Cooper Not Campaigning For Position

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. John Sherman Cooper said today he was "not campaigning for any position in the Senate's Republican leadership and would support any liberal bloc nominee against Sen. Everett M. Dirksen (R-Ill.).

The Kentucky Republican is a key figure in the liberal insurgency to gain a bigger voice in party senatorial policy councils. Cooper said he would run for one of the posts if the liberal bloc nominates him at a meeting here Dec. 30.

Some of the liberals had counted on Morton to back their case. Morton said he felt their cause would better be served by concentrating on obtaining good committee posts for qualified Republican senators regardless of their seniority.

4 1-2 Ton Satellite Circles Globe; To Broadcast Message

WASHINGTON (UPI) — America's mightiest satellite, an 8,800-pound Atlas intercontinental missile, majestically circled the earth today and was believed ready to broadcast a recorded message by President Eisenhower.

President Announces News

When the Atlas blasted off its pad at the missile test center Thursday, there was no inkling a satellite try was under way. First word of the shoot's importance came two hours later when the President announced in Washington that an orbit had been achieved.

Special stations to send messages and receive them on the playback were set up at Los Angeles, Ft. Huachuca, Ariz., Ft. Sam Houston, Tex. and Ft. Stewart, Ga.

Electronic Equipment in the Missile

Electronic equipment in the missile flashed back instantaneous data on the flight's progress, which was picked up by the brain and processed into guidance impulses to keep the rocket on course.

But Roy Johnson, head of the space agency, promised that more and bigger satellites of the "talking" variety could be expected in the future.

The Atlas has surged to the front in the space race in less than a month. On Nov. 28, the Air Force demonstrated this country's ability to split the oceans with a fighting rocket by firing an Atlas 6,300 statute miles and plunking it down within 30 miles of a pre-terminated target.

