PICKENS, N.C. - Mrs. Essie Johnson, a Negro woman who has had one of her three sons killed in Viet Nam, another missing, the third wounded, commenting on the Southeast Asia war:

"No war is good, but I felt real strong about this one, even before Charles died. And it ain't right for three sons to have to go. I don't think any of our boys should be there fighting."

NEW YORK - Actress Maureen O'Sullivan, 55, denying that she intends marrying a 23-year-old rabbinical student: "When you go out with someone and you're in the public eye, you are bound to be the object of such stories. It's deeply embarrassing to me and deeply embarrassing to him."

BERLIN - The Soviet news agency Tass, charging that the Western Allies were callous in forbidding the Soviets entry to West Berlin to guard the wreckage of a Soviet plane that crashed in the Western sector Wednesday:

"Noteworthy is the strange behavior of the Western occupation authorities . . . who did not let representatives of the Soviet armed forces come to the place of the accident and pay last honors to the dead servicemen.



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


