two quadrennia, be on a ratio of the approximate percentage of members of the former Conferences, and that forever after, chairman of boards, commissions and committees may be elected strictly on the basis of qualifications without regard to former Conference relationships."

F. S. James called attention to the Discipline provisions and a Point of Order was raised by Levy Rogers, questioning whether the Conference could pass anything in conflict with the Discipline.

O'Dell Amendment - Donald O'Dell moved to amend Section 3 Substitute as follows: "I move that after the word 'Chairman' in line 6, we place a period, and delete the rest of the paragraph."

Previous Question - James Hyatt called for the question on Item 3. The question was called. The O'Dell Amendment failed, the Hood Substitute was defeated.

Proposed Amendment for Paragraph 7 - Douglas Bowling presented a Substitute for paragraph 7 as follows: "The number of districts for the new Conference initially shall be fifteen, following a system of maintaining the present eleven 1785 districts and four 1866 districts for a period of one quadrennium. During this quadrennium a committee on district needs shall be appointed by the Bishop, representing all fifteen districts, to study the Conference with reference to number of districts needed and suggestions concerning district boundaries. This committee shall be appointed at the time of the organization of the new Conference and report its findings not later than the Conference of 1975."

When the number of districts has been determined and accepted by the Conference, the presiding Bishop shall appoint, for the next two quadrennium, district superintendents on a ratio of the approximate percentage of members of the former Conferences.

Brown Amendment - B. B. Brown moved that in the first paragraph, line 3, the words one year be substituted for one quadrennium.

Question - W. R. Kinnett moved the question on paragraph 7 and the question was called. The Brown Amendment was defeated. The Bowling Substitute was defeated.

Whitaker Amendment - G. W. Whitaker moved an amendment to Alternate Plan A as follows: "I move to Amend Alternate Plan A by adding the following words to Section B, Paragraph 3, Standing Rules: "—unless approved by a two-thirds's majority of members from each of the former annual Conferences."

The section then will read: "For two quadrennia following the creation of the new annual Conference the standing rules and resolutions of the new Conference shall not include any rule or resolution that violates the provisions of this Plan of Implementation unless approved by a two-third's majority of delegates from each of the former annual Conferences."

Previous Question on Whitaker Amendment - W. J. Smoak moved the previous question on the Whitaker Amendment and the question was called. The Whitaker Amendment was adopted.

Motion - J. M. Barrington moved that the Conference recess for a lunch hour from 12:30 to 2:00 P.M. This was adopted.

Hood Amendment to Paragraph 3.c. - James Hood moved the addition of a paragraph to section 3.c. as follows: "Pensions. The annuity rate shall be the same for the members of both former Conferences and shall be equal to, and not below, that previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785, for a period of two quadrennia."

Previous Question on Hood Amendment - Joe Alley moved the previous question on the Hood Amendment. The question was called and the Hood Amendment was defeated.

Adjournment - The session was adjourned for lunch.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Opening - Bishop Hardin called the Conference to order at 2:00 P.M. The Conference sang "Amazing Grace" and prayer was led by Bishop Hardin.

Perfection of Alternate Plan A - The Conference continued on Plan A and Plan A was declared to be perfected.

Perfecting of Alternate Plan B - Alternate Plan B was presented by Harry Kent and was declared to be perfected without amendment.

Moore Motion for Reconsideration - Roy Moore moved to withdraw his motion to consider the original plan (revised) at this time. The move to reconsider was adopted.

Motion - A motion was made to adopt Plan B as a substitute for Plan A.

Motion - George Whitaker made the following motion: "I move that when the vote between Plan A and Plan B is taken that the Plan voted up be received as the recommended Plan of the Committee of Six."

Motion on Previous Question - Carlisle Holler moved the previous question on Alternate B. The question was called.

Point of Order - Dan Montgomery called attention to the Conference that they had previously voted to receive this vote by ballot.

Motion to Reconsider - It was moved that this ballot only be received by a show of hands rather than by secret ballot. The motion was adopted and the Conference voted to take this vote by a show of hands.

Question - The substitute failed and Alternate Plan B was rejected as the recommendation of the Committee.

Alternate A - This became the report of the Committee as stipulated by the Whitaker Motion. Frank Lineberger requested that Alternate A be read with changes.

Motion - LeGrande Moody called attention to the fact that Plan A had not been formally adopted and moved that it be adopted.

Substitute Motion -

Question as to Nature of This Session - There was discussion as to the nature of this session and Bishop Hardin ruled that this was a called session of the Annual Conference and not an adjourned session.

Chad Davis asked for clarification of the differences between the original plan (revised plan) and the original plan. Eben Taylor responded for the Committee.

The question was raised as to whether or not the Conference could consider the original plan (revised) and make changes in that plan. Bryan Crenshaw made a Point of Order saying that this could be done by making the amended original plan as a substitute for the substitute. The Bishop ruled that this was true.

Previous Question - A motion for the previous question was made by Carlisle Holler on the substitution of the original plan of merger (revised) for Alternate A.

The ballot was taken. Thom Jones sang, "He's Got The Whole World In His Hands" and the Conference was recessed until 4:35 P.M.

Report on Balloting - Bishop Hardin called the Conference back to order following the recess, at 4:40 to receive the results of the balloting on the motion to substitute the original plan (revised) for Alternative A. The motion failed by a vote of, No-448, Yes - 426 with 4 abstentions.

Motion - Frank Lineberger moved that the Conference reconsider the method of voting and vote by a show of hands rather than by secret ballot. A Point of Order was made by M. D. Moore. Bishop Hardin ruled that the Conference could vote on the Lineberger motion. The Motion to reconsider the method of voting failed.

Ballot - The ballot was then received on the motion that Alternative Plan A be the plan of merger accepted by the South Carolina Annual Conference '85.

Motion - Harry Kent made the following motion: "I move that we petition the 1972 General Conference to assist the South Carolina Annual Conference in funding the added costs of Pensions and Minimum Salary generated by the merging of the two present annual Conferences."

Motion - The Conference expressed appreciation to the Committee of Six for their work. This was adopted.

Vote on Kent Motion - The motion made by Harry Kent was adopted.

Report of Ballot - The report was made on the ballot to make Alternative Plan A the Merger Plan of the South Carolina Annual Conference 1785. The vote was YES - 505, NO - 367, Abstentions - 5. Alternate Plan A was adopted.

Statement - Bishop Hardin made a statement of appreciation to the Conference and an explanation regarding his position.

Motion - George Cannon moved a vote of appreciation to Bishop Hardin which was followed by a rising vote of thanks.

Procedure - DeArmond Cannady asked for clarification on the procedure to be followed in the movement toward merger.

Motion - James Nates made a motion having to do with procedure. The motion was perfected by a slight change in terminology and accepted by its maker and was as follows: "I move the adoption of the following:

1. That the present Committee of Six be a continuing Committee until the adoption of a plan of merger between the 1785 and 1866 South Carolina Conferences of the United Methodist Church;

2. That, in the event the Conference of 1866 does not adopt the plan of merger which we have passed today, that we, the Conference of 1785, respectfully request, through our presiding Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., that the Conference of 1866 elect a Committee Comparable to our Committee of Six;

3. And, that we request these Committees from the Conferences of 1785 and 1866, to devise a Plan of Merger which might be acceptable to a simultaneous session of the Annual Conferences at the same location."

The motion was adopted.

Closing - The Conference sang the hymn, "Bless Be The Tie That Binds". Bishop Hardin pronounced the benediction and the Conference adjourned sine die.

THE JOINT SESSION

THURSDAY, JANUARY 27, 1972

Opening - Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr. called the South Carolina Conference (1785) and the South Carolina Conference (1866) in joint session on Thursday morning on January 27, 1972 at 10:00 A. M. Granville Hicks led the Conference in singing "Amazing Grace" and "Lord, I Want To Be A Christian."

Devotion - Following the singing of the two hymns, Bishop Hardin led the Conference in a devotion of prayer and scripture.

The Call of the Conferences - The call for the meeting of the two Annual Conferences was issued on December 10, 1971, as follows:

TO: ALL MINISTERIAL AND LAY DELEGATES OF THE SOUTH
CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE '85 OF THE UNITED
METHODIST CHURCH

This is to notify you that with the approval of the Cabinet, I am calling a special session of the South Carolina Annual Conference (85) of the United Methodist Church to meet in the Township Auditorium, Columbia, South Carolina, at 10:00 A.M., on Thursday, January 27, 1972.

This Conference is called for the specific purpose of discussing and voting upon a plan to form one annual conference of the United Methodist Church in South Carolina. The plan has the approval of the Committees of Six of both Annual Conferences.

This formal notice is being delivered to each delegate to the annual conference through the ministers of the churches and charges. The ministers are charged with the responsibility of notifying their delegates.

I pray that God's spirit will lead us in our discussion and action.

This same call was issued to the members of the South Carolina Conference (1866)

Bar of the Conferences - Allan R. Broome, Secretary of the 1785 Conference moved that the Bar of the Conference be set to include Sections A, B, F, and E in the Arena of the auditorium and sections A, B, C, D, E, G, and H of the first balcony. Following a second it was adopted.

John D. Boone, Jr., Secretary of the 1866 Conference moved that the Bar of the Conference be set to include Sections C and D in the Arena of the Auditorium and Section G of the first balcony. Following a second it was adopted.

Roll Call - Mr. Boone moved that the roll of lay and clerical delegates for the 1866 Conference be determined by the signing of the attendance cards which were distributed to all members. Following a second it was adopted.

Dr. Broome made the same motion for the 1785 Conference and it was adopted.

Bar of the Conference - Mr. Boone and Dr. Broome presented motions to make the platform of the Auditorium a part of the Bar of the Conference. This was adopted by both Conferences.

Standing Rules - DeArmond Canaday (chairman of the Standing Rules Committee of the 1785 Conference) moved that no member of the Conference be allowed to speak more than one time on each question and that, without permission of the conference, will not be allowed to speak longer than five (5) minutes. The same motion was made for the 1866 Conference and both Conference adopted these rules.

The following rule was also submitted: "All motions shall be written and a copy be sent to the presiding officer's desk prior to or immediately following the making of the motion so as to be at the desk prior to the debate on the motion." This was moved and seconded by both Conferences and was adopted by the two.

Mr. Canaday also moved that "the method of voting on any total plan be by written ballot." It was moved, also, by the 1866 Conference and was adopted by both Conferences.

Election of Tellers - Dr. Broome nominated the following as tellers: J. I. Young, Andy Morris, Joe Brubaker, W. K. Jordan, Jr., Joel Hand, Jr., Richard Murphy, Perry Turner, Roy Stockman, Joe Sowell, Vernon Anderson, and Joe W. Giles. Joel Hand was named to serve as chief teller. These were elected.

Mr. Boone nominated the following: J. K. Davis, I. Moses, A. N. Rogers, Otis Martin, Cranston Pinckney, Mrs. Elsie Jones, E. E. Huggins, and J. K. Davis to serve as chief teller. These were elected.

Report of the Committee of Six - Bishop Hardin presented the committee of six from each Conference to present the Plan of Union.

Motion - There was a motion from a member of the '66 Conference that the entire plan be read. The motion was lost.

A similar motion from the 85 Conference was also lost.

Harry R. Kent was present to represent both Conference Committees in presenting the Plan of Union. Mr. Kent presented the following plan:

PLAN OF UNION

INTRODUCTION:

The personal choice of freeing our own and other men's hearts comes to us in many ways during all of life. Seldom does a group of men and women have this opportunity to liberate themselves and countless of their fellows from the collective practice of separatism over three centuries by activating their professed belief of oneness in Christ.

There have been incidents of reconciliation between individuals—and there is glory in that. Even now some of us can turn aside briefly from ourselves and see another in his likeness to us—or in fleeting moments acknowledge in him some Christ-like quality. More often than not we emphasize our difference and only faintly resist the shackles of our history. All too infrequently do we protest the compromises perpetrated within the Church against Jesus' example of brotherhood.

Many vital battles of life have been fought largely outside the Church. We are charged at this juncture in time to lay claim to the victory of a meaningful relationship to God—by saying first of all to ourselves and to all who will follow that we will shore up our relationships with each other. This is great glory—and it is freedom—which comes when a group of people begins to listen, to communicate, to trust, to care, to seek solutions, to achieve, and finally to gain release from fear and prejudice that permits us to love one another.

Organization is necessary for orderliness—and perhaps to satisfy our need

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

(A) There shall be in South Carolina one annual conference, to be known as the South Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, to be formed through the union of the two conferences now existing.

(B) Union shall be accomplished and the new conference organized in accordance with the provisions of **The Book of Discipline** of the United Methodist Church, insofar as the same applies, except in such cases made and provided for in this plan, following the steps hereafter provided.

A. Conference Structure

1. a. Following the creation of the New South Carolina Annual Conference, elected members of the conference boards, commissions, and committees shall be on a ratio of the approximate percentage of members of the former conferences for the first two quadrennia. Realizing that lay and ministerial dele-

gates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences are elected by secret ballot, we call upon the delegates in their election as a matter of conscience, to follow a ratio of the approximate percentage of members of the former conferences. However, nothing herein shall preclude laymen joining a church of the conference after the creation of the new conference or clerical members joining the conference after the creation of the new conference from becoming members of any board, commissions, or committee so long as the ratio of majority and minority groups is maintained. During this period, in the election of district lay leaders and two associates for each district (who become members of the conference Board of the Laity), at least one of the three shall be elected from each of the former conferences, where possible. This procedure would begin at the time the districts are realigned.

b. The General and Jurisdictional Conferences delegates as elected in 1971 shall be the delegates for the 1972-1976 quadrennium.

2. Until the new annual conference's standing rules are adopted, the Committee on Nominations shall consist of the two Committees on Nominations of the uniting conferences.

3. Being aware of the inherent privilege of each board, commission, and committee to elect its own chairman, and in a sincere effort to be faithful to the spirit of determination to bring into being ONE annual conference of The United Methodist Church in South Carolina; it is, therefore, the will of the conference that each board, commission, and committee shall elect its chairman on the basis of merit without regard to former conference relationships.

4. a. The South Carolina Women's Society of Christian Service, being a part of the connexional system of the Columbia Area of the United Methodist Church, shall be guided by the plans of the creation of the new conference established by the annual conference, the district, and the local churches. (**The Book of Discipline**, Pars. 1341-1344)

b. The Executive Committee of the Women's Societies of Christian Service of the two former conferences shall set up:

(a) A Committee on Nominations to prepare a slate of officers for the composition of the new society, with proportionate representation.

(b) A Committee on By-Laws and Standing Rules to draw up by-laws and standing rules for the new society; and

(c) A Committee on Finance to establish procedures for combining conference and district treasuries, clearing financial practices and policies of the former societies and to provide a clear interpretation of the directives regarding the financial policies as they are received from the Women's Division of the United Methodist Church.

5. In selection of new trustees for the boards, agencies, and institutions of the new conference, the principle of inclusiveness shall be observed.

6. In the new annual conference, the Program Council and other boards, and agencies of the conference having employed staff, shall employ staff members and clerical personnel on an inclusive basis, with the proportions pertaining at the time of the formation of the new conference being observed as a guideline in future employment.

7. a. We recommend that the new South Carolina Conference be divided into twelve districts effective at annual conference, 1974.

b. We recommend that all District Superintendents serve the remainder of their present terms of six years on the District and that the Districts be reduced to twelve by attrition.

c. District boundaries shall be determined according to Par. 390.3 of **The Book of Discipline**. We recommend that the continuing committee provide guidance.

8. The appointment of District Superintendents is the responsibility of the presiding Bishop; however, after 1975 we strongly recommend to the presiding Bishop that the structure of the cabinet be made up of nine (9) members of the former 1866 conference and that three (3) District Superintendents be from the former 1866 conference, with this structure then being maintained for at least the remainder of the eight (8) year period following union.

9. The Program Council shall consist of the presiding Bishop; the district superintendents; two representatives of conference agencies determined by the annual conference, one of whom shall be a member of each of the former conferences; the Conference Secretary and two representatives of Conference Youth organization, one from each of the former annual conferences; two representatives of the Women's Society of Christian Service, one of whom shall be a member of each of the former conferences; two representatives of the Board of the Laity, one, the Conference Lay Leader and the other, a member of the other former conference; one layman from each district; chairman of age-level and family departments; and such additional members as to make the membership of the Council to be in accordance with the proportions pertaining at the time of the creation of the conference.

B. Standing Rules

1. In the organization of the new conference a Committee on Standing Rules shall present rules of procedure for adoption by the new conference.

2. Until new standing rules are adopted, the new conference shall be guided by **The Book of Discipline** and **Robert's Rules of Order**.

3. For two quadrennia following the creation of the new annual conference the standing rules and resolutions of the new conference shall not include any rules or resolutions that violate the provisions of this Plan of Implementation unless approved by a two-thirds majority of the Annual Conference.

C. Financial Adjustments

1. **Apportionment.** Apportionments shall be made by the conference Commission on World Service and Finance directly to the churches (or charges) after consultation with the district superintendents. These apportionments shall be based on a tri-part formula considering church membership, previous world service giving, and non-capital expenditures by the church or charge.

2. **Minimum Salary.** The minimum salary schedule in the new conference shall be uniform for all members and shall be equal to that previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.

3. **Pensions.** The Annuity rate shall be the same for the members of both former conferences and shall be equal to that previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.

4. **Funding.** The 1970 General Conference reordered its priorities and instructed every board and agency of the church to trim budgets and programs until two million dollars from present giving could be available to fund special programs for minorities.

With this precedent to guide us, and recognizing that additional costs will be involved, it is recommended that the World Service and Finance Commission of the newly created conference immediately reorder financial priorities and request all boards, commissions, and committees of the conference to trim budgets so that the financial needs of the new conference can be more nearly met as it comes into being.

It is further recommended that the World Service and Finance Commissions of the two conferences involved, prior to the creation of the new conference, remind the 1972 General Conference of the amount of financial support promised by the 1968 General Conference in such situations (that is, 100% for the first quadrennium, 80% for the second quadrennium, and so forth).

If the General Conference of 1972 is unable to provide the funds authorized by the 1968 General Conference for this purpose from present or anticipated revenues, that the General Conference of 1972 then be petitioned to make some special provision for the funding of those additional costs to the new conference which are beyond the present financial capacity of the conference itself.

We pledge our every effort to be financially responsible as we seek to increase giving in the new conference. However, without additional funds being made available from some source—our own resources and those of the General Church—it will not be possible to bring into being a "united" Conference in the United Methodist Church in South Carolina that is faithful and just to

everyone who will be involved in the life and work of the new South Carolina Conference.

5. **Conference Homes.** The services of all conference homes for children, the aged, and conference claimants shall be available to all persons on an equal basis. Opportunities for employment in homes having employed personnel shall be on an inclusive basis.

6. **Institutional Support.** The institutions supported by the two former conferences shall be undergirded by support from the new conference on a formula to be determined by the new annual conference, which formula shall be applied in like manner to similar institutions.

7. **Insurance.** The program of life insurance and health insurance for the new conference shall be based upon the insurance plan previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.

Continuing Committee

1. A follow-up Committee on Implementation shall be elected quadrennially for two quadrennia, with representation from the two former annual conferences, to consider concerns and developments relating to the creation of the new conference which have not been anticipated or provided for in the Plan of Implementation. The Committee on Standing Rules shall determine the number to be elected and the extent of ex-officio representation.

The Committee of the Whole - Harry Kent moved that the two Conferences move into a Committee of the Whole to be reconvened as Conferences for final vote after the discussion. There was a second.

W. Charlie Kearns moved that the Conference go into voting on the plan without discussion or debate. Bishop Hardin ruled that the Conferences were now dealing with the setting up of the Committee of the Whole and this motion was out of order.

Colie Moore moved for the 66 Conference that the Conference move into a Committee of the Whole for discussion to be reconvened as Conferences for voting after the discussion. It was seconded.

Both Conferences adopted the motion which was before it.

Chairman of the Committee of the Whole - Bishop Hardin was nominated as the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole. Mr. Boone put the question and he was elected.

Election of Secretaries - Mr. Boone and Dr. Broome were elected to serve as joint-secretaries of the Committee of the Whole.

The words under 7 b were eliminated through agreement: "as is now constituted."

Motion - Bryan Crenshaw moved the elimination of paragraph 7 b. Since he had made a speech before the motion, Bryan Crenshaw withdrew the motion.

Motion - Donald O'Dell moved the elimination of paragraph 7 b and that the following words be added at the end of paragraph 7 a: "We recommend that the new South Carolina Conference be divided into twelve (12) districts (and change **at** to **by**) Annual Conference of 1974 and that the districts be reduced to twelve (12) by attrition."

Substitute - Bill Kinnett moved that we substitute the motion that we simply eliminate paragraph 7 b. It was seconded.

Substitute for the Substitute - M. D. McCollom moved that in the process of eliminating districts by attrition, as the terms of the District Superintendents end, that this apply to the District Superintendents of the 66 Conference only.

Kinnett Substitute Withdrawn—Mr. Kinnett withdrew his substitute in support of the McCollom substitute.

Motion—Mr. McLeod of Walterboro, moved that the Committee of the Whole recommend to both Conferences that they adopt the plan of the Committees of six as submitted to these conferences. There was a second. This was interpreted by Bishop Hardin to be a substitute for all that was before the house.

Question—The question was called. The motion was adopted.

Conferences Re-Convened—The Committee of the Whole was adjourned and the two Annual Conferences were called back into order.

Motion to Recess—I. DeQuincy Newman moved that the Conference be recessed for ten minutes.

Substitute - Omega Newman moved a substitute "that the 66 Conference remain in session until the business is completed." The substitute was adopted.

Motion—There was a motion from the floor that the Plan of Union be adopted by the 85 Conference.

Point of Order—DeArmond Canaday raised the point of order that "before voting that we must have a minimum of two speeches for and two speeches against the question".

Suspension of Rules—It was moved from the 85 Conference that the rule requiring two speeches on each side be suspended. The motion was adopted.

Motion to Vote—Bishop Hardin called the question as to whether the 85 Conference was ready to vote. It was adopted.

Motion—Mr. Cooper moved that the rules of the 66 Conference be suspended and that we have more than two speakers on both sides. It was adopted.

The Cooper Motion—There was misunderstanding as to what the Conference had voted in regard to the Cooper motion. He cleared the matter by saying that his motion was to suspend the rules so that more than two persons could speak on both sides. Bishop Hardin ruled that the Conference did not understand it that way and would need to vote again with this made clear.

Substitute Motion—Omega Newman moved a substitute motion for the Cooper motion that the Conference cut off debate and proceed to vote. The vote was taken on the Newman motion. The Bishop announced that the 66 Conference had cut off debate by a two-thirds (2/3) majority.

Motion to Adopt—Omega Newman moved the following: "On behalf of the South Carolina Conference 66, I deem it an honor at this point in the churches history and United Methodism to truly bring the kingdom into the hearts of men. Therefore, I make the motion that the plan as submitted by the two Committees of Six, be adopted by the 66 Conference." There was a second.

Call for the Question—Theron Few raised the question concerning the action of the 85 Conference. He stated that the rules were suspended to allow voting without the necessary two speeches on both sides. Therefore he moved that the question be called. It was adopted.

Motion to Recess—LeGrande Moody moved that "after the vote is taken that the 86 Conference be in recess while the vote is being counted". It was adopted.

The same motion was adopted by the 66 Conference.

The vote on the Plan of Union was received and the two Conferences were recessed for fifteen minutes.

Report of Vote on the Plan of Union—Following the recess, Bishop Hardin read the results of the vote on the Plan of Union. The 66 Confer-

ence voted 135 yes and 44 no. The 85 Conference voted 573 yes and 247 no with 7 abstentions. Bishop Hardin announced that on the results of ballots, duly recorded, "I announce that the plan submitted by the Committees of Six of the two Conferences has been adopted."

Resolution—Wallace Fridy presented the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

Whereas, the 1972 General Conference of the United Methodist Church will receive a report from the Structure Study Commission, which if passed, will have far-reaching effects and change in the Annual Conference Structure; and

Whereas, a seven month period, or until January 1, 1973, following our uniting conference in June 1972, will provide time and knowledge in perfecting the organizational structure for the South Carolina Annual Conference, and

Whereas, to conserve the values of program planning and operation of each conference, continuing leadership of boards and agencies of these conferences for a seven month period would provide such continuity; and

Whereas, a nominating committee could have adequate time in recommending leadership to be elected by the South Carolina Annual Conference:

We therefore recommend that the Standing Rules of both conferences be suspended in order:

(1) That for seven months, or until January 1, 1973, following the uniting conference in June 1972, all boards, commissions, committees and agencies will be composed of all members of these same boards and agencies from the two former conferences. (Officers of such boards and agencies now in office may continue to serve jointly during this seven-month period); and

(2) That a nominating committee shall be elected and organized immediately after the uniting conference, in accordance with the standing rules adopted at the uniting conference, to bring in nominations to a special session of the new conference held within the closing months of 1972, to serve for the rest of the quadrennium, beginning January 1, 1973; and

(3) That all boards and agencies following this session of both conferences, complete their program planning, except where joint action is required, and that joint meetings of boards and agencies be held prior to the uniting conference to coordinate plans for the new annual conference, and further, where feasible, it is recommended that joint efforts be made in all planning; and

(4) That the presiding Bishop is respectfully requested to appoint a continuing Committee on Merger to take office following this session of these conferences.

SECOND DAY

TUESDAY MORNING—JUNE 6, 1972

An Order for the Administration of the Sacrament of Holy Communion—The Holy Communion was administered in the Leonard Auditorium on the campus of Wofford College.

Opening—Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr. called to order the new South Carolina Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdiction, The United Methodist Church, at 9:00 A.M. in the Memorial Auditorium, Spartanburg, South Carolina, following the uniting last evening of the former South Carolina Conference (1785) and the South Carolina Conference (1866). This Conference session was called to order in the one hundred, eighty seventh year of Methodism in South Carolina.

The Conference joined in singing the hymn "Amazing Grace" after which Bishop Hardin led the Conference in the opening prayer.

Welcome—Bishop Hardin introduced the President of Wofford College, Dr. Paul Hardin, III, who spoke words of welcome to the Conference and introduced the following persons who were members of the local Entertainment Committee: The Reverend J. D. Spears, Superintendent of the Piedmont District, Dr. A. McKay Brabham, Superintendent of the Spartanburg District, The Reverend T. H. Fisher, Minister of Silver Hill United Methodist Church, and Dr. Francis T. Cunningham, Minister of Bethel United Methodist Church, who brought words of welcome to the Conference. Dr. Hardin then introduced the new President-Elect of Wofford College, Dr. Joe Lesesne, who spoke briefly to the Conference. Bishop Paul Hardin then spoke in response to the words of welcome.

Election of Conference Secretary—Dr. Allan R. Broome was nominated for the position of Conference Secretary. Ted Fisher moved that the Conference Secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for the election of Dr. Allan R. Broome as Secretary of the Conference. This motion was adopted and Dr. Broome was elected.

Personal Privilege—Dr. Allan R. Broome spoke to the Conference in response to his election as Secretary.

Nomination for Secretarial Staff—Bishop Hardin then called on Dr. Allan R. Broome who made the following nominations:

Election of Statistician—The Reverend Theus W. Rogers was nominated as Conference Statistician. He was elected by unanimous vote.

These were elected.

Roll Call—The Conference Secretary moved that the Registration Cards which were filled out at the Registration Desk beginning Monday, June 5, 1972, at 10:00 A.M., be declared the official signed attendance of the Conference and that these be used as the official roll for both the Clerical and Lay Members of this Conference. It was adopted.

Bar of the Conference—The Conference Secretary moved that the center section, the right center section, and the left center section be set as the Bar of the Conference. It was adopted.

Confirmation of Election—The Conference confirmed the election of M. McCollum as Chairman of the Commission on worship for the remainder of this Conference year.

Resolution of Membership—The Conference Secretary moved that the newly elected lay members and reserve lay members to the 1972 session of the South Carolina Conference (1866) and to the South Carolina Conference (1785) and the other Lay Members of both Conferences both elected and re-elected, be declared the duly elected lay members and reserve lay members for this, the 1972 session of the South Carolina Conference of The Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church.

Agenda—The Conference Secretary moved that the printed program distributed before the Conference and at the Annual Conference session, be the official agenda for the meeting of this Annual Conference session, with the understanding that the time designated for each program item become a fixed order of the day. He also moved that Bishop Hardin be granted freedom to make necessary adjustments where business matters of this Conference require. It was adopted.

Name of Conference—Omega F. Newman called attention to the fact, according to the Plan of Merger the official name of our Conference is the South Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The United Methodist Church.

State of the Church Address—Bishop Hardin made an address on the State of the Church. (See address at beginning of section on reports.)

Standing Rules—John W. Curry, Sr., Chairman of the Committee on Standing Rules spoke to the Conference and then introduced D. E. Canaday to explain the policy and procedures of the Committee. Harry R. Mays presented the report to the Conference by distributing copies, which had been previously printed, to the members of the Conference.

Announcements—The Conference Secretary, Allan R. Broome, made announcements and read greetings from The Reverend Joe Maw.

Recess—Bishop Hardin recessed the Conference for fifteen minutes. Following the recess Bishop Hardin called the Conference to order and Grandfather Hicks led in singing "We are Climbing Jacobs Ladder". Bishop Hardin led the Conference in prayer.

Motion—Ed Ellis moved that the Youth Delegates, regardless of the method by which they had been chosen, be seated for this annual Conference session. The motion was adopted.

Report of the Standing Rules Committee (Continued)—Harry Mays presented the report after explaining that the report would be presented section by section for adoption.

Section B-8—was presented as follows:

8. There shall be a Committee on Nominations to be elected quadrennially.

a. The Committee shall consist of twelve (12) clerical and twelve (12) lay persons, elected by the Annual Conference, and two youth nominated by the Conference UMYF Council and confirmed by the Annual Conference. The following shall serve, ex-officio without vote: the Conference Lay leader, the Conference President of the United Methodist Women, and the secretary of the cabinet.

b. Nine (9) of the clerical members and nine (9) of the lay members shall be from the former '85 Conference; three (3) of the clerical members and three (3) of the lay members shall be from the former '66 Conference.

c. On the first day of the 1972 Annual Conference the Nominating Committees of the two former conferences shall submit a list of nominees equal in number, clerical and lay, to those to be elected from the former conference which each represents. At least an equal number of nominees, lay and clerical, from each former Annual Conference shall be nominated from the floor.

d. The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall prepare ballots containing the names of all persons nominated, indicating their former conference and whether lay or clerical.

e. On the second day of Annual Conference it shall be an order of the day at the morning session for balloting to commence. A simple majority of the votes cast shall be necessary for election.

f. The first person elected, or the person receiving the largest number of votes on the first ballot in which election occurs, whether lay or clerical, shall be the chairman.

g. Balloting shall continue, using such ballots as the Conference Secretary shall authorize, until the Committee has been properly elected.

h. There shall be no voting by orders; all Annual Conference members shall vote for all persons.

i. Election to the Committee shall be in keeping with the conference Standing Rule on tenure. When a person, lay or clerical, is elected to membership on the Committee, he may not, during his period of service on this Committee, be nominated for membership on any Board, Commission or Committee whose membership arises from nominations from this Committee.

Amendment—George W. Whitaker presented the following amendment:

"I move that 8-C, sentence 2, be amended to read: Opportunity shall be given for at least an equal number of nominees, lay and clerical, from each former Annual Conference to be nominated from the floor."

Question—The question was called by the Conference. The amendment was adopted.

Substitute—Doug Bowling presented the following substitute for the entire section B-8 as presented by the committee. The Substitute was as follows:

Insert for Section B, paragraph 8. a, b, c, d, e, f, g, h and i, page two of Standing Rules and Resolutions the following:

8. There shall be a Committee on Nominations to be elected quadrennially.

(a.) The Annual Conference Committee on Nominations shall be composed of the Presiding Bishop as Chairman or one appointed by the Bishop to preside over the sessions, the Secretary of the Cabinet and fifteen ministers and fifteen lay persons (one each from each district, and decreasing to twelve ministers and twelve lay persons as the number of districts decreases to twelve).

The lay person from each district shall be elected by a group composed of the Chairman of the Council on Ministries from each legal church within each district. This shall be done by secret ballot after at least five nominations are made from the floor. The district superintendent shall preside at said election.

If less than fifty per cent of these Chairmen are present at this called meeting, the district superintendent shall receive from the floor at least five nominations from those present and shall declare that election of the lay representative of that district will be completed by ballots mailed to each Council on Ministries Chairman.

The minister from each district shall be elected by the ministers within each district. This shall be done by secret ballot after at least five nominations are made from the floor. The district superintendent shall preside at said election.

The results of the elections shall be reported to the Secretary of the Conference and the Secretary of the Cabinet no later than one month prior to the convening of the Annual Conference.

The present Conference Committees on Nominations shall continue to serve in their present capacity until the provisions of this resolution are implemented.

(b.) This shall be a quadrennial Board. Any minister or lay person moving out of the district shall be replaced the year of his or her move.

(c.) Election to the Conference Committee on Nominations shall be in keeping with the Conference Standing Rule on tenure. When a person, lay or clerical, is elected to membership on the Conference Committee on Nominations, he may not, during his period of service on this Conference Committee on Nominations, be nominated for membership on any other Board, Commission or Committee whose membership arises from nominations from this Committee.

Motion—M. D. Moore moved that we perfect the substitute motion Doug Bowling before voting. The motion was adopted.

Amendment—Harry Kent moved an amendment to 8(a), Paragraph 4, the Substitute:

"I move to substitute for the 4th paragraph of 8(a) of the mimeographed substitute, "The ministerial members of the committee shall be elected by at-large election in the annual Conference, from at least twice as many nominees as there are vacancies, and with separated nominations to assure proportionate representation of the two former Conferences".

Point of Order—Omega Newman called attention to the contractual agreement of merger that provided for black representation on all Boards and Agencies.

Point of Order—Following further discussion, W. R. Kinnett questioned whether we were dealing with the Substitute Motion by Mr. Bowling or the Amendment by Mr. Kent. Not Sustained.

Question—The question was called. The Kent Amendment to the Bowling Substitute was defeated.

Amendment—Paul McWhirter presented two amendments to the Bowling Substitute for Sections 8(a), the second paragraph and the fourth paragraph as follows:

"The lay person from each district shall be elected by a group of charge lay leaders of each district".

"The three districts having the largest black membership within a district shall elect three lay members to the nominating committee.

The three districts having the next largest black membership, shall elect three clerical members to the nominating committee.

The district superintendents shall, at the beginning of each year, determine the six districts with the largest black membership."

Doug Bowling accepted both of these amendments to his Substitute.

Personal Privilege—Paul McWhirter spoke as a point of privilege relative to the effectiveness of the current plan of nominating committee, which has been underway in the Conference of 1785.

Amendment—M. D. McCollum moved an amendment for the previously accepted amendment which had been presented by Paul McWhirter.

"I move that, where it becomes necessary to provide for equitable representation from each former Conference, the Annual Conference elect a sufficient number of at-large members to the Committee on Nominations to achieve equity of representation, lay or clerical, black or white."

LeGrande Moody suggested changing the wording of the McWhirter Amendment to "District Board of Laity" in place of "Charge Lay Leaders". The suggestion was accepted by Doug Bowling.

Point of Order—Bill Edwards raised a point of order that questions were being directed to amendments that had already been accepted and not to amendment on the floor. Sustained.

Motion—W. R. Kinnett moved to refer the entire Section 8 of the Standing Rules Committee Report back to the Committee, with instructions that be re-written with the basis for the election of the committee on nominations be with the districts and that proportionate representation of the two former Conferences be maintained. The Kinnett motion for referral was adopted.

Resolution—James L. Hyatt moved a resolution be referred to the Resolutions Committee and set as an Order of the Day on Wednesday at 2:30 P.M. The referral of the Hyatt Resolution to the Committee on Resolutions

and Appeals was adopted. The Order of the Day was set for Wednesday at 2:30 P.M.

Motion—T. N. Brittain moved that the Standing Rules Committee report back to the Conference on Section 8 after re-writing as soon as possible. It was adopted.

Announcements—The Conference Secretary, Allan R. Broome, made announcements and the Benediction was pronounced by W. M. Stokes.

SECOND DAY

TUESDAY AFTERNOON—JUNE 6, 1972

Opening—Bishop Hardin called the Conference to order and the Conference was led by Thom Jones in singing "Come Thy Fount of Every Blessing" after which E. L. Davidson offered a prayer.

Personal Privilege—Bishop Hardin recognized F. T. Cunningham who introduced a British Methodist family. The Reverend and Mrs. Ian Haile, who are on an exchange program with James Rush. Mr. Haile spoke briefly to the Conference.

Standing Rules—H. R. Mays continued the report which had been begun during the morning session. Section 9—approved. Ed Ellis suggested an addition to 9(d) to read "and the person being replaced be notified". This addition was accepted by the Committee.

Section 10—Adopted as printed with editorial changes

Section 11—Amendment—George S. Duffie moved to amend paragraph 11(a) to read "28" ministers instead of "22". This amendment was accepted by the Committee.

Motion—G. W. Whitaker moved that the Executive Committee of the Council on Ministries under Section V-3, be made permissible instead of mandatory. Dr. Whitaker's suggestion was to substitute the word "may" for the word "shall" in Section V-3. It was adopted.

Motion—Barbee Parsons moved an addition to section V-1, which now reads "also, one representative from the Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations, and one representative of Pastoral Care and Family Life", changed to read, "and, one representative of the Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information." Grady Newman requested an addition to Section V-2 of the words "a member of TRAFCO". This was accepted by the Committee. The Barbee Parsons' amendment was adopted.

The Committee on Standing Rules requested permission to set up a Section known as 11(z), which would establish a Committee on TRAFCO, Section 11 was then adopted.

Section 12—adopted with the exception of Paragraph D, which was referred back to the Committee.

Section 13—was then presented.

Motion—C. L. Moody moved that Section 13-A be changed to read, "Any motion made on the Conference floor shall be sent to the Secretary's desk as soon as the person making the motion returns to his or her seat".

Amendment—Quay Adams moved an amendment to Dr. Moody's motion be made to read "no motion shall be voted upon until a copy of that motion has been laid on the desk of the Secretary of the Annual Conference". This amendment to Dr. Moody's Motion was accepted. The Conference then voted on Dr. Moody's amended motion. A count vote was taken and the tally was 391—for, 326—against. The Moody Motion as amended prevailed. Section 13 was then adopted with these amendments.

Section 14—Adopted as printed.

Section 15—Adopted as printed.

Section 16—Adopted.

Section 17—To be presented later for adoption. The Committee was granted permission to make a recommendation concerning the June salary for those Ministers who are moving.

Section 18—Adopted.

Section 19—Adopted

Section 20—

Motion—Bishop Hardin entertained a motion "that the expenses of the delegates shall be born by the districts which elects them". The motion was formally made by Harry Mays from the Rules Committee. The motion was adopted. Section 20 was adopted. The Committee then went back to Section 12(d), which was adopted with changes which are written into the report. Section 12 was then adopted.

Standing Resolutions—Were then presented by the Committee. Sections A and B were ordered to record without reading.

Section C—Miscellaneous Standing Resolutions.

1(a)—Adopted.

1(b)—Adopted.

1(c)—Adopted.

2 —Adopted.

3 —Adopted without specifying how this money should be reported in the Annual Conference Reports. This decision was to be made at a later time.

4 —Adopted.

Motion—M. B. Hudnall moved an Order of the Day for 11:00 A.M. on Thursday for a report from the Board of Missions. This was adopted.

Motion—Ben Barnes moved an Order of the Day for 2:30 P.M. Thursday for a report from the Health and Welfare Ministries Board. It was adopted.

The Standing Rules Committee requested permission to present the balance of their report tomorrow after they had held a meeting to finalize those sections not yet adopted by the Conference. Permission was granted.

Announcements—The Conference Secretary, Allan R. Broome, then made announcements. He announced the registration of delegates to date: Effective Ministers registered—491, Retired—54, Probationary Members—36, Associate Members—99; Total—680.

Closing—The Conference was then dismissed with a prayer by the Conference Secretary, Dr. Allan R. Broome.

SECOND DAY

TUESDAY EVENING - JUNE 6, 1972

Opening—Bishop Hardin called the Conference to order. Thom Jones led the Conference in singing "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus". Attention was called to several special needs for prayer and the Conference was led in prayer by LeGrande Moody.

Nominating Committee—R. E. Seignious, Secretary, was presented for the report of the Nominating Committee.

Courtesies and Introductions—Francis T. Cunningham, A. McKay Brabham, James Barrett, Lewis Phillips, Emmett Walsh, T. H. Fisher, Miss Cora McGee.

Daily Journals—Stanley LaTorre, Danye Bragdon, Marion Crooks, Matthew McCollom, James Gadsden.

Resolutions and Appeals—C. A. Graves, Paul Betsill, W. R. Bouknight, II, Mrs. B. J. Fowler, Mrs. Roy Parker, J. B. Bowen, Mrs. Flora Bethea. These Committees were elected.

Continuing Committee on Merger—Omega Newman, Chairman, made the report. Bishop Hardin expressed gratitude to the Committee.

Board of the Ministry—Collie Moore, Chairman of the former 1866 Committee, made the report. The Conference voted to re-open the report of the Board of the Ministry.

Question 28—C. C. Davis was restored.

Question 30—Add the name of Willie Aaron Lee to full connection. He was admitted by a 2/3 vote of the Conference.

Question 33(b)—Add the name of Willie Aaron Lee. The Conference voted to grant him Elders Orders.

Board of the Ministry—Ralph Cannon, Registrar for the 1785 Conference, made the report.

Question 34—Was voted reopened. Mr. Cannon recommended retirement to Raymond Ledbetter Moore under the twenty year rule. This retirement was voted by the Conference.

Question 45(a)—Add Raymond Ledbetter Moore, II.

Question 44(a)—Add James Rufus Holt, October 1, 1971.

Question 48(b)—Add Richard Edward Allen, Jr., Yale; Kenneth Ray Kernerly, Candler; Elmer Devon Ruth, Lutheran; Toni Louise White, Candler.

Question 48(c)—Add Donald R. Bailey, Emory Graduate School; Mitchell Wayne Kyllomen, Boston University Graduate School.

Recognition of Retired Ministers—Bishop Hardin recognized and presented the retiring ministers and a retiring deaconess. Tribute was paid to these persons. Ministers retiring are: Samuel Marvin Atkinson, Lloyd Defoix Bolt, William Reuben Bauknight, Jr., Dennie Roy Dickenson, Sr., John Grady Forrester, Bascom Cyler Gleaton, William Russell Gregg, A. Van Harbin, Jr., Rex Vanolyn Martin, Raymond Ledbetter Moore, Jesse Wise Tomlinson, James Rufus Holt. The retiring Deaconess, Mary Beth Littlejohn, was also recognized. Bishop Hardin recognized these persons individually, and presented them certificates of retirement.

