The Conference Secretary then nominated as Assistant Secretaries Dr. Bryan Crenshaw, Rev. W. C. Reid, and Rev. Raymond Gibson. They were elected.

Election of Conference Secretary—Bishop Tullis opened the floor for nominations for Conference Secretary. The nominees were: 1. nominated by Ernest Heape was Rev. Ted Morton; 2. nominated was Washington Kearns by Willie Dicks. Mr. Morton was elected.

Election of Chancellor—Bishop Tullis expressed words of gratitude and requested that the Conference Secretary send a letter of such gratitude to Mr. M. L. Meadows, who had served long and faithfully as the Conference Chancellor and legal counsel who has had to close his law practice because of ill health. The suggestion of Bishop Tullis was adopted.

Motion—Mr. Spencer Robinson moved that the present Bishop employ whatever legal help was needed until such time as a new Bishop could nominate his own Chancellor with a confirming vote to be made at the next Annual Conference. The Spencer Robinson Motion was adopted.

Courtesies—The Rev. C. D. Williams spoke for Bethel United Methodist Church, host congregation, in the absence of Dr. C. M. Graves, their minister. He introduced the following persons: 1. Dr. Joe Lesesne, President, Wofford College, who spoke words of greeting; 2. the Rev. Ted Walter, who brought greetings to the Conference from the Spartanburg District; 3. The Rev. Chad Davis, who spoke about the formation of the Community Korean Church in Columbia, later formed as a United Methodist Church. The leaders of this congregation were presented to the Conference and one of them spoke words of appreciation for the help from the Conference. Bishop Tullis then introduced Cyrus B. Dawsey and his wife to the Conference as transfers from the Florida Annual Conference after serving for years in Brazil. Cyrus B. Dawsey brought greetings from friends in the land of Brazil. Bishop Tullis also mentioned the transfer of Dick Gibson from the North Carolina Conference to become a member of the staff of St. John's Church in Rock Hill. W. R. Kinnett, Superintendent of the Marion District, asked that greetings be sent to the Rev. Deborah Quilling and her husband, the Rev. Richard Allen, on the birth of their first child. Bishop Tullis brought words of greetings from the Ned Long who are serving as missionaries to Argentina. Bishop Tullis then introduced Dr. J. Peters of the Western North Carolina Conference, a Vice President of the Methodist Publishing House, who spoke briefly and presented Miss Cynthia Littlejohn, Manager of Cokesbury Bookstore, Columbia, South Carolina, who presented a check for \$16,518 for the pension program. Bishop Tullis expressed words of gratitude.

Announcements—The Rev. Ted Morton made announcements.

Closing—The closing prayer was made by the Rev. Ron Pettit.

Second day—Monday Afternoon
June 2, 1980

Opening—Bruce Sayre led the Conference in worship during which they sang the hymn, "Come, Thou Almighty King."

Courtesies—The Rev. C. D. Williams presented Mayor Frank Allen, a member of St. Paul United Methodist Church in Spartanburg, who brought words of welcome to the Conference. Rev. C. D. Williams then introduced Mr. Emmett Walsh, Chairman of the Administrative Board of Bethel United Methodist Church, our host church, who brought words of welcome from Bethel.

Recognition of SIP Workers—The SIP (Summer Investment Program) workers were introduced by the Rev. Bill Brown, who spoke briefly on the nature of the program. Bishop Tullis then sent the group out with a prayer of blessing.

Resolutions—The Rev. Cyril Hamm presented those resolutions to be referred to the Resolutions Committee. The resolutions were referred.

The McKay Brabham Resolution regarding a request to the Governor of Georgia for the commutation of a death sentence was referred.

The Joe Tysinger Resolution regarding the J. P. Stevens Boycott was referred.

The Arcadia United Methodist Church Resolution regarding the J. P. Stevens Boycott was referred.

The James H. Nates Motion to establish the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry was referred.

The Susan Henry-Crowe Resolution calling for a study of the J. P. Stevens issue was referred.

The Leon Wagnon Resolution on "Special Offerings" and church meetings was referred.

The Simpsonville Resolution regarding the J. P. Stevens Boycott was referred.

The Washington Street Church Resolution on the hostages in Iran was referred.

Personal Privilege—The Rev. Joe Nicholson requested that greetings be sent to Mr. Joe Parker, an active member of Bethel Park United Methodist Church in Denmark and a member of the Annual Conference for the last twenty years, who is ill and could not be present this year. The Conference voted that these greetings be sent.

Bishop Tullis then suggested that greetings also be sent to Dr. C. C. Norton who had been a member of this Annual Conference for fifty years, and who is unable to attend for the first time in many years.

Order of the Day—A motion was made that an "Order of the Day" be set for Wednesday for the report of the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals. It was adopted. Bishop Tullis then asked that the Rev. Ted H. Walter, Chairman of an Ad Hoc Committee set up by Bishop Tullis to confer with officials of the J. P. Stevens Company, be allowed to meet with the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals to bring to them what information had been derived from these consultations with J. P. Stevens. There were no objections from the Conference to Bishop Tullis' suggestion.

Motion—James Cheek moved a resolution be referred to the Board of Education and to the Council on Finance and Administration relative to the hiring of a Black educational director for the Conference. The motion was referred.

Point of Order—Dr. George Whitaker moved the suspension of Rule 96E in the Standing Rules to allow the continued service of Dr. Bryan Crenshaw and the Rev. Bill Reid as Assistant Secretaries. It was adopted.

Motion—Dr. George Whitaker then moved that those elected as Assistant Conference Secretaries be allowed to serve for one year and that an election be held at the next Annual Conference to fill that roll for the balance of the quadrennium. The motion was adopted.

Report of the Judicial Council—Ted Morton, Conference Secretary, reported on the Judicial Council decision No. 476 in reference to the question raised by the South Carolina Annual Conference. The Council's ruling stated that Standing Rules may contain quotations or citations from the DISCIPLINE, but that an Annual Conference does not have power to vote approval or disapproval of General Conference actions.

Standing Rules—Douglas Bowling, Chairman, presented Hawley Lynn, Secretary, who presented the report of the Committee on Standing Rules. (See Reports, Section VIII.)

Following the report the following questions were raised:

Rule 31 and Rule 41—W. W. McNeill called attention to the fact that Standing Rules 31 and 41 were in conflict with recent General Conference legislation. This was referred.

Rule 70—Rule 70 was ruled out of order by Bishop Tullis and was stricken.

Rule 31—James Nates called attention to a motion before the Conference having to do with a new Board on Higher Education and recommended that if this is passed representatives of this body be appointed to the Council on Ministries. This was ruled a mute question to be dealt with depending upon Conference action on the new committee.

Rule 31A—Mickey Fisher called attention that the General Conference had made the Conference Lay Leader a member of the Conference Council on Ministries. This was accepted by the committee.

Rule 31—Willie Dicks moved to include two representatives from Black Methodists for Church Renewal to serve on the Council on Ministries. This was referred.

Rule 45—Washington Kearns raised a question related to Rule 45.

Rule 65—Ted Walters called attention to the fact that the District Superintendents appoint two members of the Committee on District Superintendency (Para. 718). This was referred.

Doug Bowling moved that the report be adopted except at points where questions have been raised, with these questions to be reported back later. This motion was approved.

Report of the Committee on Nominations—Edward Jenkins, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations, was presented for the report, and spoke generally on the procedure and work of this committee. Mrs. Henrietta R. Morton, Secretary, presented the report. Mrs. Morton made certain substitutions and corrections of the spelling. Mrs. Morton called attention to the nominations for the Committee on Episcopacy had been reserved for appointment by the new Bishop.

The report of the Committee on Nominations was received as information for future action by the Conference.

Episcopal Nominations—

Committee on Investigation—Bishop Tullis called attention to the Committee on Investigation and said that these had been elected in the morning session. Since the entire Conference had not heard these nominations, he read the nominations to the Conference.

Board of Ordained Ministry—Bishop Tullis made nominations for the Board of the Ordained Ministry—1980 (see listing in Section II). These were elected.

Offering for Jenkins Orphanage—An offering was taken for the benefit of Jenkins Orphanage. The offering totaled \$1,044.84.

Personal Privilege—Dr. Spencer Rice, Head of the General and Jurisdictional Conference delegation, placed before the Conference the name of the Rev. C. J. Lupo, Jr. in nomination for the Episcopacy and spoke briefly to the nomination. James Cheek, layman from Liberty Hill United Methodist Church, spoke on the needs of the Black Methodists in South Carolina. The nomination in favor of C. J. Lupo as an Episcopacy candidate was unanimous.

Motion—The Rev. Marvin Lare moved that the delegates of the South Carolina Jurisdictional Conference be asked to work for the election of a Black bishop and that the idea that one black bishop in the Southeastern Jurisdiction was adequate be put to rest. The motion was adopted.

Board of Diaconal Ministry—Mr. Charles A. Hutchins, Chairman of the Board of Diaconal Ministries, was presented for the report. (See listing in Section II of the JOURNAL.)

Report of the Council on Finance and Administration—Harry Mays, Chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration, was presented for the report. He called attention to the amended report, which contains changes necessitated by the action of the General Conference. James C. Adams, Secretary, was presented for the report. He called attention to the differences between the report as originally presented and the amended report. The report was given for information and questions in this session, and will be acted on officially later in the Conference.

Report No. 1—The number of special days are reduced.

Report No. 2—determined by total net funds.

Report No. 3—deals with District Superintendents, their salary, expenses, etc.

Report No. 4—the figures were amended in Item F (3) and Item G.

Report No. 5—Item 5—Mileage increased to 20c per mile and meals allowance was changed. Attention was called to Item 11 regarding the episcopal residence.

Report No. 5—Item B—NOMINATION—Mr. Thad W. Herbert was nominated as the Conference Treasurer Statistician. He was elected.

Report No. 7—This report has to do with the sale by the Trustees of THE ADVOCATE property known as 1420 Lady Street.

The floor was open for questions. Questions were asked regarding the following items:

Report No. 1B—Questions were asked regarding special offerings in Church School on first Sunday.

Privilege of the Floor—McKay Brabham moved the privilege of the floor for Mrs. Maryneal Jones, editor of THE ADVOCATE, to speak. This was granted. Mrs. Jones spoke to the Conference regarding the line item on the South Carolina Methodist ADVOCATE in Report No. 2.

Motion—McKay Brabham made the following motion: "I move that one and one-half percent of the total net funds be included as a line item for the South Carolina Methodist ADVOCATE for 1981 in Report No. 2." This was referred to the Council on Finance and Administration.

Questions were raised by Mr. Rowell regarding items in Report No. 4, Item 3.

Additional questions were raised concerning increase in World Service, new line item in church extension; questions regarding the recapitulation in Report No. 5, and respecting Conference properties. Questions were raised regarding Report No. 7, Recommendation One, Para. d. All of the questions were referred to the Council on Finance and Administration.

Following announcements by the Conference Secretary, the benediction was pronounced by Judge Richard E. Fields, Jr.

Second day—Monday Evening June 2, 1980

Opening—The Conference was called to order by Bishop Tullis and sang the hymn "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing."

Board of Education Presentation—Dr. James Nates, Chairman of the Board of Education, presented the report. He introduced the following persons who spoke on behalf of their respective committees:

No. 1—Camps and Conferences—The Rev. Bob Stillwell;

No. 2—Curriculum Committee—No official report. Rev. Nates mentioned the work of this committee in recent days.

No. 3—Higher Education and Campus Ministry—The Rev. Marion Crooks.

Dr. Nates' report was then ordered to record.

Mr. Crooks' report was ordered to record.

Nominations—The Rev. Marion Crooks presented the nominations for the Board of Directors of the following Wesley Foundations (See Board of Education Report in Section VIII for names):

No. 3—The Orangeburg Wesley Foundation. Words of gratitude were spoken for the work of Dr. Matt McCollum, recently deceased, and the newly elected director, Larry McCutcheon, was introduced. The Chairman of the Orangeburg Board, Mr. M. E. McCutcheon, was introduced.

No. 4—The University of South Carolina. The Rev. George Duffie, Director; Chairman of the University of South Carolina Board, the Rev. Milton McGuirt, was introduced.

No. 5—Winthrop College. The Rev. Risher Brabham, Director; Chairman of the Winthrop Board, the Rev. Herb Franklin, was introduced.

Part-time workers on other campuses across the state were asked to stand in place in the Conference. A round of applause as gratitude was expressed.

Dr. James Nates then introduced four college presidents who spoke to the Conference: Dr. Hubert Manning, Clafin College; Dr. Ralph Mirse, Columbia College; Dr. George Fields, Spartanburg Methodist College, and Dr. Joe Lesesne, Jr., Wofford College.

Bishop Tullis then asked the Conference to stand and sing one verse of "My Hope is Built on Nothing Less" after which he introduced and called to the platform Bishop Edward Carroll of the Boston area. Bishop Tullis then spoke briefly on higher education and introduced Dr. Donald J. Welsh, a member of the Conference, and newly elected president of Scarritt College. Bishop Tullis then introduced the guest speaker of the evening, Dr. James S. Barrett, Associate General Secretary of the Division of Higher Education of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry. Dr. Barrett spoke to the Conference.

Bishop Edwin Carroll pronounced the benediction.

**Third day—Tuesday Morning
June 3, 1980**

Observance of Holy Communion—The Sacrament of Holy Communion was observed in Leonard Auditorium. The Liturgist was Robert Hall; The Preacher was E. H. McDowell, Jr.; the Diaconal Minister was Olene Civils; and the Lay Reader was Barry Cannon.

Opening—Devotions were led by Bruce Sayre. Announcements were made by the Secretary. Bishop Tullis called the Conference to order and welcomed Bishop Edward G. Carroll of the Boston Area. Bishop Carroll took the chair.

Order of the Day—Report of the Cabinet to Annual Conference—The report of the Cabinet was made by Bishop Tullis and dealt with the general state of the Church. (See Report, Section VIII of the JOURNAL.)

Committee on Courtesies and Introductions—C. D. Williams presented Mrs. Edward Tullis and Mrs. E. G. Carroll to the Conference. These persons received a standing ovation. Mrs. Tullis spoke to the Conference and Mrs. Carroll brought greetings.

Motion—George Washington Kearns moved that the report of the Cabinet be adopted, that this report be printed in the ADVOCATE, and that the appreciation of the Conference to the Cabinet be expressed by a standing ovation. This motion was adopted.

Personal Privilege—James Medley spoke to the Conference on a point of personal privilege praising the leadership of Bishop Tullis.

Motion—G. W. Kearns moved that the James Medley remarks be placed in the record. This was adopted. (See Section VIII for the text of these remarks.)

Motion—Diane Patterson made the following motion: "I move that the South Carolina Conference endorse the ethnic minority priority as the priority for the South Carolina Conference for the 1981-1984 quadrennium." The motion was passed.

Motion—James Cheek made a motion requesting the formation of a Conference Committee to implement the ethnic minority priority. The motion was referred to the Committee on Structure.

Motion to Suspend Rules—Spencer Robinson moved to suspend the rules for the purpose of limiting speeches and debate. A standing vote was called for, and the motion to suspend the rules failed.

Report of the Conference Lay Leader—Bishop Tullis praised Harry R. Kent, Lay Leader of the South Carolina Conference, who retires this year after serving ten years in this position. Mr. Kent addressed the Conference and received a standing ovation.

Personal Privilege—Chad Davis spoke to the Conference on contributions made by Harry Kent and presented a resolution of appreciation and a gift of a Bible. The Conference adopted the resolution.

Personal Privilege—Omega Newman spoke his appreciation of Harry Kent in his work of merger and church extension.

Report No. 5, Board on the Laity—Harry Kent moved the election of Dan Winchester as Conference Lay Leader. He was elected. Mr. Kent also moved that duly nominated district Lay Leaders be elected. They were elected.

Report of Special Committee on Special Days—Mrs. Miriam Alewine, Chairman, presented John Redmond, Vice-chairman, for the report. (See Section VIII for text of the report.) The report was referred to the Council on Finance and Administration.

Report of the Commission on Insurance—The Rev. Archie Bigelow, Chairman, presented the report. He called attention to Report No. 6, Para. 2, "The Insuring of Diaconal Ministers" and Report No. 9, Section 1, "The Requested Appropriation from C F & A." He then called attention to Report No. 10 with changes that had been made. The report as amended was then adopted. The report as a whole was adopted.

Personal Privilege—The Rev. Jim Gadsden moved that greetings of love and concern be sent to the Rev. Larry Gregory of the Greenwood District who was hospitalized at the University Hospital in Augusta, GA. as a result of an automobile accident. The motion was adopted.

Courtesies and Introductions—The Rev. C. D. Williams introduced to the Conference the Secretaries of the Bishop and the respective District Superintendents.

Motion—Carolyn Harrell, lay member from St. Paul United Methodist Church, Florence, moved that a love offering for the Rev. Larry Gregory be received at the Ordination service. The motion was adopted.

Board of Pensions Report—Dr. John W. Robison, chairman, introduced Dr. Fritz Beazley who presented the report. Explanations were made relative to Report No. 1, Para. A. Report No. 1 was then adopted. Report No. 2 was ordered to record. Report No. 3 was ordered to record. Report No. 4, beginning with Question 48, Para. 1706.3b in the Discipline was discussed. The list of those relative to this question was read. Report No. 4, Question 48 was adopted. Report No. 4, Question 60, "What other personal notation should be made?" was presented. At this point the Rev. George Duffie, Registrar of the Conference Board of the Ministry, moved amendments to the Report by additions made by the Board of Ministry. The additions were accepted. Report No. 4 of the Board of Pensions was adopted as amended. The report of the Board of Pensions as a whole was then adopted.

Special Report—Board of Pensions—Dr. John W. Robison, Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions spoke of plans of Pensions Crusade. He announced that Dr. Mike Watson had been named as chairman of the campaign. Dr. Watson was presented and spoke to the Conference, tracing the history of South Carolina Pensions.

Ernest Heape of the office of Ministerial Affairs, spoke to the Conference. He called attention to "A Charge to Keep" pamphlet. He said that the ministers will be asked to participate significantly in personal giving to the campaign and will be asked to accept one-tenth as their goal. Ministers making under \$13,000 per year will be asked to contribute 8% of their salary for 1981, distributed over a period of four years, those making over \$13,000 will be asked to contribute 9% during the same period.

A film was presented.

Recognition of Retired Ministers—Bishop Tullis recognized the ministers who are retiring this year and called them to the platform. In tribute to these men, Mrs. Ron Russell, daughter of retiring minister Max Christopher, sang a medley of religious songs.

Adlai Holler welcomed the retirees to their new relationship. Bishop Tullis presented certificates to each and greeted them individually. Nineteen men retired with a total of 691.5 service years. (See Section VI, Questions 45, 46 and 47 for the names of those retiring.)

Presentation of Chaplains—Bishop Tullis called all chaplains present to the stage and spoke to the Conference of their work. They were presented by C. D. Williams and each chaplain on active duty gave his name and place of service.

Announcements—The Secretary made announcements and called attention to a telegram received from Bishop Harmon. The Secretary will respond to Bishop Harmon's greetings.

Motion—Lewis Sherard moved that the Conference send a message of sympathy and love to the Don Foster family in the death of their son. This was passed.

Benediction—The Benediction was given by Chaplain Jack Haney.

**Third day—Tuesday Afternoon
June 3, 1980**

Opening—Worship was led by Bruce Sayre.

Committee on Episcopacy—Joel Cannon, chairman of the Conference Committee on Episcopacy, made the report. He announced the following dates: August 6, a farewell dinner for Bishop and Mrs. Tullis to be held at Columbia College; October 5, a welcoming service or worship and reception for the newly appointed Bishop to be held at Shander Church, Columbia. Mrs. Tullis was escorted to the platform.

Resolution—A resolution of appreciation for Bishop and Mrs. Tullis was read. The Resolution was adopted by standing unanimous vote of the Conference.

Report of Committee on Episcopacy was Adopted as a Whole.

United Methodist Women—Mrs. Lois Burkhalter, President, presented the report. The report was moved to record.

It was announced that Mrs. Lois Burkhalter had been elected as secretary of the Southeastern Core Group of the United Methodist Women.

United Methodist Men—Mr. Bill Smith, President, presented the report, and the report was moved to record.

Courtesies—Rev. C. D. Williams presented Dr. John Carr, who spoke briefly bringing greetings from the Candler School of Theology, Emory University.

Mr. Williams then presented the Rev. William Felder, Chaplain of the Methodist Home in Orangeburg, who presented residents of the Home who were in attendance at the Conference.

Mr. Williams then presented the Rev. James Gadsden, Greenwood District Superintendent, who then presented to the Conference Ms. Barbara Boultinghouse, Director of Boylan-Haven-Mather Academy in Camden, who paid tribute to and introduced the Rev. Granville Hicks of the Board of Directors. Mr. Hicks was presented a plaque of appreciation for his service to the school.

Mr. Williams then introduced the Rev. Morris Thompson, new-appointed Director of Development for the Red Bird Missionary Conference, who spoke briefly of his role with that Conference which would begin immediately following this Annual Conference.

The Rev. Hilton Johnson was then presented and named those persons who have been present from various denominations as representatives of Christian unity.

Motion—C. D. Williams moved that the South Carolina Annual Conference send greetings to the General Synod of the Presbyterian Church, U.S., now meeting in Myrtle Beach, SC. This was approved.

Report of the Council on Ministries—Judge Richard Fields, Chairman, was presented for the report. Judge Fields spoke of his appreciation to the Council on Ministries and stated that he was completing eight years of service as chairman. He presented Mickey Fisher, Conference Director.

Mr. Fisher presented Bishop Tullis who in turn gave a plaque to Judge Fields in recognition for his service as chairman of the Council on Ministries for the last two quadrennium. Judge Fields was given a standing ovation by the Conference.

Director's Report, Conference Council on Ministries—Mickey Fisher, Conference Director of Council on Ministries, expressed his appreciation to the staff for their assistance during the period of re-organization study. He introduced staff members and identified their roles in the proposed new structure.

General Announcements—Mr. Fisher announced that the Conference calendar would not be printed this year but that a planning calendar related to activities of the South Carolina Annual Conference would be sent in August. Organizational meetings of new committees, commissions, and boards need to be arranged.

Motion—Mr. Fisher moved a suspension of the standing rules for the purpose of changing dates of organizational procedure for Conference boards, commissions, etc. The rules were suspended.

Motion—Mr. Fisher moved that the organizational date for Conference boards, commissions, committees, etc., be set for July 26. This motion was passed.

Background on Objectives and Goals—Mr. Fisher said that he had taken seriously the mandate of service to the local church as a priority. He had found a hard working staff but found difficulty in using the organizational model for the delivery of services needed in local churches. This led to the new structure proposals.

Structure Model—The new structure model was explained by Mr. Fisher. He spoke of the rationale and procedure of the proposed staff reduction in the light of reorganization. Mr. Fisher then dealt with budget matters. He amended the report changing the figure in the first line (Administration 1980) from \$75,754 to \$74,764.

Motion—Mr. Fisher moved adoption of Report No. 1, Report No. 2, Report No. 3, Report No. 4 of the Council on Ministries.

James Cheek spoke against the motion. Bishop Tullis called attention to the limitation to the time in debate. Tony Gavalas asked a question regarding the transmission of information to the districts from the program council. W. Bill Perkins spoke against the Council on Ministries report.

Motion for Previous Question—Mr. Charles Appleby, Central Church, Spartanburg, moved that the previous question be called. The motion passed.

Action on Reports No. 1, 2, 3, 4 of the Council on Ministries—The Conference passed these reports by a standing vote.

Report of the South Carolina Methodist Advocate Board of Trustees—Mr. James Johnson, Chairman, presented the report. Reports 1 and 2 were ordered to record. The Rev. Wiley Cooper presented Report No. 3, p. 147, with a correction in Item 3 to read one and one-half percent rather than two percent as printed in the Pre-Conference Journal. The Reverend Harry Mays of CF&A spoke to the Report.

Substitute Motion—The Rev. Harvey Floyd moved a substitute motion for Item 3 under Report No. 3 to read as follows: "The Trustees recommended that each local church adopt one of the plans outlined in Report No. 2."

During the discussion Harvey Floyd accepted an addition to his motion which would read "with the exception of the two percent plan." The Floyd Substitute Motion was lost.

Amendment—The Rev. W. R. Kinnett moved that Report No. 3, Item 4, be changed to read that "the Trustees recommend that a local church accept one of the following methods of financing the ADVOCATE in their local church: the line item; the All-Family Plan; the Church Leader Plan; or the individual subscription plan." The Kinnett Substitute was adopted.

Report No. 3 was then adopted as it had been amended.

Report for Information—Jimmy Johnson made a report to the Conference regarding the vote of the ADVOCATE Trustees to sell the 1420 Lady Street property. He stated the major components of the building are in a state of deterioration, and it was felt the sale of the property was wise at this time.

Announcements were made by the Secretary.

Introduction—Dr. Thomas Langford, Dean, Duke Divinity School, was introduced.

Closing—B. J. Cooper closed the session with prayer.

**Third day—Tuesday Evening
June 3, 1980**

Consecration Service for Diaconal Ministers, Deacons, and Elders—The Consecration Service for Diaconal Ministers, Deacons, and Elders was held in the Spartanburg Memorial Auditorium with Bishop Edward L. Tullis presiding. The assisting elders were the Rev. Peden Gene Curry and the Rev. George Watson. The Preacher for the evening was Bishop Edward G. Carroll, Resident Bishop of the Boston Area.

**Fourth day—Wednesday Morning
June 4, 1980**

Service of Holy Communion—The service of Holy Communion was observed in Leonard Auditorium on the Wofford College campus. The Liturgist was the Rev. Robert A. Hall; the Preacher, the Rev. James Rush; Diaconal Minister, Mrs. Carol Watson; the Lay Reader, Mr. Anderson Cooper.

Devotional—The morning devotional was conducted by Bruce Sayre.

Committee on Introductions and Courtesies—C. D. Williams presented George W. Watson, District Superintendent of Florence District. Mr. Watson informed the Conference of the death of Mrs. Laurie W. Smith, wife of the Rev. Lowry Smith. Bishop Tullis led the Conference in a period of silence and memorial prayer and the Secretary was instructed to communicate the sympathy of the Conference to the Rev. Mr. Smith.

Resolutions and Appeals—Gene Couch, chairman of the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals, was presented for the report. The resolutions and actions were as follows:
Wagnon Resolution I—having to do with special days. The Committee recommended non-concurrence. Non-concurrence was approved.

Wagnon Resolution II—having to do with travel and planning for meetings. The Committee recommended non-concurrence. Non-concurrence was approved.

Brabham Resolution—having to do with commuting the death sentence of Mr. J. Howard Cox of Georgia. The Committee recommended concurrence. Discussion followed. The recommendation for concurrence was defeated. The Conference voted non-concurrence and thus the Brabham Resolution was defeated by a vote of 467 to 353.

Edwards Resolution—having to do with opposition to the Equal Rights Amendment. The Committee recommended non-concurrence. Non-concurrence was supported and the Edwards Resolution was defeated.

Wicker Resolution—having to do with the keeping of church records. The Committee recommended non-concurrence. The Committee recommendation was defeated and the Wicker Resolution was adopted. The Resolution: "That our Church emphasize the keeping of good local records and that records of all older churches be gathered up, micro-filmed, and preserved for posterity."

Check Resolution—The Committee recommended non-concurrence. The Committee was supported and the Check Resolution was defeated.

Substitute Resolution—presented by the Committee on Resolutions, regarding the J. P. Stevens issue. Gene Couch, chairman, stated that the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals had received numerous resolutions having to do with the General Conference action regarding boycott of J. P. Stevens Company. The Committee on Resolutions and Appeals therefore wrote and offered a substitute resolution as follows:

Whereas The South Carolina Annual Conference has always exemplified itself in dealing with sensitive issues that affect the welfare of its constituents, proving herself fair and providing an atmosphere where faithful dialogue and response have been constructive and true to our heritage and;

Whereas: We are confident that our South Carolina Annual Conference will continue to seek the Truth which will affirm the worth, dignity and integrity of human life and;

Whereas: We humbly ask to be led by the Holy Spirit and that by prayer and study we may indeed know the Truth and;

Whereas: We affirm our historic Social Principles in regards to the rights, duties, privileges and responsibility of labor-management relations and;

Whereas: Certain action of the 1980 General Conference urging support of the boycott against the products of J. P. Stevens is grievous to many thoughtful people of South Carolina Methodism and is evidently viewed from a different perspective by a vast majority of the Methodists of South Carolina, but not from a perspective outside that of the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ and;

Whereas: Certain information and data so gathered and presented at General Conference raises some honest questions and doubts.

Therefore be it Resolved that:

1. That the South Carolina Annual Conference, in session June 1-4, 1980, at Wofford College, South Carolina, acknowledge receipt of the above mentioned Resolution of the 1980 General Conference of the United Methodist Church and respectfully decline to accept its guidance as conscience-binding, especially as it relates to the boycott of goods produced by J. P. Stevens and;
2. That we do accept as conscience-binding our responsibility to pursue the Truth to the end, that Bishop Tullis appoint a Task Force to continue to investigate and document as much information as humanly possible as it relates to this subject and;
3. That this data be passed on to the General Board of Church and Society by September 15, 1980, and;
4. That this Task Force be responsible to the South Carolina Annual Conference.

Reese Substitute on J. P. Stevens—Fred Reese offered a substitute for the Committee Resolution. The Reese Substitute called for a study of both The General Conference action and current labor management problems, with a report to be made to the 1981 Annual Conference Session.

Discussion followed.

Motion on Previous Question—Bundy Bynum called the previous question. The question was called. The Reese Substitute and the Committee Resolution were read.

Reese Substitute—was voted by standing vote and was defeated.

Committee on Resolutions and Appeals Substitute on J. P. Stevens Resolution—was then passed.

Motion—Gene Marchbanks moved: "the Conference acknowledge the hard work of this Committee on the J. P. Stevens Resolution." The motion passed.

Committee on Implementation—Dr. Omega Newman, chairman, presented the report. The report was adopted.

Committee on Structure—The Rev. James Hood, chairman, presented the report. Section I was adopted. Section II, Item 1 was presented. Discussion followed.

Substitute Motion—Charles Johnson moved a substitute for Section II, Item 1.

Amendment to the Substitute—The Rev. W. R. Kinnett moved an amendment to the substitute to change the number "12 persons" to "12 from ethnic groups" and "4 from the majority church." The amendment was accepted by Charles Johnson.

Question—The Rev. Omega Newman moved the previous question. The question was called.

The Johnson Substitute was adopted. The Johnson Substitute then became the main motion and was adopted. It then became known as Section II, Item 1. The Section as perfected reads:

We recommend the CCoM Ethnic Minority Local Church Committee become an Annual Conference Committee and that it be given the responsibility for coordination and implementation of the '81-'84 mission priority developing and strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church:

- a) Twelve members shall be from ethnic groups and four members shall be from the majority church;
- b) Funds appropriated for the CCoM EMLC Committee will be redirected for the Annual Conference EMLC Committee;
- c) The Annual Conference EMLC Committee shall designate one of its members as a representative of the CCoM;
- d) The Committee shall provide liaison linkage with the GCoM EMLC Coordinating Committee.

The Committee on Structure then presented a resolution asking for the establishment of a Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. The resolution was adopted.

Suspension—The Rev. James Hood moved the suspension of Rule 101B. The suspension was adopted.

Motion—The Structure Committee moved a resolution that they be instructed to put the changes adopted during this last day of Annual Conference into the Standing Rules. The motion was adopted. The Report as a whole was then adopted.

Methodist Foundation—Dr. Harry Chandler, the Executive Director, presented the report and introduced Mr. Marshall Shearouse, Chairman of the Board, who spoke briefly to the Annual Conference.

Recess—The Conference recessed for fifteen minutes.

Call to Order—Bishop Tullis called the Conference to order following the recess.

Motion—Chad Davis made the following motion: "I move that \$2,000 be placed in the Annual Conference budget to fund the work of the Annual Conference to study the J. P. Stevens matter." This motion was passed.

Motion—Chad Davis made the following motion: "I move that \$2,000 be placed in the Annual Conference budget to fund the work of the new Board on Higher Education and Campus Ministry." The motion was passed.

Report of the Committee on Standing Rules—Doug Bowling, Chairman of the Committee on Standing Rules, made the report.

Rule 19—Delete the following from Rule 19: "and one (1) ex-officio member, without vote, who shall be the Executive Secretary for University and Adult ministries of the National Division of the Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church." This was approved.

Rule 31—In Rule 31 change "Ecumenical and Interreligious concerns" to read "Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns." This was approved.

Rule 31—Add a phrase to read: "two (2) representatives of the Conference United Methodist Men." This phrase would follow the phrase that now reads: "two representatives of the Conference Youth organization." This was approved.

Rule 31—Add a phrase to read: "two (2) representatives of the Black Methodist for Church Renewal." Mr. Bowling moved non-concurrence and non-concurrence was sustained; therefore, this representation is not added.

Rule 31a—After the words "the Director of Conference Council on Ministries (with serves without vote)" add the phrase "the Conference Lay Leader." This was adopted.

Rule 41—Change the words "Commission on Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns" to read "Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, which is required by the DISCIPLINE is printed to establish the connection between this commission and the appropriate church agency." He also moved that this Rule be printed in italics. This was adopted.

Rule 65—After the phrase "shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations" add the words "and the District Superintendents." This was adopted.

Motion to Adopt Standing Rules Report as Amended—Doug Bowling, Chairman, moved the adoption of the Standing Rules as amended.

Medley Motion on Rule 45—James Medley moved to amend Rule 45 as follows: "Amend Rule 45 to read: The Commission on Religion and Race shall be composed of fifteen (15) persons. Eight members shall be persons from ethnic minorities, three (3) of whom shall be clergy persons and five (5) shall be lay persons. Seven (7) members shall be persons of the majority membership, three (3) of whom shall be clergy persons and four (4) of whom shall be lay persons." This was accepted by the Committee and approved by the Conference.

The Report of the Committee on Standing Rules as amended was adopted as a whole.

Personal Privilege—Mrs. Pal Moore, First Church, Cheraw, moved that greetings be sent to Dr. and Mrs. Pierce Cook. This was adopted.

Commission on Equitable Salary—John Baxter, Chairman, made the report. He called attention to the changes and new items.

Amendment—The Rev. Craig Bigelow of the Marlboro Circuit moved an amendment that the salary schedule printed on Report No. 2, Item A, remain at the level recommended by the 1979 Annual Conference session. After discussion, the Craig Bigelow Amendment lost.

Amendment—The Rev. Joe Sowell moved that Item 1a, Report No. 2, the figure 7% increase be changed to 18% increase. After discussion, the Joe Sowell amendment was lost.

Motion—The Rev. David Templeton of Galloway Memorial Church, Greenwood moved the deletion of Section g under Report No. 2. After discussion, the David Templeton Motion was defeated.

The Commission on Equitable Salary then recommended the addition of Section n to their Recommendations, related to the payments for continuing education.

Amendment—The Rev. Craig Bigelow moved the addition of Section n to the Recommendations setting a maximum total compensation for ministers at \$35,000.

Point of Order—The Rev. Bundy Bynum called a point of order in which he said the DISCIPLINE gives the Charge Conference the right to set the salary in local churches. Bishop Tullis sustained Bynum's point of order and Bishop Tullis ruled the Bigelow Amendment out of order.

Amendment—The Rev. Harry Stullenbarger moved the addition of a #7 to Section a of Report No. 3 of the Commission on Equitable Salary to read as follows: "The Commission on Equitable Salary should pay one-half of the Social Security tax on the salaries paid by the Commission on the above six categories." The Harry Stullenbarger Amendment was accepted by the Commission on Equitable Salaries. The Report of the Commission on Equitable Salary was then adopted as a whole.

Bishop Tullis spoke words of gratitude to the Equitable Salary Commission for their work.

Council on Finance and Administration—The Rev. Harry Mays, Chairman, presented the report by words of introduction after which he led the Conference in prayer and then presented the Secretary of the Council, the Rev. Jimmy Adams who presented the report.

Mr. Adams responded to question asked previously.

Report No. 1—Mr. Adams made corrections in Report No. 1 by deleting from Item b, #2 and #3 moving Golden Cross to Item #2 and inserting a new Item #3, Junaluska Advance Fund, \$2.00 per member for the quadrennium.

Report No. 2—Mr. Adams amended Report No. 2 by inserting on line 4 the ADVOCATE recommendation for CF&A of \$312,000 and by adding a new line to the report—Homes for Aging, \$416,694, with a percentage figure of 2.000%. There followed discussion of the appropriateness of adding the ADVOCATE dollar item in the light of previous action of the Annual Conference.

Robinson Motion—Spencer Robinson moved: "I move to delete the line item relating to a percentage of average net funds for the ADVOCATE." Discussion.

Previous Question—Harvey Floyd moved the previous question. The question was ordered.

The line item for the ADVOCATE was deleted.

Gary Motion—Chick Gary made the following motion: "Under Section a of Report No. 1 of the Council on Finance and Administration, the ADVOCATE asking of one and one-half percent will be listed at the bottom of the apportionment sheet form of the Conference Treasurer and will be listed as an optional asking." It was adopted.

Questions were asked about the increase in general administration fund and other administration funds. Bishop Tullis clarified the situation and wider implication of the Pacific Homes suit and stated that this accounts for about one million dollars per year in legal defense costs. Questions were asked regarding ministerial education.

Report No. 2 Was Adopted.

Report No. 3 Was Adopted.

REPORT NO. 4—Mr. Adams moved to amend Report No. 4 by adding to Item 4, Other Conference Benevolences (Boards), two lines:
Item g: J. P. Stevens Study Committee, \$2,000;
Item h: Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, \$2,000.
This would change the total of items in Report No. 4 to \$1,225,279.00.

MOTION TO AMEND—Mickey Fisher moved to amend Report No. 4, Section a-b, (Board of Education) to \$39,235 instead of the listed \$40,235. This was adopted. The new total of Report No. 4, Section 2 thus became \$286,250.

ETHNIC MINORITY COMMITTEE—A motion was made that the expense fund for this committee be increased from \$1,300 to \$2,000 with funding to come from the Council on Ministries. This was approved.

REPORT NO. 4 OF THE COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION WAS ADOPTED—Mr. Adams announced that this gives the Conference a total budget of \$8,085,912.00.

REPORT NO. 5 OF COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION WAS ADOPTED.

REPORT NO. 6 WAS PRESENTED BY MR. ADAMS FOR CONSIDERATION.
In Report No. 6 A, Special Recommendations, Mr. Adams made the following motion: change Item 11 to read: "11. As authorized under paragraph 2411 of the Book of DISCIPLINE, the Committee on the Episcopacy and the advisory Episcopal Housing Committee are authorized to negotiate with the presiding Bishop concerning housing to assist in those negotiations, it is recommended that up to \$125,000 be available from the Conference Contingency Reserve Fund for use in providing an adequate residence for the Bishop. If a purchase is made for the Annual Conference it shall be in the name of the Annual Conference Board of Trustees."

SUBSTITUTE—Mr. Doug Coffeen moved the following substitute to Item 11: "move that the spending limit for the Bishop's parsonage be reduced from \$125,000 to \$100,000."

The Coffeen Substitute was defeated.

REPORT NO. 6—ITEM 14—Mr. Adams moved that a new item be added to Report No. 1, a special recommendation to be numbered 14, which would read as follows: "14. We recommend that each charge pay \$300 annually for the use of the pastor for continuing education." A suggestion was made that this be amended by adding the words "at least" so that the item would read: "We recommend that each charge pay at least \$300 annually for the use of the pastor for continuing education." This was adopted.

George Whitaker called attention to the fact that the continuing education money should be expended only on voucher for continuing education.

