Journalism New Aid For The Church

Churches are forging a new instrument of religious education that may prove more effective than Sunday schools or sermons in communicating Christian insights to contemporary society.

The instrument is journalism — specifically, magazine journalism. Nearly every major denomination now has one or more first-rate magazines aimed at a broad family audience.

Many of these periodicals have been launched within the past decade. Some are drastically transformed versions of venerable house organs which previously had a narrow appeal.

If you haven't read one of the new-style church magazines, you may be in for a pleasant surprise — and perhaps a few shocks as well. The pleasant surprise is the high professional quality of these publications. With rare exceptions, they are "slick" magazines both in the technical sense of being printed on glazed paper and in the more general sense of being skillfully edited.

The contents often are a far cry from what you might expect to find in a church magazine. Instead of filling their pages with bland little homilies and short stories, today's religious period are wading boldly into such controversial issues as drug addiction, homosexuality, pacifism, black power and "death of God" theology.

By commissioning articles from leading theologians and well-informed experts in other fields, a church magazine can give the layman a far more lucid and intellectually satisfying treatment of almost any subject than he's likely to get in the average sermon.

In the past, denominational magazines were seriously handicapped because they could offer only a small fraction of the fee or of the audience available to a writer in mass circulation secular magazines.

This problem is now being overcome, however. Nine of the most important Protestant journals have recently entered into an informal cooperative agreement to publish jointly features which no one of them could afford to commission alone.

Since there is practically no overlap in circulation, the effect is to make the same article available to a total audience of about 3.6 million readers — which compares favorably with all out the biggest of the secular "slicks."

Cooperation in Advertising The same technique also is being applied to solicitation of advertising. In the past, many big national advertisers have shied away from religious journals, both

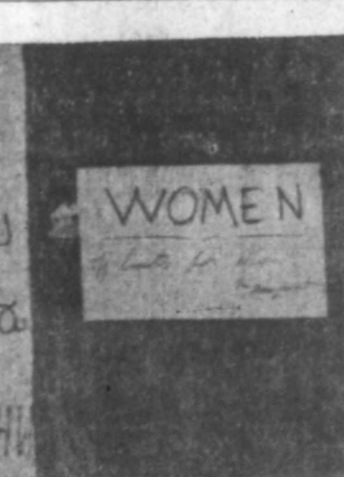

money to pay current commitments.

Dallying by the state authorities on this question came about when all property owners were assessed 100 per cent of the value of their property. This caused some confusion since the Electric System was already paying 100 per cent.

Work will begin soon on the four-laning of South 12th Street from Sycamore to just south of Uncle Jeff. Mayor Ellis reported that both gas and water lines must be moved in order to accomplish the widening.

The gas system will utilize three or four men and also rent machinery from the Lynch Construction Company, now working near South Marshall School in Marshall County. The system will use their own men and equipment also and the operation is expected to take from three to four weeks at an additional cost to the city of \$3,000 to \$4,000.

## Fatalities Pile Up On Slick Roads

The worst snowstorm of the season moved across the Midwest and into the Northeast today, bringing additional dangers to thousands of the nation's motorists who took to the highways for the Christmas holidays.

The National Safety Council predicted that between 650 and 700 persons would never reach their destination before the 78-hour holiday weekend ends. For the corresponding 78-hour period last year 729 persons were killed and 34,000 injured, the council said.

The United Press International count at 8 a.m. EST showed at least 79 persons killed in traffic accidents since the weekend began.