Reception of Class into Full Connection—Bishop Hardin received into Full Connection those persons listed under Question 30 in the report of the Board of Ministry. (See list in the Business of the Annual Conference). Allan R. Broome, Secretary, presented by name those to be received.

Commission on Minimum Salary—Michael Watson, Chairman, was presented for the report. (See Report). The report was adopted.

Report of Special Committee to Study Minimum Salaries—Theron Few, Chairman, presented the report. Report number one was received as information. Report number two was presented as a recommendation to be acted on by the Annual Conference.

Amendment—Harvy Floyd moved that this study of the "salary system" referred to in report number two, be referred to the Minimum Salary Commission.

Amendment—W. R. Kinnett moved that we refer the need for a study of Ministerial support to the Committee on Annual Conference Structure. The Kinnett Amendment was adopted. The report as a whole was adopted.

World Service and Finance—Carlisle Smiley was presented for the report. Resolutions—O. Jerome Nelson was presented for two resolutions.

(1) A resolution was presented having to do with the service of J. S. Dial, as follows:

"WHEREAS Reverend James S. Dial has served the South Carolina United Methodist Conference '66 for twenty years as chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, and WHEREAS the uniting of the '66 and '85 Conferences require one Commission with one Chairman, and WHEREAS in joint session of the two commissions, another chairman was unanimously elected:

THEREFORE be it resolved:

That we express our appreciation and gratitude to Reverend Mr. Dial for these twenty years of service as he conducted the office in a faithful, non-partial, courteous and efficient manner:

And finally we recognize in Reverend Mr. Dial, a loyal churchman and Christian gentleman.

It is our prayer that the blessings of God our Father continue with Reverend Mr. Dial as he continues to carry on the work of Him who called him to the gospel ministry."

Adopted.

(2) A resolution was presented having to do with the service of J. W. Curry, as follows:

WHEREAS Dr. J. W. Curry has served the South Carolina United Methodist Conference '66, as Treasurer on a part-time basis for twenty years and

WHEREAS union of the Conference '85 and '66 calls for serving his tenth (10th) successful year as pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church Orangeburg, South Carolina.

THEREFORE be it resolved

That we express our sincere appreciation and gratitude to Dr. Curry for these twenty years of faithful, honest, courteous, efficient and dedicated service as Conference Treasurer. Last but not least, we recognize in Dr. Curry a Christian gentleman and a loyal churchman.

We hope for Dr. Curry a continued success in his ministry and that God will continue to bless him and his ministry."

Adopted.

Mr. Dial presented Judge Richard Fields who spoke of the service of J. W. Curry and presented a gift to him.

Resolution—Paul McWhirter presented a resolution of appreciation to S. D. Clarkson, as follows:

"WHEREAS Mr. S. D. Clarkson has served the South Carolina United Methodist Conference, '85, for twelve years as Conference Treasurer, and

WHEREAS Mr. Clarkson is retiring at his request from this position as of July 1st.

THEREFORE be it resolved:

That we express our deep sense of gratitude to Mr. Clarkson for these twelve years of faithful, courteous, efficient and dedicated service as Conference Treasurer;

That above all other considerations, we recognize in him a loyal churchman and Christian gentleman;

That we wish for him long years of health and happiness in his retirement."

Adopted.

Motion—Matthew D. McCollom moved that the State of the Church address made by Bishop Hardin be printed in the Conference Journal.

Adopted.

Announcements—Announcements were made by the Secretary.

Motion—Wallace Fridy made the following motion:

"I move that a telegram of appreciation be sent to S. D. Clarkson".

Adopted.

Closing—The Benediction was given by Bishop Hardin.

THIRD DAY

WEDNESDAY MORNING—JUNE 7, 1972

An Order for the Administration of the Sacrament of Holy Communion—The Holy Communion was administered in the Leonard Auditorium on the campus of Wofford College.

Consecration of Lay Workers—Bishop Hardin led An Order for the Consecration of Lay Workers. Spencer M. Rice presented the report of the Committee on the Lay Worker. The Conference approved the certification of Miss Gloria Jean Foster (certified as Director of Christian Education), Mrs. Lina Mae Leigh (certified as Associate in Education), and Fletcher Carter (certified in the field of Stewardship). These three were then Consecrated by Bishop Hardin.

Committee on Daily Journals—Stanley LaTorre reported that the Journals were in order through the second day. Adopted.

Introduction—Bishop Hardin introduced Dr. J. Otis Young and Miss Sue Henry, the Methodist Publishing House. Dr. Young spoke briefly to the Conference. Miss Sue Henry presented a check to Bishop Hardin to be placed in the pension fund in the amount of \$12,986.16. Bishop Hardin received the check and in response said that it represented both former Conferences.

Report of World Service—J. C. Smiley, Chairman of the Board, presented J. A. Merchant, Secretary, to make the report.

Report Number 1—Adopted.

Report Number 2—Adopted. Sections 1, 2, and 3 adopted.

Report Number 3—Section 1—Deleted.

Section Number 2—Was presented.

Motion—Herbert Floyd moved that Item Number 1 of Report Number 3 be referred back to the World Service and Finance Commission. Mr. Floyd withdrew his motion.

Motion—Allan R. Broome made the following motion: "I move that we request a referral of Item Number two, Report Number three, to the World Service and Finance Commission for study in conjunction with the Program Council and the Board of Education to be reported to the recessed session of the Annual Conference at the time a new budget is proposed."

The Motion was approved.

Point of Order—A point of order was made by James Medley that discussion was not germane to the motion. This was sustained by the chair and the report continued.

Section number two, report number three, was adopted.

Section 3 (Report 3) was adopted.

Report Number 3—Was adopted as a whole.

Report Number 4—Sections 1,2,3,4,5,6,7,8,9,10 and 11—Adopted.

Report Number 4—Was adopted as a whole.

Report Number 5—Ministerial Items

Section Number 1—District Superintendents

Amendment—An Amendment was made by Donald O'Dell for (a) of Section 1 of Report Number 5 as follows: "I recommend that \$8,219.50 salary be set for District Superintendents for the Conference Year 1972."

The motion was defeated. Section Number 1 was adopted.

Prayer—Bishop Hardin led the Conference in prayer on behalf of Col. Roy C. Moore, a member of this Conference, who was hospitalized during the night.

Report on Offering—Bishop Hardin reported that the offering received for the Fund for Reconciliation on Monday evening, totaled \$1,139.48.

Announcements—Were made by the Secretary, after which the Conference was recessed.

Bishop Paul Hardin called the Conference to order following recess. Thom Jones led in singing, "Come We That Love The Lord". Bishop Hardin then led the Conference in prayer.

Board of the Ministry—Collie Moore moved the re-opening of Question 31 (a). The question was re-opened. Henry Bradford Shaw was then elected to receive ordination as a Deacon.

World Service and Conference Benevolences—James A. Merchant, Secretary, continued the report.

Report Number 5

Section 2—Adopted.

Section 3—Adopted.

Section 4—Adopted.

Report Number 5 as a Whole was adopted.

Report Number 6—Adopted with the naming of the same accounting firm for the coming 7/12th Conference Year.

Report Number 7

Motion—Van Thomas moved that we amend Section D of Report 7, by deleting the phrase "who may be required to appear before the Conference Commission on Ministerial Training and Qualifications". J. A. Merchant asked Van Thomas if this motion would not also include making the \$10.00 payment, a per diem payment, for each day of the Annual Conference. Van Thomas agreed. The Van Thomas motion was adopted.

Motion—James Hood moved that a per diem of \$10.00 a day be paid to those Seminary students who are attending the Conference June 5-June 9, 1972. It was adopted.

Motion—Tom Britain moved that after the deletion of the phrase mentioned in the Van Thomas motion, in Section D of Report 7, that we add "not serving a Pastoral Charge in this Conference." It was adopted.

Motion—Don Haton moved that the word "Delegate" in Report Number 7, Section A, be changed to "members". It was adopted. Report Number 7 as a whole was adopted.

Report Number 8—Collie Moore presented the report asking Paul McWhirter to explain two additions to the World Service total budget. The Reverend Paul McWhirter explained the addition of two items:

- (1) The Committee on Conference Lines—\$3,000.00
- (2) Committee on Lay Workers—\$100.00

This changes the total asking in the report from \$575,469.00 to \$578,569.00.

- (1) Administration—Adopted.
- (2) World Service—Adopted.
- (3) Annual Conference Administration—Adopted.
- (4) Annual Conference Benevolences—Was presented.

Motion—G. S. Duffie, Sr., moved that the amount of \$1,236.00, appropriated for ministerial training additional scholarships, be changed to \$2,000.00.

Amendment—Robert Morris moved that the amount of \$799.00 for enlistment be moved to the Ministerial Training Additional Scholarships on Report Number 8, World Service Budget. The Morris Amendment was adopted. The Duffie Motion was then adopted.

Amendment—Thom Jones then offered \$590.00 of the \$1,590.00 allocated to Worship for the Annual Conference Entertainment of Seminary students. This was accepted.

Grady Newman offered \$200.00 from the TRAFCO budget of \$2,835.00 to be used by World Service at their discretion. It was accepted.

Section 4 was then adopted.

The additional recommendations were then presented.

Paragraph (1) was adopted. Paragraphs number 2 and 3 were adopted. The Report of the World Service and Conference Benevolences Commission was then adopted as a Whole.

Announcements—Were made by the Secretary.

Orders of the Day—A motion was made that 3:30 this afternoon (Wednesday) be set as an Order of the Day for receiving the report from Spartanburg Junior College. This was adopted.

A motion was made by DeArmond Canaday to set 7:30 this evening (Wednesday) for the Committee on Standing Rules report as an Order of the Day. This was adopted.

Recognition of Chaplains—Bishop Hardin presented the Chaplains who were present at the Conference. These were introduced individually and Bishop Hardin extended greetings and appreciation.

Greetings—B. S. Drennan made a motion to extend greetings to the North Carolina Conference, the Western North Carolina Conference, and the Southern Baptist State Convention now in session. He also moved that permission be granted to the Secretary to send appropriate greetings to other groups. This was approved.

Announcements—Were made by the Secretary.

Introduction—Mrs. Ellen Kunes, Secretary to Bishop Hardin, was presented to the Conference.

Closing—The Conference was dismissed with the benediction by Bishop Hardin.

THIRD DAY

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON—JUNE 7, 1972

Opening—Bishop Hardin called the Conference to order and Granville Hicks led the Conference in singing "A Charge to Keep, I Have". Porter Anderson led in prayer.

Order of the Day—Resolutions and Appeals—Francis T. Cunningham, Chairman, presented a resolution from James Hyatt and Lloyd Hatton as follows: "WHEREAS, it has come to the attention of many of us the apparent willingness of many of the churches in our Conference to negate their financial responsibility to our Conference especially in the area of ministerial items; and

WHEREAS, the failure to underwrite Conference programs especially in the area of Conference Claimants directly results in the financial penalizing of retired ministers, widows and orphans; and

WHEREAS, the failure for churches to participate in Conference Claimants places an undue burden upon their present minister at his time of retirement; and

WHEREAS, ministers according to the 1968 Discipline, paragraph 921, are to receive salary directly proportional to the churches acceptance and paying of ministerial items; and

WHEREAS, ministers and churches have flagrantly violated these Disciplinary requirements; now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That a special committee be appointed by the Bishop with the following purposes:

- a. to examine and investigate all before mentioned violations in all churches and with all ministers; and
- b. to ascertain to the best of their ability the cause; and
- c. to bring to the attention of both ministers and churches the results of their irresponsibility; and
- d. to offer positive recommendations to the 1973 Annual Conference for steps to be taken in the future; and

2. That this committee be made up of at least one minister and one layman from a large church, a small church, an urban church and a rural church but that its total membership should not exceed fifteen (15) members."

The Committee on Resolutions and Appeals recommended concurrence, with the resolution to be referred to the Committee on Interpretation of the Program Council (Council on Ministries).

Amendment—James L. Hyatt moved, "Bishop, I would move that the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals ruling be amended to read concurrence only, that this resolution might be properly before the Conference. The motion lost. The recommendation of Resolutions and Appeals was adopted.

Motion—James L. Hyatt moved that the Committee on Interpretation set up a Sub-Committee to deal specifically with the Hyatt-Hatton Resolution. Adopted.

Davidson Resolution—A resolution from E. L. Davidson and others was presented by Francis Cunningham on behalf of the Resolutions and Appeals Committee as follows:

WHEREAS, one of the first priorities of a local church or charge is to provide adequate support for its ministers, and

WHEREAS, the carrying on of ministry in most situations demands a considerable expenditure by the minister for travel and other expenses, and

WHEREAS, there is a tendency for most people to lump together all that the minister receives, whether from salary, travel and expense allowance, or parsonage utilities and treat the total figures as if it were all net salary;

THEREFORE, be it resolved:

That the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church in session at Spartanburg, S. C., June 5-9, 1972, hereby requests:

1) The Pastor-Parish Relations Committees, the Finance Committees, and the Administrative Boards of each church or charge to study carefully the travel and other expenses incurred by the minister in serving said church or charge and to budget an account adequate to cover this.

2) That a similar study of parsonage utility items (electricity, water, telephone, heat) be made and an amount realistically arrived at be budgeted.

3) That the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance be requested that beginning the fiscal year 1973 all items that are apportioned as percentages of pastor's salary be apportioned on the salary item alone (excluding the travel and expense fund and the parsonage utilities fund).

4) That the above named committees and Administrative Board of the local church or charge study the feasibility of providing a car and its operating expense, maintenance, and insurance for the minister to use in his ministry. If a church elects to go this route it is envisioned that the policy concerning use would be worked out by the local church committees and the minister and would be similar to that of many businesses that furnish company cars for employees.

Administrative Restructuring—George Fields presented Wesley W. Boone Jr. for the report (See Report).

Recommendations 1, 2 and 3 were presented and these have been referred to the appropriate agencies.

The report was amended as follows: "We recommend that the Steering Committee shall continue through the Conference Year 1973, and shall be organized with the same officers of the same boards and agencies of the Conference".

The report as amended was adopted.

Request for Prayer—C. LeGrande Moody reported on two accidents (one to a member of the Conference, one to the father of a Minister) and requested prayer.

Order of the Day—Spartanburg Junior College—James S. Barrett, President, presented F. S. James, who read the following resolution:

Whereas, Spartanburg Junior College serves in mission through education for South Carolina United Methodists, and missional programs for students of special need have expanded enrollment from 509 to 1,111 in ten years, and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees recognizes the critical need for additional facilities and scholarships to enable and strengthen this dynamic movement as follows:

\$1,225,000	Classroom and Physical Education Building
\$ 500,000	Camak Memorial Auditorium
\$ 250,000	Renovation of Hammond Hall
\$ 900,000	Endowment
\$ 125,000	Library Expansion, and

Whereas, the Board of Missions of The South Carolina Annual Conference (85) also recognizes this need and recommends that a crusade for capital improvements and endowment be conducted in The South Carolina Annual Conference for Spartanburg Junior College, and

Whereas, the Spartanburg Junior College Board of Trustees and the Board of Missions have been granted approval by the Commission on World Service and Finance of The South Carolina Annual Conference (85) for a capital funds crusade for Spartanburg Junior College to total \$3,000,000; \$1,250,000 would be requested from the churches of the Annual Conference and \$1,750,000 be secured from sources outside the South Carolina Conference.

Be it therefore resolved,

1. That the South Carolina Conference conduct a financial crusade to yield \$1,250,000 for Spartanburg Junior College over a two-year period beginning April 1, 1973, and that the crusade will be directed by Spartanburg Junior College, using no outside professional assistance.

2. That the intensive phase of the campaign be conducted during February and March, 1973.

3. That the college conduct a series of sub-district and church-cluster-group meetings for familiarization with Spartanburg Junior College and its mission, program, and needs during October, November, December, 1972, and January, 1973.

4. That all local churches plan their schedules to give full cooperation during the crusade.

5. That each local church be challenged with a financial objective based on an equitable formula as its proportionate part of the conference goal, and that the Administrative Board of each local church be asked to accept this amount as its minimum objective.

6. That each local church be asked to determine its own method to implement its minimum objective.

7. That the Board of Missions, with the approval of the Bishop, select a Conference Crusade Steering Committee to work with the Board of Trustees of Spartanburg Junior College in implementing the Crusade.

8. That all funds raised in this crusade be paid by each local church treasurer (or a special treasurer if desired) to Spartanburg Junior College and the college will furnish an annual audit of the funds to each local church and the Commission on World Service and Finance.

9. That after the intensive phase of the crusade, all follow-up and reporting services will be conducted by Spartanburg Junior College. These services will be performed in cooperation with local church treasurers.

10. That during the various phases of this crusade, Mission Special Support for operations be maintained and increased because of the vital nature of this continuing support.

Dr. James moved it's adoption. Ben Hudnall, Conference Chairman of the Board of Missions, and M. B. Royster spoke on behalf of the resolution. Carlisle Smiley reported that this had been before the Commission of World Service and Finance and it was approved. Several members of the Conference spoke regarding Spartanburg Junior College.

The question was called. The Resolution was adopted.

F. S. James spoke appreciation for the Board of Trustees and James Barrett also spoke appreciation.

Board of Pensions—Cellis Woodard, Chairman, was presented for the report.

B. J. Cooper presented two matters: First, the names of Talmadge Stanton and W. L. J. Nelson were placed under Question 22(a). It was adopted. Second, Mrs. Julia M. Washington Daniels, 446 Alice Street, Lake City, S. C., be reinstated for pension credit. Her date of birth was August 31, 1900. She is the widow of the late Rev. E. M. Washington, who died October, 1948. It was adopted.

Commission on Insurance—Ted Morton, Secretary, asked permission for John R. Hannon, Regional Group Manager of Prudential Insurance Company, to speak to the Conference.

Ted Morton presented the report. (See Report)

Ministers' Registered—Dr. Broome announced that as of this time, 666 ministers have registered at the Conference.

Closing—The afternoon session closed with the Benediction by Claude Harper.

THIRD DAY

WEDNESDAY EVENING—JUNE 7, 1972

Opening—Bishop Paul Hardin called the Conference to order. Granville Hicks led in singing "Onward, Christian Soldiers", after which J. S. Dial led the Conference in prayer.

Personal Privilege—Bishop Paul Hardin introduced Bishop Cyrus B. Dawsey, who then spoke briefly to the Conference.

Order of the Day—The Standing Rules Committee then continued its report. Harry R. Mays, Secretary, presented the report. An additional Addenda Sheet was distributed to the Conference. Rule Number 8, pertaining to the Committee on Nominations was then presented to the Conference.

Motion—Harvey Floyd moved that we delete from Rule Number 8, Section A, paragraph C, the phrase, "whose membership arises from nominations from this Committee". After discussion, the Harvey Floyd motion was withdrawn.

Amendment—B. B. Brown moved that we add to Rule Number 8, under Rule 8, sub-heading A, the following: "when a person, lay or clerical, who is a member of this Committee, be nominated and elected from the floor, his or her membership on the Committee on Nominations shall cease".

Point of Order—James Medley questioned whether the motion was proper before the Conference. Bishop Paul Hardin ruled that it was.

Question—The question was called. The Bill Brown Amendment was defeated.

Question—The question was called on the main motion. Section 8, as presented in the green sheet Addenda by the Standing Rules Committee, was then adopted.

Rule Number 17—Rule 17 was presented.

Motion—George W. Watson moved that we delete Paragraph A, under Rule Number 17 of the green Addenda sheet. The motion was defeated.

Motion—Allen Long moved that we add to Rule Number 17, Section known as E, to read "that each local Church be asked to follow the recommendations in the manual for the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee concerning the minister's vacation, days off, pulpit supply, and continuing education".

Point of Order—Harry Kent raised a point of order that the motion presented by Allen Long was not germane to the rule being debated. The point was not sustained. The motion by Allen Long was defeated.

Amendment—Ed Ellis moved that we add to Rule Number 17, Paragraph B, these words, "to a limit of 7500 pounds, and \$50.00 for packing expenses".

Substitute—C. L. Moody moved that we add the wording found on page 227, The 1971 Journal & Yearbook, The 1785 Conference, at the bottom of the page, which pertains to the limits to which the church is expected to pay packing expenses. This substitute motion was accepted by Ed Ellis who made the original amendment. The amendment and substitute were then defeated.

Rule Number 17 as presented by the Standing Rules Committee was then adopted.

The Standing Rules Committee recommended that in Rule Number 15-D, the third line change the word "minister" to "member". It was adopted.

The Standing Rules Committee recommended that in Rule Number 13-D, after the words "Conference staff" insert the words, "and lay persons who are heads of Conference institutions supported by the Conference. It was adopted.

Move to Re-open—Harry R. Mays moved to re-open Standing Resolutions C, under Miscellaneous Resolutions. The motion was adopted. The Standing Rules Committee recommended a change to Standing Resolutions C, as follows: "In the Standing Resolutions 'C', change the title of section 4 from "Local Church Financial Reporting" to "Reporting the Total Support of the Ministers", after the word "minister" add "(including District Superintendents and ministers serving special appointments)"; and close the sentence with the word "salary" and delete the remainder of that sentence." It was adopted.

Section F of the green Addenda sheet was adopted as follows: "Add to Standing Resolutions after Paragraph C.2. (d) a new paragraph C.2. (e):

The Commission on World Service and Finance shall authorize payments from the Administrative Reserve Fund to pay the operating expenses for the seven month period, June-December, 1972, for newly formed Boards, Commissions and Committees established by the Annual Conference as per the following schedule: (1) one to five members at \$35 per member; (2) the next five members at \$30 per member; (3) the next five members at \$25 per member; (4) the next five members at \$20 per member; (5) all above 20 members at \$15 per member. Amounts in excess of the above schedule shall require prior approval of the Commission on World Service and Finance. Continuing support beyond this seven months period shall be by the usual procedure. It is recommended that, wherever feasible, established Boards, Commissions and Committees be assigned new duties rather than establishing additional structure.

Section H of the green Addenda sheet was adopted as follows: "Add to Standing Resolutions after Paragraph C.2. (e) and new Paragraph C.2. (f): The expenses of the Committee on Nominations shall be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

Section J of the green Addenda sheet was then presented as follows: In Standing Resolution C.2.d., delete the first sentence."

Motion—Franklin Buie moved "All funds not specifically directed shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer, and these shall include District Work Fund and District Specials".

Substitute—W. J. Vines moved a substitute for the Franklin Buie Amendment to read as follows, "that all funds from local churches to Conference

Boards, Agencies, Institutions, and Benevolences be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer".

Motion—F. S. James moved that we table the substitute and the amendment and accept the report of the Standing Rules Committee. The F. S. James motion was adopted.

Motion—Franklin Buie moved that the matter of specially directed funds be referred to the World Service Committee for study. The motion was adopted.

Move to Re-open—H. R. Mays moved that we re-open discussion of Rule 11 on the original report of the Standing Rules Committee. Move to re-open was adopted. Harry R. Mays then presented to the Conference Section G, on the green Addenda sheet relative to Rule 11 as follows: "Add after Paragraph 11.n., a new Paragraph 11.e., as follows: There shall be a Commission on Religion and Race which shall be composed of eight (8) members of the former Conference '66 (three of whom shall be ministers and five of whom shall be lay persons. At least one lay person shall be a youth, one shall be a young adult, and one shall be a woman.) and seven (7) members of the former Conference '67 (three of whom shall be ministers and four of whom shall be lay persons. At least one lay person shall be a youth, one shall be a young adult, and one shall be a woman.)"

Section G on the green Addenda sheet was adopted.

Move to Re-open—H. R. Mays moved to re-open discussion of Rule 13 on the original report of the Standing Rules Committee. The motion to re-open was adopted. Section I of the green Addenda sheet was then presented to the Conference as follows: "Change Standing Rule 13.a. to read as follows: A copy of any motion made on the Conference Floor shall be sent to the Secretary's desk as soon as the person making the motion returns to his or her seat."

It was adopted.

Motion—Allen Long moved an Amendment to Rule Number 13, to be known as 13-I, and to read as follows, "that each local church be asked to follow recommendations in the manual for the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee concerning the minister's vacation, days off, pulpit supply, and continuing education". The Allen Long motion was defeated.

H. R. Mays moved adoption of the report as a whole as amended with the privilege of editorial changes and other such changes as may be dictated by the Discipline.

Move to Re-open—Theron Few moved to re-open for discussion on the green Addenda sheet the section known as B, relative to Rule Number 17 on the original report of the Standing Rules Committee. The Theron Few move to re-open for consideration was defeated.

The report of the Standing Rules Committee as a whole was then adopted.

Personal Privilege—Harry R. Mays then expressed appreciation to those who are members of the Committee and the Conference for their cooperation.

Personal Privilege—J. A. Merchant then expressed appreciation to the Standing Rules Committee for their work.

Personal Privilege—Spencer Robinson, of the Rock Hill District, then spoke of appreciation of the Conference and the Clergy by the Laity.

Order of the Day—Spencer Rice informed the Conference that the Board of Missions had agreed to move their Order of the Day to 10:45 A.M. Thursday morning and allow the Board of Education an Order of the Day at 11:45 A.M. Thursday morning. It was adopted.

Announcements—The Secretary then made announcements and the Conference Session was adjourned with prayer by Bishop Paul Hardin.

THURSDAY MORNING—JUNE 8, 1972

Jones, Jr., and an individual statement of withdrawal which all members of the Cool Springs Methodist Church have signed.

In your Committee's decision we submit that you please consider the monies we will be losing in a recent constructed parsonage, and in reference to charge conference minutes, it was our understanding that we would have been protected by same.

After consulting with the congregation, we, therefore, make the United Methodist Conference an offer of \$5,000 for the properties we now use for worship service. We would continue to use the properties as a house of worship as an independent body at this time.

We pray that your consideration will be in our favor, that we might have your blessings in this new endeavor we have taken.

RESOLUTION ON JOURNAL AND YEARBOOK—

WHEREAS, the **Journal and Yearbook** of the South Carolina Conference contains a great deal of material that is needed at the earliest date that it can be released for use; and

WHEREAS, it has grown in size until it exceeds four hundred pages of material that requires many months to gather, edit and print; and

WHEREAS, the printers cannot deliver copies until the middle of December following the meeting of the Annual Conference in June; and

WHEREAS, the information for the statistical tables is available following the close of the fiscal year on December 31 and cannot be published in the **Journal and Yearbook** for release until the following December; and

WHEREAS, over one hundred pages is printed both in the Pre-Conference reports and later in the **Journal and Yearbook**; and

WHEREAS, it is an increasing difficulty to gather and edit all of the material during the months of June, July and August; and

WHEREAS, it is costing the Annual Conference between twelve and fifteen thousand dollars through the World Service and Conference Benevolence budget to print and distribute the copies to the ministers and the churches; **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:**

FIRST: that the **Journal and Yearbook** of the South Carolina Annual Conference be printed in four volumes to be released as follows:

Volume No. 1—to be released in the spring and to contain all pre-conference materials, including reports, program, calendar, memoirs, and all other such material that can be released before the meeting of the Annual Conference.

Volume No. 2—to be released in the summer and to contain the listing of the organization of the Conference (officers, boards, commissions, committees, etc.), the alphabetical roll and Conference directory, roll of lay members, Journal of proceedings, business of the Annual Conference and appointments.

Volume No. 3—to be released in the fall and to contain additional reports not printed in other issues, the Standing Rules and Resolutions, ministerial records and historical information.

Volume No. 4—to be released in the winter and to contain all of the statistical information on the districts and churches and the audit of the Treasurer of the Annual Conference.

Second: that the **Journal and Yearbook** be distributed to all individuals and churches desiring a copy or copies at the rate of \$4.00 per year for the four volumes on a prepaid basis only. This subscription price to cover the cost of printing, mailing, handling and postage and any additional costs as the subscription money will allow.

Third: that a free subscription be provided to each member of the Annual Conference, both lay and clerical.

Fourth: that the churches will be requested to buy copies for distribution to those persons desiring and needing them. These copies to be purchased on a prepaid basis only as the church desires to make them available to their own officials.

FIFTH: that the World Service and Finance Commission be requested to include in the budget for conference benevolences a sufficient amount to cover the subscriptions sent to Conference members, and such other amount as may be necessary to insure the full payment for the publication of the **Journal and Yearbook** over and above the amount received on paid subscriptions.

Sixth: that the publication of the **Journal and Yearbook** be begun on this basis as soon as this process can be set up and put into effect but not later than the spring of 1973.

The Committee recommended concurrence. This was adopted.

Presentation—Francis Cunningham introduced Dr. Robert Lundy to the Conference. Dr. Lundy is the Secretary of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Council.

Announcements—Announcements were made by the Secretary.

Recess—The Conference was recessed.

Opening—The Conference convened following recess by singing "Lord, I Want To Be A Christian", and prayer by Bishop Hardin.

Order of the Day—The Order of the Day for the Board of Missions was called and M. B. Hudnall, Chairman, was presented. He introduced Robert Davenport, who spoke of the mission services of certain laymen from our Conference. He paid special tribute to Michael Watson and George Straight. Dr. Watson reported to the Conference and said that more than fifty laymen have served overseas and given special service there to over fifty thousand people. Dr. Watson spoke of the mission plans for the coming year.

M. B. Hudnall presented the laymen who have served overseas mission service. Bishop Hardin presented these with certificates of recognition. W. T. Holroyd was presented and called attention to the mission interpretation emphasis planned for this fall throughout the South Carolina Annual Conference.

Wallace Fridy introduced Dr. Bill Starnes, of the Board of Missions, who addressed the Conference.

Mr. Hudnall presented Mr. and Mrs. Dwight Strong, Missionaries to Korea who spoke briefly to the Conference.

Report Number 3—Board of Missions—(See Report) Harvey Floyd read the report, adding in line 8, following the word "ministry", the word "and campus ministry". Claude Harper spoke on the mission nature of campus ministry and referred to the report of the Board of Education (See Board of Education Report Number 1, Campus Ministry).

Motion—Michael Watson, Chairman, Minimum Salary Commission, made the following motion:

"I move to re-open Minimum Salary".

Order of the Day—James Medley moved that an order of the Day be set for the first thing Friday morning, 9:00 A.M., for the report of the Board of Christian Social Concerns. The Order of the Day was set.

Order of the Day—The Board of Education Report which had been set as an Order of the Day for 11:45 A.M. was presented.

James A. Bradley, presented the report's joint planning process.

Claude R. Harper introduced Wesley Voigt, who spoke briefly to the Conference about the Methodist Camp.

Joe Alley, Coordinator of Youth Ministries, spoke to the Conference about Youth Encounter 1972.

Dr. Harper then introduced H. V. Manning, President of Claflin College, who spoke briefly to the Conference about Claflin.

Dr. Harper then introduced R. W. Spears, President of Columbia College, who spoke to the Conference about higher education, commendations for Spartanburg Junior College, Claflin, Wofford, and expressed appreciation particularly for the leadership of Paul Hardin, III, and then spoke briefly to the Conference about the interest of Columbia College.

Dr. Harper introduced Paul Hardin, III, who expressed appreciation to the Conference and spoke about higher education and Wofford College.

Eugene Mullikin, Secretary, then presented the report of the Board of Education.

Motion—James Copeland moved "that three practicing lawyers be selected by the South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church, to study the will of Benjamin Wofford and all related documents pertaining to that will, having to do with Wofford College, in order to ascertain the exact relationship of the South Carolina Conference to Wofford College. After discussion, the Copeland motion failed.

Motion—James Copeland then moved "that the South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church go on record as opposing the "open dorm" experiments at Wofford College and that the Administration and Trustees be advised that the South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church will oppose any policy on their part which may allow members of the opposite sex to be dated in the dormitory rooms of students at Wofford College". The Copeland motion was defeated.

Announcements—The Conference Secretary, Allan R. Broome, then made announcements. Bishop Hardin called attention to the fact that the report from the Board of Education was not finished and allowed Eugene Mullikin to proceed with that report.

Announcements—The Conference Secretary, Allan R. Broome, then made announcements. Bishop Hardin called attention to the fact that the report from the Board of Education was not finished and allowed Eugene Mullikin to proceed with that report.

Report Number 2—Ordered to Record. (See Report)

Report Number 3—Ordered to Record. (See Report)

Report Number 4—Ordered to Record. (See Report)

Report Number 5—Was presented and Spencer Rice made nominations that were elected. (See Report) Report Number 5 was then adopted.

Report Number 6—Adopted. (See Report) Nominations were elected.

Report Number 7—Adopted (See Report) The nominees were elected and those eligible for re-election were re-elected.

Report Number 8—Adopted.

The report of the Board of Education as a whole was adopted.

Announcements—Announcements were then completed by the Conference Secretary, Allan R. Broome. The Conference was dismissed with a prayer by Bishop Hardin.

FOURTH DAY

THURSDAY AFTERNOON—JUNE 8, 1972

Opening—The Conference was called to order by Bishop Hardin. Thom Jones led in singing "Come, Thou Almighty King". Prayer was offered.

Privilege—E. W. Hardin, as a point of personal privilege, spoke words of gratitude to his brother, Bishop Paul Hardin, and to his nephew, Paul Hardin, III, President of Wofford College, for the association which he had had with them across the years of their relationship to the Annual Conference and to Wofford College.

Conference Entertainment—E. W. Hardin presented an invitation from Wofford College for the Conference Session 1973. It was noted that the former Conference of 1866, had previously accepted a similar invitation from Wofford College to meet here in 1973. F.G.C. DuBois affirmed acceptance of the 1866 Conference last year. The Conference then accepted the invitation of Wofford College to meet on their campus in 1973.

Motion—F.G.C. DuBois then moved that we accept the invitation of Wofford College to meet here in 1974. The invitation was accepted.

Order of the Day—The Report of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, was presented by Ben Barnes, Chairman.

Report Number 1—Moved to record. (See Report)

Report Number 2—Moved to record. (See Report)

Report Number 3—Was presented. (See Report)

Harry Chandler was then recognized. After speaking of the history of the origination and building of the Methodist Home in Greenwood, Dr. Chandler introduced the Executive Director, Ted R. Morton, who spoke briefly to the Conference relative to the Greenwood Methodist Home. Report Number 3 was then moved to record.

Report Number 4—The Methodist Homes Campaign Continuing Committee, B. B. Barnes then recognized Charles A. Graves, Chairman of the Committee, who presented the report. (See Report)

Ted Morton presented the recommendations. He amended the final report by reducing the operating budget by 1/2. The report, as amended, was adopted.

Report Number 5—To record without reading. (See Report)

Report Number 6—Ordered to record without reading. (See Report)

Report Number 7—Recommendations amended by changing the last of the report to read "dates to be October 18, 19, 25 and 26". The report as amended was adopted.

Committee on Introductions—Paul Hardin, III, presented Robert Stoddard, Mayor of Spartanburg, who brought greetings to the Conference.

Ed Ellis presented Thomas A. Langford, Dean of Duke Divinity School.

Report Number 8—Nominations—The following substitutes and additions were made to the report: The name H. W. McMillan, Greenville, was substituted for W. B. Cox, Mullins, as a lay trustee of the Orangeburg Home. Mrs. Bernetha Boone, Florence, was added as a lay member to the South Carolina Methodist Agency for the Retarded. The nominations as amended were adopted and the persons named were elected.

Report Number 9—Ordered to record. (See Report)

ence Secretary, Allan R. Broome. The Conference was dismissed with a prayer

Report Number 9—Ordered to record. (See Report)

The report was ordered to the record.

The report as a whole was then adopted.

Courtesies and Introductions—Bishop Paul Hardin introduced to the Conference, Dr. Robert F. Lundy, who spoke to the Conference on behalf of Lake Junaluska Assembly and the Southeastern Jurisdictional Council.

Bishop Hardin then introduced the Reverend W. L. Buffington, who spoke on behalf of Paine College, and who then presented the Reverend J. E. Robinson, who spoke on behalf of Paine College.

Francis T. Cunningham then asked Paul Hardin, III, President of Wofford College, to bring to the platform Mrs. Paul Hardin, Jr., wife of Bishop Hardin, who spoke brief words of gratitude and thanks to the Annual Conference.

Program Council—B. J. Cooper spoke to the Conference. Claude Harper presented Matthew McCollom, Conference Program Director of the former 1866 Conference, who spoke to the Conference.

Wallace Fridy, Program Director for the former 1785 Conference, was presented and spoke to the Conference.

Thurman Vickery was presented for the Committee on Interpretation. The Report was moved to record. Approved.

Motion—J. E. Spears moved "Because of the specialized nature of their work, I wish to offer a motion that our Conference extend to the Program Directors a rising vote of thanks". This was approved.

Women's Society of Christian Service—Mrs. Beulah Baxley, President of the WSCS of the former 1866 Conference, was presented and spoke to the Conference. Mrs. Roy Parker, President of the WSCS of the former 1785 Conference, spoke to the Conference.

Order of the Day—Board of Evangelism—J. O. Gilliam was presented for the report.

Report Number 1—Order to record.

Report Number 2—Program and budget was read and adopted.

Report Number 3—William Stokes, Co-Chairman, was presented for the report of Evangelism (1866 Conference). This was ordered to record.

Report of a Special Task Force—The 1971 Session of the Annual Conference requested the Board of Evangelism to bring to the 1972 Annual Conference a definition of Evangelism. A task force was established for this purpose and a visual presentation was made as the report of this task force.

Fletcher Carter was presented and spoke on special studies which have been conducted in local churches. He made the following recommendation: "We recommend that this Annual Conference instruct the Program Council, its member Boards and Agencies, to study the needs that have been discovered during the Year of Stewardship and to plan program that will minister to these needs, to develop leadership and resource to implement these programs, to bring these back to the Conference for approval and funding at its adjourned session this fall."

This was passed.

"We recommend that all fifteen district Program Councils send its Director of Evangelism to the Junaluska Candler Camp meeting this summer."

This was approved.

"We recommend that this Annual Conference accept as a place to start, this new definition of Evangelism as presented through script, music, and slides."

This was adopted.

Announcements—Announcements were made by the Secretary and others.

Closing—Bishop Hardin dismissed the Conference with the benediction.

FOURTH DAY

THURSDAY EVENING—JUNE 8, 1972

The Thursday evening session of the South Carolina Conference was held at Bethel United Methodist Church in Spartanburg, South Carolina. The Ordination Sermons was preached by Bishop Lloyd C. Wicke, resident Bishop, the New York Area, Northeastern Jurisdiction. His subject was "Now That I have Become A Man" based on the thirteenth chapter of I Corinthians.

Ordination of Deacons—Dr. George S. Duffie, Sr., Chairman of the Board of the Ministry (Conference 1785), and Dr. Allan R. Broome, Secretary of the South Carolina Conference, called the names of those elected to Deacon's Orders and presented them to Bishop Hardin for ordination. They were ordained by Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., Bishop Cyrus B. Dawsey, and Bishop Lloyd C. Wicke, thus answering Question 32 "Who have been ordained deacons?" (See list in the Business of the Annual Conference.)

Ordination of Elders—Rev. Collie L. Moore, Chairman of the Board of the Ministry (Conference 1866), and Dr. Allan R. Broome, Secretary of the South Carolina Conference, called the names of those elected to Elders Orders and presented them to Bishop Hardin for ordination. They were ordained by Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., Bishop Cyrus B. Dawsey, and Bishop Lloyd C. Wicke, thus answering question 34 "Who have been ordained Elders?" (See list in the Business of the Annual Conference.)

FIFTH DAY

FRIDAY MORNING—JUNE 9, 1972

Opening—Bishop Paul Hardin called the Conference to Order. Granville Hicks led in singing, "I Am Thine, O Lord", after which the prayer was led by Bishop Paul Hardin.

Committee on Conference Journals—Dannye Bragdon reported that all was in order through the morning of the fourth day of the Conference session. The report was adopted.

Courtesies and Introductions—Francis T. Cunningham presented Mrs. Carol Snyder of the Conference Secretarial Staff for words of appreciation to her from the Annual Conference.

Board of the Ministry—Bishop Hardin then nominated members of the Board of the Ministry. (See Boards, Commissions and Committees). They were affirmed.

Order of the Day—Christian Social Concerns—G. S. Duffie, Jr., Secretary, introduced the report and expressed words of appreciation from Rhett Jackson, Chairman, who was not present at this moment.

J. W. Robinson then presented the report.

Report Number 1—Moved to record. (See Report)

Report Number 2—Amended by adding a paragraph from the addenda. Report Number 2 was ordered to record.

Report Number 3—Amended by adding a paragraph to Item 12, Section A. John Murry moved to add a paragraph Number 13 to Report Number 3. Bishop Hardin requested that this be delayed to the proper time. Report Number 3 down to "Recommendations" was moved to the record. It was done.

Recommendations Report Number 3—

Recommendation Number 1—Presented by James Medley. Adopted.

Recommendation Number 2—Presented by Matthew McCollom. Mickey Fisher made the following Substitute: "I move that the Recommendation Number 2 of this report be deleted and that the Board of Christian Social Concerns be instructed to design a program whereby the United Methodist People of South Carolina may engage in an all out effort to come to grips with the drug abuse problem from a wholistic perspective." The Board accepted the substitute and it was adopted.

Recommendation Number 3—James Medley stated that the first paragraph was information and moved that it be accepted as information. Adopted. Herbert Floyd presented the recommendation and James Medley presented the rationale for this resolution.

The Minority Report—Joe Sowell, who was a part of the minority presenting the report, stated that three of the five of the minority had a brief meeting and would like to present the following as a part of the minority report: "I move you, sir, that we delete the two final paragraphs of this recommendation beginning with the words 'be it further resolved'." Bishop Hardin stated that this was perfecting the majority report and called for the reading of the minority report.

The question was raised as to whether or not the minority report as printed was really a minority report or just opposition to the majority report. The Bishop continued to maintain that first the report must be read.

An additional question was raised as to whether or not the minority report was valid since it carried no signatures.

Joe Sowell, a part of those presenting the minority report, suggested that the minority report be forgotten in order to make amendments to the majority report. The Bishop stated that this was acceptable.

Amendment—Joe Sowell then moved to amend as follows: "I move you, sir, that we delete the last two paragraphs of the report which has just been read beginning with the words 'be it further resolved'."

Point of Order—George Whitaker rose to a Point of Order. He stated that since the minority report appears in the Pre-Conference Journal it, therefore is properly before this body. In order to clarify the situation so there will be no misunderstanding, I move that we delete the entire section from the Pre-Conference Report entitled, "Minority Report." There was a second.

Point of Order—Joe Sowell raised a Point of Order, "do we not already have a motion on the floor with a second?" The Bishop sustained the point and Mr. Sowell requested permission to speak to the motion.

The Bishop ruled that you can only debate this motion if the house assumed that there is no minority report that makes a motion to adopt anything. Will you accept that?