CANADAY MOTION—DeArmond Canaday made the following motion: "I move that the Council on Finance and Administration include in its written report to the 1980 Session of the Annual Conference the following:

A. A statement of the purpose of the Contingency Reserve Fund;
B. A recommendation outlining the use of the Contingency Reserve Fund between Annual Conference Sessions and;

C. A statement of policy concerning the use of interest income accrued on balance on hand in the various Annual Conference Funds."

This motion passed.

REPORT NO. 6 OF COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION—this was adopted.

REPORT NO. 7 ON COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION—was moved by Mr. Adams and was adopted.

Mr. Adams moved that the report of the Council on Finance and Administration be adopted as a whole. It was adopted.

ANNOUNCEMENTS WERE MADE BY CONFERENCE SECRETARY.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE—George Duffie raised a question about the availability of Report No. 7 in printed form. He was informed that it was included in the packets presented to each delegate when they arrived at Annual Conference.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE—The Rev. C. D. Williams reported that Mrs. John Roquemore, wife of the Rev. John Roquemore, was ill in Self Memorial Hospital, Greenwood, and requested that greetings be sent to her from the Annual Conference.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE—The Rev. P. G. Curry asked that the names of Rev. Owens and Nathan Jones be added to those to whom we send greetings because of illness. The Rev. C. D. Williams then led the Conference in a prayer of concern for these persons and a prayer of dismissal.

RECESS—The Conference recessed for lunch.

Fourth day—Wednesday Afternoon
June 4, 1980

OPENING—Bishop Tullis called the Conference Session to order.

RECONSIDERATION—Dr. Bryan Crenshaw moved reconsideration of Report No. 7 of the Report of the Council on Finance and Administration. Consideration of the Report was adopted.

Harry Mays, Chairman of CF&A, explained to the Conference the contents of Report No. 7 and its background, with particular reference to Recommendation No. 2 relative to the building of the new United Methodist Center in Columbia. After much discussion the previous question was called. Report No. 7 was then adopted.

The Report of the Council on Finance and Administration was then adopted as a whole.

SERVICE OF SENDING FORTH—The Rev. Bruce Sayre led the Conference in the Service of Sending Forth after a distribution of the printed appointments which Bishop Tullis designated as the appointments.

Bishop Tullis read from Jude 17-25 and preached. Bishop Tullis concluded his sermon with the words: "My final word would be keep yourselves in the love of God." He used as a benediction Jude 25.

READING OF APPOINTMENTS—Bishop Tullis read the appointments by recognizing the district superintendents who in turn affirmed the appointments printed in the special issue of the ADVOCATE with certain editorial changes. The Service closed with the singing of "Lead On, O King Eternal."

AWARD PRESENTATION—"The Bishop's Award in Scouting" was presented to Troop 121, St. John's United Methodist Church, Aiken, and Cub Pack 95, Union United Methodist Church, Irmo. Wesley Farr, chairman, assisted the Bishop in presenting the awards to the units.

CHANGES IN DISTRICT AND CHARGE LINES—J. Chad Davis, Secretary of the Cabinet, read the changes in district and charge lines by districts.

These were received as information.

DISTRICT NOMINATIONS—J. Chad Davis, Secretary of the Cabinet, nominated the District Committees on Ordained Ministry, the District Committees on Church Buildings and Locations, and the District Trustees. These were elected. (See Section II of the JOURNAL for a listing of these persons.)

DISCIPLINARY QUESTION 16—For the information of the Conference, Mr. Davis presented information on matters related to the organization, discontinuance and naming of churches of the South Carolina Conference. (See Section VI of the JOURNAL for details of these changes.)

REPORT OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY—The Reverend Tom Lyles, chairman, presented the report's introduction which was adopted with additions.

ACTIONS ON RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY:

MOTION—A motion was made to delete Item No. 4. The motion was lost.

MOTION—Larry Roberts, Chapin, moved that Item No. 5 be amended to read: "In view of the high incidence of domestic upheaval which often leads to violence, physical or psychological, and increasingly to the break up of the family, we recommend that local churches give priority to the study of the root causes of family breakdown and to the study of God's plan for the Christian family and home. We further urge churches to offer support through counselling, loving care and church-wide teaching of God's plan for the Christian family according to the Holy Bible.

The Larry Roberts amendment was adopted.

MOTION—The Sumter Cluster, Hartsville District, represented by the Rev. Joe Pridgen, moved a substitution for the Board and Church's Society recommendation 10, Section 1. The substitution was accepted by the Board of Church and Society. (See Section VIII, Reports of Boards, for the text of this recommendation.)

MOTION—Mr. C. Lamar Haltiwanger moved to add to the recommendations presented by the Board of Church and Society, and to be numbered 16, the following recommendation: "that we initiate a drive to provide clothing, food and financial aid to the victims of St. Helen's through the United Methodist Church Overseas Relief." The motion was adopted.

MOTION—The Rev. Joe Cal Watson moved the deletion of No. 2 under Section 10. The motion was lost.

MOTION—A motion was made to add a five cent deposit on all bottles sold containing alcoholic beverages in South Carolina. The motion was lost.

MOTION—The Rev. Pat Ginn-Griffith moved reconsideration of Item 10, Section 2. Reconsideration was lost.

MOTION—A motion was made relative to Item 10, Paragraph 2 and was ruled out of order by Bishop Tullis.

MOVE TO RECONSIDER—A motion was made to reconsider Items previously discussed. The motion was defeated.

QUESTION—Mr. Spencer Robinson moved the previous question. The question was moved.

APPROVAL OF AMENDED REPORT—The report as it has been amended was then approved.

RESOLUTION—The Board of Church and Society presented a resolution which had come to them from Mr. Mitchell Ormand and recommended concurrence of the Mitchell Ormand resolution.

Mrs. John T. Moore from Cheraw moved the deletion of Part C, dealing with the offering for Cambodia, from the Resolution. Mrs. Moore's move for deletion was adopted. The entire Mitchell Ormand Resolution was then lost.

CONSULTATION OF CHURCH AND TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY—The Rev. Wend Bill McNeil spoke to the Conference about the appearance of Dr. Albert Outler at the consultation on "The Church in the Twenty-first Century," October 13, at College Place Church in Columbia.

OMNIBUS MOTION—The Rev. Ted Morton, Conference Secretary, offered an omnibus motion to expedite the remaining items of Conference business. He moved that reports not containing material for decision by the Annual Conference be ordered to record. These Reports were:

- Report on the Daily Journal;
- Report on Conference JOURNAL;
- Report of Committee of Annual Conference;
- The Belin Trustees;
- The Conference Trustees;
- Reports of the Council on Ministries, the Methodist Camp, Commission on Worship, Commission on Status and Role of Women, Commission on Ecumenical Affairs, Committee on Career Planning and Counseling, and the Board of Evangelism.

These were moved to record without reading.

The Rev. Carl Harris, Chairman of the Board of Evangelism, stated that Evangelism had materials for action and therefore the Board of Evangelism should be omitted from the list. The others were moved to record without reading, and the motion was passed.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE—The Rev. F. Bundy Bynum, Secretary of the Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, moved all reports of the Board to record without reading, except the reports having to do with nominations. The motion was approved.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES NOMINATIONS—The nominees for Trustees of Epworth Children's Home, Greenwood Methodist Home, and Orangeburg Methodist Home were presented and elected. (See Section II of the JOURNAL for names.)

BOARD OF MISSIONS—The Rev. Lloyd Hatton presented the report of the Conference Board of Missions.

MOTION—James C. Bigelow moved that the Marlboro District Cooperative Ministry be added to the list of specialized ministries related to the Board of Missions. No funds were requested, and the Conference voted that this be added.

All reports of the Board of Missions except recommendations were ordered to record.

BOARD OF MISSIONS NOMINATIONS—Nominations for Trustees of Spartanburg Methodist College and Trustees of the Belin Property were presented. The Spartanburg Methodist College Board nominations were amended to include as student advisory trustees Angela D. Clark and Jeffrey R. Bridgman. The amendment was approved. The nominees were then elected. (See Section II of the JOURNAL for those elected.)

PASTORAL CARE AND COUNSELING—The report was presented by Dr. Iverson Graham. The Director's report was adopted. The recommendations were adopted. (See Section VIII, Reports, for text of the report.)

NOMINATIONS—Dr. Spencer Rice, head of the South Carolina Delegation to Jurisdictional General Conference, presented Dr. J. C. Lupo, Jr., who made the nominations to the Jurisdictional pool of names for consideration as nominees to General Boards and Agencies of the Church. In the list presented, the name of Michael Watson was deleted and the name of J. C. Hipp was added. The name of Tami Abel was also deleted and Mr. Sam Mitchell was nominated by the Rev. Julian Lazar to the pool of nominees. Mr. Michael Bartley, age 15, was nominated by Larry McCutcheon. Mitchell and Bartley were accepted as persons to be added to the list. The entire list of nominees for the pool were then adopted. Spencer Rice spoke of the work of the Episcopal Committee for the Jurisdiction.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE NOMINATIONS—The Rev. Ed Jenkins, Chairman, presented the Committee on Nominations to the Conference and then introduced Mrs. Henrietta Morton, Secretary, who presented the report and made corrections and substitutions in the printed list. Mrs. Angelin Wallace requested the deletion of her name from the Ethnic Minority Committee to be replaced by the name of Lillian Hymes. The substitution was approved.

Since the 1980 General Conference legislation created a Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, nominations were made for this Board and for the Board of Education. Certain other Boards had substitutions from the printed report. The Report of the Conference Committee on Nominations was then considered *ad seriatim*.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION—elected as nominated.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES—elected as nominated.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY—Susan Henry-Crowe moved to substitute Ellen Younker for Henry Thomson. This substitute was defeated and the Board was elected as nominated.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM—Susan Henry-Crowe moved to substitute Angelin Wallace for Howard B. Sweat. The substitute was defeated and the Board was elected as nominated.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES—elected as nominated.

BOARD OF MISSIONS—Susan Henry-Crowe moved to substitute Barbara Rollins in place of Carl Harris. The substitute was defeated and the Board was elected as nominated.

BOARD OF PENSIONS—Sam Johnson nominated Angelin Wallace in place of J. Ben Cunningham. The substitute was defeated, and the Board was elected as nominated.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY—elected as nominated.

COMMISSION ON CAREER PLANNING AND COUNSELING—Susan Henry-Crowe nominated Carol Neese in place of Ronnie A. Pettit. The substitute was defeated and the Commission was elected as nominated.

COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AND INTER-RELIGIOUS CONCERNS—Larry McCutcheon nominated Eliza Williams in place of Bernice Waring. Mrs. Williams was substituted and the Commission was elected.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES—Susan Henry-Crowe nominated Diane Moseley to substitute for James Gosnell. The substitute was defeated and the Commission was elected as nominated.

COMMISSION ON GROUP LIFE AND HOSPITAL INSURANCE—elected as nominated.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE—Susan Henry-Crowe nominated Mary Teasley in place of Anthony Gavalas. The substitute lost and the Commission was elected as nominated.

COMMISSION ON ROLE AND STATUS OF WOMEN—elected as nominated.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP—elected as nominated.

COMMITTEE ON THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE—elected as nominated.

COMMITTEE ON ANNUAL CONFERENCE STRUCTURE—Charles Johnson nominated Ed McDowell in place of William Coble. The substitute failed and the Committee was elected as nominated.

COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE JOURNAL—elected as nominated.

COMMITTEE ON EPISCOPACY—elected as nominated.

COMMITTEE ON PASTORAL CARE AND COUNSELING—Susan Henry-Crow moved to substitute Gloria Davis and John C. Preer. The substitute was defeated and the Committee was elected as nominated.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS AND APPEALS—elected as nominated.

COMMITTEE ON STANDING RULES—elected as nominated.

TRUSTEES OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE—elected as nominated.

TRUSTEES OF THE ADVOCATE AND METHODIST CENTER—elected as nominated.

COMMITTEES ON THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENCIES—elected as nominated.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY—Elected as proposed with the exception of Spencer Rice in place of Mr. Leaphart. The Board was elected as amended.

BOARD OF EDUCATION—The name of Fran Ennis was removed because of being a member of the Committee on Episcopacy. Jennie Fender, Elaine Jenkins, and Tillie Dunstain were nominated to replace Fran Ennis. Jennie Fender was elected. The Board of Education was elected as amended.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE ADVOCATE—The Reverend Wiley Cooper was removed because he has honorably located at this Annual Conference. The Committee nominated the Reverend Diane Moseley for the replacement of Wiley Cooper. The Reverend Kenneth Bobo was nominated from the floor. The Rev. Diane Moseley was elected.

COMMITTEE ON EPISCOPACY—The name of Sammie Jackson was removed from the Committee on Episcopacy because of a conflict; nominated were the Rev. Gloria Davis, whose name was withdrawn; the Rev. Willie Dicks; and Dr. Hubert Manning. Dr. Hubert Manning was elected to replace the Rev. Sammie Jackson. The nominees of the Committee on Episcopacy, as amended, were elected.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE—Nominated were the Rev. Willie Dicks and the Rev. Melvin Fludd. The Rev. Melvin Fludd was elected.

ETHNIC MINORITY COMMITTEE—Mrs. Doris Patterson was nominated in place of Mrs. Corrie McGee. Mrs. Corrie E. McGee was elected. The Committee on Ethnic Minority was then elected as presented.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY—The Board was elected as presented.

J. P. STEVENS STUDY COMMITTEE—Bishop Tullis announced the names of the members of the J. P. Stevens Study Committee.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES—Jim Nates was called for presentation of recommendations of the Council on Ministries. Recommendations on the redirection of 1980 budget appropriations were amended by adding the words "and future receipts" following each place where the words "balance of funds" occurred in the report. The report was adopted as amended.

RECOMMENDATIONS concerning church extension work were approved.

ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF BOARDS OF DIRECTORS OF UNITED METHODIST CAMP—Jimmy J. Montgomery was nominated to fill a vacancy in the Class of 1983. Nominated to serve in the Class of '84 were Miss Rachel Leaver, Mr. John Terry, and the Rev. Herbert Thomas. Those nominated were elected.

CONTRACT PERSONS WORKING FOR CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRY—The Rev. Mickey Fisher presented contract persons who will be working with the Conference Council on Ministries and spoke of their work. This was received as information.

REPORT OF CAMP PHILOSOPHY—The Rev. Susan Ulmer was presented for the report which dealt with the philosophy of camping in South Carolina through the United Methodist Church. The report was adopted.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM—The Rev. Carl Harris, Chairman of the Conference Board of Evangelism, was presented for the report. He called attention to key items of the report, and made a report on the "Proclamation Evangelism" event. This event was stated to have been a success.

Conference members from St. Paul's Church, Florence, expressed gratitude for the work of the Rev. Carl Harris on the Board of Evangelism and asked for applause.

MOTION—(Dr. Spencer Rice questioned the right of a Committee on the Board of Directors of the Methodist Camp to change the name of the Camp.) Dr. Spencer Rice moved that the decision to change the name of the Camp be delayed until the Conference Council on Ministries and the Annual Conference could consider it. The Spencer Rice motion was adopted.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE—Spencer Robinson moved that we send sympathy and concern to Mrs. Ruth E. Hughes. Other persons named were Mrs. Reba Shumaker and the Rev. Johnson (father of Charles Johnson).

MOVE TO RECONSIDER—A motion was made to reconsider the naming of the Camp. The move to reconsider was not adopted.

APPRECIATION—Bishop Tullis expressed gratitude to the Rev. Peden Gene Curry for his years of service as a District Superintendent as he left the Cabinet to assume an appointment in a local church.

MOTION—The Conference Secretary, the Rev. Ted Morton, moved that he be given authority to send words of gratitude to all those who assisted in the Annual Conference.

MOTION—The Secretary offered a motion for adjournment. The Bishop led in singing "Bless Be the Tie That Binds." *Sine Die*. The motion was adopted. Bishop Tullis pronounced the Benediction.

Cabinet Report to The Annual Conference

REFLECTIONS AND REVIEW

The Cabinet has graciously asked me to report for the entire group to this 1980 session of the Annual Conference. I shall endeavor to do that, not just by reporting on programs and statistics for this past year, but by reflecting on the manner in which we as a corporate body have sought to respond to priorities which we have set for ourselves in our work.

MAKING MERGER WORK

Our number one priority for the past two quadrennia has been to make merger work. The 1972 sessions of the two Annual Conferences involved adopted a strong plan for merger which was to be operative for eight years, which period closes with this session of the South Carolina Annual Conference. We have endeavored, as a Cabinet, not to adhere legalistically to a plan, though we have not violated that plan, but to keep alive an attitude and spirit in the Conference that developed a creative merger. The extent of that success must be left to the assessment of historians in a later time.

Our Cabinet has been inclusive. We have now had Black superintendents serving on eight of our twelve districts. I do not believe this record is exceeded anywhere else in United Methodism. The rich traditions of both former conferences have impacted our process and decision making. We would testify to a person that we are better people and perhaps better leaders because we have all enriched each other.

The Cabinet has supported Black leadership at the District and Conference level. We have provided ethnic leadership from our Conference for the entire Church. The General Commission on Religion and Race has on several occasions affirmed the direction of our Cabinet toward inclusiveness.

We have yet a long way to go. Although we have more than fifty local churches with integrated membership to some degree, we have not yet been able to cross racial lines in our appointment process. We have worked toward this end, not to create a showcase, but to make effective appointments. We all still have within us and within our system a kind of racism that favors white males in ministerial leadership in most of our churches. We are beginning to see encouraging signs from churches and pastoral-parish committees of an openness to effective ministry without regard to race and sex.

The spirit of inclusiveness in the Cabinet is far more significant than much of the Conference realizes. We believe this supportiveness of each other in our ministry is making and will make an impact on the future of the Conference.

IMPROVING APPOINTMENT CONSULTATIONS

Our next priority, so closely related to the first, has been to continually improve our process of consultation in appointment making. Our procedures and instruments for this purpose have been given general exposure over the entire Church as I have led the workshop on appointment making for all new District Superintendents in our Church for the past quadrennium. The recent action of the General Conference on consultation almost parallels our present process in South Carolina.

We continue to struggle with parts of two deployment systems—the unilateral appointment method and the call system. Many in our Conference who have begun to understand that consultation is a two-way street are threatened by it and want to return to a system of former days when little or no consultation prevailed. Many ministers wanted to be able to request reconsideration of proposed appointments but are now deeply threatened as they discover lay committees asking for reconsideration of proposed pastors. As a minister, allow me to say to our brothers and sisters in the clergy, we can't have our cake and eat it, too. If we choose to lay down guidelines for our own appointments, we must accept the fact that the laity can also develop a rather exacting profile for a proposed clergy leader.

One of our problems in the Cabinet is that both clergy and laity insist on giving unrealistic demands. We will struggle to meet them all and will endeavor to take time and be sensitive to all needs, but if we can satisfy say three out of five proposed requirements we may have done all we can do with the clergy and churches we have to work with.

We seek in appointment making to provide adequate information for churches and pastors. Then the hidden agenda begins. Without understanding all that is involved, Brother Bill calls Brother Joe, who served that church twelve years ago, and the Brother Bill rejects the proposed appointment on Joe's inadequate and often highly prejudiced information. Or the PPRC chairperson calls a former pastor or an old buddy and asks about Bill. "Oh, he can't preach," says the wise uninformed informant who never heard Bill preach in all his life and knows really very little about him except that "he is abrasive," which means he doesn't accept his point of view about some personal position.

May I say this as a brother who wants to be a brother to all of you? I have never seen such unbrotherliness and unsisterliness anywhere in my life as we seem to have in our clergy family. We take a fiendish delight in cutting each other down. There are some pretty telling words in the Bible about such actions, and, in case some of you may not have done so recently, look toward the back of the New Testament and read and digest the letters of James and John.

The Cabinet was unable to make what we believed to be some effective appointments this year and in recent years because of our basic unkindness, irresponsible gossip and in some cases, untruthfulness about our fellow clergy, he or she that hath ears to hear.

GIVING LEADERSHIP IN EVANGELISM

The Cabinet has sought to give leadership in evangelism in our Conference. We have not all agreed on concepts and methods in evangelism, nor need we. We must respond intelligently and enthusiastically to our Lord's commission, "Go and make disciples." Our evangelism must be incarnational—the proclamation of the Gospel in words and deeds in concrete situations. This kind of evangelism brings together the personal and social elements of the gospel, seeking at the same time the conversion of persons and the building of a world fit to live in. In the midst of the awesome human need of our day we know that there is a time and place when we must name the "Name" and proclaim the Word.

Our hope is that our emphasis on evangelism recently experienced will help make us all aware that it is not an item on the agenda of the Church—it is our unique and imperative agenda. As people of the tradition of the "warm heart," we must make more visible and articulate our response to our Lord's command.

We live in one of those fortunate areas of this country where there is growing economic strength and thus increasing population. Consequently, we have had a net increase in church membership for the past seven years. We are particularly encouraged about growth in our Black constituency where our major increases have taken place.

The Cabinet has sought to be aware of Church Extension opportunities in the Conference. As our population increases dramatically, especially around Charleston, Columbia and Greenville, we will need to develop more adequate strategies and support for new organizations. This must continue to be a matter of highest priority for the vitality of United Methodism in South Carolina.

AFFIRMING WOMEN IN MINISTRY

One of the most dramatic changes in recent years in our Conference has been the increase in the numbers of women clergy. The Cabinet has sought to be very intentional about the deployment of women in ministry. Without question, our women clergy are competent, committed professionals, able to take their place along with male clergy in this Conference. Their ability to perform adequately in ministry is no longer in question. They are proving themselves in varied kinds of assignments in this Conference.

The number of women clergy will be increasing. It is estimated that by the year 2000, only twenty years away, one-half of the United Methodist clergy persons will be women. Our local churches need carefully to evaluate this new factor as they consider ministerial leadership in the future. Women bring a creative, sensitive dimension to ministry not always possible for men to achieve. We now have a strong nucleus of women clergy in this Conference capable of top leadership and able to serve any church in our midst. For the strength of our Church in the days ahead, we must plan to assign these persons to the kinds of situations commensurate with their abilities. I believe this Cabinet affirms this position and will continue to place high priority on such an opportunity.

SUPPORTING OUR INSTITUTIONS

The Cabinet has been an important link between our institutions and our local churches. In the eight years of my ministry here the Cabinet has given leadership to major fund-raising campaigns—one for Spartanburg Methodist College and the other for Claffam College. Both of these efforts gave added strength to these two important institutions.

Both Columbia College and Wofford College, along with the previously mentioned schools, have had strong financial support from the Conference. This funding has been spear-headed by the Cabinet in contact with Charge Conferences as budgets have been established and claims paid.

The Cabinet has given an added dimension of support to our homes for the aging, to our Bethlehem Centers, to Killingsworth, to Boylan-Haven-Mather Academy and to Epworth Children's Home. During these years the direction of the Killingsworth program has been changed and new, creative ministries to women emerging from crisis have been offered. The relationship of Boylan-Haven-Mather Academy to the Conference is being carefully studied. All of these institutions have been the object of care, attention and support from the Cabinet.

I want to say what I believe is a pertinent word about our Conference institutions. We have a tendency to take them for granted. We do not always give them priority in the life of our Conference. We are often tempted to come up with pilot projects and experimental ministries which frequently siphon support from our institutions.

It is my deep conviction that much of the major thrust in mission in our Conference still comes through our institutions. Care for children, youth, women in crisis, attention for growing young adults, and ministries to the aging go on 24 hours a day and 365 days a year in these institutions. When many of our local churches sag in missional support, our ministry in our homes, schools and centers continues under the direction of a group of the most dedicated and committed people I know anywhere.

Many of us make a great claim at being missional and yet fail to realize that the most significant mission in our midst is probably in our ongoing institutional service. If our local churches become more and more self-centered, concerned chiefly about a local expression of ministry, we will lose our contact with ministry to human need expressed in our institutions, and we may lose the spirit of the Christ who called us to a servant role. How can our servanthood be more adequately evidenced than in our support for institutions caring for persons in Christ's name?

SERVING THE SMALLER MEMBERSHIP CHURCH

Our Conference primarily consists of churches of smaller membership—200 or less. It must be remembered by those who choose a ministerial career in South Carolina that most of us will serve churches of small membership and many of us will work in multiple church charges. To make as one's goal in ministry the serving of a larger station church as a sign of success or achievement simply discredits the strength and validity of ministry in the smaller place.

This Cabinet gives a great preponderance of its time and ministry in these churches of smaller membership. The very nature of our task makes it essential. We have given far more attention to churches of smaller membership than to others. For someone to say that smaller churches are neglected by the Cabinet or that larger churches have more clout in the appointment making process reveals a total ignorance of our involvement. The churches of smallest membership have received careful consideration in all of our ministry in recent years.

In my own local church visitation I have intentionally spent the large percentage of my time in the smaller places. This is because of my own interest and concern and my desire to affirm the places where the struggle is often more difficult. We have about 1090 churches in this Conference. In one way or another I have visited and touched the life of almost 900 of these locations. I have discovered that much of our real strength and commitment lies in these churches of smaller membership, and I salute both the laity and clergy who give themselves in real servanthood in many of these places.

The Cabinet is glad that the General Conference has finally recognized that churches of 100 members cannot be organized for ministry as are those of 1,000 members. A new proposal, with greater flexibility, now allows the charge conference with the counsel of the District Superintendent to organize more efficiently for the work of that church in charge.

BEING A VITAL LINK

Perhaps far more than is generally realized, the Cabinet has struggled with difficult issues in social concerns and has affirmed the position of our Church on many controversial social situations. The District Superintendent is the one person who faces the wide spectrum of diversity in our churches and has to confront and deal intelligently with the probing questions raised by our people. I happen to know that our Cabinet has dealt with a wide range of social issues—world peace, world hunger, racism, equality for women, collective bargaining, the rights of minorities, the issues of equality and justice—and has dealt with them forthrightly and fairly. The District Superintendent is the vital link in our connection, and for one I want to affirm that link and the strength of it in South Carolina.

There are many other areas in which we have been involved—leadership training, recruitment of lay and ministerial leadership, youth ministries, involvement in ministry with United Methodist Women and United Methodist Men, conflict management and other important areas of work. The District Superintendents have been at the total for the total Church. We are a world parish and we have affirmed that by bringing support for World Service from under 70% in 1972 to over 90% in 1979. Much of this increase must be attributed to the leadership of our District Superintendents.

We have our problems and areas of weakness, but this Conference is growing and it is an important part of United Methodism, and the Superintendents are no small part of that picture.

ENJOYING THE GAME

Allow me a closing personal word. These eight years have been among the best in my ministry. Mrs. Tullis and I have found this Conference ready to be in mission, and we have enjoyed being a part of that ministry.

I am aware, more than you, of my inadequacies at points. I have always cherished the word of my old friend Dr. Lon Robinson of Lawrenceburg, Kentucky, who left church one Sunday trying to think of something good to say about the sermon and remarked, "Well, Ed, Babe Ruth didn't bat 1000." That has saved me many a time!

In all frankness, while I have missed the ball at times, there were occasions when, in my opinion, you muffed the play! But it has been a good game in which we have been involved together. We are nearly 200 years old as a Conference, but in many respects we are still in the early innings of the game, and from some other spot Mary Jane and I shall await the score at the end of each succeeding inning with interest and concern.

There is one thing of which I shall always be certain about this game we have played together. For awhile I had the chance to play in the Major League, and I know that you shall ever be grateful for it.

REPORT NO. 1

Eight years Edward L. Tullis and Mary Jane have been with us, and we are reluctant to accept the probability of their assignment to another Area.

Space will not allow all that could be said in viewing their accomplishments and the appreciation of South Carolina United Methodists for their presence among us. Bishop Tullis came into a newly formed Annual Conference, a merger of two segregated Conferences. His leadership has built brilliantly and effectively upon the leadership of Bishop Paul Hardin in this new experience.

The Tullises' dedication to the on-going life of the local Churches in this area of United Methodism is proven by their constant travels throughout the Conference and their comprehensive personal knowledge of individual members and clergy. Bishop Tullis has given unusual understanding and guidance to the boards, agencies, and institutions under his care.

The Committee will be conveying to the Jurisdictional Committee on Episcopacy the needs and challenges we see and will be doing this primarily through our own representatives to that body. If Bishop Tullis is reassigned to the Columbia Area, we shall be overjoyed; if not, we shall receive his successor in the true spirit of Methodism.

A TRIBUTE TO EDWARD L. TULLIS

Bishop, Distinguished Guests, and Fellow United Methodists
I have requested this point of personal privilege to try to fulfill what I deem to be a sacred duty. Please hear me carefully and prayerfully.
Eight years ago this summer I had the great privilege of going to Lake Junaluska to witness to members of the South Carolina Annual Conference Delegation to the Southeastern Jurisdiction Conference regarding my understanding of the need to not only elect Edward L. Tullis to the episcopacy in our great church but to also secure him as our episcopal leader. To believe I had a significant influence may be an execution of fantasy. Be that as it may.
I remember being quizzed about my dear friend's capacity for openness. To that I replied, "If you have a disagreement with Ed Tullis, don't challenge his leadership, rather seek him out for a personal encounter and you'll not only find him open, but extremely affirming of you in the event he cannot agree with you." It has been my joy to see a great number of you grow in understanding of the mission of the Church as you followed this path.
Let me share the source of my understanding of this great man's ability to deal with those of us of lesser faith. It developed in one of Ed's mountain appointments in Eastern Kentucky. In this Church nestled quietly in view of the stripped hills of his parish folks had the habit of going in and out while their young preacher was expounding the virtues of our God who reveals himself in his word and through his servants.

After nearly a year of this Ed finally learned how to deal with it. One Sunday he addressed his flock thusly, "Dear friends, when I first came here I was extremely annoyed by what appeared to be a lack of courtesy on the parts of folks who went and came while I was preaching. I am not annoyed anymore. I know now these 'fellars' have the itch and are ashamed to scratch in public.

Needless to say, Ed joined the staff of the National Division of the Board of Missions, but folks in that mountain town still sit still during preaching.

To you, friends of this Conference, I want you to know that this man knew what was happening when we went in and out during conference sessions.

To you, dear and trusted mentor in the Gospel, I want to articulate a confession of the sinfulness involved in our unwillingness to seek you out for personal counsel instead of going behind the "church" to scratch. Please forgive us.

And finally, dear Sir, make this aspect of your ministry more visible in your next charge. Folks need to know it's alright to scratch as long as they keep the issues clearly rooted in the scriptures and traditions of our great heritage. Bless you Sir.

THE BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

The Board of Diaconal Ministry was created by the 1976 General Conference. The South Carolina Board of Diaconal Ministry is thus completing its first quadrennium of service.

According to paragraph 301, *The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church, 1976*, consecrated diaconal ministers are "persons called of God and set apart through consecration for specialized ministries of service in the Church's life and mission." It has been this board's responsibility to recommend for consecration all those who have met the personal, Church, and professional qualifications required. The board registrar also handles certification requirements for those people who have met the standards established by the Church and the profession related to the diaconal career. Those diaconal ministers recommended for continuation and for consecration and those persons who have been re-certified by the board are listed at the end of this report.

The Board of Diaconal Ministry seeks to be in communication with groups who share common interest. In 1979 the board attended a luncheon of the Christian Educators Fellowship and Diaconal Ministers were invited to the C. E. F. Luncheon at Annual Conference. Members of the board met with the Board of Ordained Ministry to initiate ways of working together. (Paragraph 732 (4)). The board would like to encourage more joint planning on issues which effect both boards (e. g. recruitment, continuing education, etc.).

Two members of the Board of Diaconal Ministry attended the Southeastern Jurisdictional Workshop for Chairpersons and registrars of Conference Boards of Diaconal Ministry (Atlanta, Georgia). The meeting provided information on Board of Diaconal Ministry Foundational Studies and Certification Studies.

During 1979 the board prepared a brochure describing diaconal ministry and defining steps for candidates. The brochure was distributed at Annual Conference and has been made available to all interested groups and individuals.

In January 1979 a special Salaries and Benefits Study Committee was appointed. Their recommendations are listed at the end of this report.

The board recognizes the retirement of Miss Frieda Morris during 1979. Miss Morris served as a deaconess and a diaconal minister doing church and community work in the Marlboro area.

The board wishes to thank Bishop Tullis and The Reverend Chad Davis (Cabinet Representative) and many others who have helped the South Carolina Conference Board of Diaconal Ministry carry out its responsibilities.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In keeping with paragraph 311 of *The Book of Discipline, 1976*, the board recommends the following guidelines for use by churches and agencies employing Diaconal Ministers in the South Carolina Annual Conference.

BASE SALARY—The minimum base salary for the Diaconal Minister working in a church or agency in South Carolina should be commensurate with the minimum compensation for an ordained minister in full connection of the Annual Conference.

TRAVEL—All travel on church or agency business should be reimbursed at the recommended rate for the Annual Conference. All other church or agency business expense shall be reimbursed at actual cost.

HOUSING—Adequate housing or housing allowance should be provided for the Diaconal Minister by the employing agency.

HOSPITALIZATION—Each Diaconal Minister should be covered under the Annual Conference insurance program on the same basis as an ordained person under special appointment.

PENSION—Each Diaconal Minister should be covered by an adequate pension plan by the employing agency (preferably a pension plan with the United Methodist Board of Pensions) and that pension plan provide for transfer and vested interest.

PROFESSIONAL DUES—Each church or employing agency should provide the dues for all professional organizations where membership is required to maintain the professional certification of the Diaconal Minister.

CONTINUING EDUCATION—Each church or employing agency should provide for the Diaconal Minister at least \$300.00 annually for continuing education. This amount should be allowed to accumulate for up to three (3) years to allow the Diaconal Minister to attend major training events. Time for training events are not to be considered vacation time.

NOTE—Federal law requires that Diaconal Ministers be covered under the Social Security program.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

A STATEMENT OF GUIDELINES, STANDARDS AND OTHER CONTINUING EDUCATION POLICIES AND INFORMATION

With the adoption of mandatory Continuing Education legislation by the 1980 General Conference, a new day and era has begun in the United Methodist Church.

Paragraph 420 reads as follows:

Rights of Full Members—Members in full connection shall have the right to vote on all matters in the Annual Conference except in the election of lay delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences (Para 700.1a) and shall have sole responsibility for all matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of ordained ministers. They shall be eligible to hold office in the Annual Conference and to be elected delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences under the provision of the Constitution (Para. 39, Art. IV).

Every effective member in full connection who is in good standing shall receive an annual appointment by the bishop.

1. **Growth in competence and effectiveness through continuing education is expected of conference members. These are professional responsibilities which ministerial members are expected to fulfill and which represent a fundamental part of their accountability and a primary basis of their guaranteed appointment. These shall include:**
 - a. Continuing availability for appointment.
 - b. Having pastoral effectiveness evaluated annually by Pastor-Parish Relations Committee and District Superintendents trained in the process of evaluation to determine the gifts, graces, health and readiness for ministry (Para. 731.2j and 519.2).
 - c. **Annual participation in continuing education programs. The Board of Ordained Ministry (Para. 731.2i) shall set minimal standards and specific guidelines for continuing education programs for members of their conference, and insure their availability.**

The S. C. Conference Board of the Ordained Ministry, in compliance with the legislation and in consultation with Dr. Mark Rouch, Intentional Growth Center, Junaluska, N. C., and in conversation with Emory, Gammon, Duke and the Board of Higher Education and Ministry, adopted this paper as our initial Statement for the Quadrennium.

I. Specific Guidelines

The first consideration of this paper is the basic understanding of the meaning of Continuing Education and program guidelines which are further outlined in this paper. Our basic understanding of Continuing Education follows.

To increase competence, effectiveness and faithfulness is the purpose of continuing education for ministry.

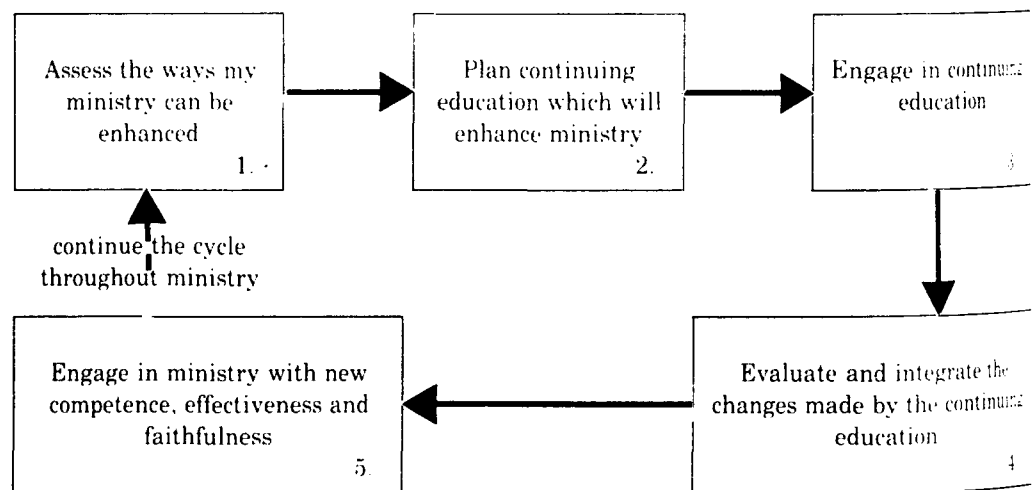
Now that the United Methodist Church has decided to require continuing education for its ordained ministers, everything depends upon whether that purpose is kept clear in view. If it is, the life of the Church will be enriched and the possibility for ministry in the world increased.

But the great danger now is that continuing education will become only a requirement to be met—an end in itself. If that happens, the life of the Church will be harmed.

The choice is ours. It is a choice for those who plan for the support and encouragement of continuing education. It is a choice for everyone who engages in it.

The key question is: How can I enhance my ministry? How can I become more competent, more effective, more faithful? It is **not**: What continuing education event should I engage in next?

In simple diagram, this is what the process for each of us would be:



Many are already engaged in this process. But for many others, an occasion and encouragement are needed in order to get under way.

Experience has shown that one of the most productive and supportive ways for this to happen is through a group event in which participants can assess their needs for personal and professional growth in ministry and then plan for continuing education to meet those needs. Such events are occurring with increasing frequency throughout our denomination.

A seminar of this type needs to be long enough for participants to get some "distance" from the rush of daily activities and to provide opportunity for a sense of collegiality to develop.

The seminar should include opportunity and assistance for participants to do, at least, the following:

- Analyze the nature and major tasks of one's ministry;
- Decide which tasks are done effectively and which need improvement; which provide satisfaction and sense of meaning, which do not;
- Consider how these relate to the needs of the Church—both one's own appointment and the Church of Jesus Christ in its Gospel character;
- Examine where one is in her or his career or journey in ministry, and the dynamics related to that place or stage;
- Assess one's own self-esteem and ego strength with a view to their bearing upon future growth;
- Decide what the above factors indicate as to the most urgent needs for growth in ministry;
- Learn how to develop a continuing education plan to address those needs;
- Examine the opportunities and resources for continuing education and to formulate a definite but flexible plan for the months ahead.

These Seminars should not only provide opportunity for solid, productive planning but also be such as to remind participants of the joy of learning; open up new and exciting vistas for growth; and provide the encouragement of peer support.

Each participant should be made to feel that his or her human journey and journey in ministry are taken seriously and valued.

Once a plan for personal and professional growth is made, the journey has just begun. It is then of great value to have consultation available for refinement of the plan and help with its implementation.

