
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Why Go to College Now?

THE PERENNIAL question, "What shall I do when I graduate from high school next June?" is more confusing in this year, 1942, than it ever was before. This is so because new factors have come to bear on the decision. Many of you will be tempted to take the short view, and yield to the call of industry and business, attracted by prospects of high wages and quick earnings. Many of you young men will be lured toward premature enlistments by the promise of adventure, or a fatalistic acceptance of the inevitability of the draft.

Even here, however, the college man has the advantage. The aviation corps requires that enlistees have two years of college work. The navy asks that deck officers be trained in higher mathematics. A college degree is almost a prerequisite for a commission in the army.

Yet wars can't last forever, and with their end comes demobilization, both military and industrial. Discharged, you will find yourselves untrained people in a specialized world, facing the inevitable problem of unemployment.

Service to one's country, moreover, is not merely a matter of armies or defense industries. It is a matter of training and preparation for living. Here, the longer view will, perhaps too late, teach you that education is something none can take from you,

and make you conscious of its real implications. For it is not the facts or the materials of education that stay with you. It is the training in thinking and in ways of the mind — the mental discipline — which leaves its mark forever on you, and leaves you always one fit to cope with changing situations.

Today, in a changing world, America and humanity needs such minds. Tomorrow they will need them more.

That is the best answer to the question, "Why go to college now?"

Social Program

WHETHER you are an habitual wall flower or rug cuttin' jitterbug you won't have any trouble fitting in the social program sponsored by the Associated Students. One hour each Tuesday night and two-and-one-half hours each Saturday night an informal dance and recreation hour is held with dance music provided by the recreation hour orchestra. No dates are necessary, but it's an even bet you won't leave the floor alone. The Associated Women Students sponsor weekly teas, parties and other activities, to which all women are invited. Classes, off-campus clubs, dormitories and service groups also are active in the social life of the College.

Costs

THE MOST for as little as possible is the policy of the College when it comes to student expenditures. A registration fee of \$13.50 per quarter pays for all activities, health and hospitalization and the lyceum program. Certain courses in industrial education, music, science, art and geography require slight extra fees. Books and supplies average \$7.00 per quarter.

Living expense at the halls is \$6.50 per week for board and room and recreational facilities. Those who can stand their own cooking live for as little as \$17.00 per month.


It is possible to attend Eastern Washington college for as little as \$150 cash outlay per year by commuting, or for \$300 in residence.

Intercollegiate Athletics

E ASTERN Washington college is one of the oldest and strongest members of the Washington Intercollegiate conference (WINKO), sometimes called the hottest small college conference in the nation. In addition to football, basketball and track, tennis and golf are also part of the sport program. Minor sports include swimming, junior varsity basketball, and fencing. Besides the regular conference games, contests are scheduled with Washington State college, Gonzaga university, University of Idaho, University of Montana, University of Washington and other widely recognized institutions. THE EXTENSIVE physical education program at Eastern Washington college gives those men and women who do not compete on varsity teams a chance to participate in the sport he or she likes best. For the men, regular leagues are formed in touch-football, basketball, swimming, wrestling, boxing, fencing and badminton; and competition is just as fast in these class leagues as in the varsity program. Physical education classes give you competent coaching and developing under the watchful eyes of regular instructors.

Christmas Production




Handel's "The Messiah" was presented this year as the official Christmas program of the college. George F. Barr directed, Spokane and Eastern Washington college musicians took part.

The Campus

B ELIEVING that the best work will be done by a student if his physical surroundings are pleasant and progressive, administrators of this College, through the years since it was founded in the early 1890's, have added beauty as well as practicality to the campus. Stretching out over forty acres of grass, sidewalks and modern buildings, the campus is still compact enough so that you don't have to be a ten second man on the track team to get from one class to another on time. A new athletic field, in addition to the regular football stadium and track, was added this year. A baseball game and two softball games can be played at the same time on this recent addition to the campus. Both men and women have physical education and intramural classes on the new athletic field. Center of all activity is Showalter hall which houses the administrative offices and most of the classroom work. Classes are also held in the industrial education building, Hargreaves library and Martin hall where students get practical teacher training in a public school conducted by the College. The main gymnasium features a topnotch basketball floor and areas for playing badminton and other games. Physical education classes are held here and in the old gymnasium and swimming pool in Showalter hall.

Student Employment

NO MATTER whether you have special training for business or just a brawny back, there is a job for you at Eastern Washington college if you need it to help out in completing your education. Work is found for students at everything from responsible secretarial positions to mowing lawns about the campus. Some students earn part of their expenses by working on the N.Y.A., while others work on the campus as extras or at regular college jobs. Many private homes take in students who work for board and room. Business establishments have jobs for college students.

Curricula

A LTHOUGH we have tried to present the life of this College from an informal point of view, we must not forget that there are certain courses of study which must be followed. Eastern Washington college is primarily a teacher training institution of high national ranking and grants the Bachelor of Arts in Education degree upon completion of the four year course. This qualifies you to teach in the state's elementary and junior high schools.

If you are not preparing to teach, Eastern Washington offers a wide variety of courses in which you may specialize and after a year or two transfer to either the State College or State University without loss of credits. Many students do this if they lack immediate funds to attend the larger schools.

Whether you plan to become a doctor, lawyer, farmer, druggist, veterinarian, business man, architect or engineer you can here obtain the basic courses that you will need later on.

Under the quarter system, used by Eastern Washington college, it is possible, by attending summer sessions, to complete the regular four year course in three calendar years.

Teaching Placement

O PPORTUNITIES for both men and women to obtain teaching positions in this state upon graduation from Eastern Washington college are exceptionally good. Last year more than ninety-six per cent of those who received their Bachelor's degrees from this College were placed in permanent teaching positions. The remaining few either didn't care to teach, were married, or went on to another college for graduate work.

The College maintains its own teacher placement office in the Bureau of Public Relations, L. W. Lee, director. Through this office, at no extra cost to the student, a teaching position is secured for you at the time of your graduation.
