# SINKING SPRING CHURCH GUTTED BY FIRE

## Early Morning Blaze Destroys Ten-Year Old Church Building

### Sgt. Frank Gibson Gets Orders For Duty In Thailand

Frank Gibson has received orders to report to a United States Air Force Base in Thailand, according to his wife who called the Ledger and Times this morning.

Gibson is a Technical Sergeant in the United States Air Force, having made a career in the Air Force. He expects to end his tour in about two years.

Sgt. Gibson and his wife and family lived in Murray for some time and he was recently transferred to Blytheville Air Force Base in Arkansas. He has been

Two fires, discovered simultaneously within minutes and only a mile apart, destroyed the Sinking Springs Baptist Church and an old house on Highway 94 West of Murray last night.

At 1:03 a.m. this morning the Murray Rescue Squad received a fire call to a house on the Joe Parker farm on the Lynn Grove Highway near the intersection of the Wiswell Road.

Meanwhile the Murray Fire Department received a call that the church west of Wiswell was ablaze and they responded to that call knowing that the County truck was on another call.

The Rescue Squad had sprayed nearly half a tank of water on the house when the church call was received. The county firemen pulled off the house fire and went to the church because the house was unoccupied and the fire was out of control.

The county truck emptied its remaining water into the Murray truck at the Sinking Spring fire and made a dash back to a city fire hydrant. By the time the county truck returned the city fire truck had been out of water several minutes and the fire had broken through the roof. Water from the county fire truck, brush fire truck and water brought to the scene by water hauler Luck Burt was poured on the blaze but the fire was then out of control.

The city truck remained until 2:30 a.m. and the county truck left about an hour later. The big brick building was completely leveled.

The attractive and modern church building was erected in 1959. Terry Sills is pastor of the congregation which numbers approximately 450.

Rev. Sills said this morning that the cause of the fire had not been determined.

### Bob Billington Is Speaker For Consumer Class

"The Cost of Running a Car" was the subject of a talk given by Bob Billington to the Consumer Education Class at Murray High School recently.

Billington told the class about the various kinds of car insurance available to the consumer. He told the class members that liability insurance is required in many states; however, it is not required in Kentucky at the present time. "Liability insurance protects you against damage to other people, their cars, or their property," he said. "Collision insurance protects against damage to your car in a collision, and comprehensive insurance protects against losses from such things as fire, theft and floods," he continued.

The fourth car insurance policy, medical coverage insurance was also presented by Billington.

During the class, members examined a sample insurance policy and reviewed terminology used by insurance companies.

Following Mr. Billington's talk, a question and answer period was held. In closing, he gave some general guides for the consumer to follow when purchasing services available by insurance companies.

The Consumer Education Class is under the direction of Mrs. A. B. Crass.

