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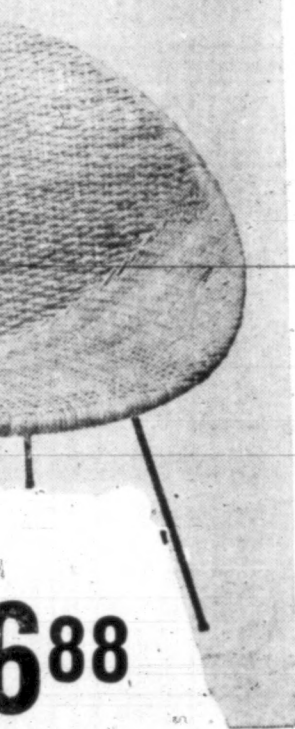

# BIG THREE AGREE ON SUMMIT MEETING

## The First Contemporary Arts Festival To Begin March 31

The first "Contemporary Arts Festival" at Murray State College, an outgrowth of the festival of contemporary music held here last spring, will begin Tuesday, March 31, and will continue through May 1.

The festival will be sponsored by Murray's fine arts department and the Murray chapter of the American Association of University Women. Also taking part will be Phi Mu Alpha and Sigma Alpha Iota, music fraternities.

A planning board of three fine arts instructors, is handling arrangements for the festival. Members include Russell M. Turbine, co-ordinator; Neil Mason, program chairman; and Paul Shahan, publicity chairman.

The festival will feature examples of contemporary music, drama, art, dancing, and films, all of which date after 1920. Professor Turbine said that the festival will be an attempt to expose people to what is going on presently in the arts. "It has been so true that people live economically and socially in the present but live culturally in the past. Our idea is to bring them up to date," he said.

Most of the festival's events will be produced by student and faculty groups, although a few programs by other performers will be included.

Highlights of the spring-long program will be a ceramics exhibition by Don Campbell, of the art faculty, April 6; two short operas, "Sunday Excursion" and "Trouble in Tahiti" by the opera workshop April 24; a band and brass choir concert April 26; a modern dance group, May 1; an orchestra and string orchestra concert, May 10, and a play, "Bell Book and Candle" by the college drama department May 14-16.

Last year's contemporary music festival, sponsored by Phi Mu Alpha and Sigma Alpha Iota, met with such enthusiasm that the fine arts faculty decided to expand the affair last year, who directed the affair last year, said that each of the concerts played to near capacity crowds.

## Weekly Paper Scores Pole Plastering

FULTON — The Fulton County News, a weekly newspaper, has attacked gubernatorial candidate Lt. Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield for allowing excessive campaign advertising.

The newspaper said Waterfield campaign workers had "plastered" telephone poles, trees, bridges and culverts with campaign posters and stickers in violation of three state laws.

It said the three state statutes (KRS 43.930 - 43.950 - 43.970) specifically forbid injuring public property or rights of way or defacing or damaging milestones, guideboards or telephone posts.

The newspaper said that early in the campaign the Garden Clubs of Kentucky, Inc. asked all candidates to refrain from defacing trees, telephone poles, bridges and other highway property by posting campaign placards.

It said Bert T. Combs and Wilson W. Wyatt had promised they would not post campaign placards excessively and that Waterfield agreed to go along with the other candidate but was "leaving the matter up to his campaign headquarters."

## Similar Views Presented To Kremlin By Western Powers

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States, Britain and France expressed willingness today to meet at the summit with Russia if a prior foreign ministers conference can narrow cold war differences and prepare constructive proposals.

The three Allied Western powers formally presented their views in similar notes to the Kremlin.

All three agreed that a Summit conference this summer would be worthwhile if the foreign ministers meeting in Geneva in May shows promise.

The U.S. note specifically listed a peace treaty with Germany and the tense Berlin situation as problems that could be dealt with by the foreign ministers and later at the Summit.

However, the note said the purpose of the negotiations would be to reach positive agreements over as wide a field as possible.

