*A Place to Stay* is a touching book about a mother using her imagination to help her daughter adjust to the shelter that they will be staying in. At first, the daughter is apprehensive and afraid - the shelter does not look very much like a house - but after a bit of make-believe and meeting a new friend there, she begins to feel much better about her new place to stay. This book provides a crucial talking point between parents and their children. It opens up space for conversations about homelessness, abuse, and the different situations that children and their families may be coming from. *A Place to Stay* may also provide comfort to children who are currently staying in a shelter because they realize that they are not alone. Additionally, Meza's illustrations show a combination of joy, grief, and imagination, acknowledging the myriad of feelings that children and adults may have when staying at a shelter.