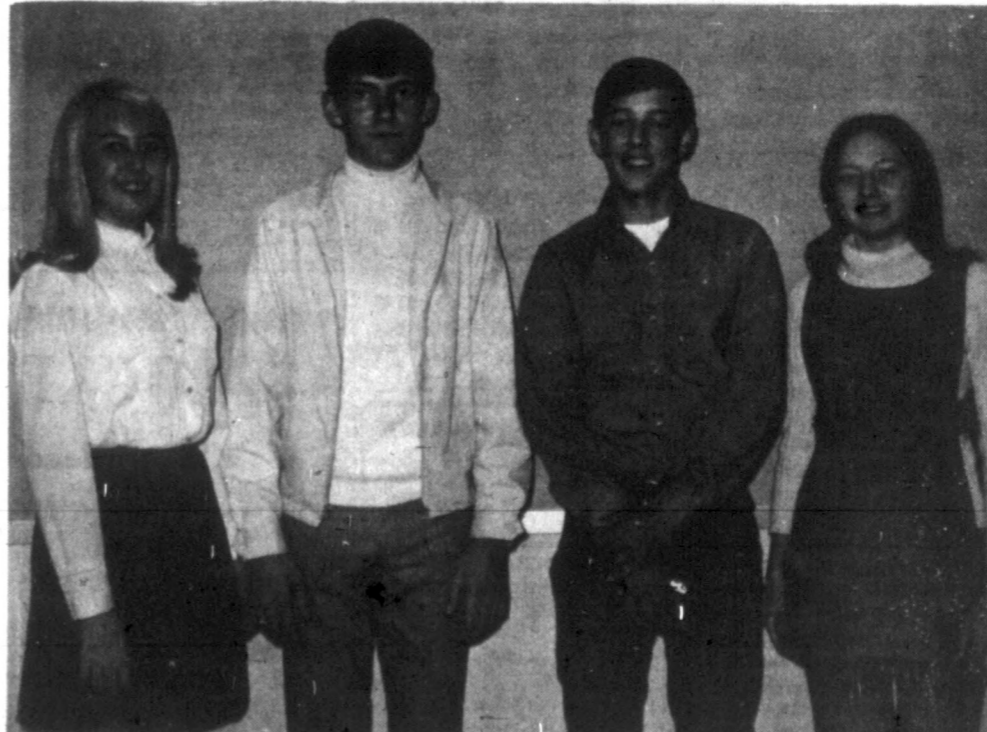

# Wildcats Grab Top Spot In Basketball Poll; Western 19

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Kentucky Wildcats and veteran mentor Adolph Rupp never seem to run out of challenges even though the baron of college basketball ranks as one of the most widely decorated members of the coaching fraternity.

Rupp, beginning his 40th year of collegiate coaching, has two big challenges entering the new season. One is a fifth national championship; the other is a winning season despite the loss of Mike Casey, the team leader of the Wildcats who broke a leg in an automobile accident during the summer and won't return this year.

The Wildcats got a running start toward both goals the past weekend with a pair of

impressive victories which vaulted them past South Carolina and UCLA in the first weekly United Press International major college basketball ratings.

Kentucky, with wins over Kansas and West Virginia, received 17 first-place votes from the 35-member UPI Coaches Rating Board and a total of 316 points to displace pre-season nominee UCLA as the nation's No. 1 ranked team.

UCLA, also 2-0, got 14 first-place votes and 270 points for the No. 2 spot while South Carolina, ranked second in the pre-season ratings, dipped to fourth after suffering a 55-54 setback at the hands of Tennessee.

New Mexico State, picking up three wins in the first week of the new campaign, moved from fifth to third. The Aggies received three first-place votes and a total of 222 points. The remaining first-place votes went to Ohio State. Points are awarded on a 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 basis.

Southern California, using impressive victories over Colorado and Vanderbilt to collect strong voting support, jumped from ninth into a tie for fifth with Duquesne, both with 119 points.

Davidson (2-0) climbed a notch to seventh followed by North Carolina (2-0). Tennessee played only one game but the Vols' stunning upset of South Carolina lifted the Volunteers from the list of the also-rans to the No. 9 ranking.

Villanova and Ohio State shared the No. 10 position with 53 points each.

## Buc Win, O'time

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—The New Orleans Buccaneers were down to their last Jones Monday night, but one was enough to pull a 105-99 overtime victory over the Denver Rockets in the only American Basketball Association contest.

Jimmy Jones, the Bucs' leading scorer, was banished from the game with two technical fouls with one second left in the final half.

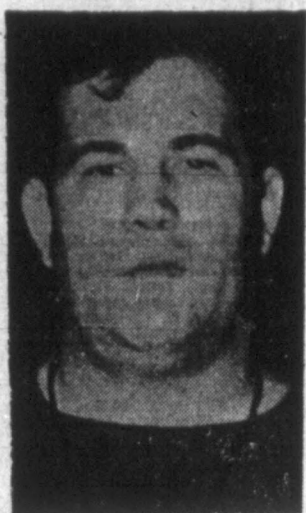
Steve Jones took charge to lead the Bucs to their 11th consecutive home court victory and their fifth straight conquest of Denver.

