#### MSU alumnus and entrepreneur develops innovative emergency rescue product

Joseph "Kelly" Moore (00) knew he wanted to have a career in business when he graduated from Morehead State University with a Bachelor of Business Administration with an emphasis in finance. With his current entrepreneurial endeavor, he is in the business of potentially saving lives.

Moore and Matt Able are co-founders of the Lexington-based company Longtail Designs LLC. They recently announced the launch of a Kickstarter campaign for the Rescue Biner, the company's first product.

The Rescue Biner is an aluminum carabiner that features additional tools to use in a life-saving emergency for first responders or victims of an automobile accident. These include a concealed razor blade for slicing through seatbelts and a tungsten carbide tip capable of easily breaking out vehicle windows.

Before going into business for himself, he found a knack for business at MSU. Moore and his family moved to Morehead from Kemmerer, Wyoming, in the summer of 1994, and he enrolled in the spring of 1995. After graduation he worked for two decades in finance as a federal employee. He has been a financial officer for the United States Air Force primarily based at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, Ohio, and also has analyzed and overseen budgets for the U.S. Forest Service, first in Fort Collins, Colorado, before returning to Kentucky as a budget officer for the Daniel Boone National Forest from 2010 to 2018.

When he was a student at MSU, Moore said he enjoyed the fact that MSU was in the Daniel Boone National Forest, but it was the small classes and the personal attention he received from faculty that was most beneficial to his future.

"My financial and accounting courses laid the foundation for me to learn cost modeling, financial and data analysis, and teamwork," he said. "I'm a solution-driven person and the positive feedback and support I received while attending MSU really helped craft my business acumen as I started my professional career."

The idea for the Rescue Biner came about before founding Longtail Designs in 2016. Moore met Able when he started working for the Daniel Boone National Forest in Winchester and they both developed backgrounds as wilderness first responders. This led to them bouncing ideas back and forth and seeing a need for something useful when there is an accident occurs and seconds matter.

"The design evolved from an article I had read where a person had used scissors to cut an accident victim out of a vehicle seat belt. I don't carry scissors in my vehicle. Most don't," Moore said. "So, when Matt Able and I sat down, we really had a moment of clarity and the Rescue Biner was born." Moore said the company had planned to launch its current Kickstarter campaign a couple of years ago for their patented product. They chose crowdfunding both due to the company's tight budget and wanting to use its primary resources to make the most effective product possible.

"We deliberately chose to focus on our getting the design right and not on seeking investor funding through the traditional models," he said. "We wanted to leave it up to the consumers to choose our product and not spending thousands of dollars getting an analysis report on what we 'might' be able to do."

Longtail Designs' Kickstarter campaign for the Rescue Biner launched on April 14 with the campaign's deadline ending on May 27. Since its launch, they are more than halfway to their goal of raising \$30,000.

"As a company, we want our designs to make a difference for those who use them," Moore said. "As entrepreneurs, we want to build something that gives back and looks out for our community and the environment instead of just worrying about the bottom line. If we do things the right way and worry about being a good company that makes great products, the rest will take care of itself."

## MSU alum hired as principal for Fayette County Public Schools

Fayette County Public Schools (FCPS) Superintendent Manny Caulk has announced that Morehead State University alumnus Donte Tichenor (13) will be the new principal at Booker T. Washington Elementary School in Lexington.

"I am extremely excited and humbled by this opportunity to serve in this community," Tichenor said. "When I entered the field of education more than 10 years ago, I never envisioned myself being in an elementary school. God has a way of ordering your stops and closing doors that you thought were meant for you. None of this would have been possible without Morehead State University."

Tichenor earned a bachelor's degree in psychology from the University of Kentucky before attending MSU to earn his Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) in Middle Grades Social Studies. At MSU, he was awarded Graduate Student of the Year.

"When I decided to return to school to pursue a graduate degree in teaching, Morehead State took a chance on me when other universities said I needed higher scores," Tichenor said. "Fast forward almost a decade later and numerous roles within my district, I am now principal of Booker T. Washington Elementary School."

