U.S. Senator John McCain dies at 81

Former Senator from Arizona and 2008 Republican presidential nominee John McCain died Saturday evening after roughly a year-long battle with brain cancer. He was 81 and only four days shy of his 82nd birthday.

In a statement from his office, it was announced McCain passed away at 4:28 p.m. local time at his home in Cornville, Arizona, one day after it was announced that he would discontinue treatment for cancer.

McCain began his service to the country following his graduation from the United States Naval Academy, where he was commissioned as an ensign in the Navy. His first combat assignment was to an aircraft carrier where he flew A-4 Skyhawks over North Vietnam during Operation Rolling Thunder, which was an eight-week air campaign designed to impair Vietnam.

While flying his 23rd bombing mission, his aircraft was shot down over Hanoi, Vietnam. After the impact fractured his arms and legs, the North Vietnamese pulled him to shore, bayoneting him and beating his shoulder with a rifle. For the next five and a half years, he would remain a prisoner of war, enduring torturous conditions and receiving minimal care for his injuries. Following McCain's release from imprisonment, he ended his military service a decorated war hero, receiving two Purple Hearts, the Distinguished Flying Cross, two Legions of Merits, two Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medals, and a Prisoner of War Medal.

McCain began his political career upon exiting the United States Navy. He was elected to serve as a Representative to Arizona's 1st Congressional district, where he showed strong support for then-President Reagan's economic and foreign policies.

Four years later, McCain was elected to the United States Senate, where he would serve until his passing on Saturday. Though most of Congress, former Presidents, and celebrities

his policies and views were conservative, he was viewed in Washington as a 'maverick', or an independent thinker, not afraid to deviate from mainstream conservative thought to vote his conscience. During his term, he fought for campaign finance reform, an end to pork barrel spending, veterans' benefits, and a pathway to citizenship for certain undocumented immi-

Despite running an unsuccessful presidential campaign in 2000, he launched his campaign for the Republican nomination for President in 2008, where he went on to become the nominee. His candidacy faced an uphill battle as much of the electorate aligned McCain with the unpopular, presidency of George Bush. He went on to lose to then-Senator Barack Obama, only achieving 173 electoral votes.

Following news of his death, members of

rallied around to pay tribute to Senator McCain.

"He showed us who we are and who we can be when we are at our best," said Senator Jeff Flake of Arizona, "And he devoted his life to service and to the exalted idea of America that was bigger and better than him. Bigger than us all."

Former President Barack Obama, and his opponent in 2008, took to Twitter to say, "Few of us have been tested the way John once was, or required to show the kind of courage that he did. But all of us can aspire to the courage to put the greater good above our own. At John's best, he showed us what that means."

In a raucous political environment, McCain stood out as someone who practiced civility, even when it might have been inconvenient for him. So today, we honor the sacrifice given by McCain and thank him for his decades of service.

A case for transmedia narratives: a defense of Blizzard

A transmedia narrative, also called transmedia storytelling, is when a story is told through multiple forms of media. As an example say there is a movie and as a sequel it gets a tv show, some audio dramas, or even books; all telling a continuous and connected story. It is basically a device that allows for a more varied form of storytelling, by using different media one is able to use the strengths of each medium to help how effectively a story is told. This kind of storytelling has become widely used in the video game industry, and its starting to be seen as a problem. Recently, a good bit of backlash has been thrown at Blizzard Entertainment for their use of transmedia storytelling in World of Warcraft and Overwatch, and honestly I don't think it has been a bad direction to go in.

The main complaint I keep seeing is simply that developers should put all of the story they want to tell into their games. I should be clear on this, that isn't in anyway unreasonable, yet here I am to argue against it. Allow me to explain. In the past transmedia storytelling has been used when companies have no intention on telling a part of a story in their game. In games like Halo or Gears of War this is primarily backstory that can be alluded to or referenced but could, for good narrative reasons, never be fully explained. Nobody likes exposition breaks in their action shooter games, its a restriction of the genre. Yet while some of Overwatch's comics and shorts do tell backstory, some actually move forward a story that, if you are just playing the game, you are not even made aware of. Why is that? I see it as a restriction of *Overwatch's* genre, a

competitive online shooter. The way the game is set up, a series of online matches, doesn't lend itself to a story. While the heroes themselves hint at a world with many stories to tell, there just simply isn't a place to tell them outside of special events. With this in mind, Blizzard seems to have made the decision to tell these stories in the way that makes the most sense for their game, outside of it. While doing this they can also ignore the limitations of the genre. Transmedia storytelling has become, in this case, the technique required to move past a development issue.