The remaining Jones had 28 points, including four clutch free throws in the last 21 seconds of the overtime.

Spencer Hayward pace Denver with 29 points.

The victory, viewed by 11,490 fans, was the Bucs' 15th in their last 17 games. It increased their lead in the ABA's Western Division to four games over idle Dallas.

## Elmer Hall To Coach In California

Elmer Hall, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Pat Farley of Murray Route Four has been named as basketball coach at McCloud High School, McCloud, California. He is the husband of the former Peggy Pat Farley. Both Mr. and Mrs. Hall are graduates of Murray State University.

Following is an article concerning Mr. Hall which appeared in a west coast newspaper. McCloud is in northern California near Mt. Shasta.

McCLOUD — Elmer Hall, a mountain man from Kentucky, takes over the McCloud High School basketball reins this season and he has the nucleus of a championship squad.

"We just about have to win," he said, "the school is used to it." The Loggers won the league football championship. Most of the stars of that squad are out for basketball.

Hall, from Murray State College in Kentucky, is in his first head-coaching job (he is 27) and believes he has the necessary ingredients for a title cake—speed, experience. Only the high catalyst is missing.

"We are faster than average," he says, "and have the experience. I'll probably start five of our seven lettermen."

As usual, the Loggers are short. As usual, they'll be like a bunch of bees around the basketball, though.

"It's a tough act to follow," Hall says, "when the football team has won the championship, but maybe we won't put on too bad a show."

## Three Inducted

MIAMI (UPI) — Three football greats are the first members of the newly created Orange Bowl Classic Hall of Fame.

Named Monday were Frank M. Kinard of Mississippi, first All-America to play in the Orange Bowl; Frank Sinkwich of Georgia, first Heisman Trophy winner to play in the classic; and the late Gen. Robert Neyland, famed coach of Tennessee who brought his team to the bowl twice.

"They helped build the prestige of the Orange Bowl Game in its struggling years," explained L. Allen Morris, president of the Orange Bowl Committee.

## Texas Picked First In Final Week Of UPI Football Poll

NEW YORK (UPI)—Texas today begins its reign as champion of college football. The Longhorns, who needed

some last-period heroics to stop stubborn Arkansas, 15-14, Saturday, were named college football's 1969 national champions Monday by the United Press International Board of Coaches.

Texas received 28 first-place votes from the 34 ballots cast. One coach did not participate in the balloting.

"Great, that's wonderful," said Texas Coach Darrell Royal when informed that his team had taken the national championship. "I was sweating it out. I'm happy for myself, the coaching staff, the players and the university."

Penn State, unbeaten in 29 games over a three-year span, finished No. 2 in the balloting, followed by Arkansas, Southern California and Ohio State. Missouri was sixth, with Louisiana State, Michigan, Notre Dame and UCLA rounding out the top 10.

Five coaches from each of the seven geographical areas of the nation comprise the UPI ratings board. Each week they select the top 10 teams in the nation, with points awarded on a 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 basis on votes from first through 10th.

## PRESIDENT WILL RECEIVE GOLD GRID MEDAL

NEW YORK (UPI)—A substitute college football player, who speaks proudly of watching his college games from the bench, will upstage an all-time coach and eight superstars tonight when he receives the Gold Medal from the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame.

President Nixon, a sub during his playing days at Whittier College, Calif., will be awarded the foundation's highest honor during a dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel Archibald MacLeish, Pulitzer-prize winning poet, will get the foundation's National Distinguished American Award.

Former Presidents Eisenhower and Kennedy and former supreme commander of Allied forces in the Southwest Pacific during World War II, Douglas MacArthur, were previous recipients of the Gold Medal Award.

While President Nixon has few memories of personal glory on the college gridiron, he will be moving in fast football company as the foundation inducts a great coach and eight former stars into its Hall of Fame.

Charles "Bud" Wilkinson, who compiled a 139-27-4 record during 17 years as coach of the University of Oklahoma and later served President Kennedy as head of the physical fitness program, will be inducted into the coaching Hall of Fame. Wilkinson is currently serving as a special assistant to President Nixon.

