In this eighth issue, we have included two Bridging Research and Practice articles. The first article by Danielle DeFauw, Julie Anne Taylor and Okezie Iroha, examines how the Detroit billboard project influenced high school students' interest and language development. Particularly, the authors explored the impact of the project on students' views of how persuasive writing impacts an authentic audience, which includes their community and themselves. In the second article, Joy Myers describes Eva's story, a case study of one teacher's inquiry into interactive read alouds. Myers argues that given the tremendous attention early literacy has received recently and the increasing diversity of our student population, it is important and timely to engage in conversations regarding ways an inquiry stance can bolster literacy teachers' confidence regarding their instructional decisions. For the popular Critical Issues section, we provide articles on fluency by a group of outstanding researchers. Marcia Invernizzi, the Henderson Professor of Education at University of Virginia, discusses the role of developmental word knowledge. Timothy Rasinski, Professor of Reading Education at Kent State University, James Nageldinger, Assistant Professor of Literacy Education at Elmira University, and Chase Young, Associate Professor in the department of Language, Literacy and Special Populations at Sam Houston State University, build the case that reading fluency should be authentic reading. Laura Tortorelli, Assistant Professor of Reading Education at Michigan State Universit, y asks and answers a very important question: "Does reading rate equal reading fluency?" Voices from Around the State continues to be well-received by our readers, and in this issue we have teacher tips from Brittany Kennedy in Norridge, Illinois, Jill Hoort at Okemos Public Montessori, and Martha Rogers at Walled Lake Consolidated District. For our eighth issue, Brandy Archer from the Michigan Department of Education reports that literacy has been woven into MDE's strategies and action plan for becoming a top 10 state in

education in 10 years. We provide reviews of professional texts for teachers in a column titled *Must Read Texts*, which is edited by Dr. Kathy Highfield. We include a column edited by Dr. Laura Apol and four doctoral students (i.e., Lisa Domke, Ashley Johnson, Jeanne Loh, and Tracy Weippert) entitled, *For the Love of Literature*.