There is, thus in having consultants available among one's colleagues in ministry who can assist with the ongoing process. Where the role of seminar leader can be combined with this consultant's role, the entire process is strengthened.*

II. Minimum Standards

The Board of Ordained Ministry has established that the minimum standard for the next 18 months will be for each member in full connection (and certain other ministers to be determined by the Board later) to participate in a "Personal and Professional Growth Assessment and Continuing Education Planning Event" (as outlined by the Board and implemented by the District Committee of the Ordained Ministry and District Coordinators of Continuing Education). Certain temporary exception to this minimum standard will be allowed initially by the Board to ministers engaged in C.P.E., D. Min. and other qualified Continuing Education programs.

III. District Organization

The Conference Board of the Ordained Ministry shall ask each District Committee on the Ordained Ministry to elect two elders to be nominated by the district superintendent to serve as the District Coordinators of Continuing Education under the Supervision of the District Committee and the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry.

The two persons who will serve as District Coordinators of Continuing Education should have a special interest and skill in continuing education as well as commitment to personal and professional growth. The choice of these persons is crucial to the total program. We must have capable and committed district coordinators.

Our committee would like to have the names of these District Coordinators by June 15.

IV. Funding

Many conferences are providing basic financial support for continuing education through the ministerial education fund, which has been ruled to be legitimate. (Western North Carolina Conf. allocates 25% of MEF for this purpose.)

Our MEF resources (based on 78% payment) are already committed for this year, with a considerable amount going to the supervision of probationary members.

Our committee will seek to raise the level of payments to MEF by local churches to 90% and will ask the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry for funds from this increase if our promotional efforts are successful.

Other financial resources will be: (a) to strongly urge the local churches and each District to provide funds in the 1981 budgets for this new requirement for the ministers who are appointed to them. (b) the coordination of conference and district leadership

training programs as approved continuing education events. (c) grants and gifts to persons, companies, foundations, etc. (d) some investment by the individual minister. The Equitable Salary Commission will be asked to consider helping pastors who are receiving minimum salary support.

Guidelines for the major use of continuing education monies to be used by Committee at the beginning will be to:

- (a) Provide for the administration of Continuing Education Committee of Board of Ordained Ministry and part to continuing education administration at district level.
- (b) Provide for a limited number of continuing education program events at conference and district levels.
- (c) Provide for scholarships for individual ministers in implementing their continuing education plans. Basic scholarship policy will seek to encourage a majority of funds by the conference, district, local church, and participating minister.

V. Providing Program Resources for Personal and Professional Growth

After each minister has developed her his personal and professional growth plan for the next three years, helping them find seminars, courses, reading programs, colleague study groups, etc., will be a major undertaking. Candler School of Theology, Duke Divinity School, Gammon Theological Seminary and Claflin College have offered their services in continuing education at this point. We will also seek the support of Columbia College, Spartanburg Methodist, and Wofford, as well as the Lutheran Seminary in Columbia.

Resources and other opportunities will be publicized and promoted by the Conference Board Committee and the District coordinators.

VI. Monitoring the Process

It is hoped that each minister will be motivated to be her his primary monitor of the result being a growing sense of competency in ministry. Ultimately, this is where the "charge to keep we have" comes down. However, colleague groups will encourage, affirm, support, exhort, and needle one another as part of a total process from beginning stage through implementation.

We envision the emergence of a new and powerful sense of koninia among the delegates of our conference as we give ourselves in this ministry to Christ, the church, the world, and one another.

VII. Time Line For Next Steps

Step No. 1: By Annual Conference June, 1980, we will request that the Conference consider recommending that all local churches include adequate funds in their 1981 budget for continuing education. The local church Pastor-Parish Relations Committee should make the recommendation.

Step No. 2: By Annual Conference June, 1980, we will request that the Committee on Equitable Salary consider including in their 1981 salary supplements additional amounts for continuing education for each minister receiving minimum salary fund.

Step No. 3: By June 15, 1980, request district superintendents forward the names of the two coordinators elected by the District Committee on Ordained Ministry on nomination by D. S.

Step No. 4: By September 1, 1980, the Board of Ministry Committee on Continuing Education proposes to have initiated a conference-wide program of positive promotion of the value and meaning of personal and professional growth, and the enhancement of ministry that results when ministers join this exciting and adventurous journey.

Step No. 5: By October 3, 1980, to have provided a training event for district coordinators which we request district superintendents to attend. This training event will be a Personal and Professional Growth Assessment and Continuing Education Planning Event, and will enable the coordinators supported by District Superintendent to provide a similar event for the ministers in full connection in each district.

Step No. 6: By December 1st, all districts to have provided a personal and professional growth assessment event for the first group of ministers.

Step No. 7: By January, 1981, those ministers who have completed their Personal and Professional Growth Plans, should begin implementation of these plans.

Step No. 8: By January, 1982, all ministers in full connection should have completed their Personal and Professional Growth Plan and started implementation of their plans.

Step No. 9: January 1982 through June 1983, continuing consultations and monitoring of the implementation of the Plans by individual ministers, colleague groups, district coordinators, and district superintendents.
Dr. Mark Rouch, Director of the International Growth Center, Lake Junaluska, N. C., has helped us with the development of Part I.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ANNUAL CONFERENCE STRUCTURE

RECOMMENDATIONS

I. The Committee on Annual Conference Structure has received from the Annual Conference Council on Ministries a request to approve the consolidation of the CCOM organizational structure. The Committee on Annual Conference Structure has determined that the requested organizational structure changes are internal responsibilities of the CCOM and not the responsibility of the Committee on Annual Conference Structure.

The Committee on Annual Conference Structure therefore recommends the following deletions from the Annual Conference Standing Rules:

1. In Rule No. 7 delete the following: "and a young adult appointed by the Annual Conference Council on Adult Ministry."
2. In Rule No. 31 delete the following: "chairpersons of age-level and family council." Rewrite the Rule to read: "chairperson of youth council."
3. In Rule No. 31 deletion of the following *ex-officio* members with vote: "the chairperson of the Committee on Planning, Research and Coordination; and the chairperson of the Committee on Communications." Also in Rule No. 31 delete the following *ex-officio* member without vote: "the Coordinator of Communications."
4. In Rule No. 62, 62a, and 62b.
5. Delete Rule No. 73.

II. The Committee on Annual Conference Structure has received from the CCOM a request to create Annual Conference Committees for the concerns of EMLC and Hunger. The Committee on Annual Conference Structure does not concur.

1. We recommend that the CCOM Ethnic Minority Local Church Committee become an Annual Conference Committee and that it be given the responsibility for coordination and implementation of the '81-'84 mission priority developing and strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church:
 - (a) Twelve (12) members shall be from the Minority Church and four (4) members shall be from the Majority Church;
 - (b) Funds appropriated for the CCOM EMLC Committee will be redirected for the Annual Conference EMLC Committee;
 - (c) The Annual Conference EMLC Committee shall designate one of its members as a representative to the CCOM;
 - (d) The Committee shall provide liaison linkage with the CCOM EMLC coordinating Committee.
2. We recommend that Hunger concerns be placed as a subcommittee under the Board of Missions.

The Board of Diaconal Ministry, which is required by the Discipline, shall be organized and function as per paragraph 732 of the 1976 Discipline.

The membership shall include the following *ex-officio* members without vote: The Director of the Conference Council on Ministries and the Superintendent of the Methodist Camp. The membership shall also include, with vote, a District Superintendent appointed by the Bishop, and a member of the Annual Conference Board of Trustees.

Rule 7a to read:

The Conference Lay Leader shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference, upon nomination by the Board of Laity.

Rule 8 to read:

The Board of the Ordained Ministry, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of twenty-four (24) ministers. The Board shall be nominated by the Bishop and shall function in accordance with paragraph 721 of the 1976 Discipline.

Rule 10 to read:

The Board of Pensions, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of eighteen (18) elected members, nine (9) lay persons and nine (9) clergy persons. The Board shall be organized in accordance with paragraph 734 and paragraphs 1706 through 1708 of the 1976 Discipline.

Rule 11 to read

The Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference, which is required by the Discipline, shall be organized as per paragraphs 2410 through 2420 of the 1976 Discipline.
(editorial change)

Rule 30 to read:

The Council on Finance and Administration, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of eleven (11) elected members, five (5) clergy persons and six (6) lay persons. The Council shall function in accordance with paragraphs 706 through 726 of the 1976 Discipline.
(editorial change)

Rule 31 to read:

The Council on Ministries, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of the following: the presiding bishop; the district superintendents; the Conference Secretary; two (2) representatives of the conference youth organization; two (2) representatives of the Conference United Methodist Men; two (2) representatives of the Conference United Methodist Women, one of whom shall be the president; two (2) lay persons from each district; chairpersons of age-level and life councils. There shall be two (2) representatives, at least one (1) of whom shall be a lay person from each of the following boards: Church and Society; Education; Evangelism; Health and Welfare Ministries; Laity (one (1) of whom shall be the Conference Lay Leader); the Missionary Camp; Ordained Ministry (both shall be clergy persons and one (1) shall be the chairperson of Missions.

There shall be a Board of Higher Education and Campus ministry composed of twenty-four (24) elected members of whom sixteen (16) shall be lay persons and eight (8) shall be clergy persons. There shall be at least one (1) lay person from each district; there shall be no more than one (1) clergy person from a district at the time of election.

We recommend that the Standing Rules Committee make the necessary changes in the Standing Rules, allowing for the Chairperson of the Board to be a member of the Conference Council on Ministries, and we further recommend the Commission on Nomination make nominations to this Board at this annual session to be effective at the beginning of the Quadrennium.

There shall be one (1) representative from each of the following commissions: Christian Unity and Inter-religious Concerns; Enlistment for Church Occupations; Religion and Race; Status and Role of Women; Worship. The following shall be ex-officio members with vote: The Director of Pastoral Care and Counseling; the Chairperson of the Committee on Planning Resources; the Chairperson of the Committee on Coordination; and the Chairperson of the Committee on Communication. The following shall be ex-officio members without vote: The Conference Staff (salaried and volunteer); the Conference Treasurer; one representative from the Council on Finance and Administration; the Coordinator of Communications; The Editor of the South Carolina United Methodist Advocate and Administrator of Ministerial Affairs. The Council on Ministries shall function in accordance with paragraphs 726.1 and 726.10 of the 1976 Discipline.

a. *There may be an Executive Committee of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries composed of the Chairperson, the Vice Chairperson, the Secretary, the presiding Bishop, the District Superintendent, the Director of Conference Council on Ministries (who serves without vote), The Conference Lay Leader, and any additional members needed to achieve a balance of ministers and lay persons.*
(editorial and substance change)

Delete Rule 31b as an editorial correction of 1979 Conference Journal.

Rule 32 to read:

The Council on Youth Ministry, which is required by the Discipline, shall be organized by an action amenable to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries. The Council shall function as per paragraph 739 of the 1976 Discipline.

Rule 40 to read:

The Commission on Archives and History, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of the Conference Secretary, the Archivist of Claflin College, The Archivist of Wofford College, two (2) Lay persons and two (2) Clergy persons elected by the Annual Conference. The Commission shall function in accordance with Paragraph 735 of the 1976 Discipline.
(editorial change)

Rule 41 to read:

There shall be a Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns composed of eighteen (18) elected members of whom twelve (12) shall be lay persons and six (6) shall be clergy persons. There shall be one (1) lay person from each district; there shall be no more than one (1) clergy person from a district at the time of election.

Rule 43 to read:

The Commission on Equitable Salaries, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of twelve (12) elected members of whom six (6) shall be lay persons and six (6) shall be clergy persons. The Board of Missions, the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Board of Laity shall each designate one (1) of its members to serve ex-officio. The Commission shall function in accordance with paragraph 934 of the 1976 Discipline.
(editorial change)

Rule 45 to read:

The Commission on Religion and Race, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of fifteen (15) persons. Eight (8) members shall be persons from Ethnic Minorities, three (3) of whom shall be clergy persons and five (5) of whom shall be lay persons. Seven (7) members shall be persons of the Majority Membership, three (3) of whom shall be clergy persons and four (4) of whom shall be lay persons. This Commission shall be related to the General Commission on Religion and Race and shall function in accordance with paragraph 736 of the 1976 Discipline.

Rule 46 to read:

The Commission on the Status and Role of Women, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of eighteen (18) elected members, twelve (12) lay persons at least nine (9) of whom shall be women and six (6) clergy persons at least two (2) of whom shall be women. This Commission shall function in accordance with paragraph 737 of the 1976 Discipline and shall be related to the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women.
(editorial change)

Rule 63 to read:

There shall be a Committee on the Conference Journal composed of three (3) clerical members, six (6) lay members and the following ex-officio members: the Conference Secretary; the first Assistant Conference Secretary; the Editor of the South Carolina United Methodist Advocate; the Statistician.

- a. The Committee shall be responsible for the publication of the preconference report.
 1. All Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees shall submit their informational reports and recommendations to the Conference Secretary so that they may be ready for distribution, as the pre-conference report by mimeograph or offset print method, at least four weeks prior to Annual Conference. Excluded from this requirement are the Board of the Ordained Ministry, the Committee on Nominations, the Board of Diaconal Ministry and the Statistical Report.
 2. The Committee shall determine the dates and inform the Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees when reports shall be due in order to maintain the schedule for the pre-conference report.
 3. No report by any Board, Council, Commission or Committee shall be considered by the Annual Conference which has not been distributed at least four weeks prior to the Conference session. This rule does not apply to reports dependent on information obtainable only at a date shortly before or during the Annual Conference Session.
- b. The Committee shall cooperate with the Conference Secretary in determining the accuracy of the daily minutes. The Committee shall report concerning the accuracy of these minutes to the next Annual Conference session and shall note any discrepancies and/or exceptions and shall cause these to be noted in the Conference Journal next published.

- c. The Committee shall publish the South Carolina Conference Journal in one volume and shall have the Journal ready for distribution at least by October following the close of Annual Conference. The Journal shall include the information reports included in the pre-conference report, the deliberations of the Annual Conference, and the Statistical Report.
1. The Chairperson of the Committee, the Secretary of the Committee and the Secretary of the Annual Conference shall edit the Conference Journal.
 2. The Committee shall let the contract for the printing of the Conference Journal, and shall provide for the printing at least one year in advance.
 3. The Committee shall list in the Conference Journal names of the Officers of the South Carolina Methodist Conference Credit Union and may include a brief resume of its annual report, if provided by the Credit Union.
- d. The Committee shall be responsible for the publication of the Volume entitled "United Methodist Ministers in South Carolina," which shall be printed every five years, and which shall feature biographical sketches and pictures of all the Ministers of the South Carolina Conference.

Rule 64 to read:

The Committee on Disability, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of a majority of two (2) representatives of the Board of the Ordained Ministry, the Chairperson and Secretary of the Board of Pensions and a district superintendent appointed by the Bishop. The Committee shall function as per paragraph 740 of the 1976 Discipline.

Rule 65 to read:

The Committee on District Superintendency in each district, which is required by the Discipline, shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations, with two members nominated by the District Superintendent, and elected by the Annual Conference and shall function as per paragraph 758 of the 1976 Discipline.
(editorial change)

Rule 66 to read:

The Committee on Episcopacy, which is required by the Discipline, shall be organized and function as per paragraph 733 of the 1976 Discipline.
(editorial change)

Rule 70 to read:

The Committee on Investigation, which is required by the Discipline, shall be nominated by the presiding bishop and composed of five (5) itinerant elders and five (5) reserves as per paragraph 2521 of the 1976 Discipline.
(editorial change)

Delete the parenthetical sentence which follows Rule 85 and precedes Rule 90. Replace this sentence with the following: Rules which are printed in italics are agencies which are required by the Discipline and which are not subject to the vote of The Annual Conference.

Rule 120:

Delete the parenthetical phrase which reads "(except as provided in Rule 136)"

Delete Rule 136

Rules 137-142 to be renumbered to read 136-141.

At the 1979 session of the South Carolina Annual Conference, the presiding officer ruled that material from the Discipline cannot be included in the Standing Rules of the Conference. Subsequently, the Annual Conference requested a declaratory decision from the Judicial Council in this regard. The Committee on Standing Rules is pleased that the Judicial Council has ruled in the Committee's favor, thus allowing the South Carolina Annual Conference to include material from the Discipline in its Standing Rules. The entire text of the Judicial Council decision is as follows:

JUDICIAL COUNCIL DECISION

Decision No. 476 In Re: Constitutionality of an Annual Conference voting to include parts of the Discipline in its own Standing Rules.

DIGEST: An Annual Conference may include quotations or citations from the Discipline in its own Standing Rules. An Annual Conference does not have the prerogative to vote to approve, disapprove or modify actions of the General Conference.

JURISDICTION: The Judicial Council has jurisdiction under Par. 2515 of the Discipline.

STATEMENT OF FACTS: The South Carolina Annual Conference has included several quotations from the Discipline within its Standing Rules. In the 1978 session an oral inquiry was made to the Presiding Bishop asking:

Does the Annual Conference have authority to adopt and include in its Standing Rules as action or information any mandatory legislation adopted by the General Conference and included in the 1976 Discipline of the Church?

The Bishop ruled that the Annual Conference does not have such authority. In the 1979 session of the Conference the Committee on Standing Rules presented the same Rules for action. Upon appeal to the chair, the Bishop reminded the Conference of his ruling in 1978 and then requested the Conference to affirm or deny his previous ruling. The Conference voted to sustain the Bishop's ruling.

Subsequently the Chairman of the Committee on Standing Rules moved that the South Carolina Annual Conference seek a declaratory decision from the Judicial Council "as to the legality of including in the Standing Rules . . . a rule which has already been adopted by the General Conference and is included in the Discipline . . ."

The Conference approved the motion and requested the decision.

The request was filed with the Judicial Council during the 1980 General Conference Session.

ANALYSIS: Par. 702.1 authorizes the Annual Conference to adopt rules and regulations not in conflict with the Discipline. There is no prohibition against including quotations from the Discipline in Annual Conference rules and regulations. Simple citations might accomplish the same effect without the unnecessary duplication, but Annual Conferences, Boards and Agencies may quote the Discipline to make more clear its obligations and procedures and insure compliance with the actions of the General Conference. Each Annual Conference votes on its own rules. However, the vote on inclusion of required regulations previously adopted by the General Conference does not constitute a legal vote of acceptance or rejection of that material. Quotations from the Discipline may be included for purposes of information, interpretation and clarification. Annual Conferences may present petitions to the General Conference and may vote upon Constitutional amendments referred to them by the General Conference. However, Annual Conferences do not have the prerogative to vote to approve, disapprove or modify General Conference action. Even so, an Annual Conference may include in its own rules quotations from the Discipline with the understanding that they do not vote on the essence of such quotation. When quotations are included they should be exact and with proper designation as to source.

DECISION: An Annual Conference may include quotations or citations from the Discipline in its own Standing Rules. An Annual Conference does not have the prerogative to vote to approve, disapprove or modify actions of the General Conference.

Report No. III

- A. We recommend a salary of \$ 23,458 for each district superintendent for the year 1981.
- B. The Council on Finance and Administration of the South Carolina Annual Conference, The United Methodist Church, hereby designates up to 15 percent (\$3,518.70) of the District Superintendent's salary for the year 1981 as allocated for parsonage utilities and maintenance, not including maid service and such expenses as paid by the district.
- C. Each district superintendent is also to have available up to \$3,000 for travel in his district, \$ 3,325 for travel outside of his district (all travel expenses to be vouchered) and one-half the cost of social security.
- D. Each District Board of Trustees shall elect a treasurer from the elected trustees of said district. The treasurer of the Board of Trustees shall administer all funds for the District Parsonage Fund, writing all vouchers only for parsonage payments, repairs, insurance and furnishings and not to include any utility payments. The moving expenses of an incoming district superintendent may also be paid from the District Parsonage Fund, not to include more than \$50 packing expenses. The treasurer of the District Board of Trustees shall report to his board on all receipts and expenditures of the District Parsonage Fund.

Report No. VI

A. Special Recommendations.

1. We recommend that the District Superintendents and the District Board of Laity be allowed to make adjustments in the apportioned salary items (Episcopal Fund, District Superintendents' Salary Fund, Equitable Salary Fund, Pension Fund and Conference Insurance Fund) and in World Service and Conference Benevolences. However, no changes in the district totals may be made.

2. In view of the fact that the conference treasurer credits the accounts of boards, commissions and agencies as money is received, if any board, commission or agency has insufficient funds available to meet current expenses, the Council on Finance and Administration is hereby authorized to lend funds from the Conference Contingency Reserve Fund to said board, commission or agency provided that adequate funds shall be available within the same conference fiscal year to pay off the loan.
 3. All boards, commissions and committees receiving funds from the conference treasurer shall submit with each voucher adequate supporting data.
 4. Boards, agencies and conference institutions which are allowed to withdraw lump sums from the conference treasurer shall submit an audit by a certified public accountant to the Council on Finance and Administration.
 5. It is the recommendation of the Council on Finance and Administration that all boards, commissions and agencies of the conference pay standard rate of 20¢ a mile when a representative travels on church business, with an effort being made toward car pooling while on such trips, and that other expenses be paid; however, that the maximum paid to such a person for meals shall be \$2.50 for breakfast, \$3.50 for lunch and \$4.50 for the evening meal.
 6. We recommend that each church place in its budget an adequate amount to subscribe to the Advocate all-family plan and that this money be paid directly to The Advocate on at least a quarterly basis.
 7. We recommend that all churches pay an amount equal to one-half of the Social Security cost of the pastor or pastors of the charge.
 8. The balance held by each board, committee, commission or agency on the books of the conference treasurer shall be carried forward from one year to the next and this amount shall be taken into consideration in the subsequent budget request.
 9. We recommend that the Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration be authorized to grant amounts up to \$7,500.00 from the Conference Contingency Reserve Fund to meet any individual emergency or unanticipated need.
 10. We recommend that when The Advocate is instructed by Annual Conference to publish items, the Conference Treasurer is hereby directed to pay exceptional publication expenses from the Conference Expense Fund.
 11. We recommend that if in the opinion of the Episcopal Housing Committee and the then presiding bishop it is desirable and practical to furnish the bishop with a parsonage, that the Episcopal Housing Committee be authorized to use up to \$125,000 from the Conference Contingency Reserve Fund to purchase in the name of the Annual Conference Board of Trustees a suitable residence.
 12. We recommend that "average net funds" as used in this report shall mean for each church the four year average of net funds for the years 1976, 1977, 1978 and 1979. When a church has declined in net funds for two consecutive years "average net funds" shall mean the average of the last two years only.
 13. The calculation of "net funds" for the current year (1980) shall be as in previous years lines 35, 36 and 39 through 42 of Table II, plus the giving of the church to the funds for which the church is given a specified apportionment or asking.
 14. We recommend that each charge pay at least \$300 annually for the continuing education of the pastor.
 15. The Council on Finance and Administration shall include in its written report to the 1981 session of the Annual Conference the following:
 - (a) A statement of the purpose of the Contingency Reserve Fund.
 - (b) A recommendation outlining the use of the Contingency Reserve Fund between Annual Conference sessions, and
 - (c) A statement of policy concerning the use of interest income accrued from balances on hand in the various Annual Conference funds.
- B. We nominate Thad W. Herbert as conference treasurer statistician for the 1981-1984 quadrennium.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

REPORT NO. VII

The Trustees of the South Carolina United Methodist ADVOCATE, acting within their legal authority, decided on March 15, 1980, to sell that piece of property known as "1420 Lady Street" in Columbia, South Carolina. Because the offices of the Annual Conference are housed in this building, this decision necessitated the prompt development of long-range plans to house these offices. Consequently, the Council on Finance and Administration presents the following recommendations to the 1980 session of the South Carolina Annual Conference:

RECOMMENDATION ONE:

Annual Conference empowers the Council on Finance and Administration to act as its legal agent in order to accomplish the following:

- Council on Finance and Administration shall negotiate with the Board of Trustees of Columbia College in order to purchase a piece of property near the college campus on which a building may be erected to house the Annual Conference offices.
- Council on Finance and Administration will place the title of this purchased property in the name of the Board of Trustees of the South Carolina Annual Conference for the benefit of the Annual Conference.
- Council on Finance and Administration shall be responsible for the design and construction of a building suitable to house the Annual Conference offices.
- Upon completion of the building, Council on Finance and Administration will act on behalf of the South Carolina Annual Conference and the Board of Trustees of the South Carolina Annual Conference in the administration of the building.

RECOMMENDATION TWO:

Annual Conference authorizes Council on Finance and Administration to spend up to \$750,000.00 in order to purchase the property and to contract for the design and construction of the proposed building to house the Annual Conference offices. Up to \$380,000.00 may be used from the Conference Contingency Reserve Fund toward the total cost of the proposed office building. The remainder of the cost may be obtained by a mortgage placed upon the property. The Board of Trustees of the South Carolina Annual Conference is directed to cooperate with the Council on Finance and Administration in the proper negotiation of this anticipated loan, and the Board of Trustees is authorized to place a mortgage on this property for a period not to exceed fifteen years. Repayment of this loan shall be provided for in the rental fees normally budgeted by the Annual Conference offices.

RECOMMENDATION THREE:

The bishop is requested to appoint a COMMITTEE ON EQUITY to determine whether, if any, equity the Annual Conference has in the proceeds of the sale of the "1420 Lady Street" property. The Committee is to be composed of five persons, three of whom shall be lay persons, and the Committee is authorized to receive not more than \$1,500.00 from the Conference Contingency Reserve Fund to defray its expenses. If the Annual Conference receives funds from the sale of "1420 Lady Street" these funds will be applied to reduce the amount of the loan on the new building.

REPORT of the

STUDY COMMITTEE ON SPECIAL OFFERINGS

AUTHORIZATION

At the Annual Conference of South Carolina, United Methodist Church, 1979, the following motion was made and is recorded on pages 113-114 of the South Carolina Conference Journal:

Motion—Mr. Mitchell Reames, Central Church, Florence, made the following motion: "I move that the Bishop appoint a broad-based committee, representative of the entire Church, to make a study and report to the next Annual Conference on what appropriate missional priorities of the Conference should be relative to special offerings currently included in Section 2 of the Report of the Council on Finance and Administration; and furthermore, that no person serve on the study committee who is a member of any Board or Agency which receives funds from the special offerings; and meanwhile, amend Report No. 1, Section 2c, so that

First Sunday Church School offerings be designated for the two (2) Methodist Homes in fiscal 1980, proportionately as recommended in that same report, to temporarily assist in relieving the financial crisis facing The Orangeburg Home in its current operating budget."

Motion to Divide the Question—The Rev. Chad Davis made a motion to divide the question so as to vote separately on the creation of a Study Committee and the designation of First Sunday Church School offerings for the Methodist Homes. The motion was approved.

Point of Order—The Rev. Harry R. Mays raised a Point of Order regarding this Reames motion (Part A) stating that no method of funding was provided for the Study Committee's work.

Amendment to Reames Motion A—The Rev. Chad Davis moved that Part A of Reames Motion be amended to include \$1,500.00 from the Conference Reserve Fund to cover the cost of the Study Committee's work. The motion passed. On vote, the Reames Motion, as amended, was passed.

Substitute for Reames Motion Part B—The Rev. Bill Kinnett moved to substitute for the Reames Motion Part B an amendment to Report No. 1, item 2, "Special Days", the following: "Under Methodist Home, Greenwood, (a) Free-will offering, January 24, 1980; (b) Church School Offering, each First Sunday of the month. Under Methodist Home, Orangeburg, (a) Free-will offering, November 23, 1980; (b) Church School Offering, each First Sunday of the month."

Call for the Previous Question—The Previous Question was called.

Motion Adopted—On vote the call for the Previous Question was approved. The Kinnett Substitute Motion prevailed on vote and became the main Motion replacing Part B of the Reames Motion. On Vote the Main Motion was adopted.

To comply with this motion, Bishop Edward L. Tullis, after consultation with his cabinet invited fourteen (14) persons, representing each of the districts of the Conference, to serve on this committee. Eleven (11) persons were able to accept. They are: Ms. Betty Ashley, Seneca; Mrs. Tillie Dunstan, North Charleston; Mrs. Miriam Alewine, Greenwood; Mrs. Gladys Hunsberger, Parris Island; Mr. J. W. Wingate, Darlington; Mr. Lawrence E. Stroud, Great Falls; Mr. John Redmond, Greenville; Mrs. J. W. Harrington, Florence; the Rev. John Boone, Orangeburg; the Rev. Ray Hook, West Columbia; the Rev. Angelin Wallace, John's Island.

Bishop Tullis' letter dated February 7, 1980, to each person asked to serve on this committee read, in part:

"The last session of the Annual Conference authorized a committee to study special offerings related to Report No. 1, Section 2-c, of the report of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration. . . . "Please study carefully the authorization for your committee found on pages 113, 114 of the 1979 South Carolina Conference Journal. The action begins near the bottom of page 113, beginning with "Motion . . . Mr. Mitchell Reames . . ." and ends on page 114, "Motion adopted." You will need to study the report of the Council on Finance and Administration, page 163 and following in the same Journal."

ORGANIZATION

On February 23, 1980, this committee met at Washington Street United Methodist Church in Columbia, with the Rev. George Watson as our convener. After a discussion of our duties as a Study Committee on Special Offerings as stated in the motion above and as outlined in the Bishop's letter, the following officers were elected: Mrs. Miriam Alewine, chairperson; John Redmond, vice chairperson; Ms. Betty Ashley, secretary.

The chairperson was charged with contacting each institution mentioned in Report No. 1, Section 2, of the Council on Finance and Administration (page 171, South Carolina Conference Journal, 1979), and to secure written data concerning local church support to each institution for at least the past quadrennium.

The chairperson appointed the following sub-committees to visit each institution as a follow-up on written reports expected:

Orangeburg Methodist Home: Mrs. Gladys Hunsberger, Mrs. Tillie Dunstan
Greenwood Methodist Home: John Redmond, Mrs. Miriam Alewine.
Golden Cross: Ms. Betty Ashley
Junaluska Advancement Fund: the Rev. John Boone, the Rev. Angelin Wallace
Epworth Children's Home: Lawrence Stroud, the Rev. Ray Hook, J. W. Harrington, J. W. Wingate

The entire committee was concerned that our time to do our research was short. We were to present to Annual Conference, 1980, a report of our study, but each of us was determined to give of their time unstintingly in order to report our findings at this early date. We were aware of how very important this study could be.

RESEARCH

After a month of numerous telephone calls, letters, visits to the institution, and committee meetings, all church members of this Study Committee on Special Offerings met again at Washington Street United Methodist Church, Columbia, on March 22, 1979. Each sub-committee reported on their research and visits, and presented written reports of their findings and recommendations.

We will present our findings singly for each area of special study to which we are assigned, and in the order that they appear in Report No. 1, Section 2c of the Council on Finance and Administration, South Carolina Conference Journal 1979, page 77.

EPWORTH CHILDREN'S HOME

NOTE: Report No. 1, Section 2c states Church School Offering, First Sunday of each month. Our research indicated some churches observe fourth Sundays each month. We do not wish to confuse this issue, so we have stated any Sunday local church offering.

It is our considered opinion that these offerings be continued. They have been effective in every way and fill needs for our children at Epworth. Epworth enjoys many years of good management and foresightedness in the use of their income in all phases of their work. The special offerings from each local church make possible programs for the children that would not be possible otherwise. This Study Committee on Special Offerings unanimously recommends the special offerings to Epworth Children's Home continue to be observed by the local churches of our Conference.

JUNALUSKA ADVANCEMENT FUND

In Report No. 1, Section 2c of the Council on Finance and Administration, we recommended that \$2.00 per church member for the quadrennium be taken as a special offering in each local church. (No date specified)

If our Conference had fulfilled this recommendation we would have paid the Junaluska Advancement Fund a total for the quadrennium of \$473,953. According to our research and our conversation with Dr. Melvin Harbin, Director, South Carolina Conference, through January, 1980, only sixteen (16) percent of this amount, or \$75,925, had been paid.

We learned that the facilities of Junaluska are used most by the Western North Carolina Conference; South Carolina ranks second in the use of Junaluska facilities. We place fifteen (15) out of sixteen (16) conferences in the Southeastern Jurisdiction in our contributions to Junaluska. As a Committee we were saddened by this. We felt that Junaluska has not been properly presented to the congregations and that this special offering has not been promoted.

We learned, too, during our study, that there have been misunderstandings between Junaluska and some of our churches. These were group meetings were concerned, and the committee has given this information to Dr. Harbin in the hopes of correcting these situations. We have been assured that every effort will be made on the part of the staff of Junaluska to see that these situations do not re-occur. Goodwill between Junaluska and the churches of South Carolina is essential, and both the staff of Junaluska and the Methodists of South Carolina must work together.

This Study Committee understands that new requests for funds may be made for the Junaluska Advancement Fund for the next quadrennium. This committee feels that if the Conference accepts the recommendation of such an offering the Methodist South Carolina should make every effort to fulfill such a commitment.

GREENWOOD METHODIST HOME

The Greenwood Methodist Home is a skilled nursing facility opened in 1971. As we studied the Support Fund for the Greenwood Methodist Home which is made up of offerings listed above, we secured an Income and Expense Analysis for a four-year period beginning with calendar year 1976. The Conference provided \$158,430.68 through special offerings over this four-year period for patient care; Greenwood Methodist Home extended a total of \$236,813.86 to patients unable to pay the full cost of their care. The difference in the offerings provided by our churches and the expenses the Greenwood Methodist Home had to supply was \$78,383.18. This difference of more than \$78,000.00 came from the Home's Permanent Endowment Fund.

This specific example may make the problem even clearer: In one church a budgeted amount of \$1,200 is given annually to Greenwood Methodist Home; members of this church who are residents of Greenwood Methodist Home receive from the Support Fund much more than that amount per month. In the Anderson District during 1979 the offerings fell short almost \$7,000 of funds needed for patient care of members from that district. Greenwood District's giving was almost \$18,000 short of funds needed for members from Greenwood District.

We are not suggesting that each church or each district supplement the cost of care for each member, but we feel if South Carolina Methodists are made aware of this, they will want to do something about it.

The Support Fund giving must be increased or persons will have to be turned away unless they can pay their own way, or can qualify for Medicaid assistance.

ORANGEBURG METHODIST HOME

The Orangeburg Methodist Home began as a home for the aging about twenty-six years ago, but now extends both primary and intermediate nursing care to its residents.

Free-will offerings from churches in our Conference total about 3.8% of the Orangeburg Home budget.

In its twenty-six years, Orangeburg Methodist Home has had many demands made upon it because it was the only Methodist facility of its kind in South Carolina. The Home has met those demands, and is still, but the struggle is harder than ever because of lack of funds. Never debt free in those twenty-six years, there is still outstanding a debt of \$750,000. All building plans have stopped because of this, but building plans need desperately to be re-activated.

Because of lack of funds, in February, 1979, the decision had to be made to admit only persons who could pay their full expense because the support fund (our special offerings) were in serious decline. One resident was forced to move to a much smaller accommodation because he was not able to pay for the room he had been living in for some time. His retirement check, due to inflation, was no longer adequate. One of the goals of the Orangeburg Home is to strive for the day all residents will have equal facilities, no matter what their financial status. If Medicare/Medicaid were lost, it would be a serious blow.

Both Greenwood and Orangeburg Methodist Homes have their special, individual needs, and this Study Committee on Special Offerings has been made aware of these needs through our research and visitation.

First, these are not just buildings; they are people - individuals - who live in these buildings; and these buildings bear our name - yours and mine - METHODIST.

Long, long years ago we helped solve our problems at Epworth through the establishment of special offerings. It is still working because Methodist Christians cared.

This committee believes if South Carolina Methodists know about the financial problems of our Methodist Homes, we can and will solve those, too.

Time is of the essence here. We need immediate action by this body. We have alerted the Council on Finance and Administration that as a study committee we are recommending a two (2%) percent line item in the apportionments of the South Carolina United Methodist Church, to be divided between the Orangeburg and the Greenwood Methodist Homes on a two to one ratio, respectively. If we are to claim these two homes as Methodist, we must furnish funds to allow them to fulfill the ministry for which they were established.

We are happy to report that Golden Cross is making vital contributions to the life of our Church and its ministers. We recommend the continuation of a free-will offering taken in our local churches on a specific Sunday during the year.

SUMMARY

Because it is impossible to incorporate into this report all that we researched in each of these areas of study, we are attaching, in some instances, copies of reports given to us. The directors of each of the Methodist Homes, Epworth Children's Home, Junaluska Advancement Fund, Mr. Thad Herbert and his staff were most cooperative and we are indebted to them for both their written reports and their time when they were visited. Our special thanks to the Rev. Harry R. Mays, president, Conference Council on Finance and Administration, whose patience was inexhaustible as we came on him for procedural and background information concerning finances within our Conference.

We urge LAY DELEGATES to report to the local church actions taken by the Conference. Remind your minister and offer to see that your church follows through on actions taken here. Your minister is only one person, and that local church is the one you are here too.

THE ADVOCATE prints news of Annual Conference decisions, and since the Journals cannot be printed the instant Conference adjourns, we urge LAY DELEGATES to secure a copy of THE ADVOCATE and keep the local church informed, not only immediately following Conference, but all during the year.

We have presented these special offerings to you as they are listed in our 1980 Conference Journal. This Study Committee on Special Offerings spent a great deal of time compiling and digesting information on each of these offerings, and this report will not be complete until we list them according to priority as we see them:

- No. 1 - The Orangeburg Methodist Home. Our giving for the Support Fund increased from ten (10%) percent to 3.8% over the past ten years. This means our giving through special offerings is much less than adequate. It is imperative that the Methodists of South Carolina take immediate action to remedy this situation.
- No. 2 - The Greenwood Methodist Home. Here, too, support fund giving falls short of the needs and has to be supplemented from their Permanent Endowment Fund.
- No. 3 - Epworth Children's Home. Our special offerings on specific days are continuing to meet the needs.
- No. 4 - Golden Cross. Our offerings seem adequate and no request for more funds seem necessary.
- No. 5 - Junaluska Advancement Fund. Local Church promotion of this is recommended.

This Study Committee on Special Offerings most urgently requests that the South Carolina Annual Conference of 1980 accept our recommendation of a two (2%) percent line item in the apportionments of the South Carolina United Methodist Church, to be divided between the Orangeburg and the Greenwood Methodist Homes on a two to one ratio, respectively.

THE COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

REPORT NO. 1

Report No. 1 of the Commission on Equitable Salaries is informational in nature. It is intended to create an awareness that the South Carolina Conference, through this commission, extends salary support to churches other than "minimum" salary situations. This conference is providing mission and ministry for the support of pastors who are

1. Church Extension
 - a. new congregations
 - b. restructured charge lines
2. Missional or engulfed situations
3. Minimum salary appointments
4. Ethnic Minority Discipleship program (ends in 1984)
5. Cooperative Ministries

The following is a summary of the number of churches receiving support in each of the foregoing categories and the totals granted for each in 1980:

1. Church Extension	6 churches	\$ 43,890.24
2. Missional or engulfed	10 churches	26,487.00
3. Minimum salary	59 churches charges	139,727.97
4. Ethnic Minority Discipleship Program	14 charges	9,410.00
5. Cooperative Ministries	1 church	500.00

Appreciation is expressed to those churches who have raised their local salary support and are not making a request for additional funds from the South Carolina Conference.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

REPORT NO. 2

Whereas, the DISCIPLINE of 1976, paragraph 934, provides for fixing an Equitable Salary System by the Annual Conference, therefore be it resolved: That the South Carolina Annual Conference fix an equitable salaries system according to the following scale to become effective on January 1, 1981 and continue until changed by this Annual Conference. Salary changes have been based upon Seventy percent (70%) of the 1980 average salary for Effective Members of Annual Conference. Other categories are based upon a percentage of the effective ministers calculated figure.

