

CAREER INFORMATION RESOURCES AND SERVICES AT MYSORE UNIVERSITY LIBRARY: AN OVERVIEW

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1. Introduction:

Career information is the foundation for the provision of career guidance services. It includes all the information that assists people to make informed education, training and occupational choices throughout their working lives. A Career Resources Center collects, organizes and provides access to as much information on general career guidance as possible and as much information as possible on specific careers. A Career Information Centre itself can range from a minimal collection of career - related resources housed in one section of a single room to a multi - purpose facility housing a large collection of resources in all three formats.

Libraries can be an invaluable source of information. Since most areas have libraries, they can be a convenient place to look for information. Also, for those who do not otherwise have access to the Internet or e-mail, many libraries provide this access. Libraries may have information on job openings, locally and nationally; potential contacts within occupations or industries; colleges and financial aid; vocational training; individual businesses or careers; and writing résumés. Libraries frequently have subscriptions to various trade magazines that can provide information on occupations and industries. These sources often have references to organizations which can provide additional information about training and employment opportunities. Career information and guidance services have traditionally been seen as a public service available from educational institutions, government departments and their agencies. Increasingly, in countries competing in the global economy, common notions about career information and career development are emerging:

- It is an individual responsibility – services should help people help themselves manage their career development. This is career self-management;
- It is an ongoing (lifelong) learning process – it is everybody's business and not just something undertaken at a time of crisis;
- It requires worker and learner flexibility and adaptability – changes in the nature of work and employment require that most individuals be prepared to successfully manage several work and learning transitions; and,
- It requires different kinds of tools and services at different points across the life span.

In most countries, there are gaps and overlaps in the career information and guidance services. Availability is uneven. Few countries, it seems, have coherent policies, systems

and delivery structures for career information and guidance that support transitions across the span of life, learning and work. Though career guidance is a century old concept recently it becomes an important issue world wide in view of the changes in the economy brought about by globalization, privatization and emergence of ICT. Information is at the core of career guidance and education; indeed, it tends to prevail over other guidance function.

2. Role of University Libraries in Career Information Guidance:

Libraries can play a much important role in imparting career guidance. In formal education, library is described as 'heart of education'. The library system in higher education is committed to provide independent learning environment to student. From the book houses the libraries have gone to an individual residence to share the shelves of knowledge. Therefore, it can be inferred that the success of career guidance in educational institutions depends upon the efficient library system. Therefore the system of education has to take care of strengthening the library system and thus disseminate career information.

Librarians with their abilities in knowledge organization and dissemination skills can play a profound and enduring role in encouraging and assisting young people to follow their hearts and to pursue their dreams. In developing countries like India college librarians can play a major role in the career development of the youth who comes to the library for guidance and support in their study and to prepare for their future career opportunities.

2.1 Career Guidance Service at Mysore University Library:

Career services, like many other aspects of higher education, are becoming increasingly global and virtual in nature. Although career centers proudly report the number of employers who participate in on-campus interviews and live career fairs, career professionals must be able to serve students, employers, and often alumni who are not able to physically visit campus. The development of more sophisticated career services technology helps to facilitate this global reach. Noting that most career services offices are housed in the division of student affairs, where the focus on student development is paramount, career services professionals must be mindful to balance the need for "high tech" with "high touch"—virtual services with one-to-one connections. As students increasingly use texting to communicate with friends, family, academic professionals, and employers, career centers must not lose sight of the challenge to help students develop communication and interpersonal skills that will be needed while on the job. Career center staff must weigh the advantages of providing virtual services against the need to help students develop critical social skills.

2.2 Career Information Resources Centre (CIRC):

An exclusive CIRC has been set at Mysore University Library, which is attracting a good number of students aspiring careers in various lines.

3. Objectives of CIRC:

1. To identify various types of competitive examinations being conducted various governmental and non-governmental agencies.

2. To identify and acquire useful career related resources both in print and electronic helping the patrons to prepare for their examinations both written and personal interview.
3. To collect sample and previous year question papers of various examinations both print and electronic.
4. To subscribe to career related magazines both in English and Local language.
5. To scan and display job announcements in news papers and Internet on the notice board of CIRC.
6. To organise both books and journals in helpful sequence depending upon type of examination.
7. To set up Career Information Resource Portal giving access to various useful career related information including employing agencies, job announcement resources, guidance in preparing CV, Interview, etc.
8. To organise Lectures, Seminars, Panel Discussions useful for career seeking students.
9. To counsel the students on the matter concerned to career development.

