## Murray Fire Department Is Called To Fire At Benton

The Murray Fire Department was called last night about 6:00 p. m. to aid the Benton fire department in a fire at the Benton Elementary School cafeteria.

A pumper truck and six men were sent to the fire which according to a spokesman from the Murray Fire Department, was out of control when they arrived.

The fire, discovered by the school janitor about 5:30 p. m., completely gutted the cafeteria and caused extensive smoke damage to the rest of the 32 room school building.

Marshall County Sheriff Joe Tom Haulton said he suspected arson and has requested a state fire marshal to make an investigation. The sheriff tentatively estimated the damage at \$75,000.00.

The fire apparently started in two different places in the building. The major part of the damage was caused by a fire which started in a teacher's office near the cafeteria and another fire was found behind a freezer in the kitchen.

The fire in the kitchen was apparently started by putting paper behind the freezer and igniting it. Papers were found scattered on the floor of both the kitchen and the teacher's office.

## Calloway County Quota This Year Is 225 Pints Of Blood

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Murray Thursday at the First Methodist Church, Calloway County's quota is 225 pints. Citizens will receive the opportunity to provide for the blood needs of the year by coming to the bloodmobile and donating a pint of blood.

The following questions are frequently asked and the answers are printed here in an attempt to clarify points of interest.

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**Who can donate blood?** Any one between the ages of 18 and 80 who is in good physical condition. Doctors and nurses are on hand to take medical histories and give examinations. Some persons are not permitted to donate because of diseases which they have had in the past. Many precautions are observed for the donor's safety, including disposable needles.

**If I donate a pint of blood how will it benefit me?** You assure yourself and your family of having all the blood you need for a year. "Family" is defined as husband or wife; children under 18; children over 18 unable to donate blood; parents-in-law, grandparents, and grandparents-in-law.

**If I donate how will it benefit the community?** If the quota is met, every citizen in the county will receive all the blood they need until the end of this fiscal year.

**If I am physically rejected when I offer to give blood do I receive a Red Cross Credit Card?** Yes.

**What is done with the blood collected?** It is packaged, typed, and processed at the Regional Blood Center in Nashville. It is then returned to participating hospitals for use of patients either in the form of blood, blood plasma, gamma globulin, or other derivatives. Murray-Calloway County Hospital orders the blood it needs and keeps it available for patients when they need it.

**Why does the hospital need an emergency list of donors of fresh blood?** Because it is not always possible to foresee the exact type that will be needed. Blood keeps only 21 days and the hospital does not want to order more than it needs. Thus an emergency donor is sometimes needed until the center can get the blood type needed to the hospital.

**How often can a person donate blood?** Once every 8 weeks for a maximum of 5 times a year.

**Can pregnant women donate?** No, not until 12 months after delivery.

**Is there any cost for Red Cross blood?** The Murray-Calloway County Hospitals pays the regional center \$5.00 per pint. This cost is passed along to the patient with a charge for cross-matching and for actual transfusion.

**Does this cost pay all expenses of the local blood program?** No, the Calloway County Red Cross chapter has paid the expenses for all drives for many years out of local funds. Last year special donations were made by the Moose Lodge, the

## Yandall Wrather, Conservationist, Dies Early Today

Yandall Wrather of 1605 Farmer Avenue, prominent Murray man, passed away this morning at 3:30 at the Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, Tenn.

The deceased entered the hospital on April 16 and had undergone surgery since that time.

Wrather, age 63, had retired April 30, 1968 after nearly 33 years service in the U.S. Department of Agriculture and four years as vocational agriculture teacher.

Wrather was a graduate of Lynn Grove High School and the University of Kentucky. He taught vocational agriculture in Painesville and Lincoln counties and was county agent of Morgan County for ten years before joining the U.S. Soil Conservation Service.

Wrather's career spanned some of the greatest advances in agriculture and natural resource conservation.

The Morgan County Farm and Home Improvement Association was formed while Wrather was County Agent to promote and develop agriculture in the county.

Wrather served as soil scientist for SCS at Mayfield before moving to Marshall County as soil conservationist. While in Marshall SCD he was instrumental in promoting one of the "Conservation Caravan field days".