The Commission on Equitable Salaries looking to the future of South Carolina United Methodism recommends the following salary scale which will enable all churches and pastors to easily ascertain the Equitable Salaries schedule:

- A. 1. The total equitable compensation for Effective Members of the Annual Conference will be \$12,750.
2. The total equitable compensation for Probationary Members (FULL TIME)—will be \$11,475.
3. The total equitable compensation for Probationary Members (NOT FULL TIME)—will be \$9,565.
4. The total equitable compensation for Associate Members will be \$11,475.
5. The total equitable compensation for Local Pastors—(FULL TIME)—will be \$10,200.

6. The total equitable compensation for Student Local Pastors will be \$8,925.
7. The Commission shall pay one-half (1/2) of the Social Security Taxes on the Salary paid by the Commission on the above six (6) categories.

B. Longevity Merit Income

A pastor who has served ably for fifteen (15) or more years in full time service—(10) of which have been in the South Carolina Conference, shall receive \$600 above the minimum base.

C. The District Superintendent shall recommend the adjusted amounts which must be approved by the Commission on Equitable Salaries before payment can be made. Any person shall be considered a student pastor if he is enrolled in an accredited college or seminary for a degree.

This recommendation from the District Superintendent shall be accompanied by a form provided by the Equitable Salaries Commission and completed by the pastor, the Pastor—Parish Relations Committee and the District Superintendent indicating income from all sources.

D. Be it resolved that the Annual Conference through its Equitable Salaries Fund shall not pay in excess of thirty-five percent (35%) of the above amounts. The churches shall be encouraged to pay the other sixty-five percent (65%), but this resolution will not hinder the Board of Missions and Church Extension or other agencies of the church from making appropriations from its discretionary fund. Exception to this resolution will be allowed under the following conditions:

- (a) The church must meet all the requirements of the Equitable Salaries Commission.
- (b) The Administrative Board of the said church must declare in writing to the District Superintendent that the above requirement having been met, it will not pay the sixty-five percent (65%).
- (c) The District Superintendent and the Cabinet must recommend this exception unanimously.
- (d) **TO BE GRANTED AN EXCEPTION, ALL ABOVE REQUIREMENTS MUST BE MET.**
- (e) Be it further resolved that \$2,000 be set aside as a discretionary fund to be administered by the Commission on Equitable Salaries on application of the District Superintendent.
- (f) Equitable Salaries Funds shall be disbursed monthly, and shall be given to the pastor involved.

E. Cooperative Parish Ministries

Directors or Coordinators of Cooperative Parish ministries which have been approved by the Board of Missions, and application made by the District Superintendent to the Commission on Equitable Salaries by January 1 preceding the appointment, June of the same year may be eligible for funds not to exceed \$7,000. No pastor shall be eligible to receive funds unless the charge he/she serves agrees in writing to release him/her for these added duties; and no equitable salary grant will be made to a pastor making more than \$15,000.

F. Missional Situations

Missional situations are when areas—rural, inner city, transitional or engulfed neighborhoods, demand an effective ministry but are not capable of providing such ministries without Equitable Salary assistance. To be eligible for assistance the appropriate committee of the Board of Missions must verify that it is indeed an engulfed situation. Assistance will decrease by twenty-five percent (25%) each year over four (4) years of the initial request. The pastor's salary may be increased beyond the cost of living if all apportionments are paid in full.

EQUITABLE SALARIES FOR NEWLY SET-UP WORK

Notes:

1. In all cases where a new work is being considered, the District Superintendents shall notify the Commission on Equitable Salaries by January 1 preceding the Annual Conference session that the work is to be effected; providing the projected cost to the Equitable Salary Commission.
2. This schedule applies to pastors who are on trial or in full connection and who have had a minimum of four (4) full years of service prior to this appointment.

1st Year: Note: First full year of church's organization. The Equitable Salary may be according to the pastor's category.

Special Note: The District Superintendent may apply to the Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions for a salary that is more in keeping with the amount received by this pastor in his previous appointment.

2nd Year: The grant depends on amount received first year. At the beginning of the second year, the newly established church must assume one-fourth of the pastor's salary.

3rd Year: The grant for the third year depends on amount received second year. At the beginning of the third year, the newly established church must assume one-half of the pastor's salary.

4th Year: The grant for the fourth year depends upon the amount received the third year. At the beginning of the fourth year, the newly established church must assume three-fourths of the pastor's salary.

- Notes:**
1. Except where the administrators of this salary schedule feel an extreme case of hardship exists, no salary funds will be granted to a church after the fourth full year.
 2. A "new church" may be interpreted to mean an "engulfed" situation or a relocation project, if it is determined to be a church extension responsibility by the Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions. The District Superintendent must provide a substantiating statement from the Conference Board of Missions that the engulfed situation is in reality an engulfed situation.
 3. The local church shares of this salary schedule is interpreted to mean—all sources of income from the local church.
 4. These figures are minimum and any amount of funds from any source in any guise added to these figures will be subtracted from the Conference support given.
 5. In all cases where a newly set-up work is attached to an existing charge, these become charge figures.

G. If the Bishop and Cabinet find it necessary to make an appointment requiring Equitable compensation supplement beyond the regular schedule, it may be granted upon Cabinet request for a term not to exceed three years in any given situation, and Equitable Salaries shall not pay in excess of thirty-five percent (35%) of total compensation in any instance.

H. The Equitable Salaries Commission recommends that the balance of the \$60,000 (\$38,000-\$40,000) of the Equitable Salaries reserve be designated in 1980 for salary supplement for Ethnic Minority Local Church Empowerment be extended; that the monies be disbursed over a period ending December 31, 1984, and that no local church or charge receive more than \$800 in any one year, and then only if this amount is matched dollar for dollar, and that the pastors receiving said supplement be in the effective relationship and a resident pastor of the church or charge served.

I. The Commission on Equitable Salaries requests that the South Carolina Conference designate fifteen percent (15%) (or actual expenses) of monies funded by this commission as parsonage allowance. This request is made to satisfy the requirements of the Internal Revenue Service.

J. The Commission on Equitable Salaries recommends that two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.00) of the funds in the Equitable Salaries account be designated as "reserve", and that it be reported accordingly, as a "reserve", and not as funds available for granting current equitable salary assistance.

Travel Grant: The Commission on Equitable Salaries requests that \$25,000 be designated for travel grants to equitable salary recipients. Grants will be made to pastors serving appointments with heavy travel on a formula developed by the Equitable Salary Commission.

The Commission on Equitable Salaries recommends that the equitable salaries for effective members of the Conference (under 15 years) be indexed to the average salary package which includes salary, amount designated for utilities, travel and amount designated for Social Security of all effective members of the Conference during 1980, and we recommend that it be indexed at seventy percent (70%) of the Annual Conference salary of the preceding year and that the resulting number be rounded to the nearest \$50.00.

- M. Continuing Education Support
Up to 70% of the amount paid by the Local Church shall be provided for the support of the Minister's Continuing Education program.

THE COMMISSION ON GROUP LIFE AND HOSPITAL INSURANCE

REPORT NO. 1

The insurance program of the South Carolina Conference is designed to provide the ministerial members of the Conference and their dependents a comprehensive plan for major medical and life insurance. The program is administered through a group plan underwritten by The Prudential Insurance Company of America and supervised by the Commission on Insurance. Eligible for coverage under the program are ministerial members of the Conference in the following categories:

- (1) those fully employed by a church either in the effective relationship, probationary membership, associate membership, or full time lay pastors
- (2) certified candidates for ministry in the last two years of seminary
- (3) ministers who are full time employees of Conference boards, agencies, or institutions
- (4) all district superintendents
- (5) student pastors who are serving work within the boundaries of the Conference

Certain lay persons who are full time employees of the Conference are also granted coverage. In seeking coverage, an applicant is required to give proof of insurability. Eligibility requirements are set forth in a guidebook, YOUR GROUP INSURANCE PLAN, published by the Commission. This guidebook is available free of charge from the Office of Ministerial Affairs, P. O. Box 11284, Columbia, South Carolina 29211.

Since an objective of the insurance program is to provide a plan of comprehensive insurance coverage, the requirement is made that all participants in the program enroll for both life insurance and major medical insurance.

This insurance program is continuously reviewed and analyzed by the Commission on Insurance, the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs, and the Prudential Insurance Company of America. Coverage is reviewed periodically in order to keep the program strong and in order to provide coverage that is adequate to meet the financial demands of a changing economy.

REPORT NO. 2

LIFE INSURANCE BENEFITS

The Conference Insurance Program provides the following coverage under its Group Life Insurance Policy:

The reductions in the amount of insurance coverage shown in the "Schedule of Amounts" above will be made on the November 2nd coinciding with or next following the attainment of age 50 or 60. However, in no event will an employee's total amount of insurance be less than his accumulated paid-up insurance.

Survivor benefit: There will be a survivor benefit of \$200 per month payable to the surviving spouse and or children of a participant upon his/her death. The surviving spouse will receive \$200 per month until his/her death, remarriage, or attainment of age 62. Upon the death, remarriage, or attainment of age 62 by the surviving spouse, payments will continue to the dependent children of the deceased participants until the youngest unmarried dependent child reaches age 21. If there is no surviving spouse, payments will be made to the children of the deceased until the youngest unmarried child reaches age 21.

REPORT NO. 3

MAJOR MEDICAL INSURANCE BENEFITS

The major medical plan of the Conference Insurance Program provides benefits for reasonable and customary charges incurred by the insured, or a covered dependent while receiving hospital services, treatments and supplies ordered by a physician. After a \$150 annual deductible, the plan provides for payment of 80% of the first \$2,000 of eligible expenses and 100% of all other eligible expenses over \$2,000.00 up to an unlimited maximum.

The coverage for retired participants is reduced to a lifetime maximum of \$25,000 for the insured and each eligible dependent.

Other details of the major medical expense plan are contained in the guidelines "Your Group Insurance Plan".

REPORT NO. 4

MEDICARE BENEFITS

Medicare is a Federal health insurance plan, administered under the Social Security Act, for the benefit of persons 65 years of age or older. The Medicare Program consists of two parts: (a) hospital insurance, designed to pay for physicians' services and related medical services. Under terms of the Medicare Program, hospital insurance (part a) is provided for all persons under the plan. The medical insurance (part b) is an optional feature for which the insured pays a stated monthly premium.

The Conference Insurance Program is so designed that it provides certain benefits which begin at the point where Medicare coverage terminates, and, in addition, make provision for some benefits not covered by Medicare at all. Therefore, it is required that all ministers 65 or over, or whose wives are 65 or over, will enroll in the health insurance plan provided by Medicare. Further, it is expected that those eligible for Medicare will enroll in the full program (part a and part b) in order to derive the maximum benefit afforded by Medicare.

Inasmuch as insurance coverage for eligible retirees is provided for them by the Conference without cost to the insured, it is imperative that all retirees seek Medicare coverage upon attaining age of 65. All persons who are or could be covered under Medicare should be absolutely positive that the hospital they are entering is one which participates in the Medicare program. Our plan does not pay any benefits which are not covered by Medicare.

For active enrollants and their eligible dependents, the Medicare Supplement of the Annual Conference insurance program shall provide the Benefit Reduction approach in the calculation of claims that will enable the participants to receive the same level of benefits as if they were under age 65. This assumes that the active age 65 and over enrollant will be enrolled in Medicare parts (a) and (b) upon reaching the age of eligibility.

A handbook explaining the provisions of Medicare is available from any district office of the Social Security Administration.

REPORT NO. 5

ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES

Billing: The Administrator of Ministerial Affairs sends a quarterly statement to every one enrolled in the Conference Insurance Program. Statements are mailed in January, April, July and October. Although statements are mailed quarterly, payments for premiums may be made on a monthly basis. Bank drafts and post-dated checks may be used in making premium payments, if desired.

Cancellation of Coverage: It is imperative that each participant in the Conference Insurance Program keep his premium payments current. The Commission on Insurance has instructed the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs to cancel the insurance coverage for any participant who does not pay his premium by the end of the quarter for which he has been billed.

Ministers Serving Special Appointment: For the purpose of proper cost analysis, it is required that all Conference Boards and Agencies, served by ministers and others eligible for insurance, pay for the "institutional share" of the insured's premium. (The "institutional share" for ministers serving churches is paid through the Council on Finance and Administration appropriation directed to the Conference Insurance Program.) This provision shall apply to the District Superintendents, those service Methodist colleges and other Methodist institutions and agencies operation under Board of Trustees should they elect coverage under the Conference Insurance Program. In every case the full cost of coverage must be paid by the insured, his employer, or through the combined payments of the insured and his employer.

Premium Payments: Premium Payment shall be made in accordance with the instructions printed on the quarterly "Statement of Account".

Application for Insurance Coverage: Eligibility for enrollment begins with recognition as a probationary member, full-time employment as a lay pastor or student lay pastor, or as a transfer from another Annual Conference, and so noted in report of the Board of the Ordained Ministry. Enrollment at any other time classes an applicant as a "late entrant". Applications for enrollment in the Conference Insurance Program are available from the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs. If not completed and in the hands of the Administrator within 31 days from the date of eligibility, the applicant will be classed as a "late entrant". It will then be necessary for a health statement to be furnished, and in most instances, a physician examination will be required at the expense of the insured.

Claims Procedure: The cost of medical care continues to rise, therefore, the Office of Ministerial Affairs and the Prudential Insurance Company of America audit every claim with great care. Conference Insurance Program participants can render valuable assistance in the claims processed by:

- 1) making certain that they have received all the services for which they are requesting payment
- 2) supplying the documentation required to validate their claim
- 3) refraining from asking reimbursement for services clearly excluded under the terms of the insurance program

Claims must be submitted at least quarterly, but not more often than once a month.

REPORT NO. 6

COVERAGE FOR CONFERENCE LAY EMPLOYEES

The Commission on Insurance receives from time to time requests from conference boards and agencies for insurance coverage for lay employees. Accordingly, the Commission has adopted the following policy in this connection:

Conference insurance coverage is available to all employees of the United Methodist Church directly related to the South Carolina Annual Conference and working within the boundaries of the Annual Conference, including diaconal ministers fulfilling the requirements of Paragraphs 302-311 of the 1976 BOOK OF DISCIPLINE and recommended by the Committee on Diaconal Ministry of the South Carolina Annual Conference, provided the insured and the agency concerned bear their full share of the cost of the insurance.

Individuals making less than \$5,000 per annum will be covered by \$200.00 of insurance but will not be eligible for term and paid-up coverage.

Coverage under the major medical insurance shall be the same as for all other persons covered, and all provisions governing eligibility for the Conference Insurance Program shall apply.

REPORT NO. 7

COORDINATION OF BENEFITS

The purpose of health care insurance is to help meet actual expenses. In line with that purpose, the Conference Insurance Program contains a non-profit provision which coordinates our plan with other plans under which an individual is covered so that the total benefits available will not exceed 100% of the allowable expenses. Under this plan, if a dependent, employed wife is covered by another group plan, application for insurance benefits should first be made under the employee's own policy, then application may be made to the Conference Insurance Program for any additional benefits that may be due.

Strict adherence to this policy is essential if we are to maintain good benefits for our program at a reasonable cost. A detailed explanation of the "coordination" process is contained in "Your Group Insurance Plan".

REPORT NO. 8

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON GROUP LIFE AND HEALTH INSURANCE

In accordance with Conference Standing Rule 71, Delos Corderman has been elected administrator and Ernest M. Heape has been elected assistant administrator of the Office of Ministerial Affairs with responsibility for administration of the conference insurance program.

REPORT NUMBER 9

COMMISSION OF GROUP LIFE & HEALTH INSURANCE

The Commission on Insurance makes the following recommendations for the action of the 1980 South Carolina Annual Conference.

1. That the Council on Finance and Administration apportion to the churches their share of \$482,347.00 for the Conference Insurance Program to be used as follows:
 - a. \$ 47,925.00 for administration of the program.
 - b. \$434,442.00 for the Conference's share of the cost of the insurance program providing coverage for eligible enrollants of the S. C. Conference.
2. That enrollant premium payments for the period beginning July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1981 be set as follows:
 - a. Categories 1 - 5 of Report Number 1 shall be \$60.00 monthly.
 - b. Premiums for retired ministers 65 and over be fully paid by the Annual Conference except in cases where the spouse is under age 65; in which instance the premium shall be \$40.00 monthly.
 - c. Premiums for the surviving under age 65 spouse will be \$40.00 monthly.
 - d. Premiums for the actuarially retired member under age 65 with dependent shall be \$93.00 monthly.

Participants in the Conference Insurance Program shall pay their premiums monthly. All coverage shall be subject to cancellation if payments are not made prior to the end of the quarter for which the insured is billed.

Every participant in the Conference Insurance Program shall become familiar with the provisions of the program as outlined in the guidebook, YOUR GROUP INSURANCE PLAN, copies of which are available from the Office of Ministerial Affairs, P. O. Box 1254 Columbia, South Carolina 29211.

REPORT NUMBER 10

Recommended increases in benefits effective July 1, 1980:

1. Increase dependent life coverage as found in Report Number 2:
 - a. Retired spouse coverage \$1,000.00
 - b. Active spouse coverage 2,500.00
 - c. Dependent child coverage
 -14 days to 6 months 1,000.00
 -6 months to age 21 2,500.00
2. Increase Survivor Benefit as found in Report Number 2 from \$150.00 monthly to \$200.00 monthly.
3. Add coverage for removal of impacted wisdom teeth to Major Medical benefits found in Report Number 3.
4. Increase lifetime maximum of retired insured and each eligible dependent as found in Report Number 3 to \$25,000.00.

THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

REPORT NO. 1

(A) The Board of Pensions requests that the South Carolina Annual Conference pay 143 per service year as the rate for annuity payments to retired ministers, which shall include approved supply time prior to admission into full connection. In the case of Special Conference Claimants, the rate shall be 100% of the rate for full conference members. The Board requests that the annuity rate for a spouse be 75% of the minister's salary.

(1) based on ten years if the approved service years of the spouse are fewer;
(2) for the approved service years of the spouse if the total of approved service years is less than fifteen but more than ten years.

(3) for the minister's total years of service if the service years of the spouse are more than fifteen years. The Board requests that each eligible dependent child receive a benefit while under age 16 in an amount equivalent to five percent of the average salary of the South Carolina Annual Conference in the year in which the benefit may be paid; and that the benefit for an eligible dependent child sixteen and older shall be an amount equivalent to ten percent of the average salary of the South Carolina Annual Conference in the year in which benefits may be paid. It is further stipulated that the definitions of paragraphs 101, 110, 111, and 112 of the October 1, 1976 revised Rules and Regulations of the General Board of Pensions shall be applied.

(B) Provisions of paragraphs 101a through 284 of the Pension Manual of The United Methodist Church, effective October 1, 1976, are to be used in making payments to claimants of the South Carolina Annual Conference.

(C) The Board of Pensions requests that an appropriation be made that will pay the Board of Pension (Conference Claimants) \$2,167,242 for the program of the South Carolina Annual Conference for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1980, and that the sum be apportioned to the charges of the South Carolina Annual Conference on the basis established in continuing resolutions.

(C) RESOLUTION RELATING TO RENTAL HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED MINISTERS OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, the policy of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or an amount of rental allowances as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ministers of The United Methodist Church are considered as extensions of compensation and paid to retired ministers as compensation for previous active service; and

WHEREAS, the determination of the amount of rental housing allowance paid to an active minister is made by the local Church as the employer; a retired minister ceases to be an employee of a local Church; the Annual Conference or Conferences of which a retired minister is or was a member during active service represents the local Church in pension matters, subject to rules and procedures of the General Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church as authorized by The General Conference;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. There is designated by this Conference as a rental housing allowance, the lesser amount of \$4,200.00 of the pension payments or an amount equal to 66% of the total pension payment of each retired minister of The United Methodist Church who is or was a member of this Conference at the time of his or her retirement.
2. The pension payment to which this rental housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired minister from all employment by any local Church, Annual Conference, or institution of The United Methodist Church, or of any former denomination that is now a part of the United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform service related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension.

II (A) The Board of Pensions has approved and recommends for approval of the South Carolina Annual Conference the following institutions and organizations for annuity credits: Claflin College, Columbia College, Wofford College, Spartanburg Methodist College, The South Carolina Methodist Advocate, Epworth Children's Home, The Methodist Homes (Orangeburg and Greenwood), Associated Christian Training and Service (Memphis, Tennessee), Charleston Urban Ministry, Columbia Urban Service Center, Greenville Urban Ministry, Office of Ministerial Affairs, South Carolina United Methodist Foundation.

(B) We hereby approve any recognized institution of our denomination to which a member of the South Carolina Annual Conference may be given an Episcopal appointment, outside of the State of South Carolina, as an institution to which ministers so appointed may receive pension credit, provided that the minister pays his or her institutional assessments in an amount equal to 12 percent of the average salary for the year funded, if the institution fails to make such payments.

(C) Each institution, organization or district to which a minister is appointed with annuity credit shall pay to the South Carolina Annual Conference Board of Pensions an amount equal to twelve per cent of the average salary of the South Carolina Annual Conference for the year funded. Such payments shall be made for each minister so appointed, and shall be based on the Average Salary Computation of the General Board of Pensions for the South Carolina Annual Conference effective during the appointment, and must be paid each fiscal year.

III The fiscal year of the Board of Pensions shall be the same as that of The South Carolina Annual Conference.

IV (A) We recommend that the Annual Conference approve the distribution which the Board of Pensions has made to claimants during the year as set forth in detail in our Report No. 3.

V All ministers with episcopal appointment shall report non-ministerial activity to the Board of Pensions prior to December 31, 1980 in order to receive proper annuity service credit. The forms shall be provided by the Board of Pensions.

STATEMENT ON THE PENSIONS CAMPAIGN

THE SITUATION

The Ministers Reserve Pension Fund of the United Methodist Church has been in existence for over fifty years. A half century ago some Methodists realized that a portion of a minister's income should be deferred for the minister's use in retirement. However, this concept was not widely accepted throughout our connection until the last two decades. In South Carolina, for example, we were on a current income distribution program until 1971-1972. Under the current income program, what was received was paid during the year to the beneficiaries of the annual conference. There was no reserve and the earning power of a reserve was forfeited. The current income distribution was, however, a marked improvement over the distribution of the collection for "worn-out preachers" that was received at the annual conference sessions in earlier days.

The pension program now in effect for ministers and their dependents in the United Methodist Church is actually a defined benefit. For each year of approved service rendered, all ministers in our conference receive the same benefit. This is also a "peer group" concept. This is different from most other pension plans which relate the amount of pension benefits to each individual's salary earnings. The peer group defined benefit demonstrates the relatedness into which a United Methodist minister enters when becoming a member of an annual conference. Each receives the same benefit for the same years of service and the pension becomes a deferred salary.

In 1971 and 1972, the ministers of the South Carolina Annual Conference entered the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund. Since participation in MRPF, the annual conference has contributed 9% of the average salary of the conference into a reserve program. Real progress has been made during the decade of the 70's. We have established a reserve program, there are disability benefits for disabled ministers, and there are defined survivors benefits for disabled ministers, and there are defined survivors benefits for surviving spouses and the children of ministers. However, we have incurred liabilities also.

When the annual conference entered the reserve pension fund, we did not have almost eleven and a half million dollars that would have been necessary to fund the years of service rendered prior to 1971-1972. We agreed to fund the unfunded prior service years during a thirty year period. Consequently, on the last day of each year the annual conference contributes two amounts to the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund. For example, on December 31, 1979, we contributed \$785,973.00 for current service funding and \$1,111,207.00 for the prior unfunded service years.

The contributions the annual conference makes to the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund have increased each year. The primary reason for the increases is the defined benefit, the pension rate, is set in the light of the average salary paid to active ministers. The 1979 *Discipline* (Paragraph 1706.7) recommends a guideline of one percent of the average annual salary (including 20% for housing) as the pension rate for retired ministers. In 1972, the year of the last phase of entrance into MRPF, the computed average salary was \$9,594.00 and the pension rate was \$85.00 per service year. By 1979, the computed average salary was \$14,589.00 and the pension rate was \$125.00 per service year.

THE PROBLEM

Each time the rate is increased, the prior years of service for those already retired and those presently serving full time, must be funded at the full rate. The increases have come as the effort has been made to keep pensions in line with salaries and with the cost of living. The increases in the rate have meant increases in the total dollar amount of unfunded liability. For example, at the beginning of 1980, our unfunded liability was 15.5 million, an increase of 34.78% and our pension rate was \$132.00 per service year, an increase of 55.29% over the respective figures at the end of 1972.

The increase in unfunded liability would be more alarming if we had not made actuarial progress. The fact is that we are making actuarial progress—from 17.39% funded at an \$85.00 rate at the end of 1972 to 37.97% funded at a \$132.00 rate at the beginning of 1980.

Our problems are two fold. We are doing the work of two generations in one generation. That is, we are funding both the past service of ministers active and retired as

well as funding the current service of active members. For these reasons, and because of inflation, our unfunded liability and our payments for prior service years, in terms of total dollars, have increased.

THE SOLUTION

The 1977 session of the Annual Conference authorized a task force to study our pension program. The committee drew attention to four fundamental concerns: "1) low service annuity rates which were providing insufficient retirement income, 2) an unfunded liability for past service costs in excess of \$15,600.00 and, 3) that many congregations in the conference were concerned about the absolute size of the annual request for pensions from the Board of Pensions and its relative size *vis a vis* world service and conference benevolences." The Special Pension Study Committee recommended "a campaign for pensions to net six million dollars during the quadrennium 1980-1984, the major objective of which is to provide necessary funds to help underwrite the cost of providing future pension for service already rendered (funding of unfunded liability)." The 1978 session of the annual conference adopted the report of the Special Pension Study Committee and the Board of Pensions. A special committee has organized the capital funds campaign and established the calendar for this major undertaking. This is entirely our own campaign. There are no outside fund raisers. There are no high priced experts employed. We have made promises to ministers serving in our annual conference, and we can keep the promises we have made using our resources and our personnel. This is not an easy task, nor have we set goals we cannot reach. Our goals are realistic, and together, we can reach them.

THE COMMITTEE ON THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Committee on the Annual Conference met on December 15, 1979, to accomplish its task of planning for the 1980 Annual Conference Session. ference Session. By making this change in the Program Schedule, it will be possible to devote Monday evening to a significant connectional emphasis: the role of the Church in Christian Higher Education. We are pleased that the Reverend Dr. James S. Barron will be our keynote speaker. Finally, on Tuesday evening, the Services of Consecration for Diaconal Ministers and of Ordination for Deacons and Elders will be held in the Stanburg Memorial Auditorium, affording all who wish to attend the opportunity to do so. Conference will close on Wednesday afternoon.

It is the feeling of the Committee that these changes in the Program Schedule will prove beneficial both in the conduct of the Annual Conference's business and in the spirit of uplift that the Conference Session should generate.

Space will not allow all that could be said in viewing their accomplishments and the appreciation of South Carolina United Methodists for their presence among us. Bishop Tullis came into a newly formed Annual Conference, a merger of two segregated Conferences. His leadership has built brilliantly and effectively upon the leadership of Bishop Paul Hardin in this new experience.

The Tullises' dedication to the on-going life of the local Churches in this area of United Methodism is proven by their constant travels throughout the Conference and their comprehensive personal knowledge of individual members and clergy. Bishop Tullis has given unusual understanding and guidance to the boards, agencies, and institutions under his care.

All these demands have not deterred him from episcopal leadership in the general church. Illustrative of this is the keynoting last August the Convocation at Clark College in Atlanta on "The Ethnic Minority Local Church," serving as Director of the Jurisdiction's "Proclaim the Word" Evangelistic Program, preparing a voluminous deposition submitted to the United States Supreme Court for the Council of Bishops on the highly important Pacific Homes litigation. He is currently President of the Southeastern Jurisdiction College of Bishops.

Certainly among the essential duties of the Episcopal office are the placement of the preachers in the charges and the presiding over the sessions of the Annual Conference, and Bishop Tullis has fulfilled these wisely, conscientiously, and patiently.

We admire Bishop Edward L. and Mrs. Mary Jane Tullis; we love and appreciate them. Pray for them in their continuing service of Christ and His Church. We do not doubt that they respect and believe in us.

The Committee will be conveying to the Jurisdictional Committee on Episcopacy the needs and challenges we see and will be doing this primarily through our representatives to that body. If Bishop Tullis is reassigned to the Columbia Area, we shall be overjoyed; if not, we shall receive his successor in the true spirit of Methodism.

The Committee on the JOURNAL is also responsible for the production of this *Pre-Conference Report*. The contract for this publication was awarded to Print Media Services (an agency of the Conference Council on Ministries). The Committee is seeking to make the *Pre-Conference Report* a more helpful working document for the members of the Annual Conference and welcomes suggestions on this subject.

Other responsibilities of the Committee include the monitoring of the *Daily Journal* of the Annual Conference which is the source of the minutes recorded in the Conference JOURNAL. A Sub-Committee of the larger Committee is assigned this task. Finally, the Committee is proceeding with plans to publish an updated version of "United Methodist Ministers in South Carolina," the last edition having been published in 1975. A few copies of the 1975 edition are still available and may be ordered from the Conference Treasurer, Post Office Box 282, Columbia, South Carolina 29202. The Committee has asked the Council on Finance and Administration to provide another allocation of \$4,000.00 to be held in escrow for the purpose of underwriting the cost of publishing the book. Proceeds from the sale of the book are then returned to the Conference funds.

We, the Committee on Implementation, wish to thank and commend Bishop J. Harden, Jr., for leading us into one conference. Bishop Edward L. Tullis and Marjorie his wife for eight years of genuine Christian Leadership which contributed greatly in many ways to our progress toward inclusiveness, they will always be remembered with love and affection. We thank the clergy and laity for their input in our endeavors and pray that the future of our conference be as meaningful and fruitful as it has been in the past.

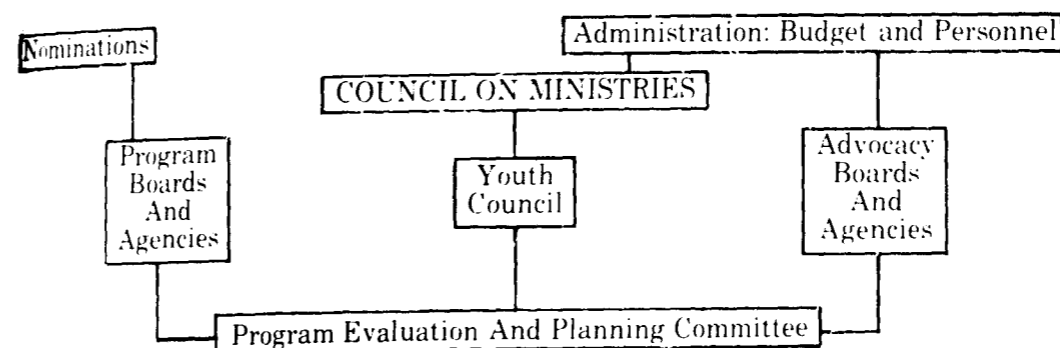
I have been impressed with the vitality of faith and commitment among our people. There is much effective ministry taking place in our churches. Pastors and lay people alike are giving themselves in beautiful ways to manifest the love and power of Christ in their communities. I understand that the task of the Council is to help this to happen in every church and community. Thus our energies and resources need to be directed to local church program enrichment, local church leader development, local church administrative support, and local church extended ministries. The goals adopted for the 1980-84 quadrennium indicate that this is where conference wants the Council on Ministries to work.

A word of appreciation is due to those whose service on the Council comes to an end with the new quadrennium. We are especially grateful to the Honorable Judge Richard E. Fields who is completing eight years as Chairman of the Council. His bright wit and gracious spirit enhanced the climate of good will and good humor at Council meetings.

REPORT NO. 3 CCOM COMMITTEE FOR ADMINISTRATION

Membership: The Bishop, A District Superintendent named by the Bishop, CCOM Vice-chairperson, CCOM Secretary, CCOM Director, Conference Lay Leader, five persons elected by the council upon nomination by the Nominating Committee to maintain adequate representation of Laity, Women and Blacks.

Responsibilities: Personnel Development and Budget Management

- Functions:**
- 1) Set Personnel Policies
 - 2) Evaluate and approve program staff job descriptions
 - 3) Review program staff applications with CCOM Director
 - 4) Hear employee grievances and serve as advisory board to director on personnel matters
 - 5) Review program staff job performance annually
 - 6) Recommend program staff salaries
 - 7) Recommend administrative budget to CCOM
 - 8) Review all CCOM accounts quarterly

REPORT NO. 4 COMMITTEE FOR PROGRAM EVALUATION AND PLANNING

Membership: The Bishop, the District Superintendents, a Lay Representative of each district designated by the District Council on Ministries, two representatives of each CCOM member board, commission, committee, the President of the Conference United Methodist Women, the President of the Conference United Methodist Men, the President of the Council on Youth Ministry. Of the two representatives of each CCOM member board, commission and committee one shall be the Chairperson. The other, to be designated by the board, commission or committee, shall be of a different race.

Responsibilities: Assess needs and missional imperatives, evaluate program effectiveness, initiate program development, coordinate program proposals, and recommend a unified program to CCOM.

- Functions:**
- 1) Serve as long range planning group to design and lead a process for Council to set quadrennial objectives and goals.
 - 2) Lead Council through annual prioritizing of quadrennial goals.
 - 3) Solicit annual CCOM program evaluations from local churches, district councils, boards and agencies, and advocacy groups, through questionnaires and through hearings conducted in 3 districts each year.
 - 4) Arrange for annual compilation and analysis of conference statistical reports and board and agency program reports for distribution to CCOM member bodies.
 - 5) Contract for needed research with approval of CCOM.
 - 6) Receive board and agency proposals and coordinate into unified program recommendation for CCOM and Annual Conference consideration.

REPORT NO. 5

RECOMMENDATIONS TO REDIRECT 1980 BUDGET APPROPRIATIONS

The Consolidation of Conference Council on Ministries Organizational structure reduced program staff from five (5) to three (3); eliminates Children, Adult, and Family Councils; and eliminates the four functional committees - Research, Program, Communications, and Leader Development. Responsibilities previously assigned to these groups are covered differently under the consolidated structure requiring the redirection of 1980 budget allocations. Thus we recommend:

- 1) That the June 30, 1980 balance of funds appropriated as salaries for the positions being eliminated be redirected for contract work in districts and churches;
- 2) That the June 30, 1980 balance of funds appropriated for the Research Committee and the Program Committee be redirected to the Committee for Program Evaluation and Planning;
- 3) That the June 30, 1980 balance of funds appropriated for the Communications Committee be redirected to the CCOM operations account;
- 4) That the June 30, 1980 balance of funds appropriated for Communications Staff Committee Implementation be redirected for the CCOM Communications Advisory Committee;
- 5) That the June 30, 1980 balance of funds appropriated for the Leadership Development Committee be redirected to the CCOM operations account for training, certification, and recertification of leaders for Job Function Workshops and Christian Workers Schools;
- 6) That the June 30, 1980 balance of funds appropriated for the Children, Adult, and Family Councils be redirected to the Board of Education for programs - Children, Adult, and Family Ministries.

REPORT NO. 6

CHURCH EXTENSION RECOMMENDATION

In response to the Britt Simpson resolution referred to the Conference Council on Ministries at the 1979 session of the Annual Conference we propose:

1. That each district conduct a major effort to recruit additional members into Church Extension Partnership and that the money raised through the Partnership be used to give aid to existing churches.
2. That the Conference adopt a line item apportionment equal to 1% of the average net funds to be administered by the Committee on Church Extension of the Board of Missions with 1/2 to be used for purchasing land for new church sites and 1/2 to be used for establishing new congregations.

REPORT NO. 7

1981-84 Objective and Goals Adopted at the 1979 Annual Conference Session

The Objective: To share in word and deed the truth that, through Christ, we as God's people, related to all human kind, with an imperative to create a more fulfilling life for all people everywhere.

- The Goals:**
- To develop training programs to assist local churches with the recruitment of new people.
 - To provide small churches with alternative models for ministry with youth.
 - To aid local church leaders in communicating the concerns of evangelists to their congregations.
 - To aid local churches in developing effective stewardship programs for all ages.
 - To provide assistance to local churches in developing building plans that will meet their needs now and in the foreseeable future, and
 - To implement the United Methodist Church Missional Priorities with emphasis on local church involvement.

Priorities for 1981:

- To aid local churches in developing models of ministry to involve the total membership in the ministry of the church.
- To aid local churches in continuously up-grading the skills of teachers, counselors and other leaders and their use of resources.
- To aid local churches in developing and stating clearcut goals and objectives.
- To develop techniques and strategies for making local churches more aware of and willing to participate in the social concerns of our state, nation and world.

PROPOSED PROGRAM 1981

LOCAL CHURCH PROGRAM ENRICHMENT

- 1 **EMLC Spin-Off 6** - To create an effective Christian Education Program in every black local church, focusing in 1981 on a major district training event with follow-up in clusters. Implementation by Task Force chaired by Mrs. Beverly Dicks and funded through the Board of Education. \$10,000
- 2 **Conference Summer Youth Ministries** - To meet nurture needs, fellowship needs, personal needs of youth in local U. M. churches; to further unify in merger; to improve local youth ministry through assemblies, retreats, conferences, etc. Recommend Youthciple and Summer Youth Ministries cooperate in these ministries. Implementation and funding through Board of Education. \$ 4,000
- 3 **United Nations Seminar for Adults** - To give greater awareness of the global arena in which we live; to deal with a specific timely world issue under the leadership of skilled Seminar designers; to see better the role of the U. N. in helping to create the conditions essential for human justice. Implementation and funding through Board of Church and Society. \$ 500
- 4 **Handbook for Chairpersons of Health and Welfare Work Area** - Develop a simply worded, graphically illustrated pamphlet or handbook for local church chairpersons of Health and Welfare work areas. Implementation and funding through the Board of Health and Welfare. \$ 650
- 5 **Growth Group Experiences** - Sensitize local church members and church leaders in a beginning understanding of sex role stereotyping and how it affects our behavior in the church and in society at large. Implementation and funding through the Commission on Status and Role of Women. \$ 1,500
- 6 **Workshops on Supplemental Worship Resources** - Workshops for the enrichment of local church worship through the use of United Methodist supplemental rituals. Implementation and funding through Commission on Worship. \$ 400

- 8 **Plan of Discipleship** - To aid local churches in developing and stating clear-cut goals and objectives; and to develop models of ministry which involve the total membership in the ministry of the church. Implementation by teams of lay and clergy volunteers who have received specialized training. Funding through Board of Evangelism. \$ 6,000
- 9 **Promote U. M. M. in Each Church** - Promote fellowship and Christian love around men and boys of the church. Implementation by Bill Smith, President Conference U. M. M. Funding through Board of Laity. \$ 1,000

10. **A. Effective Stewardship Throughout the Conference** - To design and schedule training events, to distribute promotional material and to enlist local church participation in a year-round program of stewardship. To give guidance to the groups responsible for the work of stewardship and the Committee on Finance in the local church. We will offer workshops to be implemented in various locations: 2 at the district level; 4 in clusters of churches, according to size; 2 in pilot churches. Implementation by C. E. Murray of the Board of Laity. Funding through Board of Laity.
- B. Stewardship Packets** - Assemble packets of stewardship and finance materials to be used in training and motivating churches. 1. 36 General Stewardship packets; 2. 12 Wills and Special Gifts packets. Implementation by Harry Irwin of the Board of Laity with funding through the Board of Laity.
11. **Stewardship of the Family** - To continue to focus attention on the stewardship of the family by publicizing family life programs produced in 1980, making them available to churches through flyers and demonstrations. Implementation by B. J. Pasley of Board of Laity with funding through the Board of Laity.
12. **Training Event for Local Churches Planning Day Camping** - To train local church leaders in designing and leading day camping activities. Implementation by Board of Directors of S. C. U. M. Camp with funding by registration of participants.
13. **Consultation on Racial Inclusiveness** - Bring together 6 to 8 selected persons from each district for exposure, enrichment and motivation. These persons would be trained and would covenant to train local church leaders in Black empowerment. The purpose of the consultation is to celebrate merger and its meanings, to broaden awareness of continuing needs of an inclusive church, to evolve a consensus of priorities and programs for the next quadrennium toward a more inclusive church. Implementation by Commission on Religion and Race. Funding through Commission on Religion and Race.