The U.S. emphasized that the foreign ministers should discuss "questions relating to Germany, including a peace treaty with Germany and the question of Berlin."

## Dr. Cunningham To Address WSCS Meet At Fulton April 1

At the evening session on Wednesday, April 1, Dr. W. J. Cunningham, pastor of St. John's Methodist Church, Memphis, will address delegates and visitors at the annual Women's Society of Christian Service Conference at the First Methodist Church in Fulton, Kentucky. The topic will be "Following the Trail of John Wesley." Members of the Wesleyan Society, who come to Fulton for Guild Night will have the opportunity of hearing this address on a subject of interest to all Methodists.

In the summer of 1958, Dr. W. J. Cunningham, pastor of St. John's Methodist Church, Memphis, spent some weeks in England and took advantage of the opportunity to visit places associated with the life work of John Wesley and to add to his knowledge about the founder of Methodism.

Dr. Cunningham, who has been pastor of St. John's Church since 1956, is a native of North Mississippi and a former member of the Northern Mississippi Conference. He is the son of a retired minister of that conference.

Dr. Cunningham was graduated from the University of Mississippi, Oxford, Miss., and from Emory University, Atlanta, Ga. Millsaps College, a Methodist institution at Jackson, Miss., bestowed upon him the honorary degree of doctor of divinity.

He is a member of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA; was a member of the Ninth World Methodist Conference, a representative of the Methodist church in the USA at the latest session of the World Council of Churches, and a member of the Methodist Institute of Theological Studies at Oxford, England, in the summer of 1958.

## Clean Sweep Predicted, Combs, Wyatt

GRAYSON (UPI) — Bert T. Combs, candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in the May 26 primary election, Wednesday predicted a clean sweep for the Combs - Wyatt team in the 7th Congressional District.

Combs said a survey of the counties in the district had revealed that he and his running mate, Wilson W. Wyatt, Louisville, would carry the district by "not less than 25,000 votes."

Chiding his principal opponent, Lt. Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield, he said, "When my opponent thinks otherwise, he is merely whistling past the graveyard. Veteran political observers all tell they are willing to stake their reputations that the Combs-Wyatt team will carry the 1st District in western Kentucky. Harry Lee's home district."

Earlier in a television message beamed to eastern Kentucky from a station in Huntington, W. Va., he attacked the Chandler-Waterfield administration for refusing to call a special session of the General Assembly to consider extension of unemployment benefits.

The working man knows I have repeatedly demanded that a special session of the legislature be called to do this. On the other hand, the working man knows that Harry Lee Waterfield served as acting governor as recently as last week. He served while Gov. ## Thought All Insane So Killed Two

HIBERNIA, N. J. (UPI) — Mrs. Ellen Church, who told police she bludgeoned two of her children to death with a toy tomahawk and a hammer, was confined to an institution today as insane.

"I thought we were all insane," she told officials Wednesday in explaining why she took the lives of two of her children and tried to kill two others by feeding them overdoses of sleeping pills in fresh raspberries.

Mrs. Church was taken to Graystone Mental Hospital Wednesday night after two psychiatrists signed commitment papers.

Morris County Prosecutor Frank Serebo said that the psychiatrists had found Mrs. Church a "schizophrenic" who was actively psychotic and was suffering from hallucinations.

Mrs. Church, a den mother for Scout Cub Pack 62 in Rockaway, also had tried to commit suicide by taking sleeping pills after the attack on her children.

The bodies of the two youngest children, Kenneth, 5 months, and Katherine, 2, were found stuffed in a basket in a playhouse in the Church yard Tuesday night.

Stephen, 10, and Elizabeth, 14, were found to be suffering from the effects of sleeping pill poisoning. They were treated at a hospital and recovered.

## Brochure To Interest Glass Manufacturers

FRANKFORT (UPI) — The state Department of Economic Development has issued a brochure designed to interest glass manufacturers in the great potential of the glass industry in Kentucky.

Of the 625 million bottles purchased by Kentucky industries every year, none of them are made in the state.