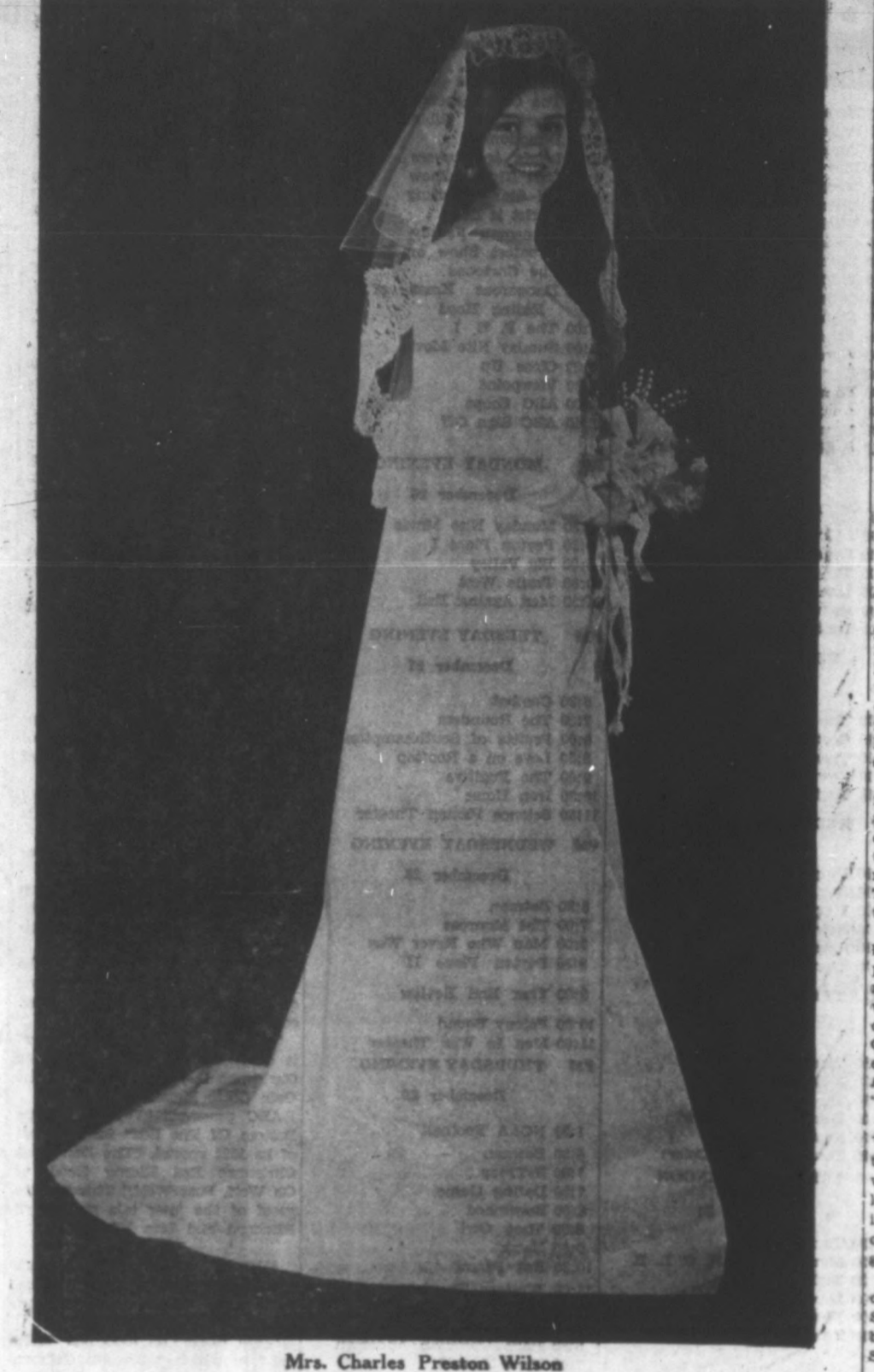

Many Details Are Not In The Bible

Many people take it to be "gospel truth" that Jesus Christ was born in a crude wooden stable on Dec. 25, 1 A. D., that he shortly thereafter received gifts from three Oriental kings named Kaaper, Melchior and Balthazar.

Actually, not one of these familiar details of the New Testament comes from the New Testament. All are from the products of pious imagination, and probably are contrary to historical fact.

Take the matter of that wooden stable. It has been depicted so often in paintings and pageants that it comes as a surprise to many to learn that the Bible says only that Mary after giving birth to her son, "laid him in a manger because there was no room for them in the inn."

Since a manger is a feedthrough, the clear implication of the passage is that Jesus was born in a place where livestock were usually kept. But in first century Bethlehem, cattle were not sheltered in the kind of wooden barn envisioned by generations of Western artists. They were kept in caves, hewn out of the soft limestone cliffs.

Western Nation it is interesting in this connection to note that the tradition of the wooden stable is entirely unknown to Christians in the lands of the Eastern Mediterranean, including Palestine itself. They have always taken for granted that Jesus was born in a grotto.

The assumption that Jesus was born in the year 1 A. D. is the basic premise of the Western calendar, now generally used throughout the world. This calendar supposes to date all events from the birth of Christ. It divided history into two eras—B. C. before Christ and A. D., Anno Domini, which is Latin for "the year of our Lord."

Dionysius Eridanus, who made the calculations for the Julian calendar in the 6th Century A. D., was not very good at arithmetic. He miscalculated the year 1 by at least six years.