Also, a word of thanks is due to the members of the retiring Board who have given a lot of time in carrying out the duties and responsibilities assigned to them.

Accomplishments of the past year include another successful United Nations Seminar, an increased number of local churches sponsoring Refugee families and increased support of the Hungrief program. In fiscal year 1979, the contributions were as follows:

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

1. Because the juvenile court system of South Carolina provides for a category of dispensed judgment for young persons called "status offenders," and

Because these "status offenders" would be guilty of no crime under laws applicable to the adult population, and

Because the current methods of handling "status offenders" tend to treat them as criminals rather than as youth in need of special attention, Therefore

(1) We support the efforts of those in authority in South Carolina who are seeking alternatives to incarceration for "status offenders," and

(2) We support the search for redemptive programs involving families, school systems, community leaders, and others who together are attempting to develop realistic approaches to the solution of the problems created by "status offenders" and the conditions which cause youth to become such special persons of need.

2. Because all people who so desire should have physical access to the buildings of the United Methodist churches of South Carolina, and

Because all people should be able to participate as fully as possible in all aspects of local church life,

Therefore,

(1) We remind all local churches of their responsibility to provide such modifications as are necessary to make their buildings accessible to the physically handicapped and the Trustees of all local churches be informed of this action by the Annual Conference.

(2) All District Boards of Church Location and Building should require such provisions prior to their approval of any building projects under their jurisdictions.

(3) Convenient parking spaces should be provided for the automobiles in which the handicapped are transported to church activities;

(4) Programming of local church activities should always take into consideration the specific needs of those with any physical handicaps or impairments.

3. The Board addresses the question to be presented to the Annual Conference: a mandate that the S. C. Senate be re-apportioned to assure a one person-one vote status prior to the 1980 election. That further, the people of the United Methodist Churches and the State of South Carolina consider whether or not a constitutional amendment should be proposed and adopted setting up one legislative body based entirely upon equal representation in such body by population.

4. We continue to support passage of the Equal Rights Amendment and urge the S. C. General Assembly to support ratification.

5. In view of the high incidence of domestic upheaval which often leads to violence, physical or psychological, and increasingly to the break-up of families, we recommend that local Churches give priority to the study of the root causes of family breakdown and to the study of God's plan for the Christian family and home. We further urge Churches to offer support through counselling, loving care, and churchwide teaching of God's plan for the Christian family according to the Holy Bible.

6. We encourage all of our Churches to survey the need, and where the need is established to lead in the creation of a Child Care program with an understanding of the Missional task of this program; and this program be supported from local budgets if needed. In communities where the local United Methodist Church would not have facilities or financial capability, the local Church should work for the development of a licensed community based program.

7. That the Cabinet consider making the role of Chaplain at near-by Correctional Institutions a part of the appointment to churches or charges in the areas; that those ministers be selected who are qualified to perform such duties; and the churches they serve be encouraged to extend themselves in ministry to the near-by correctional facilities. Specifically we urge the United Methodist Men's Clubs from these congregations become involved in a ministry of outreach to the inmates of these correctional facilities.

8. That our Conference and our local churches continue to support the Christian Action Council and the Alston Wilkes Society.

9. We urge the Governor and the General Assembly to continue to work together toward an improved Criminal Justice System for our state. We commend their efforts to bring together all areas of responsibility related to a system of justice, i.e. the courts, the correctional system, the Probation, Parole and Pardon Board, the Law Enforcement Officers, and citizens concerned, and encourage further dialog to improve the working relationships with all agencies and individuals related to our state's Criminal Justice System.

10. We view with understanding the firmer stance taken in recent months by our Government toward the Soviet Union. At the same time we raise an urgent plea for wisdom in this time of increased National fervor. We recommend the following attitudes or actions by our Conference:

(1) We urge continuation of efforts at multilateral arms reduction until a formula is found which represents genuine arms reduction and is both equitable and verifiable.

(2) We reluctantly acknowledge the need for the registration of young men, but do not approve such for women. We believe that the drafting of women is conducive to further dehumanization of Society, when the home is already under severe stress; that the drafting of women is not truly necessary to the security of our country; and the current level of enlistment by women fulfills the need of our armed forces for their services.

11. That in order to extend our witness to the Father's love for all the children of His creation, transcending all boundaries of religion and nation, that the South Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church encourage active support of UNICEF.

12. We recommend that each United Methodist Church in South Carolina become familiar with "The Social Principles" of the United Methodist Church and that occasionally the Social Creed of our Church be used as an affirmation of faith in worship services.

13. We recognize the danger of Alcohol and other Drug Abuse and we identify the County Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse as a major resource and we urge

churches to use that resource in programs of children, youth, and adults in the Methodist Churches. We urge the Legislature of South Carolina to add a penny to each twelve ounces of beer sold and that it be earmarked for alcoholism education, counseling, and proper counselling for children and teen-agers. We also urge the Legislature of the United States to place restrictions on the advertisement of beer that appeals to children and teenagers. We urge the General Assembly of South Carolina to identify beer and wine as alcoholic beverages.

14. We urge continued sponsorship of refugee families by our Churches.

15. We continue to affirm the United Methodist opposition to the death penalty contained in the *Discipline*.

16. We recommend that the Churches of the conference initiate a drive for food, clothing, and financial aid to the victims of Mount St. Helens through United Methodist agencies.

17. In view of recent developments, we remind ourselves of Item B in Paragraph 730 in the Law of our Church, to wit: "We support the right of public and private (including farm, government, institutional, and domestic) employees and employers to organize into unions and other groups of their own choosing. Further, we support the right of both parties to protection in so doing, and their responsibility to bargain in good faith within the framework of the public interest. In order that the rights of all members of the society may be maintained and promoted, we support innovative bargaining procedures that include representatives of the public interest in negotiation and settlement of labor-management contracts, including some that may lead to forms of joint decision of issues."

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

As we enter into Annual Conference, 1980, please allow me some reflections on the past year. And I shall look back even a little further before the end of this year's report.

In the area of Camps and Conferences, we have seen the establishment of a new Committee on Camps, who is responsible to the Conference Council on Ministries. Under the able chairmanship of the Reverend Bob Stillwell, our Committee on Camps and Conferences continues to look at programs of vital ministry.

Curriculum resource materials continues to be developed and improved in the United Methodist Church. There is more and more study on the background of the Bible and its implications for today. We are seeking to establish a resource center for the Conference. The Reverend Ken Bedenbaugh has given fine leadership on the Curriculum Committee.

A number of meaningful activities have taken place in the area of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, with the dedicated leadership of the Reverend Martin H. I feel there is a close relationship with the Conference through this Committee. Columbia and Wofford Colleges. Campus Ministry is on a solid foundation and is achieving exciting future goals.

The Leadership Development Committee has continued the productive program of the past. They look toward others for the future. Dr. William Rentz was the past chairman before he moved out of state. Mrs. Betty Moss McGuirt now serves in that capacity.

This year has been especially challenging for our Committee on Non-Profit Organizations. The entire slate of trustees for our senior colleges had to be selected. Mrs. Paul G. G. has been outstanding in her leadership on this essential committee.

I am grateful for the support received from the Reverend Mickey Fisher. He has given special assistance to the Board of Education even as he has taken on the heavy task of being Director of the Conference Council on Ministries.

Much has taken place in leadership development and training in the area of Higher Education. Mrs. Marian Jones, through the CCOM staff, has given excellent guidance and direction in projecting and implementing these programs.

This Conference, by our rules, will mark the end of my service on the Board of Education. I have had the high privilege of serving as chairman of this important Board for eight years. It is my prayer and expectation that our gracious God, from the Father, through the Son and by the Holy Spirit, shall minister even more meaningfully in the areas of vital mission through His people called United Methodist Christians.

MOTION BY JAMES H. NATES, JR. TO ESTABLISH A BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

I move that a Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry be established by the South Carolina Annual Conference. This Board shall be given authority to fulfill the responsibilities included under paragraph 730 of the 1976 *Book of Discipline*.

Funding for this Board shall be an appropriate percentage of the funds already apportioned for 1980-81 for the administrative operation of the present Board of Education.

Such a Board might be composed of 24 persons -- 8 clergy and 16 laity, with appropriate representation of ethnic minorities, women and young adults (students). Ex-officio members, without vote, should include the directors of the Wesley Foundation at Clemson University of South Carolina, Winthrop College, Orangeburg, and the University of South Carolina; all part-time campus ministers; and the president (or his representative) from each United Methodist College in South Carolina -- Claflin College, Columbia College, Spartanburg Methodist College, and Wofford College and the Executive Director of the Conference Council on Ministries.

Rationale

The rationale for this recommendation is five-fold:

1. First, the Board of Education, as it is now constituted, has had inadequate personnel over the last quadrennium to effectively carry out the administrative and programmatic concerns required of it. Specifically, the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry has had only five voting members of the Board of Education to conduct the myriad of business required under paragraph 730 of the *Discipline*. To assist this Committee, the Board of Education gave the authority to the CHECM (Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry) to select additional personnel to accomplish its work. Such persons have assisted the Committee, but have been frustrated by their lack of voting power in influencing Board of Education decisions. Upon re-organization of the Board in July, these persons will no longer be related to the CHECM, and the Board of Education will again face the problem of insufficient personnel.

2. Second, the work of this CHECM has been hampered because of its limited authority. It has received only recommendatory power and consequently has been forced to duplicate many presentations and meetings wasting valuable time and "administrative money" in interpreting Board of Education decisions to its different relational bodies. This Committee has a working arrangement with four college Boards of Trust, four Wesley Foundation Boards of Directors, and one campus ministry advisory committee, with no authority to act on its own in these relationships. The process of accountability is clumsy and inefficient, and has often resulted in misunderstanding between the Board of Education, the Committee on CHECM, the College Boards of Trust and the Wesley Foundation Boards of Directors.

This matter of authority and accountability is further complicated by the fact that Spartanburg Methodist College is not under the authority of the Board of Education and has no direct relationship with any higher education organization of the Annual Conference. This motion would allow for liaison relationships of institutions of higher education and ministry.

3. Third, the Board of Education has been forced to concentrate primarily on administrative tasks at the expense of providing programming in the areas of leader development, curriculum, and Christian education methodology. 75% of the Board's time has been consumed by administrative concerns of higher education and campus ministry, and until 1979, the Methodist Camp operation.

The Board is of the opinion that a removal of all administrative matters would result in a significant increase in time and personnel available to give attention to the critical areas of local church leader development and upgrading of our Conference church school programs.

- 4) The Board further feels that our emphasis should be on ministry, and that ministry should mold our structure. Therefore, our ministry through higher education and campus ministry, as well as that of Christian education in the local church, can be enhanced through the establishment of a separate Board of Higher Education, Campus Ministry, and resulting structural adjustments.
- 5) Finally, action by the 1980 General Conference points up the increasing attention that higher education and campus ministry will be given by the general church. Certain to come will be program demands and administrative tasks that will be additional responsibilities for an already overburdened committee and cumbersome working arrangement. A full Annual Conference Board composition would allow to be more responsible to the already existing tasks of the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

Financial Concerns

We are appreciative of the generous support of the South Carolina Annual Conference in 1979 of all the apportionment items related to the work of the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry. The Senior College Fund received \$484,913 (plus \$70,800 over 1978); Campus Ministry received \$130,100 (plus \$22,200 over 1978); and the Black College Fund received \$81,248 (plus \$295 over 1978). The significant increases in Senior College and Campus Ministry giving are attributable to the restoration of the apportionment percentages to 4.5% (from 4.285%) of total giving for Senior Colleges and 1% (from .9352%) of total giving for Campus Ministry. The Black College apportionment is determined by the General Conference.

Although these amounts reflect increases over last year, the Senior College giving was only 62.2% of the apportionment figure (\$778,724); Campus Ministry was 75.1% of the apportionment (\$173,463); and Black College Fund, 61.1% of the apportionment. We encourage, of course, a 100% acceptance and payment of these three apportionment items.

Higher Education Concerns

The Board of Higher Education and Ministry of the United Methodist Church has expressed concern for the clarification of Church-college relationships in each Annual Conference. At the request of the University Senate, our committee participated in a review of the South Carolina colleges, and the results were encouraging. Although there are problems confronting all colleges in the private sector, our senior colleges appear stable. Of primary concern are the small endowments of our colleges and the continuing problem of recruitment. Many United Methodists apparently remain unaware of the tuition grants available in South Carolina for middle and lower income families. Pastors and local churches should encourage United Methodist youth to consider application to Wofford, Columbia, or Claflin before making a final college choice.

The Claflin Challenge is now in its final year, and local churches are encouraged to make complete payment of their pledges before December 31, 1980. Remember to give persons who have joined your church in the last three years the opportunity to contribute to this campaign as well.

Campus Ministry Concerns

Financially our campus ministry program is sounder than it has been in more than a decade. This is due primarily to a program of interpretation, coordinated by George S. Duffie, Jr., that has established personal contact with most of the United Methodist churches in South Carolina. Local churches are invited to designate a "Campus Ministry Contact Person" who will receive regular information about our campus ministry programming in South Carolina and will serve as a liaison between the local church and the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

Although our financial situation has improved, we are still unable to underwrite a full-time campus ministry program for the Charleston area. The Charleston Campus Ministry Task Force, elected at the 1979 Conference session, will continue to do background work for this program in the hope that apportionment acceptances and payments will allow a full-time campus minister by 1981.

Finally, the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry is currently developing a process of evaluation that will be designed to strengthen our Wesley Foundations and part-time campus ministry programs.

A Final Word

As we conclude this quadrennium, the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry would like to express its appreciation to Dr. James H. Nates, Chairperson of the Board of Education, for his effective leadership over the past eight years. Appreciation is also expressed to our college presidents—Dr. Joab Lesesne, Dr. Hubert V. Young, and Dr. Ralph T. Mirse; our Wesley Foundation Directors—Rev. J. Risher, Rev. J. Ham, Rev. B. B. Brown, Rev. George S. Duffie, Jr., and Rev. Matthew D. McCollum; our part-time campus ministers—Rev. Wayne Ballentine, Rev. Beth Collier, Rev. S. Henry-Crowe, Rev. Richard McAlister, Rev. Edward H. McDowell, Rev. Robert N. Dr. Keith Polk; and Conference Council on Ministries Director, Rev. A. Mickey. A special "Thank You" also to Mrs. Doris Chambers, secretary to the Council Director who has handled so capably the administrative duties of our Committee over these quadrennia.

REPORT OF THE TASK FORCE ON METHODISM AND CAMPING

The Task Force on Methodism and Camping recommends acceptance of the following statement:

The philosophy of camping in South Carolina through the United Methodist Camps shall be:

- 1) Enable all persons to have an opportunity to experience camping.
- 2) Enable persons to have an increased appreciation of God's creation by bringing them into direct contact with the natural environment.
- 3) Enable persons to encounter Christ through study and through human relationships in an outdoor living arrangement.
- 4) Enable the camper to experience a diversity of culture and an increased respect for all persons.
- 5) Enable the campers to learn to live together in inter-dependency while at the same time, learning to develop a sense of independence.
- 6) Enable persons to experience worship in a variety of settings and methods.
- 7) Enable the camper to experience the transmission of Christian values, acceptance and forgiveness through the staff and through each other.
- 8) Enable persons to be nurtured and affirmed in a setting of openness and love.

We further recommend that the South Carolina Annual Conference United Methodist Camps or retreat centers will have representation through a member of their Board of Directors or Trustees on the Conference Council on Ministries. That person shall be elected by his or her own Board.

The program of the camp or retreat centers will be implemented through the Conference Council on Ministries for adoption by the South Carolina Annual Conference.

We are striving to maintain excellence of program and improve maintenance of Camp facilities. Working committees are active in the areas of program development, property maintenance and development, promotion, personnel, and finance. If this historic institution were to disappear from the scene of academy, there would be a void that could not be filled in our life time.

Presently there are twenty-one persons, young women and young men at the College preparing themselves for full-time Christian service. Due to the critical shortage of black ministers, many student pastors enrolled at Claflin College are serving churches throughout the conference to assist in meeting the crucial needs of the Black churches. Your continued support is needed as the College fulfills its mission in providing leadership for the church in general and the South Carolina Conference in particular.

We continue to be grateful to Bishop Tullis, the Cabinet, Ministers and Lay Persons of the Conference for the continued support you have given to the "Claflin Challenge... An Investment in People". This investment is yielding fruit far beyond the financial support the College is receiving. The College is now known by many persons throughout the Conference. We have been able to build a reservoir of good will for Claflin which will benefit the institution for years to come.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF COLUMBIA COLLEGE TO THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

This report is submitted on behalf of Columbia College to the 1980 South Carolina Annual Conference with appreciation for the continuing interest of the United Methodists of South Carolina.

The 1979-80 academic year saw the celebration of the 125th anniversary of the founding of the College. It is gratifying to be able to report that in terms of financial stability and academic program, Columbia College's 125th year has been a good one.

Numerically, the 1979-80 academic year began with a record enrollment of more than 1100 students. Financially the rapidly increasing rate of inflation has necessitated greater-than-expected increases in the cost of operation. The College is presently operating on a balanced budget as of June 30 but once again it has been necessary to make needed maintenance, renovation and capital expenditures.

Academically, it is gratifying to be able to report solid progress. In December the National Council on Social Work Education granted full accreditation of the Social Work program, making Columbia College the only school in the Private-Sector of South Carolina with a fully accredited degree program in Social Work at the undergraduate level.

Also in December the prestigious National Association of Schools of Music granted full Association membership to Columbia College. Prior to this date the school had only Associate membership.

The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools on December 15, 1979 granted formal approval to offer work in the graduate level. This will make it possible for Columbia College to offer the Master's Degree (not just Master's level courses) in Music - and eventually in Education and other areas.

Columbia College exists today because people have believed and continue to believe in her mission with willingness to invest in her future. Without the strong support the college receives from all the members of her family - trustees, alumni, faculty, staff, the Church, friends, businesses and foundations - we could not meet the many challenges that face our college today and in the years ahead.

As indicated in last year's report, Columbia College has many strengths and potential for the future. She is also at a critical point in her long history. In the last year there are two major problems that must be solved in order to realize the potential of Columbia College and continue her tradition of leadership in the Higher Education.

1. The size of the endowment of the institution is simply not adequate to insure financial stability for the future. Even minor decreases in student enrollment and substantial unexpected cost increases could be devastating because the endowment is severely underfunded.
2. Another critical area of concern is the physical plant. Since the fire of 1964, sizable debt has been incurred in order to complete the renovation. Renovation and maintenance have been deferred due to inadequate funding for endowment, for debt retirement, for maintenance and renovation that is needed.

With the predictions of declining enrollments for most schools during the 1980's, these problems take on added significance for the future of Columbia College.

These needs are vital to the welfare of the college and to the maintenance of her quality, traditions and values that have touched the lives of young women. Columbia College continues to believe in the worth of her mission - to provide education for women in a Christian environment. She continues to seek the support of the United Methodists - churches and people in the fulfillment of her mission.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF WOFFORD COLLEGE TO THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

During the celebration of the 125th year of Wofford College those of us at the College express our appreciation for the historic relationship which Wofford has with the South Carolina Annual Conference. Throughout Wofford's history these two institutions have mutually supported each other, and I believe have been of mutual benefit to each other.

Today you have provided the College a strong Board of Trustees which is the most significant factor in the College achieving its position of leadership in higher education. In addition, the conference has increased its financial support and continues to provide moral support. For all of these things we are certainly most grateful.

I would like to repeat a point I have made to the Conference in the last few years. The college wishes to serve the children of United Methodists of this state. Too often we find that Wofford is beyond the financial reach of many United Methodist students. Please assure you that financial aid is available for most students from South Carolina who are academically qualified and if they come from families with incomes up to \$7,000 a year. If a student comes from a large family with an even higher level of income that student may still qualify for state or private grants, especially if there is more than one family member attending college. Therefore, let me urge you not to discontinue your support of Wofford until you have contacted our Financial Aid Office. We will work with you to insure that all qualified United Methodist young people have an opportunity to attend Wofford if they so desire.

The report of the major areas of College life are presented by Dean B. G. Stephens, Academic Affairs; Dean Michael J. Preston, Student Affairs; Dr. William Mount, Registrar; Mr. Edward E. Greene, Finance; and Mr. Russell Picton, Development.

Academic Affairs

The faculty was strengthened during the 1979-80 academic year by the addition of the following persons: Dennis Wiseman in French (Ph.D., UNC); Mary Hope Rhodes in English (M.Ed., USC); and Major Nelson Collard in Military Science (B.A., University of Virginia).

Edward Minus of the English department is on a leave of absence during the first semester to complete a novel and is being replaced temporarily by Nancy Killian of the Peoples. Dr. Richard Ramirez, chairman of the foreign languages department, is on a leave of absence during the 1978-79 academic year and chose to remain in his home and go into private business. He will be missed at Wofford College and by the foreign language education community.

Stanley Levine of the foreign languages department left Wofford last summer to accept a position in the department of Hebrew at Ohio State University. The Reverend Talmage Skinner taught a course in Hebrew during first semester as a replacement for Campus Minister Donald Welch, who is on a leave of absence at Scarritt College.

The Wofford community was deeply saddened by the unexpected death of Dr. James Loftin, Emeritus Professor of Chemistry, on February 7, 1980. Dr. Loftin came to Wofford in 1941 and taught continuously until 1971 except for duty during World War II. He served as chemistry department chairman from 1960 until 1971.

The faculty has just completed a year-long study of the College's Interim program - a four + 1-4 calendar - and have reaffirmed their commitment to it as an important educational vehicle. Though some modifications have been implemented, the basic structure of the program will remain unchanged.

The Wofford faculty and trustees have approved in principle an important new program in the field of gifted and talented education which will include projects for parents, and children.

Projects for teachers will consist of courses, seminars, and a master's degree in education. The master's degree derives from an institution-wide commitment to the field and is based on a strong disciplinary base in the liberal arts, and it will be the only master's degree offered by Wofford College. We believe that an excellent, historically distinguished liberal arts college can offer high-quality graduate work in a limited field which is appropriate to its purpose and which will serve an identifiable constituency.

Such a degree program should result in increased institutional visibility and promote long-term strength in admissions - especially of high-ability students. A master's degree in gifted and talented education will capitalize on existing institutional strengths to fill a genuine need and at the same time promote institutional advancement.

The institutional model for a strong, limited-purpose program at a superior liberal arts

college already exists. Vermont's Middlebury College, also a Phi Beta Kappa undergraduate college, offers a highly-respected master's degree primarily during summer months in a limited area of study (foreign languages). The degree program at Wofford should help fill a real need in a field of growing concern since there are few gifted and talented degree programs in the United States and none in South Carolina.

Projects for parents of gifted and talented children will consist of night, weekend and summer seminars focusing on appropriate areas of concern. Weekend and summer programs will also be offered for gifted children in various age groups. The first program for children will be offered during the summer of 1980 and designed for children who have just completed grades 5 through 8. All United Methodist ministers in the South Carolina Conference have been sent information about the program.

Student Affairs

Wofford College students continue to demonstrate their academic concerns as well as increased participation in extra curricular activities. Their involvement in the "co-curriculum" has manifested itself through politics, service projects, musical and art presentations and through athletic competition. Several specific examples include: excellent performances of the Wofford Theater Workshop, international competitions of the Glee Club Ensemble and new and satisfying experiences for women students through club sport competition in volleyball and basketball. In addition, an intercollegiate bowling team has been selected and has received strong student support.

Generally, students appear to be more concerned about campus activities and are interested in all aspects of their college experiences. As a result, a healthy and positive mood prevails on the Wofford Campus.

Religious Life

Wofford College continues to maintain and to enhance its explicit posture as a Christian school. This posture is reflected in many ways. A liberal arts education at Wofford is value oriented. No student can graduate without studying our heritage—the Judeo-Christian faith. As a result of the program established by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, every freshman and most upperclassmen are exposed to questions of values in regard to the knowledge they gain in every academic discipline.

Overt expressions of the Christian faith and its perspectives are apparent in: man orientation, chapel services, the Campus Christian Association, Bible study groups, Sunday evening fellowship, and denominational organizations. An increasing number of students regularly attend worship services in local churches; some students hold part-time jobs as members of the staff in area churches. Most recently, faculty and Campus Union approval of a new Religious Affairs Committee reflects a schoolwide interest in expanding the expression and examination of Christian concerns as a regular, integral part of campus life.

This year, while The Reverend Don Welch has been on leave from Wofford, the work of the Office of Campus Ministry and Counseling has been maintained by Ms. Ar Howard and The Reverend Bill Mount, acting campus minister. Among the activities which have been initiated are: The Pre-Ministerial Society, an organization for students who anticipate careers in ministry; and the Adjunct Chaplaincy, a vehicle for coordinating and facilitating the work of clergy from various denominations who regularly carry on a ministry with Wofford students. In this regard The Reverend Lem Carter has been instrumental in developing a program for Methodist students on campus.

Wofford College is anxious to serve the United Methodist Church in South Carolina. The Lay School of Christian Studies is now in its third year. Laypersons in the program continue to be enthusiastic about their study and to report its importance for their participation in the life of their local churches. The Office of Campus Ministry continues to function as a liaison between local churches and the College. We want to be the place where South Carolina United Methodist youth see an opportunity for an excellent education in an atmosphere of openness and faith.

Finance

Enrollment for the 1978-79 academic year averaged about 945, so an enrollment of 940 was budgeted for 1979-80. Enrollment is much stronger than was expected for the current year and should average just over 1,000. This increase of sixty students will

budget will ensure a very good year from a financial standpoint, and will permit the College to catch up with some maintenance, painting, etc. which was deferred over the past two or three years. The operating budget adopted in February for 1980-81 projects expenditures totaling almost \$6.4 million. The required increase in tuition and fees is just under 10 percent, which is below the national percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index. Total financial aid available to students from all sources is in the neighborhood of \$2 million. About 60 percent of Wofford students receive some form of financial assistance.

The College's assets had a book value of almost \$22 million at August 31, 1979. Endowment funds—invested to provide earnings for operations and scholarships—totaled almost \$5 million. Physical plant assets totaled almost \$11 million. Except for \$2,767,000 in bonds and notes payable on residence halls and food service facilities, there were no significant liabilities.

In February of 1979, construction was begun on a campus life building. This building will include an activities area for physical education and intramurals which can be converted into an arena seating 2,800 for basketball, convocations, concerts, etc. Also included are a theatre, game room, lecture room-cinema, an all-purpose room featuring a snack bar, and offices for dean of students personnel and the athletic staff. Construction will be complete in the late summer or early fall. Most of the funds required have been raised.

Development

Increased church support through the Senior College Fund was one of the major reasons why Wofford College attained the highest level of gift support in its 125 year history. The Senior College Fund support increased from \$167,690 to \$196,390—a \$28,700 increase which will help to strengthen our operating budget including student financial aid.

The outpouring of gift support during the celebration of the 125th anniversary year was in recognition of the important educational role Wofford College has played in the development of educated citizenry.

An Alumni Annual Fund Challenge from the Ramill Foundation resulted in unrestricted alumni support increasing to \$320,181—a record high. Corporate unrestricted support reached \$111,000—another new high. These achievements coupled with the Senior College Fund increase led to Annual Fund unrestricted giving for budgetary support attaining \$699,000—substantially exceeding any previous high in the history of the college.

Further, support for the Campus Life Building campaign and gifts for scholarships—both current and endowed, led Wofford to restricted support of \$1,571,000—also a new record. Together this generous support for current budget assistance and that received primarily for construction and scholarship assistance totaled more than \$2,582,000.

Wofford will move into the decade of the 80's in a position of fiscal strength. We remain grateful to all that the United Methodist Conference does to assist Wofford College to remain a strong educational institution.

Report No. 1

Program Highlights of 1979

The 1978 Annual Conference approved and assigned six programs to the Board of Evangelism. The following is a report on those programs:

Preaching Clinic: Preaching Clinics were held in Rock Hill, Marion and Walterboro Districts with Dr. Roberto Escamilla and Dr. Alan Walker and Rev. Chad Davis as speakers.

South Carolina Laity Convocation: The South Carolina Laity Convocation was held on August 10-12 at Lake Junaluska. Over 1800 persons attended and heard Dr. Reginald Mallett, Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., Bishop Edward L. Tullis and Rev. Charles S. Johnson. Six workshops were held on Saturday and Sunday mornings. Mr. Harold Scipio serves as Program Chairman.

Plan of Discipleship: Churches involved in the Plan of Discipleship showed progress in membership growth and total funds received.

Youthciple: Teams of youth evangelists have been trained and certified to work in local churches in supporting and developing a total program of youth ministry.

Missional Priority on Evangelism (SEJ Proclamation Evangelism Event): The Conference Steering Committee was organized and entered into a process of clarifying objectives and projecting the South Carolina Proclamation Evangelism Program.

Grand Strand Leisure Ministries: The Grand Strand Ministries received \$11,516 and they handled 3,335 cases of persons who had some type of need. Of this number, 2% of the people were from outside of Horry County.

1980 Program Implementation Plans

Preaching Clinic: Negotiations are presently underway with the Rock Hill District for the development of a Preaching Clinic with the emphasis on basic communication skills.

South Carolina Laity Convocation: The 1980 South Carolina Laity Convocation is planned for August 8-10. Speakers will be Dr. Wallace Chappell, Dr. Woodie White, and Carl N. Harris and the resident bishop. Workshops will be as follows:

THE BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

The past three years (quadrennium) have been spent trying to inform the South Carolina United Methodist what the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries is, its functions and goals, the agencies (Orangeburg, Greenwood and Epworth) and what the Golden Cross does in this Conference. This began at a Workshop at Camp Gravat in early 1978 for Chairpersons of Health and Welfare Ministries in the local churches. There have been "Fairs" and "One Great Hour of Sharing" in the Conference Districts. We have a program committee who will help with your workshops for districts on Health and Welfare Ministries. If you wish help, please write our Program Chairman, Mr. Jim Womack, Route 8, Spartanburg, SC 29303.

The highlight of our training program was the Workshop for Boards of Trust. Originally this was planned for the Board of Trustees of Orangeburg and Greenwood Methodist Homes and for Epworth Children's Home. As the workshop developed, the program committee thought this should be shared with the other boards and committees of our Conference. It was most gratifying when all our Conference boards and committees sent representatives. Lunch was served at Epworth Children's Home dining room to 70 people.

The keynote speaker was The Honorable Eugene T. Hackler, an attorney from Kansas City, specializing in institutional law, who gave a well organized, interesting and informative program on the legal and practical aspects of Boardmanship. The Advocate the "The State" newspaper have published the details. Comments such as "best" and "most meaningful" program given in our Conference have been received. A repeat of this program for new Boards should be considered in the future.

Our Board has been interested in the Good Shepherd's programs and although there is no connection with our Board, there is a successful Good Shepherd program in Spartanburg, SC. Four Methodist churches are among the thirteen churches in the Spartanburg area participating. The Good Shepherd's program is a project of the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries of the Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church. If local churches are interested in such a project, they may obtain information from Dr. Paul B. Maves, The Shepherds' Center Development Project, 5218 Oak Street, Kansas City, MO 64112. This is truly a "one to one" ministry as our Health and Welfare Ministries are.

The Health and Welfare Board is very grateful to the Annual Conference of the South Carolina United Methodist Church in sending a resolution to the General Conference to maintain the National Health and Welfare Ministries as it is now and not to create this Board's function under other boards and committees. We beseech the delegates to General Conference to watch very carefully the legislation and help us keep this important board intact. Copies of this resolution have been sent to officers, executive committees and legislative committees of General Council on Ministries, the Board of Global Ministries and the National Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, and to the South Carolina delegates to General Conference.

Golden Cross Sunday is the first Sunday in May (some churches are possibly using the Christmas Sunday). Unfortunately there is a lack of promotion of this important project. This year there were eighteen inquiries regarding Nursing Scholarships. The maximum number (6) for the maximum amount \$500.00 each) were granted. The number of scholarships and the maximum amount need to be increased.

Eleven (11) requests for medical assistance were received and a total of \$5,150.00 was given. The maximum amount allowed to an individual request also is \$500.00, and due to inflation, this too should be increased.

The amount of work involved in the Golden Cross projects has increased and sub-committees have been established. The Chairman of Golden Cross is the Reverend George M. Rizer; applications for Nursing Scholarships and Medical Assistance should be mailed to him at Herbert Memorial United Methodist Church, Route 5, Box 482A, Georgetown, SC 29440.

The individual homes bequeathed to the South Carolina Conference for homes for retired Methodist Ministers, their widows and retired Methodist Missionaries are old and very expensive to maintain. The Board tries to keep these homes in good condition, but as they become vacant and after advertising their vacancy in the Advocate and there are no applications for occupancy, these homes are sold and the funds obtained have been used for the purchase of a duplex apartment in the Orangeburg Methodist Home and \$50,000.00 (the Greenwood Home found contributors for the balance, \$20,000.00) was contributed for two one-bedroom apartments in the Heritage Hills complex of the Greenwood Methodist Home. These are also used for Retired Ministers, and the supervision and maintenance are under the respective agencies.

The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries does not see as one of its roles providing housing for all Retired Ministers. There have been very few requests for the use of the homes. This situation could change with the inflationary cost of housing and high interest rates. The North Augusta Home is vacant and there are two requests for this home at the time this report is being written. A Committee has been appointed to make a selection of the occupancy on the primary criterion of need. These houses, when vacant, are advertised in the Advocate. If there are ministers planning retirement and are interested in these houses, they should write the Reverend Jack Bozard, Adnah United Methodist Church, Adnah Drive, Rock Hill, SC 29730.

As the six homes now held by the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries are scattered over South Carolina, their supervision and maintenance, with the high cost of fuel and possible shortage of gasoline, becomes difficult; the sub-committee has asked the District Superintendent or District Director of Health and Welfare Ministries, and particularly the Minister of the Church nearest these homes, for help in determining need and maintenance. The local areas have also been most helpful in paying for minor major repairs on these homes.

This year the insurance companies who have the insurance on these homes have been asked for new appraisals and the Districts have been most helpful in obtaining new appraisals and photographs required. Our insurance costs will increase accordingly and you and your church doing your fair share in your contributions to Golden Cross.

The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries is greatly appreciative of the capable and concerned supervision of the Greenwood, Orangeburg and Epworth Homes.

Our thanks to Mr. Charles Hutchins, Executive Director of Epworth Children's Home, for his continuing good works, and congratulations on the new clinic for retarded infants (from birth to four years of age). He will give you more details in his report.

Our appreciation to the Reverend Ted Morton, Executive Director of the Greenwood Methodist Home, for care administered to intermediate and skilled nursing care patients. Congratulations on completing the lovely residential apartments in the first center of Heritage Hills.

Our most profound appreciation is extended to Dr. Allan Broome for his excellent management of Orangeburg Methodist Home as Interim Director.

The Health and Welfare Board is particularly pleased and very appreciative of the new Executive Director, the Reverend James Alewine, of the Orangeburg Methodist Home. The esprit de corps of the employees and residents of this institution has increased tremendously. The capable, concerned, loving care given by Mr. Alewine to all concerned means much in the operation of such an institution.

Now it is up to you as Methodists to do your part for these institutions! There are persons in our senior citizens homes who are not eligible for Medicaid but are financially able to pay the costs needed by our institutions. The Support money given by you is not sufficient to cover these needs and yet the Homes can only provide care within their budget. This is the last year (this ends my eighth and final year on the Board) I shall have the opportunity to ask you to evaluate your stewardship to the Homes and to Golden Cross. You, our South Carolina Methodists, are known to be very generous when you know there is a need. Please help! I wish again to remind you, you, too, one day will be a senior citizen. Are you planning for your, your brother's or sister's future? When the final accounting for your stewardship arrives, will it be a "Well done thou good and faithful servant?"

It has been a privilege to serve on this Board for eight years, and I'm most appreciative of the help and support which has been given me as Chairperson for the last three years.

REPORT OF EPWORTH CHILDREN'S HOME

1980

Throughout its 84 years of service, Epworth has made an effort to provide a program that was creative, challenging, and flexible to meet the needs of children and families. Originally created to serve the needs of orphaned children, the scope and effectiveness of its services have broadened greatly.

In 1979 large numbers of children and families continued to be referred to Epworth. As the complexity of our society continues to place strain and stress on families, Epworth reaches out as an arm of the church to provide the needed services. Methodist ministers and lay persons making referrals know that Epworth's response to a family in crisis is immediate and thorough.

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Within the year, group care, foster home care and higher education were provided for 296 children and youth. This is an increase of 76 children since the beginning of the decade. Through family counseling, referral services, follow-up family services and the special services to retarded persons, Epworth has provided some help to 329 other children. This represents more than 300 families.

Through emergency and temporary care, Epworth has provided for 123 children. This service provides the opportunity for immediate placement of children who are neglected, abused, or in danger. Experience has proven to us that there is a great need for this kind of service — to respond to youngsters who are in undesirable circumstances, to prevent placing a child in jail because there is nowhere else for him to go, or, in one case to rescue three children from a car which had been their home for three weeks.

The family counseling program continues to grow each year. This service provides Epworth with opportunities to prevent family breakdown through the family's involvement in a counseling process which identifies and solves problems in order that the family may continue to function as a unit in the home.

Epworth's program of education on the campus has been expanded. Continuing are the reading and speech programs involving 60 children per week. Evidence of the effectiveness of these programs is readily apparent in the improvement of school reports and in such statements as one made by a 12-year-old boy who said, with a glint in his eye, "When I came to Epworth I was 4 years behind in reading and now I can read like the other boys in my room." The C. G. Fuller Foundation awarded Epworth a grant for a specialized tutorial program. Thirteen tutors provide tutorial help for 40-50 children each week. These educational programs are making it possible for youngsters to improve study habits, develop their ability and change attitudes about school.

Thirteen young people are continuing in higher education and technical training.

The 1975 Annual Conference asked Epworth to develop a ministry to retarded persons. Epworth has made great progress in developing an education program, disseminating information, establishing contact with existing programs across the State, and providing consultation where requested. Epworth's support services were given to 13 persons living within their own families. It is Epworth's hope that the creation of a pilot project of "Infant Stimulation and Parent Education" will make it possible for Epworth to assist in developing similar programs at other areas within the Conference. This program involves young children in a specialized program housed in the College Place United Methodist Church adjacent to Columbia College. Certified teachers, aides, parents and volunteers from Columbia College's Speech and Hearing program, Child Development Department and others make up the staff. Epworth was the facilitator for the first conference ever held in the State of South Carolina which gave exclusive attention to the challenges of the Down's Syndrome child. This conference brought together more than 150 people from across the State. The process of developing another such conference for 1981 is underway.

Epworth's trustees and staff have been willing to adapt the group care program and provide additional services which make Epworth viable and productive. While some child care institutions find it increasingly difficult to operate more inclusive programs, Epworth continues to grow. The increasing number of visitors from other agencies who seek to learn from Epworth ways and means of providing creative programs is an indication of the respect Epworth continues to enjoy as a leader in the field of child and family services. During the year, training for houseparents was provided in cooperation with the University of South Carolina. A management plan designed to help the staff be more effective, thereby avoiding increasing the staff numbers, is in progress. The staff is enhanced and enriched by the use of highly specialized consultants.