The players being inducted into the Hall of Fame are Chuck Bednarik, University of Pennsylvania center, 1945-48; George Cafego, University of Tennessee tailback, 1938-39; Edwin "Babe" Horrell, University of California center, 1922-24; Les Horvath, Ohio State back, 1940-44; Larry Kelley, Yale end, 1934-36; the late William "Wild Bill" Kelly, University of Montana quarterback, 1924-26; John Kitzmiller, University of Oregon halfback, 1927-29; and Gerald Mann, Southern Methodist quarterback, 1925-27.

Also to be honored are scholar-athletes Ted Shadd of the U.S. Military Academy, Dan Pike of the Naval Academy, Charles Longnecker of the Air Force Academy, Terry Stewart of Arkansas; Randy Reeves of Nebraska; John Cramer of Harvard; Harry Khasigian of Southern California; George Joseph of Pennsylvania; Tim Callaway of Georgia; Harry Gosso of Indiana and Michael Oriard of Notre Dame.

## Racers Defeat Seton Hall

Five Ohio Valley Conference teams rocked non-conference foes Monday night with three of the wins coming on the road.

East Tennessee downed Richmond 63-57, Murray defeated Seton Hall 90-81 and Middle Tennessee stopped Belmont 89-71 in the road action. Western Kentucky toppled California Riverside 92-79 and Austin Peay bombed Lambuth College 124-67 in home contests.

Forward Mike Kretzer scored the last eight points as East Tennessee rallied from behind to beat Richmond. Kretzer hit a 20-footer from the corner to tie the game 57-57 with three minutes left and then connected from the same spot 50 seconds later to put the Bucs ahead.

Kretzer hit four free throws during the last 17 seconds to ice the contest and boost East Tennessee's record to 2-2.

Western Kentucky's 7-0 junior center Jim McDaniels dumped in 32 points and pulled down 15 rebounds as the Hilltoppers downed California Riverside. Forward Wayne Bright added 19 points for Western Kentucky which now is 3-0 for the year.

Center Howard Lee led Riverside (0-4) with 24.

Sophomore guard Jim Drew pumped in 24 points to lead Middle Tennessee over Belmont. The Blue Raiders, playing without two starters, also got 18 points from forward Ken Riley as they boosted their record to 2-1.

Austin Peay set a new scoring mark with the 124 points against Lambuth, breaking the old mark of 118 set last week against the University of Tennessee at Martin.

Center Terry Young led the balanced scoring attack with 20 points as six Gavs finished in double figures. Austin Peay now is 3-1 for the year.

Lambuth, 1-2, was led by Gary Kerby with 16 and Jim Dillard with 14.

There are no OVC teams in action tonight with Eastern Kentucky playing at LaSalle Wednesday night. The first conference action comes Thursday night when Austin Peay travels to Murray. In a non-conference game Thursday night, Butler is at Western Kentucky.

## MSU Rifle Team Wins Invitational

MANHATTAN, Kan.—Murray State University marksmen carried out a clean sweep of first place in all three divisions at the Kansas State Invitational Rifle Tournament last weekend.

The Murray varsity, ROTC, and women's teams all finished first in competition with 63 squads from throughout the nation in the Kansas meet, the largest rifle tournament in the nation.

Two-time All-American marksman Ernest Vande Zande led the varsity team with 573 points of a possible 600. His effort was the high score for the tournament in which 256 participated.

Bill Schweitzer, another MSU rifleman, finished second high for the tournament, one point behind Vande Zande at 572.

The MSU varsity compiled 2,262 points of a possible 2,400. East Tennessee State University finished second in the meet with 2,242 points.

The Racer ROTC team finished with 2,193 points to top their division and the women placed first in their category with 2,193 points.

The Murray State University rifle team has been among the top in the nation for the past

several years. Last year the Kentuckians finished second in the nation and two years ago they were first.