He was assigned to the Calloway County SCD in 1949. He gave valuable assistance to Murray State University's peacetime "Conservation Workshop" for teachers. This workshop gave teachers valuable background in conservation to use in all grades and subjects. Awarded the USDA Certificate of Merit for outstanding performance as a Soil Conservationist, commendations from Regional Directors, State Conservationists, and others, but his prize accomplishment was a warm personal letter and citation from the first Chief of SCS Hugh H. Bennett.

The mill was built in 1900 by Dr. C. N. Crawford, a practicing physician at Lynn Grove and Mr. Ferguson. They later sold it to Miller and Myers.

The building is constructed from white oak timber which was cut from the ground now occupied by the mill. The mill now standing is the original one and has not been rebuilt. It is in excellent condition.

Powered by a steam engine from 1900 when it was built, the mill was converted to diesel engines in 1928. The diesel engine has not been rebuilt.

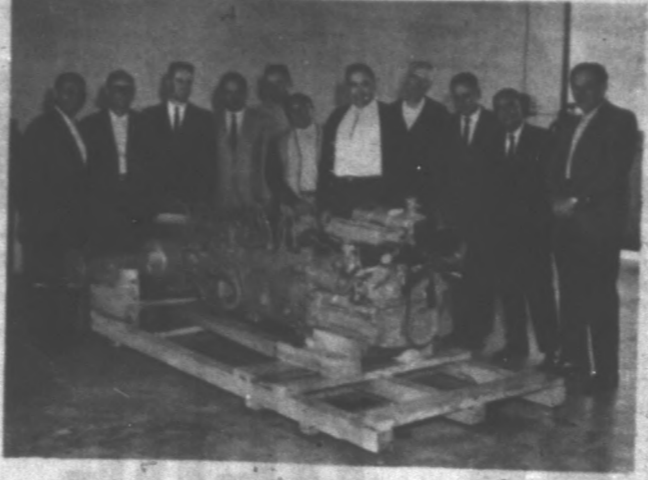

## Calloway Co. High Is Given Power Train

A Ford tractor power train worth more than \$3,900.00 was presented recently to Calloway County High School by Ford Motor Company's U.S. Tractor and Implement Operations. The donation arranged by Billington-Forsythe Tractor Company, is part of a continuing Ford program to support the agricultural community.

Donated under the Company's corporate contributions program, the power train consists of a three cylinder 201-CID gasoline engine, eight speed manual-shift transmission, and rear axle. Power trains are given to qualifying schools, colleges, universities and technical schools.

Bill Owens, zone manager presented the unit to the Vocational Agriculture Department.

The power train will be used for classroom instruction for vocational Ag students and Adult training programs. A total of 252 Ford Tractors engines and power trains—worth more than \$856,000—was donated to educational institutions in 1968.

Last year's total increased donations of Ford tractor power components since 1961 to 582, with total worth in excess of \$1,330,000.

## Christians And Jews Are Closer Now

Recent theological developments offer hope for major improvement in relations between Christians and Jews.

Both in the Roman Catholic Church and in major Protestant communions, Christian theology is moving toward acknowledgment that the Jews are still God's people in a special sense.

This trend is important because it strikes at one of the principal ideological roots of anti-Semitism among Christians.

The traditional Christian view, which has held sway among Protestants and Catholics for many centuries, is that the appearance of Jesus fulfilled God's promise to send the Jews a messiah or savior.

According to this view, the refusal of a majority of Jews to recognize Jesus as the long-awaited messiah resulted in abrogation of the ancient "covenant" under which the Jews became God's "chosen people. God thereupon established a new covenant with the followers of Christ, and the church became "the new Israel."

As a logical extension of this doctrine, Christians looked upon Judaism as a fossil religion, and sought to convert Jews to Christianity as their one hope of salvation.

An extensive attitude survey conducted several years ago by the University of California sociologists Charles Y. Glock and Rodney Stark disclosed a direct link between anti-Semitic feelings and acceptance of the traditional Christian view that Jews had defaulted on their covenant with God.

Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum, director of interreligious affairs for the American Jewish Committee, told Christian theologians at an interfaith conference in 1966 that abandonment of the "fossil religion" attitude toward Judaism was "critical for the future of Jewish-Christian relations."