During 1979, the Churches voluntarily contributed approximately \$404,000 through Mother's Day, Work Day, and first Sundays. This amount has remained rather constant for the last three or four years. These contributions are essential as they provide approximately 40 percent of the operational budget. Epworth has resisted the temptation to expand beyond her means. The trustees and staff are committed to operating a balanced budget without incurring indebtedness. Epworth continues to be committed to the idea that we will provide service to as many children as the church and Epworth supporters can and will fund.

The buildings and grounds are well kept and in good repair and the financial situation at Epworth is sound.

Thirteen percent inflation, mostly in the area of necessities, makes it imperative that we continue to increase our concern and commitment to the needs of Epworth boys and girls and families.

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Epworth was created by the Conference to provide a Christian service to boys, girls and their families. From its inception, Epworth has relied upon the spiritual and the support of people in the churches for her survival. The fortieth anniversary report states that "not since its inception has the staff and children failed to get together for daily prayer." The Church on campus continues to provide influence, molding the spiritual lives of youngsters who come to live at Epworth. There is always opportunity for the children to study under the direction of dedicated staff people, to participate in choirs and other aspects of the worship service, plus the opportunity for daily study and devotion in the cottages.

We thank you, the Methodists of South Carolina, for your faithful support. Together we look to the past with pride and to the future with confidence that God will continue to use us all to meet the needs of those children and families who seek Epworth's love and who are blessed in His sight.

REPORT OF GREENWOOD METHODIST HOME

We are pleased to present this twelfth annual report of Greenwood Methodist Home for the information of the 1980 Session of the South Carolina Annual Conference.

Conference Year 1979 was another year of significant service in the health ministries performed by the Nursing Center. While statistics are never able to tell the full story of our service, they are a useful index for understanding the scope of services rendered. During the year we served a total of 150 older persons who are in need of Skilled Care Nursing; we had 37 new admissions and 32 persons were discharged (22 by death, 7 to the hospital, and 3 were able to return home). The gain of admissions over discharges (5 persons) when added to the January 1 census of 97 patients produced the total of 102 patients which is the capacity of the facility.

Our patients came from 16 of South Carolina's 46 Counties, and there were two out-of-State admissions (one each from North Carolina and Georgia). As one might expect, the Counties closest to Greenwood have the greatest concentration of patients. We did have admissions from as far away as Orangeburg and Kershaw Counties.

The Nursing Center continued to provide (by contract) the meal which is delivered daily at midday, Monday-Friday, by Greenwood "Meals-on-Wheels," a project of the Greenwood County Council on Aging. In the course of the year more than 16,000 meals were delivered by a faithful corps of Volunteers, many of whom are now serving specifically due to the high cost of gasoline. Approximately 75 persons are served daily in the Greenwood-Ninety Six areas, and without question some of these persons would have required institutional care were it not for this meal service and the daily contact with the Volunteers who bring meals to the recipient's own dining table.

The opening of "Aldersgate Court" in Heritage Hills in July was the fulfillment of what seemed at times an elusive dream. The twelve apartment units provided by this lovely building are filled with the exception of one of the large, two bedroom units, which we are seeking resident donors. When a subscriber (or subscribers) is found for this apartment, the proceeds from the donation will be sufficient to "pay out" the full cost, and we can begin to consider quite seriously the construction of the second building which has been named "Bristol Court."

We are most thankful for the splendid community of residents who "took a chance" on the Home by making significant contributions financially when all we could offer to them was a vacant field, a blueprint, and a few drawings by an artist. To our joy, "Aldersgate Court" developed — and we believe exceeded — the beauty portrayed by the artist's rendering, and all of our residents are happy with the choice they made to join the Home in this pioneering venture!

We would be less than honest if we did not confess that while we have great hopes for the future, we also have some genuine concerns. Our cost of operation continues to rise due to inflation, and this dictates rate increases. Since many of those served can now pay the full cost of their care, when the charge for service is increased, we automatically hand the Home itself a large "bill" for persons being assisted through the "Support Fund." In 1979 the Churches of the Conference gave us approximately \$48,000.00 in "Support Fund" gifts and we expended over \$70,000.00 to aid patients who

could not pay the full cost of their care. The difference of \$22,000.00 was provided by the income from a modest Endowment Fund and designated gifts. It is essential that the contributions received through the "Support Fund" be increased if the Home is to have sufficient funds to provide financial aid to those persons who cannot pay the full cost of care and who are not eligible for government programs. *We do not believe there is any greater call to service than that of helping to meet the health care needs of our frail elderly brothers and sisters who are no longer able to care for themselves or to be served in their own homes.*

We would express our appreciation to the Conference and to Board of Health and Welfare Ministries for the excellent leadership that has been provided for the Home in its Board of Trustees across the years. Four of our Trustees will rotate off the Board this year: two laymen (Dr. Gilbert Hogan, who has served as Vice-President, and Eldon Fisher, who has served on the Finance and Investments Committee) and two ministers (LeGrande Moody, who has served as President of the Board, and Roy Pryor, who has been Chairman of the Committee on Admissions). We look forward to the addition of four new members who will be elected to replace and are confident that they will render exemplary service in the years ahead.

In the coming year (and throughout the 1980's) we will be striving to add to the Home's physical plant, expand its capacity for service, and seek the full measure of financial resources essential to maintain a sound operation. There is a role for every United Methodist in South Carolina in our future, and it is not too much to say that without that measure of full support, the future of the Home will be severely limited. We covet your prayers, ask your continued — and increased — financial undergirding, and we invite you to visit the Home and to seek its service.

REPORT TO THE 1980 SESSION OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH THE METHODIST HOME ORANGEBURG, SOUTH CAROLINA

In the Fall of 1978, the Board of Trustees of The Methodist Home, Orangeburg, appointed Dr. Allan R. Broome to serve as Interim Administrator. Dr. Broome held that position until the 1979 Session of the Annual Conference. During that period he gave able and lasting leadership to The Methodist Home. Among his major contributions were the strengthening of the financial structure and the organization of the operations of the Home into four Administrative areas under the direction of an Executive Director. At the 1979 Session of the Annual Conference the Rev. James E. Alewine was appointed Executive Director of the Home.

Many of the financial problems have been cleared up over the last year and a half. The most recent print-out shows that the Home is operating in the black. The Board of Trustees feels we are nearing the point when some of our dreams may again be pursued. Much needs to be done by way of improving facilities we have and the building of additional facilities. We clearly see the need for an activities building, a Chapel, and additional office space.

Perhaps our first need is another residential building. We have phased out the "Wells" building which had become obsolete. The Harmon Building has been converted from semi-private to private rooms. Those two actions have cost us the loss of accommodation for 26 people. We are not proud of our Capers Building or Harrell Building. Both served us well, but they are old and cannot be expected to serve us much longer. The number of residents in those two buildings would almost fill a new residential building.

There is still a long waiting list for admission to the Home. Almost invariably persons are admitted in the chronological order of their request for service. We wish we could admit persons at the exact moment they wish to be admitted, but such is impossible. Most people seem to understand and appreciate the situation.

Perhaps the most significant act of the Board in recent times was its decision to admit people into residential care only. Please take careful note here. This means one cannot wait until medical care is necessary and then be admitted to The Methodist Home, Orangeburg.

The Methodist Home is not ideal. The ideal is to remain in one's own home, unfortunately, for a large host of reasons many cannot. When such is so The Methodist Home is a fine place to be. Now is the time for you to say this about our Greenwood Home and our Orangeburg Home. The vast majority of our residents and their families realize what a grand thing The United Methodist Church has done in creating these facilities.

We still need your help. Perhaps we need it more now than ever before. Many people without ability to pay the service fees apply for admission. Last year we received us \$104,698.00 to assist such people. That was an 11.5% increase over last year. I express to you our appreciation. To the degree you give we are able to assist those who are unable to pay their service fees. While inflation rages more funds are needed to maintain our present level. To assist more HOME people we will increasingly need more support from the people of our Church.

At the close of my first year as Executive Director, I realize my debt to the people, past and present, who have helped bring The Methodist Home to its present level of ministry. To them all I express my appreciation.

REPORT NO. 2

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS OF 1979

Resource South Carolina Laity Convocation: More than 1800 persons attended the fifth Laity Convocation at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina. Dr. Reginald Mallett was the keynote speaker.

Resource Lay Speaking Schools: Under the direction of Sam Middleton, the Conference Committee on Lay Speaking gave leadership to every district that made a request for help.

Resource the Cluster Group Process: Cluster Group Leaders were provided with orientation on method and content so that they could give leadership to clusters in their districts. Even though Cluster Groups were not scheduled at Annual Conference, more than half of them held meetings.

Sponsor Three One Great Days of Training: A Training Session for Conference and District Leaders was held in Columbia during August and was attended by 150 persons. Four persons from the General Board of Discipleship were leaders of some of the training sessions. The following day the Walterboro District held a One Great Day of Training and the members of the General Board were present there to lead various workshops. It was well attended.

Stewardship Resources: Develop Models for Family Ministry: Under the leadership of B. J. Pasley, an interboard task group planned to conduct four seminars on Family Crisis. Two were held in the fall of 1979 and were video-taped for use in local churches. The first seminar was on Substantive Dependency and was held in Washington Street U.M.C. on September 23. The second seminar was on October 14 at St. Paul's U.M.C. in Spartanburg on the subject of The Clergy Family.

Develop United Methodist Men's Work: On September 13, at Virginia Wingard U.M.C., the second annual United Methodist Men's Conference was held. Dr. Ross Freeman was the keynote speaker. Officers who were elected for 1980 are:

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

During the quadrennium that is now drawing to a close the Board of Missions attempted to put greater emphasis on serving the local church and funding agencies which serve persons in need. The Board's basic function is to oversee the Conference policies, to allocate funds for missions projects, and to publicize opportunities for service and giving.

The committee chairpersons have done an excellent job in leading the committee. They have formed guidelines which lead to clear accountability of agencies through the Board. The Local Church Development Committee has trained several of Board members and others to relate directly to churches in their quest to be in mission in the local community. Members of the Board are actively involved in the missions projects of the Conference. Several members of the Board, and at least two members of the CCOM staff, have served as interpreters to District training events to help church chairpersons understand the global and Conference missions programs.

Especially in the areas of Volunteers in Missions and the Summer Investment Program, we are very grateful for the help of persons who are not members of the Board. Because of their dedication and enthusiasm they spend much time and effort to make these two areas of ministry more effective.

Sam Johnson, CCOM staff member assigned to Missions, has been of immeasurable assistance in coordinating the Board's activities. He has brought perspective and insights pertaining to the missions thrust within our Conference and beyond.

Again this year the Reverend Bessie Parker has volunteered her service to the Board. She has traveled across the state several times per month telling the missions story and reports that everywhere our churches have responded to the needs of others. The Board is indeed fortunate to have Mrs. Parker working with us.

The Board, we feel, has suffered by not having all District Missionary Secretaries serve as active members of the Board. In an effort to keep Districts informed of the Board's programs and decisions we have continued to invite District Missionary Secretaries to our meetings with voice, if not vote.

At the beginning of this quadrennium the Urban Works, and Town and Country committees were consolidated, in accordance with the Discipline, into the Parish and Community Development Committee. In turn this committee was sub-divided into the Specialized Ministries and the Local Church Development sub-committees. The Summer Investment Program, which sends college students into areas of mission for ten weeks in the summer, is also a part of this committee.

The Church Extension Partnership, which began five years ago, is continuing on a solid foundation to provide financial help to churches around the Conference which are upgrading their facilities.

The Education and Cultivation Committee, in various ways, publicizes advanced special offerings and mission needs in the Conference and around the world. In early 1981 this committee will publish a new *Tract with Missions* book which will include information on all programs of the Board of Missions and the missionaries who are supported by our Conference.

The Volunteers in Missions Committee is still actively involved in Haiti, and is considering service to other countries. This ministry draws persons from all over our state into a vital and personal experience in mission.

More detailed reports of the committees of the Board of Missions follow.

REPORT OF THE PARISH AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Parish and Community Development Committee is divided into two sub-committees, the Committee on Specialized Ministries and the Committee on Congregational Development.

The Committee on Specialized Ministries is chaired by the Rev. A. Lloyd Hays, Jr. This committee has the responsibility for establishing guidelines and funding support ministries of the Annual Conference Board of Missions.

The two projects sponsored by the Board of Missions that deal primarily with youth are S.I.P. (Summer Investment Program) and S.S.S. (Salkehatchie Summer Service). S.I.P. trains and sends college age missionaries to mission sites across the Conference. This program is under the direction of the directors of the Wesley Foundations. S.S.S. is a project involving senior high youth in repair and renovation of sub-standard homes in Beaufort and Jasper Counties. Thirty youth were involved in 1978, fifty youth in 1979, and we project more than seventy youth in the summer of 1980.

The cooperative parishes of the Conference are supported through mission program funds in their attempts to bring small membership rural and urban churches together for programming and mutual staff and lay support. The cooperative parishes now functioning include: Bennettsville-Cheraw Area Group Ministry, Chesterfield Cooperative Ministry, Marlboro Cooperative Ministry, Oconee Cooperative Ministry and the Greenville Crescent Ministry. The Conference representative to Hinton Rural Life Center is the Rev. Sammie Jackson. Rev. Jackson is responsible for contact between rural churches and cooperatives and the Center.

The Board of Missions continues in its support of migrant ministry, working through the rural agencies and the urban ministries.

The Parish and Community Development Committee continues to provide support for urban ministries in Columbia, Spartanburg, Greenville and Anderson. Urban ministries in these locations are evaluated and measured by the mission value per conference dollar spent, by their use of United Methodist dollars to generate state, federal, private and other denominational funding, by their providing direct assistance to the disadvantaged, by their addressing community structures and social systems in accordance with the Gospel Word. Both urban and rural agencies are evaluated as to accountability of use of conference funds.

The budget requests for each of the specialized ministries are included in the annual budget of the Council on Ministries.

The Committee on Congregational Development is chaired by Mr. Owen Holmes-Newberry. The responsibility of this committee is to make every local church a mission station. The committee has recruited and trained pastors and lay persons to offer direct help to individual congregations through a process of mission analysis and program design. The committee has written each District Superintendent informing him that the committee is available to come into his district for work in the local churches.

The process involves three visits to the local church by the helping team. First, the team meets with the local church leaders for conversation about what is going on in the church and what the church leaders see happening in the community served by the church. In this session instruments are shared for gathering in-depth information about both the church and the community.

Second, the team returns to the church for a day and a half (usually a weekend) to assist the local leaders in analyzing the church and community information gathered since the first visit. The purpose of this session is to bring together clear understanding of what is happening in the church and the community with a compelling vision of what it means to be God's people at work in the world. It is designed to enable local church leaders to: 1) draft a mission statement for their church; 2) set goals for nurturing the members and reaching out to the community; and 3) adopt specific programs for working toward the goals.

Third, the team returns to the local church about six months after the weekend session to assist the local leaders with checking on progress toward the goals. They seek to help in spotting problems and finding ways to get around problems.

1980 will be a year when the trained teams will be going to local churches with the hope of being able to assist at least three churches in each district. In 1981 the committee plans to prepare a paper reporting the measurable results of the program in the conference and in 1982 to have helping teams trained in each district.

UNITED METHODIST VOLUNTEERS IN MISSION

"Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ."
Such is the mandate of the South Carolina Conference United Methodist Volunteers in Mission Committee as they continue their program of Evangelism through construction work, medical services, educational and agricultural programs. The committee works with the Jurisdictional Coordinator's office in Atlanta and the United Methodist Committee on Relief to develop a continuing program through which some of the needs of the world can be met by the short-term volunteer services of laity and clergy in the name of Jesus Christ. The following report includes projects completed in 1979-80 and projections for 1980-81.

1. **Medical Projects:** Dr. Michael C. Watson, Chairman of the S. C. U.M.V.I.M. Committee, continues to recruit medical personnel for all areas of need Churches across the conference continue to prepare mid-wifery kits for shipment overseas. Again this year some fifteen hundred or more kits were prepared and shipped to Haiti.

2. **Construction Projects:** Under the supervision of U.M.V.I.M. and our Conference Youth Service Fund, the Reverend John Culp directed the second very successful Salkehatchie Summer Service Project. This second project involved between 50 to 60 youth and adults in the renovation of several homes in poverty areas in and around Beaufort County. This program has been a very exciting and meaningful experience for all involved. The third SSS project is now underway for 1980. Registration has now reached over 85. The group will be working on the sea islands of South Carolina this summer.

Mr. M. L. "Pat" Garrett, U.M.V.I.M. Coordinator of construction coordinated two building teams for 1979-80. Reverend Robert J. Howell of Georgetown led a team of 16 volunteers to begin construction on a much needed school in Cap Haitien, Haiti in August. Over \$12,500 was raised for building materials and supplies. A second team of 20 members was led by the Reverend Archie Bigelow. They returned to Cap Haitien in February to finish the school. Six thousand dollars was raised for this second project and many tools and building materials were donated to be used and left with the Haitians.

3. **Agriculture:** Mr. Joe Cal Watson, U.M.V.I.M. Agriculture Coordinator, has made two on-site visits to Haiti this year offering agricultural assistance. These visits are also invaluable to the committee as Mr. Watson is familiar with the areas of greatest need and also with the services rendered by the committee.

4. **Ophthalmology:** Dr. Hal H. Crosswell, Jr. of Columbia, South Carolina coordinates the "eye care" program for U.M.V.I.M. for our conference and U.M.C.O.R. nationwide. Six to eight teams of eye surgeons rotate each year in the clinic built by South Carolina volunteers in Jeremie, Haiti. These volunteer surgeons provide basic eye care, including the fitting of thousands of pairs of used eye glasses donated through U.M.V.I.M.'s "Share-a-Pair" program. Cataract and related surgery is also performed and other eye diseases treated. Eight eye surgeons rotated through the Jeremie clinic in 1979. To date there are six surgeons lined up to go for 1980. This year for the first time the teams are being housed in the manse, partially funded by our conference and built by the Haitians. As a part of the "eye program" Dr. Bud Antley, Optician, is coordinating the collection and cataloging of eye glasses. The youth of Leesville United Methodist Church will be assisting him in this program. For 1980 their plan is to set goals and have a supply of these glasses ready to go with each shipment that goes to Haiti, in order to keep the clinic supplied with used eyeglasses.

5. **Dental Teams:** Dr. Kent Bridges of Greer, South Carolina, serves as coordinator for dental volunteers. Five teams of dentists and assisting personnel have rotated through Jeremie and Port-au-Prince this year, providing basic pain relief dental care. One dentist and wife team worked out of six schools and saw between 500 and 600 patients, most of them children.

6. **Medical Collections, Packaging and Shipments:** Under the guidance of James R. Mitchell of Leesville and Mr. Joe Cal Watson of Ridge Spring, and John Gissendanner of Cayce, S.C., 38 cartons of medical and hospital supplies were collected, repackaged, and shipped to Haiti in December. Sample medications which are donated by physicians and drug companies are collected at Cayce and Leesville United Methodist Churches and are packaged for overseas shipment. This group is also in charge of shipping all supplies for U.M.V.I.M.'s eye surgical and dental programs.

7. **Educational Scholarship Program:** Evelyne Margrone Bertoni and Danielle Gaspard have now graduated from Columbia College. Evelyne graduated in May of 1979 and returned to Haiti to begin teaching in the Methodist School in Port-au-Prince.

Danielle graduated in December and returned to Haiti in February and is now teaching in the Methodist School and working in a medical lab. Scholarships are also provided for the training of nurses and teachers in Haiti. Funds are continually needed for the "self-help" programs.

In conjunction with the Hunger Committee, the UMVIM Committee has provided over \$25,000 for the school lunch program for Haiti.

Mr. James Covington of Columbia installed a sound system in the Methodist Church in Jeremie, Haiti. Mr. Covington accompanied Dr. Crosswell in 1979 and also taught and filmed much of the eye program and other areas in Haiti in preparation for making a film for promotional purposes for the conference. When completed this film will be placed in the conference office and will be used by the committee members and volunteers as they serve as Mission Interpreters both within our conference and to the wider church.

In an effort to broaden our volunteer services for 1980, Projects Coordinator Reverend Needham Williamson will be going to Mexico in May with Tom Curtis, Regional Coordinator for UMVIM, to investigate the possibility of serving in that area.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF SPARTANBURG METHODIST COLLEGE

Spartanburg Methodist College is a missional agency of the South Carolina Annual Conference and is grateful both for the challenge and resource of the church to provide an educational ministry that changes the lives of persons. During 1979 your college not only maintained the strength of educational programs that have been developing since 1911 but also began bold new activities to meet emerging needs of the people who live, work, and serve in the decade of the 80's. United Methodists have served over 100 different persons this year through this institution, and 96% of them were Southern Methodists.

Spartanburg Methodist College meets the diverse needs of persons in South Carolina with a multiple offering of programs. Each program is built on a strong liberal arts and Christian value base. As an example, the following numbers of students were enrolled in the various programs during the regular fall 1979 semester:

This college has unique opportunities for service by concentrating on two year education and accepts that role gladly and eagerly. Freshmen and sophomores who wish to earn the four year degree at another institution are receiving high quality instruction. During 1979 the faculty and Counseling Center have carefully compared the SMC curriculum with senior colleges to make certain the courses are parallel and at least equal in requirements. To help students plan a transfer program without loss of credit the Counseling Center staff has been increased in size and the faculty advisement program strengthened. The quality of the college transfer program is clearly evidenced by results with the May 1979 graduating recipients of the Associate of Arts Degree. An increased number, 82% of them transferred to a senior college and are working on another degree and 18% entered a career immediately after graduation.

The college community is grateful for strong gift support for the educational programs. Of the \$569,000 in annual gifts and grants received last year, \$196,000 was contributed by churches in response to an asking of \$259,000. These resources enable

the missional services the college provided to the persons who came to her for help. The gifts last year increased almost \$20,000 over the year before, and a United Methodist individual matched this increase dollar for dollar. This same special friend has offered the same matching funds for all 1980 increases, so the generosity of churches can add double strength to their college.

The Board of Trustees has continued strong leadership to reach the objectives of the ten year capital development plan which started in 1977 to raise \$5,000,000 for serious physical plant problems and to increase the college's very small endowment. Previous to 1979, \$400,000 has been raised and spent on renovations of old buildings to meet safety requirements, but this year a giant step was taken by a successful capital crusade for \$1,000,000 which was over subscribed by gifts and three year pledges. While none of this crusade was conducted through local churches, many United Methodist gave leadership and gifts.

During the year with the use of the capital gifts, renovations have made safe and usable facilities of three old buildings. The north area of the campus was completely rebuilt when a public highway was relocated from the middle of the campus. An addition to the Phil Buchheit Administration Building replaced two temporary office trailers used since 1972. Also the trustees have approved the construction of student housing for 48 students who have lived in trailers since 1973, and the new building is scheduled to be ready for the fall 1981 semester. Even with this progress, the college must still report serious capital needs which can only be handled with gifts and grants.

The faculty and staff are privileged to serve through this college and are aware of the dynamic leadership provided by the trustees who are nominated by the Conference Board of Missions and elected either by the Annual Conference or the National Division of the Board of Global Ministries. SMC serves in the strength of our church's mission of helping persons develop their fullest potential of intellect, body, and spirit.

THE COMMISSION ON CAREER PLANNING AND COUNSELING

The Commission on Career Planning and Counseling has been engaged in being a resource agency for districts and local churches whenever possible. We have attempted to focus on career planning in general and on guidance and church related careers as a secondary focus.

Since our last report, the Rev. George Duffie, Jr. participated in a district workshop in the Marion District as a resource person from Career Planning and Counseling. We attempted to guide the churches of Marion District in the work of career planning. The Rev. Louis D. Jamison, Chairperson, led a workshop in the Hartsville District in May, 1980, with separate sessions for the smaller churches and the larger churches. The local church chairpersons of Career Planning and Counseling.

Two persons were assisted by the Commission to attend the National Career Planning and Counseling Workshop in Denver, Colorado. They were Mrs. Joellen Cook and the Rev. George Duffie, Jr. Also attending on scholarships from the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry and representing the Black Church Task Force on Christian Education were Mr. Robert Johnson and Miss Darcella White. All of these persons can be a resource for the Commission.

The Commission on Career Planning and Counseling is attempting to be far more than a resource agency, as we understand that to be our task in the Conference, rather than planning programs. We have many requests still ahead of us in planning for the remainder of 1980 and 1981. We hope to always be available and helpful to all who come upon us as we close out this quadrennium and look forward to another.

THE COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

The goal of the Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns Commission is to reach out and link arms with brothers and sisters in and beyond the faith as we attempt to reach the world to God and effect an atmosphere of love, sharing, understanding and mutual respect among and between all peoples.

In an attempt to help create such an atmosphere, the first Ecumenical Breakfast was held last June as a part of the program at annual conference. Keynote speaker at the meeting was Rabbi Max Stauber of Temple B'Nai Israel in Spartanburg. Also participating were Father John Carter, Roman Catholic and Baptist Ministers, A. S. Walker and Coolidge Johnson. This was so successful that the second one is planned for 1980 with the Rev. Lonnie Turnipseed, General Secretary of the EIC Division of the Board of Global Ministries as resource speaker.

The main thrust of EIC emphasis in the immediate future will be interreligious Christian-Moslem relationships. We lift this out as great opportunity for our conflict and urge United Methodist support of a Christian-Moslem Conference planned for this year by the Christian Action Council.

The 1977 Annual Conference approved the Lund principle as the basis for program planning. The principle states, "to do together everything which consensus does not compel us to do separately." We reaffirm that principle which places ecumenical in the planning stages rather than afterthought.

An Ecumenical Luncheon is being planned for September as a means of welcoming our "new" Bishop. Judiciary heads of other ecclesiastical bodies or official Ecumenical officers will be invited to share fellowship and mutual concerns.

The Commission continues to participate in the National Conference on Christian Unity. The Chairman and the Rev. Larry McCutcheon represented South Carolina May 10-13 at the meeting which was held in Seattle, Washington.

We urge each church to participate in some ecumenical endeavor during 1981. We are considering the awarding of a special Bishop's Accommodation for outstanding efforts.

We urge promotion and support of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity which celebrated beginning January 18, 1981.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

As the United Methodist Conference with the largest black constituency in the United States, we have special cause for rejoicing in the merger of black and white conferences in South Carolina. Each brings to the new Conference distinctive histories and a rich heritage. Each brings viable traditions and cultural roots. We celebrate these differences as part of the diversity of gifts which are made known to us through the Spirit.

Our history as a merged Conference over the past 8 years reflects determined efforts to make merger work, assuring inclusiveness in board and agency representation, examination of institutional hiring practices, offering of resources to strengthen black church awareness, opportunities for persons and groups to engage in constructive discussion of understanding racial differences, conflicts, etc.

At the end of a quadrennium as a merged Conference, the chairperson of this commission appeared before a hearing conducted by the Continuing Committee on Merger. Three major areas were identified which needed attention and constructive program building:

1) **Human Resources and the Black Church:** Far too many struggling black churches are without resident pastoral leadership. Far too many black pastors are without adequate salaries. Far too many black churches do not have resources to upgrade support or facilities. While we thank God for the ingenuity and patient sacrificial love which has enabled black church survival in the hardest of times, we must now turn together to consider ways to assure needed leadership for the days ahead.

My hope is that the Committee will recommend a careful survey of human resources needs in the black church and encourage the Commission on Enlistment and Board of Ministry priority to seek equipping, resourcing and financial needs which will strengthen black church leadership and facilities.

At the same time, I hope that deliberate efforts will be made in Conference settings to provide opportunity to articulate and express black cultural and theological understandings. In addition, opportunity should be provided for black gatherings which can foster and sustain the sense of belonging and friendship which former Conference experiences offered. The Continuing Committee can be the needed stimulus to bring such experiences to pass.

2) **Conference Priorities and the Needs of Black Persons:** In my judgment, the Continuing Committee can help us focus on human needs of black persons in a state-wide context which can help us gain needed insight for study and action. Underemployment, economic repression, lack of representation on public policy boards, institutional racism, these continue to be problems experienced more forcefully by blacks than whites. The Commission on Religion and Race is permitted to function only in the presence of receptive districts and thus can be only one channel of increased sensitivity. The Committee can help us recall our commitment once more and remind us in specific ways that a new Conference requires continuing commitment to the causes of justice and humaneness for all people.

3) **A Viable Black Caucus:** Not since merger has the unified voice of blacks been heard in Conference decisions or policy. The role of BMCR has been ineffective in communicating the black agenda to the church as a Conference. It seems to me that an effective black caucus can serve as a useful and helpful ally to all Conference Boards, Agencies, Committees and Commissions, helping us to deal more realistically with proposals and ongoing programs which need the input of the black experience and felt needs. It is too much to expect that the mere presence of blacks on boards and agencies will result in caring consideration of needs which are uniquely black.

The Continuing Committee can encourage the strengthening of the black caucus and affirm its need for the kind of growth which will promote genuine inclusiveness.

At the end of two quadrenniums, these areas of concern remain. While we applaud efforts to upgrade salaries, education, stewardship, etc. through programs of church partnership, Ethnic Minority Local Church, etc., these efforts are not sufficiently funded nor followed up to assure continued progress and realization of potential. Nor is there much evidence of responsiveness of local and district church leaders to implement work area on Religion and Race objectives. If a viable black caucus is presently active, its concerns and agenda are yet to be communicated to the Conference.

Moving into the third quadrennium as a merged Conference, the imperative work area on Religion and Race become more focused as we view the national increasing distrust of systems by minorities who are the first to feel the pinch of inflation and the deprivation of economic recession.

The inclusive church can offer models of hope and inclusiveness as we are determined in our commitment to make merger work. Sensitive and specific efforts to continue to increase recognition and understanding of the black experience will enrich the church.

Attention to Christian education and leadership development in the black church is a continuing need requiring the best efforts of all who care about the survival of the black church.

The Commission on Religion and Race sees its role as an agency of strengthening the program processes and growth potentialities of persons and groups engaged in the mission of an inclusive church. The program proposal of the Commission for 1980 is on local church leadership development for racial understandings and black church enablement.

With strong local church commitment to the liberating word of the gospel and the help of Conference and district leadership, our Conference can lead the Church to experience new strengths and vision which can offer hope and healing in an age of hurting and despair.

THE COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

In 1979 the Commission completed its first quadrennium of membership on the Conference Council on Ministries. Appointed commission members have held leadership roles on CCOM functional committees. As we have grown as a commission we have sought to take more responsibility for strengthening our ties with district and conference structures. With the appointment of Rev. Lem Carter as a liaison to our Commission from the Board of Church and Society, we were able to lay the groundwork for sharing common concerns and channeling our energies and resources through new avenues of service.

Sixteen persons have been selected and trained to lead Growth Groups for Women. Three training sessions were held in 1979. Growth groups were conducted at West Columbia UMC, Columbia and Trinity UMC, West Columbia. The program possibility of Growth Groups for Women was presented at three District Fairs. Twenty-four local churches in the Spartanburg, Rock Hill and Orangeburg districts have indicated an interest in Growth Groups for Women.

Eve's Advocate began its second volume of publication with a feature story on "History of Women in American Methodism" by Diana Westerkam. The issue also contained an evaluation of the newsletter. The Communication Committee of the Commission is currently looking at the future of *Eve's Advocate*.

In January, 1979, the Commission sponsored a lay delegate, Mary Kennerly, to the Clergy Women's Consultation. The Commission continues to reach out and include various resource people who have shared special talents and interests with the Commission and Commission projects. Members of the Commission have been challenged. Chairperson Diane Moseley to grow in their understanding of issues which face women. Part of one meeting was used to study the problems of women who are abused at home. The Commission continues its support of the Equal Rights Amendment. The Commission affirms women assuming new leadership roles throughout the conference.

The Commission seeks to be open to the will of God and to the needs of the people it serves.

REPORT NO. 4

SALE OF THE METHODIST CENTER PROPERTY

Naturally, the Advocate Board of Trustees' unanimous decision to dispose of the 1420 Lady Street property is of primary interest to this body. It has been a part of South Carolina Methodism for many years.

The building has been maintained adequately, but it is thirty-one years old and worn out. All major components - electrical, plumbing, elevator, and heating and air conditioning pose major threats of large capital outlays. The best example of the problem is the heating system. In the winter, it is inadequate so office people complete

work by using portable electric heaters which overload the electrical system. More than one potential fire has been witnessed by the staff. Balancing the heating system has proven impossible, causing some areas to be at the same time extremely hot and extremely cold.

I want to assure you the decision was not made hastily; was not made without consultation with conference leadership and was not made without seeking cooperation from the conference.

The matter has been under consideration since 1973, when the Board of Trustees received an unsolicited offer to sell the property. The Board refused the offer, in large part because we realized the Conference as a whole would be affected by a decision to sell and no consultation between the Board and Conference had taken place at that time. As a result of the offer, however, the Board did have the building evaluated by a professional consulting engineering firm for possible renovations to bring it up to modern standards. The results of the evaluation indicated a major capital outlay would be required to accomplish the renovations. The Advocate Board did not and still does not have the funds necessary to perform the work, nor was it justifiable to borrow funds needed to rental income return prospects. It appeared to the Board then - in 1973 - that disposing of the property and investing the proceeds of a sale for operation of publishing the Advocate may be the better route of responsible stewardship to South Carolina Methodist.

In the fall of 1978 (December 7) during a severe cold period, the heat providing equipment on the blink for several days because of a major breakdown. The boiler had been inspected and serviced for winter operation on October 15, 1978. Bishop Tullis requested a meeting with Dr. Wallace Fridy, then Editor of the Advocate, Rev. Harry Mays and Mr. Thad Herbert, C. F. & A., Rev. Chad Davis, Columbia District Superintendent, Rev. Delos Corderman, Conference Office of Ministerial Affairs, and Rev. Oscar Smith, the Chairman of Conference Council on Ministries, to discuss, and I quote, "the long term use of this facility", end of quote. All in attendance were made aware that the Advocate Board did not feel it could undertake a renovation effort of the magnitude to avoid the type recent calamity experienced and that disposing of the property appeared to be the best solution to the problem of an outdated building. Again, we recognized and emphasized such a move would have a major affect on the Conference as related to its housing needs.

A second meeting, requested by me, was held December 18, 1979, to update Bishop Tullis, Rev. Harry Mays, and Mr. Thad Herbert. I informed those present that I would recommend disposing of the 1420 Lady Street property to the Advocate Board at its January, 1980, meeting. A rationale statement prepared by a special committee is attached to this report as information for the Conference record. Rev. Mays was informed of the Advocate Board's official action March 21, 1980, by telephone and in a letter dated April 7, 1980 (copy attached.) Let me read selected portions of that letter . . . "let me assure you our board recognizes the complexity this decision creates as it relates to the South Carolina United Methodist Conference; therefore, we acknowledge this process must be undertaken with full cooperation between the Advocate trustees and C. F. & A. It is not our intent to put the Conference in the street. We pledge our support to the Conference as it deals with its housing responsibility. We, also, desire to locate with the Conference whenever it establishes offices. I do want to say to you again that we want this process to be a cooperative venture in order to discharge our responsibilities to all South Carolina United Methodists as good stewards with dignity."

We have secured an MAI appraisal of the property, but will not list it with a Realtor or brokers until some time frames can be developed from action taken by this Conference or appraisals being submitted by C. F. & A.

**REPORT OF
UNITED METHODIST WOMEN**

The organized unit of United Methodist Women shall be a community of women whose PURPOSE is to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ; to develop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.

This year more than 32,000 women in South Carolina have listened to these words and believed that by becoming a part of the organization they might further enhance their own lives and greatly contribute to the improvement of the world through our mission program. They have given some \$293,000 for mission work within our Conference and beyond. It represents our best year ever! Through our pledge to missions, \$257,860.45 sent to the Women's Division in New York, we have contributed \$257,860.45. The balance was used within our Conference.

Through leadership training at every level of our work, we have helped women see the potential in their lives and enabled them to assume responsibilities as officers and members of the Church. Thirteen women were elected to General and Jurisdictional Conferences as delegates or reserve delegates. We have reached out especially to women under 35 years of age, providing scholarships in each District to the School of Christian Mission and in helping organize new groups. We have sent women to Intergenerational Retreats, and as a part of the laity of the Church, we were in attendance at the Lay Convocation at Lake Junaluska. We participated in events sponsored by Church Women United and the Christian Action Council.

Our Conference Newsletter, *The Mission Echo*, has been selected for preservation in the S. C. Caroliniana Library in Columbia. It has proven to be an excellent means of communication and each District also has a newsletter. Each unit encouraged the sending of *The Mission Echo* to the minister in the local church.

The School of Christian Mission at Columbia College had 341 in attendance at \$2,500 worth of mission study books and resource materials were sold. This School is a gift to the Conference from the United Methodist Women in S. C. and anyone is welcome to participate. Each local church should send those charged with responsibility for mission study. Lay speakers would benefit from such training and be available for teaching in the local churches.

The Retreat at Lake Junaluska, led by Dr. Warren Ebinger, had 1,100 women present. Our offering went to the Lake Junaluska Fund, the Fund for Retired Ministers and Deaconesses for Medical Expenses and to the Wallace Family Life Project in Marion District.

After a year in which we stressed the needs and rights of children, we climaxed the International Year of the Child with Annual Meeting in Anderson District. Various workshops, interest groups and speakers were highlights of the two day meeting with 475 in attendance. We heard reports, ratified the Charter for Racial Justice, elected officers, delegates to Jurisdiction Meeting, and nominees to the Women's Division. A Love Offering went in honor of Bishop and Mrs. Tullis to mission projects with South Carolina and to the National Children's Defense Fund.

At the Southeastern Jurisdiction Quadrennial Meeting in Nashville, Tennessee we were pleased to have 192 from S. C. making the trip on four chartered buses.

Enthusiasm, participation and financial support are at an all time high as we seek to meet the needs and interests of women through the avenues of United Methodist Women. It is an exciting period in our mission history!

THE SOUTH CAROLINA UNITED METHODIST FOUNDATION

The Foundation is having an interesting and exciting first year. A look at other similar foundations tells us that we should expect initial growth to be slow. Judged in that light, our progress has been impressive. Still we have barely made a beginning and a great big task lies ahead.

Seven South Carolina Methodist institutions—Epworth Children's Home, Claflin College, Columbia College, Spartanburg Methodist College, Wofford College, Greenwood Methodist Home, and The Methodist Home (Orangeburg)—have joined together to bring the Foundation into being. An office was opened in The Methodist Center at 1420 Lady Street, Columbia, South Carolina, last June, with an Executive Director, Harry Chandler, and a competent Board of Trustees, as follows: Marshall A. Shearouse, Chairman; T. Emmet Walsh, Vice-Chairman; Bruce R. Sigmon, Secretary; Dwight F. Patterson, Sr., Treasurer; Allan R. Broome; M. M. Clinkscales (succeeded by Mrs. Clay Brittain); John W. Curry, Sr.; Lachlan L. Hyatt; W. W. Kellett, Jr.; Lloyd B. Williams, Jr.; John M. Younginer, Jr. (succeeded by William L. Elkin); and Bishop Edward L. Tullis (Advisory).

We are most fortunate in the make-up of our Board of Trustees. The Chairman was the Trust Department of the C&S Bank for forty-three years. Each of the institutions is represented. We have bankers, investments counselors, an attorney, a Certified Public

Accountant, successful business persons, a leader in industry, the former large Executive Director of one of our institutions (Epworth Children's Home), and two ministers (one of them a former Conference Treasurer and one-time member of the General Council on Finance). The Executive Director has attended an R&R News Seminar on estate planning in Washington.

