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



Our mission blossoms when we provide free care to those who cannot afford to pay, when our employees volunteer in the community, when we honor area students with scholarships, and when we operate programs at a loss because it's the right thing to do.

From our hospitals in St. Cloud, Long Prairie and Melrose, to our long-term care services in those towns and Monticello, to our clinics and specialty services throughout the region, we strive to meet all of the community's health care needs, all of the time.

Through Project H.E.A.L. (Health Education Access Link), St. Cloud Hospital and several community partners offer free health screenings on the first, second and fourth Wednesdays of the month at Catholic Charities in St. Cloud. Project H.E.A.L. performs screenings and basic care at three other sites in the community. More than 400 people have been served since the project began in September 2001. A federal Community Access Program grant supports the program; most supplies and medications are donated. Volunteers from local congregations staff the clinics. The CentraCare Health Foundation accepts donations for these efforts as well.

In fiscal year 2002, CentraCare Health System spent \$61 million to upgrade equipment and facilities. This is part of a five-year, \$260-million capital improvements plan that is designed to ensure outstanding health care facilities for Central Minnesota's growing population.

We're building to meet your needs, reinvesting revenue back into health care.

From the premature newborn, the feverish infant and the accident-prone preschooler, to the 5-year-old battling leukemia and the teen who got in with the wrong crowd, CentraCare Health System offers people and services who can help.

St. Cloud Hospital's neonatal intensive care team specializes in nurturing preemies. Our pediatricians routinely care for youngsters with colds and flu, nasty bumps, bruises and breaks. Our cancer team works closely with Children's Hospitals and Clinics to administer chemotherapy to youngsters in St. Cloud. Our adolescent behavioral health programs have helped hundreds conquer their demons and addictions.

CentraCare, often in cooperation with other health care providers, offers an extensive array of children's specialty services: allergy; cleft and craniofacial; cancer; heart, blood and lungs; digestive disease; nutrition; and long-term follow-up for premature babies.

Your children and grandchildren are precious to you — and to us.

Five-year-old Jonathan Lindsey was diagnosed with leukemia in February. He will receive chemotherapy for three years at the St. Cloud Hospital Pediatric Cancer Unit at the CentraCare Health Plaza. Previously, his family drove to the Twin Cities two times a week for care. Less travel for Jonathan means more time for riding his bike, playing with dinosaurs and being a big brother. Jonathan stands in front of the "Shining Futures" wall at the Health Plaza, where an array of photos celebrates children who beat cancer. Jonathan hopes to someday have his picture on the wall. Gifts from donors help make these services possible.

Going home.

That's your goal when you go to the doctor or enter the hospital. And it's our goal for you.

If you need continued care after your specialty procedure in St. Cloud, you can get it close to home, thanks to CentraCare's regional network of services.

If a dairy farmer from Eagle Bend undergoes cardiac bypass surgery at the Central Minnesota Heart Center at St. Cloud Hospital, his local doctor and one of our cardiologists will monitor him back home.

If an elementary school student from Holdingford gets chemotherapy treatments at the CentraCare Health Plaza in St. Cloud, her primary care will be provided by her family doctor just down the road at CentraCare Clinic -Melrose.

When you need specialty care whether it's a hip replacement, kidney dialysis or diabetes monitoring — CentraCare Health System will work to ensure that you get the care you need, close to home.



When Joshua Reyes, age 12, woke up one morning with a headache and high fever, his mother, Sonya, took him to the Melrose Area Hospital emergency room.

After performing a spinal tap and starting IV fluids and antibiotics, Kurt Schwieters, M.D., diagnosed Joshua with bacterial meningitis and had him transferred to St. Cloud Hospital's Intensive Care Unit.

Five days later, Joshua was back at home in Melrose and continued his care with Dr. Schwieters at CentraCare Clinic - Melrose.

"He was back to normal within a week," Sonya said. "I couldn't have been more pleased with his care."



n October 1999, a drinking and driving accident left R. Josh Holly, now 24, paralyzed from the chest down. His chance of walking again: less than 5 percent. But through determination and therapy, Josh not only walks but also is completely independent and working toward full recovery. Here, Josh works with Ruth Wolf-Eggebrecht, occupational therapist at St. Cloud Hospital's Adult Rehabilitation Center at CentraCare Health Plaza, to increase his strength.