Point of Order—The point was raised that there were two motions to delete on the Conference floor at one time—to delete the minority report and to delete a section of the majority report. The chair has ruled that you must determine what you are going to do with the minority report before you can do anything with the major report.

Substitute Motion—Bill Vines moved that we accept the minority report as information. This was adopted.

Ruling—The Bishop rules that there was still a motion on the floor which dealt with the deletion of the last two paragraphs of the majority report. Joe Sowell was then given permission to speak to the motion before the house.

Substitute for the Amendment—McKay Brabham moved to substitute the following for the amendment presented by Mr. Sowell. The substitute was as follows: "I would move to amend to make the last two paragraphs to read in this manner. 'Be it further resolved that we call upon the United Methodist people of South Carolina to vote against HR 2680 and HR 2681, commonly known as the mini bottle legislation at the poles of South Carolina on November 7, 1972.' The second part of this amendment would be the inclusion of the final original paragraph minus the 1972 figure before General Assembly." There was a second.

Mr. Sowell said that he would accept this substitute.

The Question was called.

The Brabham Amendment was passed and Recommendation Number 3, as amended, was passed.

Motion—W. W. McNeil moved an additional section to Report Number 3, to read as follows: "Be it resolved that we call upon each local church work area in Christian Social Concerns to seek out the resources available in the area of drug and alcohol abuse, prevention and treatment, (examples: the Appalachian Regional Council Division on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, Mental Health Centers, etc), and that we offer our resources and talents in a joint, community-wide effort in dealing with this sickness in our society." It was adopted.

Amendment—Harry R. Kent moved that we add to the previously adopted Amended Section Number 3 (The Brabham Amendment) these words, "and that, regardless of which of the options may be approved by the public in South Carolina, we petition the legislature to continue to seek better and wiser controls." The Kent Amendment was adopted.

Amendment—John Murray moved an addition to Report Number 3, to be known as New Section Number 4, under recommendations, the following: "We were told in the 1960's that the war in Vietnam was a fight against the spread of international communism as sponsored by Russia and China. Yet, our President has just returned from conferences in Peking and Moscow. The Vietnam War is therefore revealed to be a local war where the interests of the United States are not involved.

Therefore, be it resolved, that the South Carolina Conference of United Methodist Church affirm its support of (1) immediate withdrawal of all our armed forces from Vietnam, (2) the immediate cessation of bombing and other acts of war, (3) the immediate return of all prisoners of war."

Substitute—M. D. Moore moved a substitute motion to the Murray Amendment to read: "WHEREAS the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church recognizes the atheistic nature of the Communist philosophy and reaffirms the total incompatibility of the teachings of Jesus Christ and the teachings of Communist philosophy, and,

WHEREAS, the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church affirms its Christian conviction that war is incompatible with the Christian ethics as a means of resolving international differences, and,

WHEREAS, the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church confesses such ignorance of those military, political, and diplomatic factors involved in the Vietnam conflict as to render impossible any intelligent demand upon the governments of the involved nations,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the South Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church hereby pledge its prayerful support to all those efforts which are being directed toward the attainment of a just and lasting peace in Vietnam, Southeast Asia, and all the world."

Question—Donald Burnett moved the previous question. The question was called. The M. D. Moore Substitute carried and became an addition to Section Number 3, under recommendations to be known as Section Number 4.

Motion—Theron Few moved that in Section Number 3, under recommendations, we strike the second paragraph beginning with the second "whereas" in its entirety and delete the first seven words of the third line in the following paragraph: "the complexity of pluralism in regard to".

Point of Order—A point of order was raised as to whether Section Number 3 was still properly before us.

Motion—to re-open. It was moved that Section Number 3 be re-opened for consideration. The move to re-open was passed.

The Theron Few motion was then adopted.

Reconsideration of Report Number 2—Francis Cunningham moved to re-open Report Number 2 of the Board of Christian Social Concerns. It was re-opened.

Motion—Francis Cunningham moved "I move that Report Number 2 of the Board of Christian Social Concerns be changed from its present position as added as a personal privilege of the Chairman at the end of the Report and received as information." This was adopted.

Motion—James Copeland moved to amend Report Number 3, recommendations by adding the following: "I move that the South Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church recommend to the Administration and Trustees of Wofford College that the College be returned to a "No alcoholic beverage on campus" policy, and that any student not wishing to conform to the discipline, be advised to attend a college which conforms more to their style."

Substitute—Donald Burnett moved a substitute for the Copeland Motion as follows: "Be it resolved that we recommend that all institutions of South Carolina United Methodism seek to abide by the spirit of the principles embodied in these resolutions."

Substitute for the Substitute—LeGrande Moody moved a Substitute for the Burnett Substitute as follows: "I move that we leave the matter of dealing with alcoholic beverages in all our institutions in the hands of the Trustees of our institutions."

Question—The question was called.

The Moody Substitute—passed by a vote of 332 to 288. The Moody Substitute became the Original Motion and was passed. The Report as a whole was adopted.

Resolution of Appreciation—Ralph Cannon presented a resolution of appreciation to Rhett Jackson as follows:

WHEREAS, Rhett Jackson will this year complete eight years of imaginative and courageous leadership of his Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns; and

WHEREAS, his compassionate self-giving has sustained the very life of the Alston Wilkes Society, the Christian Action Council, the Columbia Urban Service Center, and other such instruments of justice and mercy; and

WHEREAS, along with his able and dedicated co-chairman, Dr. Matthew McCollom, he led the joint Committee on Merger through long hours of detailed and difficult decision-making, during which many persons in the two conferences learned to love, respect, and trust each other, and through which the essential groundwork for union was laid;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this first united session of the South Carolina Conference express to Rhett Jackson our profound gratitude for his history-making leadership and our abiding admiration for his Christian strength and consecration."

This was adopted.

Announcements—Announcements were made by the Secretary.

Recess—The Conference recessed.

Bishop Hardin reconvened the Conference with Prayer.

Report of the Committee on Publication of Conference Journal and Yearbook—Christopher Poole, Secretary, moved Reports Numbers 1, 2, and 3 to record. They were moved to record.

Ecumenical Affairs—Chad Davis, Chairman of the 1885 Conference Committee on Ecumenical Affairs, moved to record the report without reading. It was ordered to record.

Board of the Laity—Harry Kent, Conference Lay Leader, presented the report.

Report Number 1—Adopted.

Report Number 2—Ordered to record.

Report Number 3—Adopted.

Mr. Kent presented Fletcher Carter, Program Counselor, who spoke to the Conference.

Mr. Kent presented H. D. Smith, who made nominations. (See Report Number 4). They were elected.

The report of the Order of the Laity as a whole was adopted.

Personal Privilege—Bishop Hardin expressed gratitude on behalf of himself and Mrs. Hardin for all of the kindnesses and generosity which had been shown to them by the Annual Conference.

Bishop Hardin then introduced H. V. Manning, the President of Claflin College, who spoke on behalf of the Black College Fund established by the General Conference.

Motion—A motion was made from the floor that we support this fund.

Special Appointments—D. W. Reese, Cabinet Secretary, made special appointments. The appointments of Wiley B. Cooper, Jon G. Linder and Vernon Baur were added to the original list. The report was adopted.

Nominations for General Boards—Richard Seignious presented nominations for General Church Boards from the Nominating Committee. These were elected as the nominees.

LeGrande Moody, Jr., made the following motion: "I move that we request our newly assigned Bishop to re-convene this Annual Conference to meet on October 3 and 4, 1972 for the purpose of electing members of Conference Boards, Commissions, and Committees; to adopt a Conference Budget for the Calendar year 1973, and to attend to any other business which the Conference or the Bishop may deem important or necessary." The motion was adopted.

Motion—Hawley Lynn moved that the adjourned session of the Annual Conference on October 3 and 4, 1972, meet in the Township Auditorium in Columbia if it is available on that date.

Amendment—M. D. Moore moved that if the Township Auditorium is not available, that we move to the Coliseum

Substitute Motion—Harvey Floyd moved that the adjourned session be in Spartanburg Memorial Auditorium.

Amendment—Harry Kent moved an amendment to the Floyd Substitute "if we can determine whether adequate motel space is available". The Kent Amendment was accepted by Mr. Floyd.

The Substitute Motion made by Mr. Floyd lost.

Substitute—James D. Hood, Jr., moved that we go to the Columbia Township Auditorium for the adjourned session, if this auditorium is not available that we go back to Spartanburg.

The Substitute motion was adopted.

Motion—M. D. Moore moved that we begin the session of the Adjourned Session of Annual Conference at noon time if we meet in Spartanburg. The motion was lost.

The Conference then voted to recommend that we ask the new Bishop to set the time of day for the meeting of the Conference.

Announcements—The Conference Secretary then made announcements.

Board of the Ministry—H. T. Risher moved to re-open Question 43. The motion was granted. He moved to add the name of C. S. Ferguson. He was added.

Personal Privilege—Robert Mack presented a check to Omega Newman as a contribution for a trip to Africa.

Offering for Jenkins Orphanage—Bishop Hardin announced that this offering will be taken this afternoon.

Announcements—Further announcements were then made by the Conference Secretary and the Conference session was dismissed until the afternoon.

FIFTH DAY

FRIDAY AFTERNOON—JUNE 9, 1972

Opening—Bishop Hardin called the Conference to order and Grand Marshal Hicks led the singing of "Trust in the Lord". Bishop Hardin led in prayer.

Resolutions and Appeals—Francis Cunningham, Chairman presented a resolution from William B. Pierce of Greenville as follows: "WHEREAS, has become a matter of national policy to observe many holidays by so-called long week-ends which include Saturday, Sunday, and Monday; and

WHEREAS, this national policy is determined by the Congress of the United States of America which is sensitive to the desires of the citizenry. Therefore be it

RESOLVED, that

1. The South Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, in session at Spartanburg, South Carolina, does call upon the citizenry of this state to consider the implications of this policy on national holidays as it affects church life;

2. That the agencies of United Methodism are urged to consider the possibility of seeking through lobbying to affect a change in this national policy to substitute Friday for Monday in these long weekends.

3. That inter-church cooperation, as evidenced in the Key '73 evangelism program, be sought to gain a broad based program of support for a change of national policy for long week-ends so that Friday is substituted for Monday in each instance; and

4. That we call upon the general church agencies of The United Methodist Church, and especially the Council on Ministries, to consider this as a priority matter in the planning of our Church's program in the current decade.

Dr. Cunningham moved that this be referred to the Board of Christian Social Concerns. This was referred.

Board of Missions—Ben Hudnall chaired the total presentation and introduced members of the former 1866 Conference for their report.

Willis Goodwin called attention to Priority Church Extension Program. He deleted the first project, Building of a Sanctuary at Laurens, and added the following "a Church and Educational Building on Young Island at a cost of \$80,000.00. Merger of churches at Eddeton—\$2,500.00." This Section amended was approved and adopted as Conference Mission Special Program.

Town and Country Work—This was presented by George Manigo and ordered to record.

Urban Ministries—Omega Newman moved that Sections Numbers 1, 2 and 3 be ordered to record. He added a section for dealing with Missions Special for Campus Work. Chad Davis moved that this be coordinated with the Board of Education's Campus Ministries Program. This was accepted. Section Number 4 was approved.

Advance Specials—Advance Specials from the former 1866 Conference were discussed by DeQuincy Newman. He deleted Number 1, "United Methodist Work in Porta Rica" and added a new Number 1, "United Methodist Church in Rhodesia" for a water system. This report was approved and amended.

M. B. Hudnall made the report for the former 1785 Conference.

Report Number 1—Ordered to record.

Report Number 2—Ordered to record.

Report Number 4—Ordered to record.

Report Number 5—Was presented by Bill Kinnett, who offered the nomination in this report. Pastoral Care and Counseling—Tom Brittan moved the report to record. Iverson Graham, Jr., was presented and spoke to the Conference.

Public Relations and Methodist Information—Bob E. Parsons moved to record with typographical changes. It was adopted.

Resolution—Bob E. Parsons moved:

"In view of the merger of The South Carolina Conference, 1785 and 1866, the reorganization of Annual Conference Structures which this union of the two Conferences requires, and the delay which is necessary in submitting annual Conference program planning the members of the Annual Conference Ad Hoc Committee on Communications submit the following request:

"That the Annual Conference extend the function of the Ad Hoc Committee on Communications until the June, 1972 session of the Annual Conference."

"That the report of the Ad Hoc Committee on Communications be presented to this fall session of the Annual Conference."

The resolution was adopted.

(2) That words of gratitude for detail planning and excellent execution of these plans be conveyed to our official hosts: Dr. Paul Hardin, III, and the Wofford staff, Dr. A. McKay Brabham and the Rev. J. E. Spears, District Superintendents, and Dr. F. T. Cunningham, and the Rev. Ed Ellis, and the Rev. T. H. Fisher, Jr., Host pastors;

(3) That grateful thanks be given to two groups without whose guidance and help the work could never have been accomplished, the Continuing Committee of Six and the Joint Committee on Standing Rules, whose preparation and presentation of the Standing Rules was a tremendous undertaking;

(4) That we give our praise to God for His leadership, guidance and inspiration given to those who planned and led our Service of Union. Mr. Glenn Draper and the combined choirs were an inspiration. Bishop James S. Thomas challenged us with his probing thoughts and the sincerity of his purpose. The symbolic joining of the various groups and interests of the two former Conferences fulfilled a long awaited hope. The sharing of the body and blood of Christ reminded us of our oneness in Him. We praise God for the celebration of merger experienced in the service and are grateful to all who participated;

(5) That we give our thanks to Bishop Lloyd C. Wicke for his message at the Ordination Service, but our real thanks are to God for such a messenger as Bishop Wicke. Our appreciation goes to all who assisted in the service;

(6) That thanks be expressed to those who recorded the proceedings of the Conference; to Dr. Allan R. Broome, the stenographer and assistant secretaries; the Rev. W. C. Reid, Dr. Bryan Crenshaw and Rev. J. L. Boone, Jr.; to the Rev. Grady Newman and his TRAFICO assistants; and to the Conference Registrars. Appreciation is expressed to the pages for their gracious helpfulness. We commend those responsible for informing the public of the happenings of the Conference.

(7) That words of thankfulness be expressed for Conference members lay and clerical, who were willing to work through many problems with understanding and patience to make sure that the new Conference was built on equality and fairness to all. The spirit of cooperation between board committees, commissions and agencies of the two former Conferences in presenting a united approach in their reports and projected plans was very helpful;

(8) That our gratitude be expressed to the Rev. Granville Hicks and the Rev. Thom Jones for leading the singing and to Mrs. Omega Newman for playing the organ;

(9) That we express our pleasure for the presence of two beloved persons—Mrs. Paul Hardin, Jr., and Bishop Cyrus B. Dawsey. They are always an inspiration to us;

(10) That the Conference express its deep love and gratefulness in spirit to Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., who with patience and understanding guided the affairs of this Conference. His fairness to all, his impartial treatment of all, his willingness to allow the Conference to express itself and find the desired course of action, his enduring good humor, his patience in working through complex problems, and above all, his demonstration of a life filled with God's Spirit and the willingness to permit the Spirit to control his attitudes and actions are deeply appreciated;

(11) That our praise and thanksgiving be given to Almighty God for leading us to and through these events in the life of United Methodism in South Carolina. We are grateful that under His guidance we have become one in name and have made a real start in becoming one in spirit, purpose, fellowship and direction. With humbleness of heart, we are thankful to God who through His leadership of the minds and hearts of men made this union possible, and may we claim His priceless gifts, given in time for eternity, and go on to perfection."

It was adopted.

Second Resolution—A special resolution regarding Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr. and Mrs. Hardin was read as follows:

RESOLUTION OF APPRECIATION

WHEREAS, since 1960 Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr. has been the Episcopal leader of the Columbia area of the United Methodist Church, and

WHEREAS, the rules of the United Methodist Church require his retirement in July, 1972, and

WHEREAS, Bishop Hardin has made a lasting contribution to United Methodism in South Carolina and to the lives of many people

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

(1) That Bishop Hardin be thanked for consistently expressing patience and understanding toward laymen and clergy of the Church;

(2) That he be applauded for protecting the structure of the Church with determination, even when this protection required his involvement in the courts;

(3) That words of gratitude be conveyed to him for the countless hours spent in travel, attempting to be where his Church needed him. Many United Methodist Churches of South Carolina, both large and small, have received special visits by the Bishop. He has flown all over the world on the Church's business;

(4) That Bishop Hardin be commended for having distinguished himself and the United Methodist Conferences of South Carolina as no other bishop of our time as a fearless, tireless and dedicated leader of world Methodism. His responsibilities as Chairman of the Council of Bishops and Chairman of World Service and Finance have been discharged ably and effectively;

(5) That Bishop Hardin be thanked for his willingness, regardless of personal cost in popularity, to express his convictions to the people of South Carolina on important controversial issues. One thinks of his objection to certain liquor proposals, his outspoken support of brotherhood among the races, equal employment, public education, drugs, poverty, population control and the ecology;

(6) That appreciation be expressed to the Bishop for organizing and sponsoring three Convocations which called together the Church's leadership for inspiration, training and growth in the Faith;

(7) That words of gratitude be conveyed to the Bishop for sharing with United Methodist people his personal notes through the weekly Advocate. These personal insights and reflections have been marvelous means of communication between the Bishop and his people;

(8) That Bishop Hardin be thanked for his constant willingness to engage in dialogue. During pastors schools, in special grievance sessions and in his office, the Bishop's availability to his people has contributed substantially to the Church's progress;

(9) That Bishop Hardin be commended for promoting consultation in the making of pastoral appointments. Developments in this area have boosted clergy morale and strengthened the appointment process;

(10) That Bishop Hardin be thanked for bringing United Methodism in South Carolina to that high point of union celebrated on Monday, June 5, 1972. The merger of two racially divided annual conferences could not have been accomplished without the Bishop's forthright leadership. His grace and sense of fair play helped cool animosities and promote cooperation. When history passes out credit for the unity of South Carolina Methodism, Bishop Hardin will be the leading recipient. He has given to his people of both races an exciting vision of what it means to be one in Christ.

(11) That in the alphabet an "i" is not an "i" without a dot, and our Bishop is not our Bishop without his Dot. The familiar words "Dot and I" have often spoken to us of the closeness, support, dependence, love and affection that exists between the two. Mrs. Hardin has walked beautifully, gracefully, and honorably through South Carolina as the First Lady of United Methodism. We have been justly proud and thankful for her. Her personal loveliness, charming manner, friendly personality and sincerity have "strangely warmed" our hearts.

(12) That Bishop and Mrs. Hardin shall know that our prayers, love and best wishes go with them. We wish for them good health, meaningful activities, many enjoyable years. We shall always have an interest in their well-

being and shall always be delighted with a visit from them. We do not expect to replace First Church, Birmingham, as the top spot in their affections, but we assure them that they have top spot in our hearts. We are grateful to God for the work of the Holy Spirit in the decisions of men that caused Paul and Dot Hardin to come our way. In prayerful thankfulness we say to them:



SECTION VI**STATE OF THE CHURCH**

Address Delivered By Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr.
 At S. C. Annual Conference on June 6, 1972

In this brief statement no effort is made to deal with some of the grave issues of the day such as war, poverty, ignorance, pollution, drug abuse and relative concerns of all responsible society. The recent General Conference has attempted to express itself on such matters and the Annual Conference will likely do the same.

It is impossible for me to write of the State of the Church at this particular time as a report to this particular Annual Conference session without injecting a strongly personal note.

I am grateful to God and to the United Methodist Church for allowing me to return to my native state for the last three quadrennia of my active ministry. During the thirty-three years that I spent in the ministry outside South Carolina I felt at times the underlying urge to return but never quite saw the way to that accomplishment. When transfers were offered there always seemed to be valid reasons to decline them. Then the Church took the matter out of my hands. In 1960 I was elected to the Episcopacy and assigned to the Columbia Area.

This turn of events itself brought certain anxieties to my mind. I realized that I had become the bishop of a number of men whom I had known in school and college, native South Carolinians themselves who had scarcely thought of me in terms of the ministry and certainly not in terms of the Episcopacy. I pause here to express my deep appreciation of the brotherly manner in which they and others received me and of the splendid cooperation which they have given me.

The past twelve years have not been easy ones but then I never expected them to be. We spent the latter part of 1960 opening a new office in a newly created Area and trying to get acquainted with the people of the state which I had left thirty-three years earlier. Scarcely had we settled down when Bishop Bachman Hodge died and I was given the additional responsibility of the Alabama-West Florida Conference. For more than three years I went back and forth between the two Conferences, finding a great degree of understanding on the part of both.

Yet this was a time of growing tensions among Methodists of the deep South, when our Church was making quite clear its opposition to enforced segregation and moving toward the elimination of the Central Jurisdiction. From that time until this, I have tried to live very close to the ministers and the people, so much so that in spite of the fact that each bishop is permitted and rather expected to take a missionary tour each quadrennium I have never taken one, preferring to remain close to my nearer responsibilities.

Three times it has been necessary for me to go to court to protect the structure of the Church. I have never enjoyed this—rather have I strongly disliked it. But if the structure of the Church is allowed to crumble we are done with the itinerant system which has helped to build the Church into a strong and viable force. If a minister is to be appointed to a church we must be certain that the church is there when he arrives. Many of our people need to be educated as to the whys and wherefores of the Methodist structure and to learn that it has existed for the benefit of clergy and laity alike for many, many years. A few of our members—principally those who have come in from other denominations—are of the opinion that some stringent rules have been added lately for the suppression of congregational rights. This is not so. These same safeguards existed in the days of our great grandparents.

There are other areas of the Church's life and ministry in which our present day members need basic knowledge, including the Conferences, Annual, Jurisdictional and General. They need to know for instance that the General Conference is made up of properly elected delegates from all the Annual Conferences, which delegates stand as high in the estimation of the Conferences which elect them as do the delegates from South Carolina in our own estimation. I detect

occasionally what seems to be a feeling that the General Conference is made up of "foreigners" who are plotting against the rest of us. The fact is that the convictions held by those delegates are well known to the members of their Annual Conference before they are elected as delegates to the General Conference. They represent the majority opinion of their Annual Conferences. So that when they speak at the General Conference, it is in essence the voice of the majority of Methodist opinion throughout the nation. This does not prevent the voice of the minority being expressed and heard but when anger surfaces in reality a rebellion against democratic processes. We need to remember that when people differ from us in their opinions in regard to race, war and other important issues, they are no more unchristian or unpatriotic than we if they are sincere. We make a tragic mistake when we brand everyone who disagrees with us as being either unchristian or unpatriotic. There are times when a critic of government may be displaying more patriotism than someone who blindly defends it. To think otherwise is to deny one of the fundamental tenets of our democracy, and to stifle such dissent is to sound the death knell of any free and open government.

It is not until I review some of the activities of three quadrennia that I realize that it has indeed been twelve years since first you received what Carl Griffith called an embryo bishop. If you care for facts and figures, two excellent secretaries, Mrs. Jean McKay and Mrs. Ellen Kunes, tell us that I have dedicated (that means they are debt free!) 45 churches, 47 parsonages and 31 educational buildings. I have consecrated 36 churches, 13 parsonages and 21 educational buildings. I have participated in 22 homecomings, 9 ground breakings, 6 cornerstones, 6 mortgage burnings, 13 commencement programs, 23 anniversaries, 2 otherwise regular preaching occasions, 43 miscellaneous occasions and about 20 other engagements without record. Add to that figure 38 Alabama engagements and about 60 engagements outside the Area, plus attendance upon the General Boards of Education and Christian Social Concerns for eight years and the Council on World Service and Finance for four years. Of course this does not include the meetings of Annual Conference cabinets, boards, agencies and committees. I have driven hundreds of thousands of miles and flown many or more. I have known joy and sorrow, I have been both elated and dejected, for these last twelve years have been some of the most crucial in the history of our Church and the State of South Carolina. It has been a time of social and political upheaval, in short a time of revolution and change. The fact that it has not been attended by more violence than we have seen is due to the fair-mindedness and level headedness of some of our leaders and many of our people, black and white.

During these years we have witnessed the breakdown of many barriers and we have seen the first steps toward an inclusive society and church. These changes have been difficult for some and painful to many. While open opposition has been manifested at times, let it be recorded that thousands of our people have been honest in their efforts to adjust to changing concepts and circumstances. As early as the General Conference of 1948 the Methodist Church spoke out against enforced segregation—six years before the Supreme Court school decision—thus nullifying the claim of some that Methodists did not know that segregation was wrong until the Supreme Court told them so.

It has been against this religious, social and political backdrop that we Methodists in South Carolina have been moving toward the formation of one inclusive Annual Conference. It has been at times a difficult task. Some of our ministers and laity have complained that we were moving too fast while others have said that we were moving too slowly. My deepest concern has been that we should move, whether slowly or rapidly.

It is hardly necessary to recount our progress step by step or to dwell upon the agony that we have experienced at times. Just let it be recorded that there are many South Carolinians, both black and white, who have in their hearts a genuine feeling of goodwill toward their fellowmen. In times of crisis their voices have been heard and their influence has prevailed.

The Bishop's Convocations, held during January for three successive years at a hotel in Columbia, have brought members of the two annual conferences together for worship, study and discussion and have contributed greatly to the

breaking down of the walls of ignorance and misunderstanding. Many people of both conferences have helped to plan the convocations and to make them a success but fairness compels me to say that it is doubtful that they could have been planned and promoted so helpfully without the tremendous assistance of Dr. Wallace Fridy.

Most of you are familiar with the splendid work of the larger Merger Study Committee, made up of ministers and lay people from both conferences, and with the hard groundwork that they did. You know also of the negative votes of one conference or the other, of the appointment of the Committee of Six, of the extra sessions of the conferences and the final approval of a plan. Last night's Service of Union was the culmination of literally hundreds and perhaps thousands of hours of work and prayer.

It would be a serious mistake to assume that the task has been accomplished and that the work is done. There are more difficulties ahead, there are grave problems to be solved and obstacles to be surmounted.

One of the problems to which this Conference must address itself is the matter of declining payments on World Service and Conference Benevolences. What is happening leaves the impression that an organized effort is being made to bring coercive economic pressure to bear upon the church's ministry. If and when the United Methodist Church becomes a money controlled church its usefulness to society will be over. This, of course, is no new threat. The Church has faced it before and it will probably come up again. The program of the Church should be determined by a responsible interpretation of the gospel of Jesus Christ and the will of God as revealed in the Holy Scriptures.

I close with an affirmation of faith in God, in Christ, in the United Methodist Church and in the Methodist people of South Carolina.

This Annual Conference is well supplied with unusually gifted and dedicated ministers as well as lay people of intelligence and deep commitment. I predict that the Church will emerge from her days of trial and tribulations with purer heart and stronger determination. While I no longer will be your bishop I will be watching you and loving you and praying for you. Blessings on you!

Bishop Paul Hardin, fellow District Superintendents, members and friends of the South Carolina Annual Conference:

I am deeply grateful for this signal honor that has been bestowed upon me to represent the Cabinet of the South Carolina Conference 1866, in presenting this report to you.

As followers of Jesus Christ, we know that God's will must be done. However, we all agree that it is painful to the mere mortal mind, when those who are near and dear to us, are taken from our ranks and claimed by death. Let us remember with thanksgiving those who have loved, labored, and served in the South Carolina Conference, but were taken during the Conference Year to the land where there is peace: namely, CHARLES COLONEL CLARK, SR., CLARENCE FURMAN FERGUSON, THEODORE ROOSEVELT FRIERSON, THOMAS B. HENDERSON, OMIE MARK, JR., J. H. PRINGLE and HENRY C. BREWER. - Widows: namely, MRS. NANNIE WOFFORD JACKSON, MRS. GERTRUDE GREEN MILLER and MRS. JANIE HARRINGTON.

"Servant of God, well done,
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last."

Bishop Hardin found it necessary to make one interim appointment. The Reverend Edward E. Jenkins was appointed to the Cheraw Charge, replacing the Reverend S. B. Cooper who was appointed to the Centenary Church in Charleston following the death of the late Reverend Theodore R. Frierson.

We recognize, with a profound sense of appreciation, the stamina and courage of Bishop and Mrs. Paul Hardin, Jr. They have endeared themselves to the hearts of strange people in strange places. From the ball rooms of hotels and sandy beaches to the red hills of the rocky Piedmont, many hearts have been inspired by their "common touch." The Cabinet appreciates the very leadership given to our Conference by Bishop Hardin during these turbulent days of transition. We pray that God will continue to bless them as they embark upon the coming well-earned days of retirement.

Few, if any episcopal leader, would have welcomed the task which Bishop Hardin has successfully achieved within the past twelve months. He determined himself to produce the better (or should I say) the best plan for merger. This he did with the recent blessings of our General Conference.

The documentation of a workable plan of uniting the racial segments of United Methodists in South Carolina is of priceless worth and meaning. It is an initial statement of altruism. However, as W. D. Weatherford in his book "Studies in Christian Experience" has said, "Personal testimony is necessary. There can be no greater sin against humanity than to have truth in one's possession and fail to pass it on to others. . . . A physician who knows a remedy for human suffering would be condemned if he failed to share it. The teacher who possesses great truth dedicates himself—often at great sacrifice—to share his knowledge. Those of us who trust we have had some experience with God, surely have a great obligation to share it." We can but admire and respect the anxious moments, the personal convictions and steadfast hopes of the chairman and members of the joint committee—and I reverently include those whom we loved and lost but were blessed only with a vision of what was to be.

The District Superintendents of the South Carolina Conference 1866 will commend the faithful pastors and laymen of the 125 charges with 326 local churches and more than 40,000 members. Without shame or apology, we bring to this union the rich heritage and reward of a simple faith and trust in a God who inevitably makes His way known through all sorts and conditions of men. He is in the midst of poverty, sin, frustration, hopelessness, hunger, nakedness, despair, in joy or in pain, in life or in death.

Today, as in many years past, we carry an enviable record of ministerial membership and qualification. There are among us: 103 in full connection, 2 associates, 20 Lay Pastors, 15 retired in full connection and 7 retired associates. Also, 5 deaconesses, 2 Home Missionaries and 4 retired deaconesses. The number of full members now serving special appointments are: (one each) Conference Program Director, College President, Assistant Director of Voluntary Service at Southern Methodist University, Staff member at State Teachers College in Fayetteville, N. C., a Chaplain at S. C. State Hospital, Chaplain U. S. Army, two staff members at Claflin College—one who also serves an appointment, Staff member Program Council, Division of Interpretation in Evanston, Ill., Staff member of Commission on Chaplains and staff members of the General Board of Education in Nashville, Tenn.

Our salaries, small though they may be in some instances, are sound with a minimum rate of \$7,000 (salary only) and \$8,000 (salary only) travel and utilities are added. We are co-sponsors with the General Board of Missions, 3 Advance Specials, 3 Special Projects and 5 Black Community Developers. We bring with us, as our contribution towards the two conferences' projected cost of \$1,324,227 for 606 pensioners, \$350,000 of hard earned and sacrificial savings plus an estimated Temporary General Aid Fund Assistance of \$187,015. A total of \$1,861,247. We consider this to be a rather healthy contribution towards more than 100% increase in annuity.

Further, we bring to this union a deep sense of dignity and pride. To the Conference has served as a medium of expressing our otherwise suppressed thoughts, ideas and emotions. We have been justifiably proud of meeting our financial obligation for World Service in full for more than a decade. We expect this support to continue as the Conferences unite because we feel that we have "a Charge to keep."

We feel peculiarly proud of Claflin College located in the city of Orangeburg, with capable leadership, fully accredited and bellowing her strength as tall as her most recent high-rise structure. We gave birth to her in 1869—3 years following our own Conference's birth. Your entire Cabinet and a large percentage of the membership of the Conference are her loyal sons. The South Carolina Conference 1866 has consistently adopted an annual budgetary responsibility to which now equals the amount of \$50,000, in addition to liberal contributions on Race Relations Sunday and other fund raising campaigns. Claflin has made tremendous progress and we look forward to continued expansion as the two Conferences unite. We feel that Claflin will always meet a unique need in South Carolina. Recently her choir most ably represented us at the General Conference. We solicit for her the prayers and support of each United Methodist.

The long-ranged planning and success of the Bishop's Convocation on Stewardship gave rise to themes for Stewardship Emphasis Workshops, Seminars and Programs sponsored by Districts, Conference Boards and Local Churches. Commendations are in order to the Program Council, District Superintendents, Pastors, Board of the Laity, Women's Society of Christian Service, Youth and Chairmen of the respective boards and agencies who emphasized Stewardship in the areas of Evangelism, Christian Education, Missions and Social Concerns. We all agree that our accomplishments have left much to be desired. But, we are dedicated to the all-inclusiveness of Stewardship and Missions.

The deans of the Pastor's School are to be commended for their innovative program. A program which exposed us to serious scrutiny of our personal attitudes and emotions under the direction of Dr. Carlye Marney and his staff at Lake Junaluska, N. C., with appropriate messages by eminent speakers, impromptu sermons by ministers of our Conference and the exhilarating music rendered by the Lake Junaluska Singers.

We look at the past year with gratitude for the progress that has been made within the four districts in buildings and improvements. Several new churches were erected and consecrated or dedicated to the Glory of God. A number of congregations are currently engaged in building or renovation or fund raising campaigns. Time will not allow me to mention names, churches and pastors here. However, we congratulate them for their great work and sincerely hope that their spirit of renewal will carry over into the new relationship.

It is a joy to report that each Superintendent held successful District Conferences, Workshops and special Youth Enterprises. There was enthusiasm, spiritual fervor and love demonstrated by those in attendance. It was very much in evidence that through these activities the South Carolina Conference is determined to be a part of "A New Church for a New World."

I hasten to acknowledge the project of Advance Special, presently being sponsored by our Youth, under the leadership of our Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions and the Director of Youth Work. The project involves an African Tour for 15 persons who will make a personal delivery of \$5,000 to be applied to the installation of a Central Water System at the United Methodist Church Center at Nyadiri, Rhodesia—for the particular benefit of the Maternity Hospital and Baby Fold. The 14 days' tour will include visits to Sierra Leone, Litoria and Kenya. We commend them for this tangible expression of deep concern for our ancestral brothers and sisters.

We approach this day of irrevocable change in both Church and State with some doubts and fears, some apprehensions and "hang-ups", but, we dare not lose our simple faith and trust in the Presence and Power of Almighty God. This is all we have ever possessed enough of to really feel free to call our very own. We are cognizant of the fact that our plight is enhanced by: (paraphrased)

"Our little systems (which) have their day;
They have their day (but will soon) cease to be;
They are but broken lights of Thee,
And Thou, O Lord, art more than they."

We realize that all is not well among us, yet we are hopeful that each layman and minister of the former South Carolina Conference 1866 will do his utmost to help bring about the kind of union with which God will be pleased. All battles are not over. Many battles will be fought before there will be a complete reconciliation within ourselves and between us and our brothers. As we continue to hammer out or dissolve our problems, let us be ever mindful of our mission and goal—that of continuing to build a "New Church for a New World."

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE (1785)

June 8, 1972

This report comes as eleven District Superintendents have just completed rounds of Charge Conferences numbering about 400 sessions, with their experiences in evaluating their past year's ministries, setting next year's goals and electing local church leaders. It reflects some of the findings gained in approximately three hundred consultation sessions between the eleven superintendents and pastors, between those superintendents and local church Pastors Parish Relations Committees regarding the pastoral leadership needs of the churches and the ministerial aspiration of almost one hundred pastors who are moving this year, plus one hundred more who would likely have moved if they felt their fortunes would have been improved.

Out of this welter of minister-church encounters and relationships, the District Superintendents seek to report to the Conference what they discern as the church's condition, its evidences of kingdom accomplishment and its sign of high hope, as well as its signals of deep need. If these reports of the eleven superintendents come through to you with some note of anxiety or tones that suggest fatigue rather than the whistling wind of inspiration and flashing tongues of fire, you will understand it to be the result of covering almost 300,000 miles over the highways and backways of South Carolina since we last reported our stewardship to the Conference.

What do your District Superintendents feel that they should report to the Conference at this point in its history?

An effort was made to secure their joint assessment of white Methodists in South Carolina by asking them to respond to six questions:

1. What do you see as the most promising development in the United Methodist Church in South Carolina in the last five years, in addition to Conference merger?
2. What have you discovered as the greatest hindrances to the Christian mission in the United Methodist Church in South Carolina?
3. What significant developments do you visualize in the United Methodist Church in South Carolina in the next ten years?
4. What is your assessment of the mood, the outlook, the attitude of the professional ministry in the South Carolina Conference (1785) today?

5. What do you foresee as the church's relationship now and in the next ten years to youth? to young adults? to families?
6. What other concerns and observations would you like to report to the Conference?

I shall try to give you their evaluations in five sections as follows:

Section I How Our People View the Nature of the Church and its Mission.

Section II Assessing Our Local Church Leadership.

Section III The Outlook and Climate of the Professional Ministry.

Section IV Measuring Our Ministries in Christian Nurture and Witness.

Section V Probing the Fog for a View of Our Future.

Section I—How Our People View the Nature of the Church and its Mission.

There are many signs that a significant number of local church leaders and planners in our churches are responding to a New Testament concept of "Servanthood" as the role of the church in the community. Charge Conference reports and weekly church bulletins indicate a growing measure of outreaching concern of responses to human needs. While some of our church people still measure their expressions of Christian concern in terms of Thanksgiving baskets for the needy and Christmas fruits and nuts for the shut-in, many are setting goals that indicate a wide ranging sensitivity and compassion for people: the bereaved, stranded travelers, indifferent materialists in the shadow of the church, youth and young adults in our motor-minded, sex oriented drug culture.

In spite of the Charge Conference round-up of ministries-to-ourselves, of "missional" dinners for the too-well-fed, of carpets and cushions and air conditioning comforts, there often breaks through evidences of a growing concern for ministries to the mentally retarded, of medicines collected for Haiti, of churches built in India and Central America, of clothing and food for burned-out and distressed families in our neighborhoods.

But the weight of evidence shows that our people spend a preponderant amount of their time and over 80% of their means on themselves, their institutional upkeep, the ministries to those who come to the church rather than to those who do not belong and do not feel welcome. Congregations, both large and small, often interpret "Christian ministries" to mean those attentions due members of the congregation from the pastor because they pay his keep. In five years of district supervision, I have not had one pastor's effectiveness criticized because he ministered to so few outside the church family.

Most of our giving is a giving of goods or dollars. We Methodists generate 1000% more enthusiasm for an offering of stuff that we can send through the mail or by the pastor than we can for a sacrifice of time and self to accompany the gift. Too often, our Methodist Christians deprive themselves of experiences in Christian sharing and witness by avoiding personal involvement. Nearly every congregation has its symbolic love-agents who are always called upon to express the congregation's love, thus depriving many members of experiences in Christlike involvement with the kind of people whom our Lord calls us to serve. How many congregations have retired the debt on a new building far ahead of schedule but found difficulty raising their World Service apportionment! A small church declares itself too poor to accept any part of its missionary apportionment, yet is able in two years of its missionary inactivity to air condition its church school building, carpet the sanctuary and install new pews, all cash paid. The bulletin of one church lists among its goals and projects for the new year: "Carpet the sanctuary vestibule, carpet vestibule of the gym, refinish pews, install cushions in pews, beautify present parking lot, pave and beautify new parking lot, install sheltered covers for trash cans, total cost \$16,700, all in the same year that we South Carolina Methodists gave a pittance to rehabilitation in Vietnam and less than ten cents per member to the ten million destitute and dying refugees of East Pakistan.

A church trustee reports to his Charge Conference, "Our church property is now valued at one and a quarter million dollars. Next year, it will be one and

a half million. WE ARE A GREAT CHURCH!" But when the members of the Charge Conference are asked by the presiding officer: "What do you see as the greatest community need and your most wide-open door for ministry next year?" there is a long, awkward silence, followed by uneasy titters of laughter. It would seem that a "great Church" is one that is projecting great goals, devising great missional plans; a church that is self-consciously and prayerfully asking itself which of the multitudinous hurts in the homes of its community it would seek to alleviate, with PRIORITIES FOR ACTION AND A TIMETABLE FOR IMPLEMENTATION, and with task force groups involved in missional action and service.

In several instances, congregations have renounced, with righteous indignation, all obligation for World Service or Conference Benevolences because they read in some hostile report about some denominational group somewhere giving some amount to some militant cause. They cut off their share in the support of 1,200 United Methodist missionaries around the world lest a nickel or dime of their benevolent dollar might possibly filter into a project that they disapproved of. Yet churches that angrily renounce missionary responsibility rarely substitute their own missional ministries. A missionary on furlough in a South Carolina pulpit says, "I'm still waiting to hear of a church which refuses its missionary apportionment for the right reason—for the reason that it is so involved in its own missional ministries that it cannot afford to pay its share of Conference and World-wide benevolences.

In spite of the preponderant evidence in our Charge Conference reports that our churches minister chiefly to those who come to us, and in spite of our need to get a clearer Wesleyan vision of our "world parish", most of our District Superintendents indicate in their evaluations that the most promising development in our United Methodist Churches in South Carolina in the last five years is seen in "persons willing to work at problems and issues confronting the church despite anxiety, anger, frustration, complexity of issues, confusion and turmoil. More and more persons are unafraid to search for solutions; new approaches to old problems—dare we even suggest to seek anew the will of God." One Superintendent calls this "the first ripple of the wave of the future". Another lauds what he observes as an "acceptance of the worth of lay participation in policy-making, which includes women and youth".

Section II—Assessing Our Local Church Leadership.

The most searching and sobering task in the United Methodist Church each year is the kind of sifting, searching evaluation of the dependability and commitment of local church leaders that must be done by the Committee on Nominations and Personnel as it selects and recruits local church officers for the following year. Every committee knows the gnawing embarrassment of nominating men and women, who have no serious intentions of fulfilling their tasks, to positions that require dedication and informed commitment.

Frequently, hostility toward the pastor, as chairman of the Committee on Nominations, follows when a careless, uncommitted officer of the church is replaced because he or she did not fulfill the responsibility of an office. Many of the District Superintendents list as the greatest hindrance to the Christian mission: "apathy toward the fulfillment of church leadership responsibility"; "lack of genuine commitment on the part of the laity AND THE CLERGY to the demands of the gospel"; "provincialism"; "resistance to change"; "traditionalism".

This comes as an indictment of the total ministries of all of us. What more damning judgment can a church member make of his former pastors, his Christian teachers, his family faith than to accept a discipleship role with the obvious attitude that it will not require of him any expression of discipline or servanthood?

We need to ask, as one District Superintendent suggests, whether laymen consider what goes on as the church's ministry is TOO TRIVIAL FOR SERIOUS COMMITMENT. We should also ask whether or not we need a church-wide concentration upon the nature of the gospel FOR NOW and upon the

task of the church that the Lord of history is calling out of the wildwood and vexing in the vale.