Yet, how does this idea of telling a story outside of limitations fit for World of Warcraft? Has the game not been telling stories for 14 years now? Honestly, how this idea is being applied to the game, and the backlash to it are the reason I am writing this. In the new expansion, Battle for Azeroth, the team for the game is interested in telling a more character driven story. This is where the issue of genre comes in again. Massive multiplayer online (MMO) games have a tendency to tell stories through either walls of text or short interactions or cutscenes involving non-player characters. These are fine for very event driven narratives, but not for character drama. In truth, having the player just follow around a few characters as they endlessly talk to each other wouldn't be very engaging. It would be similar to having a big exposition dump in a film, informative sure but it doesn't hold the attention. It also has no gameplay potential so it would all around bore players. The solution that seems to have come from this problem is to put actions into the game, yet give extra context in short stories or comics. Players don't have to seek these things out, but they can if they want to better understand the characters inner motivations. A player that doesn't care about this, however, still gets the epic cinematics and gameplay they want. It is a way to please two very different kinds of player. It also allows the developers to move past the limitations of their genre, into a region of storytelling they want to explore. In the end, I think that transcendence of limitations in narrative is one of the most interesting ideas that games have for us recently.

The Meg delivers exactly what you expect

Back in 1975, Steven Spielberg unleashed his cinematic masterpiece onto the unsuspecting masses in the form of Jaws. Adapted from the (surprise) hit book of the same name, Jaws made waves with both critics and audiences alike, creating not only the summer blockbuster, but also solidifying and legitimizing the shark genre of film into what we know today. The Meg, much like Jaws, was also based on a novel. Written by Steve Alten, *The Meg* (the novel's name is simply Meg) has been stuck in development hell for quite some time now. Originally, New Line Cinema was to release the film in 2008 with Guillermo Del Toro directing, but when 2008 came and went without a splash from our favorite prehistoric monstrosity, back into the depths the project went. After the rights were dropped from New Line and Del Toro was gone, next up to direct was the saint of splatter himself, Eli Roth. But, surprise surprise, this never happened. Finally, after twenty one years of teasing, we the fans finally get to take a bite out of this lonnnnng awaited treat. So, does The Meg sink or swim when it comes to adaptations of shark novels? Oh, it swims baby. Like a megalodon creeping up from the bottom of the ocean.

This review is not going to go into much detail concerning the story of the film, because it is still making **serious bank** in theatres and I don't want to spoil it for those who are still planning on going to see it. In

summary, Jason Statham plays Jonas Taylor, a rescue diver who loses two men during a deep sea rescue. While in the depths, something rams into the hull of the submarine that their on and forces Jonas to leave the remaining men in order to save everyone else. This royally screws Jonas up and he "retires" to Thailand, disgraced and thought to be crazy. Fast forward five years and Jonas is dragged out of "retirement" in order to rescue his exwife (who left him after the incident on the sub) from the bottom of the Marianas trench, where her crew has discovered a gosh darn megalodon. While this story isn't going to wow you with utter brilliance, it will keep you hooked from the start with some smart pacing and some genuinely wonderful acting from all those involved. Outside of god-king Statham, we have Rainn Wilson (Dwight from *The Office*) playing an eccentric tool of a billionaire and boy is he delightful. Cliff Curtis (the stepdad from Fear The Walking Dead) is another treat as Jonas's old partner who wrangles him back into the water. This is a film with what feels like *genuine* people genuinely trying to do good. They're nerds in the water that accidentally release a megalodon and actively try to contain and/or kill the monster. It's almost like *Lake Placid*, but with an even bigger beastie.

Water and shark based puns aside, *The Meg* is a solid summer blockbuster and the best shark film since *Deep Blue Sea* (suck it *The Shallows* and *47 Meters Down*). The characters are likeable and entertaining, the story has a quick pace, the cinematography is wonderful at capturing the scale of

VRV adds classic Nickelodeon channels to streaming service

VRV, a fandom-focused digital streaming service, has signed a deal with Viacom and Nickelodeon to launch a new streaming channel dedicated to Nick's classic 90's shows and more. The new channel, called NickSplat (yes really), will stream via VRV as an over-the-top service, and will offer fans access to nearly 30 classic series, the companies say.