Education. Understanding. Screening and prevention. Support. A continuum of care.

Our educational programs range from childbirth preparation classes to menopause seminars. Our support groups include an eating disorders support network and a group for the families of Alzheimer's patients.

We address the unique needs of high-profile people who must continue their personal and professional activities while conquering chemical dependency.


And at St. Benedict's Senior Community, we support the elderly as well as those who need long-term care for other reasons.

Ella Kemper took good care of her family. But when it came time for her children to take care of her, she said, "Absolutely not!" Ella had told her daughter Laura, "If I can't ever take care of myself, I want to go to St. Ben's." So in 1999 when the family home in Richmond became too much for Ella to take care of, she moved to Benet Place, the income-based independent living apartments at St. Benedict's Senior Community (SBSC) in St. Cloud.

She soon was playing 500 with new friends and enjoying her space. After three comfortable years, Ella experienced a setback that brought her to St. Cloud Hospital and then to the subacute wing at SBSC before she eventually returned to her apartment. Ella now needs a little more help, so she lives in the Care Center. At 94, she walks every day, does puzzles, reads the St. Cloud Times and plays Bingo. "At my age," she said, "I couldn't have a better place — it's right next to heaven here."



Jan Weidenbach considers her physician to be a very important part of her family's life. The Little Falls woman's doctor is Paul Van Gorp, M.D., who practices at CentraCare Clinic -Long Prairie. Their relationship grew along with the size of Jan's family, which led to frequent visits and a unique friendship. Dr. Van Gorp delivered nine of the 11 Weidenbach children and continues to care for the entire family.



Those numbers have become cliché, but they accurately describe the Level II Emergency Trauma Center at St. Cloud Hospital.

Twenty-four hours a day.

Seven days a week.

Three-hundred-sixty-five days a year.

If you awake at 2:39 a.m., sweating, gasping and clutching your chest, we're ready for you.

If your car spins out and crashes on an ice-covered road, we're ready.

If your toddler's ear is aching, nose is running and fever is raging, we're ready.

Sixteen emergency physicians. 12 trauma surgeons, 40 trauma nurses. L.P.N.s. Paramedics. Emergency medical technicians. Life Link III helicopter. Newly expanded facilities.

Patients served from July 1, 2001 to June 30, 2002: 46,125.

We can take whatever you dish out -24/7.





The Emergency Trauma Center team at St. Cloud Hospital responds quickly when a patient arrives at the hospital complaining of chest pain.

Whose fault is it? Doctors? Pharmaceutical companies? Health care executives?

If only there were a simple answer.

Charitable gifts are essential as we continue to emerge as a top-rated medical center and to help our communities make healthy decisions. For example, without the January 2002 gift of \$1.5 million from the Coborn family, CentraCare Health System could not have purchased equipment that increases the accuracy of radiation therapy for cancer patients, dramatically reduces the amount of time patients must spend in treatment planning and increases their comfort.

The Coborn gift kicked off our \$10 million capital campaign - Investing in Health ... Ensuring Excellence. The campaign is raising money for the Coborn Cancer Center at CentraCare Health Plaza, child and adolescent behavioral health services, and the Alzheimer's unit at St. Benedict's Senior Community.

Every gift is essential to the success of our campaign. In addition to the capital needs identified in each area, there are many programs and services that are provided via sustaining contributions from generous donors such as Bob and Mary Jane Jennings. In order to maximize their gift for the Coborn Cancer Center, the Jennings have chosen to have the CentraCare Health Foundation deduct a monthly donation from their credit card to provide ongoing support for this cause.

This year's winner, Wings of Mercy, Minnesota, supplies free air transportation to people with limited financial means who need specialized medical services. Volunteer pilots fly these patients from their small communities to cities with specialized medical facilities.

David Van Nostrand, M.D., started the Minnesota chapter of Wings of Mercy after learning of the program while performing outreach surgery in Jamaica with a group from Michigan.

Wings of Mercy volunteers believe that by helping people become self-sufficient today, the less help those people will need tomorrow.

As the 2002 Spirit of Caring winner, Wings of Mercy receives a framed, limited edition print specially created by Sister Ruth Nierengarten, O.S.B., and \$2,000 in support of its efforts.



"This gift," Paul said, "allows us to show our appreciation for all we have received from the medical community and the Sisters of St. Benedict through the years."


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