It is just at this point that we find much of the reaction and renunciation expressed by lay leadership. In the midst of social change, and the collapse of treasured traditions, laymen in leadership have looked to their church as a comforting haven of customary piety, only to find that the church too is shaken by the dialogue that polarizes around the issue of the saving of souls and the saving of the society.

Our basic problem seems to stem from Biblical illiteracy if not Biblical ignorance. Our lay leadership has not had scholarly instruction in Biblical background and interpretation. This has happened because pastors have not been able to serve as "chief teacher of the parish", either because of their church workload, or because they have not understood this to be one of the prime assignments given them when they were ordained to the Christian ministry. Much so-called "Bible teaching" that many laymen leaders have received in our church school classes has contributed more to a kind of popular every-man-as-he-pleases sermonizing folk-faith than to an informed understanding of what the Bible says about life, about the gospel proclaimed by Jesus Christ and about his church as reflected in the New Testament. The result has been lay leadership that often challenges the pastor, privately, if not publicly, for "not preaching the Bible" when he fails to focus on pet peripheral proclamations. Others react in frustrated annoyance at the pastor's call to social righteousness and the gospel demands of our social creed, "Preacher, you can read it out of that book (**The Discipline**) but don't try to tell me it's in the Bible." Our lay leadership is often confused because pastoral leaders have based their concept of the Christian community, the church, and its call for Christian discipleship on the **Book of Discipline** or on Annual or General Conference actions, rather than where they originate, in the Holy Scriptures.

Furthermore, both laymen and pastors need, in their planning for ministry, insights into the planning process for local church ministries to community needs. More and more councils on ministries are learning that this requires homework, gathering of meaningful information, task force assignments, group wisdom and commitments to specific stages and steps toward fulfillment. We should all take heart that this will be the focus of Methodism during this quadrennium: not on funds raised for projects determined by others or activities telegraphed from afar. **IT WILL PUT EACH CHURCH SQUARELY AT THE JOB OF PLANNING TO CHANGE LIVES AND STRUCTURES IN ITS OWN COMMUNITY.**

Our District Superintendents are about evenly divided on the prospects for progress in this area. Some think pastors and laymen are unprepared and unwilling to do the hard thinking and hold one another to the accountability that this will require. Others predict that there is a growing interest among lay leadership in projecting specific ministries and engaging in definite missional tasks rather than talk, propose, commend and pass resolutions until the next meeting of the planning group.

Section III—The Outlook and Climate of the Professional Ministry.

In this area of our Conference concern, District Superintendents' reactions span the whole spectrum of ministerial attitudes. They speak of the ministers' hunger for community in personal and professional relationships. At the same time, they report an anxious reserve among our pastors about embracing one another as "soul brothers". Some see a growing sense of comradeship, a dissipation of professional rivalry, of improved morale, growing out of more consistent and mature approach, to consultation about ministerial appointments. Others observe, at the same time, "too professional a concern for salary, prestige, status in the eyes of ministerial peers and luxuries in parsonage appointments". One superintendent sees a significant number of pastors as part of a "spoiled generation that too often forgets divine calling and commitment in anxious grasping for top appointments". Another sees pastors as a group caught between the scape-goating pressures of anxious lay people and the limitations of our Methodist appointive system. Another rejoices in the increased

concern shown by ministers for improving their professional ministerial competence. The consensus of the superintendents is that South Carolina Conference now has, as a whole, the best educated and best prepared ministerial leadership in its entire history. But this provides conditions for some ministerial frustrations: pastors trained and prepared for challenging tasks are too often assigned to small churches with limited potential BECAUSE THESE ARE THE KIND OF CHURCHES THAT CONSTITUTE OUR METHODIST SYSTEM IN SOUTH CAROLINA. In the realistic words of the saintly missionary, the Reverend Will Rogers of Brazil, "South Carolina just doesn't have enough outstanding churches for the outstanding preachers we have". And it is not going to change very quickly. Herein lies the cause of much professional ministerial frustration. When suburban St. Timothy's is assigned a new pastor, there are three to five other able pastors who might ask, "Why him; why not me?" However, there is a feeling among District Superintendents that a more positive kind of understanding of the limitations within which we receive our appointments and pursue our ministries is being achieved in our face-to-face consultation process.

The high hope of all District Superintendents is for more ministers who can learn what some of our pastors do so effectively: to become CATALYTIC AGENTS OF LAY MINISTRY, wherever they are assigned; ENABLERS OF LAY LEADERSHIP, WHO AS "PASTORS IN CHARGE" DO NOT FEEL PERSONALLY RESPONSIBLE FOR LEADING EVERY CHARGE THAT IS MOUNTED BY THEIR CHRISTIAN LAYMEN. More frequently, Chairmen of Administrative Boards should report with joy on accomplishment in lay ministry which the pastor engineered from behind the scenes rather than commend the pastor for a kind of ministerial busy-ness that leaves lay officials very little to do.

Section IV—Measuring Our Ministries in Christian Nurture and Witness

In one report after another, District Superintendents are being told by pastors and laymen that the United Methodist Church is declining in church membership and church school membership in South Carolina. If every local church made the required "Annual Audit of Members", the result would be appalling in all but a small percentage of suburban churches and in a few rural churches near industrial centers.

Relatively few local churches now emphasize the evangelistic urgency of recruiting and cultivating church school members, even though our reports for generations have shown that we receive 72% of our new members through the church school.

A veteran lay leader in South Carolina reports, "Our laymen feel they are inadequate, untrained, inarticulate in communicating to others the will of God for our times, the Gospel word in today's language." While some leaders have expressed misgivings about the lasting benefits of Lay Witness Missions, they have not provided alternative training in Christian teaching and witness for youth and adults to communicate the faith in the REVISED SHARING VERSION. That is why every Methodist, pastor and laymen, should greet with great anticipation the new "Doctrine Principles" document and the guide to study adopted by our General Conference in April. If every church will couple this study with the concern for positive, cooperative evangelistic outreach projected for the Key '73 endeavors, many of our Methodist lay people will find a new fervor in a faith that has doctrinal substance as well as innovative strategies for witnessing to anxious, ambivalent neighbors. We firmly believe that this will revitalize many a discouraged, declining congregation.

More adequate training for our church school teachers is a larger problem. With all that we now know about the value of laboratory schools, about teaching and rewarding experiences of Christian learning, too much of our church school teaching is done by a methodology that has been discarded by public school educators 15 or 20 years ago. We have not yet launched in South Carolina Methodism an improved version of church school teacher training sufficient to replace the Christian Workers' Schools which we have declared

outmoded. HERE IS A DESPERATE NEED THAT WE COMMEND TO EVERY DISTRICT COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES in this new quadrennium.

Section V—Probing the Fog for a View of the Future.

More than half of the District Superintendents expressed inadequacy at this task. One wrote, "You can't be serious about looking ten years ahead: I can't see beyond a month". But he and others attempted to see the church of the next ten years in South Carolina.

Here are their projections:

More involvement of lay leadership in all levels of the church.

A sifting, testing necessity to define and affirm what really is the church of Jesus Christ, with a loss of membership when people do not wish to live up to that kind of Christian commitment.

Continuing decline of rural church strength, with the necessity of devising more effective parish structures to maintain weak local churches. Probable decline in membership and strength in downtown city churches, as population changes affect old neighborhoods.

More cooperative ventures among United Methodist churches in cluster groups to minister on a broader basis.

Continued rejection of the traditionalism and narrowness in the local church by students and young adults.

Continued decline in church school attendance because of week-end leisure orientation of young families.

As well as we can discern it, here is the report of your District Superintendents to you who hold them responsible for leadership.

If the report has seemed too critically realistic in spots, or now and then pessimistic, please understand that we are trying to speak TO our church, as well as FOR our church, to the people most able to make it CHRIST'S CHURCH. We have gotten our perspectives from the reports which your Charge Conferences have reflected. WE FEEL A GREAT NEED FOR A MORE EFFECTIVE METHOD OF LOCAL CHURCH EVALUATION AND GOAL-SETTING THAN THE CHARGE CONFERENCE NOW PROVIDES WITH ITS HANDFUL OF SUPPORTIVE SAINTS. That task we commend to you now as we invoke the stirring, creative presence of that Spirit who has always blown through the church to redirect and renew it.

ADMINISTRATIVE RESTRUCTURING

The Steering Committee on Administrative Restructuring was organized in accordance with the action of the June, 1971, session of the Annual Conference (p. 215 of the 1971 Journal and Yearbook) for the purpose of guiding the implementation of the recommendations from the Task Force on System Analysis and Data Processing for Restructuring the Administrative and Business Offices of the Conference. These recommendations were initiated in an operating systems analysis of our conference by Mr. Vernon Sidler, Coordinator of Systems and Procedures of the Council on World Service and Finance. The committee has served faithfully to be an aid for constructive change with the least tension and trauma for the conference boards, agencies, and staff. Also, the committee is grateful to the administrative and business staff for their cooperation.

The committee has worked in the following functions:

(1) It has served as dialogue and joint planning agent for the chairmen of agencies involved in the recommendations. The planning has been geared to implementing the recommendations through each conference agency which has the responsibility for the work; but, through this committee, the other conference agencies were able to share in the dialogue and process of planning.

(2) The committee has served as advisor to the Commission on World Service and Finance in the nomination of the Treasurer/Business Administrator of the Annual Conference. Since the announcement of the nomination of Mr. Thad Herbert, our committee has been at work with him for the planning of the future steps of restructuring.

(3) Our committee has worked with the present office of the Treasurer and the Cabinet in beginning electronic data processing of the accounting and reporting of local church remittances on Connectional Funds and Benevolences. Computer Systems, Inc., of Rock Hill, South Carolina, a data processing service bureau, was contracted to do the processing for the conference.

The data processing work for this year has assisted the conference and the churches with accounting and timely reporting. The experience gained has prompted the following recommended changes for next year:

- (1) A new local church remittance form;
- (2) A regular data processing report mailing schedule;
- (3) Additional uses of information stored in the computer.

These procedural recommendations have been referred to responsible agencies of the conference.

The recommendations for structural realignment, which will begin with the 1972-73 conference year, will be reflected in the reports and recommendations of the various boards and agencies of the conference. Other recommendations will be delayed for action by future conference sessions so that the restructuring can be accomplished in the merger of the newly merged South Carolina Annual Conference.

We wish to offer the following recommendations:

1. To have every man, woman, girl and boy own a Bible and form the habit of reading it.
2. That each district hold a Bible reading contest and that the winners of the district contest compete at the seat of the next annual conference.
3. That a Bible reading class be organized on every charge.
4. That a daily vacation Bible school be held on every charge annually.
5. That everyone should read the Bible daily, with his eyes to see the light of God, with his ears to hear the word of God, with his mind to believe the truth of God, and with his heart to receive the love of God.

BUDGET: We recommend a budget of \$100.00 next year.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

REPORT NO. 1

Introduction to Report

We, the undersigned, take great pleasure in submitting this joint report of the work of the Boards of Christian Social Concerns. We have been meeting jointly for several years, and our programs have been one during those years.

May we continue in the words of the Scripture, (Eph. 4:3) to "Spare no effort to make fast the bonds of peace through unity which the spirit gives."

At the outset, we would like to commend Bishop Paul Hardin for his diligent work to set the climate that has made it possible for our boards to meet jointly even years before merger was accomplished. We are saddened by the knowledge that we must soon lose his leadership.

While the years we have been meeting together have presented many unmet challenges, we are happy that they have not been without positive accomplishments. For the first time in history, an unholy, unjust war has been wound down by public opinion. We rejoice in the small voice our boards raised against this war, even in its early years. We have helped shed some of our racial barriers, and rejoice at the opportunity to live in Christian love with our baptised brothers. We have questioned, with some success, the cultural values and bias opinions of our people on such subjects as race, citizenship, patriotism, sectionalism, war, humanity, economics, government, institutionalism, sex, creeds, denominationalism, poverty, crime, punishment, imprisonment, militarism, ecology, industrialism, science, and even others.

We would like to commend the pastors of James Island who interceded in broken relationships in the public schools there. It was an interdenominational effort, and our Rev. Woody Spackman was included. We would hope that more and more of our ministers would come on strong for public education.

In a short time many new people will take over this board. Our hope and prayer will be that they move our church on to new and deeper Christian social services. We deeply appreciate the stewardship of many laymen and ministers who have been deeply involved in the work of the boards over the years. Also, we are grateful to Bill Brown, Spencer Rice, Wallace Fridy, Matthew McCollom and the entire staff of the Program Council for their help.

REPORT NO. 2

As this will be my last report to the Annual Conference, I would like to take a personal privilege to speak a word about two trends I see developing in our Conference. The first causes me to rejoice, and the second to despair. My rejoicing comes at the trend of appointments by our Cabinet. I sense the end to the practice of promoting men who compromise and wish nothing. I see them promoting men who are laying it on the line for the Gospel's sake. Men who may be out of step with their communities and congregations, but who try their best to meet the demands of Jesus Christ. Hallelujah! My despair comes as I witness many of our pastors returning to a pietistic and legalistic concept of the Gospel. I feel that this kind of emphasis always brings out the worst in The Church.

I have been asked to clear up these two points briefly. First, about the trend I see in appointments. I do not think the positions of the culture and the positions of the church are ever the same. I think a minister must **always** try to show his people the difference. When a minister does this, in what I feel is obedience to the gospel, it is not very likely that he will be very popular with the cross section of his congregation. In the turbulent last decade, I do not think that it was possible for a minister who was obedient to this call to have been very popular with South Carolina congregations.

And, About pietism. I believe that there is a dimension of piety that Methodism has always considered important to the Christian Life. However, when piety becomes legalistic and directs ones attentions to only private attitudes and devotions, to the exclusion of active and prophetic Christianity, then I believe the church becomes inverted, irrelevant and self serving. This is what I tried to say.

REPORT NO. 3

Report to the Conference for the Year 1971-72

During the past year the Board has been actively involved in a number of agenda issues. We will briefly list those which seem most important.

1. **"Desegregation and the Public Schools"**
Resource persons from the Desegregation Center of the University of South Carolina met with the Board to communicate the human relations problems which our schools are facing. Dr. William Dufford pointed out that there are at least three "gaps" in the problem: the youth/older persons, the Black/White, and the school/community. Dr. John McFaddin outlined the services available to school systems on a contractual basis, and lifted out the problem of the "failure" mentality in coping with the problems of students.
2. **"Drug and Alcohol Abuse"**
Mr. Tom Stallworth of the S. C. Advisory Committee for Pastoral Care of Alcoholics and Mr. James Neil of the South Carolina Commission on Alcoholism commended the church for its efforts in education concerning the abuse problems related to drugs and alcohol. They did point out "the danger in the general public attitude, which parallels the way in which we reacted to alcohol thirty years ago, calling it one thing when it was in fact another."
3. **"Problem Pregnancies and Human Sexuality"**
Rev. George Duffie, Jr., a campus minister, and Miss Darrow Long, a graduate student in the School of Education at the University of South Carolina, communicated to the Board the distressing situation regarding sexual relationships among students today. The Board expressed its concern for prevention of unwanted pregnancies as well as offering guidance in Christian ethics related to human sexuality for not only college students, but for high school youth as well. To this end, we have developed resources for use in local churches, regarding personal values and human sexuality. The Board has also attempted to share with the conference the discussion of this issue through the coordinated mailing and articles in the *Advocate*.
4. **"Adult Literacy"**
During the year the Board has worked with Mrs. Myrna Strangeland and Mrs. Vera Hall of the South Carolina Literacy Council in training tutors in the Laubach process and locating community funding for local and state-wide work. We commend the untiring efforts of Reverend James Medley for his leadership in this organization and for assisting the District Directors in their work.
5. **"Recognition of Mainland China"**
Prior to President Nixon's visit to China, the Board adopted a resolution which conveyed to the President our endorsement of his trip and supported proposals of recognition of the government of that nation in the United Nations.
6. **"Just Wars"**
The Board urged local churches to implement studies on the issue of "just wars" as a way of assessing our military involvement present and in the future.
7. **"Prayer Amendment"**
The Board communicated with the South Carolina delegation in the National Congress our desire for them to oppose the passage of the so-called non-denominational prayer amendment. It was pointed out that our action was out of concern for maintaining the constitutional provision which allows free expression of religion.
8. **"Churches and the Private Schools"**
The Board has become aware that some churches are, in fact, acting as agencies of private schools by receiving gifts (tax deductible) and trans-

ferring funds to non tax-deductible private schools in an effort to circumvent the law. We have investigated this practice and have communicated with the churches of the conference regarding the previously adopted statement by the former 1785 Conference related to use of church facilities by private schools.

9. **"Petitioned General Conference"**
The Board petitioned the General Conference to provide leadership, funds and guidelines to assist in providing children's nursery day-care facilities and services for depressed and deprived communities.
10. **"Task Forces"**
During the year we have abandoned the traditional three-fold division of concerns for the Board of Christian Social Concerns, namely, the Divisions of (1) World Peace (2) Human Relations (3) General Welfare, and have worked on various task forces, designated as follows: (1) Human Relations in the Public Schools (2) Human Sexuality and Problem Pregnancies (3) Drug and Alcohol Abuse Problems (4) Child Care Facilities.
11. **"Board Members"**
During the year members of our Board have actively participated in the "Jurisdictional Christian Social Concerns Workshop" at Lake Junaluska, the "Churchman's Legislative Seminar" sponsored by The Christian Action Council, and the "Dignity of Work" Sunday.
12. **"Christian Action Council"**
 - A. The largest "affirmation of support" ever received by the Christian Action Council came in 1971. This was the tremendous response, from more than 337 individuals, 70 churches and organizations, that made it possible to pay out nearly all of the \$10,000 tax bill imposed on the Council by the Internal Revenue Service.
The IRS ruling responsible for that "bill," the Council contends, was both grossly unfair and erroneous. Therefore, the Council has employed counsel to sue for recovery through the courts--a legal option approved at our Annual Meeting.
In reading this report and reviewing the facts of the Internal Revenue Service decision against the Christian Action Council, we feel that a further word of explanation is due. We would very much like to say a kind word for the personnel at the South Carolina office of IRS, and to many of the people in the Washington office of IRS.
While it is true that these rulings caused the financial crisis, the IRS people were very helpful to the Christian Action Council in 1968 when a trip was made to clear up the tax exemption status. At that time, they made it possible from a study of the Christian Action Council Charter to make it tax exempt from an "Education Organization" basis. That was helpful and they agreed to help the Council make a study of how to change to become deductible from a religious point of view. When the final audit was made, the Columbia office under the leadership of Mr. Harold McLeod, was very helpful in setting guidelines for both the amount of taxes and the method of payment. While all the personnel of the IRS felt that they had to make the audit in application to the law, their spirit of helpfulness and cooperation was very much appreciated by all the officers of the Christian Action Council.
 - B. Although this "financial crisis" has been wasteful of time and energy, it has not blocked our programs or our work. We would emphasize that during this year we plan to
 1. complete the \$50,000 campaign for the "A. L. M. Wiggins Lectureships for Christian Service in Public Affairs,"
 2. coordinate the planning and statewide promotion of Key 73, the national program for Witness and Evangelism in 1973,
 3. extend and enlarge "Continuing Education for Ministry" programs, for laity and clergy, in cooperation with Technical Education Centers and other agencies throughout the state,

4. develop "regional committees" as ways of making the resources of the Council more effective in local cooperative planning and programs,
5. involve church leadership, both lay and clerical—at both Conference and District levels, in inter-church praying, planning and work.
6. sponsor at least 2 "Church-Industry Seminars," one on Broadcasting (for Greenville area) and one on the S. C. Ports Authority (for Charleston area), and perhaps a statewide conference on "Patriotism and Peace," and
7. carry out a study to identify ways of teaching the Bible in the Public Schools and to encourage such courses.

C. At this time of S. C. Methodism's merger into one Conference, we are pleased to report that in the past both Conferences have been members of the Council. It is also appropriate to set forth both the background, present structure, work and procedures of the Christian Action Council.

1. The "South Carolina Federated Forces for Temperance and Law Observance" was created by Baptist, Methodist and other church leaders in 1933 to oppose the Repeal of the 18th (Prohibition) Amendment. The first director of that organization was Dr. Charlie Burts, who had been the first Secretary-treasurer of the General Board of the South Carolina Baptist Convention (1919-1924).

Following the Repeal, the "S. C. Federated Forces" continued work for prohibitory legislation and education on alcohol problems under the leadership of Dr. A. D. Betts (1939-1948), a Methodist, and Rev. Maxie C. Collins, Jr. (1948-1950), a Baptist.

With the understanding that the "Federated Forces" was interested in enlarging the scope of its program, the Rev. Howard G. McClain, a Baptist minister, became Executive Director in 1950. The following year the name was changed to "Christian Action Council."

2. There has been an enlargement of program, and an integral relationship established with the member denominations, within the past twenty years. The changes have been stated as follows:
 - a. from a single-issue agency (concerned only with alcohol problems) to a "Christian Action" organization (concerned with all public issues of concern to churchmen);
 - b. from being financially supported by individuals to support by denominations;
 - c. from being an organization of individuals to an instrument of the "Christian Action" agencies (and/or concerns) of the denominations;
 - d. from an emphasis on legislation to an emphasis on education and persuasion;
 - e. from being primarily a Baptist-Methodist organization to being a cooperative church agency supported by practically all of the Christian groups in South Carolina.

During the time these changes were taking place the Council had the effective leadership of two Methodist presidents—Dr. R. Wright Spears (1956-60) and Dr. Bryan Crenshaw (1964-68).

- D. One significant development resulting from these changes has been the increase in membership. There are now 18 church judicatories in South Carolina which are represented on the Council's Board of Governors. These include both the traditional members (e.g., Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian) and newer members (e.g., Episcopal, Lutheran, Catholic). It is interesting to note that the Diocese of Charleston (Catholic) and the Nazarene communions became members the same year (1968).

The Board of Managers, which meets twice each year between the Annual Meetings of the Board of Governors, is the planning and operational "arm" of the Council. On it are representatives of the "Christian Action" agency of each member-denomination, in addition to the elected Officers and Program Directors. The Chairman of the Conference's Board of Christian Social Concerns (or a person selected by it) is the official Methodist representative.

By its by-laws the Council is the inter-church agency of the "Christian Action" boards (or interests) of the member communions. This means that the Board of Christian Social Concerns is the liaison between the Conference and the Council. It is thus responsible both to represent Methodists' concerns in the planning and work of the Council and to represent and interpret the work and interests of the Council to the Conference.

- E. During the past year Dr. Joseph T. Stukes, a Presbyterian layman, has been the Council president, the first lay president in recent years. Its program in 1971 was high-lighted by a "Churchmen's Conference on Hunger," two meaningful seminars on Christian citizenship, cooperation in sponsoring 6 conferences on the Churches' Ministry to the Aging, and the formation of an adjunct "S. C. Committee on Continuing Education for Ministry." There have also been the usual continuing services summarized as follows:

- informational and educational service (alcohol problems, aging, highway safety, constitutional revision, and other issues);
- ministries to congregations (audio-visual programming, consultative services on citizenship and community programs);
- "continuing education" programs for pastors, and
- cooperative-action programs by the churches.

A special project has been the development of a "Church Materials Packet: Christian Sexual Morality and VD" in cooperation with the State Board of Health to promote a special "VD Awareness" emphasis throughout the state.

- F. The role of the Christian Action Council is to strengthen in South Carolina those two essential aspects of the Church that have traditionally been least emphasized—namely, the "oneness of Christian Discipleship" (ecumenism) and "social education and action" (social concerns).

There has been a very limited tradition of ecumenism in the state. There is the continuing need, thus, both to develop understanding of the spirit and process of inter-church cooperation and to find effective means and procedures by which the denominations can work together. It is especially important to recognize that this function is not to be judged by "unanimity of opinion on controversial issues" (as in reality there is a variety of viewpoints within most denominations).

The Christian Action Council is most appreciative of the Conference's past support and cooperation. We recognize that its functions are near and dear to essential elements in Methodist tradition—but we believe that in these days the inter-church Council can help to strengthen them within the Conference's program and be a means through which Methodism can help to strengthen them within the whole Christian community of South Carolina.

We anticipate continued and increased cooperation with and support from the S. C. Annual Conference as we seek together to witness and work for God's intentions and purposes through His Church.

Recommendations

1. The Board of Christian Social Concerns recommends that the Annual Conference support legislation which would provide funds to needy families in

such manner that recipients would be encouraged to make use of child care centers and be permitted to be employed outside the home. Existing legislation should be amended to permit recipients to supplement family income up to the minimum subsistence levels as established by proper federal agencies without penalty. We feel that this would have the effect of placing welfare payments on an incentive basis.

2. The Board recommends that the Conference adopt the following statement on "Substance Abuse":

WHEREAS, the church of Jesus Christ is a community based on the principles of sacrificial love of neighbor and self, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Christian Social Concerns calls upon the Annual Conference to struggle realistically with the problem of substance abuse in our society, and

WHEREAS, substance abuse refers to misuse in the consumption of alcohol, tobacco, amphetamines, marijuana and/or any other personality changing or behavior altering drugs, and

WHEREAS, regarding drugs, a double standard exists in our society, one for youth and one for adults.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church calls upon the United Methodist people of South Carolina to set the example for all South Carolinians and specifically to call for an all out effort to come to grips with the drug abuse problem for a wholistic perspective.

Note: Mickey Fisher made the following substitute for the whole of Recommendation No. 2 above: "I move that the Recommendation Number 2 of this report be deleted and that the Board of Christian Social Concerns be instructed to design a program whereby the United Methodist people of South Carolina may engage in an all out effort to come to grips with the drug abuse problem from a wholistic perspective." The Board accepted the substitute and it was adopted. (See Journal of Proceedings.)

3. The Board feels the Conference should express itself regarding the pending legislation in the fall referendum related to control of alcoholic beverages. In pointing to the dilemma, the Board reminds the Conference that the only two options which the General Assembly has provided the citizens of the state are the so-called "brown-bagging" method and the so-called "mini-bottle" method. While we feel that there should be other and better options, the voters must choose between the two in November, 1972.

WHEREAS, the Church of Jesus Christ is called to be a redeeming community of discerning love, a fellowship of those who confess their sin, rejoice in the love of God freely given, and who commit themselves to spiritual excellence in every facet of life, and

WHEREAS, the Lord of the Church has in the historical Christ affirmed the validity of pluralism as the context for human existence in social practice (Matthew 11:18-19) and sacerdotal function (Luke 20: 19-26) and,

WHEREAS, the citizenry of the sovereign State of South Carolina shall be looking to the Church of Jesus Christ for guidance as it deals with the complexity of pluralism in regards to the use of alcoholic beverages in both a public and religious context.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church meeting in regular session these 5th and 9th days of June, 1972, in the City of Spartanburg, South Carolina, do publicly declare that love of God and neighbor calls us to responsibly abstain from the use, serving, or sale of alcoholic beverages and to minister to the needs of those victimized by the same. We offer our decision as a model for all men, trusting that love of God and neighbor shall equip us to understand the obligation of every person to accept full responsibility for his or her decision in regards to the use of alcoholic beverages.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we reluctantly support a favorable public vote on HR 2680 and HR 2681 (commonly known as the "mini-bottle" legislation) at the polls of South Carolina—November 7, 1972 as the more desirable of the two undesirable options being offered to control the distribution of alcoholic beverages.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that we see the action in the preceding paragraph as a call for all citizens of the State of South Carolina to dedicate themselves to the strictest possible enforcement of the control features embodied in the statutory offerings of the 1972 General Assembly.

Minority Report

We wish to express our opposition to the report regarding "mini-bottle" legislation for the following reasons:

1. We need a better opinion than the one which is now being considered.
2. Whereas, our position being one of "total abstinence," we oppose the "mini-bottle" legislation because we believe that it will result in an increased sale and use of alcohol.
3. We believe that any such action by a Church board such as voicing approval of the "mini-bottle" would be grossly misunderstood as favoring social drinking of alcoholic beverages.
4. If the proposed "mini-bottle" Referendum is defeated, the Legislature will continue to seek better and wiser controls.

Note: The section "Minority Report" was accepted as information. McKay Brabham presented a substitution motion to change the last two paragraphs of Recommendation Number 3 above, as follows: "I would move to amend to make the last two paragraphs to read in this manner: 'Be it further resolved that we call upon the United Methodist people of South Carolina to vote against HR 2680 and HR 2681, commonly known as the mini-bottle legislation at the poles of South Carolina on November 7, 1972.' The second part of this amendment would be the inclusion of the final original paragraph minus the 1972 figure before the General Assembly." The report was adopted as amended. (See Journal of Proceedings.)

Harry R. Kent moved that we add to the previously adopted amended section number 3 (the Brabham Amendment) these words: "and that, regardless of which of the options may be approved by the public in South Carolina, we petition the legislature to continue to seek better and wiser controls." Adopted.

4. WHEREAS the South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church recognizes the atheistic nature of the Communist philosophy and reaffirms the total incompatibility of the teachings of Jesus Christ and the teachings of Communist philosophy, and

WHEREAS, the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church confesses such ignorance of those military, political, and diplomatic factors involved in the Vietnam conflict as to render impossible and intelligent demands upon the governments of the involved nations,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church hereby pledge its prayerful support to all those efforts which are being directed toward the attainment of a just and lasting peace in Vietnam, Southeast Asia, and all the world.

Note: The above was adopted as an additional Recommendation and included in the above report. (See Journal of proceedings for other motions concerning this section.)

Note: Theron Few moved that in Section Number 3, under recommendations, "we strike the second paragraph beginning with the second 'WHEREAS' in its entirety and delete the first seven words of the third line in the following paragraph: 'the complexity of pluralism in regard to.'" This was adopted.

Note: Frances Cunningham moved "that Report Number 2 of the Board of Christian Social Concerns be changed from its present position and added

as a personal privilege of the Chairman at the end of the Report and received as information." It was adopted. (See Journal of Proceedings.)

COKESBURY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Cokesbury Conference Board of Trustees is grateful to the South Carolina Annual Conference for the cooperation and support which has been shown to the Board of Trustees in recent years. According to the action passed by the 1971 Annual Conference, your Cokesbury Conference Board of Trustees worked with the Conference Board of Trustees and the property was deeded to the Cokesbury Historic and Recreation Commission of Greenwood County on December 7, 1971. The main records of the Cokesbury Conference School Board of Trustees have been deposited with Mr. Herbert Hucks, Wofford College, Spartanburg, South Carolina. Other items of less importance will be deposited in the restored museum at Cokesbury by the undersigned officers upon the completion of the facilities.

Your Board of Trustees understands that with the presentation of this report to the 1972 Annual Conference, its work is completed and the Board of Trustees is dissolved.

CONTINUING EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Board of the Ministry

The Committee on Continuing Education has continued its work during the past year of disseminating information concerning opportunities for continuing education for the ministry. It has also involved itself in providing additional opportunities for training for those who are interested.

The South Carolina Methodist Advocate in the May 25th edition listed a schedule of events and dates for continuing education. While your committee considers all of these to be of importance, we would lift up a number of specific events which we submit for your special consideration.

1. The Furman University Pastors School, July 3-7, Furman University, Greenville, South Carolina.
2. The 1972 Preaching Workshop, "Preaching in Worship", Candle School of Theology, Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia.
3. The South Carolina Conference Pastors School, September 12-14, Myrtle Beach, South Carolina.
4. The Duke Seminar, November 8, Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, Columbia, South Carolina.
5. The Graduate School, Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, Columbia, South Carolina. The fall semester begins September 12, 1972.
6. The Graduate School, Summer School (three weeks), Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, Columbia, South Carolina, June 5-23, 1972.

Your committee has continued to be involved in the program of The South Carolina Committee on Continuing Education for Ministry, which is an interdenominational agency involving leadership from all of the major denominations in South Carolina. We feel that much good has come from our participation in this co-operative effort in a common area of concern. We urge the ministers of The South Carolina Conference to take advantage of the many fine opportunities now being made available to them.

Because of the large number of Methodist students enrolled at The Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, during the past year your committee has moved in the direction of helping to provide a Methodist Tutor for the Lutheran campus. There exists at the Lutheran seminary a need for courses in Methodist Polity and Doctrine. Dr. Hugh George Anderson and his administration at the Lutheran seminary have been more than co-operative in this matter and we owe to him a vote of sincere appreciation for the opportunities he is making available to our Methodist ministers. We hope that it will be possible by the beginning of the fall term to have at least a part time Methodist presence on the Lutheran campus.

In past years we have urged all of our charges to include a minimum of one hundred dollars in the local budget to assist the pastor with the expense of continuing education. Not all of our charges have complied with this request, but because of the importance of giving every minister the opportunity for study and continuing education, it is our hope that more of our churches will take seriously this suggestion. Just as important as providing necessary funds is the matter of providing necessary time away from the charge in order to receive such training.

THE REPORT OF THE JOINT DISTRIBUTING COMMITTEE TO THE SOUTH CAROLINA (1785) AND THE SOUTH CAROLINA (1866) ANNUAL CONFERENCES

The Joint Distributing Committee, representing the several conferences concerned with the merger of the South Carolina (1785) and the South Carolina (1866) Annual Conferences, in accordance with the authority granted in Paragraph 1383 of the 1968 Discipline of The United Methodist Church presents herewith a report of an agreement by which the pension responsibility of the South Carolina (1785) and the South Carolina (1866) Annual Conferences is allocated to the successor South Carolina Conference. This agreement is to be in full force and effect as of the effective date of the merger of the aforementioned Annual Conferences.

1. The pension responsibility of the South Carolina (1785) and the South Carolina (1866) Annual Conferences, on account of years of approved service rendered prior to the date of transfer by ministerial members, probationers, and full-time approved lay pastors thereof, as approved by the South Carolina (1785) and/or the South Carolina (1866) Annual Conferences is hereby accepted and approved for "annuity claim" by the successor South Carolina Annual Conference, in accordance with the following principles:

- a. All approved service rendered while under appointment to a pastoral charge shall be accepted by the successor conference within whose geographical boundaries the charge is located.
- b. Any approved service which was rendered while under appointment other than to a pastoral charge shall be accepted by the successor Annual Conference in proportion to the number of years of approved service rendered while under appointment to pastoral charges which will be distributed to the successor South Carolina Annual Conference.
- c. Any claim for supply service, which has not been approved and/or is not a part of the total distribution, shall be the responsibility of the conference in which is located the charge where such supply service was rendered.
- d. Consecutive years of (supply) lay pastor service in either the South Carolina (1785) or the South Carolina (1866) Conference, together with service in the successor conference as a full-time lay pastor shall be counted as consecutive years in **one** conference for the purpose of qualifying such years for pension claims.

2. Pension responsibility of the South Carolina (1785) and the South Carolina (1866) Annual Conference on account of service rendered prior to the effective date of merger, shall be allocated by the Clearinghouse of the General Board of Pensions to the successor Annual Conference in accordance with the principles set forth in Paragraph 1 of this agreement.

3. The pension liability on account of years of approved service rendered to the transferred churches after the date of transfer shall be the responsibility of the successor Annual Conference in which such service is rendered.

4. Beginning as of July 1, 1972 the annuities payable to Conference claimants on account of the pension responsibility of the South Carolina (1785) and/or the South Carolina (1866) Annual Conference shall be paid by the successor Annual Conference.

5. Coverage for ministers and lay pastors of the South Carolina (1866) Conference now participating in the Death Benefit Program shall be continued and benefits will be provided on the basis of the South Carolina (1866) Conference average salary through July 31, 1972. Required contributions for the period from January 1, 1972 through December 31, 1972 have been made from the assets of the South Carolina (1866) Conference.

6. The pension assets of the South Carolina (1785) Annual Conference and the South Carolina (1866) Conference as of July 1, 1972 shall be distributed to the successor conference in proportion to the pension responsibility it receives. The service annuity credits under the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, (if any) or Partial Reserve Pension Fund (if any) or Supply Reserve Pension Fund, (if any), related to service in either South Carolina Annual Conference shall be counted as conference pension assets and shall be distributed as Service Annuity Account therefrom at the time of the member's retirement, may be counted as a part of the pension payable on the basis of the annuity rate of the successor conference.

7. Any amounts collected by the General Board of Pensions related to claims or liens filed by either the South Carolina (1785) or the South Carolina (1866) Annual Conference, shall be allocated to the successor conference.

8. The years of approved service rendered in the merging conferences prior to effective date of merger, and the pension assets, as determined by this Joint Distributing Committee, shall be allocated as follows:

9. The General Board of Pensions is hereby authorized and directed to put into effect the principles agreed upon by this Joint Distributing Committee and to distribute such pension assets as are on deposit with the General Board of Pensions and responsibilities of South Carolina (1785) and the South Carolina (1866) Annual Conferences in accordance with the principles agreed upon by this Joint Distributing Committee. The treasurers of the respective Annual Conferences responsible for Annual Conference pension funds shall distribute to the appropriate treasurer of the successor conference all pension assets in accordance with the principles agreed upon by the Joint Distributing Committee.

10. Upon the completion of its work, this Joint Distributing Committee for the South Carolina (1785) and the South Carolina (1866) Annual conferences shall be dissolved as required under Paragraph 1383 of the 1968 Discipline of The United Methodist Church.

- 4. We will continue to urge our ministers and laymen to join in ecumenical opportunities wherever they appear.

**ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS
(1785 Conference)**

- 1. Statement from the Chairman.

The Commission on Ecumenical Affairs is now completing its first quadrennial of existence. These first years of operation have been difficult ones for many reasons. First of all, the guide lines from the General Church were almost non-existent. Secondly, the new commission began without a budget. For the entire first year, the commission members bore their own expenses and the meetings were numerous that first year as we tried to develop a philosophy and operational procedures. A third difficulty we faced was the losing of two chairmen in as many years but even with these hardships, the commission has become an important voice in the Conference.

Much of our time during the early period was spent developing a philosophy rather than promoting any particular program. As a result of this in-

tensive search for meaning, the commission has adopted two basic principles of operation. The first is to aid the local church in discovering unity in mission to the needs of the community. Second, is to examine all conference programs for ecumenical possibilities in regard to both stewardship and unity. The commission has adopted a broad concept of ecumenism and is not bound to any one idea of the ecumenical movement. We feel that for the first time this year we have made a direct impact on our Conference and our State. We are looking forward to combining our efforts with the members of the former '66 Conference to be a more effective instrument in encouraging Christian unity.

2. Summary of this year's work.

A. Recommendations made to Conference Agencies.

1. We recommended that the Conference Committee in charge of Pastors' School explore the possibility of combining our school with the Pastors' School held annually at Furman University.
2. We recommended to the TRAFCO Committee that they explore the possibility of exchanging films and other audio-visual aids with other denominations in the state.
3. We recommended to the Committee on Campus Ministries that they investigate the needs of small colleges and regional campuses in regard to possible ecumenical chaplaincies.
4. We recommended to the camp commission that they explore the possibility of cooperation with other denominations in an exchange in the use of camping facilities so that the Methodist in the lower part of the state might better be served.
5. We recommended to the Board of Education that they explore the possibility of an exchange with other denominations within our existing camping program.
6. We recommended to the Bishop that he invite observers of other denominations to participate in the Bishops' Convocation on Stewardship.

B. Other Recommendations.

1. We recommended that the Christian Action Council explore the possibility of developing and securing materials for a program of Release-Time Bible study for public schools. After this recommendation was accepted by the Christian Action Council, we gave them \$300 to aid in the implementation of this work. The Christian Action Council is now developing this program which we expect to be made available before too long.

C. Other Items.

Any balance in our budget this year after all expenses have been met will be used for the purchase of audio-visual materials to be placed in the audio-visual library, and scholarship money for a S.I.P. worker.

3. Closing: Merger Statement

It is the intent of our Commission to make the merger with the '66 Conference as meaningful as possible. In order to do this, we invited a member of the '66 Commission to accompany our delegate to the Christian Unity Conference in New York City. Our Commission bore the expense of both delegates.

We are offering no program proposals for next year until after the Commissions have met together. Our budget requests for the ensuing 7 months are based on 7/12ths of last year's budget and no designations will be made until the commissions have met together.

Report No. 1

Those of us who are involved in the work of The Church related to the Board of Education present the following summary of our stewardship in the task for which we are responsible. The arms of the Board (Committees, Councils, and Boards) have been actively involved in the various phases of Christian Education and business has to an unusual degree been conducted responsibly.

We are grateful for these opportunities for service, and we are grateful for the talented and dedicated people who have made this work possible. Some of these people will be identified by the reports that they make; others will continue to work behind the scenes and will continue to make their indispensable contributions.

We are grateful to the Program Council Staff Members who have been assigned responsibilities in the field of Christian Education for their dedicated and efficient work in this area of ministry: Specifically, to Dr. Spencer M. Rice The Reverend B. B. Brown, The Reverend Charles Dunn, and The Reverend Joseph Alley who have responsibilities in the field of Christian Education, and to Dr. Wallace Fridy, who has general supervision of the staff. We are, also, grateful, to the secretarial staff who do so much to keep the work going.

We appreciate, too, the splendid leadership of Dr. Paul Hardin III, President of Wofford College, and of Dr. R. Wright Spears, President of Columbia College, and to their Boards of Trustees and Administrative Staffs. A word of thanks is, also, in order for the fine work done by Wesley Voight and his staff at The Methodist Camp, and to our Wesley Foundation Directors and their Boards of Directors for their faithfulness in this ministry.

It has been gratifying during the past weeks to have been in joint meetings with the leadership in Christian Education of the '66 Conference. We have found them to be most helpful and cooperative in these meetings, and we look forward with confidence to our work together as one new conference.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

Leadership training has taken many forms; designs and models of training have been varied. Effort has been made more than ever to respond to the needs expressed by the local church through cluster or area planning groups and through the districts. Enterprises have varied in length from 3 hours to 10. They have taken the form of workshops, seminars, and schools.

The staff has responded to all calls from districts, groups of churches, and individual churches and has assisted in designing many learning experiences where credits were offered and many where no credits were granted.

A special effort has been made to bring training close to the small church and to adapt procedures and methods to its needs. In one district an experiment was designed for the CoM of the churches of 125 membership or less.

District-wide training for the local church Council on Ministries has been conducted in two districts sponsored by the District Program Council. General leadership for one was provided jointly by the district and the conference staff; for the other it was provided by the district, the Conference, and the General Program Council.

The purpose was to show the function of the CoM, its relationship to the administrative board and the distinctive role of each, to provide experience with the process of discovering needs, defining and describing needs, setting goals and developing ministries based on needs.

Conference-wide training for district coordinators has been more comprehensive than ever before. A learning experience held at Columbia College September 26-28 was well attended and evaluated as productive. It was designed to deal with the feelings of coordinators, to develop sensitivity to people and their needs and to assist in gathering resources for their work.

On October 13-15 a workshop on "New Techniques in Achievement" was held. Participated in by the Bishop and the Cabinets and Program Council Staffs of the two S. C. Conferences, this was a concentrated training. The experiences dealt with communicating, diagnosing leveling, and achieving.

