To cheerfully change my habit of living so far as is necessary, in order to comply with any request of OUR COUNTRY.

To economize in the expenditure of money in order to financially aid OUR COUNTRY.

To support the war loans of OUR COUNTRY.

To be a friend and comforter to families of those who, at home and abroad, are carrying the burdens and fighting the foes of OUR COUNTRY.

To labor unstintedly in contributing our utmost to the forces and processes of production so that the people shall not suffer want because of the withdrawal from industrial life of those who have gone into the military service of OUR COUNTRY.

To meet alike the successes and failures, gain and losses, victories and temporary defeats that may come with calmness and confidence for the sake of OUR COUNTRY.