In re-thinking the question during the past few years, Protestant and Catholic scholars have recalled the apocryphal Paul warned the early church, nearly 2,000 years ago, against the notion that God had turned his back on the Jews.

"God had not rejected his people, whom he chose from the beginning," Paul said in his letter to Christians at Rome. "For God does not change his mind about whom he chooses and blesses."

Catholic theologians from many countries met in Rome recently to consider Christian-Jewish relations. They met behind closed doors but participants said the prominent themes of the meeting was the need for Christian theology to affirm in explicit terms the continuing validity of the "old covenant between the Jews and God, and to show how it relates to the "new" covenant between Christian believers and God.

Under the prodding of noted scholars such as Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr and Dr. Krister Stendahl of Harvard Divinity School, Protestant theology is evolving in a similar direction.

## HIGH-PRICED PARKING

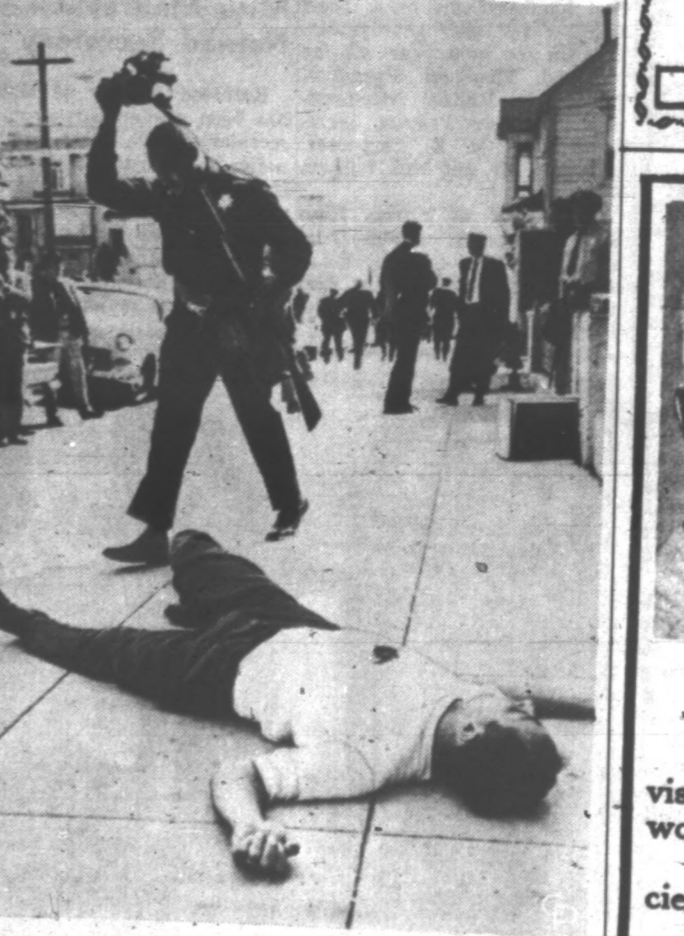

gines were used until 1928 when the mill was converted to electricity.  
In 1928 Gordon Crouch, brother of Fleetwood Crouch, became a partner in the firm. They are both now semi-retired and the business is run by Mrs. Gordon (Winnie) Crouch and J. D. Elkins, with the latter having been employed there for six years.  
Fleetwood and Gordon work at the mill during the popcorn and wheat harvest time.  
When Fleetwood first started in the business, it was necessary to go to Illinois to get the wheat for the flour for the mill. Now all the grain is grown locally.  
Persons may buy flour at the mill, but the Murray Wholesale Grocery Company is the distributor for the Lynn Grove flour.  
Fleetwood is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. M. O. (Lena) Crouch of Lynn Grove. He married Lou Jenny Boyett of Wingo in September 1921 and they moved into the house with Mrs. Stokes at Lynn Grove where they resided for two years.  
Mr. and Mrs. Crouch later moved to their present home and have resided in the same house since that time. The house is located just west of the mill in Lynn Grove.