All staff members of the Program Council have participated as a team in many phases of training connected with "The Year of Stewardship."

SELECTED RESPONSIBILITIES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN ADULT MINISTRY

- A. Young adults—Designing and Coordination of the Summer Investment Program (S.I.P.). A task force of creative and dedicated persons: Nancy Burkhalter, Kathleen Fowler, Brenda Bodie, Joy Kissam, Oscar Smith, Robert Howell, Stanley Walker, Reginald Thackston helped to make the work easier and pleasant.

S.I.P. is now in the final stage (selection of missionaries, mission fields and training of missionaries). Assignments to mission fields will follow within-service and final evaluation to be done.

Initiated by the Board of Social Concerns, this ministry to young adults was implemented by a special task force representing several boards and agencies.

- B. Young Adults—Campus Ministry

Campus Ministry has worked under a new image for the past two years. George Duffie, Jr., has been the pioneer and visionary for the new image. The work of the Task Force on Higher Education and Campus Ministry has greatly aided young adults in relation to the mission of the Church.

- C. Older Adults—three years ago our Annual Conference offered other denominations the opportunity to participate in Senior Adult Assembly. Presbyterians, Baptists, and Lutherans now work with United Methodists under the Committee: Older Adult Committee.

A decision by the Older Adult Committee committed our support for 1972 to College Week for Senior Citizens at Clemson University instead of an assembly for older adults. College Week for Senior Citizens is sponsored jointly by Clemson University, The Department of Parks-Recreation-Tourism, The S. C. Commission on the Aging.

Future plans by the Older Adult Committee commit us to become advocates for older adults and to become responsive to local churches and communities as they seek to develop ministries for older adults. The Older Adult Committee will also encourage the governmental agencies which have older adults as their concern.

- D. Adults—A Task Force on Human Sexuality and Problem Pregnancies is currently working on a model for helping local churches deal with human sexuality. The model and curriculum resources will be available in two to three months.

- E. Adults and Local Church Ministry

Currently, the Conference Adult Coordinator is engaged in planning and testing with District Coordinators and with local churches a plan for aiding the local church in designing its own particular ministry.

This planning and testing comes as a result of adults in local churches wanting to create ministries and to use curriculum materials which more nearly match their particular personal and missional needs. As a result, some local churches are experiencing struggle and excitement over the possibilities.

Another impetus for helping local churches design adult ministries is the recently released Study of the Church School by the General Board of Education. In this study it was revealed that there are varied expectations of the church school. This means that a concept or practice which sees the adults of a church as one mass is doomed to failure.

In light of the above, innovation will be possible—and must take place. But it will be easier since it is innovation based on "needs" of persons.

YOUTH MINISTRY GOALS AND THRUST

In early 1971, following a study of youth ministry needs in the local church, the Conference Council on Youth Ministry adopted as its major goal:

"By December 31, 1972, all adult leaders of youth in the South Carolina Conference '85 churches will have improved their ability to lead youth in the settings for which they are responsible by being able to use 4+ new skills."

Toward the goal we have made these steps:

- (1) Nine District Coordinators were trained in September, 1971
- (2) Leadership teams from eight Districts were trained in November, 1971
- (3) Four of these teams have reached from 10% to 50% of their churches thus far.

The thrust of the local learning events, in which both youth and adults participate, has been directed toward affirmation of youth ministry as a mutual responsibility, with both adult domination and youth dependency seen as barriers to full Christian discipleship. Skills of listening, relating, diagnosing, goal setting, communicating, and long range planning have been emphasized as most strategic.

Generally, the resurgent youth interest in the Christian faith, and especially in the person of Jesus, has brought both new creation and old conflict to our churches, with some warmly embracing the new styles of today's young Christians, while others hold out for more traditional patterns, especially in matters of worship and life-style.

In South Carolina, United Methodist youth ministry has been at its best as youth from the '66 and '65 Conferences have met, confronted one another in loving Christian relationships, listened diligently to those speaking from an alien context, and have honestly tried to map out a course for a new day in the United Methodist Church in South Carolina.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES

Children's Ministries have focused their concern in the area of training. The District Coordinator and her associates are better equipped now to train the Workers with Children in the local church. The District Coordinator of one District, with the assistance of the District Superintendent and others, has designed the total training program for that district in the area of Children's Ministries.

Some churches are seeking ways to reach the children who are not touched during the Church School hour. They are using additional sessions during the week days and some are finding this to be very successful.

Many of our districts held Vacation Church School Workshops that were well attended and effective.

Much of the training this year has emphasized the needs of the small church.

The Program is self-instruction, Communicating the Faith with Children is now being widely used. Along with Workers with Children, we encourage pastors to use this tool to help them become sensitive to the needs of children in their church and community.

Through a survey of the churches in our Conference which inquired about the programs of Nursery, Kindergarten and Day Care, a need has been indicated for various types of resourcing and training. Day Care is becoming more and more a part of church programs. This includes day care for younger children and programs for after school children. The demands upon the family causes the Mother to be a part of the work force, making it necessary to have good child care programs in the churches. The through-the-week programs for children in our churches are on the increase, and it is a must that these programs have the proper structure and relationship to the Council on Ministries of the church.

This year for the first time, we are offering camping at our Methodist Camp for those who have completed the Fourth grade. Also in the area of camping, we are still encouraging churches to participate and become involved in the low income camping. This helps the church show its concern as ministers to the total community.

FAMILY MINISTRIES

Innovations in Family Ministries are seen where churches are meeting the needs of families during mission study time in supporting the family unit. There are two types of families—the "extended family" and the "nuclear family."

The "extended family" lives in the community with their relatives, parents and grandparents. The style of living is generally governed by the older people. There is a feeling of support in these family ties. The "nuclear family" does not have the relatives near for support and decision making. The makeup is the father, mother and children all alone in the community. They are free to make whatever decisions are necessary for their survival. The church can better minister to these families if the church understands their needs and lifestyles.

Two meetings of the District Coordinators of Family Ministries were held to design ways in which to assist the local church in providing an effective ministry to the families.

A Marriage Enrichment Retreat for ministers and their wives of the Anderson District was held at the Clemson House. The purpose of this retreat was

to minister to the enrichment of the parsonage family directly and to the families of the parish indirectly.

Camping adds a certain amount of adventure to family recreation. This brings the family closer together in a setting which causes an awareness of God and His creation. A week-end in June at the beach and a whole week in July at Lake Junaluska are based on the idea that camping is not an escape from life but a means of deepening life.

THE CAMP

The United Methodist Camp is booked up far in advance for use by local church, district and conference groups. Camp enrollment increased last summer, as the following statistics will show:

Two new features met with signal success. They are the 12-day Junior High Camp and the Appalachian Trail Hike. Plans are to include an additional 12-Day Camp for Mid Highs and another week on the Appalachian Trail for 1972.

As reported elsewhere, there was a family camp held at Pirateland Family Campground in June. Thirty-three families and 153 people attended.

During the year a large recreation shelter has been completed through cash donations over the past several years. This will be a considerable asset to the programs in rainy weather and for night events. The dimensions are 40' x 80'.

The sale of a house in Asheville donated last year by Mr. Harry Mims of Orangeburg for camp development has been completed and the net proceeds are available for the construction of a maintenance building which is urgently needed for the storage and care of camp equipment.

Under the direction of Mr. Wesley Voight the camp continues to operate efficiently and effectively. Appreciation is here acknowledged for Mr. and Mrs. Voight and for the host of college students, ministers and others who serve as counselors.

Contributions from local churches for 1969-70 were \$39,676.00; for 1970-71, \$35,545.46. Through February 1 this conference year, they were \$22,166.68. For the same period last year, they were \$21,878.60.

OTHER SUMMER ACTIVITIES

Youth Encounter-71 was held for Senior Highs and Mid Highs at Columbia College July 26-30. The attendance was 105 over against 76 in 1970. This was a week in which these youth encountered themselves, others, the Gospel, life-as-it-is for rich and poor, and The Church as it struggles to new life.

The Senior Adult Assembly, held at Columbia College, was ecumenical in program and participation. Fifty-three participants enjoyed fellowship, stimulation, worship and recreation and received new insights, new skills and Christian concern.

OTHER SERVICES

The staff has endeavored to respond to all the varied calls for educational services. Some of these are: Counseling with churches and individuals on the selection of curriculum resources and their use, supplying information with regard to United Methodist Student Loans and Scholarships, counseling with

churches who are seeking lay staff members and with applicants who are seeking employment in church occupations, recommending instructors and other resource people to render special services.

OUR COLLEGES AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

The Board of Education strongly reaffirms our colleges and campus ministry. It unqualifiedly affirms the ministry of the Spartanburg Junior College and calls attention to the fact that it is funded under the Board of Missions and does not receive any support through the Board of Education.

The fact is, however, at a time in history when the call for a vital ministry to young adults on college campuses is more urgent than ever before, the support to higher education is decreasing.

At a time when the value of the dollar is decreasing and Wofford and Columbia have to meet the demands for rising prices in goods and services on every hand, the contributions of the churches are less than they were three years ago.

In the past three years, contributions to colleges have decreased from \$253,352 to \$223,256; to campus ministry from \$74,890 to \$55,814.

In spite of heavy increases in college fees, the colleges have had to curtail their programs in several important respects. Campus ministry has been curtailed to the hurting point. Personnel has been reduced from four full-time ministers to one fulltime, one theological (student) intern, and one part-time minister.

In response to this situation, the Board of Education in the fall of 1971 authorized a task force to study the funding of campus ministry as related to higher education.

The Board of Education heard and adopted the report at its February meeting. The closing paragraph of the introduction reads as follows:

The United Methodist constituency of South Carolina need the opportunity to consider and then to declare whether they have the resources, the concern, the intention, the will to carry out the mission assigned to Wofford and Columbia and the mission assigned to Campus Ministry. Worry over the past actions of other leaders, whether justified or not, hostility toward questioning, restless students, and financial vendettas against Wesley Foundations or our colleges ought now to give way to mature, forthright discussion and a consequent declaration of whether or not education and students will have claim on the church's love and money.

The following "Basic Principles" were adopted as a part of the report of the task force:

We offer the following principles as the opinion of the Task Force for consideration and approval by the Conference Board of Education.

—Christian Higher Education as embodied in Wofford College, Columbia College, and in Campus Ministry to various state or independently controlled colleges within our state are affirmed as vital and deserving of our moral and financial loyalty and commitment.

—The personnel who exercise these two aspects of mission on behalf of the Conference are committed to the place and integrity of the

other. The administrations of Wofford, Columbia, and Spartanburg Junior colleges hereby support and affirm Campus Ministry. Those who implement Campus Ministry on other South Carolina campuses declare the uniqueness of Christian colleges such as ours and the need for their special relationship to the United Methodist Church of South Carolina.

—The financial exigencies of these two distinct though related missions require a fresh reassessment by the United Methodist Church of South Carolina of their relation to the total mission of the United Methodist Church and an inquiry into the problems of interpretation and of relationships to other Conference tasks, institutions, commitments, and priorities that reassessment signifies.

The work of this task force formed some of the background for recommendations regarding the financing of our Senior Colleges and Campus Ministry for the seven-month conference year (June-December, 1972) made jointly by the Executive Committees of the Boards of Education of the two S. C. Conferences.

It will serve as a valuable resource as the new Board of Education develops recommendations for 1973.

Contributions to Higher Education from June 1, 1971, to January 31, 1972, amounted to \$126,424.28. For the same period last year it was \$127,785.62.

Please refer to the reports of the Presidents of Columbia and Wofford Colleges for a fuller account of the ministries and educational opportunities offered at these two schools.

REPORT NO. 2

The Annual Report of the President of Wofford College

What a joy it is for Wofford College to be related now to all United Methodists of South Carolina and to welcome to its campus the first meeting of a brand new inclusive Annual Conference. In this new unity Claflin College, Columbia College, Spartanburg Junior College, and Wofford have an opportunity to make more effective than ever before their ministry in Christian Higher Education. Each of these institutions has its own unique calling. Their services are diverse

and complementary, not duplicative. Possibly no other Annual Conference in United Methodism has a better chance to make Christian Higher Education work.

1971-72 has been a good year at Wofford. The opening enrollment of 10, included 23 coeds, as Wofford returned to a policy of earlier days under which qualified women who live in the commuting area are eligible to attend as degree candidates. These young women are bright and personable, and their presence on campus makes a wholly positive impact on academic and social life.

Wofford and neighboring Converse College are now permitting cross-registration on a space-available basis. This efficient policy enables Converse women to take courses at Wofford which are not available at Converse, and vice versa. No extra charge is made. How nice it would be if Columbia and Wofford were close enough to each other to permit this same flexibility.

Wofford and Spartanburg Junior College are cooperating in several areas—most notably in the ROTC program and in a federally assisted effort to provide higher education for law enforcement officers. Spartanburg Junior College now offers an Associate of Arts degree in Police Science. Wofford recognizes these credits, receives transfers, and offers a strong upper-level liberal arts curriculum leading to a bachelor's degree for these law officers. This cooperative endeavor is already improving the quality of law enforcement in Spartanburg and strengthening the relationship between city and county officials and our college communities.

The Wofford faculty continues its strong leadership in curricular improvement. Even as the College completed its fifth year of experience with the January Interim, it approved a new program in the humanities which will emphasize the importance of value systems in decision making and problem solving.

This step and the preparation of a proposal for a new religious life program at Wofford illustrate Wofford's continuing dedication to the proposition that a church-related college must add a unique dimension to higher education. The College is seeking a \$1,000,000 endowment to be used exclusively in the promotion of serious religious inquiry and discussion by students, faculty members, administrators, trustees, and every visitor to the campus.

Mr. Arthur Humphries, a devoted United Methodist layman and Wofford alumnus, has made generous gifts to all four of our colleges to help them emphasize physical fitness and healthful habits along with mental and spiritual development. His four gifts of \$10,000 each plus additional sums of \$5,000 provided by each of the colleges are being used to purchase athletic and recreational equipment for use by every single enrolled student if he or she desires to participate. Wofford students have responded with enthusiasm and with sincere gratitude for Mr. Humphries' generosity.

Wofford students in '71-'72 have displayed a very wholesome spirit and outlook. The surliness of the 60's has given way to a new campus atmosphere of courtesy and respect. As this report is being written, costs of vandalism and accidental breakage for this year are just one-fifth of the costs at the same time last year. The recent student elections had the highest voter turnout in anyone's memory. The winners were not anti-this or anti-that, but more positive in approach.

Much of the credit for all of this must go to a changing national climate among college-age young people. Perhaps the new voting privilege and draft quota reductions are responsible. On the other hand, having in mind the dispute of a year ago concerning Wofford's approach to moral concerns and training, this College dares to argue with honest conviction that our young people are responding to our policy of treating them as young adults in behaving more maturely than they did under a more legalistic system. There are signs also that many students are paying serious attention to the more intensive efforts in Wofford's history to provide information and counseling concerning alcohol and drug abuse.

These young people—many from the homes of those who read this report—are tops! Thank you for supporting them as you support Wofford College!

REPORT No. 3

Report of the President of Columbia College

It is my privilege to present to you my twenty-first Annual Report as President of Columbia College. Allow me to present briefly several important items under the three work areas of our college life: Academic Affairs, Student Affairs, and Business Affairs.

Academic Affairs

This is a day not only of knowledge explosion, but of the "implosion" of idea power—that is, the breaking of ideas from within in institutions such as a college. Without being too optimistic, let me observe that there seems to be a new awakening on campuses today on the part of faculty and students, and administrators. Educational programs take new styles and new forms; projects and courses are related better to the whole of society. Ten years ago there were strong attempts made to bring society to the campus. Today traffic is reversed, and the idea is take education out into society. That is not to say that the college or the university has all the answers, and must rush to the world with the best and latest solutions. It is to say, however, that the college community can learn better by relating more to societal problems.

Exciting new programs take groups of our students into organizations and groups within the private and state sectors for learning experiences. Obviously these organizations will benefit from the fresh views of the learners. What Martin Buber said about faith is still applicable to education: "... entrance into that whole reality, without curtailment or reduction."

More "openness" with reference to admissions, requirements in major fields of study, and counseling affords faculty and staff better opportunity to assist students in achieving academic goals.

For the past few months our academic staff has been working at implementation of our Self-Study. The college had its accreditation reaffirmed in December of 1971 by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. For many months, however, we have been working at implementation of the recommendations of the Self-Study. A two-day workshop for the entire Board of Trustees, scheduled in May of 1972, deals with implementation of the Self-Study. Restructuring of the Board of Trustees and the administration of the college, bolstering our guidance and counseling program, and strengthening several departments of the college will undoubtedly result in a stronger academic posture for this college. Our academic staff, including administrators and faculty, are planning creatively and competently!

Student Affairs

Working through various committees—particularly the Student Affairs Committee of the student body and the Board of Trustees, our goal continues to be the best possible communications between students, faculty, administrators, trustees, parents, and alumnae. One of the strengths of a small Christian college is to relate well to our constituents.

As the students themselves put it: "If you are in it, and of it, you better be with it!" To us this means that the faculty, the administration, the trustees, the alumnae, and the parents who are concerned about this college must relate as best we can to the students.

Student leaders this year—and those elected for next year—are responsive to opportunity, responsible in performance of their duties, and most capable of moving this college in the right direction.

Students today are service-oriented. They care little for status, but seem determined to be of the greatest possible use to God and society. Because our college is small, there is great opportunity for us to listen to what students are saying, and we believe that they listen to us a great deal also.

Students today have a great many more freedoms, and fewer restraints, than in former years. We must observe, however, that the vast majority of

our students accept these freedoms with a growing sense of maturity and responsibility.

A good illustration of student maturity is found in religious activities on campus. We moved this year to less rigidity in chapel attendance, requiring attendance at two services a month, and emphasizing voluntary attendance for the other two Wednesday services. Results are gratifying. Students are supporting this new approach with enthusiasm. They have a vital part not only in the change, but also in strengthening the chapel series by participating in plans for bringing to our campus such outstanding speakers as Dr. Thomas Langford of Duke; Dr. Harley Williams of Greensboro; Reverend Tom Stockton of Asheville; the Honorable Travis Medlock of Columbia; Dr. Bryan Crenshaw of Columbia.

Our Board, the administration, and the faculty, plan to continue to involve students as much as possible in the plans and programs for Columbia College.

Business Affairs

By good business management, our college has established stability in its current fund, moving from a deficit of some \$250,000 four years ago to the present "break even" level. Indeed, it is safe to predict that our audit at the close of the current fiscal year, July 31, 1972, will show that we have operated with a modest surplus.

For the past three years the Office of Development and the President's Office have cooperated in waging a "quiet campaign" to better undergird the endowment. Our efforts have hinged around an unsophisticated approach—no publicity, no fancy brochures, and no heavy expenses incurred—to improve the potential of our endowment. Our actual endowment now stands at approximately two million dollars. Three years ago our Board of Trustees encouraged us in our efforts to increase this endowment fund from two million to ten or twelve million. To this date, by including bequests and deferred gifts, our endowment potential has been increased by approximately 2.6 million dollars. Now our actual and potential endowment totals approximately 4.6 million dollars. We have requested our Business Affairs Division of the Board to plan carefully, over the next few years, so that we can indeed attain the endowment level which this college deserves—ten to twelve million dollars.

Appreciation

Allow me a special word of gratitude to our administrative staff, faculty, alumnae, and student leaders for their splendid cooperation and devoted work. I have tremendous gratitude for Dr. Thomas G. Shuler, who resigns this year, after rendering significant service over a period of twenty years in several capacities—Assistant to the President, Dean of Admissions and Records, and Dean of the College. We extend to him our deep appreciation.

Allow me to express continuing gratitude for the leadership of Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., who has given able leadership in Christian higher education over the twelve-year period of his administration in South Carolina United Methodism. Bishop Hardin, his Cabinet, the Board of the Laity, the Women's Society of Christian Service, The Advocate, the Board of Education—and the other boards and agencies of our Conference—have given invaluable assistance.

During the year the college sustained a great loss in the death of our Vice President, the Reverend J. H. Martin. Jim Martin gave substantially of his talents to this college, and one of the last meetings he attended was a session of our Executive Committee some forty-eight hours prior to his passing.

We lose two of our members this year by rotation: Dr. John Wood Robinson and Mr. W. J. Greer. Both of these gentlemen have served Columbia College ably and thoughtfully over a period of twelve years.

**SPECIAL DAYS AND OFFERINGS
RECOMMENDED JOINTLY BY THE BOARDS OF EDUCATION
OF THE '66 AND THE '85 CONFERENCES
JUNE 1, 1972 — DECEMBER 31, 1972**

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION SUNDAY

We recommend that the observance of Christian Education Sunday (Rally Day) be held on September 24, 1972, and that the offering taken, or the amount placed in the budget, be equal to 2 per cent of the Pastor's and Associate Pastor's total cash salary including travel and expense fund for the current seven-month year.

THE S. C. UNITED METHODIST CAMP

We recommend that each church be requested to contribute to The Methodist Camp a minimum of \$1.00 per church school member either through the church budget or through a special offering taken for that purpose. That October 29 be designated as Camp Sunday.

HIGHER EDUCATION**(Claflin, Columbia, Wofford and Campus Ministry)**

It is recommended that each church be asked to contribute to the support of the fund for higher education, an amount based on 5.7% of net giving. The amount requested is \$372,970, which is 5.7% of seven twelfths of the net giving of the two Conferences for 1969-70, as reported to World Service for the Conference Year 1969-70.

We recommend that contributions to this cause be divided in the following way:

Up to \$34,000 will be a priority item for the support of Campus Ministry other than for salaries. The balance is to be divided among the three senior colleges on this formula: Claflin, 18.3%; Columbia, 40.85%; Wofford, 40.85%. (This division is based on what each college received in 1970-71.)

We recommend further that November 5, 1972, be observed as Higher Education Sunday and that each local church plan an observance designed to create an understanding of our total program of Higher Education. The Board of Education is assigning The Reverend George S. Duffie, Jr., to devote the major part of his time to the specific task of interpreting the Higher Education Program and promoting its support.

ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS
(1866 Conference)

There is an ever increasing demand placed upon the United Methodist Church for competent persons in Church related occupations.

The demand for competent personnel increases the importance and urgency of the Commission on Enlistment and Church Occupation. Even though there is an urgency, the Commission must be mindful that recruitment is a very involved endeavor. The Commission should be informed as to the need for voluntary workers as persons for specific occupational callings. One's attitude of his life's involvement as commitment is important.

Young persons need to be confronted, and challenged to accept the call of the Gospel into Ministry. They need to be knowledgeable of the various types of ministry offered by the church, through which they may give meaning of their life style.

It is the opinion of the Commission on Enlistment and Church Occupation that the church is in the midst of a great challenge, but is much alive. We believe that the church is built upon a solid foundation, whose maker is God and is everlasting.

We believe that a church occupation is not an end within itself, but a means to a fuller Christian experience and expression of life. The Commission believes in the joy derived and service rendered, to be a compelling force upon ministers, and other involved persons in Christian Witness, to tell the story of the good news, that is arrived by those whose life is committed to service for God and their fellowman.

The Committee on Enlistment was involved in many church ministries during the conference year 1971-72:

1. Persons of the Commission were involved with youth and young adult groups on the conference and district level.
2. The Commission participated in the Annual Youth Convocation sponsored during the 1971 Annual Conference in Orangeburg. There were over 800 youth in attendance to the Youth Convocation.
3. Members of the Commission participated in Career Day Activities at various high schools in the state.
4. Hand books on Enlistment and Church Occupation were placed in the library of many high schools throughout the state.

Records were made of those persons showing an interest in Enlistment and Church Occupation and a continuous line of communication was established. We keep in contact throughout the high school and college years.

Recommendations for 1972-73

1. We recommend that persons previously committed to Church Occupations be given continuous guidance.
2. We recommend that the Commission distribute literature through the Secretary on Enlistment in Local churches.
3. We recommend that the Commission make it self available for participation in High School and College Career Day Activities.
4. We recommend that each church agency make referrals of interested persons in church occupations to the Commission on Enlistment.

The Commission wishes to express their appreciation to Bishop Hardin, the District Superintendents and Local Churches for their support of the Commission.

ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS
(1785 Conference)

The Commission(s) on Enlistment for Church Occupations have endeavored during this year to reach persons with the challenge and need of commitment of life to service through the church. The two Commissions have met and reorganized into one commission to serve the conference.

Activities of the commission(s) during this conference year have consisted of efforts to provide internships in service for the church, distribution of literature, one day seminars to give first hand views of various ministries of the church.

Printed materials have been placed in the office of the Program Council for persons seeking information on church occupations. District Directors have been provided with sample materials to acquaint them with what is available. These materials are made available free to the asker, having been purchased by the Commission.

The Commission has cooperated with the Committee on Lay Work and provided expenses for a lay worker representative to visit the campus of Emory University to talk with candidates for lay work within the church. This visit was made in conjunction with the visit of the Board of the Ministry to the campus. No lay worker candidates were found at Duke, therefore no representation from lay workers was made at this campus.

In internship projects we have provided three volunteers to serve in Greenville Inner-City Ministry during the summer of 1971. Under the guidance of the Rev. Harlan Wilson, these persons served in programs of summer recreation and leadership in lower economic areas of the city. Their reaction to their service has been affirmative.

We, also, provided nine \$25.00 scholarships for persons serving in the Johns Island Migrant Ministry program during the summer of 1972. An evaluation retreat was held for these persons and the results show favorable response from these volunteers to what the church is doing.

To reach Junior High youth who were being confirmed into full membership in the church, our commission sponsored three Bishop's Confirmation Institutes. These were held in Greenville, Columbia, and Charleston. Over nine hundred persons attended the three institutes. Bishop Hardin spoke at each and gave the youth an opportunity to meet their Bishop. Visits and audiovisual presentations enable those attending to get a view of many of the church's ministries. An ecumenical air was found in the Charleston rally when a Catholic priest represented Inner City ministry, a missionary from India and a Naval Hospital Chaplain told of their work.

Two scholarships have been provided by the Commission to the Summer Investment Project for 1972. These funds came from funds remaining from our Greenville Mission.

We are indebted to many persons for tireless service during this year in carrying out the program of Enlistment. We express to each our deepest appreciation.

On April 4, 1972, the two commissions met in joint session under the call of the chairmen, The Rev. Omega Newman for the Conference 1866 and the Rev. Henry M. Thomson for the Conference 1785. At this meeting officers were elected to serve the seven months of the remainder of 1972. These are: Chairman, Henry M. Thomson, Vice Chairman, I. DeQuincy Newman, Secretary, Bundy Bynum, Jr. The new commission makes the following recommendations:

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR JUNE-DECEMBER, 1972.

1. That two Deaconess Representatives from our conference be sent to the International Deaconess Convention in New York, June 14-17, 1972.
2. That a Speakers Bureau composed of summer volunteers be set up to provide resource persons for local churches relating to summer ministries and enlistment. We will provide expenses for the speakers for churches unable to pay.
3. One meeting of the Commission is scheduled for September 7, 1972 to provide training for new district secretaries and implement plans for programming.
4. We recommend that every church examine itself in light of human resources and discover how many persons have come from that church to go into full time church occupations. If a church must answer "None."

then the question should be asked, "Why?" Actions should be taken to promote enlistment for church occupations throughout the congregation.

5. We recommend use of printed materials provided by the Interboard Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations. These may be secured from our Program Council office, 1420 Lady Street, Columbia, S. C. or from P. O. Box 871, Nashville, Tennessee.
6. We recommend that contact be made with the incoming Bishop as soon as he arrives in our area to schedule at least five institutes for Junior High Youth for 1973 relating to the commitment of the whole self to the ministry of the church.

EVANGELISM REPORT NO. 1

Program Highlights of the 1785 Conference Board for 1971-72

The Board of Evangelism of the former '85 Conference spent its final year of existence in events of Exploration, Investigation and Communication through the following activities.

1. LISTENING LABS: Five regional labs were staged across South Carolina, where 1200 pastors, local work-area chairmen on Evangelism, and other interested laymen responded to the question, "What do you think we ought to do to make Evangelism more significant in our church?" Two basic discoveries were revealed in these labs:
 - A. There is a great concern in our church today for the poor attendance at Worship Service and Church School.
 - B. There is a great concern because we are failing to reach the unchurched people in the communities of South Carolina.
2. TRAINING AND THE CANDLER CAMP MEETING: Last summer many District Program Councils sent their District Directors of Evangelism to Lake Junaluska to receive training and morale building at the Candler Camp Meeting. This meeting was one of the most effective in the last several years.
3. SUMMER EVANGELISTIC MISSION:

Campground Ministry: During the summer months of 1971 five chaplains (Baptist, Episcopal, Lutheran, Methodist and Presbyterian) ministered to some 40,000 summer residents and vacationers in the Grand Strand area of our state making this project the largest of any of its kind in the United States. Our Board pays the \$900 salary of the Methodist chaplain.

Lake Murray Ministry: This project has been carried out by a seminary student from the Candler School of Theology of Emory University. The program includes activities in the following areas: outreach, worship, recreation, fellowship, and visitation, with attendance at the weekly workshop service numbering between 70 and 170. The Lake Murray Ministry is truly ecumen-

- ical in outreach with participants from almost every faith. Our Board contributes \$500 to the Lake Murray Ministry.
4. **YOUTH CONFERENCE:** In conjunction with the Conference Youth Council and the Board of the Laity, we sponsored a Youth Conference in Columbia, with 600 young people representing every District in our Conference.
 5. **COUNCIL ON EVANGELISM:** San Francisco was the site of the 1972 Council on Evangelism, which was attended by Rev. Carl Parker and supported by our Board.
 6. **LAY WITNESS MISSION:** Our Board continues to support the Lay Witness Mission Program as coordinated by the Institute of Church Renewal.

HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

REPORT No. 1

Epworth Children's Home

This report begins the recording of the history of Epworth Children's Home for the second seventy-five years of its existence. On January 20, 1971, the seventy-fifth birthday of Epworth was celebrated and this is now the first year of the second seventy-five. All of these seventy-five years have not been smooth and easy, as the history of Epworth will reveal. There has been years of wars and depression, years of progress and years of some decline, years of conflict and desperation, good years and bad. Through it all, Epworth has come to this hour with a history, an inheritance, and a foundation that leaves little excuse for a failure to move out into the second seventy-five years of its history with high hopes and dreams and a realization of a program of child care and family services that reaches far beyond the imagination of those of us who begin this second great period of our history.

The Board of Trustees begin this new period with a renewed purpose:

"Epworth Children's Home and its services exist as the expression of the desire of the Methodist people of South Carolina to serve their Lord and Master by providing, in a Christian manner and to the extent of their resources and capabilities, child care, counseling and related services to families and children in the State of South Carolina."

During the year Church contributions increased very slightly over the past year. The increase was by \$6,253.00 which represents almost a little less than 2% above that which was given a year earlier. This is not enough to care

for the cost of living increase but is evidence of the fact that the churches are showing a continued interest in Epworth and its program.

It will not come as any surprise that the operating costs of Epworth were the highest in the history of the institution. The increase of the current operating budget this year over last was \$12,000.00.

The area in which we are all most concerned is that of the service rendered by Epworth Children's Home. Last year more persons were served through the various Epworth programs than in any year of the history of the institution.

In considering this total number served, the families listed above represent many more than 328 people. It would be a sizeable job to go back and determine the exact number of family members worked with during the year. This would include parents, brothers and sisters not otherwise receiving service, aunts, uncles, grandparents and other relatives. It is conservative to estimate that each family would average at least two people. If this is done it would mean that 788 people were served as part of families that are not included in the children to whom service was rendered. This means that 788 people were served in families and 787 children were served for a grand total of 1475.

REPORT No. 2

The Methodist Home—Orangeburg

This has been a very significant year in the history of the Home. We completed four new buildings designed to serve our residents and a mechanical building that provides heating and air conditioning. Some new residents moved in on September 1, 1971. There was a constant intake of persons and we were almost full by the end of the year.

All of this transpired during the 18th year of the existence of our Home, and South Carolina Methodism has every reason to take pride in these achievements. It is truly a dream come true.

We have completed only the first phase of our long range program. It would be gratifying if we could begin the construction of two buildings for residential care and another for Intermediate Care. The third and final phase would be a new modern Nursing Home.

The primary objective of this agency is to provide meaningful retirement in a Christian atmosphere. The combined efforts of our staff must be designed to give all the residents a sense of security, independence and self reliance. Active persons are encouraged to become a part of our family before they need medical assistance. The cost of living in a retirement Home is usually not more than the cost of maintaining a home or an apartment.

Potential applicants and their families should be reminded constantly that we are not just a nursing home. Older persons do become ill and they do need medical attention. Therefore, health care is one important part of our

ministry. We are adequately staffed to meet these needs as they arise. We do admit persons direct to our medical facilities when there is a vacancy. However, it must be kept in mind that the medical staff transfers residential care persons to the medical facilities. There is usually someone in residential care who is ready for a bed when one is vacated in a medical facility.

Do not think of older persons as a special segment of society who are wholly different from their counterparts. Infirmities do slow them down, but they are not bothered too much if they are not hurried. Those with high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries or diseases of the brain may suffer from the complications of these conditions. However, the majority are as keen and alert as ever and some have more on the ball than many middle-agers.

Statistics show us that most senior citizens are not bedridden. The majority do not tire so quickly that they cannot work, shop, travel, or engage in sex. They are not more susceptible to colds, and their rate of acute illnesses is below the average for the entire population of the United States. It is true that some of these persons spend twice as many days in bed after 65 than before. Yet, this amounts to an average of less than 14 days per year.

The needs of our people are basically the same as those of our society. One important need is spiritual guidance and we present the report of our Chaplain-Program Director. This report speaks for itself.

Report of the Chaplain-Program Director

1. Chaplain's Ministries:

We conduct three Worship Services each week in order to reach the residents in the different sections of the Home. We also have four week-day devotions and the residents conduct two prayer meetings per week. The counseling sessions are about equally divided between the staff, residents and residents' families. There are about sixteen such counseling sessions per week. We average about forty individual visits per week, including visits to the Orangeburg Regional Hospital.

2. Programs and Special Services:

The two most popular programs at the Home are Bingo and Crafts. There are four bingo parties each week conducted by the resident volunteers. Some residents go from the retired and personal care areas to the Infirmary and Intermediate Care units to help those patients who may have difficulty with vision and coordination play bingo. The Home has had two classes in Creative Arts sponsored by the Orangeburg County Department of Adult Education. These classes included such crafts as Ceramics, Decoupage, Woodcraft, Burlap Design, Needle point, and leather crafts. We have about twenty-five volunteer workers who come to the Home and help with the different crafts, write letters, and do other necessary tasks for the residents. A large number of the residents give volunteer service regularly.

Special events include such activities as "Back to School Party", "Miss Methodist Home" contest, Float in Christmas Parade, Special Thanksgiving Program, and a Special Christmas Party sponsored by the Home. In addition to these programs we have had over fifty Church and Civic groups to sponsor programs at the Home this year. There are a number of tours planned for this spring and summer, and we will be planning more as time permits.

REPORT No. 3

The Greenwood Methodist Home

The Greenwood Methodist Home is a modern-day miracle. In an unbelievably short time, we have there some seventy-five beautiful acres of land, a \$2,500,000 Nursing Center free of debt, plus an endowment fund of \$420,000. We have an excellent Board of Trustees, a competent administration, and good staff personnel. We are giving the highest quality of skilled nursing care and in the spirit of Christian caring. A Development Committee is at work and other buildings are planned. Ultimately, we will have a variety of retirement accommodations as well as nursing care. The best in services and know-how will be provided, plus a concern for persons as persons.

We would hope that our constituency understands two things:

1. We followed the best advice of those who are serving in Methodist homes for the elderly in building the Nursing Center first and retirement facilities later. Obviously many residents in a retirement village eventually need nursing care. It should also be obvious that it will take time and money to erect all of the buildings we now envision. Thus, we can only respond at present to those who need skilled nursing care, and persons who need a "home" find that as yet we are unprepared to provide this type of care.

2. It should be remembered that skilled nursing care is the most expensive level of care we will offer. We are a non-profit enterprise and we are anxious to serve as many persons as possible at the most reasonable cost possible—and indeed at no cost to those who are unable to pay. Few people realize that approximately seventy employees are required to serve one hundred and two patients. This level of care is comparable to hospital care—and at about one-third of the cost. Many patients have Social Security, Medicare and/or Medicaid coverage. Others are able to pay the cost of care. It should be realized that our income for supplementing the cost of care must come from churches, individuals and income from the Lipford endowment—and the total of these funds is still limited. We are operating at a deficit and will continue to do so until our patient load is approximately 80%. It is our desire and purpose to give care to those who need it without regard to ability to pay and we are committed to this within the limits of funds available.

It is only a matter of time before we have had a beautiful retirement village, with nursing care available, able to serve a wider constituency. But this will require time and money.

GREENWOOD METHODIST HOME

Report of The Administrator

It is a high privilege to present to the Annual Conference my fourth report as Administrator of Greenwood Methodist Home.

As the President of our Board has noted, a dream has been realized in a remarkably short time. Just five years ago, the South Carolina Conference was given the opportunity and the challenge to create a new Home for the Aging. The opportunity was seized, the challenge accepted, and today we can point with pride to the first unit of the Greenwood Methodist Home, as well as new and renewed facilities at The Methodist Home, Orangeburg.

The Nursing Center of the Greenwood Home was dedicated debtfree on Sunday, May 2, 1971, admitted its first patients on Thursday, May 19, 1971, and has now completed one full year of service. Our present census numbers 65 skilled-care nursing patients, and since our opening, we have served a total of nearly 150 persons. The Nursing Center is a participant in both the Medicare and Medicaid programs, and has sought to serve both those who have

the ability to pay fully the cost of their care as well as those who need considerable financial assistance.

If you have followed closely the trends in health care, especially of the aging, you know that these are difficult days for nursing care facilities. Care is expensive in any way that it is delivered, and especially if it is quality care. Because we have not yet achieved a full occupancy, this has been a year of deficit operations for our Nursing Center. We are confident as the facility approaches an occupancy of approximately 85%, income will be sufficient to meet expenses. We are grateful for the faithfulness of Methodist people across the Conference for it is their gifts to the Support Fund, and special gifts, that has undergirded the Home in these days of its "infancy." We covet your continued support, through your gifts and your prayers, even as the Conference faces new demands and new opportunities for service.

The Board of Trustees is at the task of planning for the future, seeking ways to accomplish additional portions of the Home's long-range development plans. The Board is not content to rest with the accomplishment which the Nursing Center represents, but recognizes that residential care must be provided for the well aging as expeditiously as possible. Beyond the provision for on-campus facilities and service, there is also great demand for the Home to become a regional resource, ministering to a growing aging population, many of whom cannot be provided for in the institutional setting.

Let me conclude by inviting you to come and see, come and share, in the excitement of this ministry to the aging. Especially would we invite you to share in the Dedication of The Featherstone Garden at the Nursing Center on Thursday, July 27, at 5 p.m. This lovely addition to the Nursing Center grounds will be functional as well as a thing of beauty, and will honor a distinguished Greenwood couple, the Douglas Featherstones, who helped to bring the Home into being.

These are exciting days in the field of aging, and as the theme of the 1972 White House Conference on Aging has reminded us, these are days that call for action, not just words, if we are to meet adequately the needs of an ever-increasing number of older Americans. South Carolina Methodism can point with pride to its Homes for the Aging, and growing capacities for service for our Conference has not been content with words of love but is significantly engaged in works of love!

REPORT No. 4

Methodist Homes Campaign Continuing Committee

The Methodist Homes Campaign Continuing Committee is charged with the responsibility of bringing to a successful conclusion the capital funds drive launched on behalf of our two Methodist Homes a little more than four years ago. The Committee interprets the task assigned to it by the Annual Conference to mean the realization of a 100% payment of the two and one-half million dollars pledged to the Homes.

By action of the Annual Conference, the Committee was authorized to continue its efforts for a fourth year (the present Conference Year) even though the original plan for the Methodist Homes Campaign envisioned concluding the Campaign in the Spring of 1971. During its fourth year of activity the Committee has worked with Districts and local Churches across the Conference to keep South Carolina Methodism alert to the fact that the campaign goal has not yet been realized. Special promotional efforts have included the recognition of those Churches that have distinguished themselves by paying 100% of their pledge; cards of appreciation were sent to each of these Churches and in addition, they were recognized in the pages of THE SOUTH CAROLINA METHODIST ADVOCATE in an "Honor Roll." The effectiveness of this promotional effort can be seen in the fact that as of March 31, 1972, a total of \$99,861.37 has been paid for the 1971-72 Conference Year. This brings total payments since the beginning of the Campaign to \$1,853,453.08.

During the Conference Year now concluding significant accomplishments have been made at both of our Homes. At Greenwood, the first unit of the Greenwood Home (a 102-bed long-term care skilled nursing facility) was completed and began serving its first patients on May 19, 1971. As of April 1, 1972, the Nursing Center has served approximately 65 patients, with new arrivals scheduled daily. The Board of Trustees of the Home is now looking toward the construction of residential facilities envisioned in a long-range "Development Plan."

At Orangeburg, The Methodist Home has moved into its spacious new residential buildings, demolished its long-ago-worn-out World War II barracks, refurbished other newer structures, and is operating at near-capacity. The Home can serve approximately 260 persons with four levels of care: residential care, personal care, intermediate nursing care, and skilled nursing care.

Despite these tremendous accomplishments, there is still a job to be done! As of the date this report was prepared by the Committee, \$741,230.72 remains to be collected on the Campaign pledges; the Committee is hopeful that remittances during April and May 1972 will be as substantial as in the past several years, thereby moving the total collected to the two million dollar level. Beyond the attainment of the Campaign goal, the Committee is hopeful that its cultivation and promotional efforts will produce as a by-product a greater awareness on the part of the Annual Conference and each local Church of the needs of our Methodist Homes as they seek to minister adequately to the aging. With these goals in mind, the Committee respectfully submits to the Annual Conference the following recommendations.

Recommendations

The Methodist Homes Campaign Continuing Committee recommends that:

(1) This committee be authorized for the Annual Conference to continue its promotional efforts for the remainder of the calendar year 1972.

(2) That every local Church which has not yet met its pledge in full (including those Churches which made no pledge toward their original "Fair Share Goal") devise a plan for attaining its goal during the coming year;

(3) That the following operating budget be approved for the Committee during the ensuing year:

Summary

The Committee makes its recommendations in the light of its conviction that South Carolina Methodists intend to keep their commitment to our Methodist Homes and to those whom the Homes serve. Contributions of approximately \$100,000.00 this past year add strength to that conviction! The Committee has endeavored to be a good steward in discharging its mission and can report that as of report time it required less than \$1,000.00 for operating expenses during the year. Nevertheless, we recognize that every Campaign needs direction, just as a team needs a captain. We trust that the Conference will concur in our recommendations.