Some things are clear:

1. The Foundation is long overdue.
2. The potential is great.
3. Progress to date is remarkable.
4. It is to the advantage of each of the participating institutions that the goals and purposes of the Foundation be pursued with diligence.

The need for the Foundation is a reflection of the urgent needs of our institutions. We see it as a vehicle for undergirding our seven excellent Methodist institutions at a time when some good colleges and homes are not making it financially.

Other successful foundations demonstrate the possibilities. Some of the strong Methodist Foundations are in Florida, Louisiana, and Texas. The Baptist Foundation of South Carolina, established in 1950, has \$11,000,000 in assets and had earned in the last year of approximately \$700,000. The value of the Foundation is not only in the gifts and bequests it will attract, but also in earned income—and in its continuing ability to produce income year after year.

It is obvious from the beginning that we face the immediate urgent need to make the Foundation known. Would that every Methodist in South Carolina might be informed about it. We are making several approaches, including: (1) Quarterly mailing to a growing mailing list; (2) Presentations by the Executive Director along with sermon from pulpits all over South Carolina; (3) Dinners all over the state under sponsorship of The Self Foundation of Greenwood; (4) Correspondence; (5) Personal visits by the Executive Director.

Almost from the first day we saw the need for friends of the Foundation in all areas of the state to serve as an extension of the Executive Director and Board of Trustees. To this end an auxiliary body known as Foundation Associates has been formed.

The Executive Director has represented the Foundation in the following churches: Johnsonville; Toxaway; Anderson; Saint Mark, Spartanburg; Lyman; Broad Street, Columbia; First, Laurens; Salem, Walhalla; Buffalo; Sharon and Shiloh, Abbeville and Andersonville; Pine Grove and First, McColl; First, Bennettsville; Saint Paul, Orangeburg; Saint John's, Aiken; Grace, Union; Trinity, Anderson; Belvedere; Trinity, Charleston; Grace, Charleston; Saint Paul, Chesterfield; Salem and Hanging Rock, Heath Springs; Saint Union; Providence, Holly Hill; Saint John's, Anderson; Trenholm Road, Columbia; Saint James and Ashbury Memorial, Charleston; First, Cheraw; North, Berea-Friends, Greenville; First, Marion; and Bethel, Walterboro. Other preaching appointments scheduled for: Saint Paul, Ninety Six; Woodside and Bethel, Greenville; Suber-Martin Memorial, Columbia; Hebron and Pergamos, Cadis; Lake City; Saint Luke, Walterboro; Bethel, Jackson; Greenbrier and Gordon Memorial, Winnsboro; Gramling; Grace, Union; and First, Hemingway.

Dinners have been held in: Spartanburg (Bethel); Greenwood (Main Street); New Augusta-Aiken; Charleston (Cherokee Place); Anderson; Easley-Clemson; First, Easley; Summerville (Bethany); Columbia; Rock Hill (Saint John's); Greenville; Laurens Church (Broad Street); Winnsboro; Newberry; and Florence. Other dinners are being planned.

Besides the cumulative results we are building everyday, we can cite the following measurable accomplishments:

1. A significant number of Wills have been written to include the Foundation and our institutions and others are in the making.
2. It is apparent that we will surpass \$100,000 in gifts of cash and other assets.
3. A grant of \$5000 from the Division of Higher Education, Board of Higher Education and Ministry toward start-up costs has been most helpful.
4. A grant of \$9000 from The Self Foundation for promotional purposes (sponsored by dinners) has been of inestimable value.
5. Under "other assets" we have had three gifts of real estate, three gifts of stocks, and an automobile.

With an outstanding year of our history coming to an end, we look forward to seeing significant growth in our second year. The South Carolina United Methodist Foundation is ON THE WAY to becoming a strong instrument of service to our Methodist institutions.

JAMES SMILEY EDWARDS March 18, 1889—August 31, 1979

James Smiley Edwards was born March 18, 1889 in Greer, S.C. the son of Joseph E. and Elizabeth Keller Edwards. He attended public schools in Greer and graduated from Wofford College in 1917. Emory awarded him the B.D. degree in 1919 and he went to the University of Edinburgh, Scotland (1920-21). He was ordained and admitted to the S.C. Conference, serving churches at Chester, Westminster, Pelzer, Saxon, Duncan, Fountain Inn, Woodruff, Honea Path, Abbeville, Easley, St. Matthews, and McColl. Jim retired in 1957 and lived in Easley until failing health brought him and his loving Scottish wife, Dr. Georgina W. Edwards, to the Orangeburg Methodist Home. They had been married in Edinburg on September 20, 1924. Their son, Ian Keith, is a practicing physician in Olney, Illinois. Their daughter is Mrs. Iona Sanders of Charleston. Georgina preceded Jim in death by several years.

Memorial services were held for "Smiley" as he was affectionately known, in First Church, Easley, at noon on Thursday, September 6, 1979, conducted by the Rev. Ted Brazil, pastor, and a longtime friend, the Rev. H. Robert Reynolds, who also was a former pastor of the church.

In his remarks, Bob said: "I knew Jim Edwards as a kind and soft-spoken friend, who was gracious and courteous at all times. He was firm in his convictions, yet fair and understanding. While quick to challenge evil, he was unshakable in loyalty to friends, constant in love and affection to family. He possessed a marvelous sense of humor; was well-read and scholarly with a continuing quest for knowledge. A man of many interests, Jim was gentle yet courageous. In a very dark and dismal period, he ministered to our family with Christian grace and compassion. His affirmation and steadfast love endeared him to ministers and to lay persons in all his pastorates.

A wise counselor and advisor he was, especially to the young preachers of the conference.

Long ago, he and his faithful companion of many years, told me of their desire to give their bodies for medical research to the Medical University of South Carolina in life, so in death, each of them ministered to those in need of healing. What greater love than this: In closing his life, he remembered those who might suffer and be healed as a result of his gift of himself totally.

JOHN GRADY FORRESTER May 19, 1906—July 14, 1979

The Rev. John Grady Forrester lived a full life in the 73 years which were given him. He was born in Greer, May 19, 1906, son of the late William Thomas and Lula Grain Forrester. At the time of his death he was pastor of the Fingerville United Methodist Church.

I first knew Grady when I was pastor of the Lyman United Methodist Church and he and his family were members. At that time he was working and going to school, graduating from Spartanburg Methodist College, he entered Wofford College graduating with an A. B. degree in 1943. He then completed his work at Candler School of Theology in 1946. He was a member of Chester Masonic Lodge.

To work and attend college is no small feat, but Grady persevered and fulfilled family responsibilities in an admirable way. He was always supportive of his pastor and it was a rare privilege having this family in one's church.

Mr. Forrester was licensed to preach by the Spartanburg District, September 10, 1943. He was admitted on trial into the Upper South Carolina Conference at Greer, S. C. November 11, 1943, and received into full connection by the Upper South Carolina Conference at Greenwood, November 8, 1945, at Clemson, S. C. He was ordained deacon on November 11, 1945, at Clemson, S. C. by Bishop Clare Purcell, and two years later, on November 2, 1947, an elder by Bishop Purcell, at Spartanburg, S. C.

The following churches were served by him: Greenville Circuit, 1944-46; Mt. McBee, 1947; Mauldin, 1948-49; Brandon, 1950; Matthews (Greenwood) 1951-54; St. James, 1954-57; Woods Chapel-Sharon 1957-61; Leesville, 1961-65; St. James-Eureka, 1965-74; Fingerville 1974, retired supply.

On January 29, 1928, Mr. Forrester was married to Miss Ruth Gertrude McCall, Greer, S. C. who died in 1973. He was later married to Mrs. Rubye S. Lybrand, Greer, S. C. 1974 and she died April 26, 1979.

Surviving him are a son, John G. Forrester, Jr. of Greer; two daughters, Mrs. Edna Freeland of Greenville and Mrs. Joyce Hall of Spartanburg; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Ruth Davis of Greer; a stepson, Gene Lybrand of Greenville; two brothers, Don Forrest Taylor and Carlisle Forrester of Greer; four sisters, Mrs. Wilma Keller and Mrs. Thelma Barnett of Greer; Mrs. Mary Lou Burrell of Elon, N. C. and Mrs. Lillian Inaburn of Orangeburg; and 12 grandchildren.

Services were held at Few's Chapel United Methodist Church, Greer, on July 17, 1979. Grady took seriously his work as a minister, and disciplined himself for this task. He was conscientious in his loyalty to the church he served, and faithful to Christ to the end. Those of us who knew him will miss him, but his life has enriched us.

WILBUR RUSSELL GREGG March 28, 1900—May 27, 1980

Brother Wilbur Russell Gregg, began his long and excellent service in the South Carolina Annual Conference by being admitted on trial Saturday, December 10, 1921. This segment of a beautiful life was ended Tuesday, May 27, 1980.

He was educated in the public schools of Marlboro County, graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree from Claflin College in 1924, graduated with a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Gammon Theological Seminary, 1927. Completing additional postgraduate studies, he received the Master of Sacred Theology degree from Boston University, 1928. Claflin College honored him with the Doctor of Divinity degree 1954.

Dr. Gregg, a man of God, was one of great devotion to the congregations which he served. His interest in education and training in the law and discipline in the churches was above the average. He was called to participate in church workshops and training activities throughout the conference. His interest in music added to his effectiveness. His dedicated Christian life and integrity caused him to be an accepted leader to youth and adults. As a minister he was always faithful to his people as he pastored the Appleton Charge, Lincolnville and Ladson Charge, Centenary Church in Charleston, St. James Church in Darlington, Trinity-Orangeburg, Trinity-Camden and as District Superintendent of the Orangeburg District. In his retirement he served the North Orangeburg Charge.

Dr. Gregg taught in the Department of Religion at Clark and in the Department of Religion and Philosophy at Claflin College. He served on several boards and agencies of the conference, was a member of many civic and professional groups, the founder and president of the Orangeburg Branch of the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History.

Dr. Gregg was married to the former Mrs. Sallie Mae Jackson, who preceded him in death. He was married to the former Mrs. Laura E. Heyward, June 27, 1965, who survives him.

He gave his time unstintingly to the annual conference without neglecting his first responsibility — his local church. Dr. Harper served as a member of The Board of Trustees at Epworth Children's Home and a member of the Board of Trustees of Wofford College. He was also a member of the Board of the Ordained Ministry, the Board of Missions and Church Extension, the Conference Board of Education — president for four years, and a member of the Program Council. In Conway he was a member of the Kiwanis Club.

Claude was gentle in nature, firm in conviction, and staunch in loyalty. His integrity was without blemish, and his devotion to duty unquestioned. His love for people opened doors of opportunity for real service in their need.

Scholarly by nature as recognized by his Phi Beta Kappa key, yet his sermons were understood by all. He never preached down to people, but simply shared with them his great faith and love for Christ.

Victor served appointments at Eutawville; Harleyville; Ruffin; Heath Springs; Centerfield; Trinity United Methodist in Bamberg; First United Methodist Church in Leesville; Superintendent of the Rock Hill District and Associate Minister at Washington Street. In declining health he took disability leave for four years until his retirement in 1975.

He is survived by his wife, the former Miss Annil Long Smith; a son, Victor E. Hickman, Jr.; two daughters, Mrs. Alicia Rivers and Miss Gayle Hickman.

As one who served his people well Victor Hickman, during his ministry served as a member of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, Board of Conference Claimants, Board of Missions and Church Extension, Trustee of S. C. Methodist Advocate and the Methodist Center (served as chairman), and as a Trustee of Columbia College (served as Chairman). He was elected by his peers to be a delegate to the 1964 Jurisdictional Conference.

His mark was made in his love and caring as he lived his ministry. We are better for his having passed our way.

RUSSELL ARCHIE HUGHES
February 23, 1893 — August 25, 1979

Russell Archie Hughes was born in Union County, South Carolina, son of John Giles and Martha Rebecca Orr Hughes.

Mr. Hughes attended the Wesley Chapel School through the sixth grade, Blacksburg High School and graduated from Union High School in 1913. He earned an AB degree from Wofford College in 1917.

Our country was involved in World War I when Mr. Hughes graduated from Wofford College. After graduation he served five months in the United States Army, Company C, 62nd Pioneer Infantry.

After being separated from the armed forces, he taught mathematics one year at Clemson College. He later became principal in South Carolina public schools for five years.

Mr. Hughes was converted to the Christian Religion in early childhood and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at the age of 15. He felt the call to preach early in life. He was licensed to preach by the Spartanburg District at the Saxon Church in May 1914, upon the recommendation of Wesley Chapel Church.

On November 2, 1919, Mr. Hughes married Miss Letie Glenton Dennis of Turbeville, S. C. and to this union five children were born: Emory Keith (deceased); Mikell Giles, Mary Margery (deceased); Letie Veta (deceased), and Russell Archie, Jr.

Mr. Hughes was admitted on Trial into the Upper South Carolina Conference at Laurens, S. C. on November 6, 1924. He was received into Full Connection at Rock Hill, S. C. on October 31, 1926, and was ordained Deacon by Bishop Edwin D. Muzon. He was ordained Elder by Bishop Muzon at Anderson, S. C. on November 25, 1928.

He served faithfully and well to the following: Ridgeway, 1925-28; Irmo, 1929-32; Gilbert, 1933-36; Glendale, 1937-38; Pacolet Circuit, 1939-41; Hickory Grove, 1942-44; Janna, 1945; Butler Circuit (Saluda), 1946-49; Ninety Six, 1950-53; Lewis (Newberry) 1954-57; Ridge Springs, 1958-61. Mr. Hughes retired at the Conference of 1961 after serving faithfully for 37 years. He and Mrs. Hughes moved to Olanta, S. C. where they were living when God called him home.

Mr. Hughes was a firm, quiet, devoted man of God going about our Father's Business in a steady way.

Our good Heavenly Father called him home on August 25, 1979, and his funeral was conducted in the Pine Grove United Methodist Church, Turbeville, S. C. on August 27. His body rests in the church cemetery.

MATTHEW DOUGLAS MCCOLLOM
November 30, 1912 — April 17, 1980

If Mack ever failed to preach with persuasion or failed to pitch a no hitter or win in debate or excell at swimming, table tennis or Scrabble it wasn't because he didn't try. On every occasion he put forth his best efforts to whatever he undertook to do.

I knew Mack longer and perhaps better than any of his other contemporaries - bar none - except his own brothers and sisters. Our friendship extended over more than a half century. We came to know each other in the early twenties when his reverend father was moved from Wesley at Cheraw to Mt. Zion at Kingstree near where my own reverend father was pastor of one of those big circuits that you find in Williamsburg County, of which Kingstree was the County Seat town.

We had much in common. We were both preachers' kids. As boys we played sand lot baseball together, shined shoes on the same street corner, learned to swim at the same swimming hole on Black River, and at one time, even shared the same childhood girl friend. Also, we were members of the same Sunday School Class for intermediate

boys and "got religion" the same night, or shall I say, we were frightened into the Kingdom together. The preacher's text on that never-to-be-forgotten night was, "For thy life; look not behind thee, neither stay thou in all the plains; escape to the mountain, lest thou be consumed." Genesis 19:17.

Later in life we wound up at the same college, joined the same Fraternity, and when the great depression hit, we both dropped out of school. I went to my first pastor, Mack began teaching school and was a Local Preacher. From thence he enlisted in the US Army following the outbreak of World War II. While at Fort Bragg he achieved T4 status in the Medical Corps and assisted his Army Chaplain.

In 1942 I became Mack's pastor at Trinity Church in Orangeburg, from where I was recommended for membership in the South Carolina Conference in 1943 and full membership and Deacon's Orders in 1945.

Upon the completion of his tour of duty in the US Army, "Mack" finished his work at Claflin and then graduated from Gammon. In both institutions he distinguished himself as an in-depth scholar. In the meantime, he was wed to his charming Mamie; this union was blessed with their one child, Douglas.

"Mack" was indeed an outstanding minister. His qualifications were impeccable. He proclaimed the gospel in a clear and incisive manner. He was fervent and persuasive in his delivery, and logical in his exegesis of the Scriptures. He was a good counselor. In his home life he was the acme of paternalism and in church relationships a brother beloved. In the larger community his ministerial stance was not unlike that of John the Baptist, John Bunyon, John Knox and John Wesley. He was for three decades one of God's trombones on the South Carolina scene of human events.

"Mack" could always be counted on to espouse a good cause. He had the courage to stand up for his convictions and to articulate his feelings with unmistakable clarity. At times was known to have been vitriolic. As a foe of racial injustices and discrimination he was relentless and redoubtable.

As to the practical application of Christian morality, "Mack" excelled. Unknown to most of his contemporaries was his experience of continence. Well known is the fact that for twelve years he was the pastor of the church where he had been a member and where he ministered to former classmates, teachers, and others who knew him. There was nothing in his past life that could cause disrespect.

It is no wonder that during the final days of his earthly pilgrimage, his prayers and meditations were upon Psalm 4 which thusly concludes, "I will both lay me down in peace, and sleep; for thou, Lord, only makest me dwell in safety."

PURDY BELVIN McLEOD September 27, 1894 — March 17, 1980

The Reverend Purdy Belvin McLeod was born in Sumter, South Carolina, on September 27, 1894, the son of Jesse and Margaret Josey McLeod. At the age of three he went to make his home with the Reverend and Mrs. T. L. Belvin. He attended Claflin Fitting School and Wofford College.

In 1916, Purdy joined the U. S. Army, and served until 1919. He saw duty in France and Germany and rose to the rank of 2nd Lieutenant. After leaving active duty he joined the U. S. Army Reserve, Quartermaster Corps, serving until 1930, as a Major.

On December 3, 1919, he married Miss Ethel Gertrude Horres of Holly Hill, South Carolina. Their marriage of more than sixty years produced a close knit family team in which five children found nurture and growth. Their five children are: Martha (Mrs. Harold W. Hobbs of North Myrtle Beach), Mrs. Madeline Abigail M. Lee (Conway), Purdy B., Jr., (Columbia), Laurie Ainsworth (North Myrtle Beach), and Ethel Horres (Fairfax, Virginia).

Mr. McLeod was licensed to preach on March 15, 1924, by the Orangeburg District on recommendation of the Orange Circuit, and was Admitted on Trial into the South Carolina Conference in December that same year. In 1926, he was ordained a Deacon by Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon, and received into Full Connection in the South Carolina Conference, in 1926 at Bennettsville. Two years later he was ordained an Elder by Bishop Mouzon in Orangeburg.

Purdy McLeod was a man of remarkable energy, wit and affection. He was respected and loved by people in every walk of life, and especially the people in the congregations he served. He and Mrs. McLeod often said they enjoyed every one of their pastorates, and would have happily returned to any of them. His ministry, which spanned more than half a century, saw service in the following South Carolina communities: Meggett, Cades, Hemingway, Turbeville, Hampton, Bethune, Heath Springs, Conway and Loris. He twice served pastorates in the Conway area and after his retirement in 1960, served as Chaplain at the Horry County Prison Camp.

It is difficult to measure the mark of a minister, but it can perhaps be safely said that Purdy McLeod's most effective ministry came after his official retirement. His work with inmates at the Horry County Prison Camp was one which has had lasting influence on countless young men who came in contact with him, his wife, and his faith.

Death came quietly to Purdy McLeod on the afternoon of March 17, 1980. He simply went to sleep. His funeral service was held at First United Methodist Church in Conway, conducted by the Rev. Dr. S. George Lovell, pastor of the First Baptist Church, The Rev. Inmont Taylor, and the Rev. Eugene C. Holmes. The Old Testament lesson read at that service perhaps is the best tribute and description of his life and call: "The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me to bring good tidings to the afflicted; he has sent me to bind up the broken hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to those who are bound; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor, . . . to comfort all who mourn . . ." (Isaiah 61:1-2).

LORENZO KELGMON NIMMONS January 14, 1944 — November 28, 1979

In the quietness of the night Lorenzo Kelgmon Nimmons was called by his Heavenly Father to join all those who had gone before him. The race that was started years ago was completed on the morning of November 28, 1979, in Charleston, South Carolina, where he answered the call of the Master.

He was born in Charleston, South Carolina, the husband of Virginia Keller Nimmons, the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Kelgmon Nimmons and brother of S Sgt. Qulock H. Nimmons. He joined the Old Bethel United Methodist Church at the age of six. He attended the public schools of Charleston, Daniel Jenkins and Mary Ford elementary and the Bonds-Wilson High School. His education was furthered at Claflin College, Orangeburg, South Carolina. Upon graduation, he was called into the United States Air Force where he served his country faithfully until he was honorably discharged. He taught school in Bamberg and Blackville for three years, and after finishing a successful tenure there as a teacher, he returned home to work with the Black Community Developers Program in his church. While working there he received the call to the Christian ministry; he was recommended by the charge conference of Old Bethel and in that same year entered the Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia. He was ordained Deacon in 1972 and received Elders orders in 1974.

Brother Nimmons served the following pastorates: Laurens-Ninety Six, where he and his congregation built a beautiful church (Calvary United Methodist Church) that will always be a living monument to him. At his last appointment, North Orangeburg, he and his congregation renovated Mt. Zion and Nazareth churches. The cornerstone at Mt. Zion bears yet another living monument to him.

During his 80 years he made many contributions to life. He was a soldier in World War I, a high school coach, a public school superintendent and later a minister.

Mr. Parrott was a devoted promoter of boy and girl scouting. In 1971, he received the Asbury Trail Certificate and Medal in recognition and appreciation of his many years of encouraging scouts to walk the 23 mile Francis Asbury Trail in the Smokey Mountains near Lake Junaluska and to read about Asbury's horseback adventures over early America.

In 1965, he retired at 2 Whilden Drive in Williamston. A visit to the Parrotts provided the visitor with a memorable and interesting experience. Mr. Parrott, a patriotic citizen, quite often flew the American flag from the front of his home. One of a phrase he so often used, "America the Beautiful." It was a lovely home on the outside, and on the inside there was a lovely family to greet the visitor. In the den was an orderly and magnificent collection of mementos from around the world. Mr. Parrott was always eager to explain the history of each item in his collection. In the back yard he had carefully planted a "mini-forest," which he said contained one tree of every kind in the forest.

For the gift of his good and long life, his friendship to so many, and his contribution to the church and to life in general, we can all give thanks to almighty God.

NORMAN KEITH POLK
July 10, 1901 — December 25, 1979

Norman Keith Polk was born July 10, 1901, in Islandton, South Carolina, to Frank Henry and Mattie Varn Polk. He was educated in the public schools of Union and Spartanburg Counties, as well as the Carlisle Finishing School. He graduated from Wofford College in 1921, and enrolled in the Candler School of Theology from which he graduated with the B.D. degree in 1923.

Mr. Polk was licensed to preach by the Charleston District Conference in September, 1921, and in November, 1923, was Admitted on Trial as a Member of the South Carolina Conference. Ordination to Deacon and Elder followed in 1926 and 1927, respectively.

Mr. Polk's service to the South Carolina Conference spanned nearly one century, more than one half of his lifetime. His appointments stretched from the mountains to the sea, and wherever he served he soon found his way into the hearts of the people both as an effective pastor and as a good citizen in the community. He valued the associations that he formed with fellow citizens in Lions International and Kiwanis International, often serving the local clubs in which he held membership as their secretary, President, or representative to international conventions. In like manner he served the Conference effectively not only in his role as pastor, but also as a shepherd of the Conference's life and work through his service on numerous Conference Boards and Committees.

Retiring in 1968, Mr. Polk made Batesburg his retirement home along with Mrs. Polk (the former Rosalie Thraill), who had co-labored with him in ministry since their marriage on November 5, 1923, just four days after he was Admitted on Trial to the South Carolina Conference. Batesburg was home for the Polks until 1977, when

death compelled a move to Greenwood so that the Polks might reside closer to their only son, N. Keith Polk, Jr., also a ministerial member of the South Carolina Conference.

The closing years of Mr. Polk's life were filled daily with the pain induced by an unmerciful arthritic condition. After a lengthy stay in the hospital, he came to reside in the Nursing Center of Greenwood Methodist Home; release from disease and pain came on Christmas Day.

Funeral Services celebrating the life of this faithful soldier of the cross were held at Main Street, Greenwood, on December 27, 1979, the Reverend Needham Williamson, Jr., R. Bryce Herbert, Dr. John M. Shingler, and the Reverend James S. Gadsden leading the service. The Service of Committal and Interment were held at Ridgecrest Memorial Park, Batesburg, conducted by the Reverend Benjamin B. Barnes.

The Reverend Moses Phillip Pyatt, retired minister of the United Methodist Church, residing in Ladson, South Carolina, died Sunday, March 16, 1980, at a local hospital in Charleston. Mr. Pyatt was the son of the late Reverend Charles James and Adline Salters Pyatt. He was educated at Bishops Stevens Grade School, Avery Institute, Claflin College, and the Cummins Memorial Theological Seminary.

Mr. Pyatt was licensed to preach in 1926, at the Israel Episcopal Church in Charleston, South Carolina. He was married to Rose Green in Sumter County, South Carolina on November 19, 1936. The Tallons have two children: a son, Mr. Robert Marion Tallon of Greenville, North Carolina, and a daughter, Mrs. Imogene Tallon Russell of Moncks Corner.

He completed High School, and the five year course of study for local pastors at Emory University. He was licensed to preach January 15, 1972, in the Lake City Charge on the Jamestown Charge. Mr. Tallon was Lay Pastor on the Jamestown Charge from 1971 to 1974; Olar Charge 1974-1978; Wagener Charge 1978-1979.

He was a Mason, Shriner, and US Army Sergeant, 1945-1946, in Japan. He received the good conduct medal, and the rifle expert medal. He was also stationed in the Asia-Pacific.

He was a good pastor. He took seriously his ordination vow "to visit from house to house." All the members of his congregations witness to the fact that he was a faithful pastor; and his beloved wife, Rose, joined him in this service to the Church.

He took his preaching seriously. He prepared his sermons with great care and considered this to be the most important single effort of the week. He was a good preacher.

D. A. had heart surgery the next day from which he never recovered. But he is dead. He is alive in the Father's House.

Robert Patrick Turner, son of the Rev. John H. and Melissa Jane Mangum Turner, was born in Pageland, South Carolina, on June 30, 1890. He was educated in the public schools of Chesterfield County, the University of South Carolina, had two years at Columbia Presbyterian Seminary and completed the Conference's educational requirements through Emory University and the Conference Course of Study.

Mr. Turner married Theresa McDonald of Kershaw on August 8, 1918. This gracious and devoted wife served by his side during his fifty years of ministry and faithfully ministered to him during several years of declining health before his death. On December 1, 1922, the Rev. Mr. Turner was licensed to preach by the Sumter District. He was admitted On Trial by the South Carolina Conference that same year. He was ordained a deacon in 1924 and received into Full Connection. He was ordained an Elder on November 21, 1926. His pastorates include: Timmonsville Circuit, 1922-1923; 1923-1924; Cottageville, 1924-1927; Estill-Furman, 1928-1930; Greeleyville-Lenoir, 1931-1932; Broad Street (Sumter) 1933-1936; McColl, 1937-1938; Holly Hill Circuit, 1939-1943; Cherokee Place (Charleston), 1944-1945; Beaufort, 1945-1948; Drayton (Spartanburg), 1949-1951; Trinity (Clio), 1952-1955; Moncks Corner, 1956-1959; Indian Field, 1960-1961. Though Mr. Turner retired in 1961, he continued as a Retired Supply and pastored Target Church near Holly Hill for another ten years, 1961-1971.

The Rev. Mr. Turner served on a number of conference boards, commissions and agencies. His ministry reached into still wider areas through his sermons which appeared regularly in *The Sumter Herald*, *The Spartanburg Journal* and *The Dorchester Eagle*. He was also the author of some twenty-two meditations appearing in *The Upper Room*.

As a pastor Mr. Turner was admired and appreciated by his members. He also shared the respect of his congregations for his ability to preach with directness, compassion and with simplicity. One of the most memorable sermons of this spokesman for God was based on Paul's claim to have "kept the faith". (II Tim. 4:7) Rev. Turner's three part admonition was: (1) A faith worth keeping must be born out of personal experience, (2) It must allow room for growth and (3) It must be shared.

Mr. Turner took special delight in counseling with young ministers and sharing with them out of his rich experience and his sermonic writings. I had the good fortune of being a member of his church when my own call to the ministry came. In a special way I felt his support and am sure that to no small degree my ministry was influenced by his ministry to me and the worthy example he set before us all.

Mr. Turner died on July 25, 1979. His funeral was conducted at Target Church by the Reverends C. S. Floyd, Ernest M. Heape, and his District Superintendent, The Rev. Dr. E. W. Hardin. Burial was in the Holly Hill Cemetery.

In our Conference Henry served on the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries. His greatest thrust, however, was serving as an evangelistic preacher for numerous churches. He had a special interest in camp meeting and did much to continue their impact within our Conference and outside.

Henry Wofford was a compassionate pastor. His work among the poor, the uncultured and alcoholics would be difficult to match. His empathy for the downtrodden was Christ-like. His labors in their behalf were life giving. He was a dedicated servant of the Lord seeking little for himself and getting little except, I am sure, the "Well done" of his Master.

Henry is survived by his wife, two daughters, three sisters and four brothers. One of his brothers is a minister in our Conference and another is a missionary in Brazil.

Funeral services were held on July 29, 1979 at Enoree United Methodist Church conducted by his District Superintendent, the Rev. Theodore H. Walter, and the Rev. Ernest M. Heape. Burial was in Greenlawn Memorial Gardens in Spartanburg.

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I. RULES OF ORGANIZATION

Annual Conference Boards

1. There shall be a Board of Church and Society composed of twenty-four (24) elected members of whom sixteen (16) shall be lay persons and eight (8) shall be clergy persons. There shall be at least one (1) lay person from each district; there shall be no more than one (1) clergy person from a district at the time of election. This Board shall be related to the General Board of Church and Society and shall function in accordance with paragraph 727 of the 1976 Discipline.
2. *The Board of Diaconal Ministry, which is required by the Discipline, shall be organized and function as per paragraph 732 of the 1976 Discipline.*
3. There shall be a Board of Directors of the Methodist Camp composed of twelve (12) members, at least eight (8) of whom shall be lay persons, two (2) of whom shall be women. Board members shall be nominated by the Conference Council on Ministries and elected by the Annual Conference.
 - a. Membership shall be divided into four classes, beginning with three (3) persons in a one-year class, three (3) persons in a two-year class, three (3) persons in a three-year class, and three (3) persons in a four-year class. Annually the Annual Conference shall elect three (3) members to replace the class that expires. No member shall serve for more than twelve years.
 - b. The membership shall include the following ex-officio members without vote: The Director of the Conference Council on Ministries and the Superintendent of the Methodist Camp. The membership shall also include, with vote: a District Superintendent appointed by the Bishop, and a member of the Annual Conference Board of Trustees.
 - c. The responsibilities of the Board shall be as follows:
 1. Property. To include care of the facilities, providing adequate insurance coverage. All legal matters relative to the property shall be referred to the Board of the title.
 2. Activities. To implement program through the Conference Council on Ministries Program Process for adoption by the South Carolina Annual Conference.
 3. Finances. To provide for funding of the South Carolina United Methodist Camp through the Conference Council on Ministries in accordance with the policies of the Annual Conference. Responsibilities shall include drawing up the budget (including personnel salary and expense schedules), setting the rates for fees, authorizing and receiving an annual audit.
 4. Staffing. To draw up job descriptions for a Camp Superintendent and other staff positions as needed, and to arrange for filling the position of Superintendent. The Camp Superintendent shall fill other staff positions.
 5. Promotion. To promote the nature, purpose and services of the camp.
 - d. The Board shall be related to the Annual Conference through the Conference Council on Ministries.
4. There shall be a Board of Education composed of twenty-four (24) elected members of whom sixteen (16) shall be lay persons and eight (8) shall be clergy persons. There shall be at least one (1) lay person from each district; there shall be no more than one (1) clergy person from a district at the time of election. This Board shall be related to the General Board of Discipleship, Division of Education and the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, Division of Higher Education. This Board shall carry out the duties assigned in paragraphs 728.1.b through 728.2.g and paragraph 730 of the 1976 Discipline.

5. There shall be a Board of Evangelism composed of twenty-four (24) elected members of whom sixteen (16) shall be lay persons and eight (8) shall be clergy persons. There shall be at least one (1) lay person from each district; there shall be no more than one (1) clergy person from a district at the time of election. This Board shall be related to the General Board of Discipleship, Division of Evangelism, Worship and Stewardship, specifically in the area of evangelism as outlined in paragraph 1315 of the 1976 Discipline. This Board shall function in accordance with paragraph 728.1 and paragraphs 728.3.a. through 728.3.f. of the 1976 Discipline.
6. There shall be a Board of Health and Welfare Ministries composed of twenty-four (24) elected members of whom sixteen (16) shall be lay persons and eight (8) shall be clergy persons. There shall be at least one (1) lay person from each District. There shall be no more than one (1) clergy person from a district at the time of election. This Board shall be related to the General Board of Global Ministries. It shall function in accordance with paragraphs 729.c. (1) through 729.c.(10) of the 1976 Discipline.
7. *There shall be a Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry composed of twenty-four (24) elected members of whom sixteen (16) shall be lay persons and eight (8) shall be clergy persons. There shall be at least one lay person from each district; there shall be no more than one clergy person from a district at the time of the election.*
8. There shall be a Board of Laity composed of: The Conference lay leader; past Conference lay leaders; the associate Conference lay leader of Lay Life and work; the associate Conference lay leader of Stewardship and Finance; the secretary-treasurer; and program directors for: United Methodist Men, Certified Lay Speaking, Leadership Development, Stewardship Education, Every Member Commitment, and Wills and Special Gifts. This Board shall include four (4) district superintendents selected by the cabinet; the district lay leader and two (2) associate lay leaders from each district; The Conference President and the Conference Secretary of the United Methodist Women, the Conference President of the United Methodist Youth. The Board shall be related to the General Board of Discipleship as outlined in paragraph 728 of the 1976 Discipline. The Board shall function in accordance with paragraphs 728.5.a. through 728.5.e and 728.7.a through 728.7.d of the 1976 Discipline.
 - a. The Conference Lay Leader shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference, upon nomination by the Board of Laity.
9. *The Board of the Ordained Ministry, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of twenty-four (24) ministers. The Board shall be nominated by the Bishop and shall function in accordance with paragraph 721 of the 1976 Discipline.*
10. There shall be a Board of Missions composed of twenty-four (24) elected members of whom sixteen (16) shall be lay persons and eight (8) shall be clergy persons. There shall be at least one (1) lay person from each district; there shall be no more than one (1) clergy person from a district at the time of election. This Board shall be related to the General Board of Global Ministries and shall carry out the functions outlined in paragraphs 729.3 through 729.4.a.(20), and paragraphs 729.5. through 729.5.f. of the 1976 Discipline.
11. *The Board of Pensions, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of eighteen (18) elected members, nine (9) lay persons and nine (9) clergy persons. The Board shall be related to the General Board of Pensions and shall be organized and function in accordance with paragraph 734 and paragraphs 1706 through 1708 of the 1976 Discipline.*
12. *The Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference, which is required by the Discipline, shall be organized as per paragraphs 2410 through 2420 of the 1976 Discipline.*
13. There shall be a Board of Trustees of the Belin Property composed of eight (8) elected members of whom four (4) shall be lay persons and four (4) shall be clergy persons.
 - a. Persons serving on this Board of Trustees shall be nominated by the Board of Missions.
 - b. The Board shall be organized into four (4) classes of two (2) persons, one (1) clerical and one (1) lay.
 - c. One class shall be elected annually to serve for four years.
 - d. The tenure of the trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years.
 - e. The Board of Trustees shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Missions.

14. There shall be a Board of Trustees of Claflin College composed of not less than nine (9) nor more than twenty-seven (27) members divided into three classes serving three (3) years, respectively, elected at the annual meeting of the Board. Successors for each class, as the term expires, shall be elected for a term of three (3) years. After twenty-four (24) years of continuous service, trustees may be placed in a class of "trustee emeritus".
- The trustees shall elect their successors from a list of nominees submitted by the various supporting conferences of the United Methodist Church and the Claflin College General Alumni Association. The following allocation shall be made: Three (3) from the South Carolina Annual Conference, one (1) from each of the other supporting conferences, and two (2) from the General Alumni Association of Claflin College. The remaining members are to be elected at large.
 - This institution shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Education.
15. There shall be a Board of Trustees of Columbia College composed of twenty-seven (27) elected members in conformity with the charter.
- Every even-numbered year the Board of Education shall nominate suitable persons to the Annual Conference for election for two (2) year terms. The tenure of the trustees shall be limited to twelve (12) consecutive years. After such period of service a former trustee shall be ineligible for re-election until a lapse of two (2) years. Vacancies may be filled in any year, but one-year terms shall not be permissible in even-numbered years.
 - This institution shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Education.
16. There shall be a Board of Trustees of Epworth Children's Home composed of twenty-one (21) elected members of whom eleven (11) shall be lay persons and ten (10) shall be clergy persons. At least three (3) members of the Board of Trustees shall be women.
- Persons serving on this Board of Trustees shall be nominated to the Annual Conference every even-numbered year by the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.
 - The tenure of Trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years, after which period a person shall be ineligible for re-election until two (2) years have elapsed.
 - The Board shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.
17. There shall be a Board of Trustees of the Greenwood Methodist Home composed of twenty-one (21) elected members of whom eleven (11) shall be lay persons and ten (10) shall be clergy persons.
- Persons serving on this Board of Trustees shall be nominated to the Annual Conference every even-numbered year by the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.
 - The tenure of Trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years, after which period a person shall be ineligible for re-election until two (2) years have elapsed.
 - The Board of Trustees shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.
18. There shall be a Board of Trustees of The Methodist Home, Orangeburg composed of twenty-one (21) elected members of whom eleven (11) shall be lay persons and ten (10) shall be clergy persons.
- Persons serving on this Board of Trustees shall be nominated to the Annual Conference every even-numbered year by the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.
 - The tenure of Trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years, after which period a person shall be ineligible for re-election until two (2) years have elapsed.
 - The Board of Trustees shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.
19. There shall be a Board of Trustees of The South Carolina United Methodist Advocate and the Methodist Center composed of fifteen (15) elected members of whom eight (8) shall be lay persons and seven (7) shall be clergy persons.
- Persons serving on this Board of Trustees shall be nominated to the Annual Conference every even-numbered year by the Annual Conference Commission on Nominations.

- The Tenure of Trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years, after which period a person shall be ineligible for re-election until two (2) years have elapsed.
20. There shall be a Board of Trustees of Spartanburg Methodist College composed of twenty-four (24) elected or named members and two (2) Student Advisory Trustees.
- Persons serving on this Board of Trustees shall be nominated to the Annual Conference by the Board of Missions. Those elected and named Trustees shall be divided into three (3) classes of eight (8) each. One class shall be elected each year to serve for three (3) years.
 - Seven (7) Trustees of each class and the two (2) Student Advisory Trustees shall be elected by the Annual Conference upon nomination by the Board of Missions, and one (1) Trustee of each class shall be named by the National Division of the Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church on nomination of the Conference Board of Missions.
 - The tenure of the Trustees shall be limited to twelve (12) consecutive years. The tenure of Student Advisory Trustee shall be one (1) year.
 - The Board of Trustees shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Missions.
21. There shall be a Board of Trustees of Wofford College composed of twenty-seven elected members in conformity with the charter.
- Every even-numbered year the Board of Education shall nominate suitable persons to the Annual Conference for election for two (2) year terms. The tenure of the Trustees shall be limited to twelve (12) consecutive years. After such period of service a former Trustee shall be ineligible for re-election until a lapse of two (2) years. Vacancies may be filled in any year, but one-year terms shall not be permissible in even-numbered years.
 - This institution shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Education.