Its lineup includes series like
"AAAHH!!! Real Monsters," "CatDog,"
"Doug," "Rocko's Modern Life," "All That,"
"Are You Afraid of the Dark?," "Clarissa Explains It All," "Kenan & Kel," "Legends of the Hidden Temple," "The Angry Beavers" "The Wild Thornberrys," and many others.

VRV says additional shows will be added at a later date.

The channel will also be available both as a \$5.99 per month a la carte subscription and it will be included in the VRV premium bundle, which is \$9.99 per month. In a sense, the a la carte option is the equivalent of it being its own streaming service, but one without its own standalone platform, as with Viacom's Noggin, aimed at the preschool set.

VRV's premium bundle offers a variety of channels beyond NickSplat, including also Ellation's anime streaming service Crunchyroll, Funimation, Rooster Teeth, Shudder and others, as well as exclusive series like "HarmonQuest," "Killjoys," "Thundercats," and "Gary and His Demons."

"VRV, with a sophisticated user base that loves the best in animation, is the perfect platform to launch our NickSplat channel," said Sam Cooper, Viacom Executive Vice President of Distribution and Business Development Partnerships, in a statement about the launch.

"Viacom's content – including our deep library of genre-defining television – is highly in demand, and our audiences are always looking for new and innovative ways to enjoy our programming. We're committed to finding the best partners to bring our individual brands direct to the consumer, and this relationship with VRV is an exciting step forward in our strategy," Cooper added.

VRV arrived in 2016 as something of a competitor to Amazon's Prime Video Channels, which also provides access to niche digital streaming content in a single destination. However, VRV offers members over 20,000 hours of free content, with the option to upgrade to the Premium tier for more, as well as its exclusives. Amazon's Channels, on the other hand, is only an a la carte service where members pick and choose which channels they want. There aren't any channel bundles available at this


In addition, unlike Amazon Channels, VRV isn't targeting a mainstream user base, but has been more focused on serving various fandoms – anime fans, gamers, comics fans, sci-fi and fantasy fans, and others.


With NickSplat, it's now going after a slightly different demographic – kids who grew up watching Nickelodeon on linear TV and are nostalgic for those old shows. Maybe they even want to stream them for their own kids these days

days.

For Viacom, a partnership with VRV gives it a chance to monetize its older library content in a different way than throwing it out on a bigger platform, like Netflix (where, frankly, it would be seen by more viewers). However, VRV is not the only place some of these old shows can be found – there are also Nick classic series on other services, like Hulu and Amazon – the latter where they can be purchased by episode or season. In other words, if you're sorta obsessed with one or two old Nick shows, you may want to just go find them elsewhere. NickSplat only makes sense if you want a big back catalog of classic Nickelodeon.

VRV is available online and as an app on Xbox One, PS4, Apple TV, Roku, Fire TV, Android TV, Chromecast, Android and iOS. The service's operator, Ellation, is now solely owned by AT&T now that it bought out The Chernin Group's controlling interest in Ellation parent, Otter Media.

Gamecocks Fall to North Carolina A&T in season-opening thriller

One of college football's most remarkable streaks came to an unfortunate end in the annual Guardian Credit Union FCS Kickoff Saturday night.

Sixth-ranked Jacksonville State's regular-season win streak of 41 straight against non-FBS opponents came to an end against No. 14 North Carolina A&T in the nationally televised showdown of FCS powers at Cramton Bowl.

The defending HBCU champs (1-0) immediately answered two Gamecocks touchdowns with scores of their own in the third quarter and held on to prevail 20-17, handing JSU its first loss to a non-FBS foe since Nov. 16, 2013 (a span of 1,743 days).

Jacksonville State, 0-1 for the first time since losing to Michigan State in the 2014 opener, had its chances late.

New quarterback Zerrick Cooper connected on five straight passes as the Gamecocks moved from their 20 to the North Carolina A&T 18 in the waning moments, but the Aggies' Darryl Johnson forced a fumble that the visitors from the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference pounced on to preserve the upset.

"I made a lot of mistakes tonight," said Jacksonville State head coach John Grass. "Not a lot of smart coaching on my part. "I thought our effort was really good, but it goes back to (North Carolina) A&T — they played hard. Defensively, I thought we played well at times. Offensively, we've got to be able to run the ball better (80 yards on 27 carries)."