REPORT No. 6**Golden Cross**

Five nursing scholarships of \$300 each are provided by Golden Cross. Funds are used for repair, upkeep, and insurance of our twelve homes for retired ministers. Golden Cross also provides up to \$300 in medical aid to needy Methodists. Application forms for medical aid may be obtained from your district superintendent. Each Church is asked to place Golden Cross in their budget or receive an offering for Golden Cross, the first week in December.

REPORT No. 7**Recommendations**

Section 1. Epworth Childrens Home has continued its excellent ministry to the needs of children in its care. We commend the quality of care given and join with the Trustees of Epworth in respectfully requesting the Bishop and his Cabinet to reappoint Dr. Allan R. Broome as superintendent.

Section 2. We recommend that the third Sunday in September (Sept. 17, 1972) be set aside as Annual Work Day and that a special free-will offering be received in all Churches of our conference on this day for Epworth Children's Home; and that the Church Schools of our conference shall be requested to give the offering received on the first Sunday of each month to the support of Epworth Childrens Home.

Section 3. We recognize the ministry rendered to the elderly through the Orangeburg Methodist Home. We recommend the Rev. C. L. Woodard and his staff for their service and join the trustees of this home in respectfully requesting the re-appointment of Mr. Woodard as superintendent.

Section 4. We commend The Rev. T. R. Morton and his staff for their ministry to the occupants of the Greenwood Home. We join the trustees of this Home in respectfully requesting the re-appointment of Mr. Morton as superintendent.

Section 5. We recommend that each Church in our Conference set a minimum goal of 90 cents per member either in free will offering or budget for the Homes Support fund. It is recommended that Thanksgiving week be set aside for a special offering for the Methodist Homes. We further recommend the support fund be divided on the basis of 75% for the Orangeburg Home and 25% for the Greenwood Home.

Section 6. We recommend that four seminars for ministers, to help them in their awareness and sensitivity to the needs of families with retarded persons, be held at Greenville, Columbia, St. George, and Florence Oct. 18, 19, 25 and 26, 1972.

REPORT NO. 10

Southeastern Methodist Agency for the Retarded

PRESENT PROGRAM

A program was outlined by the Program Committee of SEMAR that was designed to sensitize the church to the needs of the retarded and to involve the church in actual "direct service ministries" to the retarded and their families. The program has three facets: (1) Education; (2) Delivery of Services; and (3) Funding of these programs and services.

(1) In the first three years of operation, some type of educational enterprise on "The Church and Mental Retardation" has been or is currently being carried on/or planned in eight of the states in the Jurisdiction.

(2) In the area of the Delivery of Services, SEMAR has helped develop programs for more than 500 retarded persons in day training centers with budgets totalling more than \$1 million dollars, of which the church has approximately \$30,000 church-dollars invested.

(3) SEMAR has sought funds needed to match these federal funds from foundations, city and county commissioners, united giving organizations, and state agencies. A little over \$200,000 has been raised annually to provide the base for these IV-A programs serving some 500 retarded persons. Application has been made for funding in two states for programs under the new Development Disabilities Services Act.

PROPOSED PROGRAM

With the Church's growing awareness of the presence of the mentally retarded in our communities (3% of our population, though in deprived areas the figure may be as high as 7-11%). The Board of Trustees of SEMAR is proposing a new program for the forthcoming Quadrennium to be known as **THINK RETARDED**. We want the total church to **THINK** of the **RETARDED**, and ways by which the church may not only **THINK** of the **RETARDED**, but may become involved in ministering to them and their families. We are asking each Annual Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries in the Jurisdiction to adopt this program in the Quadrennium, beginning in 1972.

Beginning at the 1972 Annual Conference session, a concentrated effort will be made through the planned distribution of programmed promotional material

designed to impact the Annual Conference with the need to **THINK** of the **RETARDED**. Material is being prepared for distribution at the Annual Conference session which will articulate ways in which, if a church wants to **THINK** of the **RETARDED** and translate their thinking into action, they may minister to the needs of the retarded and their families.

There are a great many programs which may be carried on by a local church in the community.

Many of these ministries may be carried out with a minimum of cost to a congregation. For example, recreation programs for the retarded may be carried out with volunteer staff with only cost being that of utilities, and a minimal amount of staff time to coordinate and/or direct the program. A few programs became costly, such as day training or adult activity programs for the retarded. Increasingly, the church is being seen as a viable partner in programming for the retarded and operating funds are becoming available for which the church is an eligible and welcome applicant. These include funds for "foster grandparent programs", etc.

"How-To" materials are being written and will be available in addition to the basic brochure which will be distributed at Annual Conference and which outline in general what a church may do if it wants to provide ministries to the retarded. These materials will detail the various types of programs such as church school classes, day training services, adult activity centers, recreation programs, etc. which the church may want to provide indicating where information materials and possible public funds may be secured to help underwrite, in addition to church funds, the cost of such programs.

INSURANCE

REPORT NO. 1

The Conference Insurance Program

The Insurance Program of the South Carolina Conference is designed to provide the ministerial members of the Conference and their dependents a comprehensive plan for major medical and life insurance. The program is administered through a group plan underwritten by The Prudential Insurance Company of America and supervised by the Commission on Insurance. Eligible for coverage under the program are all ministerial members of the Conference, whether active, retired, or seminarians, and qualified dependents of these Conference members. Certain lay persons, who are full time employees of the Conference, are also granted coverage. In seeking coverage, an applicant is required to give proof in insurability. Eligibility requirements are set forth in a guidebook, **Your Group Insurance Plan**, published by the Commission. This guidebook is available free of charge from the Office of Ministerial Affairs, Post Office Box 11284, Columbia, South Carolina 29211.

Since an objective of the Insurance Program is to provide a plan of comprehensive insurance coverage, the requirement is made that all participants in the Program enroll for both life insurance and major medical/hospital insurance.

This Insurance Program is continuously reviewed and analyzed by the Commission on Insurance, the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs, and the Prudential Insurance Company of America. Coverage is upgraded periodically in order to keep the Program strong and in order to provide coverage that is adequate to meet the financial demands of a changing economy.

REPORT NO. 2

Life Insurance Benefits

However, in no event will an employee's total amount of insurance be less than his accumulated paid-up insurance.

Dependents of retired employees are not eligible for life insurance coverage.

REPORT No. 3

Major Medical/Hospital Insurance Benefits

The Major Medical Hospital Plan of the Conference Insurance Program provides benefits for reasonable charges incurred by the insured or a covered dependent while receiving hospital services, treatments and supplies ordered by a physician. The plan provides for payment of the first \$1,000 of eligible expenses, and 80% of all other eligible expenses over \$1,000, up to a lifetime maximum of \$30,000 for each employee and each insured dependent covered under the plan. Provision is also made for coverage for certain services rendered outside of the hospital, accidental injury and maternity benefits.

The coverage for retired ministers is reduced to a lifetime maximum of \$15,000 for the insured and each eligible dependent, or to the remaining unused portion of the \$30,000 benefit limit provided before retirement, whichever is the lesser amount.

Other details of the Major Medical Expense Plan are contained in the guidebook, "Your Group Insurance Plan."

REPORT No. 4

Medicare Benefits

Medicare is a Federal health insurance plan, administered under the Social Security Act, for the benefit of persons 65 years of age or older. The Medicare Program consists of two parts: (A) Hospital Insurance, designed to pay for hospital and related health services; and (B) Medical Insurance, designed to pay for physicians' services and related medical services. Under

terms of the Medicare Program, Hospital Insurance (Part A) is provided for all persons insured under the plan; the Medical Insurance (Part B) is an optional feature for which the insured pays a stated monthly premium.

The Conference Insurance Program is so designed that it provides certain benefits which began at the point where Medicare coverage terminates, and, in addition, makes provision for some benefits not covered by Medicare at all. Therefore, it is expected that all ministers 65 and over, or whose wives are 65 and over, will enroll in the health insurance plan provided by Medicare. Further, it is expected that those eligible for Medicare will enroll in the full program (Part A and Part B) in order to derive the maximum benefit afforded by Medicare.

Inasmuch as insurance coverage for eligible retirees is provided for them by the Conference without cost to the insured, it is imperative that all retirees seek Medicare coverage upon attaining the age of 65.

A handbook explaining the provisions of Medicare is available from any District Office of the Social Security Administration.

REPORT No. 5

Administrative Procedures

Billing: The Administrator of Ministerial Affairs sends a quarterly statement to everyone enrolled in the Conference Insurance Program. Statements are mailed in February, May, August and November. Although statements are mailed quarterly, payments for premiums may be made on a monthly basis. Bank drafts and post-dated checks may be used in making premium payments, if desired.

Cancellation of Coverage: It is imperative that each participant in the Conference Insurance Program keep his premium payments current. The Commission on Insurance has instructed the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs to cancel the insurance coverage of any participant who does not pay his premium by the end of the Quarter for which he has been billed.

Ministers Serving Special Appointments: For purpose of proper cost analysis, it is required that all Conference Boards and Agencies, served by ministers and others eligible for insurance, pay for the "institutional share" of the insured's premium (the "institutional share" for ministers serving Churches is paid through the World Service and Finance appropriation directed to the Conference Insurance Program). This provision shall apply to the District Superintendents, those serving Methodist colleges and other institutions and agencies operating under Boards of Trustees, and those serving institutions and agencies outside the Annual Conference should they elect coverage under the Conference Insurance Program. This requirement shall apply also to ministerial students who attend graduate schools for studies beyond the basic seminary degree level (i.e., the B.D. Degree or its equivalent). In every case the full cost of coverage must be paid by the insured, his employer, or through the combined payments of the insured and his employer.

Premium Payments: Premium payments shall be made in accordance with the instructions printed on the Quarterly "Statement of Account."

Application for Insurance Coverage: Applications for enrollment in the Conference Insurance Program are available from the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs. No medical examination will be required for new members of the Conference, provided they make application for coverage within 31 days after they become eligible for participation in the Conference Insurance Program. Individuals making less than \$5,000 per annum will be covered by \$2,000 Life Insurance but will not be eligible for Term and Paid-Up coverage.

Coverage under the Major Medical/Hospital Insurance shall be the same as for all other persons covered, and all provisions governing eligibility for the Conference Insurance Program shall apply.

Claims Procedure: The cost of medical care continues to rise, therefore, the Office of Ministerial Affairs and The Prudential Insurance Company of America audit every claim with great care. Conference Insurance Program participants can render valuable assistance in the claims process by: (1) making certain that they have received all of the services for which they are requesting payment; (2) supplying the documentation required to validate their claims; and (3) refraining from asking reimbursement for services clearly excluded under the terms of the Insurance Program. (4) Claims must be submitted at least Quarterly, but not more often than once a month.

REPORT No. 6

Coverage for Lay Employees

The Commission on Insurance receives, from time to time, requests from Conference boards and agencies for insurance coverage for lay employees. Accordingly, the Commission has adopted the following policy in this connection:

Conference Insurance coverage is available to all employees of the United Methodist Church directly related to the South Carolina Annual Conference, who are not under the direction of a Board of Trustees, provided the employee (the insured) and the agency concerned bear their full share of the cost of the insurance.

Individuals making less than \$5,000 per annum will be covered by \$2,000 Life Insurance but will not be eligible for Term and Paid-Up coverage.

Coverage under the Major Medical/Hospital Insurance shall be the same as for all other persons covered, and all provisions governing eligibility for the Conference Insurance Program shall apply.

REPORT No. 7

Coordination of Benefits

The purpose of health care insurance is to help meet actual expenses. In line with that purpose, the Conference Insurance Program contains a non-profit provision which coordinates our plan with other plans under which an individual is covered so that the total benefits available will not exceed 100% of the allowable expenses. Under this plan if a dependent, employed wife is covered by another group plan, application for insurance benefits should first be made under the employee's own policy; then application may be made to the Conference Insurance Program for any additional benefits that might be due.

Strict adherence to this policy is essential if we are to maintain good benefits under our Program, at a reasonable cost. A detailed explanation of the "Coordination" provision is contained in "Your Group Insurance Plan."

REPORT No. 8

Election of Administrator

In accordance with the Conference Standing Rules, Section XII, Paragraph 42, Donald A. Foster has been elected Administrator of Ministerial Affairs with responsibility for administering the Conference Insurance Program and the Conference Pension Program.

The Commission on Insurance makes the following recommendations for the coming Conference Year (June 1 through December 31, 1972):

(1) That the Commission on World Service and Finance apportion to the Churches the sum of \$120,274.00 for the Conference Insurance Program to be used as follows:

- (a) \$8,671.97 for administration of the Program;
- (b) \$111,602.03 to pay the Conference's share of the cost of the Insurance Program in providing coverage for eligible ministers of the Annual Conference.

(NOTE: These figures are projections for a 7/12th Conference Year (June through December 1972), and they anticipate the inclusion of eligible ministers of the '66 Conference in accordance with the Plan of Merger, with coverage to become effective on July 1, 1972).

(2) That ministerial premium payments for the period June 1 through December 31, 1972 be set as follows:

(3) PARTICIPANTS IN THE CONFERENCE INSURANCE PROGRAM SHALL PAY THEIR PREMIUMS MONTHLY IN ADVANCE. ALL COVERAGE SHALL BE SUBJECT TO CANCELLATION IF PAYMENTS ARE NOT MADE PRIOR TO THE END OF THE QUARTER FOR WHICH THE INSURED IS BILLED.

(4) Every participant in the Conference Insurance Program shall become familiar with the provisions of the Program as outlined in the guidebook, **Your Group Insurance Plan**; and, further that each participant shall maintain a file of and become familiar with the additional instructions relating to the Program which may be issued from time to time by the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs; to the end that claims procedures be expedited, required administrative procedures be followed, and that the present high level of benefits be maintained at a reasonable cost to the Conference and the Insurance Program participants.

The Bishop's Convocation on Stewardship, which of course was a Program Council Program, but was concerned to a large degree with Board of the Laity functions, was a huge success. We have reached many of our pastors through our Pastor's Stewardship Seminars.

The continuing effort dealing with the Year of Stewardship, ably promoted through the efforts of our fine program counselor, Fletcher Carter, bringing results all over the conference. We are moving toward the goal of a simultaneous conference-wide Every Member Commitment program.

It is impossible to single out individuals so we extend our thanks to all of our dedicated laymen for the efforts in behalf of all the programs of the church, and we are grateful to Bishop Hardin and the cabinet for their cooperation and active support.

REPORT No. 2

Program Highlights of the former '85 Conference Board for 1971-72

Last year we stated that our overall purpose for this period was: "To develop leadership at the conference and district levels that will give direction and guidance to the Year of Stewardship."

Our plans to accomplish this were:

1. **One-Day Lay Seminar:** On June 27, 1971, one hundred eleven laymen came representing every district to learn how to fulfill their job in the district as it related to the Year of Stewardship.
2. **Pastors Seminar on Stewardship:** On July 7, 8 and 9, 1971, one hundred eighty-five pastors listened as the Rev. Hilbert Berger did an outstanding job of introducing these pastors to Stewardship as a style of life.
3. **Pilot Project Churches:** In order to test out the process of the Year of Stewardship, we wanted at least two churches in each district to be Pilot Project Churches. To date, we have received requests from 35 churches.

4. **TASK FORCE on the Year of Stewardship:** The Conference Program Council created a Task Force to design a plan of implementation.
5. **District or Sub-District Workshop on Stewardship:** This Task Force recommended to the District Superintendents that they bring the pastor and two of his key laymen together to be exposed to the Year of Stewardship. More than 2,500 persons attended these workshops.
6. **District Year of Stewardship Teams:** The Task Force recommended that each District Program Council select and recruit eight teams.
7. **District Team Training:** On December 18, 1971, these teams were trained in Columbia.
8. **District Team Role:** Each district team was assigned a number of churches. The team was to contact the pastors of its assigned churches to ascertain if a particular church needed more information, was ready to proceed into the Year of Stewardship, or was not interested. The team would then proceed according to this response.

NOTE: We are now receiving reports from many of these teams, and it appears that where these teams are functioning many local churches are asking for and receiving help.

9. **Bishop's Convocation on Stewardship:** In January over four hundred fifty pastors and laymen came to Columbia to attend the Bishop's Convocation. Our Board helped plan, finance and conduct this Convocation.
10. **Pastors Seminar on Stewardship Phase II:** As this report goes to press, plans are underway to conduct the second Pastors Seminar on Stewardship to be held May 17, 18 and 19.

Year of Stewardship Findings

We are discovering the following in local South Carolina churches:

1. Pastors carry the key to the door of the Local Church.
2. Lay people admit:
 - a. They have lost sight of prayer.
 - b. They are unable to put into words the "will of God".
 - c. A need of "Person to person evangelism".
 - d. A need to be involved in program of outreach.
 - e. A need of morale boosting.
 - f. A need of Leadership Development and effective training in all areas and age levels.
 - g. A need to reach the unchurched people of our communities.

Evaluation

We have accomplished more this year than most of us expected, for we now have some churches that have made these discoveries and are doing something about them.

But we have only scratched the surface in this one Year of Stewardship. We pray that as we move into our second year more doors of local churches will be open to this Process of Discovering Mission and Ministry through Stewardship.

REPORT No. 3

Joint Program Projection for June through December 1972

The Board of the Laity will continue its thrust through the Year of Stewardship in its six program areas. In order to do so it will need the 7/12ths of its current budget as had been allocated by the Conference Program Council and Conference World Service.

1. The six program areas will all need to have at least one planning meeting each, consisting of members of the former '66 and '85 Conference Committees. The purpose of these meetings will be to make plans for the Conference Year 1972.
2. The Stewardship Education Committee plans to continue on with a Conference wide Stewardship Education Program and to work in conjunction with the '66 Conference as merger is effected. This will require the production or securing of new resources.
3. The Every-Member Commitment Committee plans:
 - A. Three meetings of Conference E. M. C. Committee
 - (1) Orientation and review - Planning
 - (2) Two regular meetings
 - B. Conference-wide E. M. C. in the Fall of 1972
 - C. Resource Development:
 - Develop or secure material to assist District Director and local church leaders.
4. The Wills and Special Gifts Committee plans in conjunction with the Lay Speakers a continued program of education on the "need to make a will." It also plans to work out a practical approach to the establishment of a comprehensive Methodist Foundation in South Carolina.
5. The United Methodist Men's Committee plans to continue to search for ways to promote and organize the work of United Methodist Men in South Carolina.
6. The Certified Lay Speaking Committee has adopted as its slogan "No Vacant Pulpits on Any Sunday" and recommends this to the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. It plans to continue to update the standards of the Lay Speakers in our Conference and to urge local pastors to rely more heavily on these Lay Speakers, particularly during the months of July and August when many pastors are on vacation.
7. The Leadership Development Committee plans to continue to undergird the Year of Stewardship emphasis by helping to develop leadership at all levels of the church.

MINIMUM SALARY

Whereas, the DISCIPLINE of 1968, paragraph 920, provides for fixing a minimum salary by the Annual Conference, therefore be it resolved: That the South Carolina Annual Conference fix its minimum salary according to the following scale to become effective on the adjournment of this conference session and continue until changed by the Annual Conference.

The Commission on Minimum Salary looking to the future of South Carolina Methodist recommends the following simplified salary scale which will enable all churches and ministers to easily ascertain the Minimum Salary Schedule:

- A. 1. Minimum Salary of Effective Member of Annual Conference will be \$7,900 plus \$500 for travel, making a total of \$8,400.
2. Minimum Salary for Probationary Members will be \$6,825 plus \$500 for travel, making a total of \$7,325.
3. Minimum Salary for Associate Member will be \$6,300 plus \$500 for travel, making a total of \$6,800.
4. Minimum Salary for Lay Pastor will be \$5,250 plus \$500 for travel, making a total of \$5,750.
5. If a man has been in the Conference for fifteen years as an Effective Member, \$500 will be added to his Minimum making a total of \$8,900.

The new schedule means the average man on Minimum Salary will receive between a 5% and 5.5% increase. This is within the government recommendation. No minister will receive less in '72-'73 Minimum Salary than he is receiving during '71-'72.

The Commission on Minimum Salary will not assist churches who employ Assistant or Associate Pastors.

Student pastors will be considered by the District Superintendent and the Commission on Minimum Salary as separate cases and according to situations.

- B. The District Superintendent shall recommend the adjusted amounts which must be approved by the Commission on Minimum Salary before payment can be made. Any person shall be considered a student pastor if he is enrolled in an accredited college or seminary for a degree.

- C. It is recommended that if a charge is to receive Minimum Salary help, it should have a minimum of 150 members for a student pastor or 300 members for fulltime pastor, except in the case of a church extension situation approved by the Board of Missions and Church Extension as such

or an urban work situation approved by the Urban Work Committee of the Board of Missions. Also, neither side of a split charge should be on Minimum Salary unless one side is clearly designated a church extension situation, approved by the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

- (a) It is the policy of Minimum Salary to support a church for three years. Exceptional cases for an extended period will be considered upon recommendation of the District Superintendent to the Commission on Minimum Salary. (This will not apply to church extension situations.)
- D. Be it resolved that the Annual Conference through its Minimum Salary funds shall not pay in excess of 35 percent of the above amounts. The local churches shall be encouraged to pay the other 65 percent, but this resolution will not hinder the Board of Missions and Church Extension or other agencies of the church from making appropriations from its discretionary funds. Exception to this resolution will be allowed under the following conditions:
- (a) The church must meet all the requirements of Minimum Salary Commission.
- (b) The official board of the said church must declare in writing to the District Superintendent that the above requirement having been met, it cannot pay the 65 percent.
- (c) The District Superintendent and the Cabinet must recommend this exception unanimously.
- E. Be it further resolved that \$2,000 be set aside as a discretionary fund to be administered by the Commission on Minimum Salary application of the District Superintendent.
- F. Minimum Salary funds shall be dispersed at the end of each month, and shall be given only to the minister involved.

MINIMUM SALARY NEWLY SET-UP WORK OR URBAN WORK 1971-72

Schedule A

- Notes: 1. Schedule A applies to ministers serving first pastorates.
2. These schedules apply to ministers serving on trial or in full connection only. In case of the appointment of an approved supply, the salary will be the responsibility of the Minimum Salary Commission.
3. First full year of the church's organization.
- 1st Year: The salary shall be the top amount allowed under existing Minimum Salary Commission regulations applied to one in this category. The local church from its funds may increase this amount by not more than \$300 without reducing the minimum salary appropriation.
- 2nd Year: The salary of the second year will depend upon that paid the first year and may be increased by not more than \$300, but the local church must assume one-fourth of the total salary paid.
- 3rd Year: The salary of the third year will depend upon that paid the second year and may be increased by not more than \$300, but the local church must assume one-half of the total salary paid.
- 4th Year: The salary of the fourth year will depend upon that paid the third year and may be increased by not more than \$300 but the local church must assume three-fourths of the total salary paid.

Schedule B

- Notes: Schedule B applies to ministers who are on trial or in full connection and who have had a minimum of four full years of service prior to this appointment. Time served in this present appointment under Schedule A does not count as a part of the four years' experience required under Schedule B.
- 1st Year: Note: First full year of church's organization. The minimum salary shall be according to the minister's category.

Special Note: The District Superintendent may apply to the Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions for a salary that is more in keeping with the amount received by this minister in his previous appointment.

- 2nd Year: The salary depends on amount received first year. At the beginning of the second year, the newly established church must assume one-fourth of the minister's salary.
- 3rd Year: The salary for the third year depends on amount received second year. At the beginning of the third year, the newly established church must assume one-half of the minister's salary.
- 4th Year: The salary for the fourth year depends upon the amount received the third year. At the beginning of the fourth year, the newly established church must assume three-fourths of the minister's salary.
- Notes: 1. Except where the administrators of this salary schedule feel an extreme case of hardship exists, no salary funds will be granted to a church after the fourth full year.
2. A "new church" may be interpreted to mean an "engulfed" situation or a relocation project, if it is determined to be a church extension responsibility by the Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions.
3. The local church share of this salary schedule is interpreted to mean salary plus any travel and utility allowances.
4. These figures are maximum and any amount of funds from any source in any guise added to these figures will be subtracted from the Conference support given.
5. In all cases where a newly set-up work is attached to an existing charge, these become charge figures.

Schedule C

- Notes: 1. Schedule C applies to ministers serving as Directors of Urban Work who are members of the Annual Conference.
2. The Directors of Urban Work shall be eligible for the full Minimum Salary which is approved by the Annual Conference.
3. The salaries shall be based on recommendation of the District Superintendent of the District in which the urban work is located, after consultation with the Urban Work Committee.
or 3. The salaries shall be based on the recommendation of the Conference Urban Work Committee, after consultation with the District Superintendent of the District in which the urban work is located.
- 1st Year: The Minimum Salary shall be according to the minister's category. Special Note: The District Superintendent may apply to the Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions for a salary that is more in keeping with the amount received by this minister in his previous appointment.
- 2nd Year: The salary depends on the amount received the first year. At the beginning of the second year, the newly established work must assume one-fourth of the Director's salary, if possible.
- 3rd Year: The salary for the third year depends on the amount received the second year. At the beginning of the third year, the newly established work must assume one-half of the Director's salary, if possible.
- 4th Year: The salary for the fourth year depends on the amount received the third year. At the beginning of the fourth year, the newly established work must assume three-fourths of the Director's salary, if possible.

Schedule D

- Notes: 1. Schedule D applies to ministers serving as campus ministers who are members of the annual conference.
2. The campus ministers shall be eligible for the full Minimum Salary which is approved by the Annual Conference.
3. The salaries shall be based on the recommendation of the District Superintendent in which the campus is located, after consultation with the Board of Education.

- 1st Year: Minimum salary funds shall be paid to campus ministers up to 100% of their salaries.
 2nd Year: Minimum salary funds shall be paid to campus ministers up to 75% of their salaries.
 3rd Year: Minimum salary funds shall be paid to campus ministers up to 50% of their salaries.
 4th Year: Minimum salary funds shall be paid to campus ministers up to 25% of their salaries.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO STUDY MINIMUM SALARIES

This committee was appointed by Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., following action of the South Carolina Conference ('85) in June 1971.

In his letter of invitation to appointees, he stated "At the June, 1971 session... a motion was made and adopted that a special committee be appointed to study minimum salaries and report back to the next session of the Annual Conference in 1972."

Appointees who accepted the invitation to serve were: 3 ministers now receiving minimum salary: Rev. Theron Few, Greenwood; Rev. Dwight Mims, Elgin; Rev. Rufus Rowe, Spartanburg. 2 members of the Cabinet: Dr. McKay Brabham, Spartanburg; Dr. George Whitaker, Charleston.

1 minister from a large church: Dr. John Wood Robison, Greenville.
 1 minister from a church that tries to pay whatever the Conference sets the minimum salary to be: Rev. Bryan Carroll, Honea Path. 4 laymen from churches or charges receiving minimum salary funds: Mr. J. C. DeVane, Florence; Mrs. Niles Clark, Waterloo; Dr. Gilbert Hogan, Hopkins; Mr. C. M. Dawkins, Charleston. 2 laymen from large churches: Dr. M. C. Watson, Bamberg; William S. Dowis, Jr., Florence.

1 layman in the Conference from a church that tries to pay whatever the Conference sets the minimum salary to be: W. B. Wilkerson, Jr., Hickory Grove.

Conference lay leader or some layman selected by him to represent the laity: Mr. Douglas A. Broome, Columbia.

The committee held three meetings, on October 7, December 3, 1971, and January 27, 1972.

Officers elected were Theron Few, Chairman, Michael C. Watson, vice-chairman, and A. McKay Brabham, Jr., secretary.

Discussion within the Committee resulted in the consensus that the committee's task was (1) to compare the old system of paying Minimum Salary (1970-71 and before) with the new system adopted for 1971-72, and (2) to report on any other aspects of the Minimum Salary system which the Committee felt responsible for reporting to the Annual Conference.

It was noted that the two systems are outlined in the Conference Journal for 1970, pages 181-184 and the 1971 Pre-Conference Reports, pages 16-18. Also see 1971 Journal, page 186.

Limitations upon the Committee's action were seen in the Conference Standing Rule regarding the Minimum Salary Commission (Journal, 1970, page 276, rule number 29) which says "This Commission shall be composed of six ministers and six laymen whose duty shall be to administer the plan of minimum support as adopted by the Conference (Discipline, 1968, paragraph 924.1)"

The Committee found, through a survey made by the chairman, and reports from the Minimum Salary Commission, that ministers of the Conference ('85) were satisfied with both the scale (2 to 1) and the plan (5 to 1) as adopted in June, 1971, so long as it includes an annual cost of living increase, which was supported by two-thirds of those responding.

Based upon the survey conducted by the chairman, it was found that the salary system as such produces as much (if not more) clergy dissatisfaction than the minimum salary scale or plan (See recommendation, Report #2).

Compilation of the results of this survey, to which 50% of the ministers receiving minimum salary responded (66 replies out of 121 surveyed), have been supplied the Bishop and his Cabinet and members of the Minimum Salary Commission.

Discussion within the Committee indicated that often the laity of the local churches are not aware of the fact that their church or charge is receiving minimum salary assistance. The necessity for broader communications of this fact in every case was agreed upon by the committee.

It was also the consensus of the committee that the membership of the Minimum Salary Commission should be broadly based, within the spirit of the composition of this committee.

The feasibility of salary adjustments, both Minimum and locally paid, becoming effective at the beginning of each fiscal year (Jan. 1) received favorable consideration by members of the committee.

REPORT 2, Recommendation: The Committee recommends that the Annual Conference establish a committee to study "the salary system" of supporting the ministry. It is expected that such a committee would not be limited to a study of Minimum Salary.

MINISTERIAL AFFAIRS

Executive Committee for Ministerial Affairs

The Executive Committee for Ministerial Affairs (as authorized under the provisions of the Conference Standing Rules, Section XII, Paragraph 42) has met regularly during the Conference Year and given careful supervision to the Office of Ministerial Affairs. The Committee is pleased to report that the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs has fulfilled the requirements of the job analysis for his office in a most satisfactory manner.

Throughout the year the Committee has cooperated with the Commission on World Service and Finance and with the Steering Committee on Administrative Restructure in planning for a new system of management for Conference financial and business affairs. The Committee has voiced its opinion in these meetings that the functions and services of the Office of Ministerial Affairs should be retained as plans for the Conference Treasurer/Business Manager's office are developed. The Executive Committee for Ministerial Affairs has been supported in this position by its participating agencies; this endorsement was spelled out in a joint meeting of the Executive Committees of the Board of Pensions, the Commission on Insurance and the Credit Union on February 8, 1972. In a resolution adopted at that joint meeting, those assembled requested that in framing a new set of Conference Standing rules that the Rules Committee make provision for an Office of Ministerial Affairs (as currently structured), with the present agencies participating.

The Committee has acted on the faith that the Conference will concur in the wisdom of this resolution and has elected Donald A. Foster to serve as the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs for the ensuing seven-months Conference Year (1 June—31 December 1972), this action having been approved previously by the member agencies. The annual salary of the Administrator has been set at \$12,600.00, with a housing allowance of \$2,100.00.

Detailed information concerning the programs and financial affairs of the agencies which participate in the Office of Ministerial Affairs will be found in the reports of the Board of Pensions, the Commission on Insurance, and the Conference Credit Union. The attention of each member of the Annual Conference is directed to these important reports.

MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION (1866 Conference)

Education and Promotion

Every available opportunity was taken to inform the Conference constituency, both Lay and Ministerial, of the Mission of the United Methodist Church at Home and around the World.

Four Meetings of the Board and six Meetings of its Executive Committee were held during the year. All Meetings were utilized for interpretation and education as well as for administrative purposes.

The Board was represented at various National, Jurisdictional, Area and Conference meetings.

The Conference and all District Missionary Secretaries participated in the Jurisdictional Missionary Conference at Lake Junaluska.

Five youth of the Conference participated in the Youth and Missions Conference held at Lake Junaluska.

The chairmen of Urban Work, Town & Country, Church Extension and New Church Planning attended briefing sessions at the offices of the General Board in New York.

Several members of the National and World Division Staffs visited in the Conference during the year.

The Rev. Isaac Bivens, Assistant General Secretary for African Affairs served as an Interpreter on each of the Districts of the Conference, September 18-20. United Methodist Work in African Countries was lifted up.

A Conference-wide Workshop on Town and Country Ministries was held at Trinity Church in Orangeburg November 19-20 for the purpose of providing orientation for Pastors and local church Missions Work Area chairmen and appropriate leaders among youth and young adults.

Mission Study on the "New Face of Africa" and the "Sermon on the Mount" was promoted throughout the Conference.

The Conference Board participated in joint venture planning with the 1785 Conference for a Conference-wide Mission Interpretation involving a hundred Mission Interpreters and to be conducted September 24-October 1, 1972.

New Church construction near Orangeburg (New Light Church) cost, \$70,000.

New Church construction near Lugoff (Mt. Joshua Church) cost, \$12,000.00 Cash and \$8,000.00 in sweat equity.

2. Establishment of the Good Hope Farmers Co-op for growing and marketing sweet potatoes and other farm products with the cooperation of the Clemson University School of Agriculture, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture Extension Service and the Board of Missions' Department of Town and Country Ministries.

3. Maintenance of the Rural Mission Project at Johns Island. This project is ecumenically and community based. It includes the following components:

A comprehensive Health Service, Education and Child Care, Low Income Housing and Home Repairs, Farm Produce Marketing Cooperatives.

Also, a Migrant Farm Workers program, Legal Assistance for the indigent, and a Quilting and Handicraft Club.

Rural Mission has a governing Board of 23 members drawn from the local community, churches, and professional groups. The area served embraces Johns Island, Yonges Island, James Island, and Wadmalaw Island. The Rev. Willis T. Goodwin is Executive Director.

IV. SHORT TERM VOLUNTEER SERVICE COMMITTEE

In an effort to create more opportunities for more meaningful participation in the life of the church by its laymen, the Board of Missions of the South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church has structured a Committee on Laymen Overseas. It is the function of this committee to develop a program through which some of the needs of the world can be met by the voluntary, short-term service of laymen acting in the name of Jesus Christ. The role of the "career missionary" is a familiar one but in this day of high-speed travel, significant contributions of a specialized nature can be made by persons on a short-term basis provided the needs and the technical resources can be brought into apposition. The program has been carried on with a minimal expense to the church by encouraging each layman to provide his own travel expense. The entire program is carried on with the close cooperation and guidance of the UNITED METHODIST COMMITTEE FOR OVERSEAS RELIEF.

The first operation took place on the island of Anguilla. It was learned that this small island was losing the services of its physician so a program was developed whereby a physician in private practice in South Carolina would go there for a two week period, in rotation, for a total period of six months and provide continuing medical care for the people of the island. All who participated in this program felt that it was very worthwhile. A small fee was charged for the service and this money was returned to the people of the island in order that they might upgrade their medical facilities.

The second phase of the program developed in the country of Haiti. This program is centered about, but not restricted to, the town of Jeremie in the Southern Peninsula. An agriculturist has made two visits there to give advice and council on warm weather agriculture. An exploratory visit was made by a dentist who pulled over six hundred teeth a day during his visit. Three teams of two men each have gone for two-week periods with "jet injectors" and have given over 45,000 injections against Tetanus and Diphtheria. A building contractor went to Jeremie and drew plans for a clinic building urgently needed in Jeremie. Two teams of construction workers went to Jeremie, one from South Carolina under the direction of Reverend Needham Williamson of Leesville and one under the direction of Reverend Joe Ervin of North Carolina, and built this much needed clinic during February 1972.

A special word of thanks needs to be said to the Reverend Mr. Williamson for his work as coordinator for the raising of the funds necessary for this building project, and also to his church where drugs are being collected from all over the state and sorted by two pharmacists from this church in Leesville.

Dental teams will begin to function in the new clinic on a regular rotating basis. A surgeon and an ophthalmologist have been to Jeremie and Port-au-Prince in order to develop programs of regular visits by surgical specialists who will function in the clinic building and the local hospital.

Another immunization campaign is planned for the island of LaGonave in the Fall of 1972.

The first team is to go September 18, 1972 for two weeks. The second team will go October 16, 1972 and the third team, November 13, 1972. Joe Watson, agriculturist, will go August 8, 1972.

A program is now underway for the collection and repackaging of "Sample" drugs to be shipped to the clinic in Jeremie. We feel that the opportunities are limitless and we are just now opening the door of more significant service by the laymen of the church.

BACKGROUND: By Action of the Board of Missions (85) in the fall of 1971, a Steering Committee was appointed to make recommendations regarding a conference wide (85-66) effort to relate the mission of the church and the local church member through the use of mission interpreters. At a special meeting on February 10, 1972, Cabinet members, Board of Missions officers, District Missionary Secretaries, WSCS officers, and other concerned persons, voted to implement the project, September 24-October 1. A comprehensive statement of purpose was adopted, questions were answered, and a General Committee, nominated by the Steering Committee, was elected.

PURPOSE: 1. To respond to questions; 2. To confront issues; 3. To provide inspiration and motivation; and 4. To challenge churches to become more personally concerned and involved in missions.

IMPLEMENTATION: Two meetings of the General Committee have been held, February 10 and March 14; four area organizations have been perfected: Northwest, Midstate, East Coastal, and West Coastal; recruitment and assignment of personnel, hospitality, publicity, and Annual Conference presentation of plans, have been discussed and are being arranged, with special emphasis on co-ordinating general and area efforts. There will be an orientation session for all mission interpreters and general and area officers in Columbia on Saturday, September 23. The project will be supported by free-will offerings in the churches during the mission emphasis week.

EVALUATION: Careful evaluation of the project will be undertaken following the week of September 24-October 1, which will complete the Committee's work.

REPORT No. 3

Church Extension Section

General Overview:

During the past quadrennium Church Extension's emphasis has largely been in the Missional area of Urban Ministry, an area not usually thought of as "Church Extension." Of course, at the same time with the limited funds available, we also functioned in our traditional role. As we look to the next quadrennium, we feel that there will be a need for new churches in the growing suburbs. In addition to these new churches meeting the needs of those in the suburbs, they also will greatly assist us in Ministries, as the Urban Ministry, that cannot be self-supporting.

CHURCH EXTENSION POLICY

Council and Financial assistance is provided for the following situations.

- a. Church lots for new congregations. The first \$1,000 is provided.
- b. Church Buildings for new congregations. An initial donation of \$5,000 is made and another five thousand (\$5,000) raised by the local or the district is matched by the conference.
- c. Aid in relocation or for an engulfed situation. Usually the sum of \$4,000 is provided in these cases.
- d. Aid with new parsonages for new congregations in the maximum amount of \$2,500. Aid is furnished for parsonages in relocations engulfed situations or split charges in the maximum amount of \$1,000.
- e. In rare instances aid is furnished in emergency cases. Each one of these is considered on its merit with no general policy. These funds are provided by a \$10,000 grant and by advance specials.

DEFINITIONS OF TERMS IN GUIDELINES

RELOCATE—The word "Relocate" very simply put, means that a church physically moves from one location to another and thereby places itself in a position to serve a new community of people. This move may be a matter of a few blocks or several miles. In its relocation it relates itself to people which it was unable to relate before.

ENGULFED—"Engulfed" means essentially the same as relocation except that the people move in and change the character of the community and give the church new opportunities to serve new people and the responsibility for such service.

EMERGENCY—This term should be used very sparingly. There have been one or two relative to fires or other tragic events in the life of a church. This word should be used as little as possible—many things can be called emergencies.

Urban Work

The Urban Work Committee has as its mission to develop, implement, and support programs and fundings for existing and new urban ministries.

During the 1971-72 conference year, the Committee did the following:

1. Struggled with a theological statement for urban ministries.
2. Prepared a statement of policy on guidelines for developing and supporting new urban ministries.
3. Met with the '66 Conference Urban Work Committee in an effort to open lines of communication and to seek ways to coordinate our efforts.
4. Adopted and recommended to the Minimum Salary Commission a Minimum Salary schedule for support of approved Urban Work Ministries.
5. Developed and recommended to the Conference Board of Missions a budget of \$35,000 for the 1973 conference year.

The Committee has set the following goals for June-December, 1972.

1. To develop a policy statement, guidelines, and missional strategy to enable S. C. Methodism to respond creatively to urban realities, using available consultation resources, and to distribute this material widely.
2. To seek to have a district director of urban work appointed on each district program council.
3. To develop a funding policy and funding resources for urban ministry.
4. To provide training opportunities for urban directors, members of the Urban Work Committee, other pastors, and local church members.
5. To encourage the Annual Conference Program Council staff to have a member atuned and trained to deal with leading the church's involvement in urbanization.

REPORT No. 7

The Marlboro Cooperative Ministry

The Marlboro Cooperative Ministry began functioning June 1, 1972 with all Churches in Marlboro County participating in this new endeavor with the exception of one. The Cooperative Ministry has one church, a part of the Blenheim Charge, located in Dillon County. The organizational meeting was held at the Tatum Methodist Church in late June with each Church electing a layman to membership on the council.

In July a rally was held at Oak Grove United Methodist Church, Marlboro Charge, with approximately one hundred men attending. The Cooperative Ministry was explained to those attending and a definite but flexible plan for this new form of ministry was adopted. In November we began meeting monthly. The Directors are Thomas F. Evatt and Robert Morris, both of whom are Ministers. Col. Leroy Stanton of McColl is Chairman of the Cooperative Council, James W. Esterling, Vice Chairman and Mrs. Chesley Covington, Secretary.

On April 16, 1972 a religious survey will be made in the Lester Community to determine the number of people who should be a part of the church. Within the next year the entire County will be surveyed so that an adequate picture of the people and where they live may be presented to each Church.

During 1971-1972 the one crowning achievement is simply that the Churches of the Cooperative Ministry are talking and planning with one another.

From June 1, 1972 through December 31, 1972, many things have been planned. Mr. Thomas "Tommy" Woodle, a sophomore at St. Andrews Presbyterian College, Laurinburg, N. C. has been hired as a Summer Youth Worker and will begin work June 1. A camp for the fifth and sixth grades along with the youth through the eleventh grade will be held at Camp Pee Dee near Bennettsville, August 7 through 12. This camp will be under the direction of Mrs. Walker Jackson, Reverend Robert Morris and Tommy Woodle along

with laymen from the Cooperative Ministry. A Folk Musical is being planned and will be presented by the youth of the Cooperative Ministry.

Our two main work areas at the present time, are Evangelism and Education. During the seven months of 1972 our emphasis will be on every phase of these two areas.

Our greatest need at the present moment is a Deaconess to work in an area which is largely rural. Efforts are being made through proper channels to secure one. With this extra staff person plus the combined efforts of the Ministers and laymen, Methodism can truly proclaim that we do care and have a message for this hour in the history of Marlboro County.