### Miss Parks Is Honored

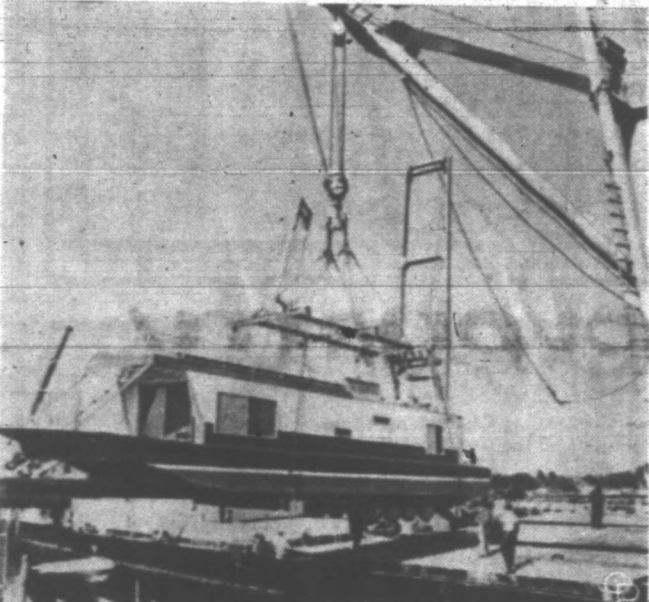

 While entertaining the other evening at the annual White House news photographers dinner, Miss Adams made a remark that suddenly caused a great light to dawn upon me.

**Sympathizes With Nixon**  
 She said she sympathized with President Nixon in his efforts to withdraw U. S. troops from Vietnam.  
 She said she could understand the difficulty he is having because she had once tried to withdraw from a book club.  
 "By George!" I exclaimed to myself. "Maybe that's it! Maybe that's the reason for the frustrating situation in Vietnam. The whole thing is being fouled up by computers."  
 If you have a charge account, a bank account, a magazine subscription or a book club membership, I'm sure you will recognize the validity of my theory.  
 Nearly everybody has had an experience somewhat along this line:  
 You are billed for something you didn't buy. You write a letter to the company about it. The company sends you a computerized form letter assuring you the mistake has been corrected. Meanwhile, the billing computer keeps hounding you, threatening to take you to court and that sort of thing. You write another letter. And another. But the computer persists.

**Extensive Use**  
 Well, it is well known that the federal government makes extensive use of computers. And it is safe to assume that some of them have been programmed with data pertaining to Vietnam.  
 So President Nixon comes into office determined to end the war or at least create conditions that will permit the withdrawal of American troops.  
 Pretty soon some side reports that progress is being made in the peace talks. Then the other side denies it.  
 Someone spreads the word that troop withdrawal may begin before the year is over. Someone else disputes this.  
 It could be that Nixon has devised the right formula for bringing about a withdrawal. But when the formula hits the computer, something goes awry.  
 It may be the same type of computer that keeps sending you monthly book selections you didn't order six months after your membership in the club has expired.  
 Should that be the case, I fear we are in for a long war.

### Industry Is Moving Into The Ghettos

International Business Machines is building a plant in Brooklyn's Bedford Stuyvesant Negro ghetto. Avco is setting one up in the Roxbury district of Boston. Westinghouse plans a new factory in Pittsburgh's Homewood - Braddock area and Control Data is building a facility in the Negro district of Minneapolis. Movement of industry into the ghetto, along with growing emphasis on black entrepreneurship and increasing opportunity for Negroes in business and industry generally, indicates the demand for black managers is going to outrun the supply for years to come.  
 It presently is estimated that 100 jobs exist at the management level for every five black managers in existence.

**Important Task**  
 Lawrence Johnson, assistant dean of the School of Business Administration at the University of Massachusetts, says the nation's schools are not producing nearly enough business educated Negroes. He urges colleges and universities, in partnership with industry, to move

ahead swiftly with this all-important task.  
 Johnson, a Negro himself, has some specific ideas about how this should proceed:  
 For the potential black manager already out of school, industry has to carry the bulk of the load, providing on-the-job training and assuming some of the financial burden for additional college work. For those in school, the colleges need to design business programs for them with heavy emphasis on remedial work.