The brochure points not only to the market for glass in the state's beverage, food and chemical industries, but also to the fact that two of the principal raw materials for glass manufacture, high-purity silica sand and high-calcium limestone are found in the state.

Kentucky's distilleries are the largest users of glass bottles in the state with the principal markets at Louisville, Frankfort, Owensboro, Bardonia and Covington.

George Hubley Jr., state economist of the Kentucky market, said the Kentucky market for glass is "of a size to command the interest of any glass container manufacturer considering the location of a new plant."

Bob Cerv is flexing his muscles again and so the Kansas City Athletics figure they're no longer the "spies" of the Grapefruit League.

Cerv, one of the American League's top sluggers last season, could lead the Athletics into the first division this year, according to manager Harry Craft.

Both Cerv and the Athletics got off to a poor start this spring but Bob took charge all by himself Wednesday when the Athletics scored a 3-2 decision over the New York Yankees. It was only the Athletics' sixth victory in 14 Grapefruit League games.

Cerv singled home one run in the first inning and tripled home another in the third in addition to clouting a double. Ned Garver pitched the first five innings for the Athletics and held the Yankees to three hits.

Both Received Surprises  
The Washington Senators and Cincinnati Reds each enjoyed a pleasant surprise when Chuck Stobbs and Orlando Pena turned in nine-inning performances.

Pena, who had an 11-10 record for Havana of the International League last season, pitched a five-hitter to become the first Cincinnati pitcher to go nine innings this spring in a 4-1 win over the Cardinals. Frank Robinson's second homer in as many days and his fourth of the spring broke a 1-1 tie in the fourth.

The quarterback spot may be in better shape next fall than it was last season. Buddy Parker, who had some good moments last year, has improved and is now the major contender. Wade Harper has gone well briefly, and according to Cullivan, will be a great help to the team if he can be used for spot performances.

The Murray coach said that he has high hopes of picking up reserve strength from a bumper crop of freshmen players he expects to bring in next fall.

More than 200 high school senior prospects have been invited to see the Blue-Gold game as well as 350 high school coaches.

Irving Jaffee gave the U. S. its first Olympic speed skating gold medal in 1928 when he won the 10,000 meters at St. Moritz, Switzerland. 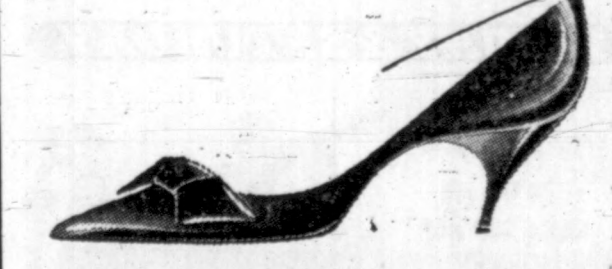