Report of the President of Spartanburg Junior College

Spartanburg Junior College is an institution in educational mission for South Carolina United Methodists. Created to serve persons of special need and living by exceptions over sixty years, the service role and the mission today continues to grow. Always demonstrating the flexibility to reach out in missional ways, Spartanburg Junior College is constantly adjusting to meet the needs of students and the imperatives of our time.

Spartanburg Junior College remains extremely sensitive to students with acute financial need. The Board of Trustees and the college administration are determined to keep total costs at a reasonable level. For the third consecutive year, no tuition increases are planned for 1972-73. The present student body includes over 250 students who are almost entirely dependent on the college to provide for them the opportunities they seek. Current year expenditures in financial aid for students will approach \$250,000.

Spartanburg is also aware of the many particular academic needs of today's student. Traditional educational models have not always been successful in preparing students for college level work. Spartanburg, recognizing these preparation gaps, in 1971-72 expanded the highly successful developmental studies program (Summer Prep) to provide critical instruction during the entire academic year. Tutorial assistance, skills classes, reading, vocabulary study and many other services are available at no additional cost.

Closely akin to the work in developmental studies is the supportive role played by the Counseling Center, Chaplain and Student Personnel staff. In addition to these persons, each faculty member is assigned a group of students for academic advisement. These varied support programs give each student significant opportunity for counsel and advisement throughout the year. Spartanburg Junior College is committed to taking students where they are and helping them go as far as they would dare. Such a program indicates that Spartanburg believes in granting students a viable opportunity to succeed and then provides services that would enable them to attain personal academic goals. The essential ingredient in our educational program is persons. Persons who are committed to the growth and development of each student.

Spartanburg is also committed to the integration of study and knowledge. While we point with satisfaction to the academic achievements of our students on transfer, we also understand our role as being more than a dispenser of academic data. Because we believe a true liberal arts education is more than the segmented study of math, language, religion and science; we also strive to place all these disciplines in true perspective through the General College Course. This year, we have been involved in exploring the "Issues of the 70's". Not only have our students had the experience of hearing outstanding lecturers, viewing good drama and ballet, they have also had the stimulation of encountering these guests and engaging them in conversation. From the response of the students, we can only conclude that this educational experience has been vital and growth producing.

The college continues to be aware of special service opportunities that relate directly to education and Christian mission.

Our Police Science and Administration program has enrolled 102 students in one or more classes. Offered in the afternoons and evenings, these classes are designed to prepare both in-service and pre-service students for meaningful roles in our criminal justice system. Students come from a dozen different agencies to receive instruction.

"Saturday College" has become a familiar term to many people in the area. Classes in early childhood education have attracted to Saturday classes over 100 different students this year. The majority of the students are adults employed in various capacities in early childhood development programs. These mature students are devoting from three to six hours each Saturday to earn college credit and gain professional skills. Many workers in local churches are also enrolled. United Methodists who work with children in the local church have been granted full tuition scholarships for study in Saturday College.

"Human Resources Development" is another contemporary expression of mission in education. Residents of the area who desire to upgrade their basic education skills, prepare for the high school equivalency exam, or to enrich their life through learning are offered a sequence of evening study. Here, we are reaching once again a segment of our population that the founder of this school wanted to serve. Many of these adults have not been in school for some years and this opportunity provides a significant vehicle for their development and training. By the excellent cooperation of the Spartanburg Model Cities Authority, scholarships are provided for these students.

Spartanburg Junior College is an active missional arm of The United Methodist Church. We view our mission to persons as a total ministry. The program of religious life on campus is carefully woven into the fabric of the entire institution. Specific examples of our concern for adequate religious programs are a Sunday campus worship, mid-week study and discussion groups, service projects and denominational group activity. Our covering objective is to present the Christian faith as the highest possible style for life.

REPORT No. 9

The Town and Country Committee

The functions of the committee shall be to work with the conference and its agencies in program areas of town and country responsibility. It shall con-

duct surveys and research studies of town and country areas within the bounds of the conference; develop cooperative procedures between the Church and social and governmental agencies, and with the churches of other denominations in local communities; work to improve the effectiveness of town and country churches and pastors; recommend a program to coordinate the work of the participating boards and agencies in this program area; and outline a program of town and country ministries to be presented to the participating agencies and to the conference. In program areas of town and country ministries the conference shall consult with the committee or its executive committee. (Paragraph 1369 section 2-b The Discipline)

Special Goals For The Year

1. To have a special training program in a seminar or retreat setting for all ministers in New Forms of Parish Ministry, and for all ministers interested in serving in staff relationships in New Forms of Parish Ministry. We plan to have Dr. Marvin Judy to lead us in this program.
2. Set up guidelines for funding of New Forms of Parish Ministry in the South Carolina Conference.

Continuing Goals

1—Rural Life Sunday

We request all churches to observe Rural Life Sunday the fifth Sunday after Easter each year. All of us are dependent on rural areas for food and other necessities of life. Materials are available to each church.

2—Rural Community

We shall continue to seek new ways to best serve the needs of the rural community utilizing resources and manpower through:

1—The Larger Parish

This is an enlarged charge of several congregations with a multiple staff of ministerial and professional leaders. They need not all be of the same denomination. Normally there is formal organization with a council made up of representatives from all cooperating congregations. Such an organization provides all of the people within the geographical area with a total and effective religious program.

2—The Enlarged Charge

Sometimes called the Larger or Cooperative Charge, exists where two or more congregations are served by one pastor and operate as a unit. This is similar to our present circuit but there is more group action on the part of the cooperating churches. Each maintains its identity but all share in many activities. They are thus enabled to provide a much more complete program than could the several churches working individually.

3—The Group Ministry

This is where two or more pastoral charges work together for the development of the Church in a given area. Each pastor is responsible for his charge but all cooperate closely. Activities are guided by a council made up of lay and clerical workers. Each group has its own budget and carries out its own specialized activities but all contribute to a central budget for group activities.

4—The Consolidated Church

This is the result of uniting of two, or more, congregations. Frequently there is objection to such action on the part of a church which thus loses its identity. This is especially likely if the move is sponsored by outside interests or authority. A substantial number may withdraw from the church. Therefore, uniting action should be taken where the reason is obvious and readily acceptable to all concerned.

5—The Extended Ministry

This type of cooperation results where a strong—often city or large town church shares its ministry with a smaller congregation nearby. This is a practical expression of the connectional system of Methodism.

Recommendations

1—Moving Expense

We recommend that the Church or Charge pay the moving expenses of its incoming preacher, including a maximum of \$50.00 for packing expenses, and that the I.C.C. rates be the basis upon which the minister's moving expenses be paid and that the maximum of 7,500 pounds be the weight limit. We recommend that a bonded mover be employed to move the minister's possessions which, while they may not be many, are sometimes costly. We recommend that the incoming minister be informed whether the moving expenses are to be paid and arrangements made with him. The lay delegate to the Annual Conference should have this information.

2—Parsonage Standards

We recommend that our Churches be guided by the latest revised edition of Parsonage Standards in building, furnishing, landscaping, maintaining and remodeling of parsonages; and that both churches and parsonage families give careful consideration to the "STANDARDS" in all matters pertaining to the minister's home. Furthermore, we recommend that any future proposals concerning parsonage standards be referred to the Parsonage Standards Committee for study and recommendation.

3—Pastor's Study and Church Office Standards

We recommend that our churches be guided by this standard in building, furnishing and maintaining the Study and Office.

4—Year of Stewardship

We recommend that in each District that the District Superintendent involve the leaders of churches of 200 and less membership in at least one meeting to help them see the values of the Year of Stewardship Emphasis for the small church.

5—Training

We recommend that ALL training for small churches be done in small churches.

6—New Forms of Ministry

We recommend that the ministers of the Conference assure their fellow ministers, who are appointed to one of these New Forms of Ministry, of their support and backing with respect to their appointment statute; and that the Bishop and the Cabinet give due consideration to the importance of these appointments.

**PENSIONS
 REPORT No. 1**

I. (A) The Board of Pensions requests that the South Carolina Annual Conference fix \$85.00 per service year as the rate for annuity payments to retired ministers which shall include approved supply time prior to admission into full connection. In the case of special Conference Claimants, the rate shall be 100% of the rate for Conference Members. The Board requests that the annuity rate for widows be 75% of the husbands rate: (1) based on ten years if her approved years are fewer; (2) for her approved years of service if less than 15 but more than 10; (3) for her husband's total years of service if her service years are more than 15. The Board requests that the annuity rate of dependent children of deceased ministers be 25% of the father's annuity rate, with payments based on his years of approved service, with a minimum of 10 years credit.

Provisions of paragraphs 3451, 3452 and 3471 of the Pension Manual are to be followed in making these payments.

(B) The Board requests that an appropriation be made that will give the Board of Pensions (Conference Claimants) \$597,923.00 for the pensions program of the Conference for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1972 and that this sum be apportioned to the charges of the Conference on the basis established in continuing resolutions.

(C) The Board requests the Annual Conference to order the pensions record to be printed in two columns in the Journal and Yearbook; Column 1 to be the amount assessed the ministers; column 2 to be the amount paid.

(D) The Conference Board of Pensions of the S. C. Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of the United Methodist Church, hereby designates up to \$2,400 for pension payments to retired ministers and ministers on disability leave be designated as housing allowance.

II. (A) The Board has approved, and recommends for Conference approval the following institutions and organizations for annuity credits: Wofford College, Columbia College, Spartanburg Junior College, The South Carolina Methodist Advocate, Epworth Children's Home, The Methodist Homes, Columbia Urban Service Center, Associated Christian Training and Service (Memphis), Greenville Urban Ministry Spartanburg Inner City Ministers, and Claflin College.

(B) We hereby approve any recognized institution of our church to which a member of the South Carolina Conference may be given an Episcopal appointment, outside of the state, as an institution to which ministers so appointed may receive pension credit, PROVIDED the minister pays his institutional assessments, if the institution fails to make such payments.

(C) Each institution or organization to which a minister is appointed with annuity responsibility shall pay to the Conference Board of Pension an amount equal to 9% of the average salary of the South Carolina Annual Conference for each minister. This is the amount the Conference has to pay the General Board of Pensions for this coverage for each year thus appointed.

(D) With reference to annuity credit for service to approved institutions indicated in above sections, The Board of Pensions recommends that no pension credit be given if these institutions fail to pay the assessments required, unless the minister serving these institutions himself pays the assessments in addition to his personal obligations. The minister should apply to the Board of Pensions for the proper clearance as early as possible to avoid mounting interest charged as a penalty on arrears.

III. The Board of Pensions is the Committee on Proportionate Payment as set forth in the Discipline, and shall compare the records of amounts paid on support of pastor and Conference Claimants and keep a permanent record of defaults for the purpose of making deduction from annuity in such cases as have not been rectified.

IV. The fiscal year of the Board of Pensions shall be the same as that of the Annual Conference.

V. (A) We recommend that the Conference approve the distribution which the Board of Pensions has made to claimants during the year as set forth in detail by our report No. 3.

(B) We request approval and the privilege of ordering to record without reading the detailed distribution to claimants.

PROGRAM COUNCIL

As we approach the end of this quadrennium, we do so with the conviction that the council concept of our Church is indeed a valid one. From the local church Council on Ministries, to the District Program Council, the Conference, the Jurisdiction, to the General Program Council, we are convinced that we have a structure which enables us to do more effective planning. This structure enables us to be more creative.

Our main concern is persons and they are found in local churches. It is here that we are focusing our attention. We believe that the mission of the local church should be Christ centered and person oriented ministry. In planning and discovering our mission these questions should be considered:

1. What is the real mission of this Church?
2. Who are the people this church should be reaching?
3. What are the needs of these people?
4. What kind of program should this church develop to meet these needs?

As a staff we are trying to refine our approach in program planning and building. We see the Program Council paralleling the Council on Ministries in a local church. The age level Chairman would be advocates upholding the needs of persons in their particular age group. The Boards and Agencies would provide the resources to meet those needs, and program would be planned accordingly.

Proposed programs, and their financial need, would then be reviewed by the Committee on Coordination. Recommendations would be made by the Committee on Coordination to the Program Council.

The Program Council would then submit its approved programs with budgets required to World Service.

Following Annual Conference the approved programs would then be implemented through three functional areas, namely,

- 1) Research, Planning and Stewardship
- 2) Leadership Development and Training, and
- 3) Outreach.

In this concept boards and agencies can be creative in their planning in response to the needs of persons and the demands of the Gospel. At the same time implementation can be coordinated through a functional approach.

In this year of Stewardship emphasis, Mr. Fletcher Carter has been set free, in our staff, to lead in this objective through conference and district meetings and in helping local churches enter into a diagnostic process. He has worked tirelessly, going up and down this conference, yet unable to respond to all the calls which came. His leadership has borne fruit and will in the years to come.

All that we have tried to do this year has been done with consideration of its affect on the local church. Most weeks find each staff member in one or more local churches of the conference, and we feel this is important, not only offering us opportunities to render service and get close to people but to see the real needs of local churches first hand.

New training experiences have been created under the leadership of Dr. Spencer M. Rice, and we will continue to explore this whole area of leadership development. (see report of The Board of Education) Dr. Rice, with patience and optimism, has planned and sought new ways of undergirding and training leadership for this great church of ours. He has given of himself unstintedly, assisting me in all areas of our work and in providing leadership for office supervision for which I am most grateful.

Our Youth Ministry has been strengthened through the labors of Reverend Joe Alley. With imagination and enthusiasm he has gained the respect and response of our youth and our workers with you. To him also has fallen the area of communications through the South Carolina Methodist Advocate as well as the Coordinated Mailing.

In the Children and Family Ministry, Reverend Charles Dunn has given strong leadership. He has worked with Day Care Centers, the retarded children's program as well as developing leadership for the local church. Increasingly he senses the need for strengthening the Family Ministry and has worked toward this end.

Reverend B. B. Brown has given his talents and skills to the Adult and Young Adult Ministry. This has taken him to the colleges and University Campuses, where with rare insight he speaks to the needs and desires of young adults found there. The whole area of research and planning, and new designs for training has gained his attention.

I have worked not only with the whole enterprise but especially with the missional concerns of our church. The exciting adventure of Short-Term Volunteer Service particularly in Haiti, has fallen to me and it has become a source of satisfaction to see new meaning and new appreciation of the church in her mission outreach take hold of those so engaged.

All of us on our staff have been related to all program boards and agencies and offered support and service. Each one of us is related to one or more district program councils. It has been a source of satisfaction to see these district councils grow in usefulness to the local church.

The most significant event, except the union of our two Annual Conferences, was the Bishop's Convocation on Stewardship, held in Columbia, January 15, 16, 17, 1972. It brought together some 400 persons from our two conferences to consider the whole area of commitment of life and talents to Christ. These convocations have had many by-products, other than their main purpose, and one in particular—offering a setting for appreciation and understanding of the people of '85 and '86 conferences. I am led to believe that they helped immensely in providing the climate for the union of our two conferences. Our whole staff was involved in these convocations—in fact we consider ourselves as a team. This joint concern and support of the whole program is our way of working.

The second most important event, in which again our whole staff participated, was the Seminar on Stewardship for Pastors. This reached one third of our pastors and was a new approach to the whole area of Stewardship. Dr. Hilbert J. Berger and Dr. Clifford Lott brought us significant leadership from the General Board of the Laity, and many who participated felt this to be the most outstanding training experience we have had in years. It brought such fine response that subsequent seminars will be planned to reach all of our pastors. This emphasis will be continued culminating in the conference with E. M. C.

Among the important new program emphases for the next seven months will be the "Eight Day Mission Interpretation" program, September 24-October 1, when we will bring to South Carolina some 100 persons who have been engaged at home and abroad in missions. They will come to tell their story at the cross-roads of the conference, to little and big churches in small and large settings. Surely we as a church will not be the same after this experience.

It has been for me a source of satisfaction to be privileged to labor in the post for the life of our Church and in the name of Christ. For the encouragement and support given by our presiding bishop, the district superintendent, pastors and laymen, I am indeed grateful. To our staff, professional and secular, I offer my warmest appreciation for the creative and cooperative way in which they have labored this year. Their dedication to the task and working as one team has made our association together a joy.

To Professor Walker Breland for his support and counsel, I will forever be grateful. His leadership during these past two crucial years has been invaluable, and has been vital in helping us mature as a Program Council. Surely the United Methodist Church in South Carolina is facing her finest hour marching together as one people under the banner of Christ—to the end that God's Kingdom will come and His will be done in this state.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND METHODIST INFORMATION

The Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information has labored to establish communications with the committees and commissions of the Annual Conference in order to arrive at a uniform policy and procedure for gathering and disseminating information about the life and work of the United Methodist Church in South Carolina.

The Commission has endorsed and encouraged the work of the Annual Conference Ad Hoc Committee on Communications, which was to review the need for a uniform and effective communications policy and report its findings back to the Annual Conference.

At present, the Commission is exploring the possibility of securing the services of a news writer who would work in and through the office of the Editor of the South Carolina Methodist Advocate. This person would be a student who is either presently involved in the study of journalism, or keenly interested in religious journalism. Initial contacts have been made, and at the present time, the prospects look encouraging. The approximate cost of this program would be \$3,500.00. Consent of the Trustees of the S. C. Advocate has been secured with the understanding that funding for the news writer will be handled through the Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information. This person would assume the responsibility of disseminating information about the life and work of the United Methodist Church throughout the state. This is a critical need and an area which could be developed for the benefit of all of our congregations in the Conference.

The Commission strongly emphasizes the need for a uniform procedure for gathering and disseminating information about Conference programs and encourages a close working relationship between this Commission and all of the Commissions and Agencies of the Annual Conference.

**SOUTH CAROLINA METHODIST CONFERENCE CREDIT UNION
PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

The South Carolina Methodist Conference Credit Union has had a good year and we are glad to report that every account is covered by Federal Share Insurance. There are 1,247 members as of the end of May, 1972, who own \$1,075,227.61 in shares. Ministers, their families and persons employed by our Conference institutions are eligible for membership. Those who are interested should apply for membership through our Business Manager, Mr. Donald A. Foster, or any one of the Directors. In fifteen years, we have made 4,971 loans totaling \$4,270,400.72. Our loss ratio is 1/5 of 1% or \$9,383.00 for the fifteen year period.

182 loans have been made during the first five months of this year. We have plenty of money on hand to lend to responsible persons. In addition to the 9 directors, we have persons serving on a credit committee, a delinquent loan committee, a supervisory committee and an investment committee. Our books and activities are audited regularly and we are under the control of the South Carolina Bank Examiner.

Our officers are: Adlai C. Holler, President, Allan R. Broome, Vice-President, Charles Polk, Secretary, Donald A. Foster, Treasurer-Business Manager.

**SOUTH CAROLINA METHODIST CONFERENCE CREDIT UNION
TREASURER'S REPORT**

Our Credit Union which was chartered in 1955 continues its consistent growth year after year. Improvements continue to be noted in all areas of service. Since the inception of Share Insurance administered by the National Credit Union Administration, an independent agency of the Federal Government, our share growth has been unusually heavy. All share accounts are now insured up to a maximum of \$20,000.00.

The Truth in Lending Law which has been in effect now for more than two years, specifically states that the APR (Annual Percentage Rate) must be shown in all loan contracts. The Credit Union movement has always been concerned that this be done for in the past, quotations made by various lending agencies have led to wrong ideas about Credit Union rates which have always been competitive or lower in monthly payments loans. When you borrow from your Credit Union, the cost of your loan is clearly defined at the time you make the loan.

We feel that these two features that have been added by the Federal Government in the past few years (Share Insurance and Truth in Lending) have helped in not only our growth but in the growth of other Credit Unions as well.

Membership in your Credit Union is open to all full time ministers, their wives and single children still living at home and to employees of Conference Boards and Agencies. All members are eligible for savings privileges and loans are made subject to usual loan procedures and after approval by a loan officer or Credit Committee. We are happy to state that we have many members who have financed several automobiles with us over a period of years and we urge those who may now be financing elsewhere to consider Credit Union financing next time they trade. We have made over 5000 loans totaling more than \$4,250,000.00 since we were chartered and our losses to date are slightly less than 1/5 of 1%. The paying record of the majority of our members is sensational!

We urge all who are not members and who wish to save consistently and borrow when necessary, to write, call, or come by the Credit Union Office any time for further information. The office is open from 9:00 to 11:45 and 1:15 to 4:45 Monday through Friday except for vacation periods and National Holidays. In order to join or make a deposit, an appointment is not necessary. When a loan is needed or other financial counselling is involved, an appointment is always advisable as only one person is in charge of this type service.

Our method of operation is now so firmly established in the minds of our members that approximately 85% of our business can be transacted by mail or phone.

The Credit Union is a non-profit organization and \$2,887.93 of its 1971 earnings were turned back to the membership in the following manner: Dividends at 5 1/4% per annum—\$47,728. Interest refunds at 7 1/2% of interest paid in current accounts—\$5,171.

Recommendations

6. The Board has re-elected M. Eugene Mullikin as Editor and Manager of the South Carolina Methodist Advocate, the Socamead Press, The Methodist Center, and respectfully requests the Bishop to make this appointment.

TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMUNICATION—T R A F C O

REPORT NO. 1

The Conference Audiovisual Library is one of the constantly functioning activities of TRAFCO. In July of 1971 the AV Library moved its facilities to room 206 in the Methodist Center, 1420 Lady St., Columbia. TRAFCO pays its prorata share of the space rent, also paying a part of the salary for a full-time secretary working in the Program Council office occupied by Mr. Fletcher Carter. We are grateful for the fine service given by the secretaries since this arrangement began.

More than 1,400 AV items have been ordered and used by local congregations, district program councils, Workers' Schools, Boards and Agencies of the Conference. We are happy to note that many requests have come from churches of the 1866 Conference in the year. Several new 16mm films have been added

and more are in process of purchase agreements. It has been discovered that many Conference Boards and Agencies have been requesting 16mm films for use through district program councils, and in promotion of special emphases through the Conference Program Council. These are added as requested. New 16mm films account for the constant rate of "\$10.00-a Year-Film-Club" memberships, which has reached the total of 140 churches and/or charges presently members. These members are entitled to use any 16mm film for a service fee of \$2.00 plus transportation. Non-film-club churches must pay a service fee of \$8.00 for each use of 16mm films. All users pay transportation to return film. A recent regulation has been adopted which restricts those churches and charge from ordering any AV materials if they owe any back fees still unpaid. There are more than 400 churches in this situation. This accounts for more than \$700.00 due the AV Library, and the SC Advocate.

TRAFCO has produced cassettes for the Program Council, for the Board of the Laity in its Stewardship emphasis in 1972. Also we have prepared a compact, portable presentation of the audiovisual report of the Conference Boards shown at the 1971 session of Annual Conference. This unit consists of a carousel projector activated by pulse signals, and narration by Mr. Walker Breland. These units have been requested in several districts, and by local congregations. This was a pilot project, and already is very popular. More such productions are in the making. In addition, a production by Mr. Fletcher Carter, for use in "Stewardship 1972" emphases. This cassette is a C 90 unit and give explicit, easy to hear, instructions for the task force in each district. More than 80 CGO units have been requested.

A recent unit was acquired which permits C 60 cassettes to be duplicated in 3 minutes, two at a time. This greatly reduces the time involved in duplication of cassettes. We have discontinued the production of C 90 cassettes, except in certain cases. This is due to the problems found to exist in the THIN tape in the C 90 cassette. The C 120 has been dropped for several months, and will not be used, except in the higher cost units.

Taping of the 1971 session of Annual Conference was done by TRAFCO for the 9th year as a service to the Secretary and his staff in producing accurate minutes for the Journal. Orders for special portions of the proceedings are made available to any person on reel-to-reel tapes or cassettes at a cost slightly above actual cost. This has been a major service of TRAFCO in order to carry the actual voices of persons who speak, or preach, or debate certain matters of business. Resolutions and regulations may be checked for greater understanding by local congregations of conference business.

TRAFCO also taped the two special sessions of Conference, and distributed dozens of tapes of each. Pastors' School, the WSCS School of Missions, the Bishop's Convocation, were also taped and distributed in order from laymen and ministers, of 1866 and 1785 Conferences.

Radio programs of "WORD and MUSIC" continue to be among the most popular in several strategic sections of the Conference. Producers of the "WORD and MUSIC" will be presented and awards given during this session of Conference.

There are 2 programs of "THE PLACE" a popular teen-participation program discussing TOP 40 tunes current in localities served by the respective radio stations.

Relationship between TRAFCO and the television stations remains in excellent spirit. Frequent personal contacts with all of them is a vital objective of TRAFCO. Many TV placements of first-rate productions have brought hundreds of favorable responses by laymen after viewing some of the major films and live programs. TRAFCO joins with the National Council of Churches and the Broadcasters Film Commission, and the United Presbyterian Church and the Lutheran Church of America in producing TV spots and full length TV programs seen every week in South Carolina. TRAFCO is active in seeing that these available productions are placed on local TV outlets in the state.

TRAFCO has been successful in reporting daily news events to a net of 36 major radio stations in the state. This has been done for more than ten years.

Currently, news reports are transmitted daily by telephone to the news room of selected radio stations which air the reports twice to four times a day. A team of ministers prepare news reports in cooperation with the ADVOCATE editor. Reports are taped and are then phoned to radio stations daily.

Radio station managers commend this project as one of the best things done to inform their listeners of happenings of the Annual Conference. This does NOT take the place of newspaper and TV news reports, of course, but through the medium of radio, reports reach thousands who might NOT get the news otherwise, say the radio station managers.

Finally, the Television, Radio and Film Communication committee of the S. C. Conference Program Council exists ONLY to serve laymen, ministers and local congregation of the conference, as well as to serve any Boards, Commissions, and Agencies requiring the special services of TRAFCO.

WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

The 1968-1972 quadrennium has been a time when the women of the South Carolina Conference Women's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild have been called upon to begin to move out beyond what they have known before and to try to do more things than they have ever done before. As we become one United Methodist Conference in South Carolina, and as our two women's organizations become one new organization, United Methodist Women, we are recognizing that we "will have to develop a sense of oneness in the midst of variety, be open to the ideas of others, learn new ways of dealing with individual and group feelings, build a network of communication and mutual support among our membership and with others of similar interest."

In these days when the "church's strength is unequal to her task," women are rising up "to make her great" as they seek liberation to true personhood not only for women, but for all of God's children.

It is a great fallacy to categorize women's work in missions as simply the giving of money. "A Celebration of Living and Giving" describes the role of women in mission in South Carolina. Women living mission has been evidenced through the participation of women in action living their belief in God the Father, Almighty and in His Son Jesus Christ for the union of the two United Methodist Conferences in South Carolina, their belief in human rights, their stand for individual freedom, and their work for social equality. Legislative meetings, seminars, workshops, schools of Christian Mission, retreats, and other opportunities have encouraged women in their hope to help bring peace and justice to all. We were hostess to the South Eastern Jurisdiction Society-Guild Quadrennial Meeting in Charleston. We have met jointly and worked out goals for the seven months period.

The giving (financial) mission of South Carolina United Methodist Women of the former '85 Conference during the past year is seen in part as follows: \$187,000 sent to Women's Division of the Board of Missions; \$19,573, conference cultivation and leadership disbursements; \$8,000, scholarship fund to Spartanburg Junior College; \$4,276, Love Offering allocated to various organizations in conference; \$500, Jurisdiction Society-Guild Love Offering for International Nursing Services, Emory University; \$1,000, advanced for Conference School of Christian Mission; \$1,000, Killingsworth Home; \$200, additional contribution to Summer Investment Program; \$500, Spartanburg Rural Work; \$500, Jeremie Project in Haiti; \$1,000, John's Island Migrant Work Project; \$1,000, Bethlehem Center, Spartanburg; \$1,000, Bethlehem Center, Columbia; \$1,000 Boylan-Haven-Mather Academy; \$1,000, Bishop Dawsey Fund; \$500, Will Rogers Work in Brazil; and other local contributions.

"The trees desire to be still, but the winds keep blowing" is a Chinese proverb. The winds of change continue to blow and to push us into changing structures and programs. Deep-rooted in faith in God, we hope to make each change better than what preceded it.

**THE WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE
 CONFERENCE '66**

This has been an extremely busy and eventful year working together. It provided valuable opportunities for communication with our fellow christians.

One of the highlights of our Conference this year was being joint host to the quadrennial meeting of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Society Guild. This was the first time that we had the privilege of entertaining this group in our State.

The theme was challenging, "In These Times—Women." We gained from the meeting a spiritual lift and a determination to carry out our purpose. Sincere appreciation is expressed to the Leadership and the Charleston District for a successful meeting.

The goals set by our conference since merger have been enthusiastically sought. Our pledge to Missions has been paid in full, and the Mission Projects within our conference have been supported. Bethlehem Community Center, Columbia, a gift of \$742.00; Boylan Haven Mather Academy \$1184.00 and Clailin College Bus Fund \$1000.00. These were gifts given by the Orangeburg District. The Florence District also gave gifts to Bethlehem Center and Boylan Haven. The four districts supported also a Love Offering through the Conference to the Nursing School at Emory, the sum of \$100.00.

In the area of Missions, Christian Social Relations and Spiritual Growth, some progress has been made. The Week of Prayer and Self-Denial was observed throughout the Conference. We supported the Bishop's Convocation on Stewardship.

The 1972 General Conference passed a resolution that we have One New Organization, "The United Methodist Women."

In compliance with the request from the Merged Conference, we are attempting to carry out our same program with the same elected officers for the seven months period which ends on December 31, 1972. Beginning January 1, 1973, we will have One New Organization in the Columbia area.

We have been working for this New Organization through our joint Executive Meetings. During our joint Executive session, we elected a nominating committee. Goals have been set and we are working enthusiastically together to achieve these goals.

Our School of Christian Missions will be held at Columbia College beginning August 4-6. Our annual meeting is set for November 4 at Shandon United Methodist Church, Columbia.

WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

REPORT NO. 1

1. We recommend that Thad Herbert be elected as Treasurer/Business Manager for the South Carolina Annual Conference for the 1972-1976 Quadrennium.

REPORT NO. 2

Institutions

1. EPWORTH CHILDREN'S HOME: We recommend that the third Sunday in September (September 17, 1972) be set aside as Annual Work Day and that a special freewill offering be received in all churches of the South Carolina Conference on this day for Epworth Children's Home; and that the Church Schools of the South Carolina Conference shall be requested to give the offering received on the first Sunday of each month to the support of Epworth Children's Home.
2. THE METHODIST HOME: We recommend that Thanksgiving Week (November 19-25) be designated for a special freewill offering for the Methodist Homes, and that each local church set a goal of \$1.50 per member either through this special offering or through the budget. We further recommend that this support fund be divided on the basis of 75% for the Orangeburg H and 25 for the Greenwood Home respectively.
3. SOUTH CAROLINA CAMP FUND: We recommend that an offering be taken on October 22, 1972 for the Conference Camp Development and Maintenance Program. Each church is requested a goal of \$1.00 per church school member.

REPORT NO. 3

Special Day Offerings

1. RACE RELATIONS DAY: We recommend that the churches of the Conference observe Race Relations Day the 2nd Sunday in February and take a voluntary offering and further that the Conference Treasurer in reporting these funds to the treasurer of the General Board of Education in Nashville, Tennessee, ask that they be directed to Claflin College, Orangeburg, S. C.
 2. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION SUNDAY: We recommend the observance of Christian Education Sunday, November 5, 1972 a freewill offering be taken.
 3. GOLDEN CROSS: In accord with a request of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, we recommend that each church receive a special freewill offering for Golden Cross on the 1st or 2nd Sunday in December.
- (Note: Section number 1 of the above report—Report No. 3—was deleted by the Commission.)

REPORT NO. 4

Special Recommendations

1. The fiscal year for which all recommendations are to be operative shall be June 1, 1972 through December 31, 1972.
2. During this 7 months Conference year, we recommend that the Conference Treasurer be authorized to advance from available funds amounts not to exceed \$5,000.00 or 50% of the annual appropriation, whichever is lower, to the several commissions and committees of the Conference for the purpose of meeting current expenses where the appropriation has not been received from current collections. However, the Committee on Conference Journal and Yearbook shall be allowed to withdraw its full amount at any time during

- the year when the bills come due, since all of its funds are needed for the printing of the Annual Conference Journal and Yearbook in 7/12th year.
3. We urge each pastor to check with his treasurer (or treasurers) before sending his report to the statistician to see that all amounts reported paid have been remitted. We urge the minister to check with the monthly report received from Data Processing Service, verify it with his treasurer and all balances indicated be paid before the end of conference year.
 4. We recommend that at the close of the fiscal year of the South Carolina Annual Conference the Statistical Secretary bring his records into conformity with the records of the Treasurer of the South Carolina Conference.
 5. The Commission on World Service and Finance recommends a total of \$250,000 for the Conference Treasurer/Business Manager, Mr. Thad Harber. He will serve as Treasurer for all Boards, Commissions and Agencies as outlined in Paragraph No. 914 of the 1968 DISCIPLINE and shall submit, for each board or agency, monthly, a statement showing the amount of the disbursements.
 6. We approve the recommendation of the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension that all local churches be urged and encouraged to include in their Advance Special giving a share for Conference and District Church Extension needs.
 7. All Boards, Committees or Commissions receiving funds from the Conference Treasurer shall with each voucher submit adequate supporting data.
 8. Boards, Agencies, and Conference Institutions which are allowed to withdraw lump sums from the Conference Treasurer shall submit an audit by a Certified Public Accountant to the World Service Commission.
 9. It is the recommendation of the World Service and Finance Commission that all Boards, Commissions, and Agencies of the church pay a standing rate of 9¢ per mile when a representative travels on church business and that other actual expenses be paid.
 10. We recommend that all District Superintendents, Pastors, and Laymen take advantage of every appropriate opportunity to encourage will and deeper support of our churches, church colleges, Epworth Children's Home, The Methodist Home, World Service causes, Missions and any other church related agency or cause the donor may desire to support, and that information concerning such bequests be published in the South Carolina Methodist Advocate as information and inspiration to others.
 11. We recommend to the Annual Conference that \$2.00 per resident family be placed in the local budget to provide subscriptions to the ADVOCATE for families of that church, and that this money be paid directly to the Advocate on at least a quarterly basis.

REPORT NO. 5

Ministerial Items

1. DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS:
 - (a) We recommend \$7,791.00 salary for each District Superintendent for the Conference year 1972.
 - (b) That 7 months for the Conference year 1972 the apportionment for the District Superintendent's Fund be distributed to the several Districts and Charges on the basis of 1.01% of net total funds raised for the Conference year 1970-71.
 - (c) We recommend that each District Board of Stewards, or in the absence of such a board the District Board of the Laity, make adequate provisions in the funds for District Work for the necessary expenses of operating the work of the District including upkeep of the District Parsonage, travel expense, secretarial and office expenses, and other necessary expenses incurred by the District Superintendent in the performance of his work.
 - (d) The Commission on World Service and Finance of the South Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, the United Methodist

Church, hereby designates up to 15% of the District Superintendent's salary for the 7 months conference year 1972 allocated for parsonage utilities and maintenance, not including maid service and such expenses paid by the district.

CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS: We recommend an assessment of \$597,000.00 to be distributed to the Conference Claimants during the Conference year; that is, 5.14% of the net total funds raised for the 1970-71 Conference year.

MINIMUM SALARY: We approve the sum \$103,601.00 for the Minimum Salary Fund during the 7 months Conference year. This is .89% of the net total funds raised during the 1970-71 Conference year.

EPISCOPAL FUND: The Episcopal Fund apportionment is 2% of the total cash salaries paid to the pastors and associate pastors serving charges under Episcopal appointment or as Supply pastors as reported to the current session of the Annual Conference.

REPORT NO. 6

The Commission has received the auditor's reports; Derrick, Stubbs, and Smith Certified Public Accountants, Columbia, South Carolina, and is open at any time for inspection. There is also a copy on file with the Conference Secretary as required by the Standing rules.

REPORT NO. 7

Annual Conference Entertainment

We recommend that:

- (a) Each local church or charge assume responsibility for the entertainment expenses of its clerical and lay members to the Annual Conference.
- (b) The District Fund be responsible for the entertainment expenses of the District Superintendent to the Annual Conference.
- (c) A per diem of \$10.00 per day be paid from the Conference Entertainment Fund to all retired members in attendance at the Annual Conference.
- (d) A per diem of \$10.00 be paid from the Conference Entertainment Fund to each full-time ministerial student at accredited Seminaries and who are not serving a pastoral charge in this conference. The Conference Commission on Ministerial Training and Qualifications will be requested to furnish the Conference Treasurer with a list of all such persons at least two weeks before the meeting of Annual Conference in order that he may have funds due these individuals available to them at the time they arrive for Conference.
- (e) Conference Boards, Commissions, and other Institutions, as appropriate, should provide for the expense of their representatives to Annual Conference.

WORSHIP

The South Carolina Conference (85) Commission on Worship held a Conference Workshop on Innovative Worship in the Fall. We dealt with music, audiovisual, interpretive dance, and drama as they relate to worship. It was well received by those attending. Some districts have had district workshops or mini-workshops during the year. The Commission has also encouraged the work of the Fellowship of United Methodist Musicians in their work in the Conference.

Two members of the Commission were invited to attend the World Convocation on Worship in Denver in August of last year and two attended. We assisted with the morning service at the Bishop's Convocation in January. Tentative plans have been made to help at this Annual Conference.

The Commission on Worship recommends that our new Bishop investigate the feasibility of other times and places for the ordination of elders before making any decision concerning this high and holy moment in the life of a minister and the people. For example: a district ordination service, or the man being ordained might have the right to choose which church in which he might be ordained, or at least on two separate nights of Annual Conference, one for Deacons and one for Elders.

DAVID NORRIS BUSBEE

"All hail the power of Jesus' name . . ."

These words, sung at the funeral of the Reverend David N. Busbee, summarize his life. His life was one which, by word and deed, constantly praised the name of Jesus, and his life can be explained in terms of the power of the NAME of Jesus.

David Busbee spent a lifetime preaching about the power of Jesus' name. After retirement he continued to fill pulpits until a stroke caused speech difficulty, but even this stopped him for only a short time. He was soon preaching again, having preached in the pulpit from which his funeral was to be conducted less than a month before he died.

Mr. Busbee also spent a lifetime serving in Jesus' name. He helped poor families with their needs, he helped young people to get an education, and he helped the jobless to find work.

It was a joy for me to have had in my congregation David Busbee and his late wife, Lillian A. (Shealy) Busbee, who died on September 8, 1970. These two great prayer warriors helped me with their prayers and encouraged me with their words. Brother Busbee may have thought the Church could be handled better than I was handling it, but he never said so. He and Mrs. Busbee had better ways of getting things done—through kindness and through constant communion with God.

Rev. Busbee was killed in an automobile wreck near Sumter on December 1, 1971. He was born near Marshall, Arkansas, on September 6, 1889, the son of David Norris and Sarah Asbill Busbee. He received his educational training in the Boston Mountain High School in Arkansas, through private study, and through correspondence work with Emory University. He received his license to preach in 1910, was admitted on trial into the South Carolina Conference in 1912, and admitted into full connection in 1914. He was ordained deacon in 1915 and elder in 1916.

In a ministry which spanned over 50 years, Rev. Busbee served: South Hampton-Furman; Cypress; Bluffton and Ridgeland; Cumberland, Charleston; Providence; Oswego; Asbury Memorial, Charleston; Latta; Chesterfield; Wesley Chapel-Hebron; Hampton; Scranton; Liberty Circuit; Darlington Circuit; and Kingstree Circuit. He retired in 1954 and served Mt. Horeb and Springhill as a retired supply.

He attended the Greenwood schools and was a graduate Asbury College, A.B., 1956. He continued his studies at Asbury Seminary; Hamm Divinity School, Springfield, Ohio; Candler School of Theology; and Erskine Seminary from which he received his Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1962. He was licensed to preach in the Kentucky Conference in 1954, was admitted on trial into the Ohio Conference in 1958 and was that year ordained deacon and transferred to the South Carolina Conference and was ordained elder.

On May 13, 1950 he and Patsy Jo Lavender were married. She; their two daughters, Mrs. Nickala J. Harrell of Moncks Corner and Miss Paula Jenkins of Pinopolis; their son, W. Y. Jenkins, III of Pinopolis, his mother and two sisters; survive him.

Besides serving churches in Kentucky and Ohio, he served two appointments in the South Carolina Conference; Townville Charge in the Anderson District, and was in his tenth year as pastor of the Pinopolis and Friendship churches of the Pinopolis Charge.

His brother ministers indicated the esteem in which they held him when they elected him a delegate to the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, only eight years after he became eligible for this honor.

The funeral was conducted in Pinopolis United Methodist Church October 25, with the Rev. Dr. George W. Whitaker, the Rev. Thomas E. Liles, and the writer officiating. Burial was in Berkeley Memorial Gardens of Moncks Corner.

JAMES HENRY MARTIN

James Henry Martin was licensed to preach by the Greenwood District in 1932. Thirty-nine years later, on September 29, 1971, he died very suddenly while serving as pastor of Central United Methodist Church in Newberry, also in the Greenwood District.

Between the time he left his old home church, Trinity, Newberry, to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and the time when his body was returned to the lovely cemetery alongside that same church, Jim Martin served as pastor of the following churches: Bamberg and Orangeburg Mills; Johnsonville; Olar; Norway; St. George; First Church, Lancaster; First Church, Conway; First Church, Laurens; and as stated above, was serving Central Church, Newberry at the time of his death.

In addition to the pastorates listed above, which he served so effectively and well, Jim answered the call of his country during World War II and served from 1942 to 1946 as a Chaplain in the United States Army. For his distinguished service he was awarded a "Certificate of Commendation for Meritorious Service" by the Secretary of War, and a "Certificate of Award for Meritorious Service to God and Country" by the General Commission on Army and Navy Chaplains.

From 1965 to 1970 Jim Martin gave five years of excellent leadership to the Conference as Superintendent of the Anderson District. When these years are added to the twenty-six spent as a pastor and the four years of the Army Chaplaincy, the total number of years given to "ministry" come to thirty-five.

During these thirty-five years of service to the South Carolina Conference, he was called upon to give leadership on numerous Boards and Agencies. Among them were the Boards of Hospitals and Homes, Education, and Missions and Church Extension. He was Conference Director of Golden Cross for several years, and at the time of his death was a Trustee of Columbia College and a member of our Conference Methodist Camp Commission.

Few ministers are privileged to give such distinguished service to the cause of Jesus Christ. Jim Martin was a deeply committed servant of God, and his memory will always be precious to those who knew him.

To prepare himself educationally for his ministry, Jim went to Wofford College where he received the B.A. Degree in 1933, and on to the Candler School of Theology at Emory University where he received his B.D. Degree in 1935.

On October 25, 1935, he married Miss Winnie Frances Hudson of Decatur, Georgia. She shared his ministry across the years in a beautiful and helpful manner, and survives him along with their son, William Watkins Martin. Another son, Henry Hudson Martin preceded his father in death in 1955.

