Then too the controversy over what amount the Murray Electric System will pay in-lieu-of-taxes, may well cost the city system about \$15,000 more.

What this amounts to is that the City School System will end up with a net increase in funds of about \$17,000 from the Utility Tax, rather than the approximately \$40,000 which was anticipated. The County System will receive about \$50,000 rather than the anticipated \$60,000.


The invitations haven't gone out as yet so I don't know whether she plans to invite my boyfriend or not, but I am praying she is.