**Verbal Skills**  
 In the longer range, Johnson urges that the public schools be "shaken up" so the black student does not emerge an educational cripple. Too many now graduate lacking the ability to handle numbers and the necessary verbal skills.  
 "Most students are afraid of numbers and that is especially true among black people," Johnson said in an interview during an American Assembly Conference last week on black economic development at Harriman, N.Y.

Johnson said the nation's predominantly white colleges have turned out only a relative handful of blacks with business degrees and the black colleges simply aren't equipped to do it.  
 Johnson, one of the nation's most prominent Negro business educators, is establishing a graduate program at Massachusetts for black corporate employees as potential managers.

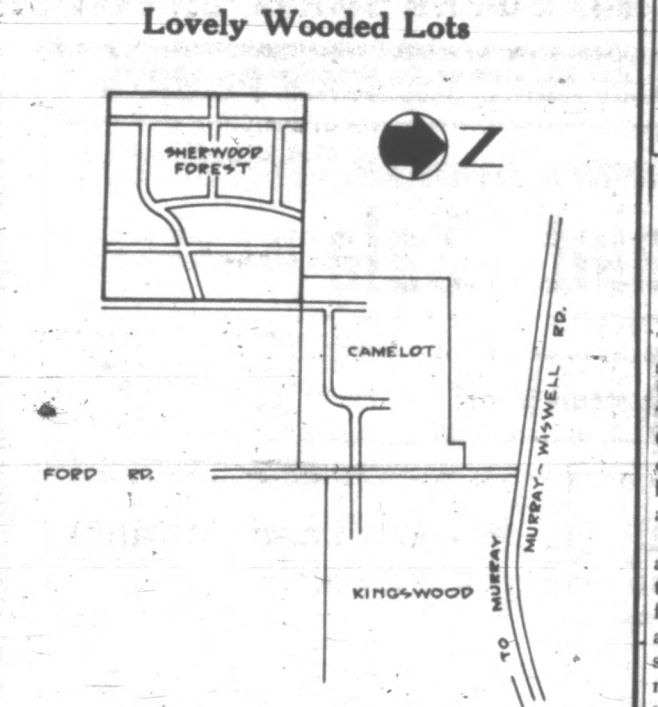
**HEARING SCHEDULED**

### Pacific Isles Favor Loose U.S. Union

AGANA, Guam UPI - The Western Pacific islands of Micronesia will negotiate for "free association" status with loose ties with the United States if a report by the Micronesian Political Status Commission is adopted.

The report listing "free association" as the first choice of the islands composing the U.S. Trust Territory of the Pacific was released last month on Palau Island by a committee of native congressmen on a territory-wide tour.

A Trust Territory official on Saipan said the report will be submitted to the Micronesian congress for approval this summer.

The Micronesian News Service quoted the chairman of the Political Status Commission, Lazarus Sali, as saying the alternative to a "free association" would be independence but that would "bring economic hardship and administrative difficulties."

#### Choose Free State

Sali said, "We chose a free state because the continuation of a colonial kind of status would prove degrading to Micronesians and unworthy of America."

"The basic ownership of these

islands rests with the Micronesians and so does the basic responsibility for governing them," Sali said.

Under the plan, the Micronesians would have self-governing powers but American assistance and presence would continue. The report said the islanders would allow the territory to be used to meet U. S. military requirements.

"As a self-governing state we would be far more prepared than as a trust territory to face the disadvantages of military use of our land," Sali said.

Nieman Craley, commissioner for public affairs of the Trust Territory, said he did not believe the report of the commission had been presented officially to U. S. authorities.

#### Prime Objective

"While this may be their prime objective, they understand that this is not necessarily an immediate objective," Craley said. "It might take 5 or 10 years but they certainly don't want to wait another 20 years."

The Trust Territory has 2,141 islands scattered over 3 million square miles of the Western Pacific. The Caroline, Marshall and Mariana Islands not including Guam, sites of several World War II battles, make up the territory's three major archipelagoes. The total population is about 100,000 on the 98 inhabited islands.

Before the 20th century, Spain and Germany claimed many of the islands. After World War I, Japan held a League of Nations mandate over them. In 1947, the United Nations

assigned them to the United States as a trust. The nuclear testing islands of Bikini and Eniwetok are included in the group.