Annual Conference Councils

30. *The Council on Finance and Administration, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of eleven (11) elected members, five (5) clergy persons and six (6) lay persons. The Council shall function in accordance with paragraphs 706 through 726 of the 1976 Discipline.*
31. *The Council on Ministries, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of the following: the presiding bishop; the district superintendents; the Conference Secretary; two (2) representatives of the Conference youth organization; two representatives of the Conference of United Methodist Men; two (2) representatives of the Conference of United Methodist Women, one of whom shall be the president; two (2) lay persons from each district; chairperson of the youth council. There shall be two (2) representatives, at least one (1) of whom shall be a lay person from each of the following boards: Church and Society; Education; Evangelism; Health and Welfare Ministries, Higher Education and Campus Ministry; Laity (one (1) of whom shall be the Conference Lay Leader); the Methodist Camp; Ordained Ministry (both shall be clergy persons and one (1) shall be the chairperson); Missions. There shall be one (1) representative from each of the following commissions: Career Planning and Counselling; Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns; Religion and Race; Status and Role of Women; Worship. There shall be one (1) representative from the Committee on the Ethnic Minority Local Church. The following shall be an ex-officio member with vote: The Director of Pastoral Care and Counselling. The following shall be ex-officio members without vote: The Conference Staff (salaried and voluntary); the Conference Treasurer; one representative from the Council on Finance and Administration; The Editor of the South Carolina United Methodist Advocate and the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs. The Council on Ministries shall function in accordance with paragraphs 726.1 and 726.10 of the 1976 Discipline.*
32. *The Council on Youth Ministry, which is required by the Discipline, shall be organized by and amenable to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries. The Council shall function as per paragraph 739 of the 1976 Discipline.*

Annual Conference Commissions

40. *The Commission on Archives and History, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of the Conference Secretary, the Archivist of Claflin College, The Archivist of Wofford College, two (2) Lay persons and two (2) Clergy persons elected by the Annual Conference. The Commission shall function in accordance with Paragraph 735 of the 1976 Discipline.*
 - a. *The libraries at Claflin College and Wofford College shall be designated as depositories of all Annual Conference minutes and records. Where possible duplicate copies of all materials shall be furnished; in case of materials which cannot be furnished in duplicate, the Secretary of the Annual Conference shall make the determination as to which depository shall be used.*
41. There shall be a Commission on Career Planning and Counseling composed of eighteen (18) elected members of whom twelve (12) shall be lay persons and six (6) shall be clergy persons. There shall be one (1) lay person from each district; there shall be no more than one (1) clergy person from a district at the time of election. The Commission shall be related to the Office of Personnel of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry and shall function in accordance with paragraphs 1603.1, 1603.7, 1603.16 and 1603.26 of the 1976 Discipline.
42. There shall be a Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns composed of eighteen (18) elected members of whom twelve (12) shall be lay persons and six (6) shall be clergy persons. There shall be one (1) lay person from each district; there shall be no more than one (1) clergy person from a district at the time of election.
43. *The Commission on Equitable Salaries, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of twelve (12) elected members of whom six (6) shall be lay persons and six (6) shall be clergy persons. The Board of Missions, the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Board of Lay Ministries each designate one (1) of its members to serve ex-officio. The Commission shall function in accordance with paragraph 934 of the 1976 Discipline.*
44. There shall be a Commission on Group Life and Hospital Insurance composed of eighteen (18) elected members of whom twelve (12) shall be lay persons and six (6) shall be clergy persons. There shall be one (1) lay person from each district; there shall be no more than one (1) clergy person from a district at the time of election. The Commission shall supervise the annual conference insurance programs.
45. *The Commission on Religion and Race, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of fifteen (15) persons. Eight members shall be persons from ethnic minorities, four of whom shall be clergy persons and five (5) shall be lay persons. Seven (7) members shall be persons of the majority membership, three (3) of whom shall be clergy persons and four (4) shall be lay persons. This Commission shall be related to the General Commission on Religion and Race and shall function in accordance with paragraph 736 of the 1976 Discipline.*
46. *The Commission on the Status and Role of Women, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of eighteen (18) elected members, twelve (12) lay persons at least nine (9) of whom shall be women and six (6) clergy persons at least two (2) of whom shall be women. This Commission shall function in accordance with paragraph 737 of the 1976 Discipline and shall be related to the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women.*
47. There shall be a Commission on Worship composed of eighteen (18) elected members of whom twelve (12) shall be lay persons and six (6) shall be clergy persons. There shall be one (1) lay person from each district; there shall be no more than one (1) clergy person from a district at the time of election. This Commission shall be related to the General Board of Discipleship, Division of Evangelism, Worship and Stewardship, specifically in the area of Worship as outlined in paragraph 728.4 of the 1976 Discipline. The Commission shall function in accordance with paragraph 728.4 of the 1976 Discipline.

Annual Conference Committees

60. There shall be a Committee on the Annual Conference composed of fifteen (15) elected members, five (5) clergy persons and ten (10) lay persons nominated by the Committee on Nominations. The following shall be ex-officio members: The President of the Conference Council on Ministries; the Secretary of the Annual Conference; the Treasurer of the Annual Conference; the chairperson of the Conference Commission on Worship; the President of the United Methodist Women; the Conference Lay Leader; and one (1) youth elected by the Annual Conference Youth Council. The district superintendent and the pastor of the local church who are to be the hosts of the next Annual Conference shall meet with the Committee in the week just preceding the Annual Conference of which they hosts.

- a. The Bishop shall serve as the chairperson of the Committee.
- b. The Committee shall arrange the Annual Conference program, giving due regard to any special orders required by the Discipline, or as ordered by the Annual Conference. The Committee shall determine the compensation and expenses to paid speakers invited by this Committee, and the Treasurer shall make such payments from the Conference Expense Funds.
- c. The Committee shall receive all invitations to host the Annual Conference. It shall recommend to the Annual Conference the place for the entertainment of the Annual Conference at least two years in advance.
- d. The Committee shall conduct all matters of courtesy and make such introductions as are necessary during the sessions of Annual Conference.
- e. The Committee shall arrange for an appropriate Memorial Service to be held annually and shall select the speaker.
- f. The Committee shall be responsible for the selection of persons to write the memoirs of the preachers, preachers' spouses, widows and widowers who have died during the year. These memorials shall be printed in the Conference Journal; those of the preachers shall not exceed 600 words and those of spouses, widows and widowers shall not exceed 250 words.
61. There shall be a Committee on Annual Conference Structure composed of the following members: Nine (9) members at large nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations, six (6) of whom shall be lay persons and three (3) clergy persons. The following shall be ex-officio members: The chairperson and secretary of the Committee on Standing Rules, the Conference President of United Methodist Women; the Conference lay leader; the President of the Council on Youth Ministries; the chairperson and secretary of the Conference Council on Ministries; the Conference Secretary; and two (2) district superintendents designated by the presiding bishop.
 - a. The Committee shall make a thorough and continuous study of the organization and structure of the Annual Conference as it relates both to program and administration. The Committee shall make annual recommendations to the Conference for consideration and possible adoption.
 - b. The Committee shall designate lines of communication between the Annual Conference, Boards, Councils, Commissions, and Committees and the appropriate Jurisdictional and General Church structures. Such action shall be subject to the approval of the presiding bishop and the Conference Council on Ministries.
 - c. All proposed structural changes for Annual Conference quadrennial boards, councils, commissions and committees shall be referred to the Committee for study and possible presentation to the Annual Conference.
62. There shall be a Committee on the Conference Journal composed of three (3) clerical members, six (6) lay members and the following ex-officio members: the Conference Secretary; the first Assistant Conference Secretary; the Editor of the South Carolina United Methodist Advocate; the Statistician.
 - a. The Committee shall be responsible for the publication of the pre-conference report.
 1. All Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees shall submit their informational reports and recommendations to the Conference Secretary so that they may be ready for distribution, as the pre-conference report by mimeograph or offset print method, at least four weeks prior to Annual Conference. Excluded from this requirement are the Board of the Ordained Ministry, the Committee on Nominations, the Board of Diaconal Ministry and the Statistical Report.
 2. The Committee shall determine the dates and inform the Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees when reports shall be due in order to maintain the schedule for the pre-conference report.
 3. No report by any Board, Council, Commission or Committee shall be considered by the Annual Conference which has not been distributed at least four weeks prior to the Conference session. This rule does not apply to reports dependent on information obtainable only at a date shortly before or during the Annual Conference Session.

- b. The Committee shall cooperate with the Conference Secretary in determining the accuracy of the daily minutes. The Committee shall report concerning the accuracy of these minutes to the next Annual Conference session and shall note any discrepancies and or exceptions and shall cause these to be noted in the Conference Journal next published.
- c. The Committee shall publish the South Carolina Conference Journal in one volume and shall have the Journal ready for distribution at least by October following the close of Annual Conference. The Journal shall include the ministerial reports included in the pre-conference report, the deliberations of the Annual Conference, and the Statistical Report.
1. The Chairperson of the Committee, the Secretary of the Committee and the Secretary of the Annual Conference shall edit the Conference Journal.
 2. The Committee shall let the contract for the printing of the Conference Journal, and shall provide for the printing at least one year in advance.
 3. The Committee shall list in the Conference Journal names of the Officers of the South Carolina Methodist Conference Credit Union and may include a brief resume of its annual report, if provided by the Credit Union.
- d. The Committee shall be responsible for the publication of the Volume entitled "United Methodist Ministers in South Carolina," which shall be printed every five years, and which shall feature biographical sketches and pictures of all Ministers of the South Carolina Conference.
63. *The Committee on Disability, which is required by the Discipline, shall be composed of (2) members of the Board of the Ordained Ministry (to be named by the Chairperson of the Board), the Chairperson and Secretary of the Board of Pensions and a district superintendent appointed by the Bishop. The Committee shall function as per paragraph 740 of the 1976 Discipline.*
64. *The Committee on District Superintendency in each district, which is required by the Discipline, shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and the district superintendents and elected by the Annual Conference and shall function as per paragraph 758 of the 1976 Discipline.*
65. *The Committee on Episcopacy, which is required by the Discipline, shall be organized and function as per paragraph 733 of the 1976 Discipline.*
66. There shall be a Committee on the Ethnic Minority Local Church composed of sixteen (16) elected members twelve (12) of whom shall be from the minority membership and four (4) of whom shall be from the majority membership.
- a. It shall be the duty of the Committee to coordinate and implement the 1980-83 quadrennial mission priority of developing and strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church.
67. There shall be a Committee on Implementation of the Plan of Union composed of twelve (12) elected members, six (6) members of the former '66 Conference and six (6) members of the former '85 Conference. (According to the Plan of Union the Committee shall cease to function at the close of the 1977-80 quadrennium.)
68. *The Committee on Investigation, which is required by the Discipline, shall be nominated by the presiding bishop and composed of seven (7) itinerant elders and three (3) lay persons as per paragraph 2523 of the 1980 Discipline.*
69. There shall be an Executive Committee of Ministerial Affairs to be composed of the chairperson and one (1) other representative of the Board of Pensions, the Commission on Group Life and Hospital Insurance, the Board of the South Carolina Methodist Conference Credit Union and elected annually by these parent boards.
- a. The Administrator of Ministerial Affairs shall be nominated by the Executive Committee of Ministerial Affairs.
70. There shall be a Committee on Nominations composed of twelve (12) clerical members and twelve (12) lay members, nominated by the districts: a youth and a young adult, nominated by the Conference Council on Ministries; up to six at large members, who may be nominated by the Bishop to insure adequate representation; the following ex-officio members: the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President of United Methodist Women, the Chairperson of the Conference Standing Rules Committee and the Secretary of the Cabinet.
- a. There shall be one (1) lay person nominated from each of the twelve (12) districts. The Church lay leaders of the several districts shall nominate these lay persons.
 - b. There shall be one (1) clerical person nominated from each of the twelve (12) districts. The ministers of the several districts shall nominate these clerical persons.

- c. These nominees, both lay and clerical, shall be elected by secret ballot after at least three (3) persons shall have been nominated from the floor of each of the electing bodies. Election shall be by simple majority.
- d. If a member of the Committee on Nominations, who has been nominated by the district moves beyond the boundaries of the District in which he/she was nominated, his/her membership on the committee shall be terminated.
- e. When district vacancies occur on the Committee, replacements shall be nominated as per rule 67.c to serve the remainder of the quadrennium.
- f. When a person, lay or clerical, is elected to membership on the Committee, that person may not, during his/her period of service on this Committee, be nominated by this Committee for membership on any Board, Council, Commission, or Committee whose membership arises from nominations from this Committee.
- g. The Committee shall make all nominations needed by the Annual Conference except as provided elsewhere by the Discipline or Standing Rules of the Annual Conference. When the Discipline or Standing Rules require nominations be made by other agencies of the Annual Conference, those nominations shall be reported to the Committee no later than February 1 of each year.
- h. Those persons nominated from the districts to the Committee on Nominations shall establish within the districts in which they serve a process of consultation with the district superintendent, ministers, and lay persons of the district to determine persons most qualified for nomination.
- i. When nominations are made, the persons nominated shall be consulted and their consent to serve received; whether nominated by Parent Boards, the Committee on Nominations or from the floor of the Annual Conference.
- j. The Committee on Nominations shall after the 1977-80 quadrennium, make nominations so that approximately one-half of the membership of all boards, councils, commissions and committees shall be rotated each quadrennium.
- k. The Conference Committee on Nominations shall nominate to the Annual Conference nominees to serve on General and Jurisdictional agencies.
71. There shall be a Committee on Pastoral Care and Counseling composed of twelve (12) persons, eight (8) of whom shall be clergy persons and four (4) of whom shall be lay persons.
72. There shall be a Committee on Petitions to the General Conference composed of six (6) elected members, four (4) lay persons and two (2) clergy persons.
73. There shall be a Committee on Resolutions and Appeals composed of nine (9) elected members, six (6) lay persons and three (3) clergy persons.
- a. Resolutions not initiated by a constituted board, commission or committee may be referred to those agencies. Any resolution not referred to a constituted board, council, commission or committee shall be referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals, and shall be reported by this Committee to the Annual Conference with a recommendation of concurrence or nonconcurrence.
74. There shall be a Committee on Standing Rules composed of nine (9) elected members, six (6) lay persons and three (3) clergy persons.

District Conference

85. Where there is a District Conference it shall be composed of all ministers, deaconesses, the church lay leader, the lay members to the Annual Conference, president of the United Methodist Women, and president of the United Methodist Youth Fellowship from each local church in the district, the district lay leader, the district president of the United Methodist Women, the district president of Youth Ministry, the Chairperson of the District Council on Ministries, the chairperson of the district Trustees, the chairperson of the district committee on Church Location and Building, the chairperson of the Committee on District Superintendency and the district superintendent who shall be chairperson of the District Conference.

Rules which are printed in italics are agencies which are required by the Discipline and which are not subject to the vote of the Annual Conference.

II. RULES OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE SESSION

90. The procedure of the Annual Conference shall be governed by the following in order listed: The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, The Statutes, Rules of the Annual Conference, The Rules of Order of the preceding General Conference and Robert's Rules of Order, newly revised, 1970.
91. Each District Superintendent shall transmit the complete list of lay members of the Annual Conference from the district in triplicate to the Secretary of the Annual Conference at least five (5) months prior to the opening date of the Annual Conference.
92. The number of additional lay members required to equalize lay and clerical representation in the Annual Conference shall be computed on a two-factor basis:
 - a. Drawn on the one man-one vote principle. This principle is implemented on the basis of membership reported to the last Annual Conference, each body of over 400 members shall be entitled to one additional lay member for each multiple of 400 or major portion thereof. The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be authorized to adjust this base up or down so as to provide the necessary number of additional lay members. The Secretary shall notify the pastor of each charge qualifying for additional lay members by January 1st of each year. Local charges shall be responsible for the expenses of such members.
93. At any session of the Annual Conference where there are to be elections of officers or delegates by ballot, there shall be a Board of Managers which shall conduct the election as the Annual Conference may direct. The Board of Managers shall be nominated and organized by the Conference Secretary, elected by the Annual Conference, and shall be composed of at least one (1) minister and at least one (1) lay person from each district.
94. Reports from Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees shall be presented in triplicate, filed with the Conference Secretary, and placed on the Conference Calendar in the order received.
95. The official roll call of the Annual Conference shall be the roll cards signed by clerical and lay members present. The record of attendance shall be made on these cards.
96. The officers of the Annual Conference, to be elected quadrennially, shall be elected at the Annual Conference preceding the beginning of the quadrennium and shall be as follows:
 - a. The Auditor, whom the Council on Finance and Administration shall nominate.
 - b. The Chancellor upon nomination by the Bishop.
 - c. The Parliamentarian upon nomination by the Bishop.
 - d. The Secretary, upon nominations which arise from the floor.
 1. Tenure as secretary shall be limited to two (2) consecutive quadrennia.
 - e. Three (3) assistant secretaries, who shall be elected on nominations which arise from the floor.
 1. Tenure as an assistant secretary shall be limited to two (2) consecutive quadrennia.
 - f. The Conference Stenographer, who shall be employed by the Conference Secretary.
 - g. The Treasurer-Statistician, who shall be elected on nomination of the Council on Finance and Administration.
 1. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds collected and otherwise specifically designated. He shall be custodian of the funds held by the Annual Conference Trustees. (The Trustees shall administer these funds.) He shall be the custodian of the Board of Pension funds. (The Board of Pensions shall administer these funds.) He shall be the custodian of the Group Life Insurance and Major Medical Hospital Insurance Funds. (The Commission on Insurance shall administer these funds.) These and all other funds allocated to the various boards, councils, commissions and committees by the Council on Finance and Administration shall be credited by the Conference Treasurer in separate accounts to the boards, councils, commissions and committees. Disbursement of funds to conference agencies shall be made by the Conference Treasurer upon order by voucher drawn by the secretary of the board, council, commission, or committee requesting funds. All boards, councils, commissions, or committees drawing money in block amounts shall make itemized statements of these expenditures to the Conference Treasurer as supporting evidence for his records.

7. Compensation for the officers of the Annual Conference shall be determined by the Council on Finance and Administration subject to the approval of the Annual Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall pay those persons from the Conference Expense Fund.
8. Lay members of Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees, lay members of the Conference Staff, and lay persons who are heads of Conference institutions supported by the Conference, who are not members of the Annual Conference, shall have the privilege of the floor without vote.
9. A member of the Conference may not speak more than once on a question before the Conference until every member who wishes to speak has spoken. A member shall not speak for more than five (5) minutes at any time, except by permission of the Conference.
10. A copy of any motion made on the Conference floor shall be sent to the Secretary's desk as soon as the person making the motion returns to his/her seat.
11. The report of the Committee on Standing Rules shall be made as a part of the organization of the Conference and as often during the session as necessary.
 - a. All proposed changes in the Standing Rules shall be submitted in writing for referral to the Committee on Standing Rules and then reported out with recommendations after twelve (12) hours.
 - b. It shall require a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote to suspend the rules.
 - c. When the rules are to be suspended, only that specific portion of the rules under consideration shall be suspended.
 - d. The Annual Conference by a majority vote can amend or alter the Standing Rules with or without the concurrence of the Committee on Standing Rules, provided that any change or alteration not originating in the Committee on Standing Rules may be voted on only after the lapse of twelve (12) hours from the time of its submission to the Conference.
12. It shall be an Order of the Day at the morning session of the second day of Annual Conference that the floor shall be opened for additional nominations to all boards, councils, commissions, and committees to which the Committee on Nominations and parent boards are prepared to make nominations.
13. It shall be an Order of the Day on the third day of Annual Conference to have the election of boards, councils, commissions, and committees. If additional nominations have been made per rule 102, and if requested by the Annual Conference, ballots shall be prepared by the Conference Secretary for use in the election.
14. The report of the Council on Finance and Administration shall be placed on the Conference Program at a time no later than the afternoon of the second full day of the Conference.
 - a. When a motion for an increase in the Annual Conference Budget arises from anyone other than the Council on Finance and Administration and is approved by the Annual Conference, that motion shall be held a minimum of twelve (12) hours and shall require an affirmative vote at a second reading for final approval. If such a motion arises from the conference floor on the last day of Annual Conference, a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote shall be required for approval.

III. MISCELLANEOUS RULES

1. Membership on all quadrennial boards, councils, commissions and committees shall not exceed two (2) consecutive quadrennia. Election to membership during a quadrennium shall be considered service for a full quadrennium.
2. Membership resulting from election by the Annual Conference, shall be limited to one quadrennial agency and one non-quadrennial agency, except ex-officio members as provided.
3. All Annual Conference boards, councils, commissions, and committees are quadrennial except the following: the Board of Pensions; the Committee on Investigation and the Boards of Trust of the South Carolina United Methodist Advocate; Belin Property; Claflin College, Columbia College; Epworth Children's Home; Greenwood Methodist Home; The Methodist Home, Orangeburg, Spartanburg Methodist College; Trustees of the Annual Conference; and Wofford College.
4. All quadrennial boards, councils, commissions, and committees shall be convened for organization within forty-five (45) days after the close of the Annual Conference by a District Superintendent or any other elder appointed by the Bishop.

Election shall be by a majority of the members present and voting. The election shall be by ballot after oral nominations and shall be by a majority of the vote cast.

124. The membership of each Board, Council, Commission or Committee of the Annual Conference shall include at least one young adult (a person between the ages of eighteen (18) and thirty (30) inclusive) and at least two women, with the exception of the following: the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Conference Board of Trustees, the Commission on Archives and History, the Committee on Investigation, and the Committee on Petitions to the General Conference. In addition to instances where youth membership is required by the Discipline, youth members should be included in the membership of all boards, councils, committees and commissions whenever possible.
 - a. Youth and young adult members of the Annual Conference, and their representatives as provided in the Discipline, shall be elected by the District Councils on Ministries from nominations which arise from the District Councils on Youth Ministry, District Coordinators of Adult Ministry and from the local churches within the districts. Their expense shall be borne by the district electing them.
125. Members of general church agencies shall serve as ex-officio members of the next conference agencies, with vote, but shall be ineligible to hold office.
126. Members of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries staff, when appointed as representatives to various Conference Agencies, shall be ex-officio members without vote.
127. Ex-officio members (excluding Conference Staff) of all Conference boards, councils, commissions, and committees shall have a vote (unless prohibited by the Discipline), but shall be ineligible to hold office.
128. No trustee, member of the faculty, manager of any interest, or staff person shall at the same time be a member of the parent or supervising board, council, commission or committee, unless otherwise required by the Discipline or Standing Rules.
129. No person shall serve simultaneously on a quadrennial board, council, commission or committee of the Conference as an elected member.
130. Parent boards may not nominate their own members to any board of trust if said member has been off that parent board for at least one (1) year.
131. Where the Discipline requires a district director or secretary for a conference agency, the person or persons named shall be from among the elected members of the agency.
132. Any member of a quadrennial board, council, commission or committee who is absent from two (2) consecutive meetings of the same, without rendering an acceptable excuse to the chairperson, shall forfeit membership on such board, council, commission or committee and the chairperson shall notify the person of this action. The chairperson shall notify the Committee on Nominations of such forfeiture. The Committee on Nominations shall nominate for election replacements at the next session of the Annual Conference.
133. When a minister is appointed as District Superintendent, his membership on a quadrennial board, council, commission, or committee shall automatically terminate, provided, that this shall not apply to ex-officio membership on any board, council, commission or committee as required by the Discipline or the Standing Rules.
134. All persons shall retire from and not be eligible for further membership on conference boards, councils, commissions, and committees at the Annual Conference following their 70th birthday. Ministers who retire shall not be nominated for membership on any conference board, council, commission or committee but shall be allowed to complete their terms of service on boards, councils, commissions and committees to which they have been elected prior to retirement, provided the Discipline is not violated in their continued service.
135. All lay persons employed by the agencies of the Conference shall conform to the compulsory retirement age set for the ministers of the church. Such retired persons may be employed on a part-time basis without executive administrative responsibility.
136. Pastors reports to Annual Conference shall cover the calendar year (January 1 to December 31) and shall be sent to the Conference Statistician so as to reach the office not later than January 15 of the year immediately following.
137. All amounts paid to or on behalf of the minister (including District Superintendents and ministers serving special appointments) to provide funds for payment of or part of his Social Security obligation shall be reported as salary.

138. All monies to be credited to the accounts of local churches for the fiscal year shall be in the hands of the Conference treasurer not later than fifteen (15) days after the end of the fiscal year.
139. There shall be twelve (12) districts in the South Carolina Annual Conference.
140. "Moving day" for the ministers shall be the second Wednesday following the close of Annual Conference.
 - a. Where special circumstances dictate any alteration of this moving date, the affected persons and the District Superintendent involved shall be permitted to make the necessary adjustments.
 - b. Ministers shall be paid during the month of June proportionately by the charge from which they are moved and the charge to which they are moved on the basis of the percentages of Sundays actually served in each charge.
 - c. The moving expenses of the pastor shall be paid by the charge to which he is moved, not to include more than \$50 packing expenses.
141. All support ministries or agencies which receive funds from the South Carolina Methodist Conference, but which are not directly responsible to the Conference, shall submit an annual program and financial report to the sponsoring Conference agency.

IV. STANDING RESOLUTION

200 The Plan of Union

A. Introduction

1. The personal choice of freeing our own and other men's hearts comes to us in many ways during all of life. Seldom does a group of men and women have this opportunity to liberate themselves and countless of their fellows from the collective practice of separatism over three centuries by activating their professed belief of oneness in Christ. There have been incidents of reconciliation between individuals—and there is glory in that. Even now some of us can turn aside briefly from ourselves and see another in his likeness to us—or in fleeting moments acknowledge in him some Christ-like quality. More often than not we emphasize our differences and only faintly resist the shackles of our history. All too infrequently do we protest the compromises perpetrated within the Church against Jesus' example of brotherhood.

Many vital battles of life have been fought largely outside the Church. We are charged at this juncture in time to lay claim to the victory of a meaningful relationship to God, by saying first of all to ourselves and to all who will follow that we will shore up our relationships with each other. This is great glory—and it is freedom—which comes when a group of people begins to listen, to communicate, to trust, to care, to seek solutions, to achieve, and finally to gain release from fear and prejudice that permits us to love one another.

ORGANIZATION IS NECESSARY FOR ORDERLINESS—and perhaps to satisfy our need for security in rules. However, in implementing this our plan for the creation of a new United Methodist Conference in South Carolina let us not obscure the loftiest rule of all—and the ultimate security that it holds: "That you love one another."

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- a. There shall be in South Carolina one annual Conference, to be known as the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, insofar as the same applies, except in such cases made and provided for in this plan, following the steps hereafter provided.

B. Conference Structure

1. Following the creation of the New South Carolina Annual Conference, elected members of the conference boards, commissions and committees, shall be on a ratio of the approximate percentage of the members of the former conferences for the first two quadrennia. Realizing that lay and ministerial delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences are elected by secret ballot, we call upon the delegates in their election as a matter of conscience, to follow a ratio of the approximate percentage of members of the former conferences. However nothing herein shall preclude laymen joining a church of the conference after the creation of the new conference or clerical members of any board, commission or committee so long as

- the ratio of majority and minority groups is maintained. During this period in election of district lay leaders and two associates for each district (who become members of the Conference Board of the Laity), at least one of the three shall be elected from each of the former conferences, where possible. This procedure will begin at the time the districts are realigned.
2. The General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates elected in 1971 shall be delegates.
 3. Until the new annual conference's standing rules are adopted, the Committee on Nominations shall consist of the two Committees on Nominations of the two conferences.
 4. Being aware of the inherent privilege of each board, commission, and committee to elect its own chairman, and in a sincere effort to be faithful to the spirit of determination to bring into being ONE Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, in South Carolina, it is, therefore, the will of the conference that each board, commission, and committee shall elect its chairman on the basis of merit without regard to former conference relationships.
 5. The South Carolina Women's Society of Christian Service, being a part of the connectional system of the Columbia Area of The United Methodist Church, shall be guided by the plans of the creation of the new conference established by the annual conference, the district, and the local churches. (The Book of Discipline, Pars. 1341-1344)
 - a. The Executive Committee of the Women's Societies of Christian Service of the two former conferences shall set up:
 1. A Committee on Nominations to prepare a slate of officers for the composition of the new society, with proportionate representation.
 2. A Committee on By-Laws and Standing Rules to draw up by-laws and standing rules for the new society; and
 3. A Committee on Finance to establish procedures for combining contents and district treasuries, clearing financial practices and policies of the two societies and to provide a clear interpretation of the directives regarding financial policies as they are received from the Women's Division of the United Methodist Church.
 6. In selection of new trustees for the boards, agencies, and institutions of the conference, the principle of inclusiveness shall be observed.
 7. In the New Annual Conference, the Program Council and other boards, agencies, and institutions of the conference having employed staff, shall employ staff members and other personnel on an inclusive basis, with the proportions pertaining at the time of formation of the new conference being observed as a guideline in future employment.
 8. We recommend the New South Carolina Conference be divided into twelve districts effective at Annual Conference 1974.
 - a. We recommend that all District Superintendents serve the remainder of their present terms of six years on the District as is now constituted and that the Districts shall be reduced to twelve by attrition.
 - b. District boundaries shall be determined according to Par. 390.3 of The Book of Discipline. We recommend that the continuing committee provide guidance.
 9. The appointment of District Superintendents is the responsibility of the presiding Bishop; however, after 1975 we strongly recommend to the presiding Bishop that the structure of the cabinet be made up of nine (9) members of the former conference and that three (3) District Superintendents be from the former conference, with this structure then being maintained for at least the remainder of the eight (8) years period following union.
 10. The Program Council shall consist of the presiding Bishop; the district superintendents; two representatives of conference agencies determined by the annual conference, one of whom shall be a member of each of the former conference; two representatives of the Board of Laity; one, the Conference Lay Leader and one other, a member of the other conference; one layman from each district; chairs of age-level and family departments; and such additional members as to make the membership of the Council to be in accordance with the proportions pertaining at the time of the creation of the conference.

C. Standing Rules

1. In the organization of the new conference a Committee on Standing Rules shall present rules of procedure for adoption by the new conference.
2. Until new standing rules are adopted, the new conference shall be guided by The Book of Discipline and Robert's Rules of Order.
3. For two quadrennia following the creation of the new annual conference the standing rules and resolutions of the new conference shall not include any rules or resolutions that violate the provisions of this Plan of Implementation unless approved by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the Annual Conference.

D. Financial Adjustments

1. **Apportionments.** Apportionments shall be made by the conference Commission on World Service and Finance directly to the churches (or charges) after consultation with the district superintendents. These apportionments should be based on a tripart formula considering church membership, previous world service giving, and non-capital expenditures by the church or charge.
2. **Minimum Salary.** The minimum salary schedule in the new conference shall be uniform for all members and shall be equal to that previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.
3. **Pensions.** The Annuity rate shall be the same for the members of both former conferences and shall be equal to that previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.
4. **Funding.** The 1968 General Conference reordered its priorities and instructed every board and agency of the church to trim budgets and programs until two million dollars from present giving could be available to fund special programs for minorities. With this precedent to guide us, and recognizing that additional costs will be involved, it is recommended that the World Service and Finance Commission of the newly created conference immediately reorder financial priorities and request all boards, commissions and committees of the conference to trim budgets so that the financial needs of the new conference can be more nearly met as it comes into being. It is further recommended that the World Service and Finance Commissions of the two conferences involved, prior to the creation of the new conference, remind the 1972 General Conference of the amount of financial support promised by the 1968 General Conference in such situations (that is, 100% for the first quadrennium, 80% for the second quadrennium, and so forth). If the General Conference of 1972 is unable to provide the funds authorized by the 1968 General Conference for this purpose from present or anticipated revenues, that the General Conference of 1972 then be petitioned to make some special provision for the funding of those additional costs to the new conference which are beyond the present financial capacity of the conference staff. We pledge our every effort to be financially responsible as we seek to increase giving in the new conference. However, without additional funds being made available from some source—our own resources and those of the General Church—it will not be possible to bring into being a "united conference in the United Methodist Church in South Carolina that is faithful and just to everyone who will be involved in the life and work of the new South Carolina Conference.
5. **Conference Home.** The services of all conference homes for children, the aged, and conference claimants shall be available to all persons on an equal basis. Opportunities for employment in homes having employed personnel shall be on an inclusive basis.
6. **Institutional Support.** The institutions supported by the two former conferences shall be undergirded by support from the new conferences on a formula to be determined by the new annual conference, which formula shall be applied in like manner to similar institutions.
7. **Insurance.** The program of life insurance and health insurance for the new conference shall be based upon the insurance plan previously in effect in the Annual Conference, 1785.

E. Continuing Committee

1. A follow-up Committee on Implementation shall be elected quadrennially for quadrennia; with representation from the two former annual conference, to concerns and developments relating to the creation of the new conference which have not been anticipated or provided for in the Plan of Implementation. The Committee on Standing Rules shall determine the number to be elected and the extent of ex-officio representation.

F. The Resolution of Implementation

1. Whereas, the 1972 General Conference of the United Methodist Church will receive a report from the Structure Study Commission, which if passed, will have reaching effects and change in the Annual Conference Structure; and Whereas, a seven month period, or until January 1, 1973, following our uniting conference in June 1972, will provide time and knowledge in perfecting the organizational structure for the South Carolina Annual Conference and whereas, to conserve the value of program planning and operation of each conference, continuing leadership boards and agencies of these conferences for a seven month period would provide such continuity; and Whereas, a nominating committee could have adequate time in recommending leadership to be elected by the South Carolina Annual Conference, we therefore recommend that the Standing Rules of both conferences be suspended in order:
 - a. That for seven months, or until January 1, 1973, following the uniting conference in June, 1972, all boards and agencies will be composed of all members of the same boards and agencies from the two former conferences. The boards and agencies shall be, as recorded in the current Minutes, convened at the uniting conference in June, 1972, and organized for the seven month period of January 1, 1973. (Officers of such boards and agencies now in office may continue to serve jointly during this seven month period) and
 - b. That a nominating committee shall be elected and organized immediately at the uniting conference, in accord with the standing rules adopted at the uniting conference, to bring in nominations to a special session of the new conference held within the closing months of 1972, to serve for the rest of the quadrennia beginning January 1, 1973; and
 - c. That all boards and agencies following this session of both conferences continue their program planning, except where joint action is required, and that meetings of boards and agencies be held prior to the uniting conference to ordinate plans for the new annual conference, and further, where feasible it is recommended that joint efforts be made in all planning; and
 - d. That the presiding Bishop is respectfully requested to appoint a continuing Committee on Merger to take office following this session of these conferences.
201. Election of Lay Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences.
 1. System of nomination: The following system of nomination and election shall be followed in the election of lay delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences:

District Nominations

 1. Each local church may submit nominations to the District Superintendent. These nominees shall be selected by the Administrative Board, certified by the Board Chairperson and pastor.
 2. A meeting of the lay members of the Annual Conference from the District shall be held, presided over by the District Superintendent, no later than January 10 of the year in which elections occur. The lay members shall vote by ballot. If fifteen persons receive a majority of the votes cast, these fifteen persons shall be certified to the Conference Secretary as District nominees by the District Superintendent no later than February 10. A biographical sketch on prescribed form (prepared by the Board of Laity) is to be presented on each local church nominee to the District meeting.

Conference Procedure

 1. 150 names selected by the Districts shall be listed and presented to the Conference United Methodist Women, the Conference Board of Laity, the Conference Council on Youth Ministry and the Continuing Committee on Merger. Each of these will select up to fifteen additional names.

2. These names with the biographical information shall be submitted to the Conference Secretary by March 1.
3. Biographical information shall be printed in the Pre-Conference Journal. The biographical information shall be randomly rotated in the Journal.
4. Provision shall be made for write-in ballots.
5. The Conference Secretary in preparing for the balloting for General and Jurisdictional conference delegates is authorized to utilize computerization for both lay and clerical.

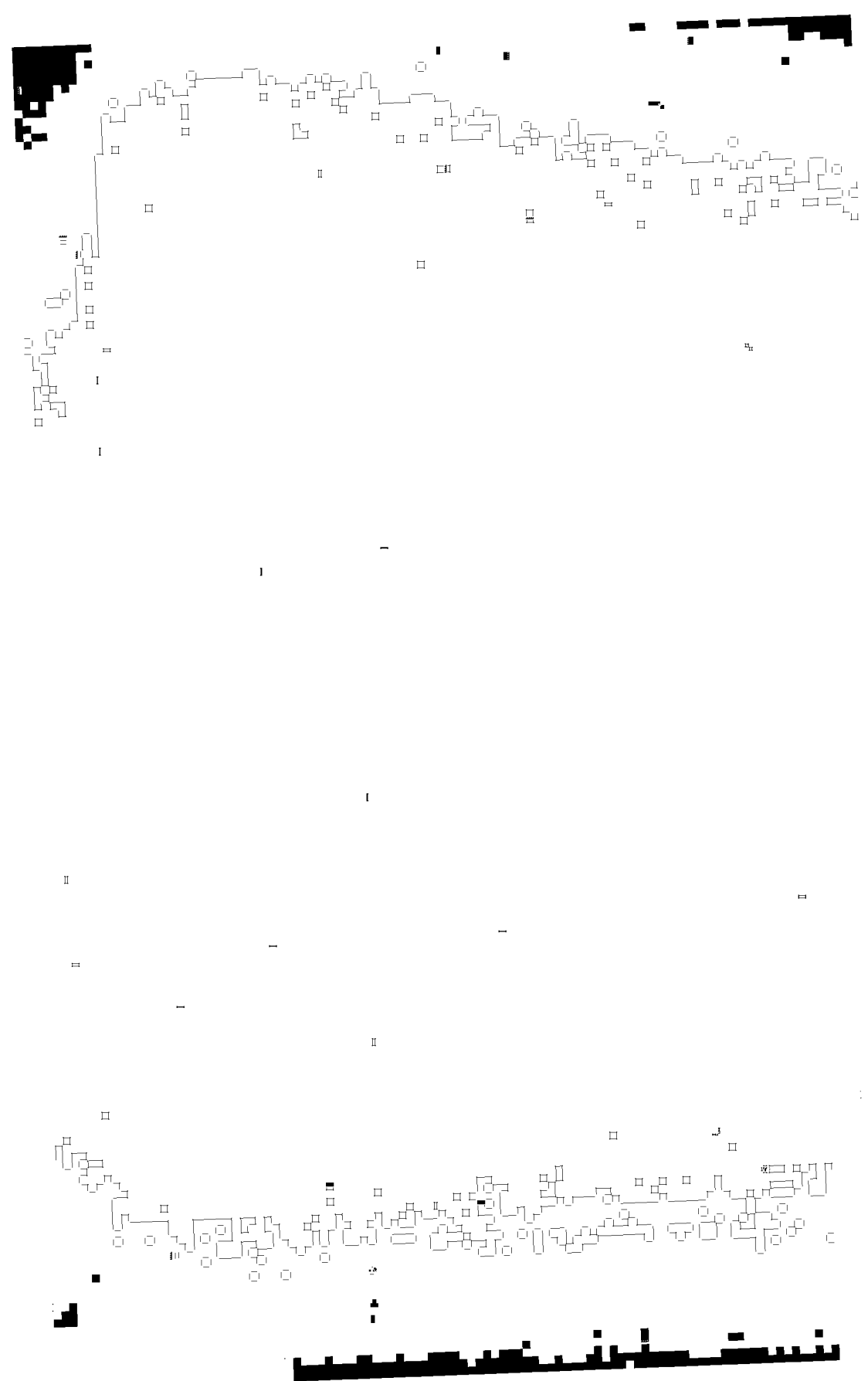