5. Mysore University Library Career Information Service Portal:

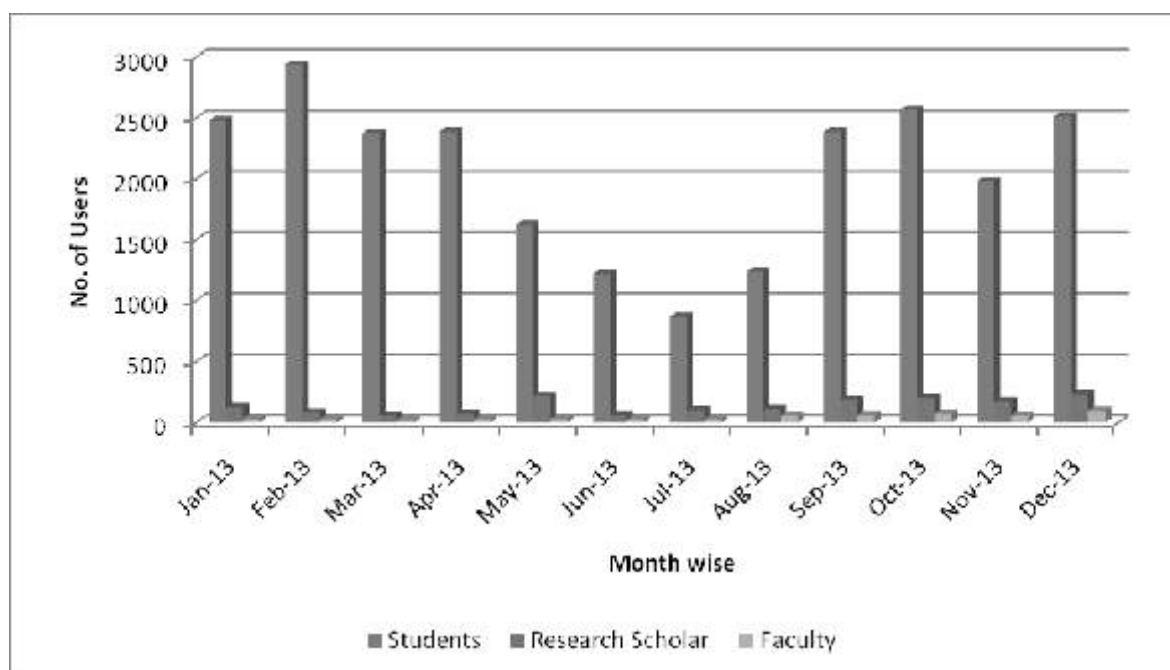
Career Information Resource Centre (CIRC) and the Career Information Service Portal was

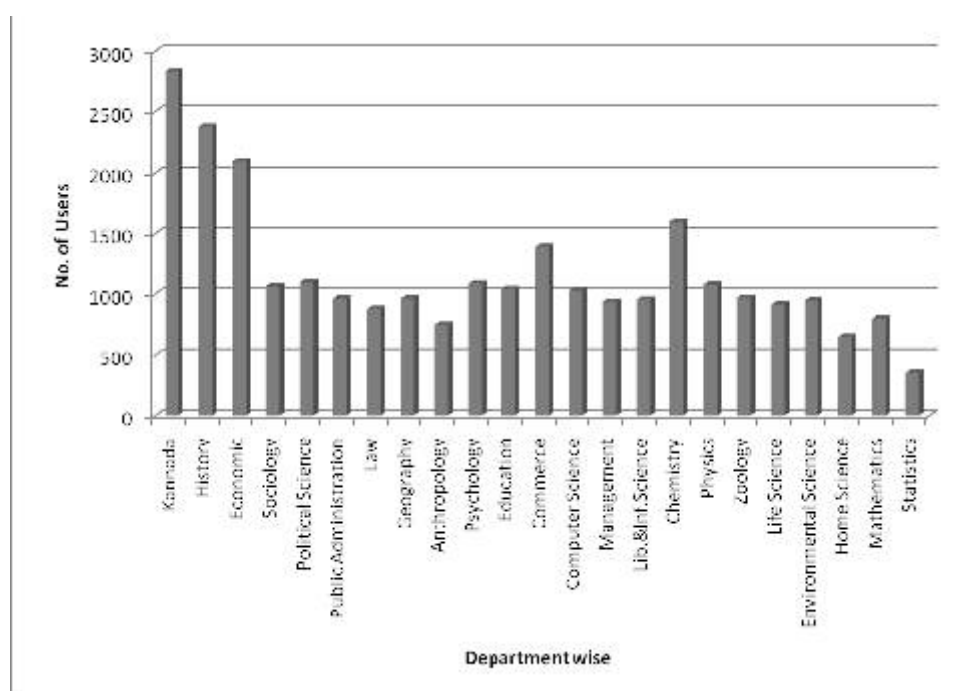


The above table depicts the number of users of CIRC of the Mysore University Library. It is evident from the table that 26752 users have availed the CIRC facility during the past one year. Among the category of users, Post-Graduate students visited and availed the facility. A small segment of teachers and research Scholars have also availed the facility. Therefore, it can be inferred that a large segment of users constitutes the Post-graduate students.

Among the users, faculty members account for less than 5%. The attendance is comparatively low during examination period and vacation. Above all it can be concluded that students at large is benefited by the CIRC of University of Mysore.

The table shows the department wise number of users who have availed CIRC facility during the past one year. From the data depicted in the table, it is evident that 10.6% of the students is from Kannada Department being the largest among the student of all the P.G. Departments. Next in the ranking list occupy the following P.G. Departments: History (8.88%), Economic (7.83%) Chemistry (5.97%), Commerce (5.20%) , Psychology (4.97%) and. Physics (4.03%). Among all the departments, the students of statistics department (1.30%) and Home Science (2.42%) and the least dependents.

Based on the needs and recommendation of the use of CIRC, The library Committee has advised to up-date the information sources on continuous notice.

6. Conclusion:

A number of recruiting agencies conduct competitive examinations, both written test and personal interview. There is need to set up exclusive Career Information Resource Centers both in public libraries and academic institutions, especially the University libraries in the country. The Mysore University Library has set up an exclusive Career Information Service Portal. Apart from counseling the aspiring students, all related material is made available, including the announcements of jobs and related news items. It is welcoming to note that the CIRC has become the hub of many academic activities always filled with students. A good number of students have successfully completed different competitive examinations, including UPSC. The library Career Resource Centre and its programmes has been supported by the activities of University Employment Bureau.

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