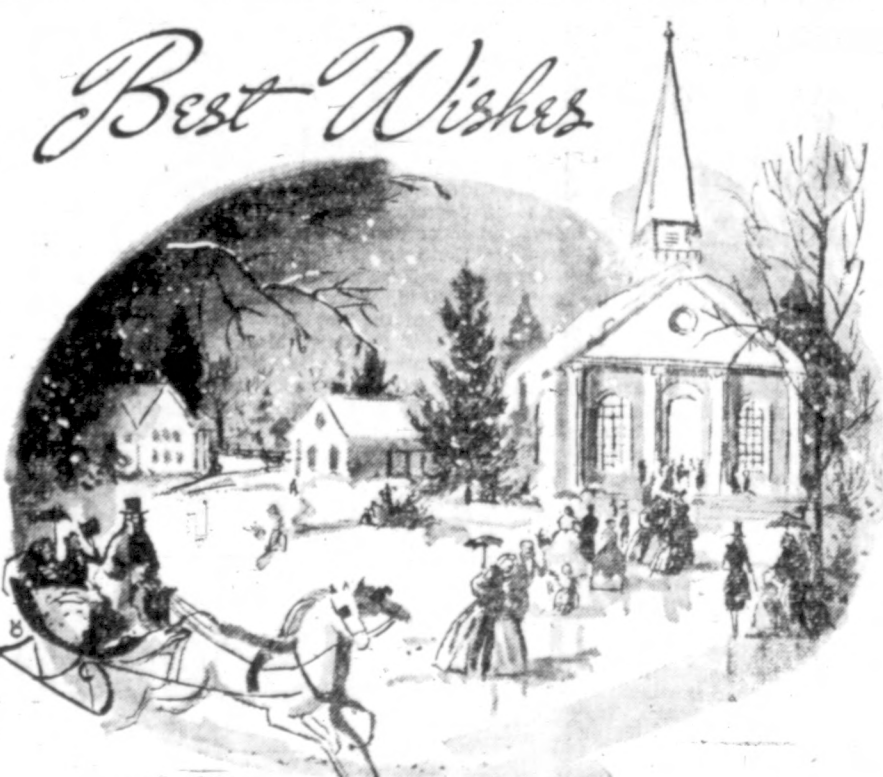

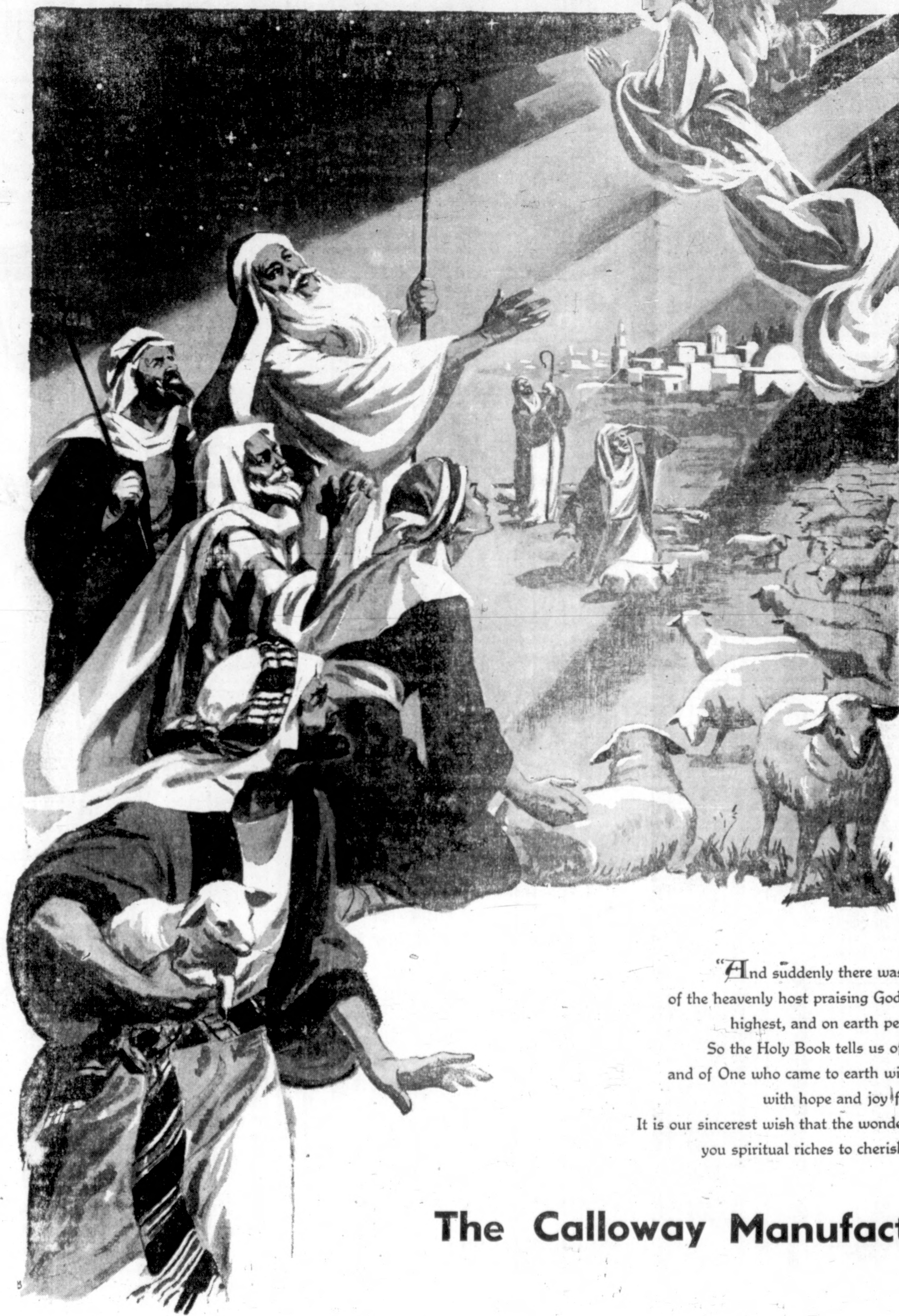

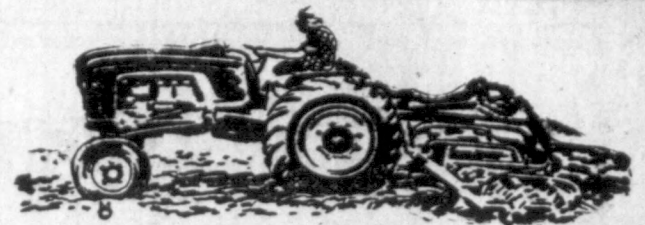

Gift Of Living Tree Big Pleasure

LEXINGTON, Ky. — A living tree of the deciduous variety or an evergreen is a Christmas tree to be enjoyed all year long, says N. R. Elliott, horticulturist in the Agricultural Extension Service at the University of Kentucky.

Deciduous trees are those which drop their leaves. Varieties which seem particularly gift-like are pink or white dogwood, redbud, flowering crab or one of the larger shade trees. A purchasing order from a nursery for spring delivery of any one of these trees would make an admirable gift, says Mr. Elliott.

The use of living evergreen trees at the Christmas season has long been encouraged by Mr. Elliott, and many of the

leading nurseries in the state are in a position to fill the orders, he says.

Such trees may be bought planted in containers and used throughout the holiday season. Then just as soon as weather permits, plant out of doors in a permanent location.

Directions for planting which come with the evergreen tree should be followed, or get a copy of Leaflet 198, Planting Evergreens, from your county agent or the Bulletin Room, Experiment Station, Lexington, Kentucky.

Conservation Reserve Contracts Effective On April 15, 1959

New Conservation Reserve contracts now being signed by farmers in Calloway County will in general become effective on April 15, 1959, according to H. B. Fulton, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

All Conservation Reserve contracts require that the land included be devoted to grass, trees, or a water or wildlife conservation practice. If the conservation practice to be used on the designated land is performed before April 15, the contract becomes effective at the time the practice is started.