Jacksonville State outgained NCA&T 403-148, but mistakes both mental and physical proved too costly to overcome. The Gamecocks committed four turnovers, were whistled for 14 penalties and were only 1-for-11 on third-down conversions.

Cooper had his moments in his JSU debut: he threw touchdown passes of 49 and 40 yards on backto-back series in the third quarter as the Gamecocks' offense began to display some explosiveness. The redshirt sophomore transfer was 24-for-38 for 320 yards but also was intercepted once.

The Aggies led 7-3 at halftime as both offenses struggled to find a rhythm

North Carolina A&T got on the board first with a 24-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter that was aided by a pair of 15-yard flags against Gamecocks defenders.

Cooper's first TD pass, a 49-yard strike to Daniel Byrd, gave Jacksonville State its first lead at 10-7 with 6:13 remaining in the third. That lead lasted only 16 seconds,

however, as NCA&T's Malik Wilson took the ensuing kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown to put his team in front 14-10.

A 40-yard Cooper touchdown pass to Josh Pearson just over a minute later put the Gamecocks ahead again at 17-14. The three-play scoring drive saw Cooper hit Shaq Davidson on a 24-yard completion before his toss to Pearson, whose first career catch resulted in points.

North Carolina A&T took the lead for what proved to be the last time with five-play, 36-yard drive after JSU failed to execute an onside kick following its score. A catch interference penalty on nthe kickoff gave the Aggies excellent field position and they re-took the lead on a 4-yard touchdown pass with 2:36 left in the third quarter.

Stinnett missed a 51-yard attempt on the first play of the fourth quarter and had a 41-yard try blocked with 4:11 remaining in the game.

Jalen Choice led Jacksonville State's defense with nine tackles, including 1.5 for losses.

The Gamecocks now have two weeks to prepare for their home opener against Mississippi Valley State at Burgess-Snow Field on Sept. 8. The Braves kick off their 2018 campaign on Sept. 1 at North Dakota.

Pair of **Gamecocks** set for World **Amateur Team** Champonship

DUBLIN, Ireland -Two weeks after Jesus Montenegro Dario made waves at the US Amateur, another member of the Jacksonville State golf program is set to compete on the worldwide stage.

Senior Valentina Giraldo will begin play with Team Colombia on Wednesday at the 2018 Women's World Amateur Team Championships. The four-day event will be played at the Carton House - O'Meara and Montgomerie Courses in Dublin and will be conducted by the International Golf Federation.

Next week, Patricio Freundt-Thurne will represent his home country of Peru in the Men's World Team Amateur Championship, which will be held at the same location. The women will play for the Espirito Santo Trophy, while the men will compete for the Eisenhower Trophy.

A total of 57 countries are represented and will have two or three players each and will play 18 holes of stroke play over four days. In each round, the total of the two lowest scores from each team constitutes the team score for the round. The four-day (72-hole) total is the team's score for the championship. Giraldo, a native of Ibague, Colombia, is coming off a recordsetting year with the women's JSU golf team. The OVC Player of the Year and medalist at the OVC Tournament won a schooland conference-record six times, tying for the fourth-most wins in a season in NCAA history. Her 72.50 scoring average led the OVC and broke her own school record of 74.06 set in her sophomore season.

Freundt-Thurne was a sophomore for the Gamecocks, who won their second-straight OVC Championship. He is a native of Lima, Peru.

MAYES: Gamecocks face uncharted territory with season-opening loss

November 16, 2013. That was the last time that the Jacksonville State Gamecocks lost in the regular season to a non-FBS foe before Saturday night's 20-17 heartbreaker at the hand of the defending HBCU champion North Carolina A&T.

Not since Jimmy Garoppolo, current starting quarterback for the San Francisco 49ers, torched the Gamecocks for a 52-14 victory has JSU felt the sting of defeat to a team on their own level in a regular season, snapping a streak of 41 straight victories.

John Grass, whowas the offensive coordinator at the time, says his team would much rather feel the sting of defeat now than come early December.

"I'd rather have this feeling right now than at the end of the year in the playoffs," Grass said. "This will grow our football team."

When you look at the laundry list of plays that didn't go the Gamecocks' way and consider that JSU still had a chance to win the game on its final drive, you have to agree with Coach Grass that this game will only help the team going forward

OVC's new deal includes ESPN+ Broadcasts

BRENTWOOD, Tenn.