Tichenor worked for the Job Corps program and later a private mental health provider before joining FCPS in 2009. There, he served in roles as a substitute teacher, paraeducator, social studies teacher, behavior interventionist and dean of students. Tichenor led the Informational Technology Academy at Bryan Station High School in 2018. In his most recent role, he came to Booker T. Washington Elementary to serve as the professional growth and effectiveness (PGE) coach prior to becoming principal.

Tichenor said he has multiple goals as the principal at Booker T. Washington Elementary, including creating a positive culture, retaining and recruiting good teachers, frequent and passionate celebrations of student success, focusing on student growth and empowering both families and the community to contribute to student success.

- MarTisse Dapre Andrews, a senior from Lexington, had MSU's top score on Adobe Certification exams. He earned his certification in Visual Design using Adobe Photoshop.

"Our students deserve a very big 'congratulations' for all of the hard work that went into this achievement. Never does that statement ring truer than this term," said Tony Glover, IT services coordinator, tech liaison and certification program coordinator. "The difficult nature/changes the COVID-19 crisis has placed on students and educators alike presented new challenges on how to continue their education online in these extraordinary times. Our students had to overcome the transition from face-to-face classes to online instruction only, poor internet service in a lot of areas, getting the required Adobe Software installed, no practice exams were offered to strengthen skills, and taking the actual certification exam on a virtual PC, not on the Mac platform they are used to using. Yet they still succeed with all of these factors stacked against them."

"The certifications earned this semester truly reinforce the fact that MSU's continued commitment to quality education and career readiness in digital media is working."

She is the daughter of Dan Potts and Amy Potts. She graduated with a 4.0 cumulative GPA and earned a Bachelor of Arts in History and Legal Studies with a minor in Spanish.

At Morehead State, Potts was a member of the George M. Luckey Jr. Academic Honors Program. She was an Undergraduate Research Fellow for three years, where she presented her research on travel writing in Kentucky at the Kentucky Philological Association and the Celebration of Student Scholarship in 2018. She also represented the Caudill College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences at the 2017 Idea Festival in Louisville.

She was named the 2019 Outstanding Undergraduate Student in History. At the 2019 OVC Championships, Potts also set the smallbore individual scoring record, the smallbore individual 20 shots prone school record and the individual aggregate school record. She qualified for the 2019 NCAA Championships as an individual.

Her academic achievements as a student-athlete include receiving the OVC Academic Medal of Honor for excellence in athletics and academics for the 2016-17 school year. Later, she was named the 2019-20 OVC Scholar-Athlete, awarded annually to the top three men and women in the OVC for their accomplishments and

leadership on the field and in the classroom. Potts also served as the student leader for Athletes in Action (AIA).

Potts said she plans to enroll in law school and credits MSU with her preparedness.

"My MSU education is one of the most valuable things in my life because it has enriched me with knowledge and experiences that have prepared me for my future while leaving warm memories of my undergraduate years. Without my MSU education, I would not be the student I am today, ready to continue the pursuit of my legal education at law school," Potts said. ### MSU students complete internships with Kentucky Legislative Research Commission

Morehead State University alumna Amethyst Muncy (20) and senior Nick Anderson have both taken an important step in their respective pursuits of careers in the field of law. They completed internships through the Kentucky Legislative Research Commission's (LRC) Legislative Intern Program this spring.

LRC's Legislative Intern Program allows qualified college students to gain knowledge of the legislative process and the creation of public policy through hands-on experience and various internship assignments. The 2020 program, originally scheduled to run from January through April, allows students to work with Legislative Research Commission nonpartisan staff and members of the Kentucky General Assembly.

Muncy, a native of Louisa, just graduated with a degree in legal studies with a minor in Spanish. As a student at MSU, she scored the highest score on the Law School Admission Test (LSAT) in MSU's history, testing in the 97th percentile. She was a member of the Societas Pro Legibus and volunteered at the Pro Se Divorce Clinic in Morehead.

Muncy was accepted with a scholarship to the University of California – Berkeley, which ranked 9th in the country by U.S. News & World Report. She aspires to work as a civil rights or immigration lawyer.