As we close this Chapter in the on-going life of James Henry Martin, we remember the words of the Psalmist, "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saint". (Ps. 116:15).

FOSTER SPEER

Rev. Foster Speer, the son of Dr. Andrew Jackson Speer, and Lola Verdel Speer was born at Lowndesville, South Carolina February 15, 1874. His education was secured in the public school of his childhood community, and at Young Harris College, Georgia. While a college student he was converted, and soon afterwards he was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of the Hiwassee Charge, North Georgia Annual Conference.

At Abbeville, in December, 1896, he was admitted on trial into the South Carolina Annual Conference, along with Sidi B. Harper, D. W. Kellar, W. C. Kirkland, F. H. Shuler, J. C. Roper, and D. H. Thrower. After serving in that Conference, and the Upper South Carolina Conference with which he cast in his lot at the division in 1914, he was retired in 1941. Thereafter for twelve years he resided with his family in a parsonage furnished them by the kind and considerate Methodists of Plum Branch, his last pastoral charge. He died October 1, 1971, and was buried in the Plum Branch Cemetery.

On June 14, 1898, Brother Speer was married to Miss Henrietta A. Pooser, the daughter of Rev. George H. Pooser of the South Carolina Conference. Throughout their long married life of 73 years, she ever proved herself an intelligent and sympathetic helpmate. Of their four children, two sons, George Andrew and John Verdel, died in infancy. One daughter, Mrs. Martha Margenhoff, a Winthrop graduate, survives. Another daughter, Mrs. Ethel Sturkey, also a Winthrop graduate, died in 1953, leaving three young sons.

Brother Speer wrote the above prior to his death, leaving instructions with his daughter that it be passed on to his District Superintendent for printing in the Conference Journal.

His modesty prevented his listing the many areas of service or the individual charges served during his active ministry of forty-five years. More years, however, were spent serving charges in the Greenwood District (part of the time known as the Cokesbury District) than in any other. Brother Speer also served as Secretary for the District Conference of the Greenwood District longer than any other man ever served. He shall long be remembered by his brethren in the ministry and by those who knew him as pastor and friend.

At the time of his death Brother Speer and Mrs. Speer were residents of the Greenwood Methodist Home, where Mrs. Speer continues to reside.

In addition to his wife, Brother Speer is survived by the daughter we mentioned above (Mrs. Marjenhoff), who has so faithfully and lovingly looked after her parents in recent years, and by the three grandsons who were also mentioned above.

The Rev. M. B. Lee served as pastor of the Plum Branch charge during the last four years of Brother Speer's life, and meant much to the family during that time. Brother Lee and I conducted his funeral service in the Plum Branch church on Sunday afternoon, October 3, 1971. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord". (Rev. 14:13).

She received the M. A. degree from Teachers College, Columbia University, New York.

Nurtured in a Christian home, it was natural that she was led to dedicate her talents and skills to the enriching of the lives of others. Having prepared for teaching she chose that as a profession. She responded to the call to Christian mission, and for twenty-five years she was a missionary of the Woman's Division of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, serving as teacher of English in Davidson Girls School, Soochow, China, and in Soochow University. STANDING RULES AND RESOLUTIONS THE SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH STANDING RULES

A. Rules of Order

1. The procedure of the Annual Conference shall be governed by the following in the order listed: (1) The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church; (2) The Standing Rules of the Annual Conference; (3) The Rules of Order of the preceding General Conference; (4) Robert's Rules of Order, Revised.

B. Organization

2. The official roll call shall be the roll cards signed by the clerical and lay members present. The record of attendance shall be made from these cards.

3. The officers of the Annual Conference, to be elected quadrennially, shall be as follows:

- a. the Secretary of the Annual Conference, who shall be elected from nominations which arise from the floor; and
- b. the Statistician of the Annual Conference, who shall be elected from nominations from the cabinet.

4. The officers of the Annual Conference, to be elected annually, shall be as follows:

- a. the assistant secretaries whom the Conference Secretary shall nominate;
- b. the assistant statisticians whom the Conference Statistician shall nominate; and
- c. the Auditor, whom the Commission on World Service and Finance shall nominate.

5. The Conference Stenographer shall be employed by the Conference Secretary.

6. Compensation for the officers of the Annual Conference shall be determined by the Commission on World Service and Finance, subject to the approval of the Annual Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these persons from the Conference Expense Fund.

7. There shall be a Committee on the Annual Conference to be elected quadrennially. The Bishop shall be the Chairman.

- a. This Committee shall be composed of five (5) clerical and five (5) lay persons nominated by the Committee on Nominations, and the following ex-officio members: the Secretary of the Annual Conference, the Annual Conference Treasurer-Business Manager, the Chairman of the Annual Conference Commission on Worship, the Conference President of United Methodist Women, the Conference Lay Leader, and one (1) youth elected by the Annual Conference UMYF Council. The District Superintendent and the pastor of the local church who are to be the hosts of the next Annual Conference shall meet with the Committee in the year just preceding the Annual Conference of which they are hosts; such persons shall not be voting members of the Committee.
- b. The Committee shall arrange the Annual Conference program, giving due regard to any special orders required by the Discipline, or as ordered by the Annual Conference. The Committee shall determine the compensation and expenses to be paid speakers invited by this Committee, and the Treasurer-Business Manager shall make such payments from the Conference Expense Fund.

c. The Committee shall receive all invitations to host the Annual Conference. It shall recommend to the Annual Conference the place for the entertainment of the Annual Conference at least two years in advance.

d. The Committee shall be responsible for the selection of persons to write the memoirs of the preachers, preachers' spouses, widows and widowers who have died during the year. These memoirs shall be printed in the Conference Journal; those of the preachers shall not exceed 600 words and those of spouses, widows and widowers shall not exceed 250 words.

e. The Committee shall arrange for an appropriate Memorial Service to be held annually and shall select the speaker.

f. The Committee shall cooperate with the Conference Secretary in determining the accuracy of the daily minutes. The Committee shall report concerning the accuracy of these minutes to the next Annual Conference session and shall note any discrepancies and exceptions and shall cause these to be noted in the Conference Journal next published.

g. The Committee shall conduct all matters of courtesy and make such introductions as are necessary during the sessions of Annual Conference.

h. The Committee shall be responsible for the publication of the Conference Journal.

(1) The Conference Secretary shall be the Editor of the Conference Journal.

(2) The Committee shall consult with the editor, let the contract for the printing of the Conference Journal, and shall provide for the printing at least one year in advance. The Committee shall make recommendations to the Annual Conference concerning publication of the Journal.

8. There shall be a Committee on Nominations to be elected quadrennially. The Bishop (or a person designated by the Bishop) shall be chairman. The Committee shall make all nominations needed by the Annual Conference except as provided elsewhere by the Discipline or the Standing Rules of the Annual Conference.

a. There shall be fifteen (15) clerical members and fifteen (15) lay members of the Committee on Nominations, two (2) youth nominated by the Conference Council on Youth Ministry, and the following ex-officio: the Conference Co-Lay Leaders, the Conference Co-Presidents of the United Methodist Women, and a representative of the cabinet:

(1) There shall be one (1) lay person elected from each of the fifteen (15) districts. The District Boards of the Laity of the several districts shall elect these lay persons.

(2) There shall be one (1) clerical person elected from each of the fifteen (15) districts. The ministers of the several districts shall elect the clerical persons.

(3) These persons, both lay and clerical, shall be elected by secret ballot after at least six (6) persons shall have been nominated from the floor of each of the electing bodies. Election shall be by simple majority.

(4) If a member of the Committee on Nominations moves beyond the boundaries of the Annual Conference his membership on this Committee shall be terminated.

(5) If, after the Committee on Nominations has been elected and organized for the quadrennium, any vacancy shall occur, replacements shall be elected from persons having the same former Conference membership, upon nomination by the Committee on Nominations (with the right of nomination from the floor of the Conference) and election by the Annual Conference.

b. The Committee on Nominations shall meet within thirty (30) days after the close of the first Annual Conference in each quadrennium.

c. Election to the Committee on Nominations shall be in keeping with the Standing Rule on tenure. When a person, lay or clerical, is elected to membership on the Committee, that person may not, during his period of service on this Committee, be nominated by this Committee for membership on any Board, Commission, Committee or Board of Trust whose membership arises from nominations from this Committee.

9. The restrictive rules are as follows:

a. No person may serve more than eight (8) years consecutively on any quadrennial Board, Commission or Committee to which he has been elected by the Conference. (See Rule 13.g. for special provisions in 1972.)

b. No person may serve simultaneously on more than one (1) Board of Trust and one (1) Disciplinary Board or Commission, except ex-officio members as provided.

(1) The Boards of Trust are of the following institutions and agencies: Claflin College; Columbia College; Spartanburg Junior College; Wolford College; Epworth Children's Home; The Greenwood Methodist Home; The Methodist Home, Orangeburg; The South Carolina United Methodist Advocate and The Methodist Center; The Annual Conference; and the Belin Property.

(2) The Disciplinary Boards, as per the 1968 Discipline, are the following: Christian Social Concerns, Education, Evangelism, Health and Welfare Ministries, Ministry, Missions, and Pensions.

(3) The Disciplinary Commissions are as follows: Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns, Archives and History, Enlistment for Christian Vocation, Insurance, Minimum Salary, Public Relations and United Methodist Information, Worship, and World Service and Finance.

c. No trustee or member of the faculty or staff of any institution or manager of any interest shall at the same time be a member of the parent or supervising board or commission, unless otherwise required by the Discipline.

d. Any member of a Quadrennial Board, Commission or Committee who is absent from two consecutive meetings of the same, without rendering an acceptable excuse to the chairman, shall forfeit membership on such Board, Commission or Committee and the chairman shall notify the person of this action. The chairman shall notify the Committee on Nominations of such forfeiture. The Committee on Nominations shall fill the vacancy, subject to the approval of the next session of Annual Conference.

e. Parent Boards may not nominate their own members to any Board of Management or Trust until said member has been off that Parent Board for at least one year.

f. When a minister is appointed as District Superintendent, his membership on any Disciplinary Board, Commission or Committee nominated by the Committee on Nominations shall automatically cease; provided, that this shall not apply to ex-officio memberships on Boards, Commissions and Committees as required by the Discipline, nor does this apply to service where nominations are made by groups other than the Committee on Nominations.

g. All persons shall retire from and not be eligible for further membership on Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees at the Annual Conference following their 72nd birthday. Ministers who retire shall not be nominated for membership on any Conference Board, Commission or Committee but shall be allowed to complete their terms of service on Boards, Commissions and Committees to which they have been elected prior to retirement, provided the Discipline is not violated in their continued service.

h. A member of the Conference may not speak more than once on a question before the Conference until every member who wishes to speak shall have spoken. A member shall not speak for more than three minutes at any time, except by permission of the Conference.

10. The rules for the nominations, elections and organization of the quadrennial Boards, Commissions, Committees and Boards of Trust provided either by the Discipline or the Standing Rules, shall be as follows:

a. When the nominations are made, the persons nominated shall be consulted and their consent to serve received, whether nominated by parent Boards or the Committee on Nominations or from the floor of

the Annual Conference. Persons consulted shall be advised as to when and where the organizational meeting shall be held.

b. It shall be an Order of the Day at the morning session of Tuesday of Annual Conference that the floor shall be opened for additional nominations to all Boards, Commissions, Committees and Boards of Trust; or other agencies to which the Committee on Nominations and parent Boards are prepared to make nominations.

c. It shall be an order of the day on Wednesday of Annual Conference to have the election of Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees, and Boards of Trust. If additional nominations have been made, as per paragraph 10.b., ballots shall be prepared by the Conference Secretary for use in the election.

d. Each quadrennial Board, Commission, Standing Committee, and Trustees of The South Carolina United Methodist Advocate and The Methodist Center, shall be convened for organization (at least a majority of the members must be present) as an order of the day for Thursday of the Annual Conference by a District Superintendent or any other elder appointed by the Bishop. If possible these organizational meetings shall be held one hour prior to the usual adjournment time of the afternoon session. The election shall be by ballot without oral nomination and shall be by a majority of the votes cast.

e. In order to conform with the provisions of the Resolution on Implementation of The Plan of Union the time of the report of the Committee on Nominations to the 1972 Annual Conference, the ensuing elections, and the organizational meetings of the Boards Commissions, Standing Committees and Trustees of The South Carolina United Methodist Advocate and The Methodist Center, shall all take place at the adjourned session of the 1972 Annual Conference. A copy of the report of the Committee on Nominations shall be distributed to all lay and clerical members at least two weeks prior to the beginning of the adjourned session of the 1972 Annual Conference. Thereafter the time schedule as provided in 10.a., 10.b., and 10.c., shall apply.

11. All Boards, Commissions and Committees required by the 1968 Discipline shall be organized as provided therein, except in the following discretionary cases:

a. There shall be a Board of the Ministry composed of twenty-eight (28) ministers.

b. The Board of Education shall be composed of one (1) lay person from each district, an equal number of ministers, and such additional Paragraphs 1247-1258 of the 1968 Discipline.

c. There shall be a Board of Christian Social Concerns which shall be composed of fifteen (15) ministers and fifteen (15) lay persons (including at least one (1) lay person from each district and conforming to Paragraph 1004 of the 1968 Discipline) and the District Directors. The three (3) members required by Paragraph 1004 of the 1968 Discipline shall be in addition to the other members elected.

d. The Board of Missions shall be composed of one (1) lay person from each district, an equal number of ministers, and such additional persons as required by the Discipline.

e. There shall be a Board of Evangelism which shall be organized as per Paragraphs 1146-1155 of the 1968 Discipline.

f. There shall be a Board of Health and Welfare Ministries which shall be organized as per Paragraph 1173 of the 1968 Discipline.

g. There shall be a Board of the Laity which shall be organized as per Paragraphs 1247-1258 of the 1968 Discipline.

h. There shall be a Board of Pensions which shall be composed of nine (9) lay persons and nine (9) ministers and organized as per Paragraph 1380 of the 1968 Discipline.

i. There shall be a Commission on Ecumenical Affairs which shall be composed of one (1) lay person from each district and an equal number of Ministers and organized as per Paragraph 1391 of the 1968 Discipline.

j. There shall be a Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations organized as per Paragraph 666 of the 1968 Discipline.

k. There shall be a Commission on Group Life and Hospital Insurance which shall be composed of six (6) ministers and five (5) lay persons.

l. The Commission on Worship shall be composed of one (1) lay person from each district and an equal number of ministers with the District Directors as ex-officio members.

m. The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of five (5) ministers and (6) lay persons. The Board of Missions, The Board of the Ministry, and the Board of the Laity shall each designate one (1) of its members to serve ex-officio.

n. The Commission on Archives and History shall consist of the Conference Secretary, the archivist of Claflin College, the archivist of Wofford College, the President and the Secretary of the Historical Society, and two (2) lay persons nominated by the Nominating Committee. The Historical Society shall be organized in accordance with the Discipline.

o. There shall be a Commission on Religion and Race which shall be composed of eight (8) members of the former Conference '66 (three (3) of whom shall be ministers and five (5) of whom shall be lay persons. At least one (1) lay person shall be a youth, one shall be a young adult, and one (1) shall be a woman.) and seven (7) members of the former Conference '85 (three (3) of whom shall be ministers and four (4) of whom shall be lay persons. At least one (1) lay person shall be a youth, one (1) shall be a young adult, and one (1) shall be a woman.)

p. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall be composed of seven (7) ministers (at least one (1) of whom shall be under the age of 35), and eight (8) lay persons (at least one (1) of whom shall be under the age of 35, and two (2) of whom shall be women.)

q. There shall be a Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information which shall be composed of one (1) lay person from each district and an equal number of ministers.

r. There shall be a Committee on Investigation composed of five (5) itinerant elders and five (5) reserves as per Paragraph 1740 of the 1968 Discipline.

s. There shall be a Committee on the Lay Worker composed of six (6) lay persons and three (3) ministers as per Paragraph 607 of the 1968 Discipline.

t. The Committee on Resolutions and Appeals shall be composed of five (5) persons, elected annually, to serve from the closing of that Annual Conference until the conclusion of the succeeding Annual Conference.

(1) Any resolution not from a constituted Board, Commission or Committee of the Conference shall be referred to this Committee for proper reference or report. Any resolution, not referred to another Board, Commission or Committee, shall be reported to the Annual Conference with a recommendation of concurrence or non-concurrence.

u. There shall be a Committee on Standing Rules elected quadrennially composed of seven (7) persons, four (4) clerical and three (3) lay.

v. There shall be a Council on Ministries.

(1) Members of the Council on Ministries shall be the presiding Bishop, the District Superintendents, the Conference Secretary, two (2) representatives of the Conference on Youth Ministry, one (1) lay person from each district, and the Chairmen of the Age Level Departments; also, two (2) representatives from each of the following Boards: Christian Social Concerns, Education, Evangelism, Missions, Laity (one (1) of whom shall be the Conference President), Health and Welfare Ministries, and the Board of the Ministry (one of whom shall be the chairman); also, one (1) representative from the Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations, and one (1) representative of Pastoral Care and Counsel-

ing, and one (1) representative of the Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information.

(2) The following shall be members without vote: The Conference Staff (both salaried and volunteer), the Conference Treasurer-Business Manager, one representative from the Commission on World Service and Finance, TRAFCO, the Editor of the South Carolina United Methodist Advocate, and the Administrator for Ministerial Affairs.

(3) There may be an Executive Committee composed of the Chairman, the Vice Chairman, the Secretary, the Presiding Bishop, two District Superintendents, the Conference Program Director, and additional members necessary to achieve a balance of ministers and lay persons.

w. There shall be a Committee on Annual Conference Structure composed of the following: The Committee on Standing Rules, the Conference Presidents of United Methodist Women, the Conference Lay Leaders, the Conference Presidents of United Methodist Youth, the Chairman and Secretary of the Conference Council on Ministries and two other members designated by the Council, the Conference Secretary and two (2) District Superintendents and three (3) members at large designated by the Presiding Bishop. The Chairman of the Committee on Standing Rules shall serve as Chairman. This Committee shall make a thorough and continuous study of the organization and structure of the Annual Conference as it relates both to program and administration. The Committee shall make annual recommendations to the Conference for consideration and possible adoption.

x. All Annual Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees shall establish lines of communication with the appropriate Jurisdictional and General Church structures. The Committee on Annual Conference Structure shall designate lines of communication whenever necessary, subject to the approval of the Presiding Bishop and the Conference Council on Ministries.

y. There shall be a Committee on Pastoral Care and Counseling which shall be composed of nine (9) persons.

z. There shall be a Continuing Committee on the Implementation of the Plan of Union which shall be composed of six (6) members of the former Conference '66 and six (6) members of the former Conference '85 designated by the Presiding Bishop.

aa. The Conference Council on Ministries shall organize a Committee on Television, Radio and Film Communication.

12. The Boards of Trust of the Conference agencies shall be organized as follows:

a. The Board of Trustees of Claflin College shall consist of not less than nine (9) nor more than twenty-seven (27) members divided into three classes serving three (3) years, respectively, elected at the Annual Meeting of the Board. Successors for each class, as its term expires, shall be elected for a term of three (3) years. After twenty-four (24) years of continuous service, trustees may be placed in a class of "trustee emeritus."

(1) The Trustees shall elect their successors from a list of nominees submitted by the various supporting Conferences of The United Methodist Church and the Claflin College General Alumni Association. The following allocation will be made: three (3) from the South Carolina Annual Conference, one (1) from each of the other supporting Conferences, and two (2) from the General Alumni Association of Claflin College. The remaining members are to be elected at large.

(2) This institution shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Education.

b. The Board of Trustees of Columbia College shall consist of twenty-six (26) elective members in conformity with the charter. The Board of Trustees of Wofford College shall consist of twenty-one (21) elective

members in conformity with the charter. The trustees shall be nominated to the Annual Conference by the Board of Education.

(1) Every even-numbered year the Board of Education shall nominate suitable persons to be elected for two year terms. The tenure of the trustees shall be limited to twelve (12) consecutive years. After such period of service a former trustee shall be ineligible for re-election until a lapse of two (2) years.

(2) Vacancies may be filled in any year, but one-year terms shall not be permissible in even-numbered years.

(3) These institutions shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Education.

c. The Board of Trustees of Spartanburg Junior College shall be nominated by the Board of Missions except as provided below:

(1) The Board of Trustees shall consist of twenty-one (21) elected members and two (2) ex-officio members who shall be the Executive Secretary of Educational Work of the National Division of the Board of Missions of The United Methodist Church and one (1) other person to be named by the National Division of the Board of Missions of The United Methodist Church, and two (2) Student Advisory Trustees.

(2) The elected trustees shall be divided into three (3) classes of seven (7) each. One (1) class shall be elected each year to serve for three (3) years.

(3) Four (4) trustees of each class and the two (2) Student Advisory Trustees shall be elected by the Annual Conference upon nomination of the Board of Missions, and three (3) trustees shall be elected by the National Division of the Board of Missions of The United Methodist Church on nomination by the Annual Conference upon recommendation of its Board of Missions.

(4) The tenure of the trustees shall be limited to twelve (12) consecutive years. The tenure of student Advisory Trustees shall be one (1) year.

(5) This Board of Trustees shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Missions.

d. The Board of Trustees of the Belin Property shall consist of eight (8) persons, four (4) ministers and four (4) lay persons, nominated by the Board of Missions.

(1) The District Superintendents of the Districts in which the property lies shall be ex-officio members of the Board of Trustees.

(2) The Board shall be organized into four (4) classes of two (2) persons, one (1) clerical and one (1) lay.

(3) One class shall be elected annually to serve for four years.

(4) The tenure of the Trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years.

(5) This Board of Trustees shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Missions.

e. The Board of Trustees of The Methodist Home, Orangeburg, shall consist of twenty-one (21) persons, eleven (11) lay and ten (10) clerical. Suitable persons shall be nominated to the Annual Conference every even-numbered year by the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.

(1) The tenure of the Trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years, after which period a person shall be ineligible for re-election until two (2) years have elapsed.

(2) This Board of Trustees shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.

f. The Board of Trustees of The Greenwood Methodist Home shall consist of twenty-one (21) persons, eleven (11) lay and ten (10) clerical. Suitable persons shall be nominated to the Annual Conference every even-numbered year by the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.

(1) The tenure of the trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years after which period a person shall be ineligible for re-election until two (2) years have elapsed.

(2) This Board of Trustees shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.

g. The Board of Trustees of Epworth Children's Home shall consist of twenty-one (21) persons (at least three (3) of whom shall be women, eleven (11) lay and ten (10) clerical. Every even-numbered year the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries shall nominate suitable persons to the Annual Conference for election.

(1) The tenure of the Trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years after which period a person shall be ineligible for re-election until two (2) years have elapsed.

(2) This Board of Trustees shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.

h. The Board of Trustees of The South Carolina United Methodist Advocate and The Methodist Center shall be composed of fifteen (15) persons, eight (8) lay and seven (7) clerical. These trustees shall be nominated by the Committee on Nominations every even-numbered year to the Annual Conference for election.

(1) The tenure of the Trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years after which a person shall be ineligible for re-election until two (2) years have elapsed.

i. There shall be a Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference which shall be organized as per Paragraph 1519 of the 1968 Discipline.

13. Miscellaneous Rules

a. A copy of any motion made on the Conference floor shall be sent to the Secretary's desk as soon as the person making the motion returns to his or her seat.

b. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall be placed on the Conference Program at a time no later than the morning of the second full day of the Conference.

c. All lay persons employed by the agencies of the Conference shall conform to the compulsory retirement age set for the ministers of the church. Such retired lay persons may be employed on a part-time basis without executive or administrative responsibility.

d. Lay members of Boards, Commissions, Committees and Boards of Trust, lay members of the Conference Staff and lay persons who are heads of Conference institutions supported by the Conference, who are not members of the Annual Conference, shall have the privilege of the floor without vote.

e. Each District Superintendent shall transmit the complete list of the lay members from his district in triplicate to the Secretary of the Annual Conference at least five (5) months prior to the opening date of the Annual Conference.

f. The Conference Secretary shall list in the Conference Journal the names of the officers of the South Carolina Methodist Conference Credit Union and may include a brief resume of its annual report, if provided by the Credit Union.

g. In establishing the organization for the 1972 Annual Conference, up to one-half of those nominated to any Board, Commission or Committee may have served previously on the same Board, Commission or Committee in either of the two (2) former Annual Conferences, provided that such persons may only serve for four (4) years on the newly organized Board, Commission or Committee before being rotated for a period of not less than four (4) years. This rule takes precedence over rule 9.a. for the Annual Conference of 1972.

h. All proposed changes in the Standing Rules shall be submitted in writing for referral to the Committee on Standing Rules and then reported out with recommendations after twenty-four (24) hours.

(1) It shall require a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote to suspend the rules.

(2) When the rules are to be suspended, only that specific portion of the rules under consideration shall be suspended.

(3) The Annual Conference by a majority vote can amend or alter the Standing Rules with or without the concurrence of the Com-

mittee on Standing Rules, provided that any change or alteration not originating in the Committee on Standing Rules may be voted on only after the lapse of twenty-four (24) hours from the time of its submission to the Conference.

14. Local Church Financial Reporting

a. The Pastor's report to Annual Conference shall include all expenditures of a local church.

(1) In order to conform with the new fiscal year all Pastors shall submit a report to the Conference Statistician no later than January 15, 1973, to cover the period June 1, 1972 through December 31, 1972.

(2) Beginning in the calendar year 1973 and each year thereafter, pastors' reports to Annual Conference shall cover the calendar year (June 1—December 31) and shall be sent to the Conference Statistician so as to reach that office not later than January 15 of the year immediately following.

b. All monies to be credited to the accounts of local churches for the fiscal year shall be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer not later than fifteen (15) days after the end of the fiscal year.

15. Annual Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees Reporting

a. Reports from Boards, Commissions and Committees shall be presented in triplicate, filed with the Conference Secretary, and placed on the Conference Calendar in the order received.

(1) All Boards, Commissions and Committees, except the Board of the Ministry, shall submit their reports to the Conference Secretary so that they may be printed and ready for distribution at least two weeks prior to Annual Conference. These reports shall include all nominations, whether by the Committee on Nominations or by parent Boards, for Boards of Trust under their responsibility. The Conference Secretary shall determine the dates when reports shall be due in order to maintain this schedule.

(a) If the Commission on World Service and Finance should be unable to complete its report in time for this printing, it shall have its report prepared separately for distribution on the first day of Conference.

b. The Committee on Resolutions and Appeals shall report on any matters referred to it with a recommendation of concurrence or non-concurrence. This Committee's Reports shall not be subjected to placement on the Conference Calendar.

c. The libraries at Claflin College and Wofford College shall be designated as depositories of all Annual Conference minutes and records. Where possible duplicate copies of all material shall be furnished; in case of materials which cannot be furnished in duplicate the Secretary of the Annual Conference shall make the determination as to which depository shall be used.

d. The Board of the Ministry shall prepare each year, for the Conference Secretary, a statement concerning the age, education, marital status and ministerial experience of each person admitted on probation or as an associate member. This statement shall be included in the Conference Journal.

(1) The Conference Secretary, in cooperation with the Board of the Ministry, shall prepare a biographical sketch of each person received into full membership in the Conference from whatever source. This sketch, along with an individual photograph furnished by the person received, shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

e. The report of the Committee on Standing Rules shall be made as a part of the organization of the Conference and as often during the session as necessary.

C. DISTRICTS

16. There shall be fifteen (15) districts in the South Carolina Annual Conference.

D. MOVING DAY FOR THE MINISTERS

17. Those ministers who have previously moved on the second Wednesday after Annual Conference and have been paid monthly shall move on that date and be paid by the church from which they are moving for the month of June for this 1972 Annual Conference year. Those ministers who have previously moved the Sunday following Annual Conference and have been paid weekly shall move on that date and be paid effective that date by the new charge to which they are appointed for this 1972 Annual Conference year.

a. Beginning at the Annual Conference of 1973, "moving day" for the ministers shall be the second Wednesday following the close of Annual Conference.

b. Where special circumstances dictate any alteration of this moving date, the affected persons and the District Superintendents involved shall be permitted to make the necessary adjustments.

c. Beginning at Annual Conference of 1973, ministers shall be paid during the month of June proportionately by the charge from which they are moved and the charge to which they are moved on the basis of the percentages of Sundays actually served in each charge.

d. The moving expenses of the pastor shall be paid by the charge to which he is moved.

E. ELECTIONS

18. At any session of the Annual Conference where there are to be elections of officers or delegates by ballot, there shall be a Board of Managers nominated by the Conference Secretary to be composed of one (1) minister and one (1) lay person from each District which shall organize and conduct the elections as the Annual Conference shall direct.

19. In the election of nominees to General and Jurisdictional Conference positions, the Conference Committee on Nominations shall nominate to the Annual Conference, and the procedure outlined in Rule 10.a., 10.b. and 10.c. shall be followed.

20. Youth and young adult members of the Annual Conference and their reserves, as provided in the Discipline, shall be elected by the District Council on Ministry from nominations which arise from the District Councils on Youth Ministry, District Coordinators of Adult Ministry and from the local churches within the districts. Their expense shall be borne by the districts electing them.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

A. The Plan of Union

Introduction:

The personal choice of freeing our own and other men's hearts comes to us in many ways during all of life. Seldom does a group of men and women have this opportunity to liberate themselves and countless of their fellows from the collective practice of separatism over three centuries by activating their professed belief of oneness in Christ.

There have been incidents of reconciliation between individuals—and there is glory in that. Even now some of us can turn aside briefly from ourselves and see another in his likeness to us—or in fleeting moments acknowledge in him some Christ-like quality. More often than not we emphasize our differences and only faintly resist the shackles of our history. All too infrequently do we protest the compromises perpetrated within the Church against Jesus' example of brotherhood.

Many vital battles of life have been fought largely outside the Church. We are charged at this juncture in time to lay claim to the victory of a meaningful relationship to God, by saying first of all to ourselves and to all who will follow that we will shore up our relationships with each other. This is great glory—and it is freedom—which comes when a group of people begins to listen, to communicate, to trust, to care, to seek solutions, to achieve, and finally to gain release from fear and prejudice that permits us to love one another.

Organization is necessary for orderliness—and perhaps to satisfy our need for security in rules. However, in implementing this our plan for the creation of a new United Methodist Conference in South Carolina, let us not obscure the loftiest rule of all—and the ultimate security that it holds: "That you love one another as I have loved you."

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

(A) There shall be in South Carolina one annual Conference, to be known as the South Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, to be formed through the union of the two conferences now existing.

(B) Union shall be accomplished and the new conference organized in accordance with the provisions of **The Book of Discipline** of the United Methodist Church, insofar as the same applies, except in such cases made and provided for in this plan, following the steps hereafter provided.

A. CONFERENCE STRUCTURE

1.a. Following the creation of the New South Carolina Annual Conference, elected members of the conference boards, commissions, and committees, shall be on a ratio of the approximate percentage of members of the former conferences for the first two quadrennia. Realizing that lay and ministerial delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences are elected by secret ballot, we call upon the delegates in their election as a matter of conscience, to follow a ratio of the approximate percentage of members of the former conferences. However, nothing herein shall preclude laymen joining a church of the conference after the creation of the new conference or clerical members joining the conference after the creation of the new conference from becoming members of any board, commission or committee so long as the ratio of majority and minority groups is maintained. During this period, in the election of district lay leaders and two associates for each district (who become members of the conference Board of the Laity), at least one of the three shall be elected from each of the former conferences, where possible. This procedure would begin at the time the districts are realigned.

b. The General and Jurisdictional Conferences delegates as elected in 1971 shall be the delegates for the 1972-1976 quadrennium.

2. Until the new annual conference's standing rules are adopted, the Committee on Nominations shall consist of the two Committees on Nominations of the uniting conferences.
3. Being aware of the inherent privilege of each board, commission, and committee to elect its own chairman, and in a sincere effort to be faithful to the spirit of determination to bring into being ONE annual conference of The United Methodist Church in South Carolina; it is, therefore, the will of the conference that each board, commission, and committee shall elect its chairman on the basis of merit without regard to former conference relationships.
- 4.a. The South Carolina Women's Society of Christian Service, being a part of the connectional system of the Columbia Area of the United Methodist Church, shall be guided by the plans of the creation of the new conference established by the annual conference, the district, and the local churches. (**The Book of Discipline**, Pars. 1341-1344)
- b. The Executive Committee of the Women's Societies of Christian Service of the two former conferences shall set up:
 - (a) A Committee on Nominations to prepare a slate of officers for the composition of the new society, with proportionate representation.
 - (b) A Committee on by-Laws and Standing Rules to draw up by-laws and standing rules for the new society; and
 - (c) A Committee on Finance to establish procedures for combining conference and district treasuries, clearing financial practices and policies of the former societies and to provide a clear interpretation of the directives regarding the financial policies as they are received from the Women's Division of the United Methodist Church.
5. In selection of new trustees for the boards, agencies, and institutions of the new conference, the principle of inclusiveness shall be observed.
6. In the new annual conference, the Program Council and other boards, and agencies of the conference having employed staff, shall employ staff members and clerical personnel on an inclusive basis, with the proportions pertaining at the time of the formation of the new conference being observed as a guideline in future employment.
- 7.a. We recommend that the new South Carolina Conference be divided into twelve districts effective at Annual Conference, 1974.
- b. We recommend that all District Superintendents serve the remainder of their present terms of six years on the District as is now constituted and that the Districts be reduced to twelve by attrition.
- c. District boundaries shall be determined according to Par. 390.3 of **The Book of Discipline**. We recommend that the continuing committee provide guidance.
8. The appointment of District Superintendents is the responsibility of the presiding Bishop; however, after 1975 we strongly recommend to the presiding Bishop that the structure of the cabinet be made up of nine (9) members of the former 1785 conference and that three (3) District Superintendents be from the former 1866 conference, with this structure then being maintained for at least the remainder of the eight (8) year period following union.
9. The Program Council shall consist of the presiding Bishop; the district superintendents; two representatives of conference agencies determined by the annual conference, one of whom shall be a member of each of the former conferences; two representatives of the Women's Society of Christian Service, one of whom shall be a member of each of the former conferences; two representatives of the Board of the Laity, one, the Conference Lay Leader and the other, a member of the other conference; one layman from each district; chairman of age-level and family departments; and such additional members as to make the membership of the Council to be in accordance with the proportions pertaining at the time of the creation of the conference.

B. STANDING RULES

1. In the organization of the new conference a Committee on Standing Rules shall present rules of procedure for adoption by the new conference.

2. Until new standing rules are adopted, the new conference shall be guided by **The Book of Discipline** and **Robert's Rules of Order**.
3. For two quadrennia following the creation of the new annual conference the standing rules and resolutions of the new conference shall not include any rules or resolutions that violate the provisions of this Plan of Implementation unless approved by a two-thirds majority of the Annual Conference.

C. FINANCIAL ADJUSTMENTS

1. **Apportionments.** Apportionments shall be made by the conference Commission on World Service and Finance directly to the churches (or charges) after consultation with the district superintendents. These apportionments shall be based on a tri-part formula considering church membership, previous world service giving, and non-capital expenditures by the church or charge.
2. **Minimum Salary.** The minimum salary schedule in the new conference shall be uniform for all members and shall be equal to that previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.
3. **Pensions.** The Annuity rate shall be the same for the members of both former conferences and shall be equal to that previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.
4. **Funding.** The 1970 General Conference reordered its priorities and instructed every board and agency of the church to trim budgets and programs until two million dollars from present giving could be available to fund special programs for minorities. With this precedent to guide us, and recognizing that additional costs will be involved, it is recommended that the World Service and Finance Commission of the newly created conference immediately reorder financial priorities and request all boards, commission, and committees of the conference to trim budgets so that the financial needs of the new conference can be more nearly met as it comes into being. It is further recommended that the World Service and Finance Commissions of the two conferences involved, prior to the creation of the new conference, remind the 1972 General Conference of the amount of financial support promised by the 1968 General Conference in such situations (that is, 100% for the first quadrennium, 80% for the second quadrennium, and so forth). If the General Conference of 1972 is unable to provide the funds authorized by the 1968 General Conference for this purpose from present or anticipated revenues, that the General Conference of 1972 then be petitioned to make some special provision for the funding of those additional costs to the new conference which are beyond the present financial capacity of the conference itself. We pledge our every effort to be financially responsible as we seek to increase giving in the new conference. However, without additional funds being made available from some source—our own resources and those of the General Church—it will not be possible to bring into being a "united" conference in the United Methodist Church in South Carolina that is faithful and just to everyone who will be involved in the life and work of the new South Carolina Conference.
5. **Conference Homes.** The services of all conference homes for children, the aged, and conference claimants shall be available to all persons on an equal basis. Opportunities for employment in homes having employed personnel shall be on an inclusive basis.
6. **Institutional Support.** The institutions supported by the two former conferences shall be undergirded by support from the new conference on a formula to be determined by the new annual conference, which formula shall be applied in like manner to similar institutions.
7. **Insurance.** The program of life insurance and health insurance for the new conference shall be based upon the insurance plan previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.

CONTINUING COMMITTEE

A follow-up Committee on Implementation shall be elected quadrennially for two quadrennia, with representation from the two former annual conferences,

to consider concerns and developments relating to the creation of the new conference which have not been anticipated or provided for in the Plan of Implementation. The Committee on Standing Rules shall determine the number to be elected and the extent of ex-officio representation.

B. The Resolution of Implementation

Whereas, the 1972 General Conference of the United Methodist Church will receive a report from the Structure Study Commission, which has been passed, will have far-reaching effects and change in the Annual Conference Structure; and

Whereas, a seven month period, or until January 1, 1973, following our annual conference in June 1972, will provide time and knowledge in perfecting the organizational structure for the South Carolina Annual Conference; and

Whereas, to conserve the values of program planning and operation of each conference, continuing leadership of boards and agencies of these conferences for a seven month period would provide such continuity; and

Whereas, a nominating committee could have adequate time in recommending leadership to be elected by the South Carolina Annual Conference;

We therefore recommend that the Standing Rules of both conferences be suspended in order:

- (1) That for seven months, or until January 1, 1973, following the uniting conference in June 1972, all boards and agencies will be composed of all members of these same boards and agencies from the two former conferences. The boards and agencies shall be recorded in the current **Minutes**, convened at the uniting conference in June 1972, and organized for the seven month period, or until January 1, 1973. (Officers of such boards and agencies now in office may continue to serve jointly during this seven month period); and
- (2) That a nominating committee shall be elected and organized immediately after the uniting conference, in accordance with the standing rules adopted at the uniting conference, to bring nominations to a special session of the new conference held within the closing months of 1972, to serve for the rest of the quadrennium, beginning January 1, 1973; and
- (3) That all boards and agencies following this session of both conferences, complete their program planning, except where further action is required, and that joint meetings of boards and agencies be held prior to the uniting conference to coordinate plans for the new annual conference, and further, where feasible, it is recommended that joint efforts be made in all planning; and
- (4) That the presiding Bishop is respectfully requested to appoint a continuing Committee on Merger to take office following the session of these conferences.

C. Miscellaneous Standing Resolutions

1. Support of the Ministry

a. The apportionments for the District Superintendent's Fund, the Minister Salary Fund, and the Conference Claimants' Fund shall be distributed to several districts on the basis of an annual fixed percentage of the total funds raised in the several charges during the preceding year, exclusive of funds raised for the following: new buildings and grounds (church and parsonage), remodeling churches and parsonages, payment of debts (principal and interest on church and parsonage building and grounds, special fund (including building and endowment, not operational funds) for Conference agencies and institutions, and funds raised for special missions over and above any apportionment for benevolences.

b. The salaries and other allowances of the several District Superintendents shall be uniform. After consulting with the Bishop and his Cabinet, the Commission on World Service and Finance shall estimate the total amount necessary to furnish a sufficient and equitable support for the District Superintendents

as provided in The Discipline. The Conference Treasurer shall, as far as practical remit monthly to the several District Superintendents the amount due them.

2. World Service and Other Funds

a. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds collected unless otherwise specifically designated. He shall be the custodian of the funds held by the Annual Conference Trustees. (The Trustees shall administer the funds.) He shall be custodian of the Board of Pensions funds. (The Board of Pensions shall administer these funds.) He shall be custodian of the Group Life Insurance and Major Medical Hospital Insurance funds. (The Commission on Insurance shall administer the funds.) These and all funds allocated to the various boards, commissions and committees by the Commission on World Service and Finance shall be credited by the Conference Treasurer in separate accounts to the boards, commissions and committees. Disbursement of these funds shall be made by the Conference Treasurer upon order by voucher drawn by the secretary of the board, commission or committee. All boards, commissions, or committees drawing money in block amounts shall make itemized statements of these expenditures to the Conference Treasurer as supporting evidence for his records.

b. There shall be an Administrator of Ministerial Affairs for the Conference who shall work under the supervision of the participating Boards and Agencies through a Special Executive Committee composed of the Chairman and one other representative of each participating Board or Agency.

c. Boards, commissions and committees of the Conference receiving appropriations shall make an annual report to the Annual Conference, giving an itemized statement of all credits, disbursements, and funds credited still on hand.

d. All funds not specifically directed shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

e. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall authorize payments from the Administrative Reserve Fund to pay the operating expenses for the seven month period, June—December 1972, for newly formed Boards, Commissions and Committees established by the Annual Conference as per the following schedule:

- (1) One to five members at \$35 per member
- (2) The next five members at \$30 per member
- (3) The next five members at \$25 per member
- (4) The next five members at \$20 per member
- (5) All above 20 members at \$15 per member.

Amounts in excess of the above schedule shall require prior approval of the Commission on World Service and Finance. Continuing support beyond this seven month period shall be by the usual procedure. It is recommended that, wherever feasible, established Boards, Commissions and Committees be assigned new duties rather than establishing additional structure.

f. The expenses of the Committee on Nominations shall be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

Conference Insurance

a. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall include in the askings for the Conference work a sum annually to be applied on the Conference Group Life Insurance premiums sufficient to cover the total premiums for the group life insurance of all retired members of the Conference.

b. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall include in the askings annually a sum sufficient to pay approximately one-half of the premiums for the Conference Major Medical Insurance and for its administration. These funds shall be administered by the Commission on Group Life and Hospital Insurance. The Commission shall furnish an annual report to the Conference on all disbursements of these funds.

3. Reporting the Total Support of the Ministers

a. All amounts paid to or on behalf of the minister (including District Superintendents and ministers serving special appointments) to provide funds for payment of all or part of his Social Security obligation shall be reported as salary.

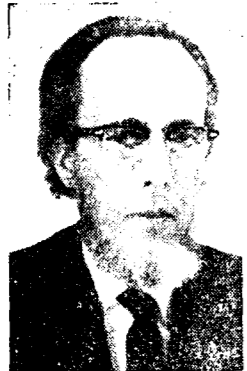