St. Matthew's Gospel clearly states that Jesus was born "in the days of Herod the king," and indicates that Herod was still alive, and slaughtering innocent babies, two years later. It is well established in historical records that Herod died in 4 B. C., so that Jesus must have been born about 6 B. C.

St. Luke connects the birth with a decree from Augustus Caesar requiring all residents of the Roman Empire to enroll for taxation. Historians have fixed the time of this census as somewhere between 9 B. C. and 6 B. C.

Along the date of Dec. 25, that was chosen by the church during the 4th Century, A. D. as a fitting occasion to celebrate the "Christ Mass" the liturgy commemorating the savior's birthday. The choice seems to have been dictated not by any particular historical evidence or tradition concerning the actual date of Jesus' birth, but rather by a desire to Christianize a Roman rite which marked the winter solstice.

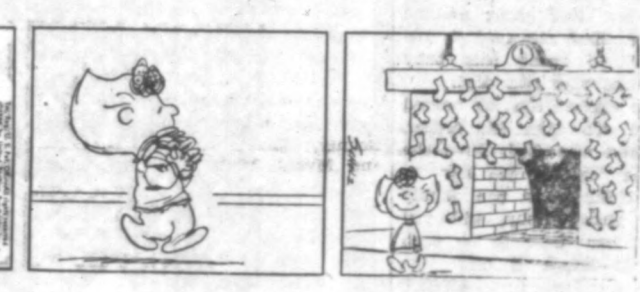
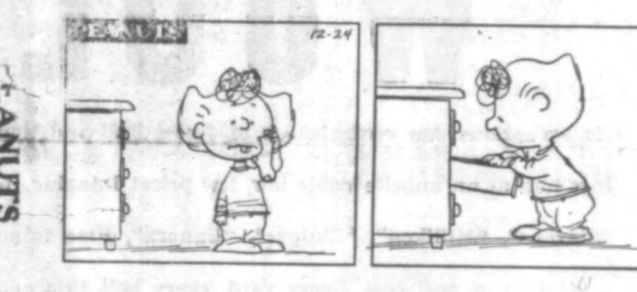

Florida, Wyoming In Sun Bowl, Blue-Gray See Action Today

Florida State takes on Wyoming in the Sun Bowl and squads from the north and south square off in the Blue-Gray classic as major college football kicks off its annual bowl season, maybe today.

The question in the 32nd annual Sun Bowl matchup at El Paso, Tex., goes something like this: Can a team like Florida State with phenomenal passing beat a team which has gotten little publicity but plays a great defense, Wyoming?

Although the Seminoles won only six of 10, they picked up 2,467 yards through the air, over 400 yards more than the famed Steve Peadar Proh Blainford Gator Bowl championship team of 1964 that held the previous school mark.

Running No Good
It's a good thing the Seminoles can pass, because they may have trouble running against Wyoming. The Cowboys, who finished the season with an impressive 9-1 mark, allowed a mere 38.5 yards per game rushing and 6.9 points.

No coaches on offense either, the Western Athletic Conference champs boast quarterback Rick Egloff, who fired 13 touchdown passes this season, and kicker Jerry DePoppler, who kicked five field goals for a 40.2 average. Halfback Jim Kibick, rated one of the West's top backs, will handle the running chores for Wyoming.

The passing will be fast and furious at Montgomery, Ala., when the Blue's Virgil Carter takes on the Gray's Terry Southall.

The Blue, coached by aerial-minded Glenn Dobbs of Tulsa, is basing its hopes for a 17th victory in this series largely on Carter, the nation's total offense leader while playing at Brigham Young this fall.

This game also is rated even. Two Receivers
Gray Coach John Bridgers of Baylor not only brought along his own quarterback, but also two of Southall's favorite receivers, Split end Tommy Smith and flanker Paul Becton. Southall completed 173 passes for 1,886 yards and 16 touchdowns for Baylor.

The classic is played annually for the benefit of underprivileged children.

Next Saturday action will really

move into high gear when Tennessee meets Syracuse in the Gator Bowl. Georgia takes on Southern Methodist in the Cotton Bowl and two squads of All-Stars collide in the East-West Shrine game.

The hectic pace comes a close on January 2, when Alabama faces Nebraska in the Sugar Bowl, Southern Cal hosts Purdue in the Rose Bowl and Georgia Tech squares off with Florida in the Orange Bowl in a night game.