"I think the legal studies program definitely makes you ready for law school because it teaches you how to be a paralegal," Muncy said. "I've basically taken all the classes I'm going to take my first year. All my professors taught me really well, so I think I will do really well in law school."

Anderson is a senior double-major in political science and legal studies from Morehead. He was a member of the 2018 MSU Homecoming Court. Anderson previously completed a five-week internship for Canadian Parliament Member Shaun Chen of the Scarborough North region, where he assisted in correspondence with Chen's diverse constituency comprised of citizens originally from the Middle East, China and South Asia.

Anderson was chosen to serve as an intern with the House and Senate Judiciary Committee in Frankfort. He said that while the internship was cut short due to COVID-19, the scope of topics the committee covered, along with the nonpartisan nature of the internship, was a unique and beneficial experience.

"From early January to mid-March, I was fortunate to be a gear in the clockwork of the 2020 legislative process," Anderson said. "The breadth of subject matter most benefitted me as a student and as someone hoping to attend law school, for it opened my eyes to the immense scope of the law and how it impacts almost every aspect of our daily lives."

#### Morehead Writing Project offers professional development opportunities for area teachers

Before schools potentially reopen in the fall, teachers in Morehead and the surrounding region will be able to take advantage of a variety of online professional development opportunities through the Morehead Writing Project (MWP) Online Summer Institute (OSI) in coordination with the National Writing Project.

The Morehead Writing Project has been delivering online professional development (led by Kentucky educators with experience teaching online and hybrid classes) for almost 10 years. The National Writing Project has been providing research-based comprehensive literacy professional development for decades.

Teaching conditions in the upcoming school year will likely be different for the entire school year. Classrooms, buildings and districts will need educators ready to plan classes that can be flexible enough to meet new challenges in education while simultaneously educating a diverse student population and supporting teacher's mental and physical health.

"We have no idea at this time what our education system will look like in the fall, spring or possibly for the next few years, but one thing that we do know is that educators will need to be flexible and ready to work with a variety of tools to meet this changing and challenging new world," said Dr. Deanna Mascle, instructor of English and site director of the Morehead Writing Project. "Morehead Writing Project's OSI has always included asynchronous online instruction for the nine years of its existence and is led by instructors whose experience extends even further. Our flexible instruction and project-based learning approach offer participants the unique opportunity to design lessons and units guided by personal experience and their individual teaching context."

Educators from kindergarten through college in any discipline, teacher leaders, literacy coaches, supervisors of instruction and principals can all benefit from Morehead Writing Project's professional development opportunities. MWP is approved to provide professional development by the Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) and a preferred provider for the Striving Readers Comprehensive Literacy (SRCL) grant and the FY20 Kentucky Comprehensive Literacy grant. The OSI also has been approved for Effective Instructional Leadership Act (EILA) credit.

The Morehead Writing Project's OSI educators develop the skills and knowledge they need to meet this challenge in the following ways:

• Educators will gain first-hand experience through an online self-paced program that can later be applied to their specific teaching context.

- The program's embedded, project-based learning helps educators gain first-hand experience and insight into developing their project-based units of instruction.
- Required creation of individual online lesson plans while receiving coaching, models and a library of resources that can be adapted for classroom needs.
- Participants will be introduced to a wide range of tools and strategies through educators with experience teaching both online and hybrid classes that can be harnessed for their future teaching challenges.
- Comprehensive literacy instruction (reading, writing and critical thinking) to help educators at any level across all content areas embed strategies in their classes.

The OSI will take place online during the Summer I (June 8 through July 2) session at Morehead State University. The cost is \$1,000 for 36 hours of professional development credit. Those interested in graduate credit can enroll in ENG 608 for three graduate credit hours (and ENG 609 for three hours and a total of six) through Morehead State University's graduate program. Students enrolled in the classes for graduate credit do not need to pay the professional development fee.

There will be weekly expectations and participants should expect to do a minimum of eight to 10 hours of work each week (double that participants elect to take six graduate hours). There is no specific time and date participants need to work and they can jumpstart work if preferred.
