This volume is a collection of papers read at the Eleventh International April Conference held at the Jagiellonian University in Krakow, Poland, on April 23–25, 2008. By now a regular scholarly event organized every three years by the Institute of English Philology, over the decades the April Conference has brought to Kraków thousands of scholars from all over the world. In 2008, 138 researchers participated in the congress, 120 papers were presented and almost 90 were submitted for publication.