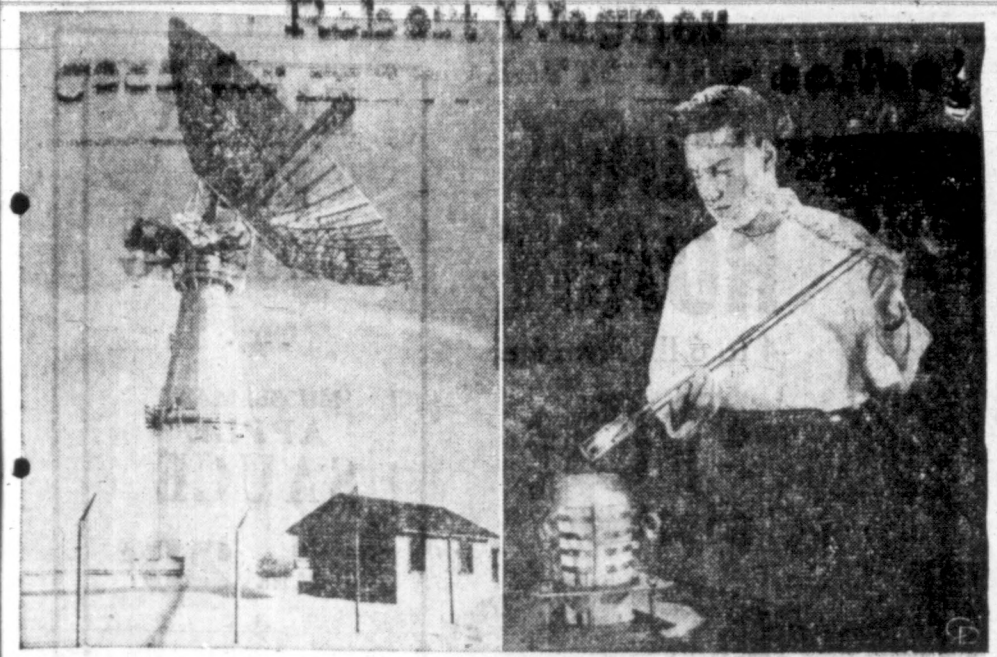

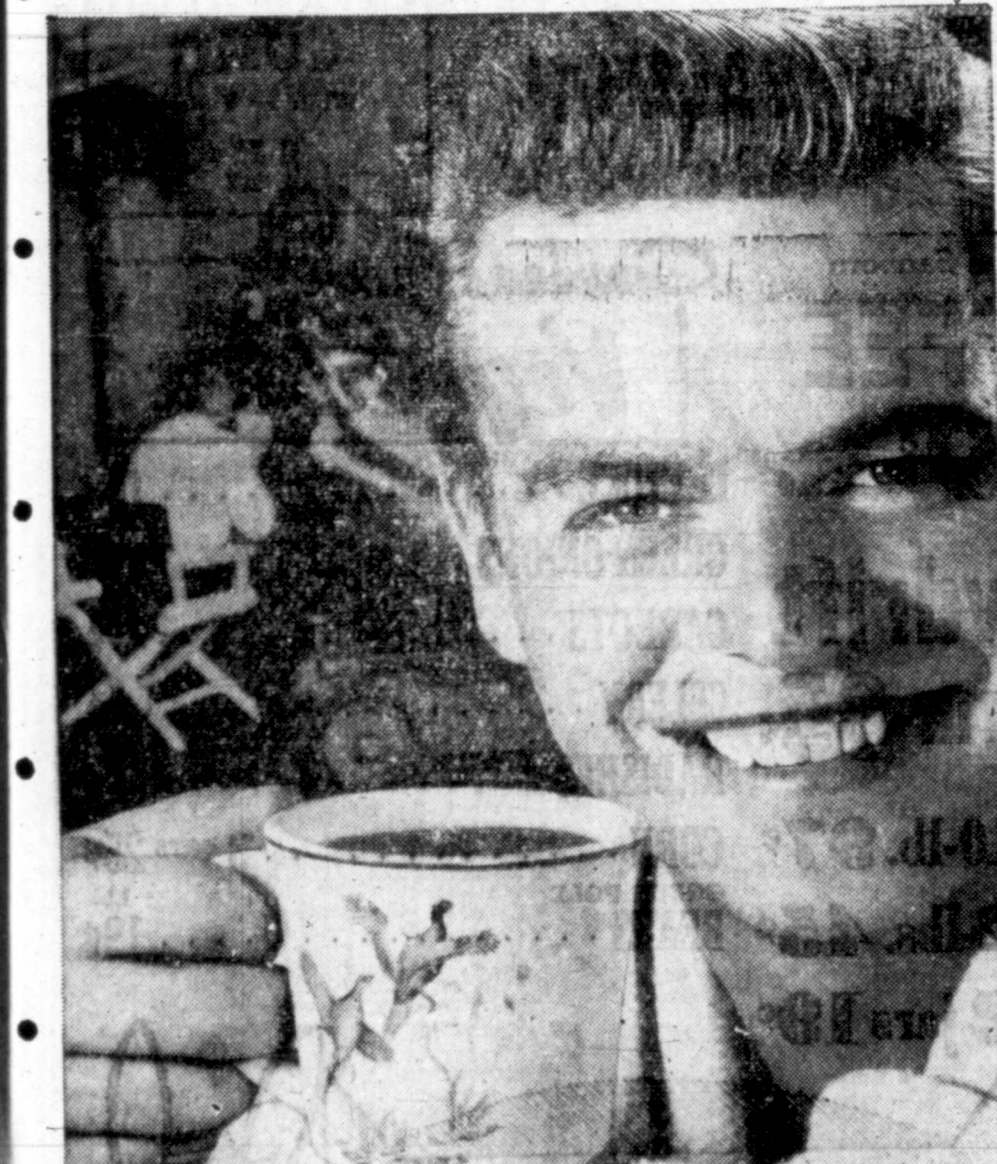

**NEW YORK (UPI)** — Thixotropic paint, a brainchild of the du Pont Co., may help you out with that basement or garage wall painting chore. You don't have to stir it. It won't drip. One gallon covers about 300 square feet.

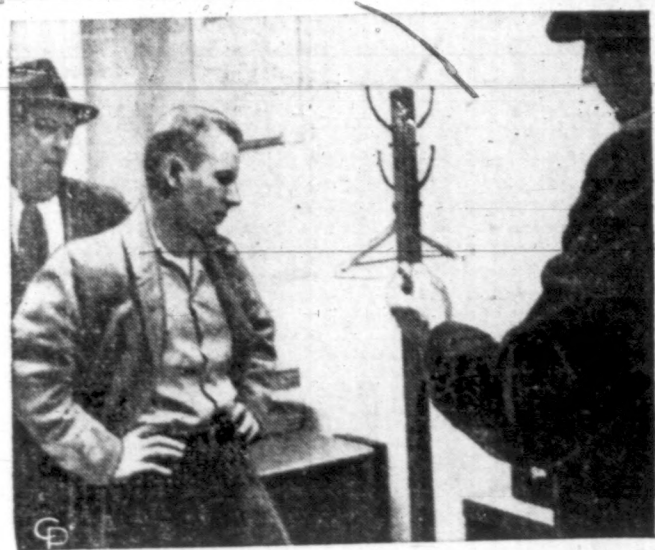

May 11 Observers  
The Western powers selected Russia's proposal that Polish and Czechoslovakian foreign ministers

attend a summit meeting in the Western Big Three agreed for the two Russian satellites to join in "a certain state in negotiations." They would presumably have the status of observers. But the United States "believes that the proposed meeting should at least in the outset involve only the four powers responsible for Germany," the note said.

It was noted that Russia had agreed for representatives of East and West Germany to sit in as observers at the foreign ministers meeting.

Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev had agreed in advance to the foreign ministers' meeting starting May 11 in Geneva.

But at the same time, he said anew that only a summit conference really could accomplish anything definite.

Leave Discussion Open  
Although the U.S. note specified only Germany and Berlin as topics for the foreign ministers conference, it said "naturally, any of the four participating governments should have the opportunity to bring up other matters which it may consider relevant to the problems under consideration."

The U.S. mission said: "The purpose of the foreign ministers' meeting should be to reach tentative agreements over as wide a field as possible and in any case to narrow the differences between the respective points of view and to prepare constructive proposals for consideration by a conference of heads of government later in the summer."

The notes of the Western powers, in reply to a Soviet note of March 2, were delivered in Moscow earlier today.

The Western Big Three promised to ask Switzerland if the May 11 date and the Geneva site would be available. United Nations Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld also will be asked if U.N. facilities in Geneva will be available.

The note was an outgrowth of the Camp David conference between President Eisenhower and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan. The views of the two were endorsed by French President Charles De Gaulle and other NATO governments before the note was dispatched.

French Ambassador Maurice Dejean called for Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko. He was followed by U. S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman and British Ambassador Sir Patrick Reilly. Gromyko talked briefly with Harriman but the subject was not discussed.