#### OBTAINS ORDER

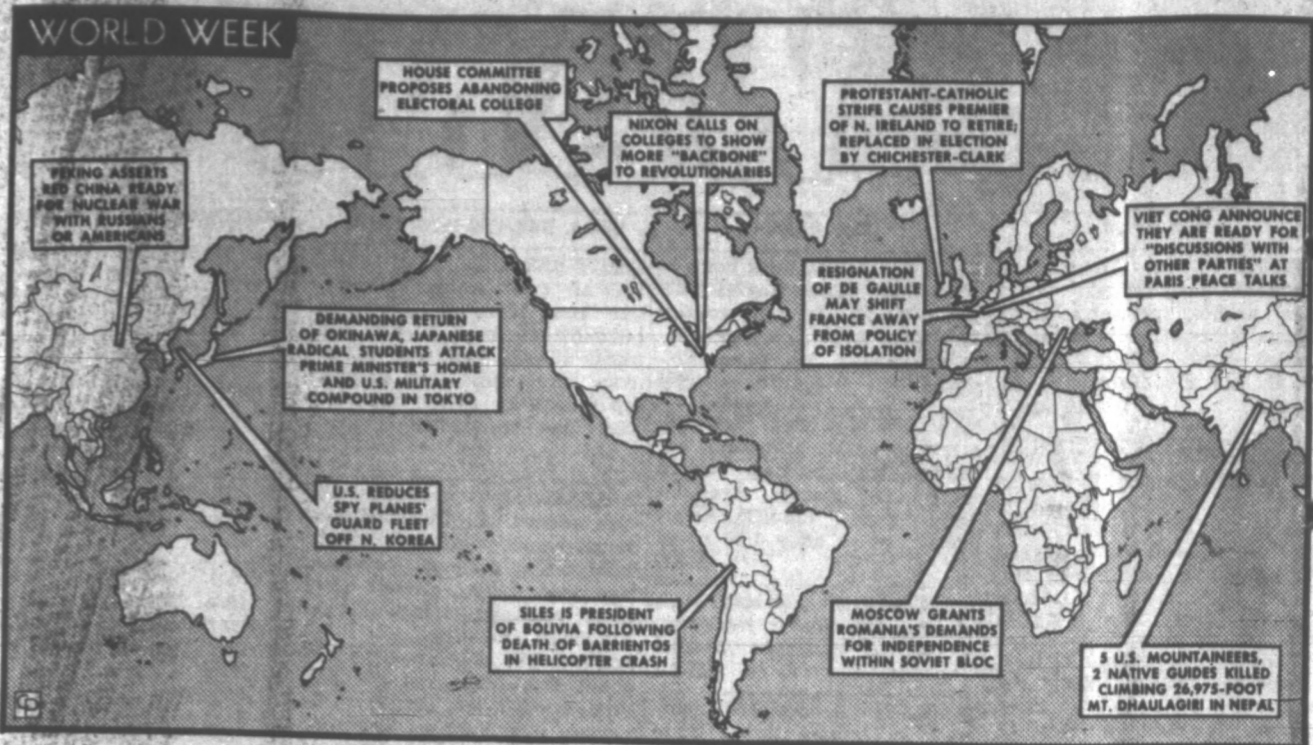
SANTA MONICA, Calif. UPI - Actress Connie Stevens has obtained a court order barring her estranged husband, Eddie Fisher, from removing her personal possessions from their home. Fisher sued Miss Stevens for divorce last month, charging her with "extreme cruelty." A few days later, Miss Stevens filed a cross complaint. She charged "mental cruelty." Superior Court Judge Edward R. Brand Thursday issued a restraining order after Miss Stevens said in an affidavit "I am fearful in my absence that Mr. Fisher, unless restrained by the court, will remove my clothing and possessions from our home."

#### Pelican Performance

FLAMINGO, Fla. (UPI) - The white pelicans of Everglades National Park find that their "schooling" pays off with excellent results. Not content to scoop up one fish, the huge birds congregate to form a line across the Park's bays and creeks. By swimming forward in a band and beating their beaks on the water, the commotion forces schools of fish into pockets where the canny pelicans can take them whole-sale.