NEW YORK (UPI)—George Forgie, Ted Miller and Ron McPherson of the New Jersey Devils were each fined \$50 Sunday by the Eastern Hockey League for misconduct during weekend games. McPherson also drew a three-game suspension for stick fighting with Doug Ferguson of the Syracuse Blades.

**Leon Smith Is New Director Of Local PAEDD**

The Purchase Area Economic Development District which has recently been organized in Western Kentucky is the local instrument of the United States Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration.

The recently organized Purchase Area District is composed of the eight Kentucky counties west of the Tennessee River and Kentucky Lake. The eight counties are: Ballard, Calloway, Carlisle, Fulton, Graves, Hickman, Marshall and McCracken. Leon T. Smith, 61, is a native of the Heath Community in McCracken County. He graduated from Heath High School in 1926 and attended Murray State University where he was graduated in 1931 with a B. S. Degree and a major in social studies and a minor in chemistry.

For the past 12 years Smith has been employed as superintendent of McCracken County Schools.

He is a member of the Tabernacle Baptist Church, where he has served as a deacon, deacon chairman and teacher of the Adult Young Men's Bible Class for twenty-five years.



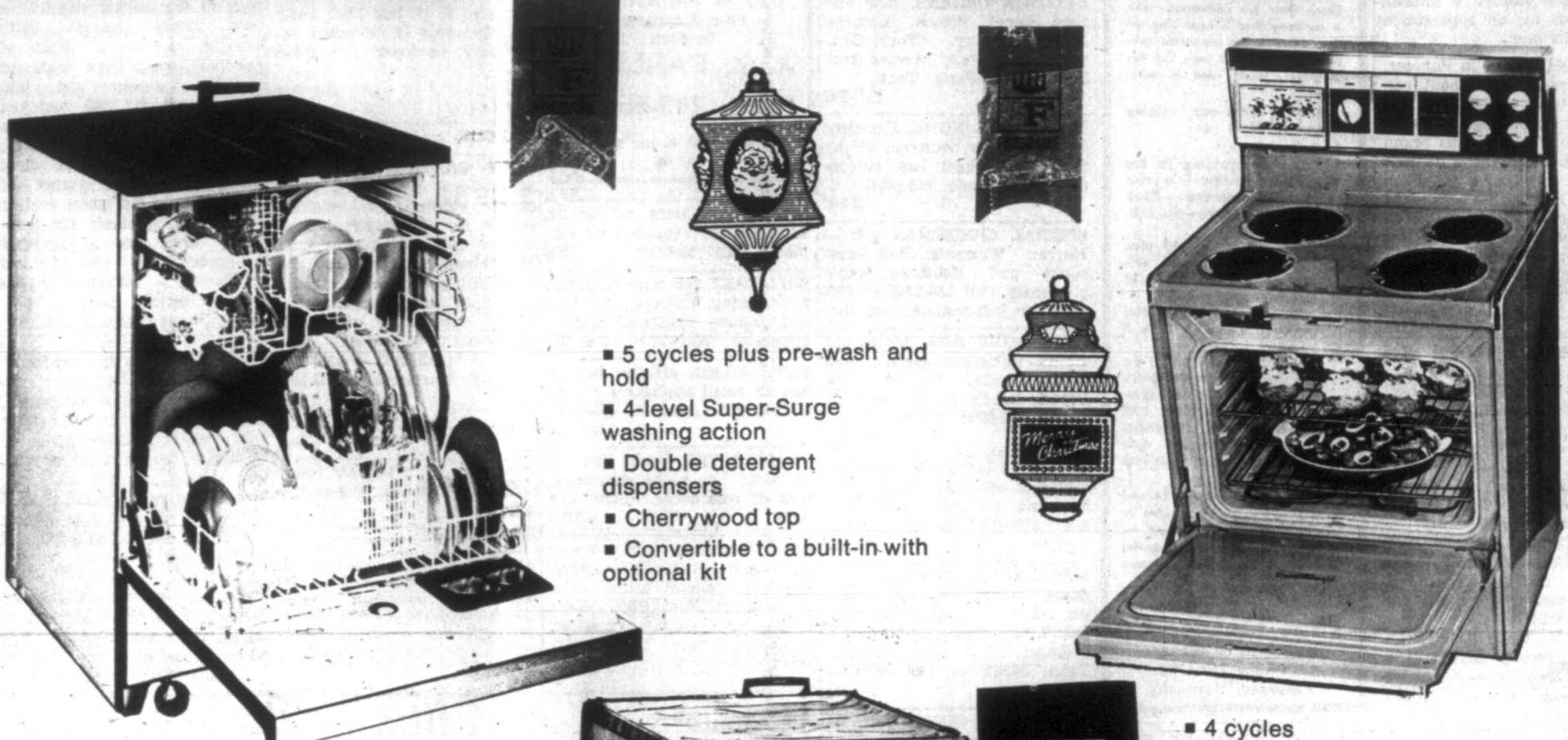

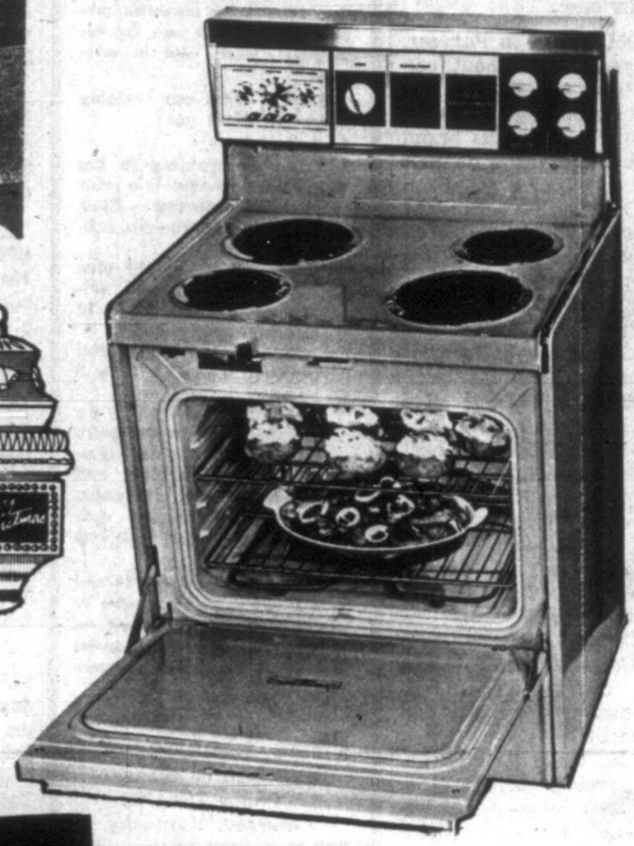

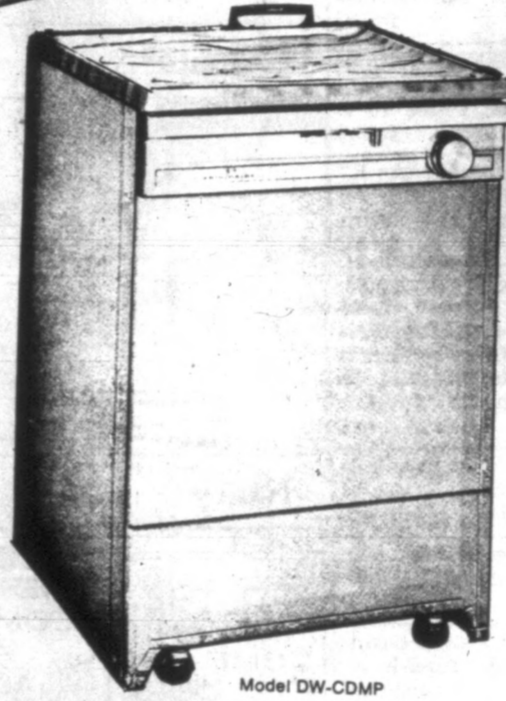