This means that 1958 crops on land put in the Conservation Reserve this fall can be harvested before the contract goes into effect. In addition, the land put in the Reserve for the first time this fall may be grazed until the contract goes into effect. After the contract goes into effect the farmer agrees not to graze the land or harvest a crop from it. He also agrees to refrain from harvesting Christmas trees and ornamentals from Conservation Reserve land on which forest trees have been planted.

MOSCOW — (UPI) — The Soviet Union's first helicopter passenger service will begin today between Samferopol and Yalta, according to the newspaper "Soviet Russia."

Ten-seater aircraft will carry vacationers from the Crimean city to the Black Sea resort in 25 to 30 minutes — a service formerly could be made only by car or bus and took four hours. Other helicopter lines are scheduled to open later this year or next.

Area And Shelter Are Studied

LEXINGTON, Ky. — "How much WINTER area and winter shelter do beef cattle need?" is the question beef producers are raising now.

Here are some guide rules from George Pendergrass, Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service specialist:

For beef-breeding cows, 30 to 80 square feet of shed space with provision for entering and leaving as the animals desire; for feeder cattle (yearlings and older), 6 to 70 square feet of which about half is an outside lot. For feeder calves less than 600 pounds in weight, 50 to 60 square feet of which 30 to 35 is outside lot.

For hand-feeding, mature cows need at least three feet of trough space; two-year olds, about 2.5 feet; yearlings, two feet; and feeder and stocker calves, about 1.5 feet. For self-feeding, about two-fifths less space in each case is required.

If hand-feeding is continued throughout the feeding period.

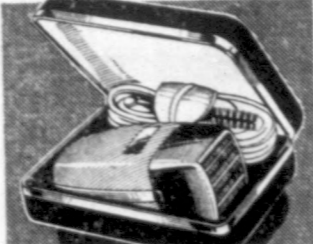

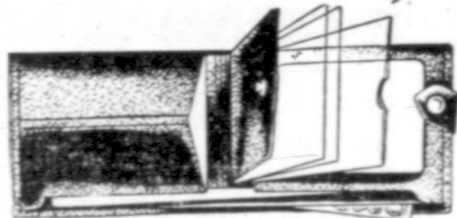

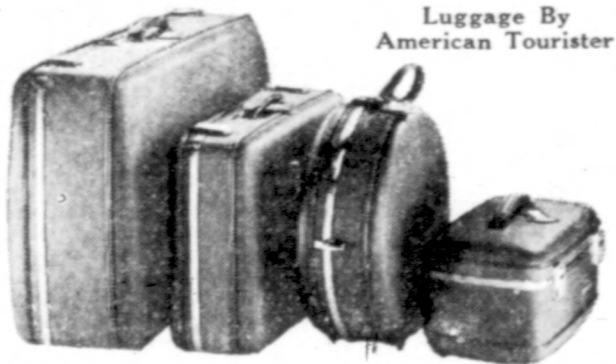

Big British Industry Is Based On Hope

By RALPH COSHAM United Press International LONDON (UPI)—One of Britain's largest industries is based purely on hope. It is hope that impels more than 10 million Britons to fill out football pool coupons week after week — hope that one Saturday night when the results are published they will be rich.

And the hope is all the greater because so many lives have been changed by big-money wins on the pools. There are nine major pools companies in Britain, but about 80 per cent of the annual turnover of 75-million pounds (\$210 million) is handled by the big three — Littlewoods, Vernons and Shermans. Littlewoods is by far the largest of these. It handles about half the turnover and frequently pays out dividends of more than 200,000 pounds (\$600,000). The largest single prize ever was the 250,206 pounds — a whopping \$700,576.80 — which Littlewoods paid in October to Margate police constable Jimmy Upton.

The pools companies pay no betting tax as such, but the normal company tax levied by the British government on all pools companies is estimated to yield more than 20 million pounds (\$56 million) a year. As for the better, they pay no tax on their winnings, although subsequent interest on the cash is taxable. Contestants in the pools, who pay only a few cents to enter, are required to guess the results of a series of games listed on a printed coupon. They mark a "1" in predicting that the home team will win, a "2" for an away win and an "X" for a tie.

The number of betting systems is limitless, but the really big money winner is usually the fellow who forecasts eight ties out of a list of 53 games. If he's the only one with a winning line, he takes the whole kitty. If there are more than one winner, the pot—more than 200,000 pounds in the case of Littlewoods, 35,000 pounds for others—is divided up. Even selling "winning systems" is big business. Every major national newspaper employs a pools forecaster who predicts ties, and prepares betting systems for the small-time punter. But it is the upset results which lead to the big wins. This eliminates the elements of skill and leaves the field clear for the "little man" who makes his selections with a pin or a whim.
